

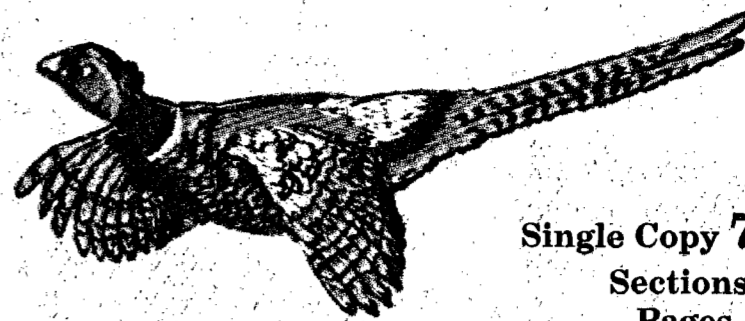

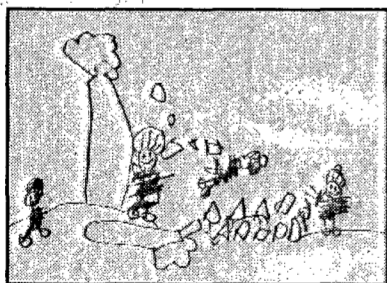
### Fundraiser

## 'Heroes Unite' campaign begins

The Siouxland Community Blood Bank kicked off their 2004 donor recruitment campaign, Heroes Unite, It's About Life, in Wayne on May 14 at Providence Medical Center.

The campaign which runs through the end of September, is designed to recruit new donors in the summertime, retain current donors, and increase the frequency of volunteer blood donation. This is accomplished through a partnership with local Fire, Police, and Rescue squads.

The "Heroes Unite, It's About Life" campaign helps recruitment efforts through education by the Siouxland Community Blood Bank staff and com-

munity participation.

From May through September the blood bank will be conducting blood drives in over 100 communities in the tri-state area.

The top three communities with the highest percentage of blood donors registering to donate in comparison to the size of their Fire, Police and Rescue squads combined will win a sponsored donation towards community fire and rescue equipment. The top prize this year will be \$1,000.

In attendance at the kick-off event were representatives from Providence Medical Center, the City of Wayne and the local Fire and Rescue squad. "We

are happy that this community supports the good cause of volunteer blood donation and encourage citizens of Wayne to donate blood as often as they are eligible," said Donor Consultant Jason Olesen. "The reality is that one out of three people will need blood in their lifetime and you all should feel special about keeping this life saving gift available for your community."

The next opportunity to donate in Wayne is Thursday, May 27 at Providence Medical Center in Wayne.

Nationwide four million lives were saved last year by volunteer blood donors. These heroes come from every walk of life but out of their kindness,

blood is available at our local hospitals when needed.

To be eligible to donate blood individuals must be at least 17 years of age; however, there is no upper age limit as long as the donor is in good health. In addition, donors need to weigh over 110 pounds and have not donated whole blood in the past 56 days. A photo I.D. is required at the time of registration.

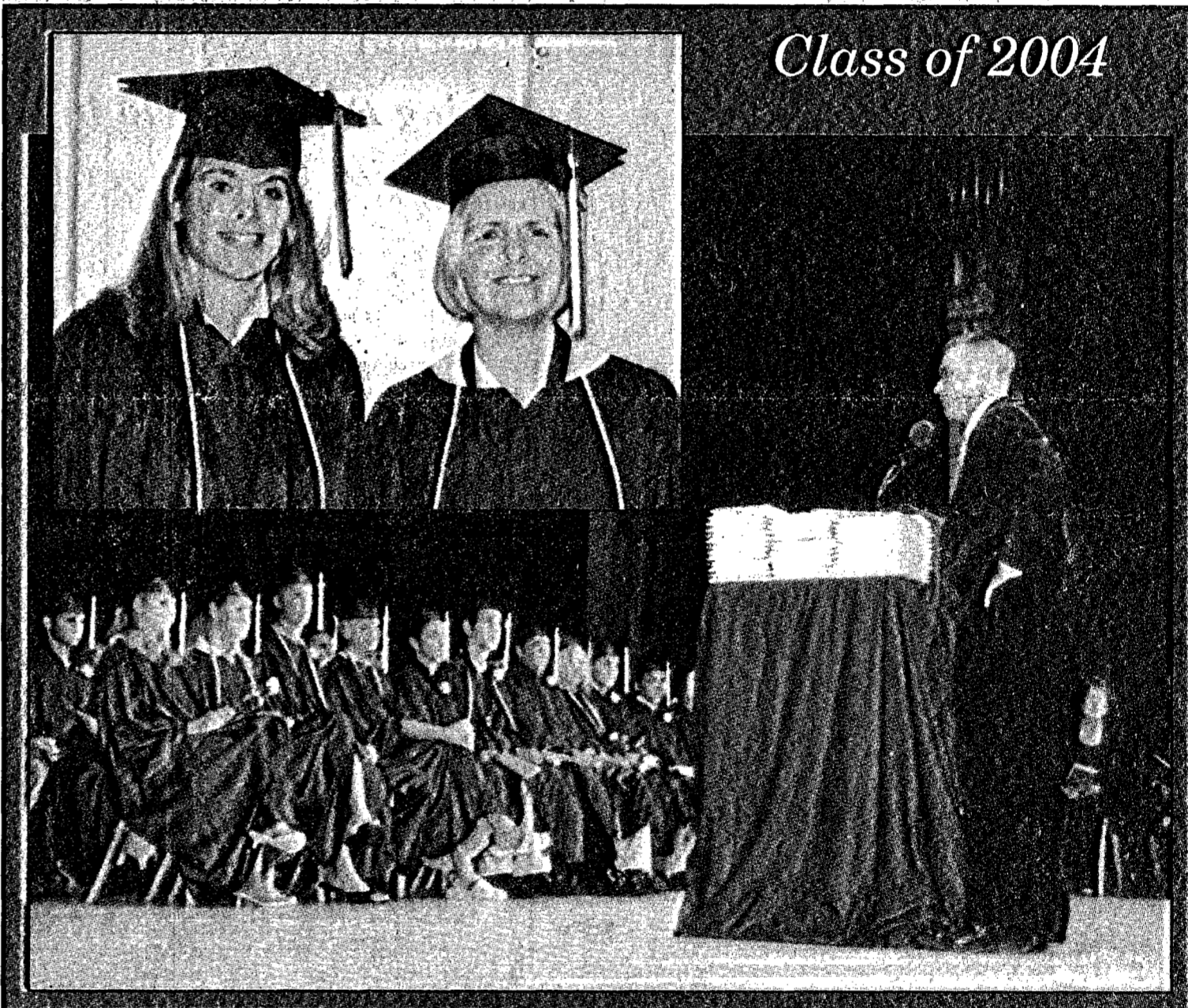
The event will be held on Wednesday, May 26 at 7 p.m. in Ramsey Theatre on the Wayne State College campus.

