# Council amends ordinance

Rental property was again debated during Tuesday's meeting of the Wayne City Council.

Ordinance 2005-2 received second round approval, with several changes and after considerable discussion.

Council member Will Wiseman proposed a change in wording to the ordinance that would waive the one-time inspection fee if property owners voluntarily allowed their property to be inspected and the property passed inspection on a first or second visit.

Lee Brogie told the council that the present ordinance is "one size fits all," treating all residential zones the same way. She noted that the areas zoned R-1 should be handled differently than those with higher density populations. The Rental Association will present proposed changes in the ordinance to council members for consideration before the ordinance is brought before the council for final reading.

Projects scheduled to be completed in make the ordinance acceptable for 2005 include East 21st Street from Highway 15 to Claycomb Road and Claycomb Road being extended from East 21st Street and the construction of concrete paving, curb and gutter on Donner Pass.

It will involve the reconstruction of the intersection and sidewalk at Providence Road and East 14th Street. The project is expected to cost \$25,000. Council members felt the project should

The council discussed whether they could sell the property to the group without making them follow the same regulations given to the adjacent property owner. These include constructing a home in the \$100,000 to \$120,000 price range and requiring that the home have a garage and basement.




# Gant is speaker at WSC program

## Noted author is teaching at WSC

Noted author Delphine Red Shirt has joined the Wayne State College Department of Language and Literature faculty for the spring 2005 semester, teaching creative writing courses, while Lisa Sandlin, associate professor, completes a visiting professorship at the University of Texas.

The author of two books, Turtle Lung Woman's Granddaughter, and Bead on an Anthill, Red Shirt's writing has been described as "eloquent " and "fascinating" by The Washington Post. In addition, her work, "Turtle Lung Woman's Granddaughter" received the 2002 "Best of the Best" award by the American Library Association and honorable mention for the women's section of the American Folklore Society's 2003 Elli Köngäs-Maranda Prize. Red Shirt's work as a freelance writer and syndicated columnist has appeared in Indian Country Today, the Lakota Nation Journal of Rapid City, S.D. and the Hartford Courant newspaper in Hartford, Conn. She also serves as a series editor for The University of Nebraska Press, in the book series entitled "Race and Ethnicity in the American West."

A member of the Oglala Sioux Tribe, Red Shirt represents her tribe as a nongovernmental representative at the United Nations. She has also served the UN as the Chairperson of the United

Nations NGO Committee on the International Decade of the World's Indigenous People: 1995-96, and as the United Nations Representative for the Four Directions Council: International Indigenous Organization. Red Shirt has also been a member of the United States Marine Corps.

Red Shirt grew up in Nebraska and attended public school, Pine Ridge reservation governa ment schools and later the Red Cloud Indian School, a Catholic high school located in Pine Ridge. She attended Regis College in Denver with a major in accounting and a minor in histor ry. She also holds a master of arts in liberal studies in creative writing from Wesleyan University.

Her third book, "Outside Looking In, Essays by Delphine Red Shirt," is in progress and will be published by the University of Nebraska Press. She maintains an extensive schedule of public speaking and appearances.

She narrated a film for the Peabody Museum at Yale University. Red Shirt has been interviewed for National Public Radio and other media. A previous adjunct professor of American studies and English at Yale, she served as an advisor to Native American Students. She also taught as an adjunct professor at Connecticut College.







Editor's note; I was sent this column and I hope Mr. Stein will not be offended, just this once, if I re-publish his column. This may be the most powerful column I have ever had the pleasure to read. I had to share it and I hope it has the same effect on you that it had on me.

As I begin to write this, I "slug" it, as we writers say, which means I put a heading on top of the document to identify it. This heading is "eonlineFINAL," and it gives me a shiver to write it. I have been doing this column for so long that I cannot even recall when I started. I loved writing this column so much for so long I came to believe it would never end.

It worked well for a long time, but gradually, my changing as a person and the world's change have overtaken it. On a small scale, Morton's, while better than ever, no longer attracts as many stars as it used to. It still brings in the rich people in droves and definitely some stars. I saw Samuel L. Jackson there a few days ago, and we had a nice visit, and right before that, I saw and had a splendid talk with Warren Beatty in an elevator, in which we agreed that Splendor in the Grass was a super movie. But Morton's is not the star galaxy it once was, though it probably will be again. Beyond that, a bigger change has happened. I no longer think Hollywood stars are terribly important. They are uniformly pleasant, friendly people, and they treat me better than I deserve to be treated. But a man or woman who makes a huge. wage for memorizing lines and reciting them in front of a camera is no longer my idea of a shining 'my memory night and day, is the star we should all look up to.

