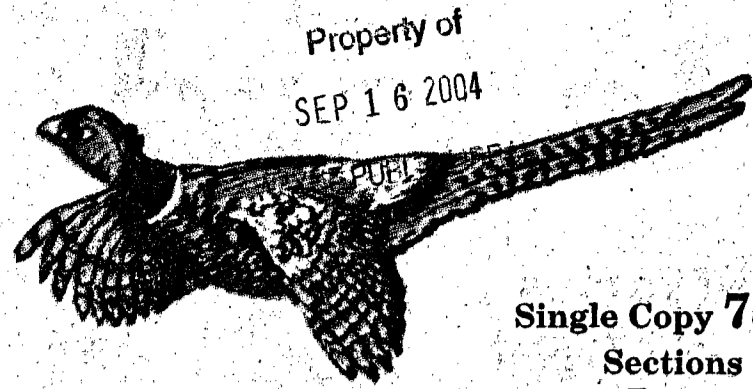

Public hears information about highway project

Approximately 70 people listened to several presentations Monday during the T.E.A.M. 15 Town Hall meeting.

Representatives of the city of Wayne, the Nebraska Department of Roads and the four committees of the T.E.A.M. 15 committee spoke to those in attendance about the upcoming project.

The Nebraska Department of Roads (NDOR) will be responsible for the replacement of the street and sidewalk for the project, which begins at Clark Street at the south end of town and continues north to the middle of the 600 block of Main Street.

Scott Brummond, Project Manager for NDOR, explained what will be done during the construction phase of the project. He noted that part of the project costs will be the responsibility of the NDOR, including the paving and the main street lights. Other portions of

the project will be the responsibility of the city of Wayne.

City Administrator Lowell Johnson spoke to the audience on the cost of the project.

He noted that the city wants to help make this project go as smoothly as possible for both businesses and customers.

Johnson also listed a number of costs associated with the project that will be the responsibility of the city and property owners and stated that generally in projects of this type, the city averages the costs and all property owners pay the same percentage.

Members of the four T.E.A.M. 15 committees, Communications, Alley/Parking, Promotions and Design, spoke to the audience about plans each has made.

Jack Hausmann, with the Communication Committee, noted that as the date of the project comes closer,

more information will be made available through a number of media sources.

Lois Shelton, a member of the Alley/Parking Committee, said members of her group have been looking at the alleys and noted that repairs are needed in certain areas and lighting could be an issue in certain spots. She also noted that other areas in the city may be used for parking and encouraged employees of Main Street businesses to park farther away from work and walk.

Promotions Committee member Leo Ahmann said a number of promotions are being planned to encourage customers to shop the downtown businesses during the construction project and that each business will be given a brochure listing all the promotions and encouraged them to participate in as many as possible.

He noted that the project will present a challenge to customers, and business-

es will need to "go the extra mile" for their customers.

A major portion of the evening was spent looking at pictures from other communities to get ideas on what the city of Wayne could look like.

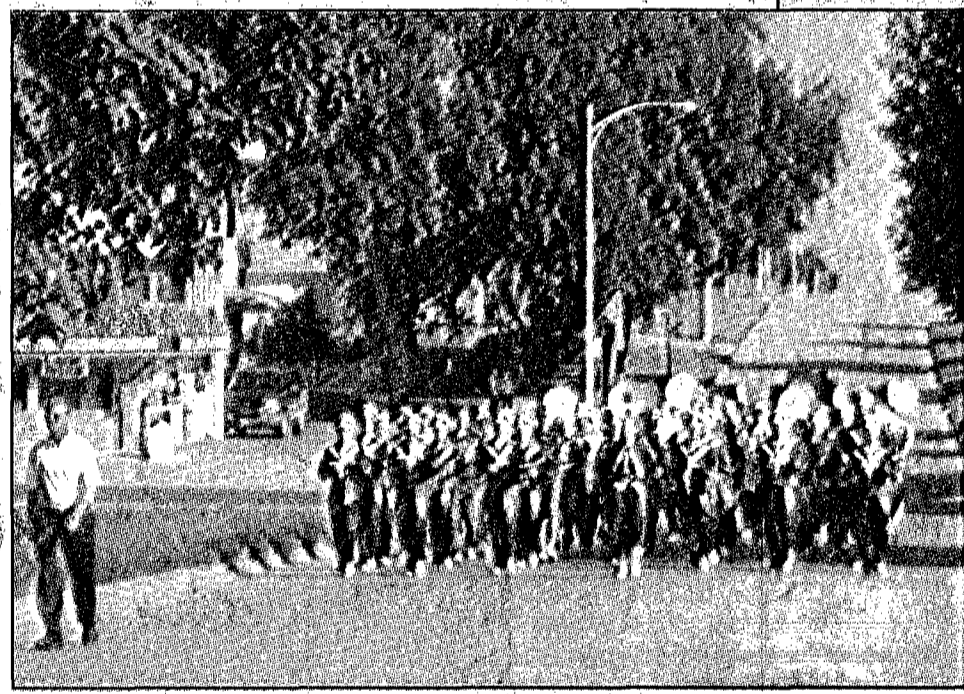
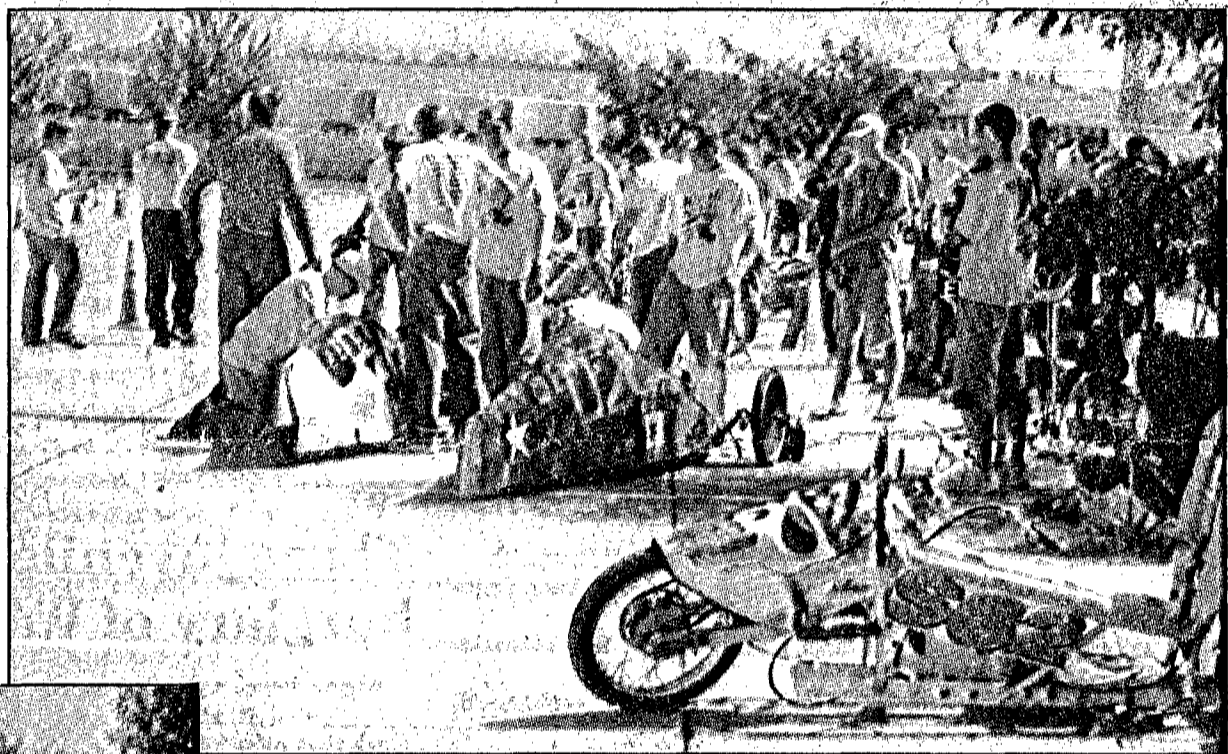
Mike Lutt and Cindy Christensen with Country Nursery presented numerous options in regard to bricks, trees, benches, lighting and flowers that could be used along Main Street.

Lutt said that his firm has visited a number of other communities in Nebraska and other states to get ideas. He showed drawings of what could be done and talked about the importance of having a plan and having all parts of the downtown Main Street look the same.

Reconstruction of Main Street is set to begin in the spring of 2006 and is anticipated to last through the construction season that year.