Born with cerebral palsy, Sarah has encountered many obstacles in her young life. But instead of letting them get her down, she has found a way to triumph over them. "I have developed what I call a CAN philosophy," she said. "First, it's important to have a Caring support system. Then, A always find the positive. Finally, Never give up on your hopes and dreams."

The Neligh native came to Wayne State after graduating from Neligh-Oakdale High School in the spring of 2000. "I've made it through Wayne State in four years," she said with a smile.

Not only did she make it through college in four years, she also excelled academically and in extracurricular activities. In addition to being selected to give the invocation at the Wayne State commencement on Saturday, she has been a member of Chi Alpha Epsilon, an academic honorary, serving this year as president. She is vice president of Lambda Pi Eta, communications honorary; president of the Pile Hall residence hall council, on which she has served for five semesters; and a member of Cardinal Key honorary and Campus Crusade for Christ.

Sarah, one of five Wayne State students to attend the Chi Alpha Epsilon national conference in Milwaukee in April, was selected

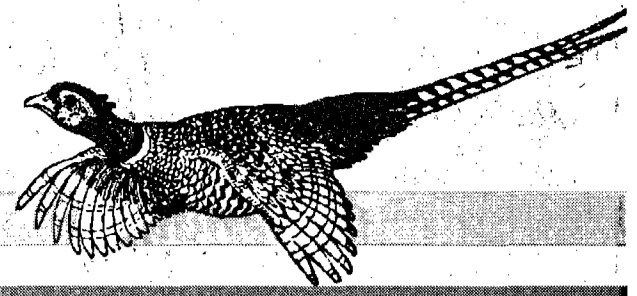

For several years she was a teachers' aide at Sacred Heart Elementary School in Norfolk. She was active in Vocations Ministry for the Archdiocese of Omaha, the Catholic Daughters of the Americas, Altar Society and many other activities of Sacred Heart/St. Mary's Parish. She was a member of Sacred Heart/St. Mary's Catholic Church in Norfolk, Delta Kappa Gamma Sorority, AARP of Norfolk, Retired Teachers Association and VFW Auxiliary of Norfolk.

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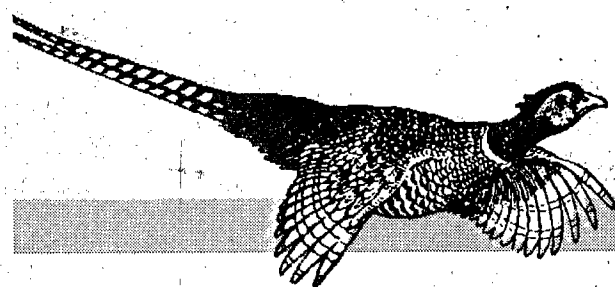

Remember on Memorial Day

 Memorial Day - a time set aside to remember our loved ones and a time to reflect upon the sacrifices our military personnel have made to keep America what she is - Land of the Free.  
 It is a great honor and privilege that I am able to call myself a member of the American Legion Auxiliary. It is through the military service of loved ones - my father, John J. Gallop, Sr.; my brother, Warren M. Gallop; husband, Robert G. "Bud" Neel - that I am able to take one day a year to bring Remembrance and Honor to our fallen Veterans of war out to the general public with the distribution of the Auxiliary memorial flower - the Flanders Poppy.  
 Chairman Dean Janke, Winside Village Board, and Chairman Colby Gillespie, Hoskins Village Board, signed Poppy Proclamations, declaring Saturday, May 22, 2004, as Poppy Distribution Day in their respective communities.

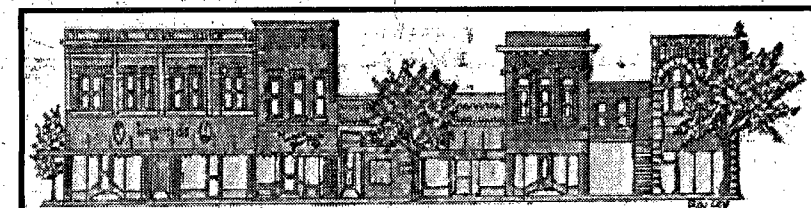
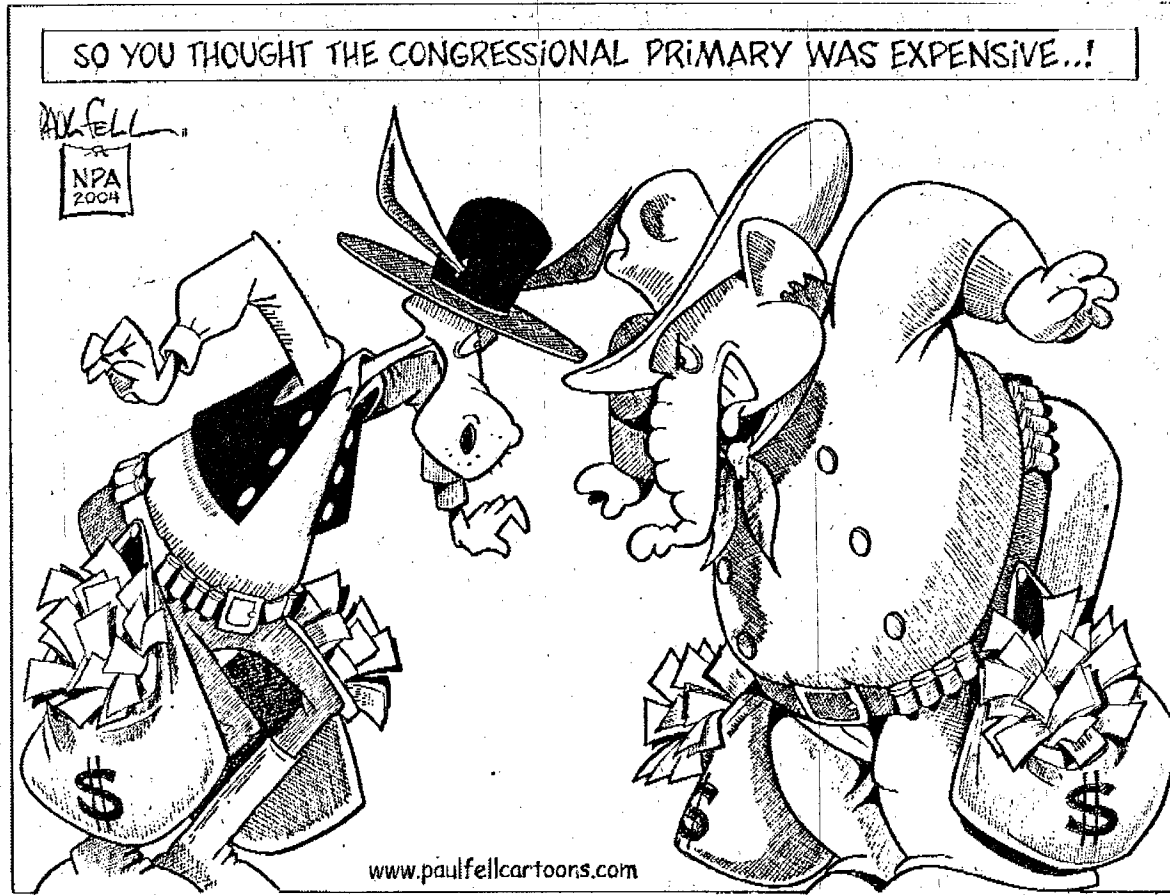
What's in store for the November election?

