
In an attempt to provide additional education about radon, three opportunities will be offered through area health departments for craftsmen in the building trades to learn about radon resistant construction.

Newlyweds thankful for support

In May of 2004, Jessica Bock walked the stage at Dordt College in Sioux Center, Iowa to collect her diploma. In June she walked down the aisle at First Christian Reformed Church in Sioux Center to become Mrs. Ryan Loomans.

And this week, the surgical removal of a knee socket, hip and femur bone will make walking a hospital hallway her next goal.

Jessica was diagnosed with Ewing's sarcoma just weeks after being married last summer. This cancer preys on bone or soft tissues, and for Jessica it is located in her left leg, where she discovered it after experiencing pain and swelling there.

On Jan. 17, surgeons at the University of Minnesota Hospital were'scheduled to remove her femur, parts of her hip and knee socket, replacing them with artificial parts to try and eliminate the cancer from her body. The surgery will be followed by a fifth round of chemotherapy, along with physical therapy, to restore her health and the ability to walk.

Though their first year of marriage is not what Jessica and Ryan had hoped for, they say the prayers and support of family, friends and acquaintances are helping them get through it. That support is evident on her website, www.car-ingbridge.org/mn/jessicaann, where a guestbook logs an outpouring of well-wishes from friends and relatives in Iowa, Minnesota and Nebraska and elsewhere.

Jessica is originally from Allen. She is the daughter of Rob and Joy Bock of Allen. She met Ryan, who is from Rock Rapids, Iowa, while they were both students at Dordt College in Sioux Center.

Even their courtship presented trials: Ryan is part of an Army reserves unit headquartered in Omaha. He was called up to serve a year stateside,

tracking shipments headed to Iraq to make sure they reached their intended destination.

Loomans was transferred to 14 locations over the course of 11 months. Upon completion of his army duty, Ryan took lineman courses at NCC and is currently employed at Nobles Cooperative Electric in Worthington, Minn., where the couple now lives.

When Jessica first began experiencing pain in her leg, doctors thought she might have torn a cartilage. She decided to wait with further treatment until the switch to Ryan's insurance coverage was completed.

Fortunately, that policy is paying for a large portion of the medical expenses, but many other costs, such as frequent trips to the Twin Cities, are an unexpected expense for the newlyweds.

At Dordt College, professors and students sold sub sandwiches and chocolate chip cookies to help the young couple. They sold nearly 1,000 subs and were able to send the Loomans \$1,500 in profit. Friends in Allen also conducted a fundraiser for the young couple.

But just as important as financial support has been prayer support, Jessica said. "It is really encouraging to read the notes and messages people leave on the website."

They come both from people she knows and some she doesn't know, who have heard about her fight with cancer through church, family members or her alma mater. Church members at the Worthington Christian Reformed Church have also helped bring in meals for the couple.

Editorials Democracy in action

Do you believe that we live in a democracy? Does our city of Wayne have a truly democratic government?

As defined by Merriam-Webster, democracy means "government by the people" and for the past 5 months I have seen, first-hand, Wayne's democratic government in action. On August 2, 2004, Wayne's Planning Commission held its first public hearing for ordinance changes concerning rental property. As a result of that hearing, a Zoning Committee was formed to assist the city in creating a rental property ordinance to address safety, occupancy, and parking concerns. The Zoning Committee included Lowell Johnson, City Administrator; George Ellyson, Building Inspector and Planner, and representatives from the Planning Commission, City Council, Wayne Rental Association and Wayne State College.

All meetings were open to the public. This committee met three times to decipher, discuss, and revise the proposed ordinance to best meet the needs of our community.

The original public hearing was for Draft #8, a 22-page document. Draft #14, a 9-page document, is now Ordinance #2005-2, and is scheduled for its 2nd reading at the Jan. 25 City Council meeting. Draft #14 is available for you to read on the City of Wayne's website (http://www.waynene.org). Right from the start, the Wayne Rental Association was in

agreement with the city to provide tenants with healthy and safe dwellings. The life safety standards have remained a part of this proposed ordinance through all revisions.

. The language regarding rental property in original singlefamily structures has been greatly simplified. Terminology was changed and redundancy was eliminated. At this time only two types of rental property are addressed: Conversion and Category Three. A Conversion is a single-family dwelling occupied by the owner that has a portion of living space offered for rent to others. A Category Three is a single-family dwelling offered entirely for rent.

