

The fifth annual American Cancer Society's Relay for Life will be held Friday and Saturday, June 11-12 at Kern Field in Wayne.


This year's fundraising event involves 12 teams of participants who take turns walking or running the track in an effort to fight cancer. Teams campout, eat and play games.





#### Volunteers monitor local stream with Dr. Barbara Hayford

Volunteers for the Northeast Nebraska Resource Conservation and Development (RC&D) initiated a volunteer stream monitoring project of Bazile Creek near Center on May 17.

Training and the first sampling of Bazile Creek was lead by Dr. Barbara Hayford, assistant professor of biology at Wayne State College.

Other volunteers included four residents of Knox County, two other RC&D members and two students from WSC, Erin Kucera and Rebekka Jessen who was acting as a representative for the NRCS.

The objectives of the project were to:

•Educate volunteers on stream ecology & biological monitoring •Convey a sense of value for stream ecosystems

•Identify macroinvertebrates to the indicator group

•Calculate metrics used to determine stream health

•Collect water quality data •Characterize the basic environment of sampling habitat

The volunteers began their assessment by taking note of the weather and location, they were to make a map of the 25-yard-sample area, and then gather samples for in-stream physical and biological characteristics. They learned to use several types of tools for gathering the macroinvertebrates. Found in the stream were blood worms, stoneflies, mayflies, damselflies, netspinners, caddisflies, beetles, midges, black flies, lunged snails, clams, and minnows. An analysis of the stream organisms and physical and chemical

conditions indicates a fairly healthy stream site. Further volunteer monitoring events on Bazile Creek are planned for late August and October.

### Food label date determines products' peak quality

The milk carton says sell by April 1, but it's April 3. Is the milk safe to drink?

Use-By or sell-by dates really are only indicators of safety, not a date ness, only at the supermarket. The when a product goes bad. In general, dating is to determine how long a product is going to remain at refrigerator case, which is set at a peak quality in terms of its taste and nutrient retention.

Consumers should be aware of these date on perishable and other items. A food shouldn't be bought . after its date has passed because that's a guarantee of bringing home a food that is no longer at peak quality.

Also, the date shouldn't be used four days away doesn't mean the as an indicator of freshness in meat will be at peak freshness home refrigerators. The use-by-

date guarantees quality, or freshdate is used to determine a safe length of storage time in a store lower temperature, around 30 degrees, than a home refrigerator, which is set around 40 degrees. The date loses meaning at home when stored in the warmer refrigerator. However, this doesn't mean one should ignore the dates either. For example, a package of hamburger meat with a use-by-date

after four days at home. It needs to be eaten or placed in a freezer within one to two days of purchase to ensure the best taste.

For most perishable foods, such as milk and juice, quality begins to deteriorate about a week after purchase.

Eggs are an exception to the week-or-so rule of thumb. They keep fresh for three to five weeks after purchase. Deteriorating freshness is not about bacteria that cause illness but about bacteria that can produce an "off" smell or flavor. An effective method for determining if food is fresh enough to eat is simply sniff the food to determine if it has a strange odor.

If the meat is stored for a long period in a home refrigerator with a temperature that is higher than 40 degrees, the listeria can multiply to dangerous levels. The only other items that need to

have use-by-dates are baby food and formula, but even these dates are essentially for meeting nutritional and quality standards rather than for safety.

## Ticks can be a problem

Ticks are a part of nature and as such can be a nuisance for animals and humans alike.

Certain types of ticks can carry Lyme disease and transmit it to humans. This creates even more of a concern for all those who enjoy camping and outdoor activities. Spring and early summer seems to be the most likely period of a tick encounter, so if you participate in outdoor activities, plan some management strategies to protect yourself from ticks.

Clothing - wear long sleeve shirts, long pants that have a tight cuff, and clothing that is light in color. Repellents – use repellents that

have DEET as the active ingredient and apply on the ankles, socks and pants.

Inspect yourself and others after being outside. Ticks will crawl easy at that time. Ticks tend to ear canals so check these areas well. If a tick is found attached, grasp the tick with a forceps close to the head area of the tick and gently pull in a firm and steady, tle creatures especially use of upward manner. Wash the area repellents. with soap and water and apply a

disinfectant to prevent a secondary infection. Be sure the head of the tick is removed or additional problems could occur.

A'red rash that resembles a

"bulls-eye" is an early sign of the Lyme disease. Flu-like symptoms around the host looking for a spot a occur which include headache, to attach, so removal is relatively fever, chills, lethargy, joint and muscle pain. There is no vaccine move to the head, shoulder, neck or available for humans. Consult a physician for further diagnosis. Chiggers are also a problem in the grassy areas. Follow similar steps for protection from those lit-