 The Nebraska Press Association  
 Will a conservative-moderate rift in the state Republican Party enhance the chances of a Democratic victory in the 1st Congressional District?  
 There are bound to be some hard feelings (no matter what any GOP officials tell you) in the wake of Tuesday's primary, which saw Jeff Fortenberry of Lincoln defeat state Sen. Curt Bromm of Wahoo.  
 Fortenberry benefited from the more than \$300,000 spent by the Club for Growth, an East Coast anti-tax organization.  
 The organization had actually endorsed Greg Ruelle of the Nebraska Cattlemen. However, what it really cared about, and said so, was defeating the moderate Bromm.  
 Bromm, the retiring Speaker of the Nebraska Legislature, was slammed for supporting some tax increases to assure a balanced budget during the state's tough economic times.  
 The anti-Bromm television campaign came in what has become the classic attack ad format.  
 There was a time when pointing to "outside money," and especially "East Coast money," in a Nebraska election was almost enough, by itself, to discredit the contributor's cause.  
 That's no longer true here, or in many other places around the country.  
 If the world has become a global village, then the United States has become a political village, at least

when it comes to money.  
 When a candidate is being knocked for tax policy decisions, it's tough. When people are confronted with difficult economic times, it's tougher. And when the criticism is backed by a whopping bunch of money for advertising in newspapers and over the airwaves, it's tougher still.  
 About those hard feelings in the GOP.

It was awaaaay back in 1970 when then-Gov. Norbert Tiemann, who offended some by being as well dressed as he was politically moderate, suffered from a split in the state GOP.  
 The fact is that the overwhelmingly dominant Republican Party figured it could throw Tiemann to the wolves. Even if Democrat Jim Exon were elected, the thinking went, so what? In four years

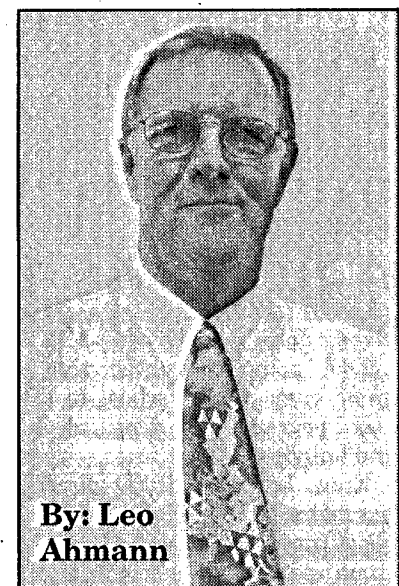
another Republican would dump him and everything would be fine.  
 That thinking was as wrong-headed as it was presumptuous. Exon served two terms as a popular governor, and went on to a career in the U.S. Senate.  
 Some analysts said the Exon reign shouldn't have been a surprise. He was regarded by many as much more conservative than the average moderate Republican.

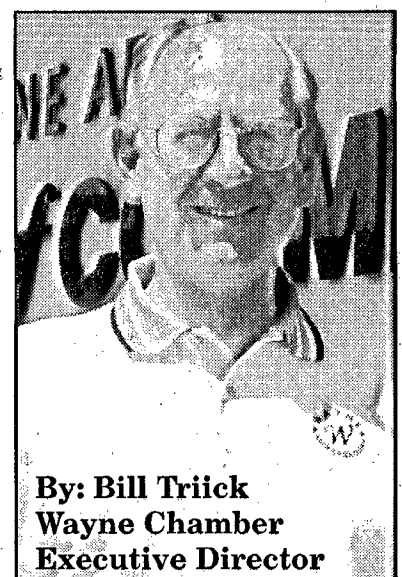

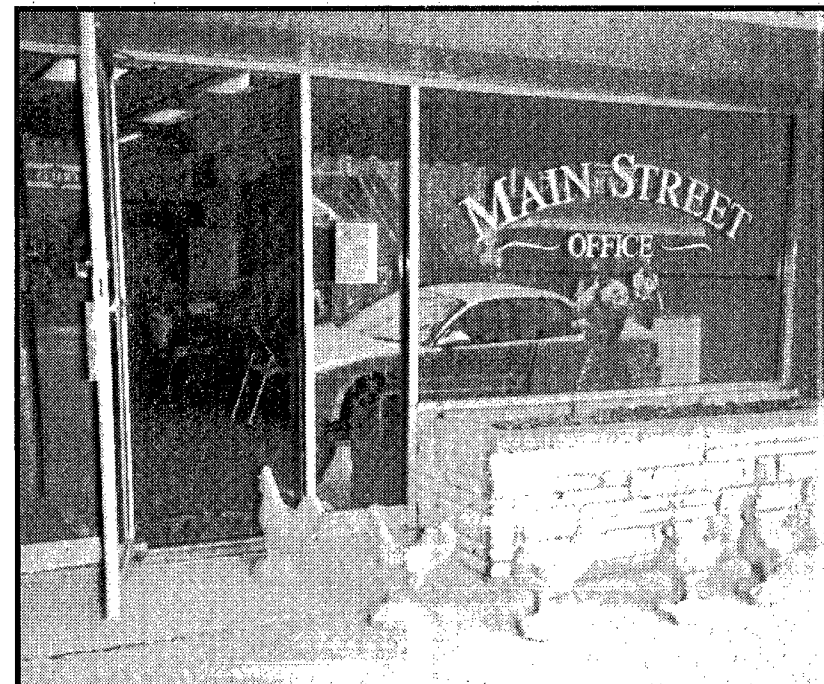

always been my biggest support system," she said. "I'm very grateful for all they've taught me-for everything they've done for me."

