



Pair experiences life in Belize

Both Ann Witkowski and Karen Kwapnioski have spent a great portion of their lives helping others through their work as registered nurses.

This carried over to their recent trip to Belize.

The two were part of a Light of Missions, a Medical Missionary organization from Sioux City, Iowa, trip to Belize from June 30 to July 11.

There were a total of 13 members in the group, six from Georgia and seven from Nebraska. Among the members were two of Mrs. Witkowski's nursing students from Northeast Community College. All but one had medical knowledge.

Belize is located south of the Yucatan Peninsula in Central America.

"Belize is an underdeveloped country with lots of poverty. A number of mission groups travel there for several reasons. First of all, the major language of the country is English so communication is not a problem. The area is relatively safe and visitors are welcome," Mrs. Kwapnioski said.

The group first flew to Belize City, a town of approximately 80,000 and then took an eight-hour bus ride to the southern part of the country.

"We spent five days in Punta Gorda, a town of approximately 2 to 3,000 people. There was a lot of



The thought from here: The gambling issue (even more than the presidential election) could really give a boost to interest in exercising the franchise this year.

Lots of local officials, elected and otherwise, have made it clear they would like to have a share of whatever revenues are generated by expanded gambling.

Then, there is what amounts to the irrevocable trust fund for education that would be provided by the Legislature's proposal to allow a couple of casinos to operate in Nebraska.

Put the pro-gambling vote together with the community uplifters vote and then add the tremendous support that could come from teachers and others in the public education community. That's a whoppin' bundle of potential votes.


The provisions for funding education, contained in the Legislature's constitutional amendment for casino gambling, haven't drawn a lot of attention. The first payouts from those rev-

enues, after prizes and other costs, would go the Compulsive Gamblers Assistance Fund. Then, the Environmental Trust Fund gets a chunk - 44.5 percent. Then comes education. It gets 44.5 per-

cent of the same pot and "it shall be used for education as the Legislature may direct." How's that for a nice insurance policy against tough economic times when the Unicameral might be

looking for areas to cut some spending. The environment and education would have an element of protection, via gambling dollars, that any entity of government would envy.





poverty in the village, but the standard of living is so different from ours. The people there don't consider themselves poor," Mrs. Witkowski said.

She noted that the people there seem quite content and happy. The family is the center of life for the people.


The school children in the village had just gotten out of school when the group arrived in Belize. Most only go to eighth grade and then take a test to determine if they could go on to high school. In the jungle area, only one boy out of 500 was going to high school.

"There is only one highway in the country, even though it is approximately 150 miles long. Thirty miles of the highway is dirt road and the remainder is similar to a black top road in Nebraska," Mrs. Kwapnioski said.

The weather in Belize was hot and humid.

"The temperature went from being tolerable to instantly hot. Also, it rained every day, sometimes three or four times a day. A cloud would come over us and it would rain for 15 minutes and then it would clear up and rain again later," Mrs. Kwapnioski said.

"When we were in Belize, we spent a day traveling and getting used to the culture. We spent time in a nursing home and then conducted six medical clinics. People came to us with stomach aches


State poet to be part of Lewis & Clark series





Two assistant coaches have been hired for the Wayne State College women's basketball team.


Head coach Ryun Willams announced that Holly Spoo and Allison Kruger will join the coaching staff for the upcoming season.





To commemorate the bicentennial, the Northeast Nebraska Resource Conservation & Development (RC&D) Council will be reliving the adventures of Lewis and Clark with two bus tours on Saturday, Sept. 18. The east tour will follow the

Lewis & Clark trail from near Yankton as far as Ponca State Park. Stops include the Corps of Discovery Welcome Center located in Nebraska three miles south of Yankton at the scenic overlook, and the Lewis & Clark Visitors Center at Calumet Bluff.