How can a man or woman who makes an eight-figure wage and lives in insane luxury really be a star in today's world, if by a "star" we mean someone bright and powerful and attractive as a role



model? Real stars are not riding around in the backs of limousines or in Porsches or getting trained in yoga or Pilates and eating only raw fruit while they have Vietnamese girls do their nails.

They can be interesting, nice people, but they are not heroes to me any longer. A real star is the soldier of the 4th Infantry Division who poked his head into a hole on a farm near Tikrit, Iraq. He could have been met by a bomb or a hail of AK-47 bullets. Instead, he faced an abject Saddam Hussein and the gratitude of all of the decent people of the world.

A real star is the U.S. soldier who was sent to disarm a bomb next to a road north of Baghdad. He approached it, and the bomb went off and killed him.

A real star, the kind who haunts U.S. soldier in Baghdad who saw a little girl playing with a piece of unexploded ordnance on a street near where he was guarding a station. He pushed her aside and threw himself on it just as it exploded. He left a family desolate in California and a little girl alive in Baghdad.

The stars who deserve media attention are not the ones who have lavish weddings on TV but the ones who patrol the streets of Mosul even after two of their buddies were murdered and their bodies battered and stripped for the sin of trying to protect Iraqis from terrorists.

We put couples with incomes of \$100 million a year on the covers of our magazines. The noncoms and officers who barely scrape by on military pay but stand on guard in Afghanistan and Iraq and on ships and in submarines and near the Arctic Circle are anonymous as they live and die.

I am no longer comfortable being a part of the system that has such poor values, and I do not want to perpetuate those values by pretending that who is eating at Morton's is a big subject.

There are plenty of other stars in the American firmament...the policemen and women who go off on patrol in South Central and have no idea if they will return alive; the orderlies and paramedics who bring in people who have been in terrible accidents and prepare them for surgery; the teachers and nurses who throw their whole spirits into caring for autistic children; the kind men and women who work in hospices and in cancer wards.

Think of each and every fireman who was running up the stairs at the World Trade Center as the towers began to collapse. Now you have my idea of a real hero.

We are not responsible for the operation of the universe, and what happens to us is not terribly important. God is real, not a fiction; and when we turn over our lives to Him, He takes far better care of us than we could ever do for ourselves. In a word, we make ourselves sane when we fire ourselves as the directors of the movie of our lives and turn the power over to Him. I came to realize that life lived to help others is the only one that matters. This is my highest and best use as a human. I can put it another way. Years ago, I realized I could never be as great an actor as Olivier or as good a comic as Steve Martin...or Martin Mull or Fred Willard--or as good an economist as Samuelson or Friedman or

as good a writer as Fitzgerald. Or

even remotely close to any of

them.

But I could be a devoted father to my son, husband to my wife and, above all, a good son to the parents who had done so much for me. This came to be my main task in life. I did it moderately well with my son, pretty well with my wife and well indeed with my parents (with my sister's help). I cared for and paid attention to them in their declining years. I stayed with my father as he got sick, went into extremis and then into a coma and then entered immortality with my sister and me reading him the Psalms.

This was the only point at which my life touched the lives of the soldiers in Iraq or the firefighters in New York. I came to realize that life lived to help others is the only one that matters and that it is my duty, in return for the lavish life God has devolved upon me, to help others He has placed in my path. This is my highest and best use as a human.



Another bill I introduced this past week is LB 763. This bill would allow the State to recoup all Homestead Tax Exemptions on property when that property is sold or transferred.

The state reimburses the counties for the property taxes exempted. In the last fiscal year, 2004, that amount was over \$46.5 million. The bill states that the county treasurer shall record the tax exemption as a lien against the property each year it is granted. The liens shall extend three years after the date of the sale or other transfer of the property. All amounts collected during that three years shall accrue interest at an amount set by laws by the Department of Revenue, which is currently six percent.

"People will still qualify for the exemption as before and be able to stay in their homes. When they no longer can stay in their home and the property is sold, the state can recoup the exemption. Any excess proceeds will go to their estate, which to me is more than fair."

## Public welcome to attend the **Festival of Honor Bands Concert**









Eating breakfast benefits children's physical and academic performances. After not eating all night, children need to replenish their energy sources in order to stave off hunger until lunchtime. Children who do not eat break-

choices so they can choose healthy foods they will enjoy eating. Post the menu as a reminder to eat a nutritious breakfast. Allow about 30 minutes for eating or as long as children need to be able to eat at a comfortable pace.