Items that have undergone revisions but still remain unclear are: transfer of property; inspections and inspection fees; imposing current building codes to already existing buildings; and the definition, registration, inspection fees, and occupancy for Conversions.

Parking requirements for rental property were a concern from the start. The language in the original draft was discriminatory since it was zoning by user (renter vs. owner) rather than by use (residential). After many discussions and further research concerning this issue, a parking ordinance was drafted that did not discriminate by user. The parking regulations will now be a separate ordinance since it is not specific to rental property. (The parking regulations can be seen on Draft #14 page 9)

Main Street Focus


Last week wa a special week for us at Main Street Wayne.

J.L. Schmidt and Elizabeth Chase, the Nebraska Lied Main Street Director and Associate Director visited us to bring us upto-date on Main Street happenings and to energize us for the coming year.

Mr. Schmidt shared with us that there are 42 state Main Street Programs with more than 1,800 communities involved in the Main Street Four Point Approach[©]. The Main Street Four Point Approach[©] refers to the use of the four required Main Street Committees Design, Organization, Economic Restructuring and Promotion. The Promotion Committee in Wayne has been the most visible committee. Its role is to sell a positive image of the commercial district and to encourage consumers and investors to live, work, shop, play and invest in the Main Street district. The Promotion Committee of Main Street Wayne has attempted to create a positive image of the downtown area through advertising, retail, promotional activity, special events and marketing campaigns carried out by its volunteer members. The committee goal is to improve consumer and investor confidence and encourage commercial activity and investment in the area. Members of the committee include Co-Chairs Irene Fletcher (Legends) and Marie Mohr (Swans), volunteers Kate Lutt (Children's Collection), Sandra Gathje (Tacos & More), Nana Peterson (Antiques on Main), Patty Weiland (KTCH) and Jan Stark (The Wayne Herald). • The redevelopment area has to be a blighted or substandard area before the city can prioritize it for development. About 75 percent of Wayne qualifies for this under the program guidelines, but there is only a maximum of 35 percent of the city can be designated at any one time.

•Our house at 601 Oak Drive qualified as blighted before we resided it last summer because the house was built before 1964 and the paint was peeling. There are other qualifiers for a re-development area, such as inadequate storm runoff and poor drainage, improper platting of lots, faulty street layout, junk laying around or any factors that "impair the sound growth of the community."

•The real estate values inside and outside the rédevelopment area aren't affected by the designation of a redevelopment area in a city.

•The city advertises for developers to come into the re-development area and invest in new taxable property.

•The tax incentive is only offered if the proposed housing or business project creates new taxable property but wouldn't occur without the tax incentive to help. The city prepares an agreement that says if the developer builds new taxable property, we will allow the developer to have the real estate taxes on that new construction go to pay off debt against the project for up to 14 years. The alternative is that without the tax incentive, the new project would never get built in the redevelopment area.

•Check a map and a public hearing notice in today's paper about a blight study and a re-development area proposal. Several priority redevelopment areas are being considered and there will be a public hearing for each one. Watch for those in this paper and call for information.

some helpful hints on how to be prepared in a winter storm in your home or on the road:

•Stay at home if possible.

•Keep the refrigerator and the freezer closed; an unopened refrigerator will keep food cold for at least a few hours. If you lose power and believe that the power will be out for a prolonged period of time. prepare a cooler filled with ice for your perishable foods.

• If the power goes off while you are using appliances, turn them off immediately; by doing this, you reduce the risk of overloading their circuitry when the power comes back on.

•Keep batteries and flashlights in a central, easily accessible location known to everyone in the household.

•Only use a flashlight for emergency lighting. Never use candles! •Do not run a generator inside a

home or garage. •If you use a generator, connect

the equipment you want to power directly to the outlets on the gen-

Fire prevention tips are shared

The Wayne Volunteer Fire Department has issued the following winter heating fire prevention tips.

The alternative heating sources that we talked about in the fall have now become supplemental heating sources.

The same prevention methods still apply to the heating sources.

 Kerosene must be kept in good working condition. Use only the fuel recommended for your heater and be sure you have adequate ventiliation when using your heater. Never go to bed or leave the house when you are using your heater.