"We have a good mix of long-time staff members

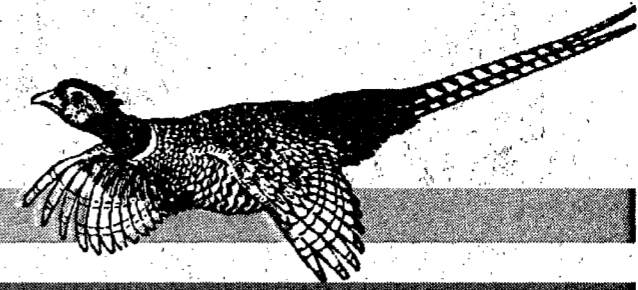


The Hanson family includes, left to right, Nate, Mark, Connie and Jennifer. Mark has recently become the principal at Wayne High School.

Council adopts 2004-05 budget

The actual tax asking for the city of Wayne will be lower for the next fiscal year.

That was the word from the city administrator and council at Tuesday's meeting of the Wayne City Council.

City Administrator Lowell Johnson explained where city revenue comes from and noted that 22 percent of the city's revenue is in the form of property taxes.

Johnson also talked about where the money goes, including personnel (41 percent), capitol outlay (25 percent) and commodities (17 percent).

The 2004-05 budget is one mill below the maximum allowed under the state lid. This amounts to \$14,000 less in tax asking for the city.

Johnson said the proposed budget will still allow the city to maintain services and add to the reserve. He noted that the city has 10 less full-time employees than two years ago.

Ordinance 2004-7 received second and third reading approval at the meeting.

It will amend the city code in regard to licensing and housing of cats in the city.

Several changes will be made to the final version of the ordinance, including the need for a kennel license for five or more animals and the age at which kittens need to leave their mother.

City Administrator Johnson said that public education needs to take place to deal with those who feed stray and feral cats and that the police department will not be spending a great deal of time on cat patrol.

He noted that those with concerns can contact the city and city employees will then trap the cats as the need arises.

Council member Will Wiseman questioned the time frame for licensing of cats after the ordinance becomes law. It was noted that the city needs time to get the equipment and process in place before any action can be taken. It was suggested cat licensing coincide with dog licensing which occurs in May of each year.

In other action, the council approved a proposal to purchase a new utility/budgetary/payroll operating system for the city. Brian Kesting, Technology specialist for the city, told the council that over the course of 10 years, it is estimated that the system could save the city \$2,000 per year. It will also allow for on-line bill paying and allow the city to expand without changing the system. It is anticipated that the new system could be in place by early 2005.

The council listened to a presentation from Craig Tiedtke on the issue of the city's parking ban from midnight to 5 a.m. on city streets.

He flew 23 combat missions and was on his way to the Pacific Theatre when the war ended. On June 17, 1945 he married Marian Grove. He finished his undergraduate degree at Denver University and received a Master's degree from Columbia University in New York City. His first journalism position was in Hornell, N. Y. The Omaha World-Herald was his next stop, eventually working as the Sunday night editor. He left the World-Herald to work at the Ralston Recorder. The family moved to Alliance, to work at the Alliance Times-Herald. In 1958 he began teaching English composition at Wayne State College. He also ran the college news bureau and was the statistician for the athletic department, sponsored the year book and did most of its photography. In 1970 he was asked to teach all of the journalism and photography classes and publish the The Wayne Stater newspaper, as a class project. He continued to enjoy the opportunity to fly, often taking pictures of the Wayne State campus from small planes. He renewed his pilot's license, was co-owner of a small plane and joined the Civil Air Patrol. He was a long time member of Kiwanis and was a Lieutenant Governor from 1987 to 1989. While a member of Kiwanis clubs in Omaha he worked at Camp OK and read to students at Conestoga Elementary School. He was an Eagle Scout and a long time Scout Master. He received the Silver Beaver Award in 1987 for his long service to Boy Scouts. He was a member of the Wayne Presbyterian Church. He was a musician, studying piano growing up. He also sang in numerous church choirs. He played for a number of events throughout his life.

Survivors include his wife, Marian; two sons, Eric and Sue Manley and Joseph and RuthAnn Manley, all of Omaha; one daughter Meredith and Tom McGowan of Lincoln and seven grandchildren.