Healthy breakfast foods should, be good sources of many nutrients. Good choices need not be traditional breakfast foods either. For example, cold cheese pizza might be a favored, and nutritious, breakfast food. Children should eat servings from many food groups at breakfast to achieve a balanced diet. For . example, one serving from the breads, cereals, rice and pasta group can be a slice of bread, one

helping children plan a breakfast ounce of ready-to-eat cereal or a menu each week. Give children half a cup of cooked cereal. Choose a high fiber, whole grain cereal low in sugar.

One serving from the vegetable group is 3/4 cup of vegetable juice. A serving from the fruit group can be either a medium apple, banana or orange, a 1/2 cup of chopped, cooked or canned fruit or 3/4 cup of fruit juice. However, eat whole fruits more often as they are higher in fiber than fruit juices.

One serving from the meat group can be two eggs or two ounces of turkey. A serving from the milk, yogurt and cheese group can be a cup of milk or yogurt, 1 1/2 ounces of natural cheese or two ounces of processed cheese. Choose skim milk and nonfat yogurt.

We were always looking for volunteers to do some of the trips, as it was so time consuming for the family,

The hospital had hired a consulting firm to "scout" the community to see if there was money to build the center. They said there was. I disagreed; I knew what was going on in agriculture. But of course, nobody had asked me! So, we began the campaign. I personally solicited some of my neighbors around Hoskins. It wasn't very fruitful, nobody had any spare dollars. Half the money was raised and then we hit stalemate, . I'll never forget the Friday we had a phone call in the Home Health Department from "Mr. Carson's secretary." How it got to our department instead of administration, I'll never know, but my friend and co-worker, Marsha, answered the phone and immedia ately transferred the call. We were so excited. And even more so, when we heard the news that he was pledging the rest of the funds.

Even more exciting was the Sunday he came to Norfolk to assist in the dedication. It was the weekend after Sue's wedding, and she and Monte were just home from their honeymoon. She and I went to Norfolk and attended the event. I was so jealous of the director of nurses, Janice Tillema because she got to meet him. He appeared genuinely moved by the whole thing, and it is aptly named the Carson Radiation Center. It has saved many miles, money and distress in the 21 years since. We will always be grateful.

## Premise Identification - is it needed?

A new method of tracking livestock from a producer's lot, to the sale barn, to a 4-H family, to the fair grounds and finally to the food supply, has recently been organized in Nebraska.

Premise identification is another term used for describing the physical location or the premises where that particular animal has traveled during its life span. The main reason for doing this tracking is to monitor a disease outbreak for protection of the export market for

producers. Determining where an animal has traveled during its life is already being recorded through ownership papers as the animal changes ownership from one person to another. The travel route is a little tedious to track and takes several weeks, in some cases, to compile a complete listing.

Knowing the location of an animal has become very important with the impact of animal disease coming into the United States and creating many problems on sale of processed meat.

The new premise identification system is going to be a much easier and faster method to use in order to follow an animal from birth to table, in fact, this system is being designed for a 48 hour traceback if an animal has been exposed to a disease. again enforce unwanted regulations on the little guy, but this is about safety of the food supply and designing a system to handle the fast travel of animals.

Keeping the borders open to export the meat produced is one of the keys to profit for the livestock producer and being able to fast track the locations of the animal in cases of disease is very important.

In order to obtain a location number or premise number, one can contact the Nebraska Department of Agriculture or go to an on-line web site at www.animalid.us and complete the registration in a very short period of time.

Is the premise ID a good idea? Yes! It is the best method that is available and will create a method of tracking animals and proving where the animal has been in case there is an outbreak of a disease. Diseases hopefully will not enter into the livestock industry in the U.S., but if the situation occurs, there is a system to address the problem. The new premise ID system is part of a nationwide system where each State will track the animal and Nebraska is one of the leaders in establishing a tracking system for animals.

First, specifically identify the problem. Looking at the issue at the most precise level possible helps determine a starting point for a solution and makes problems

even if things aren't easy or don't turn out in the way expected.

Set a specific date and time to follow-up on the effectiveness of the decision and make adjustments if necessary. Think of decision-making as a hurdle race. There are many hurdles, but the race can only be completed if the hurdles are cleared one at a time. Focus on what it takes to clear each hurdle as it comes.