•Electric space heaters should not be used with an extension cord. If necessary, use a power bar with a built-in circuit breaker,

•Fireplaces need attention too. Make sure the chimney is open and in good condition. Keep a screen or glass shield in front of the fireplace to control sparks.

•Lastly, these supplemental heat sources need space. Keep them at least three feet from any combustible material.

Remember that automated teller machines (ATMs) may not work during a power outage.

•Put on layers of warm clothing. Never burn charcoal for heating or cooking indoors. Never use your oven as a source of heat. If the power may be out for a prolonged period, plan to go to another location (relative, friend, or public facility) that has heat to keep warm.

If leaving your home is absolutely necessary, the Red Cross offers the following to help keep you safe:

*When driving, remember that all stoplights become four-way stops in a power outage. In addition, reduce speed and adjust for weather conditions as needed. *If you commute long distances.

keep a flashlight, an extra pair of shoes, water, blanket and emergency food rations in the car.

*Keep your car fuel tank at least half full as gas stations rely on electricity to power their pumps.

•small supply of food • Due to the extreme risk of fire, do not use candles during a power outage.

Food safety in a power outage: Although the Red Cross is unable to replace food lost due to power outage, informational brochures are available to answer food storage and disposal questions. Call (402) 375-5209 for more information.

"Although many feel they must throw all their food away after a power outage, there are several steps people can take to preserve and salvage their food, including perishables," said Lori Carollo, chapter manager. Carollo offers these tips: 18 1 × 1 + 1 .*If a power outage is 2 hours or less, you need not be concerned. If it looks like the power outage will . be for more than 2-4 hours, pack perishable foods into a cooler surrounded by ice.

*If you have space in your refrigerator or freezer, consider filling plastic containers with


the power goes out, by displacing air that can warm up quickly with water or ice that keeps cold for several hours without additional refrigeration.

*If the power is out when you go to bed, leave your bedroom light on so that when the power comes on it will wake you. This way, you can check on your food and return it to the refrigerator as soon as it is cool enough.

*If you use medication that requires refrigeration, most can be kept in a closed refrigerator for several hours without a problem. If unsure, check with your physician or pharmacist.






Lindsay Harmeier brings the ball down court for Winside in home action on Tuesday evening.





West Nile cases down dramatically

A total of West Nile cases in 2004 reflect a dramatic drop from 2003, according to the season's final report from the Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services Regulation and Licensure.

The number of West Nile cases among Nebraskans dropped from 2,366 last year to 54 for 2004. (This number does not include three potential blood donors who were not allowed to donate blood because of their positive status). Twenty-nine deaths were reported in 2003; there were no deaths due to the disease in 1994.*

Thirty counties reported humancases. Twenty-eight of the caseswere male, 26 were female. Theages ranged from 11 to 92.AgeNumber1-13114-25326-5031

12 65+ "We've been extremely fortunate that the number of cases has dropped and there have been no deaths," said Dr. Richard Raymond, Chief Medical Officer and Director of the Department of Health and Human Services Regulation and Licensure. "It means the end of the epidemic. We will continue to see West Nile cases every year because the virus has become part of Nebraska's landscape, and while numbers may fluctuate from time to time, we won't have huge numbers of


cases like we did in 2003." There are multiple reasons for the reduction in cases, Dr. Raymond said. "Many of the kinds of birds that serve as hosts for the virus have either died or developed immunity, so they don't transmit West Nile to mosquitoes. The dramatic reduction in cases in the third year follows the experience of other states."

Weather conditions also affect annual mosquito counts and variations in species, but cannot be identified as the major reason for the dramatic drop seen in the third year, he said.

Other factors could be public health education efforts resulting in more people taking precautions, like wearing mosquito repellent, and more community efforts like reducing standing water, mosquito spraying and larviciding, he said. 

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

ORDINANCE NO. 2004-19 AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 78. ARTICLE III. SECTION 78-96 LOCATION RESERVED FOR HANDICAPPED PARKING OF THE WAYNE MUNICIPAL CODE; TO PRO-VIDE FOR THE REPEAL OF CONFLICTING ORDINANCES OR SECTIONS; AND TO PRO-VIDE FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Council of the City of Wayne, Nebraska:

Section 1. That Chapter 78, Article III, Section 78-96 of the Wayne Municipal Code is amended to read as follows:

(b) Appropriate signs shall be placed to advise the public of these restrict