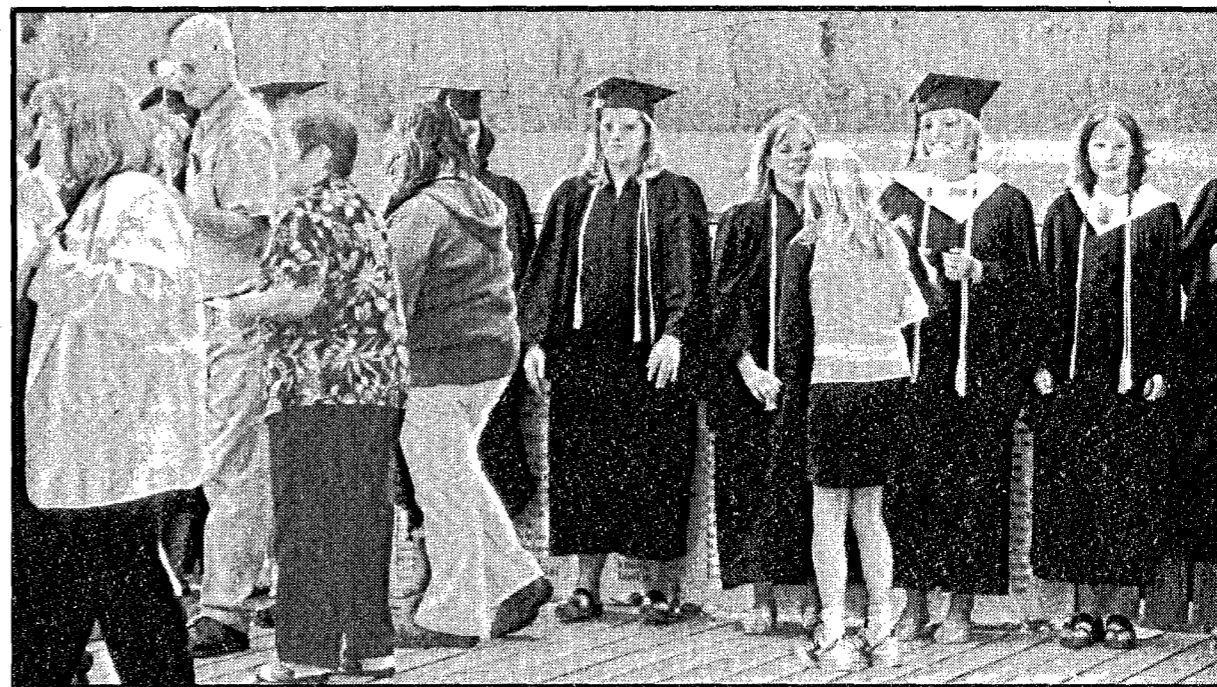
She's also happy she chose Wayne State College. "I'm so thankful I came to a place where professors, staff and fellow students got to know me as a person and not a number," she said.

Future agenda items include policies and changing the Board meeting in July to either the 5th or 6th.