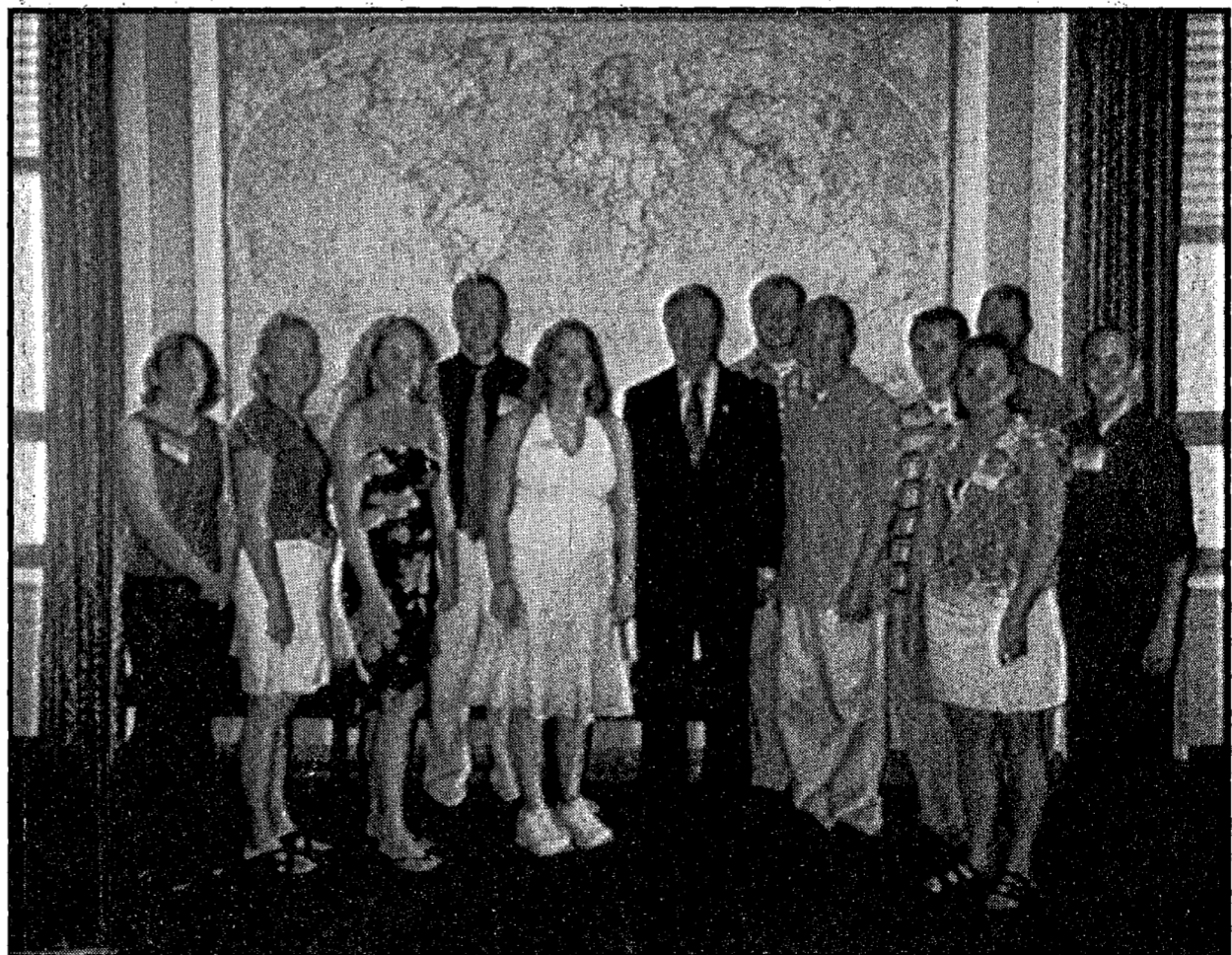
Roy Sommerfeld

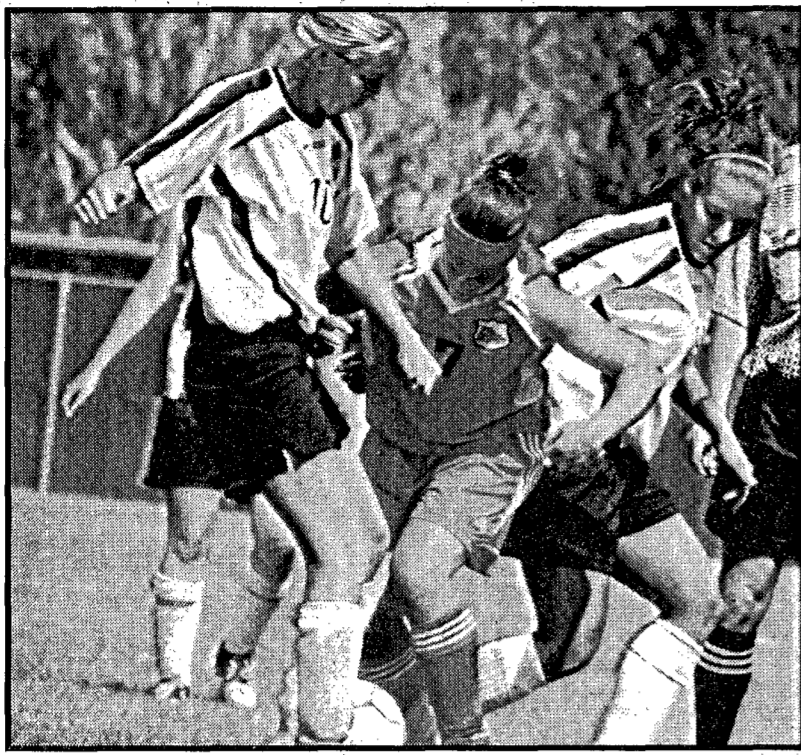

Wayne State soccer team picks up first win

Wayne State College women's soccer coach Oliver Twelvetrees used many adjectives to describe his team's first win in his first year at the Wildcat helm.

The team came from behind to win its first game of the season Sunday afternoon 3-2 over Midland Lutheran.

"They didn't give up out there," Twelvetrees, a native of Wales, said. "They've got heart and they've got fight."

After being down 2-0 at halftime on a hot, muggy afternoon, senior Tanya Mitchell opened up the scoring for the Wildcats in the 50th minute, as she received a pass from Kelly Peterson and was able to put it in the back of the net to cut Midland's lead in half.

Just 20 minutes later, a freshman to freshman combination put the Wildcats even with the Warriors.

Gena Romano fed the ball to a breaking Kemi Adewunmi who put it in for her first goal of the season. With a little more than fifteen

minutes left in the game, Mary Anne Liebenritt took a corner kick which was eventually tapped in by senior Andrea Haig for her first goal of the season and the game's eventual game winner.

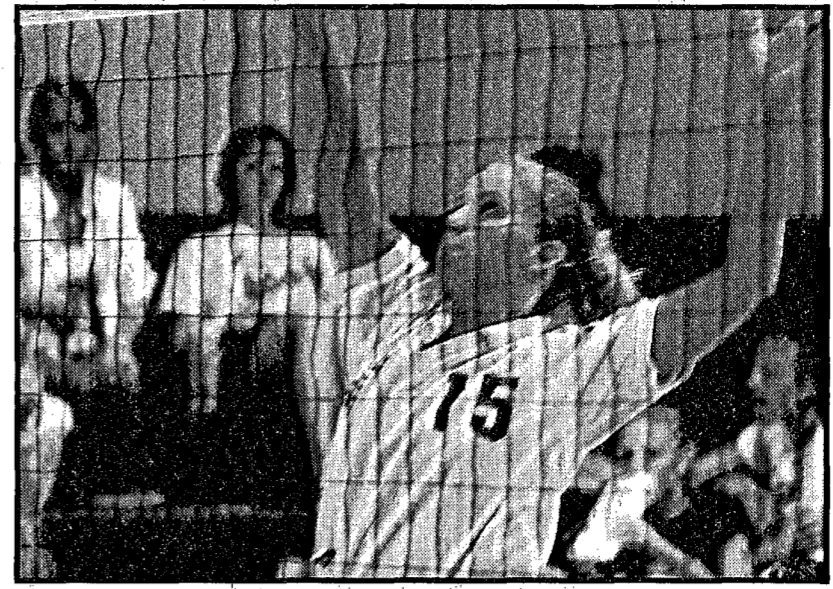
Haig, who serves as one of the team's on-field leaders, said the second half became a tale of doing whatever it took to get the win, including using the brisk south wind to assist in the effort.

"It was go for it all and make sacrifices for the team," she said.

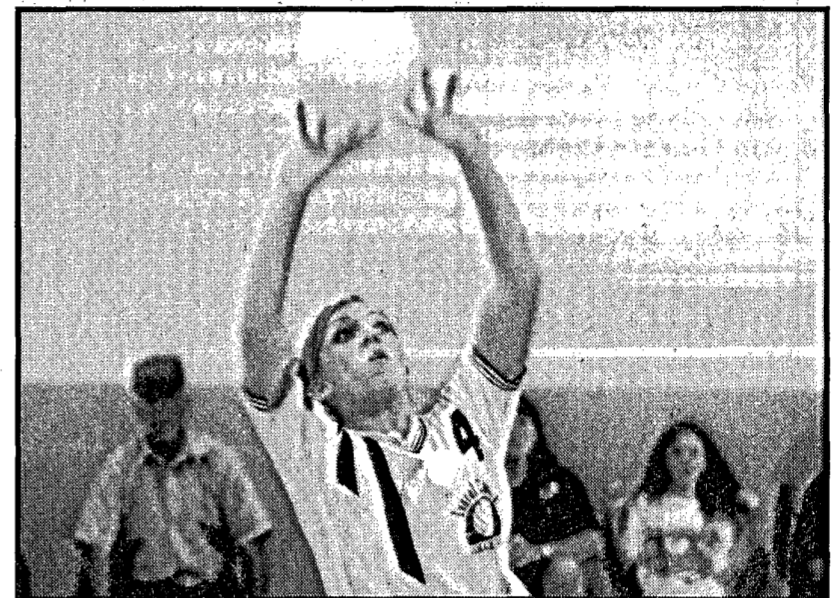

"We were definitely effective today," senior middle Michaela Blaylock said following the team's first win.

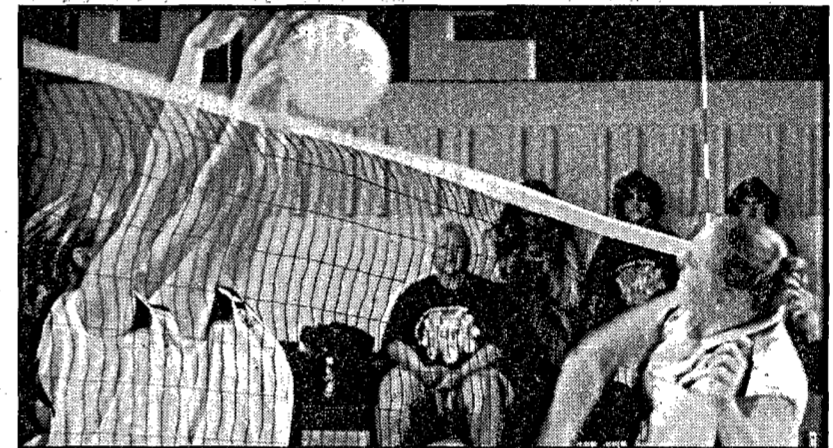
The next action for the Wildcats was scheduled for this Wednesday at home against Mount Marty College.

The team score of 378 on Saturday would have been fifth among 10 teams that day.

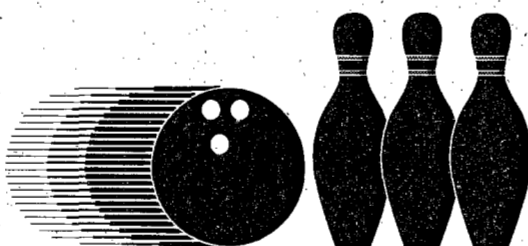

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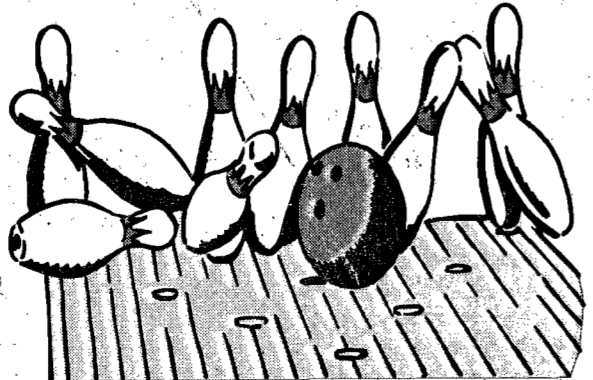

