

#### Winter Story Time



Since 1974 the Siouxland Community Blood Bank has been making regular visits to Providence Medical Center.


At last Thursday's visit, a proclamation was signed declaring January to be "National Volunteer Blood Donor Month." The proclamation launches the "Give Blood . . The Gift of Life" campaign which highlights the need for continual and consistent volunteer blood donations to maintain local community blood supplies.

Among the regular donors is Candy Frerichs, who said she has been donating on a regular basis for approximately six years.

"I started donating after my father became ill and needed blood," she said.



### Storms, cold weather call for extra precautions

Winter's frigid conditions and snow require extra precautions around the home, a University of Nebraska housing and environment specialist said.

"Faulty heaters, blocked chimneys and pipes, or the improper use of wood and other non-electric stoyes and heaters can cause lethal buildups of carbon monoxide and other gases in the home," said Shirley Niemeyer, a housing and environment specialist in the university's Institute Agriculture and Natural Resources.

"People can die in this kind of weather due to carbon monoxide or frozen vent pipes that send gasses into the home." Niemeyer said: "People's furnaces fail and they may use backup heating sources that can be dangerous if they have not been maintained and serviced."

Any heating system or appliance that burn's gas, oil, wood, propane or kerosene is a potential source of carbon monoxide, she

Carbon monoxide kills between 200 and 300 people each year in the United States. Children, pregnant women, the elderly and people with lung disease are at high risk for carbon monoxide poisoning, but anyone can be overcome by this odorless, tasteless and colorless gas, Niemeyer said.

Carbon monoxide reduces the blood's ability to carry oxygen, causing headaches, dizziness, confusion, nausea, unconsciousness and ultimately death.

"It can occur from a brief exposure to very high levels or longterm exposure from low levels," Niemeyer said. "That's why it's important to have functioning carbon monoxide alarms on each floor of the home."

If a carbon monoxide alarm sounds, a window should be opened quickly and everyone. should immediately go outside to fresh air or to a nearby home. The local fire department and utility company should be notified.

Homeowners and landlords should make sure furnaces, stoves and fireplaces are inspected for cracks, gaps, rust, corrosion or debris. Gas or oil-fired appliances should be serviced annually, she said.

In addition to carbon monoxide poisoning, sewer gases also can be dangerous, Niemeyer said.

"If areas of your home are beginning to smell like a sewer, it may mean something isn't working," she said. "Toxic gases and fumes can present a serious hazard when sewer vents become plugged with ice. A heavy buildup of sewer gas can even be explo-

### Some government decisions unwise

The Nebraska Press Association · Some stories about government are just too sweet to be passed over. Take the case of Frank Brooks of Lincoln and his hybrid, fuel-efficient and environment-friendly Toyota Prius.

The feds are so high on such vehicles that they provide buyers with a \$2,000 tax credit.

What does the State of Nebraska

It sends them a bill for \$75. Why?

The state is billing them for taxes they didn't pay, on gasoline they didn't use!

What can you say?

Banks said he was upset. How's, that for civility in the face of madness? He should get another tax credit just for not blowing a gasket.

It seems the state apparently didn't mean for the current law to put the bite on people like Brooks. It just worked out that way because of the way the statute is written. There is a bill pending to change the law.

Okay. Fine. But what about Brooks? What about his \$75?

I don't know Frank Brooks. Don't know if he's a working man or if he's in the same tax bracket as A-

You know what? I don't care, either. The state should return the guy's

\$75. Of course, getting that done might require a study by a legislative committee, a special session of the Legislature, an opinion from the attorney general and eventual

enactment of yet another statute. No state can return money with the efficiency it musters when collecting it.

One anecdotal note: It could have been worse.

Take the case of my friend of 40something years, Ken Rowlett. He lives in Ohio.

In Ohio, the state mails your license plates to you.

The state screwed up and didn't send Ken his tags on time. He got

a ticket. Officials refused to let him have temporary tags until he received his previously paid for tags from the state, which caused


Ken had to buy a set of plates on the spot in order to use his car. Later, his plates arrived from the

Meanwhile, he paid his fine.

Thus, Ken Rowlett is out the cost of the fine. And he is probably the only guy in Ohio with two sets of license plates - both paid for - that go with one vehicle. The whole deal cost him more than

\$200. Worse still (from a reporter's view) he went to his local newspaper with this phantasmagoric affair. Someone told him it was "a non-story."