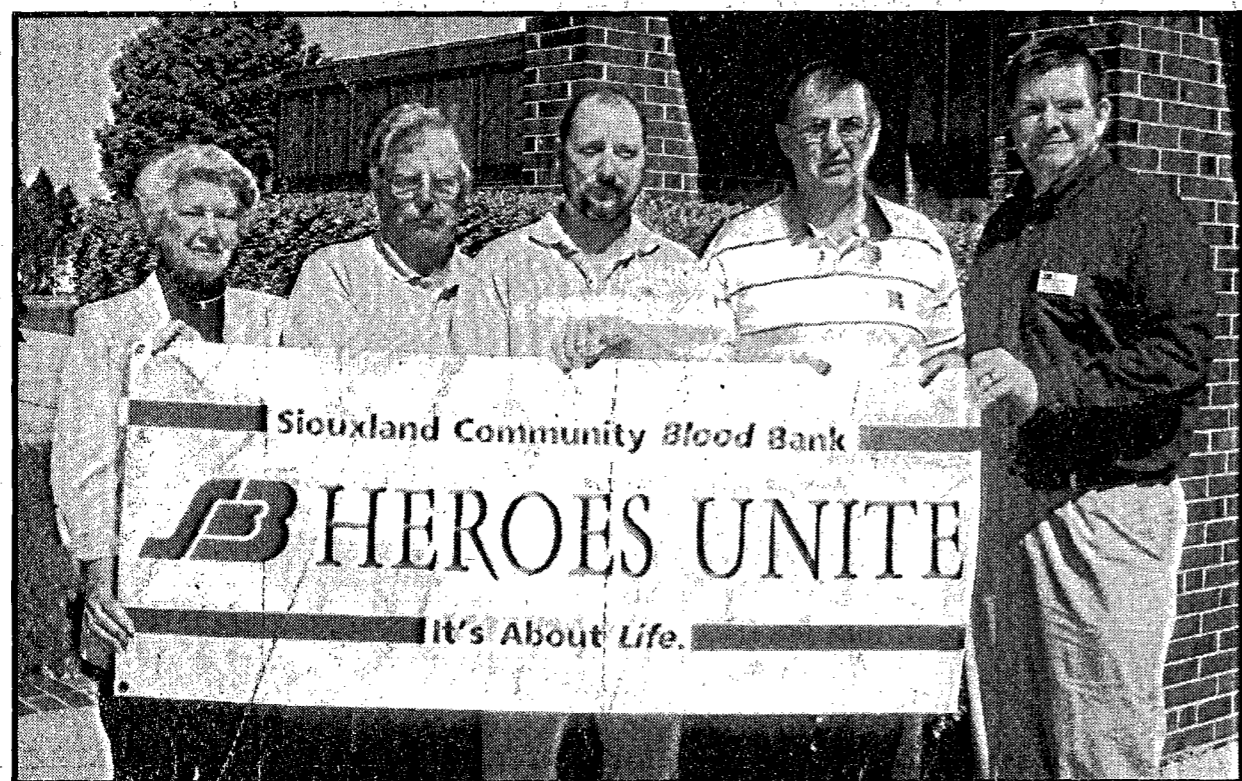

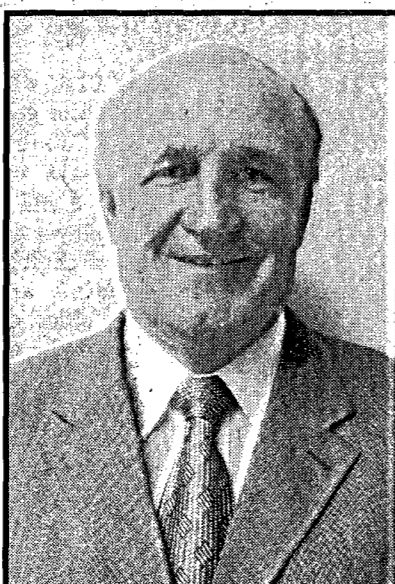

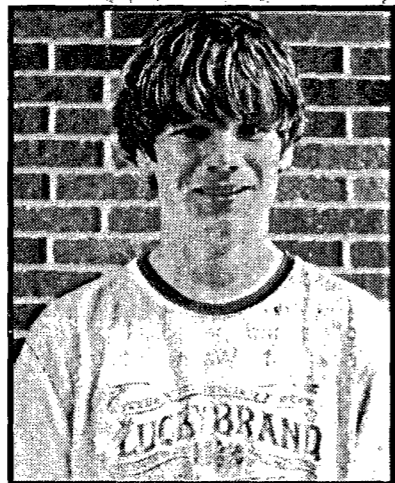

Community members are invited to help in any of these preparations. The Veterans Organizations appreciate the cooperation from everyone in the community.

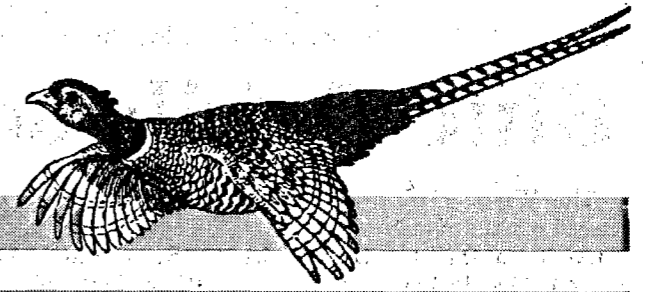

Wayne State ends season with 44-18 record

## Wildcats finish second at Central Regional

The Wayne State baseball team wrapped up a record breaking season last weekend with a second-place finish at the NCAA Division II Central Region Tournament held at Warrensburg, Missouri.

The Wildcats opened the regional with a 14-3 win over Emporia State of Kansas on Friday, then dropped a 9-1 decision to top-seeded Central Missouri State Saturday afternoon. Wayne State bounced back with a 5-0 win over Emporia State, then lost in the championship game to Central Missouri State 22-2.

"When the dust settled, we proved that we were the second best team in the region and deserved the number two regional ranking," stated veteran WSC baseball coach John Manganaro.

"Except for the last four innings of the championship game, I thought we played pretty well and were very competitive," added Manganaro.

Wayne State opened the tournament with a 14-3 thumping of Emporia State (35-21). All nine

players had at least one hit as the Wildcats banged out 17 hits in the win.

Nathan Miller (11-1) worked seven strong innings to earn the win on the mound for WSC. The senior lefthander did not allow a run while allowing five hits. He struck out two and walked two batters. Senior Ryan Wetterberg came on in relief, allowing three runs on six hits over the final two innings.

Brian Disch and Danny Bengé led the WSC offense with three singles apiece. Justin Conley, Aaron Ligocki, Tim Richt and Brian Disch contributed two hits each with Dustin Jones, Matt Fjelland and Kyle Hansen adding one hit apiece. One of Disch's hits was a home run while Richt, Conley and Hansen doubled.

Central Missouri State (53-6), the defending Division II national champions, downed the Wildcats in Saturday's winner's bracket final 9-1.

Wayne State's lone run was scored in the seventh inning when Matt Fjelland was hit by the pitch

with the bases loaded, scoring Richt.

The Wildcats had five hits in the game, three of them coming in the seventh inning. Richt finished with two singles while Ligocki, Disch and Pedroza added one hit each.

Freshman Nick Schumacher (6-3) was tagged with the pitching loss. He worked six innings, allowed six hits, four runs, seven walks and struck out four. Reliever B. J. Wierzbicki allowed five runs on three hits with five walks and two strikeouts in one inning followed by two innings of one-hit, scoreless relief by Nathan Gettler.

Following the loss, Wayne State bounced back with a 5-0 win over Emporia State to reach the Central Region championship game.

Senior lefthander Damien Heckelsmiller (8-1) tossed a complete game, five-hit shutout to fuel the 'Cats in the win. He struck out three and walked four batters.

The Wildcats scored four runs in the first three innings to set the

tone for the game and out-hit the Hornets 12-5.

Pedroza was a perfect 4 for 4 to lead the offensive attack. Jones contributed three hits, including a double. Disch connected for a solo homer in the eighth inning to seal the win. Ligocki, Richt, Fjelland and Hansen also added hits for the Wildcats.

In Sunday's championship game, Central Missouri State took care of the Wildcats 22-2 to advance to the NCAA Division II College World Series May 22-29 in Montgomery, Alabama.

After WSC scored two runs in the top of the fourth inning to tie the game at 2-2, the host Mules erupted for 20 runs over the next five innings to put the game away.

Starting pitcher Jon Pitts (3-1) was saddled with the loss, giving up three runs over three and two-thirds innings. Joe Wall worked two and two-thirds innings, yielding 10 runs. Gettler recorded two outs and gave up six runs while Dustin Nilius pitched the final inning, giving up three unearned runs.

Wayne State had five hits in the game. Bengé was 2 for 2 with a double and single, Disch doubled with Ligocki and Pedroza adding a single each.

"They're an awfully good baseball team," commented Coach Manganaro on Central Missouri State. "They were amazing."

Manganaro praised his team and their desire to win during an amazing season.

