

New council member appointed

Verdell Lutt will become a member of the Wayne City Council for a second time after action taken at Tuesday's

meeting of the Wayne City Council. The appointment of Lutt came about after Resolution 2005-26 died due to lack of a second. The resolution would have set the date for a special election in Ward One and a candidate filing deadline.

Several members of the audience spoke to the council on the issue of a special election. All were opposed to spending nearly \$4,000 for the election, which, according to Margaret Hunt, "some don't even care about."

Diane Langemeier presented a petition signed by more than 200 people who were opposed to the election and Jessica Olson noted that if the mayor

made an appointment, "in the end, it's (TIF) process. up to the council to approve the appointment."

Council members discussed options available to them and then asked Mayor Lois Shelton to submit a name to them for consideration to the position.

After Lutt's name was presented and he received 5-1 approval from the council, members of the audience gave a round of applause for his appointment.

Following a public hearing, the council approved Resolution 2005-9 which declares a portion of the city to be 'blighted and substandard pursuant to the Nebraska Community Development





Easter Egg hunt involves four generations

Generations of Fredrickson family members have been participating in the family Easter Egg Hunt on the same property in Carroll since the 1920's.


Long-time Carroll resident, Laura Fredrickson, the current owner of the property, recalls that "in those days it seemed more like a race than a hunt on Easter morning. The bragging rights went to the person getting the most eggs - but in the end all were shared."

Laura, who will turn 90 in July, went on to say that her first remembrance of an Easter Egg Hunt in her family's back yard was in the early 1920s.

"The eggs that were used were farm fresh eggs that were stored in the cave, as we had no regrigerator. Before Easter, my mother, would boil many eggs and my brothers and sisters would help color them. Also, we would go out in the back yard and form straw nests everywhere. Straw was plentiful as my dad had a pair of mules that were used to transport his well drilling equipment," Laura said.

Laura's parents were Chris and Averina Fredrickson. They were the parents of 10







I truly believe, however, that many more qualified people would be able to run for these offices if the compensation was increased. The Appropriations Committee,

on which I serve, has been in serious discussions as well. These past few years have been difficult budget times for our state and even though we now are in a position of improved fiscal health - we still must be extremely careful on how this "extra" money is spent. As is usually the case, the budget requests far outweigh what is available to spend. With \$260 million in "extra" money available, we have received \$400 million in requests for new and expanded programs.

State law requires that 3 percent of General Fund must be in the state's cash reserve fund which is approximately \$130 million dollars. That leaves approximately \$130 million dollars for new and expanded programs. What this means is that there will be many requests that won't get funded.

A bill I introduced on behalf of county clerks, LB 762, passed this week. This bill allows county clerks to assign a substitute to attend and record county board meetings or board of equalization meetings. Current law does not allow anyone but the county clerk or deputy to attend and record these meetings. The passage of this bill will allow the clerks needed time to perform other duties.

I will be writing about the Legislature's upcoming discussions on Education and Economic Development in the next few weeks.

Government grants, fact or fiction?

complaints from Nebraskans who have received notification via telephone, mail or e-mail that they have been awarded a federal grant or "Freedom Grant" to use as they see fit. Luckily, many of the individuals who filed complaints with our office asked themselves an important question, why would I get something for nothing? Because of their suspicion they avoided being bilked out of their hardearned cash. Unfortunately, many others have not been as lucky.

Here's how this particular scam works. An individual identifies himself or herself as a representative of the United States government or of a group selected to assist in the distribution of grant money.

Consumers are then asked for their bank account information to credit a "one-time processing fee" and to later deposit the grant money. The "processing fees" in question are usually around \$250 for an \$8,000 grant, but both fees and grants car run much higher. When suspicious consumers ask how they qualified for this particular grant they are told it's because they have good

It's important that consumers remember that applying for a grant of any sort is a complicated and time consuming process. The U.S. government does award grants to assist specific projects, charities, non-profit groups and educational institutions. Money is seldom given to an individual and then only after actually applying for the grant.

Remember some of the cardinal rules of consumer protection. Never give out your bank account information to someone you do not know. It could lead to unauthorized withdrawals or identity theft. And never pay money up-front for any award or prize. Processing fees and taxes are just words designed to take your money.



WSC class studying risk factors for cardiovascular disease

WSC Grad students in Advanced Cardiac Rehab have been reviewing the literature to better understand the pathophysiology and epidemiology of the Metabolic Syndrome, a complex array of risk factors for cardiovascular disease.

The syndrome of obesity, insulin resistance (Type II Diabetes), hypertension, and hyperlipidemia is reaching epidemic proportions in younger and younger people.