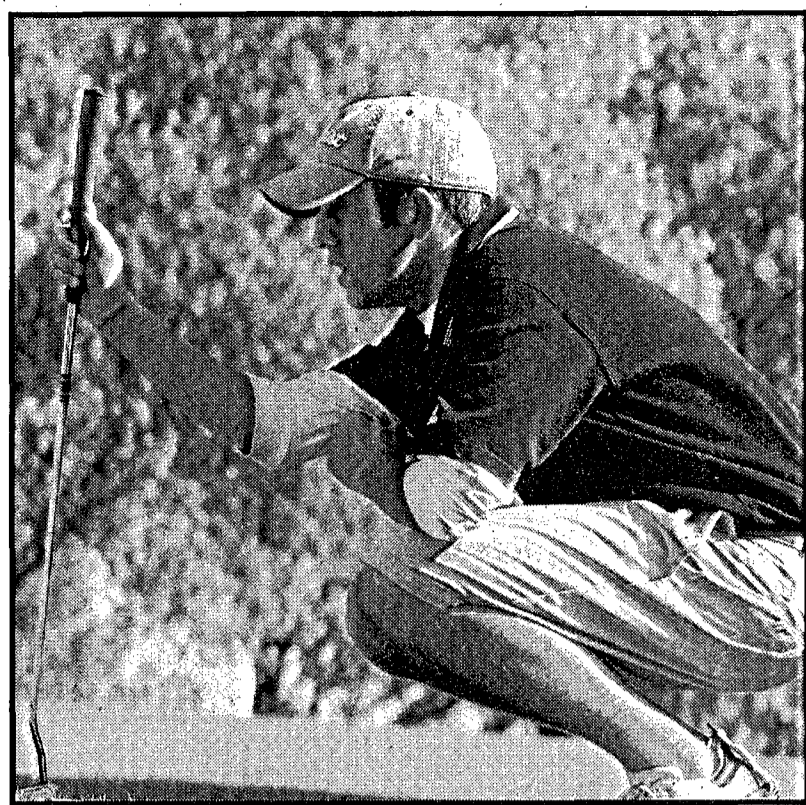
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Wayne's Mike Varley looks over his next putt at last week's Wayne State College Invitational played at the Wayne Country Club.

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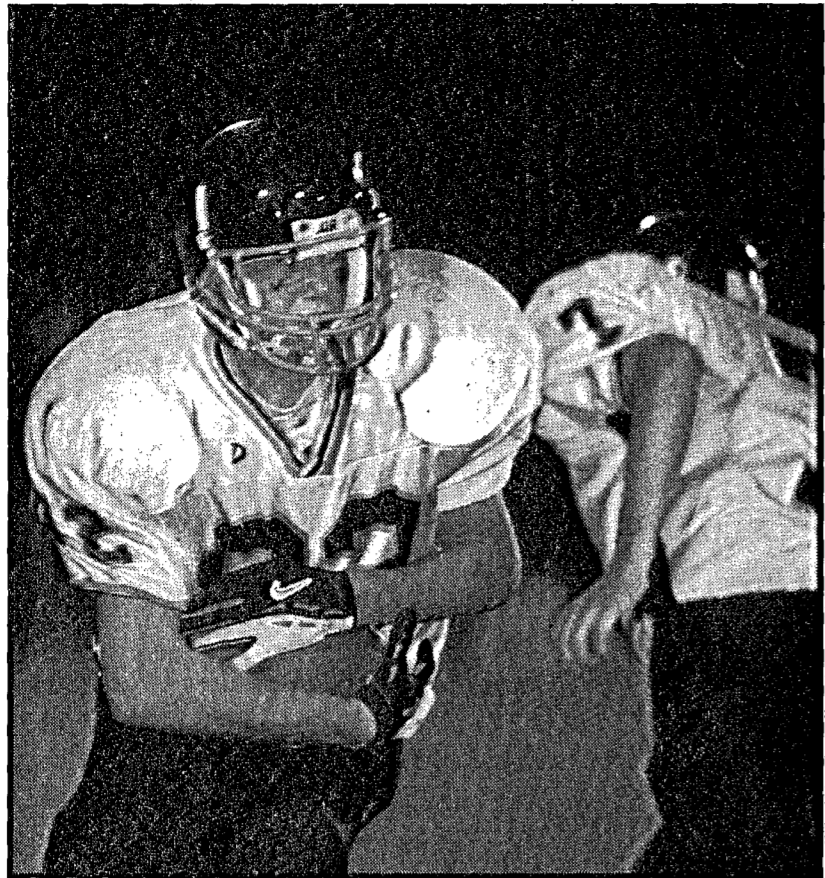

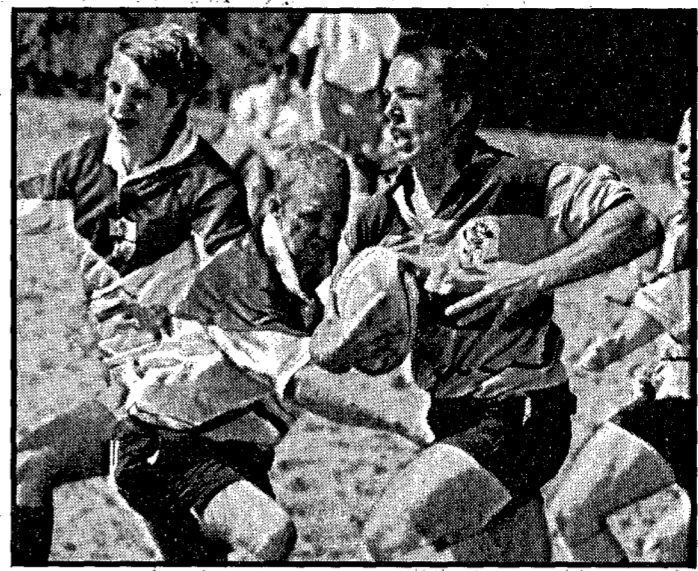
pass and turned the corner down the right sideline for a 60-yard run.

Of great concern in this corner is the frequently heard complaint from some corners that a judge's decision "ignored what the majority of people want."
Quite simply: The opinions of judges and appeals courts and the U.S. Supreme Court are not supposed to reflect polling data or vox populi, no matter how loud.
The American court system is specifically designed to protect people and ideas from that very thing. Judges are to make decisions based on evidence and any precedent set by a higher court.
If a judge goofs, appeals courts are in place to say so. This process can go all the way to the U.S. Supreme Court.
The justices of the nation's highest court might, indeed, reflect a judicial philosophy comparable to that of the president who appoints them. That's why presidential court appointments are so important to the future of the Republic. The U.S. Constitution is a work in progress. Its provisions mean what a majority of a sitting Supreme Court says they mean.

Therefore, a president who has the opportunity to appoint federal judges - including those on the high court - can leave a decades-

long legacy. Their interpretations of law might or might not reflect that philosophy in the future. That's okay; or, at least it's reality.

What the courts ought not reflect is the passing fancy of those supporting or opposing one cause or another.

City Budget

The council approved a budget this week that includes a one mill drop in the property tax rate.

In the past three years the city has levied the maximum 45 cents per \$100 valuation but reduced that levy to 44 cents for the next year. It is a small amount but the mayor and council have begun an effort to force the levy lower when possible and drive expenditures off that number.

Twenty-two percent of the money to run the city government comes from property tax. The rest comes from state government funding, occupation taxes on utilities and fees and licenses.

The FY '04-05 budget proposal is on the city web site.

Cats: Family Pets or Critters?

The council completed action this week to enact an amendment to add cats to the Wayne animal control ordinance. Now both dogs and cats will be required to show proof of rabies vaccination and be licensed each May.

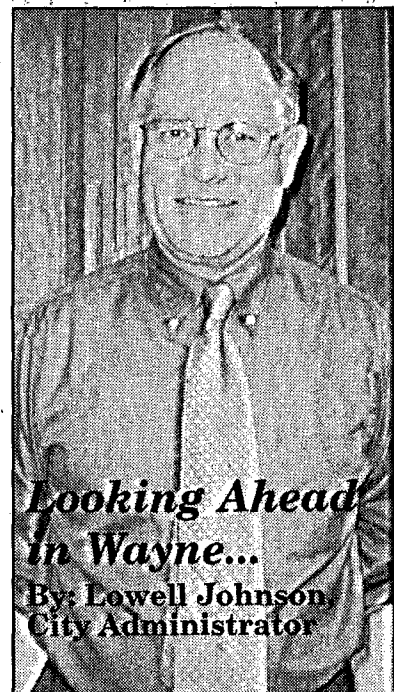
What else does the ordinance do?

1. It prohibits leaving food outside continually for cats. This affects primarily those cats that are critters. In researching this issue we found that this practice is disrupting the natural balance of life and death that limits the population of non-domestic critters, including cats. We also found that it is attracting additional, unvaccinated wild animals into town that may not normally come here.