And worse than that: As a teenager, I once worked for that stupid newspaper. And I would have given a tooth, at least, for a story like the one Rowlett lived through.



LB 139 is a bill that would add to the list of criminals required to submit to DNA testing. Currently, sexual and violent offenders are on the list; this bill would add burglary and robbery offenders. The experience of law enforcement, shows a 50 percent likelihood that those offenders also may commit sexual and violence crimes.

The bill right now has been advanced to the next round of debate. If it advances through that final debate, we will join 44 other states that include robbery offenders in their DNA sampling, and 41 other states that include burglary offenders. I am in full support of this bill, and think it's an important issue that needs to be addressed.

We also debated LB 32, which deals with an important topic in our district. The federal govern-

LB 32, in its amended form, allows those cities, counties, and natural resource districts to raise tax levies to pay for the unfunded federal mandate. The bill is currently postponed for the drafting of this amendment, and should be put back on the agenda soon.

LB 559 is a bill that would and judicial bypass. change provisions of the Motor Vehicle Operator's License Act.

Among other things, it would decrease the requirement of I.D. when applying for a driver's license. Only one form of I.D. would be needed under this bill.

The bill also provides the authority to enhance the security and reliability of the issuance process for drivers' licenses and identification cards. LB 559 has been advanced for the next round of debate.

The bill to repeal the Campaign Finance Limitation Act, LB 762, has also been up for discussion this week. As the bill stands, it would remove the act that limits the funds a candidate can spend on their campaign. At that point, we would be left

with no limits on campaign spending. Several senators had an issue with this point; they may not be in favor of the current Act, but they would like to see some type of limits in place. I don't think that this will come up again this session, however.

the second round of debate on LB information about abortion options

I am in support of this bill. I have received letters from schools letting me know how burdensome it is for them to have to comply with this law every school year.

I think this is a matter between students and their parents, and should be discussed in the home, without requiring schools to provide this information to all students.

The bill is obviously an extremely contentious one on the floor, with several senators standing to voice their opinions. Nothing was decided on Thursday, so it will be at the top of the agenda on Monday.

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

The Siouxland Community Blood Bank has been making regular visits to Wayne since 1974.

"We appreciate the support volunteer blood donors have shown to their community blood supply, knowing that each donation can help save up to three lives," said Janette Twait, CEO of the Siouxland Community Blood Bank.

"Those medically able, can give up eligible to give but only about five reviewed by collection staff.

The Siouxland Community Blood Bank needs to collect over 1,000 units of blood each week to maintain proper inventory for the 28 community hospitals they service. National Volunteer Blood Donor month encourages current donors to give as often as they are allowed and first time donors to consider how important it is to give the gift

To be eligible to donate whole blood, individuals must be at least 17 years of age; however, there is no upper age limit as long as the donor is in good health.

In addition, donors need to weigh over 110 pounds, have a hematocrit level of 38 percent and have not donated whole blood in the past 56 days. A photo I.D. is required at the time of registration.

To be eligible to make a Double Red Cell donation, males need to be at least 5 feet, 6 inches tall and weigh at least 150 pounds. Females need to be at least 5 feet 1 inch tall and weigh at least 130

In addition to these requirements, hemoglobin needs to be tested at 13.3 and hematocrit levels need to be 40 percent for both make and female donors.

Regulations regarding donations also change from time to time and someone who has been deferred in the past should be re-valuated to see if they are now eligible.

Among the more common questions potential donors have include: Allergies - OK to donate. Medication or shots OK.

Most Antibiotics — The donor will be accepted 24 hours after completion of therapy.

Blood pressure — Must be within to six times a year. About 60 per- acceptable limits. Most medications cent of people over the age of 17 are are acceptable, but must be

> Cancer — Melanoma, leukemia, lymphoma are permanent deferrals. All other forms of cancer are deferred for five years (Basal Cell Skin Cancer - no deferral).

Diabetes — If well controlled by oral medication or insulin, are allowed to donate.

Medications - Aspirin, birth control pills, antihistamines and thyroid medications will not disqualify the donor. Most medications are not a problem. Staff members will need to document the exact name of the medications on the donor card each time a donation is given.

Tattoos/ Piercing - The donor needs to wait one year after they have received their tattoo. Ear and body piercings are allowed to donate if performed professionally with one-time-use sterile equipment set up.

