Legislative forum held in Wayne

Approximately 30 people were on hand Monday to listen to Barry Kennedy, State Chamber President talk about the future of Nebraska busi-

The event also included a presentation by State Senator Pat Engel who explained some of the issues that the legislature faced during the past ses-

Kennedy told his audience that 28 forums are scheduled throughout the state this fall and that 1,200 to 1,400

business persons will attend the events environment, health care and agribusiand "provide excellent feedback" to be used as the State Chamber serves to lobby issues before the state legislature in coming months.

Kennedy noted that the last two legislative sessions were dominated by revenue/budget issues and that 833 bills were introduced in the last session, 300 of which will be carried over into the 2004 session.

Among the top issues currently being discussed are taxes, economic development and labor relations. Other important topics being debated include the

ness issues.

Kennedy said that he has repeatedly heard that business is not paying its fair share of taxes. He presented a number of statistics showing the amount paid, directly and indirectly by Nebraska businesses.

"Taxes paid by businesses do matter and will affect what businesses do and which ones will locate in Nebraska," Kennedy said.

He noted that affective incentives need to be implemented to attract business to Nebraska.

Senator Engel told his audience that the last few years have been difficult because \$1 billion of spending had to be

cut and taxes were raised. "It hasn't been easy and I have had to vote for things I didn't want to, but did because I felt it was our responsibility to take care of certain things," Engel


Engel spoke about areas within the state which may need changes, including correctional facilities and higher education.

Construction to begin on Highway 35

Construction work is scheduled to begin Monday, Sept. 29 on Highway 35 from Winside to Wayne.

Brower Construction Co. of Sioux City, Iowa has the contract for the work




of milling the existing roadway, patching and lay two inches of asphaltic concrete to the existing roadway.

Earth shoulders will be constructed, bridge curbs modified and new guardrail installed from Winside North to the Highway 98 Junction.

Most of the work will be done with one lane closed, so motorists are to expect delays of 10 to 15 minutes when work is being done.

Flagmen and a pilot car will control traffic through the work sites. Work is expected to be completed by

mid-November 2003.

Program gives taste of law enforcement


Participating in the 36th annual Junior Law Cadet program this summer, Ben Allemann of Wayne (a senior at Wayne High School) got a taste of what it is like in law enforcement. Two sessions of the week-long program were held for high school students - one for 30 boys (June 16-20) and one for 30 girls (June 9-13). The program was held at the Nebraska State Patrol Training Academy in Grand Island.

The program is sponsored by the American Legion and cadets are chosen through applications sent in by interested students. They are also chosen based on character and interest in law enforcement and they are interviewed.

During the week of intensive training in law enforcement and traffic safety, students listened to authorities from the municipal police, county sheriff, health department, game commission, Department of Motor Vehicles, Nebraska National Guard, court administrator, Federal Bureau of Investigations, and Nebraska State Patrol.

The students received hands-on experience with patrol dogs, SWAT team tactics, marksmanship, accident investigations, mock chase situations, and






A free will donation will be accepted for those wishing to come watch the fun. Refreshments will also be available.

The group, part of a Community and Economic Development Study Tour, started their tour of the United States in Chicago.

From there, they traveled to South Sioux City where they were a part of the 2003 Rural Institute on Sept. 16-18.

Following the completion of the Institute, the group traveled to Hartington where they spent the night in several different locations.

On Friday, they toured several locations in Yankton, S.D. before coming to Wayne. While here the visited Logan Nursery and had a chance to ask questions of owner Steve Hall.

From there, Annette Junck, Economic Development Coordinator in Laurel, took the six Australians and one New Zealander to Heritage Homes for a tour of the plant. Members of the group were able to view several homes in various stages of completion, ask questions and discuss

differences in home construction between this area and their home country.

After leaving northeast Nebraska, the group had plans to stop in Fremont, attend River City Round Up activities in Omaha and have a farewell dinner in Lincoln, as well as a tour of the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, the state capitol and the Food Processing Center.

The group was made up of members from the Department of Primary Industry (Department of Ag) in Victoria, area consultants who help with community projects and those who work with business activities in communities. They indicated they were "a diverse group with different interests looking at what others are doing."

Members of the group were quick to express thanks to those they had met while in the United States, noting "the friendship and hospitality is amazing."

While most of the members then returned to their homes, several had other agendas including staying on for more conferences and heading for other conferences in the United Kingdom.

Trips such as this from Australia are being taken to the United States on a regular basis.



Does Nebraska need presidential caucus?

A couple of Democrats are vigorously pushing to set up an unofficial presidential caucus for their party.

The idea is to lift Nebraska from its status as a complete political nonentity in presidential election

The idea sounds great to me, for a couple of reasons.

First, almost anything that would add a bit of dynamics to Nebraska politics would be a good thing.

Second, it would give reporters something to do in January besides writing about the NU bowl game and the Legislature.

Attorney Vince Powers of Lincoln is the driving force behind the notion. He has been joined by former Omaha Mayor Mike Boyle.