2. It restricts trapping of cats to persons authorized by police. The police department will provide humane live traps for people in areas that need cat population brought under control. We will trap the cats when trapped and take them to a location for adoption to be put to sleep at the cost. No other trapping will be done without authorization. We have traps yet, but will be more difficult to identify if we start trapping in

may get some domestic cats that are running outside at the time. Registration and identification will help us find pet owners. When we pick up cats and dogs we will hold them for five calendar days. If your pet doesn't come home for a couple of days, you might want to call our dispatchers at 375-2626.

3. Cats and dogs will be required to be under the owner's

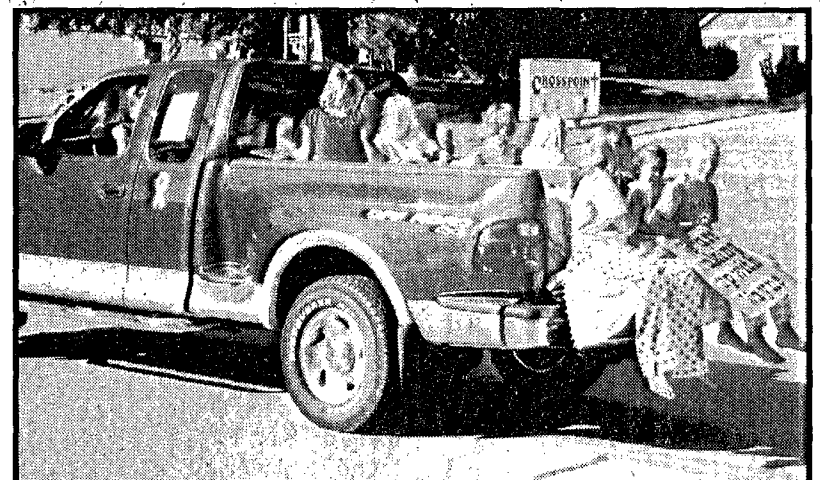
control and feces picked up if it is off the owner's property. This is easier for dogs and will be enforced on a complaint basis for both dogs and cats. Cat feces is not usually noticed until the cat population starts becoming concentrated by unlimited outside feeding. Then odor and health issues become a problem and this ordinance gives the city ability to locate the problem and resolve it.

4. Wayne has a limited number of police officers and our intent is to keep our eye on the ball of illegal drug sales and felonies. This new animal control amendment gives us tools to control animal problems when needed.

5. The new amendment limits the number of cats per household to four and the number of dogs per household to four. This ordinance defines owner as anyone possessing or harboring or having care or custody of a cat. If a resident is feeding cats outside, this ordinance considers that resident the owner of all of the cats feeding

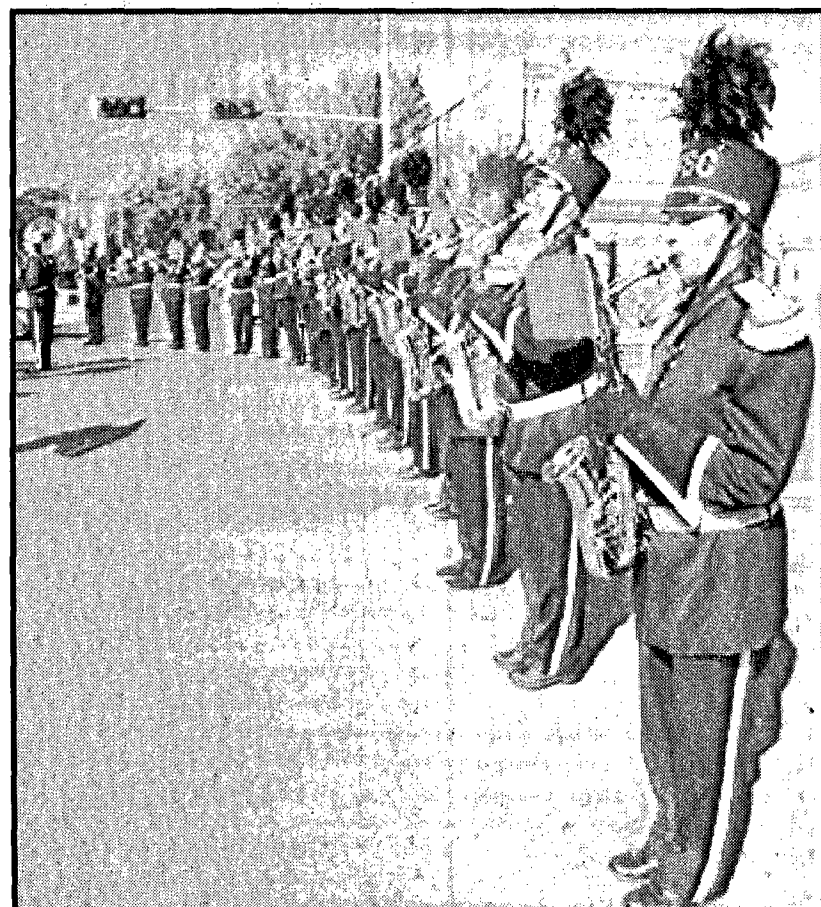

Wayne Schools Board of Education holds hearing

A public hearing to exceed the basic allowable growth rate of 0.4762 percent up to 1.4762 percent was held at 7 p.m. on Sept. 13 at the high school in Wayne. The 1.4762 percent amounts to about \$80,000 additional funds that will be accessible.

The regular meeting started at 7:10 p.m. The board approved the hiring of six people: Peg Webster as a high school paraprofessional; Karlana Sayers as a part-time custodian; Enrique Guevara as a Special Education paraprofessional; Candace Bernhagen as a part-time custodian; Mark Evetovich as a part-time Kindergarten helper; and Stephanie Schoh as part-time Kindergarten and kitchen helper.

The board acknowledged two gifts to the district: \$150 from Pamida for school supplies and \$50 from the Sports Club at Wayne State College.

The board approved the R.W. Rice Company HVAC maintenance/service agreement of \$12,096 for one year. Some of the equipment the company will main-

tain includes boilers, pumps, motors, radiators, thermostats, air compressors, hot water heaters, etc. in the three school buildings.

Also approved was the bid of \$7,000 from Business Telecommunications Systems, Inc. of Grand Island for phones and control devices in the Middle School. The telephones that were in there were around eight years old.

Teacher negotiations for the 2004-'05 year were approved. There was a 2.3 percent increase in the base amount bringing it from \$25,025 to \$25,600.

Administration gave informational reports on their buildings. High School Principal Mark Hanson noted the statewide writing assessment scores were impressive with 98.7 percent proficient.

Elementary School Principal David Lutt said enrollment is up. He also mentioned there was also a good writing assessment score at the elementary level with a score of 93 percent proficient.

Middle School Principal John

McClarnen noted the writing assessment score there was good too with a 91 percent proficient.

Sped Director Kelly Ballinger said there were three teachers recently receiving Pat on the Back awards. They are Lori Ruskamp, Pat Lutt and Sandy Spethman.

Athletic Director Rocky Ruhl said work continues on the track with sod and grass seed being put down. He also noted the Booster Golf Tourney is this Sunday, Sept. 19 at 9 a.m.

Dr. Joe Reinert, superintendent, talked about the board retreat planned for Monday, Sept. 20 at 7:30 a.m. at the high school. The final tax request will be set at the Oct. 11 board meeting. Teacher negotiations were also discussed. He ended by saying that 85 percent of the budget goes to salaries and benefits and that they want to continue to keep quality teachers and education in the district.

Executive session was held. The next regular meeting of the Wayne Community Schools Board of Education will be held on Monday, Oct. 11 at 7 p.m. at the high school in Wayne.