In South Dakota visits will include Spirit Mound and W.H. Over Museum at Vermillion. Then cross over the new Vermillion/Newcastle Bridge and stop for lunch at St. James Marketplace and an opportunity


to browse around the store. Next it's on to Ponca State Park for a stop at the National Missouri River Research & Education Center and three-state scenic overlook. Project Locate Cards help remind users that 9-1-1 calls may be handled differently

Nebraska's participation in an accurate description of the loca-Project Locate will help remind wireless communications users that their calls for emergency help may be handled differently depend;, ing on their location and the technology employed by the local public safety answering point (PSAP).

Only about half of the state's counties have implemented the first of two phases of E-9-1-1 technology that will eventually enable emergency operators to accurately and automatically identify the location of the caller requesting help.

The Public Service Commission has begun to distribute Project Locate cards to public safety answering points in Nebraska counties where Phase One E-9-1-1 has been implemented. The cards remind callers to identify the loca-

telephone number of the wireless telephone being used, and to accurately describe what has happened. Project Locate cards also recom-

mend learning the non-emergency numbers for public safety center, refraining from programming a wireless telephone to automatically dial 9-1-1 when one button is pressed and to lock the keypad when not in use to avoid accidental 9-1-1 calls.

Commissioner Vap said Project Locate has been organized nationally to help 9-1-1 callers understand how to use their wireless telephones effectively in summoning emergency assistance and reduce the amount of time needed to dispatch the appropriate service.

"Anyone wanting a Project Locate card may obtain one by contacting the public safety answering point in their county or by contacting the E-9-1-1 department of the Public Service Commission at 800-526-0017," Vap said.

Following is the language found on the Project Locate cards: Side 1: Where is the Emergency? Use road

tion of the emergency, to give the name, number, direction of travel, mile markers, intersections, landmarks, etc.

What number are you calling from? Always give the area code, wireless phone number. If using a phone without a service contract and the call is disconnected, YOU must redial 911.

What exactly has happened? Clearly describe what has taken place. EX: What is on fire? Is the person conscious and breathing? Is the person visibly injured? Types and number of vehicles involved? If reporting a crime, vehicle & suspect descriptions are always important.

Call 9-1-1 ONLY when an immediate response by police/fire-rescue/medical services is required.

Enhanced Wireless 9-1-1 Services can save lives, reduce pain and suffering as well as mitigate damage to property. You can help improve services and prompt responses by:

1. Learning the non-emergency telephone numbers in your area; 2. Not programming your cell phone to dial 9-1-1 on your cell phone;

3. Disabling the auto dial to 9-1-1 on your cell phone; and

4. Locking your keyboard when the phone is not in use to avoid accidental 9-1-1 calls, which can cause the unnecessary dispatch of services.

Since Enhanced 9-1-1 Service does not work everywhere in the U.S., BEFORE purchasing any phone or service ASK the wireless service provider what location technology they have in place to assist emergency services find YOU in times of real crisis. ASK your local 9-1-1 Center if they can receive and use your 9-1-1 call location.

BBB warns that imposters are targeting consumers, businesses

The Better Business Bureau system today issued a national alert to warn consumers and businesses about two questionable operations that are falsely using the BBB name to trick victims. Reports have come from businesses located in Arkansas, California, Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana, Nebraska, Nevada, Ohio, Texas, Utah and Washington.

One business, which appears to be a telemarketer, is contacting local businesses, falsely stating to be from the BBB and calling about a complaint or to update BBB files. The telemarketer proceeds to ask questions that have nothing to do with BBB business and leaves as a contact number 1.800.CALL.BBB (225-5222). That phone number, which is NOT owned by the BBB, is constantly busy. Businesses need to be aware that any representative from the BBB would clearly identify themselves and leave a working phone number.

The callers generally claim to be phoning about a BBB complaint or to "update" BBB files. They attempt to solicit information that is not normally required in order to conduct business with or be a member of the BBB. The callers

provided as a reference fictitious BBB phone numbers that are answered by representatives who falsely claim to be with the Better Business Bureau and provide a positive report on the business in question.

These scammers are falsely using the Better Business Bureau name to try to gain credibility with potential victims so they can get money or confidential infor-

mation. The BBB urges people to double-check with the BBB at 402-391-7612 or 800-649-6814 whenever you receive a dubious phone call or see the BBB name tied to a questionable promotion.