Travel Outside the U.S. — Need to be able to list areas of travel and dates. Each will be evaluated due to location and restrictions that apply. Some specific areas that need to be evaluated are the United Kingdom, European countries and Mexico.

Vaccinations - Hepatitis - one day wait; chicken pox - two week wait; MMR - four week wait; flu shot - no wait; oral polio - two week wait.




Meyer's story points out the changes at the farm since the Rings out and their cattle are gone.

### Big second half rally lifts Wayne State men over MSU-Moorhead

Saturday night's basketball game between the Wayne State men and MSU-Moorhead was a rarity for several reasons. Take your pick.

1.-The Wildcats rallied from a 30-16 halftime deficit and an 18point deficit in the second half to down the Dragons 69-58.

2.-Wayne State scored more points from the free throw line (37) than from the field (32).

3.-MSU-Moorhead held the lead for 36 of the game's 40 minutes. It was that kind of a night at

Rice Auditorium. "Our backs were against the wall and yet we still found a way to win the game," said WSC head

coach Rico Burkett. The Wildcats struggled against MSU-Moorhead's 3-2 zone defense in the first half and hit just 5 of 21

shots from the field (23 percent). But a more aggressive attack and a different offense in the second half helped the Wildcats come

back in the second half. "In the second half, we went with four perimeter players and one inside on offense to try and attack the zone better and it worked. We were more aggressive and it got us some opportunities to score," added Burkett.

WSC used a big advantage from the free throw line to win the game as the Wildcats canned 37 of 43 attempts, including 32 of 36 in the second half. MSU-Moorhead was 13 of 22 at the stripe.

Brett Cain paced the Wildcats

Dallas Hodges had 14.

The Wildcats suffered through their worst shooting night of the season, hitting just 15 of 46 shots from the field for 32.6 percent. MSU-Moorhead was 21 of 47 for 44 percent.

Wayne State held a 39-28 edge in rebounding over the Dragons. Cain and Archer each hauled in 12 caroms for the 'Cats. Hodges dished out a team-high five assists.

Friday evening, the Wildcats suffered a disappointing 87-73 loss at Rice Auditorium to Northern State. The Wolves controlled much of the game, taking a 47-35 lead at halftime. Norhtern State enjoyed a 27-point lead at one point in the second half before finishing with the 87-73 win.

Coach Burkett said he was very disappointed in his team's effort considering the importance of the

Wayne State was outrebounded in the game 31-22. Tim Gesell led, the Wildcats with five boards.







## Carbon monoxide is a concern in cold weather

number of deaths and injuries from carbon monoxide poisoning increases with about 80 percent of deaths happening in the home. Consumers can take action to help prevent carbon monoxide poison-

Carbon monoxide is a colorless, odorless gas produced by burning fossil fuel. Each year, a qualified professional should check all fuelburning appliances for potential carbon monoxide problems. Furnaces, water heaters and stoves that burn natural or propane gas, heating oil, wood, or other fuel should be checked for potential carbon monoxide leaks.

Chimneys and flues should be checked for leakage and creosote or debris blockage. Also be aware of ice or other weather problems that could cause blockage in chimneys and flues.

Loose or disconnected vents from furnaces, water heaters, boilers, or vented space heaters also should be corrected. High temperature plastic venting pipes should be inspected for any separation or cracks -- especially on gas-fired mid-efficiency furnaces or boilers installed between 1987-1990.

Professionals should also check for the potential of downdrafting or spillage. Downdrafting can occur when other exhaust fans are in use and the natural drifting of a fuel-fired appliance is overpowered and the air in the home is at a lower pressure than outside. Downdrafts result when air flow reverses in a vent of a chimney pulling air and combustion gases back into the house.

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In addition annual inspections. carbon monoxide alarms should be installed that meet Underwriters Laboratories requirements. Battery powered, AC current or a combination are available. Due to potential electrical outages or forgetting to check or replace batteries, a combination carbon monoxide alarm is recommended.

It's also important to never use charcoal grills in enclosed spaces, such as a home, garage, vehicle, tent or partially enclosed patio. Avoid using ranges and ovens to heat the home.

It is very important to have appliances and items inspected before they are used. Know the operating and safety procedures that must be followed. Generators, especially, require a complete understanding of how they are to be safely used.

On the day of the big game, we could hear the LSU and Oklahoma


fans cheering back and forth about which team was going to win. We heard this especially because we were amongst LSU fans.