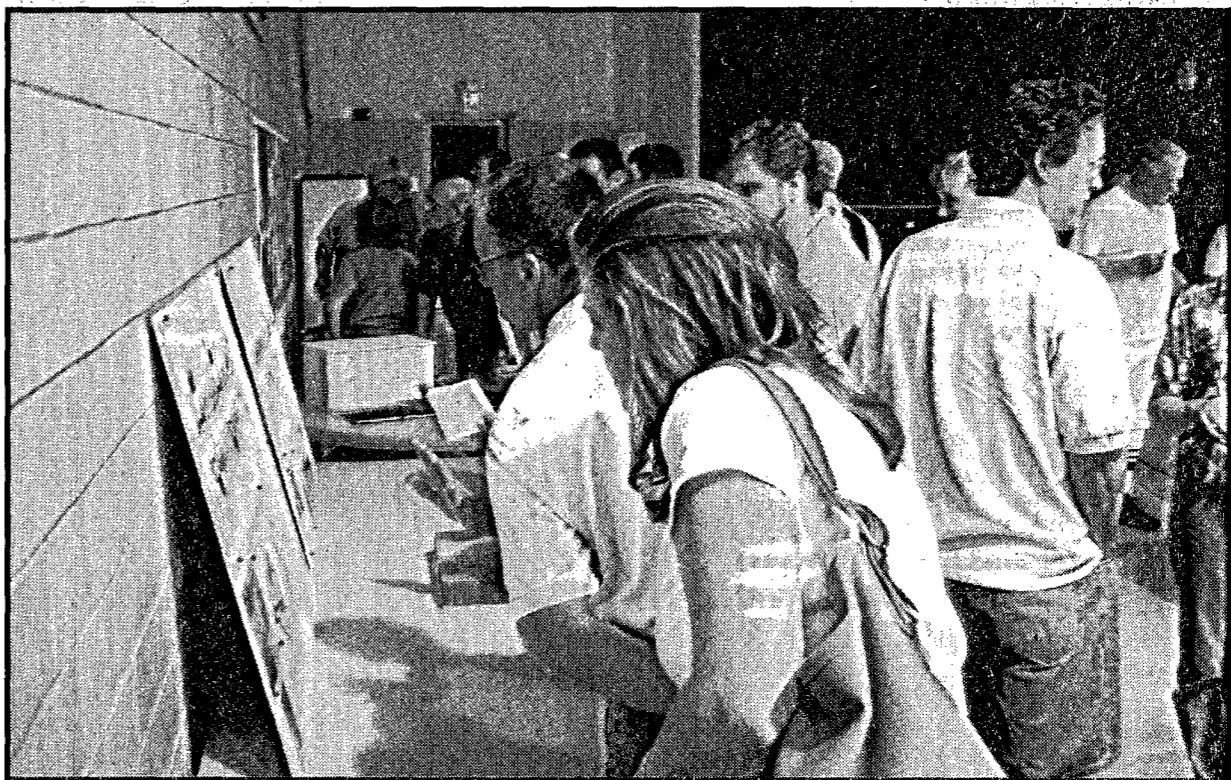

custody for psychiatric reasons. She is alleged to have been injecting methamphetamines prior to police intervention.

On Sept. 9, Wayne officers arrested two persons for drug violations in an apartment on Wayside Lane. Adra Annala, age 44, of Wayne was arrested on suspicion of Possession of Marijuana and Possession of Drug Paraphernalia.

Daniel Westerhaus, age 44 of Winside, was arrested on suspicion of Possession of Methamphetamine and Possession of Drug Paraphernalia. Westerhaus is alleged to have been in possession of hypodermic syringes, one containing suspected methamphetamine.

Chief Webster said officers were very proactive in dealing with the reports that led to these arrests. He is also very concerned that these separate cases may indicate that intravenous use of methamphetamine is becoming a common practice in Wayne.

"While these two cases may be anomalies, the reality is they are more likely the tip of the iceberg. Statistics show a large presence of Methamphetamine in Norfolk, South Sioux City and Sioux City so it should be no surprise to anyone that the drug would show up in Wayne," Webster said.

Chief Webster said these cases were started after citizen tips were received. He stressed the importance of persons giving the police their names so information can be verified.

He said he recently received an anonymous letter from a "concerned parent" that detailed alleged drug sales. While the letter named names, there was no indication of how the caller knew the information or how the alleged drug dealers are working. Without being able to talk to the letter writer Webster said the

information will be kept on file but it is virtually worthless for starting an active investigation.

Webster said it is very important for citizens to get involved if they want to help the police fight drugs in Wayne.

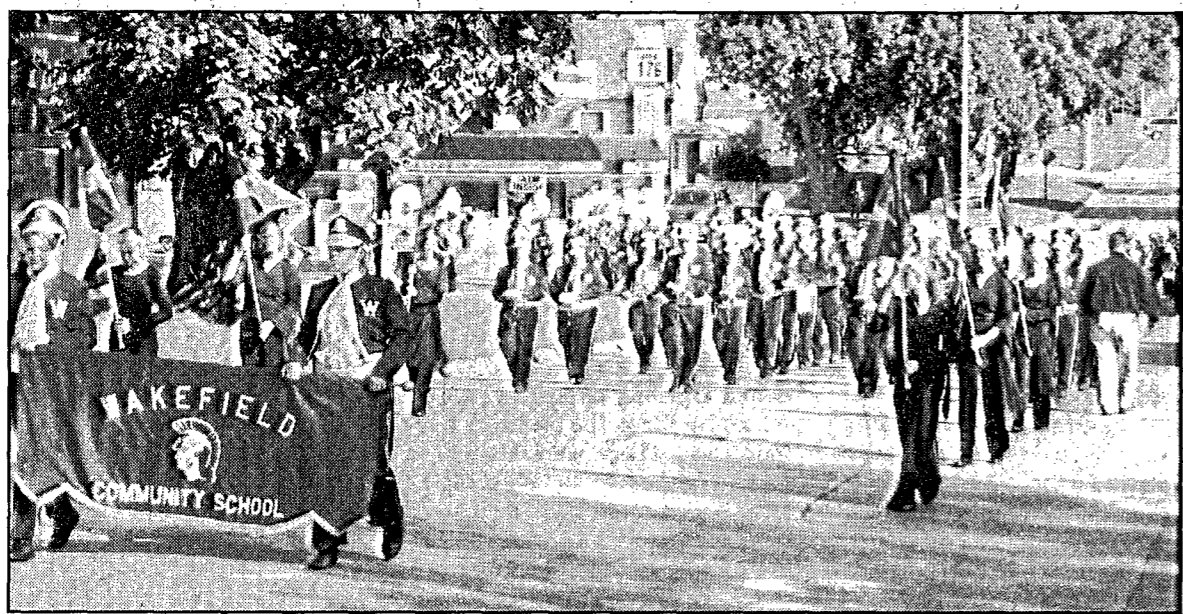
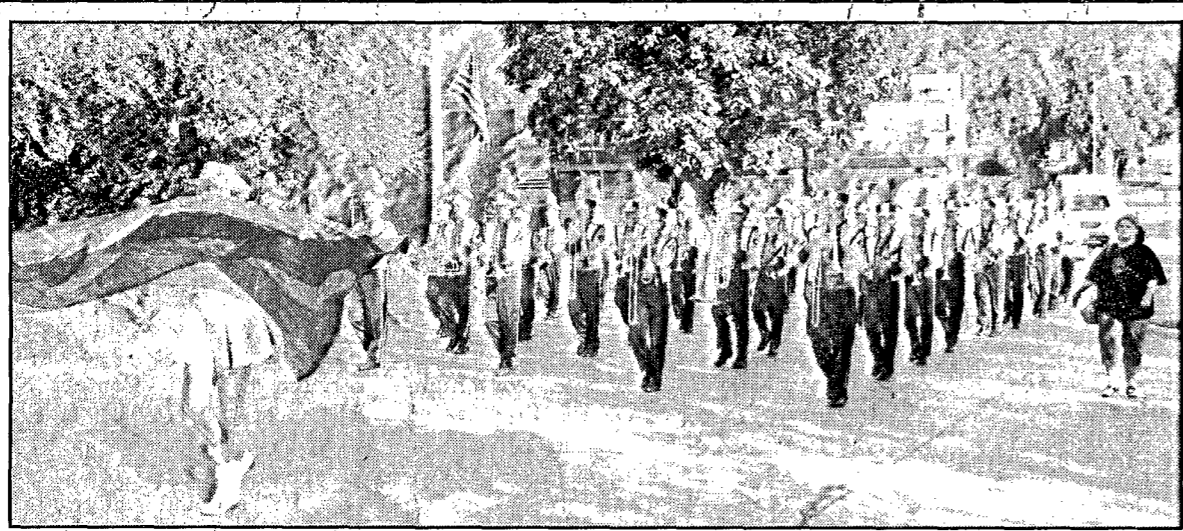

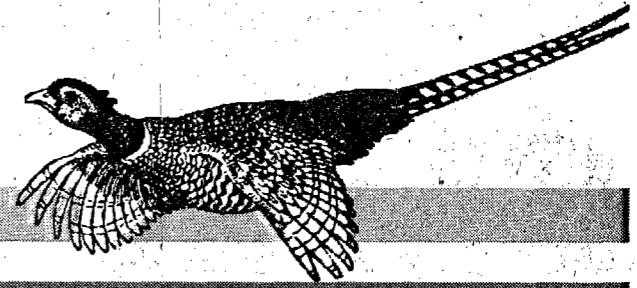

The Internet is a marvelous resource for kids and adults alike. There are many websites designed especially for children. There are some areas of the Internet though that are not appropriate for kids and can even be dangerous.