"Our seniors provided tremendous leadership throughout the year. Missing three of our top six

pitchers for much of the year, I believe we overachieved this season. I can't say enough about this team and our seniors," stated Manganaro.

Wayne State had three players named to the NCAA Division II All-Central Region Tournament Team. They were designated hitter Chris Pedroza, shortstop Danny Bengé and pitcher Damien Heckelsmiller.

The Wildcats finished the 2004 season with a 44-18 record, a new school mark for wins in a season.

## Miller, Richt named to All-Region First Team

Two players from the Wayne State College baseball team were named to the NCAA Division II All-Central Region Team announced at last weekend's tournament in Warrensburg, Missouri.

Senior pitcher Nathan Miller and senior first baseman Tim Richt were both named to the All-Central Region First Team.

Miller, a native of Washington, Iowa, finished the season with an 11-1 record and a 1.74 ERA. The lefthander appeared in 13 games, posting six complete games with two shutouts. In 88 innings pitched, Miller recorded 53 strikeouts and walked only 22 batters. This is the second time in four years that Miller received All-Region accolades.

Richt hit .411 at the plate for the Wildcats this season with 17 home runs and 65 runs batted in. The Bellevue native had 83 hits, 61 runs scored, a school record 25 doubles, 23 walks and 159 total bases. He was hit by a pitch 11 times and had an incredible .787 slugging percentage.

Wayne State finished the season with a 44-18 record, ranked 27th in the latest NCAA Division II Collegiate Baseball Magazine poll. The Wildcats won the Northern Sun Conference regular season and post-season tournament titles and finished second at the Central Regional last weekend, falling to defending national champion Central Missouri State in the championship game.

## WSC lands eight on All-NSIC Baseball Team

The Wayne State College baseball team landed eight players on the 2004 All-NSIC Baseball Team announced last week.

Six Wildcats received All-Conference recognition while two others were named to the honorable mention team.

Headlining this year's All-NSIC team was senior left handed pitcher Nathan Miller. The Washington, Iowa native was named the NSIC's Pitcher of the Year after helping the Wildcats to the regular season and post-season tournament titles. Miller was 5-0 in conference play this season with a 1.09 ERA. He allowed a league-low 20 hits in 33 innings and held opponents to a .182 batting average.

Senior first baseman Tim Richt set two new league records this season and was named the NSIC's

Co-Player of the Year, sharing the honor with Northern State's Deacon Burns.

Richt hit .478 in conference play this season with 44 hits, eight doubles and 40 runs batted in, tops in the NSIC. He connected for 13 home runs and had 91 total bases, both league records, and finished with a .989 slugging percentage in 27 league games. Richt was also one of three WSC players to appear in all 27 NSIC games.

Other Wildcats earning All-NSIC honors included catcher Chris Pedroza, pitcher Damien Heckelsmiller and outfielders Justin Conley and Brian Disch. Honorable mention honors went to outfielder Dustin Jones and shortstop Aaron Ligocki.

Pedroza, a sophomore from Omaha Westside, hit .338 in

league play (27 for 80) with three home runs and 20 runs batted in. His 10 doubles tied for second in the NSIC.

Heckelsmiller, a senior from Marshalltown, Iowa, posted a 5-1 record with a 2.63 ERA in NSIC play this season. He allowed 34 hits over 37.2 innings with one complete game, striking out 27 and walking 20.

Conley, a senior from Millard South, recorded a .392 average while playing in all 27 NSIC games this season, going 31 for 79 at the plate. He finished third in the league in triples (3) and fifth in stolen bases (8 of 9).

Disch, a senior from Norfolk, had a .384 average (33 for 86) with eight home runs and 23 runs batted in. The leftfielder also batted in six doubles and finished league play with a .733 slugging percent-

age.

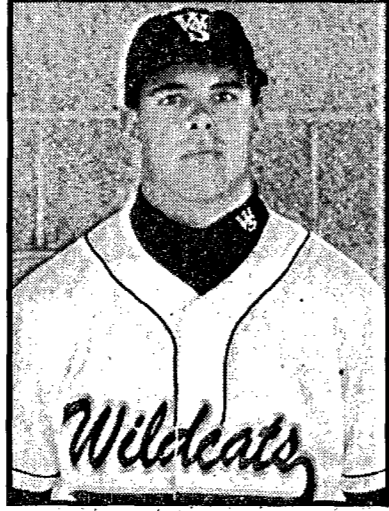

Several Wayne State track and field athletes competed last weekend at a pair of last chance meets, hoping to earn a qualifying berth in the NCAA Division II Outdoor Nationals May 27-29 in Pomona, Calif.

Sophomore thrower Lindsey Stockwell made the most of her last chance meet at Concordia University in Stewart last Friday evening, winning the discus with a new school record throw of 143-7. She also qualified for the national meet, ranking 12th in the country. Stockwell also placed fifth in the javelin with a mark of 124-3.

Dixon also competed at the Emporia State Qualifier on Saturday and placed fourth in the 110 hurdles with a time of 14.61 seconds.

Stockwell, believed to be the first outdoor NCAA Division II qualifier in WSC school history, will throw at 2 pm on Friday, May 28 at the NCAA Division II Outdoor National Championships at Cal State-Pomona University in California.

Brian Mohl finished with an 80, Tyler Johnson shot an 85 and John Whitt carded an 87 to round out Wayne's scoring.

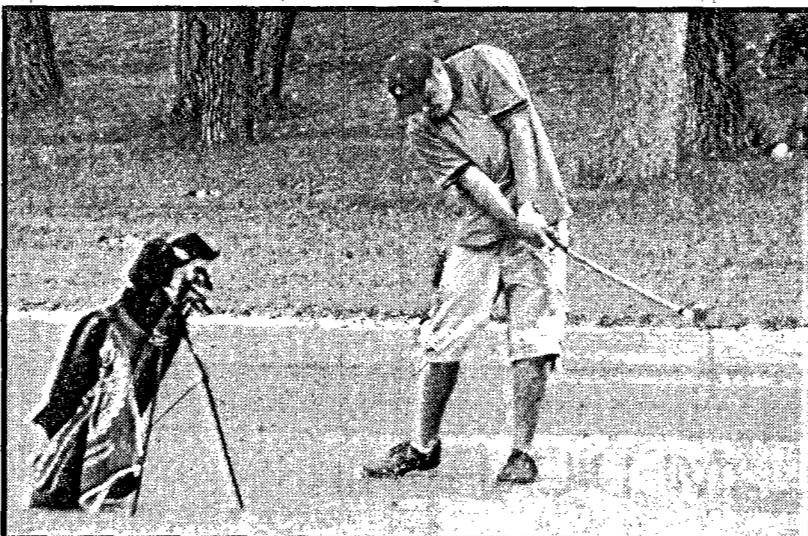
"Brian had a consistent round, Tyler had his best day striking the ball and John is close to posting a much lower score-I look for that to happen at state," stated Munson.