The primary cause of Metabolic Syndrome is a chronic lack of physical activity, so students in PED 596 are involved in a Service Learning Project working in partnership with the Wayne County Department of Health and Human Service, to promote physical activity and nutrition awareness in elementary schools in Cedar, Dixon,

Wayne and Thurston counties. · Participation in the N-Lighten Nebraska Kids program is encouraged. Pedometers are being awarded to the first 50 adult teams to average over 300 points in the adult N-Lighten Nebraska Activity competition.






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tion affecting movements such as walking, talking and writing. Parkinsons has three main symptoms: tremor, stiffness and bradykinesia (slowness of movement). It affects about one in 500 people; approximately one percent of people over 60 have Parkinsons.

With good medical treatment Parkinsons has a limited affect, if any, on life expectancy but it can be disabling. With quality medical care, support and a positive outlook, most people with Parkinsons can lead a productive life for many ears after diagnosis.

The causes of Parkinsons is not completely understood but a known cause is the degeneration of a group of nerves in the center of the brain called the substantia nigra. These nerves produce a chemical messenger called dopamine. When 80% of dopamine is lost, the symptoms of Parkinsons disease is produced: At present, it is not known what causes the degeneration of the brain (substantia nigra).

"My ability to manage my activities of daily living has been affected by Parkinsons disease, but with the help of the Home Health Care nurse to fill my pill boxes and the nurses aide who assists me with my bathing and some light housework, my husband and I have been managing well in our own home.'

Hard choices need to be made

Sunday? We could have had rain, 1098, Herndon, VA 20172-1098. rectal Tylenol. There was never or even snow, but the sun shone all day. And we are enjoying the leftovers from the meal today, and maybe the rest of the week.

Some families didn't have a beautiful Easter, and my heart goes out to them. They include Nell, a former member of our church choir, who had a stroke a month ago and has instructed her family not to use any life-prolonging means to keep her from going to heaven.

Then, there is Frances, who is 102!. Her daughter, an old friend, took her to the doctor a couple of weeks ago and he wanted to put her in the hospital. She looked him straight in the eye and said she was not going to any hospital.

Both ladies are now hospice patients. Both are comfortable. Both have loving family members at their bedside, spiritual care from their clergy, and skin care and oral hygiene from the care staff members in their facilities.

I don't know if Terri Schiavo is in a persistent vegetative state or not. I have no way of knowing what she would have wanted in her circumstances, regardless of what her husband says. My heart aches for her parents.

I do know that the hospice facility where she is being cared for is under siege. I can only imagine what the staff there has been experiencing. It hasn't been easy for the 70 other patients and their families, either. It has been a media circus.

We use a booklet in our work called Hard Choices for Loving People. It is written by a chaplain with long experience with folks who are dying. It is written in a compassionate, loving manner, and families having to make choices for loved ones find it a useful manual in weighing their options.


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Leigh Dam Project receives state funding/approval

The Nebraska Department of Natural Resources (NDNR) Commissioners meet on Thursday, March 24th at the Columbus Holiday Inn Express for their regular meeting. During the meeting, fourteen Commission members voted unanimously to approve state funding for the Lower Elkhorn natural Resources District's (LENRD) Leigh Dam Project. The funding will be in the form of a grant from the Nebraska Resources Development Fund for up to \$3.5 million, not to exceed 55% of the total project cost which is currently estimated at \$6.3 million. The LENRD will provide the balance of the project while additional sources of funding are investigated.

The vote followed a meeting on Wednesday, March 23 which included a tour of the west fork of the Maple Creek Watershed, including the proposed site of the dam. The Commissioners also met with the supporters and opponents. More than 150 people attended to give testimony for and against the project. Following testimony, the NDNR Programs Committee recommended funding the project.


The Leigh Dam will be approximately 50 feet tall and located immediately west of Leigh, across the West Fork of Maple Creek next to Colfax County fairgrounds. The project will provide flood control for the fairgrounds below the dam including property owners on the south side of Leigh, and impacting downstream landowners along the west fork of Maple Creek.

The project consists of a 480 acre recreation area that will contain a 160 acre lake. The draft of the recreation plan includes camper pads, a swimming beach, a walking/biking trail, fishing, boating (5 mph - no wake), and picnic shelters. Wayne: A core group of eight individuals will bring an athletic presence to this season's 31-member Blue Devil roster.

Head coach Dale Hochstein enters his 17th season with one returning state qualifier, senior Bryan Fink, who placed fourth at last year's state meet in the 3200 meter run.