Needless to say, there's so substitute for parental involvement and good old common sense when children are using the world wide web. •If you do have permission from your parents to meet an online friend in person, do this only in a public place and with your parents coming with you.

•Do not respond to messages and bulletin board items that are sexually suggestive, belligerent, obscene, threatening, or that make you feel uncomfortable. Show these messages to your parents and have them send a copy to your Internet service provider.

•Never send pictures of yourself to anyone online, unless you tell your parents and get their permission.

Some Internet sites are for adults only. If you come across these, leave immediately.

before heading on to Rainbow Trail. After the week of Christian growth and learning, the group spent an afternoon river rafting on the Arkansas River before heading back to Nebraska.

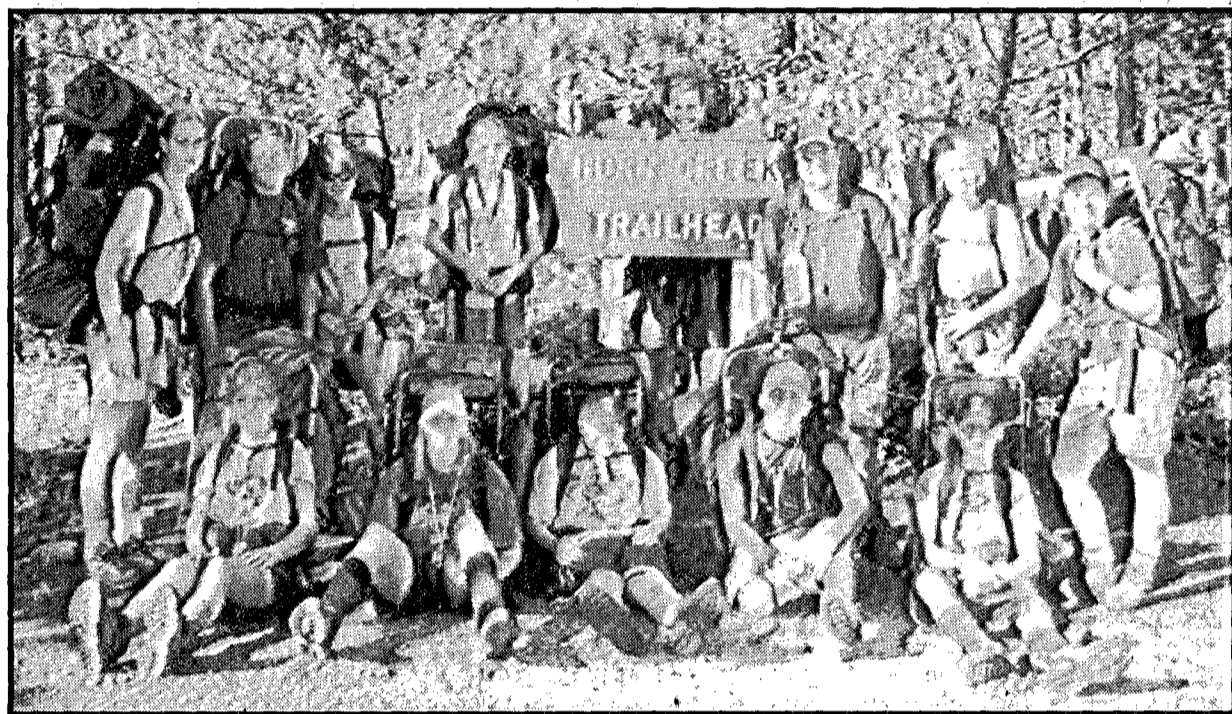
Jesse and JoHanna Crock were the guides from Rainbow Trail who accompanied the group on their week long backpacking endeavor.

Act now to avoid bugs

Now is the best time to prepare homes against invasion of overwintering insects and spiders, a University of Nebraska entomologist said.

The pesky creatures could begin seeking refuge from cooler weather by mid-October. Their most sensitive target is the home, but offices, retail stores, warehouses and production facilities also are vulnerable, said James Kalisch, insect diagnostician in the university's Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources.

"Usually the scenario is that because of the cooler temperatures, insects around doors and windows are drawn inside for shelter and warmth," Kalisch said. "By mid-November, most insects that are going to winter in the home already are there."

Though no single pest is expected to be a threat this season, the typical group of invaders will continue their yearly pattern, Kalisch said. These include crickets,

Oriental cockroaches, Asian lady beetles, cluster flies, boxelder bugs, ground beetles, spiders and other insects drawn to light at night.

Though these insects don't cause structural damage or pose a particular hazard to humans, they are a nuisance and may promote unsanitary conditions in the home, Kalisch said.

Some, like Oriental cockroaches, reproduce continually and can grow into overwhelming numbers. In addition, boxelder bugs are hardy and therefore difficult to control. Asian lady beetles favor more forested areas, but are particularly attracted to homes with rough-cut cedar shingles, where they take shelter in the gaps between the shingles.

To prevent insects and spiders from entering the home, Kalisch recommends using caulking to seal cracks and crevices in doors, windows, vents and openings for outside wires or cables. Residents also should keep screens in good repair,

vegetation trimmed and structures' boundaries free from clutter.

Insecticides sometimes are necessary around the perimeter of the home, Kalisch said. Granular treatment on the ground and in crevices, especially where the foundation meets the soil and in window wells, keeps away many potential invaders. Products containing cypermethrin, permethrin, cyfluthrin and esfenvalerate are effective and more environmentally friendly than other treatments, he said.

After applying insecticides, residents should water down the area to activate the chemicals, Kalisch said. Chemicals can wear off after a couple weeks, so more than one chemical application may be necessary.

If a few insects do get inside, the less potent aerosol sprays are an effective control, Kalisch said. Sticky traps inside help pinpoint problem areas and monitor how much impact treatments have had. Spiders in the home often crawl around at night searching for insects.

"If they find food, they set up camp for the winter," Kalisch said. Spiders also like to retreat into clothes or other articles left on the floor at night.

Brown recluse spiders are the only poisonous spiders occasionally found in Nebraska homes. Bites from other spiders, while not poisonous, may cause redness, swelling and perhaps even nausea or a slight fever.

Sometimes people unknowingly invite insect infestations. When they bring outdoor plants inside for the winter, they often forget to inspect them and remove insects, Kalisch said.

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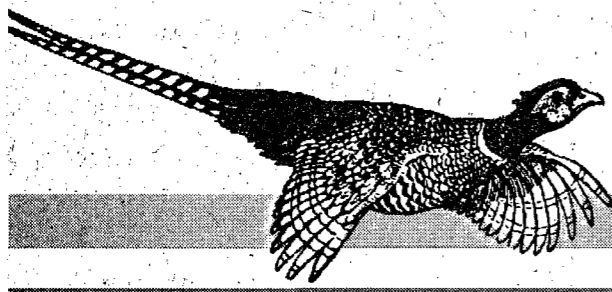
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Wheels make the world go round

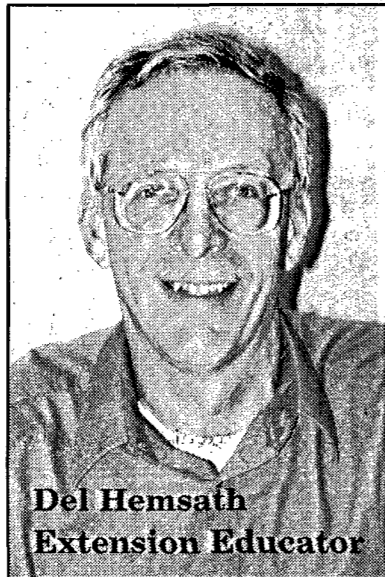

"Almost everyone is concerned about pesticide use and residues around children," said Clyde Ogg, University of Nebraska extension. "We can help schools reduce or eliminate the reliance on chemicals to control pest problems on school property."

The workshops will give school custodians, building supervisors and other school personnel information on integrated pest management, an effective and environmentally sensitive approach to pest management. This management approach works with all appropriate pest management

health-related pests, landscape and turf management, pests of moisture prone areas, mold and indoor air quality, and prevention and monitoring for pests.