Senior Karissa Hochstein and sophomore Jean Pieper will represent the Wayne girls team at state.

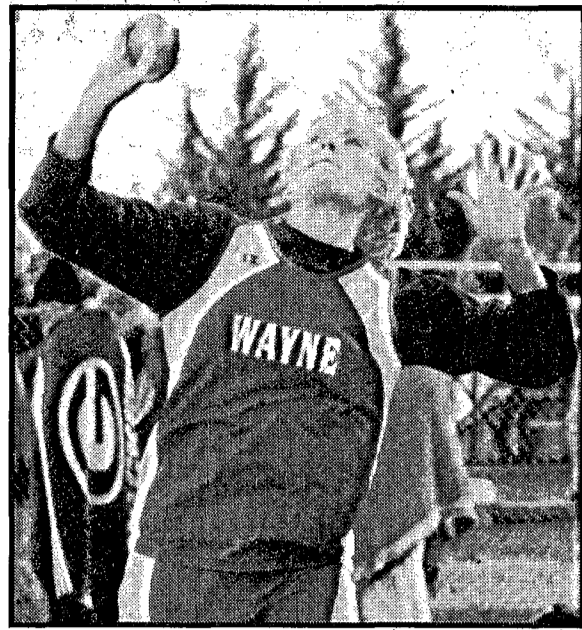
Hochstein earned a second place medal in the shot put (36-9) while Pieper placed third in the 100 meter dash (12.5) to garner state qualifying berths.

Wayne scored points in four other events at the district meet. The 1600 meter relay team of Jordyn Doescher, Karissa Hochstein, Pieper and Renee

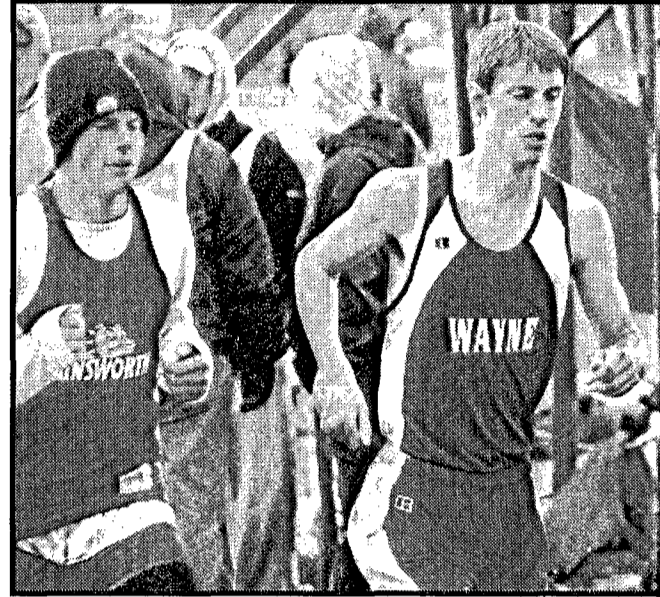

"We qualified the three that we thought should go and had Jean sitting on the bubble and she had a great day in all of her races and made it in the 100," added Coach Hochstein.

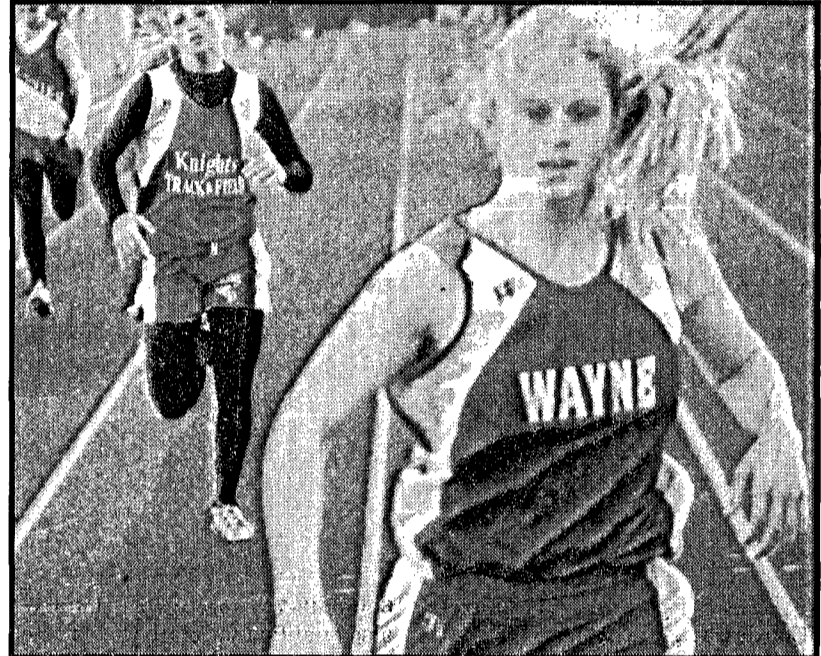

## Proper diet and exercise key for weight loss – not eating fewer carbohydrates

Losing weight can be confusing with the never-ending array of weight-loss messages and schemes available. It's estimated that nearly 25 percent of Americans are following the latest diet – low carbohydrate and high in proteins. However, the diets, which restrict high-carbohydrate foods, such as bread, pasta and most fruits, and allow liberal amounts of protein such as beef, poultry and fish and some vegetables, probably are just another passing fad. The only difference this time around is food manufacturers and restaurants have gotten on the bandwagon and have started to offer low-carb products.

People may be making the same mistake with low-carb diets that they made with the low-fat diet phase a few years ago – assuming that it equates to low-calories which isn't necessarily true.

People still need to read those food labels, and they still need to know how many calories they're eating each day. The best way to get rid of those extra pounds simply is to eat fewer calories and exercise most days of the week.