Powers figures Nebraska could draw presidential wannabes to Nebraska by holding the unofficial caucus a week or so before the nationally ballyhooed Iowa caucus-

The presidential hopefuls would haul their assets across the river in hopes of snagging a win, a little momentum and a lot of press, prior to the Iowa vote. And presidential candidates are like other kinds of cattle. If you can get one of 'em to cross the river, the rest will follow.

Heck, the tourist value alone would be worth the effort. Reporters from all over the place would show up. A Nebraska caucus, even an unofficial one, would be good for at least a full day of jabber and analysis on CNN, MSNBC and Fox News. Newspapers around the country would carry all manner of comment on the results of the Nebraska vote:

They would speculate on whether the Nebraska vote would influence the Iowa vote, whether event would bolster Democratic fortunes in Nebraska down the road, and whether Nebraska beef is better than Iowa beef.

You know that the winner would claim that Nebraska is the "true heartland" of America, that it is 'Where the West begins," and that the Iowa caucuses have become a media circus and a spending con-

The Nebraska vote would be

"unofficial" because Democratic Party won't endorse it. The vote wouldn't be binding on state delegates to the national convention.


Powers had an appropriate response when he noted that a caucus in Nebraska would annoy Democratic National Committee to no end: "Who cares?"

Well, no one with any knowledge of how the national machinery (for either party) looks at Nebraska. Republicans understandably take Nebraska for granted. Democrats

This reality is understandable. The Nebraska primaries are held in May. By May, the whole presidential nominating deal is virtually over. Why would a candidate come to Nebraska? Not many delegates to be had.

The fact that Democratic presidential candidates came to Nebraska might even bring a Republican candidate around later in the year. (Okay. It might prompt President Bush to do a fly-in and an airport rally.)

Why not?



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

Wanting to ride along with the state patrol got the ball rolling for Allemann in being part of the Junior Law Cadet program.





Winona State topples Wayne State in NSIC opener

Special teams mistakes resurfaced for the Wayne State football team in Saturday's 38-13 home loss to Winona State in the Northern Sun Conference opener at Cunningham Field in Wayne.

The 11th-ranked Warriors took advantage of a Wayne State interception and two bad punt snaps to gain stellar field position early in the game and never looked back, taking a 28-0 lead in the second quarter.

"For some reason, we manage to find a way to not believe in ourselves," said WSC Head Coach Scott Hoffman. "You can't spot a team as great as Winona a 28point lead and expect to come

Down 28-0 with 5:38 left in the first half, Wayne State put together a 14-play, 78 yard drive to get on the scoreboard with 33 seconds left in the half. Brett Edwards found the endzone from three yards out to make the score 28-7.

Wayne State scored on its first possession of the second half to make the score 28-13. A 13-yard pass from Edwards to Eric Kjar capped an 11 play, 90-yard drive and it appeared that the Wildcats were back in the game.

But Winona State countered with a 10 play, 73 yard drive, resulting in a 25-yard field goal by Steve Opgenorth, to give the Warriors a 31-13 lead after three quarters.

Following a Wayne State interception in the fourth quarter, Winona State would close out the scoring on Kevin Curtin's 25-yard run with 5:20 left in the game to make the final score 38-13.

"After we got down early, I thought we hung in there with them," said Hoffman, commenting on the two long drives that Wayne State put together for scores. "We were moving up and down the field on those guys,'

Winona State had 405 yards in total offense to Wayne State's 318. The Wildcat attack was mainly through the air with 236 yards

passing. Edwards completed 16 of 29 passes for 210 yards with one touchdown and two interceptions. Josh Hopwood topped all Wildcat receivers with five catches for 76 yards. Kjar followed with four receptions for 51 yards and one score.

Edwards was Wayne State's leading rusher with 58 yards on 18 attempts. Mell Holliday added 53 yards on 15 carries.

Defensively for the Wildcats, linebackers Aaron Rodgers and Bump Christensen and cornerback Fester Huot each collected seven tackles.

Wayne State falls to 0-3 overall and 0-1 in the NSIC and faces a road challenge at Southwest State on Saturday at 1:30pm. "Southwest is always a tough

place to play," stated Hoffman. We're expecting them to be ready, but we have to come out focused and intense and not dig ourselves in a hole like we did against Winona."

Wayne State defeated Southwest State last year in Wayne 16-13.









Defensively, Blohm made 19 tackles for Allen. Rahn chipped in with 17 stops and one interception and Smith accounted for 15 tack-

West Nile Virus cases increase

People should still take precautions against West Nile virus, even through the weather is cooler and mosquitoes are less active, according to the Nebraska Health and Human Services System.

Precautions include: *wearing mosquito repellent; *wearing long-sleeved shirt and

*being especially cautious outdoors when mosquitoes are most active - dawn and dusk.