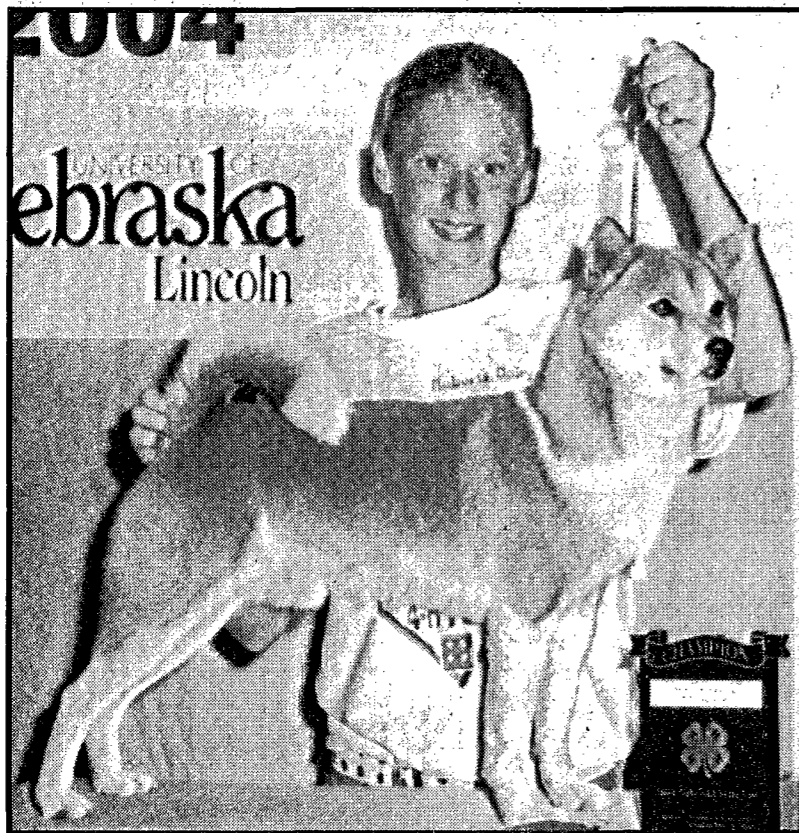

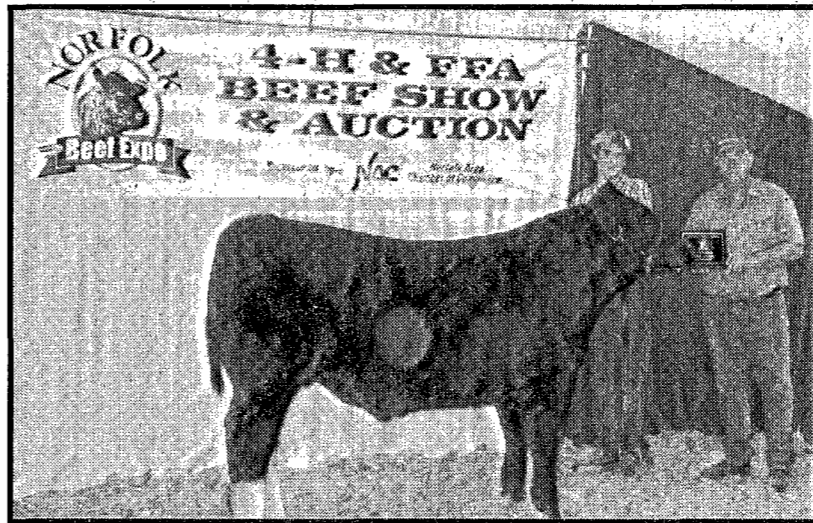

Residents at The Oaks watch Monarchs

Residents of The Oaks have spent the past few weeks watching and studying the various stages of the Monarch butterfly.

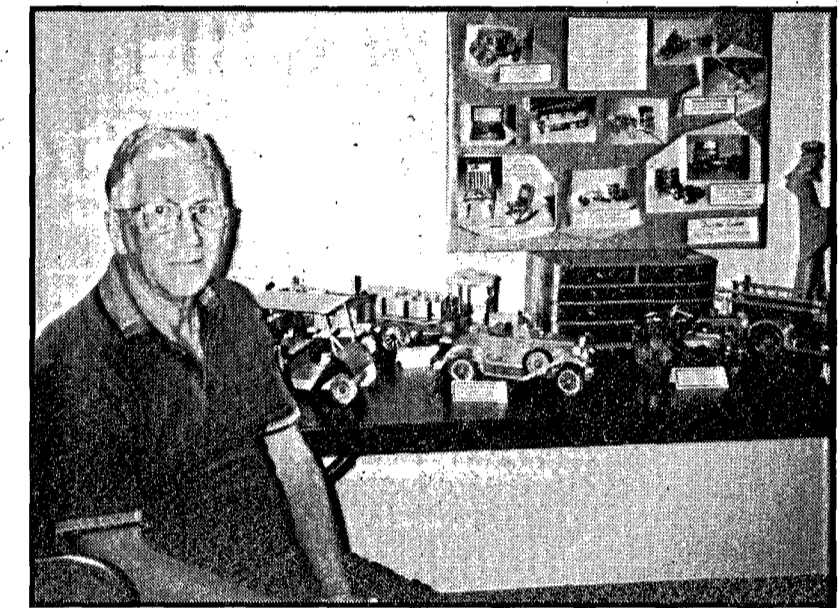
The project started on Sept. 2 when Cynthia Rethwisch brought four of the black, yellow and white striped Monarch caterpillars to The Oaks. The caterpillars feed on milkweed plants and require fresh milkweed leaves daily as they have big appetites and grow quickly.

Once the caterpillar is fully grown - about one and one-half inches long, it attaches itself to the top of the jar and will hang approximately 12 hours in the shape of a J. Residents checked the jars often and several were lucky enough to be there to watch

the transformation of one of the caterpillars into the pupa stage - a process that took less than one half hour.

The pupa is light green with a row of shiny gold dots near the top, and a few more near the bottom. During this stage there aren't any visible changes to the pupa until the day before the butterfly emerges. At this time, the pupa looks much darker as the black and orange of the wings becomes

apparent through the case. Once again eager residents checked the jars often in hopes of watching the butterfly emerge and unfold its wings. The butterfly pumps fluid from its body into the wings and in about four hours the butterfly is strong enough to fly. The Monarchs were released and wished a safe journey, as they will have a long flight ahead of them to either California, Mexico or Florida where they will spend the winter.

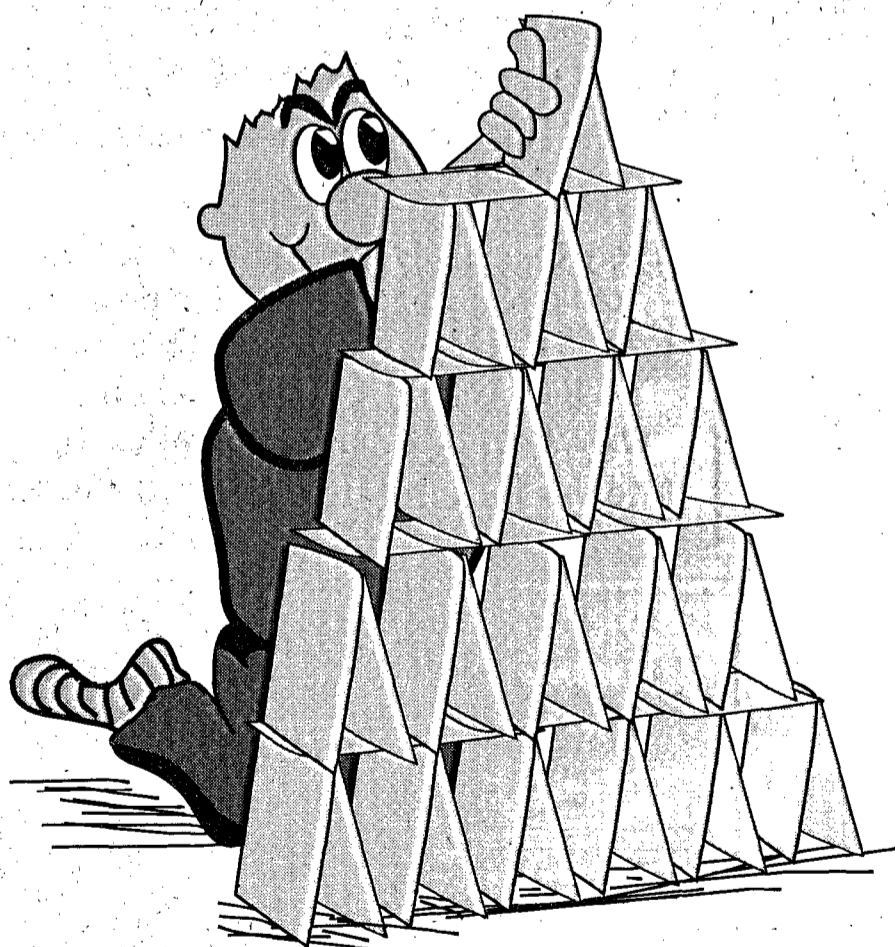
He likes working in wood for the challenge of the project and to be able to enjoy the finished project. Many of his items are given away to family & friends. He does not make things to sell.