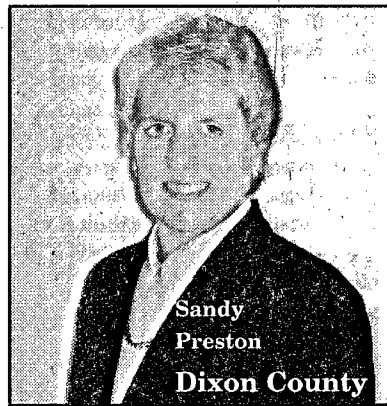
To lose weight, a person's caloric intake needs to be less than their output. People need to monitor what their current caloric intake is and make a 500 to 1,000 calorie deficit between energy in and energy out, and they'll lose 1 to 2 pounds per week. This can come from less food and more exercise.

The low-carbohydrate/high protein diets work well for so many people because people are lowering their caloric intake. Studies are showing that it's not the carbohydrate content that is creating weight loss, but the low-calorie nature of the diet.

The problem with the low-carbohydrate/high-protein diet is people aren't getting the vitamins and nutrients that the body needs to function. Most of these diets recommend 30 grams of carbohydrates, but the body needs 130 grams of carbohydrates a day in

order to function, especially the brain.

However, in a society where people like to eat meat, the diet is



attractive. Grains, fruits and vegetables are still important, though, for fiber, vitamins C and A and other nutrients associated with these food groups.

Eliminating food groups is not a good thing. A baked potato is a nutrient-packed food; it's what you add on top of it that makes it bad. Also, the long-term effects of the diets are still unknown. When carbohydrates are so restricted, fat composition in the diet generally goes up. Short-term, it appears blood lipid levels are not harmed, but long-term studies with follow-up will be needed to determine if there could be harmful changes over time.

People are losing weight and are excited, but the long-term concern is if people's habits have changed enough to sustain weight loss over time.

Unless people can find a way to make an adjustment that they're ready to live with then it's not going to work for them. They'll slip back into their old habits. It isn't surprising that people lose so much weight so fast on these diets because as with most fad diets rapid initial weight loss is just water weight.

The rapid weight loss is a real motivator for people, but in general, a diet high in fiber and fruits and vegetables will be more successful. A balanced diet, which

includes grains, fruits, vegetables, dairy, protein and fat, is important. In addition, people should be moderately active 30 to 45 minutes most days of the week.

People need to make sure they're eating the right portion sizes, getting enough fruits and vegetables and not eating French fries and candy all the time. People also need to find out if they use food as an emotional crutch and figure out ways to deal with periods of emotion and anxiety that don't involve food. Over time, if they really work hard at it, they'll develop some nice habits that they can maintain.

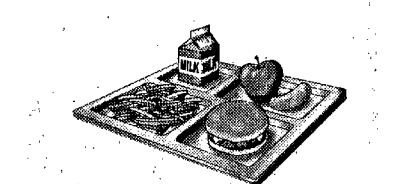

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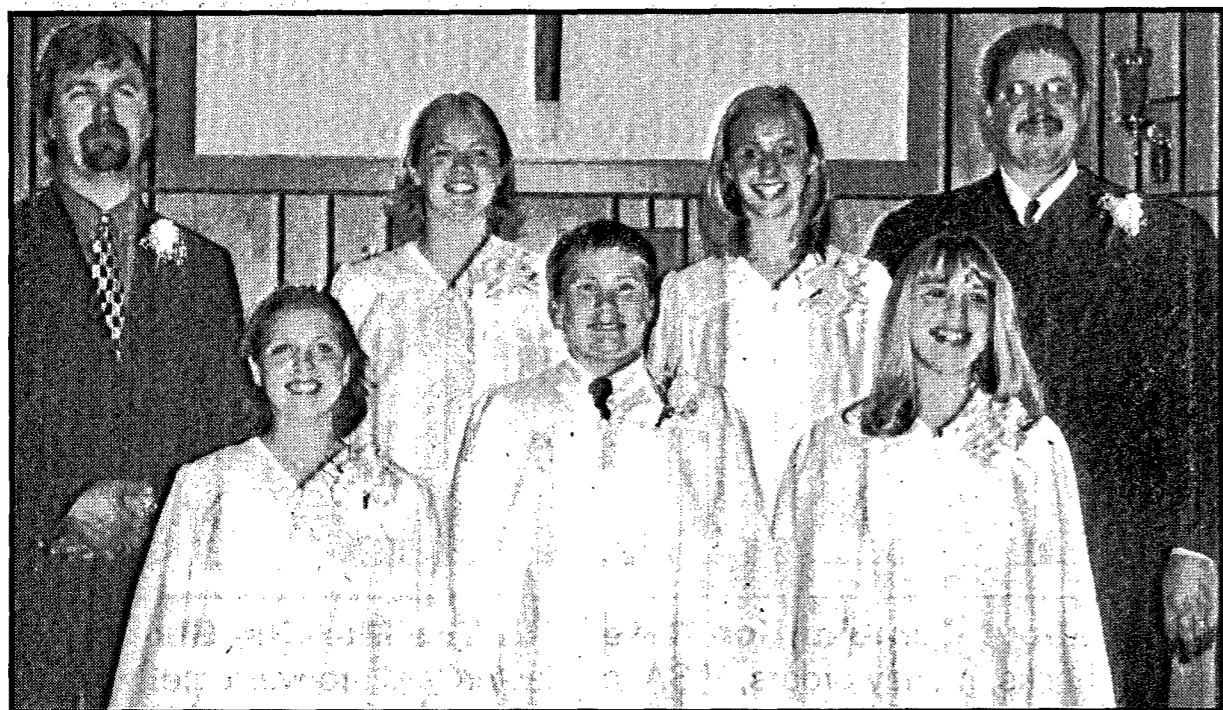

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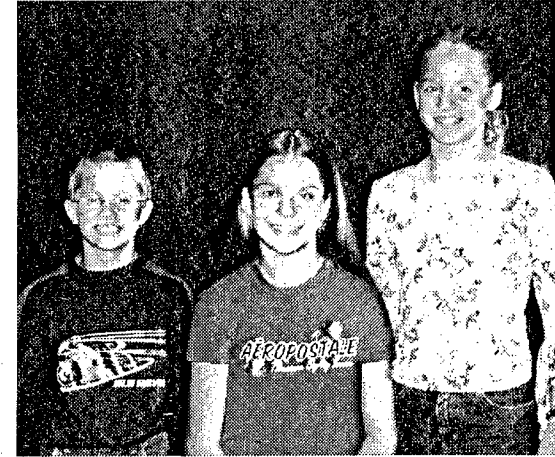
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Genealogy workshop/