As of Tuesday, 1,538 cases had been reported to the Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services Regulation and Licensure. Four more deaths have occurred, bringing the total number of deaths so far this year to 14 - adding two men over 65 and a woman aged 51-64 from the western part of the state, and a man over 65 from the northeast part.

The five counties with the highest numbers of cases are Adams, 96; Hall, 92; Buffalo, 86; Lincoln, 67; and Lancaster, 63.



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

Some 300 undergraduates at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln will work one-on-one with faculty mentors this fall as the Undergraduates Creative Research Experiences program enters its fourth year.

Students in the UCARE program from this area include: Jon Gathje of Wayne is working with Alisa Belflower, faculty sponsor, (School of Music and Department Theatre Arts) "Contemporary Vocal Works of

Adam Guettel.' Alaina Bupp of Allen, is working with Joy Ritchie (Department of English/Women's Studies) on "Tracing the History of Gender Equity and Women's Studies at

Amber Talbott of Hoskins, is with Janet Fox working . (Southeast Research and Extension Center) on "Legislative Simulation Promotes Youth Public Policy Involvement."

UCARE is an innovative program that enriches the academic experience of undergraduate students at UNL by allowing them to explore a field of particular inter-

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est and learn alongside faculty in a creative activity or research area. Students receive a stipend funded by the Pepsi Endowment, created by the contract between the University and the Pepsi-Cola Company, or funded by the university Program of Excellence

Undergraduates apply for the program in mid-February and awards are made in early April. First-year students serve as undergraduate research assistants for their faculty sponsors and earn compensation up to \$2,000. Students who continue on for a second year of UCARE funding, still guided by their faculty sponsors, receive up to \$2,400, \$400 of which helps to offset research expenses.

"Not only does this program allow undergraduates the opportunity to learn and experience what usually has to wait until graduate school, but it also provides them with excellent faculty mentors and relationships that they would never have experienced in the classroom," said UCARE coordinator Laura Damuth. "This program is also helping to attract top-notch students because UNL has become a national leader in offering facultyguided research and creative activities for undergraduates at a major research university."

undergraduate researchers began their work this last summer and others will start this fall; both groups will continue working on their projects through the 2003-04 academic year.

Tom has lectured extensively and has presented historical and musical programs throughout the country. He has written many articles and has co-authored the book Beneath These Red Cliffs, a history of the Paiute.

The representative of the Paiute Tribe of Utah for the 2002 Winter, Olympics, Tom was one of five Native American flute players to perform at the opening ceremonies. He held the distinction of bringing the Olympic torch from Athens, Greece to Atlanta, Ga., where the torch run began.

His appearance at Wayne State is being coordinated by Dr. Gretchen Ronnow, professor of English, who received an instructional improvement grant for the program. She is also directing some of the monetary award she received as the recipient of the Balsley Whitmore Excellence in Teaching Award earlier this fall to Tom's appearance on campus.

Motorists urged to use caution on rural highways

Collisions between farm machinery and vehicles on rural highways are a serious problem in many states.

Based on crash data compiled from various states, the collision rate may average nearly one per day. The fall harvest season is particularly risky as farmers are moving wagons loaded with harvested grain and harvesting machinery on the same highways as tourists and other highway users viewing the fall colors.

Using well-maintained SMV (slow-moving vehicle) emblems and appropriate lighting on farm equipment can prevent collisions, according to Dr. Tom Bean of the State University Unfortunately, operators don't always understand the rapid closure rate when their car or truck is approaching a farm tractor or

implement that may only be moving 10 mph or less.



The National Safety Council recommends using extra care when driving on rural highways at any time of the year. Never assume that the farm tractor operator is going to continue down the highway. The tractor operator may not be able to clearly see drivers approaching from the rear and may be turning into a field or obscure farm lane. Be prepared for evasive actions when attempting

This week is National Farm Safety week. Take extra care not only this week, but every time farm machinery is operated on the roads or in the fields.

There have been 18 people killed in Nebraska in 2003 through August that were considered farm related. Don't become a needless statistic.





URBAN CONSERVATION

Even though most of Nebraska's residents live in cities and towns, they are never far removed from the state's natural resources.

Conservation is just as important in cities as in rural areas. The activities of city dwellers have a major impact on water and soil; activities like construction, tending lawns and gardens, maintaining motor vehicles and use of hazardous chemicals, as well as solid waste disposal.

NRDs respond to these needs by focusing resources and programs toward urban problems and issues. They include urban forestry, flood control, stream bank erosion, recreation and education. Public information and education efforts take the conservation message to a broad audience, including urban and rural residents.

School outreach programs help teach children about the importance of conserving natural resources and ways they can contribute to a safe, clean environment, Elementary students attend water and natural resources festivals across the state, while older students benefit from outdoor classroom developments, contests for land, range and soil judging and other activities.

Many districts help teachers develop the tools to pass the conservation message on to the next generation. Districts assist universities and colleges in developing natural resources efforts.

Workshops for farmers and urban landowners provide practical information on a variety of ways to care for natural resources.
