



He grew up in the Milligan area and graduated from Milligan High School and earned his undergraduate degree from the University of Nebraska-Lincoln.


He taught Social Studies at Greeley and coached a number of sports in the two years he was there.

South Sioux City, Wayne Public Libraries join **ONE Library Consortium**

City Library moved boldly into the future Library currently provides county-wideon Aug. 15 when they signed the resolution service. SIRSI will allow both libraries to to become the newest members of the ONE Library consortium. The cost of the project, \$43,000, was completely funded through the generosity of the Peter Kiewit Foundation who awarded the libraries \$10,000 and the Nebraska Library Commission who awarded \$33,000.

ONE Library is a consortium of the Norfolk Public Library, the Columbus Public Library, Northeast Community College and Central Community College that allows patrons to access the informational holdings of all of the libraries through a state-of-the-art library information system, SIRSI.

The library circulation systems of both Wayne and South Sioux City were near the end of the their life cycles and needed to be replaced. Since their purchase of the Follett circulation system in the early 1990's, both libraries have grown immensely in materials and patrons. South Sioux City anticipates a very large influx of new patrons as it moves to a coun-

Redevelopment process and blight studies are explained

In this week's issue of the Wayne Herald there are two more notices of public hearings regarding Redevelopment Areas and Blight Studies, Like the redevelopment area the Council established last winter in the east part of town, these two additional areas are being proposed to set them up for the long term future to help property owners pay the cost of removal of old buildings, build new commercial or residential buildings or defray costs for some utility or storm sewer or street projects. How does this work?

1. The Planning Commission picks areas where they want to offer incentives.

2. Federal law requires a study of each area to find something wrong so financial incentives can be justified and a blight or sub-standard determination study is done. Conditions like poor storm drainage, house siding in need of repair, empty buildings in need of. repair, need for new streets or utilities, etc.

3. The study results are reviewed by the Planning Commission and the City Council to determine if each area is an area they want to approve.

4. If a redevelopment area is approved, the Council and Planning Commission will then be open for proposals or requests for financial incentives to help demolish/replace buildings or other projects from people willing to invest their own money. Each project or request is evaluated separately and approved or disapproved by the City Council after a public hearing,

5. We are preparing a mailing list of property owners in each area so we can direct mail public hearing notices about the area or any proposed projects.

Where does the money come from for incentives in these areas? The incentive process is called Tax



Increment Financing or TIF. If a person owns property that is bare or has an old house or building to be removed, the real estate taxes are generally lower. If a property owner builds a new building on the lot, the taxes would be high. If the real estate taxes would be \$1,000 per year higher with the new building on it the Council can agree to allow the \$1,000 per year tax in new taxes to be diverted for 14 years to the owner to help pay for tearing down the old building or to help pay part of the cost of the new

Why do this? the benefit the Council is looking for is new private investment in the area one project at a time. The Oaks Retirement Center is a large project built using TIF and will be adding \$63,000 per year in real estate taxes to the school, city, and county in 2007.

We are planning a neighborhood meeting in each area like we did for the east Wayne redevelopment area to explain more about this and projects before September 13. We will mail invitations to property owners.

Thoughts on political activity in Nebraska

Business is business and that includes occasions when Nebraska is trying to sell food and other

goods to Fidel Castro's Cuba. Governor Dave Heineman will lead a ten-member delegation to the communist-ruled island in hopes of doing some business that previously was barred by Congress.

Some Cuban-American congressmen recently griped at Heineman for setting up the excursion. They said Castro's continued persecution of pro-democracy opponents should preclude such trade missions.

Heineman isn't having any of it, indicating that his job is to handle things for Nebraska,

It is up to the federal government - from the president to the state department to Congress - to handle foreign policy, Heineman aide Aaron Sanderford said recently. "Our business is agricultural trade with the Cuban people." Enough said?

Tax exemptions for property owned by religious groups are sometimes controversial.

Such breaks often take a shot from state lawmakers who are opposed to some pending tax increase that would hit the general

The notion of a state legislature taking away any tax breaks is far, farfetched.



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
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

Plea agreement reached in manslaughter case

A plea agreement has been reached in the case involving the

Additional services include greeting cards (holiday, new baby, graduation, wedding, etc.); sports layout pages (can insert photo into page); photo calendars; scrapbook pages; index cards (available in larger sizes); panoramic photos; and Blue Tooth technology that allows certain camera cell phones to be downloaded by pointing those phones at Kent's Photo Lab's machine (up to 35 feet away).

Kent's Photo Lab was started by Kent Hall. "Dad was working on film in the basement of his home," said his daughter, Lou Wiltse. Support for our Nebraska troops and their loved ones

There are many forms of support tions, referrals to local resources, available for the soldiers who are etc. serving or have served and for their loved ones. Amongst the areas of support for our troops in Nebraska are the Family Readiness Groups, Emotional Support Groups, and Family Assistance Centers.

A Family Readiness Group (FRG), formerly known as a Family Support Group(FSG), is an organization of soldiers(married and single), their spouses and children. extended families, fiancées, boy/girlfriends, retirees, DA civilians, and even interested community members belonging to a unit/organization. The participation in a FRG is voluntary.

The FRG provides an avenue of mutual support and assistance and a network of communication among the members, the chain of and community command, resources.

Most of the units in the Nebraska Army National Guard have FRG's set up. These FRG's schedule monthly meetings. These meetings are open to any serviceman or servicewomen with a soldier or sailor who is on active duty or from other units across the state. So if your soldier is in a unit, whose FRG is to far away to attend, you can attend a FRG that is in your area.

The Emotional Support Group(ESG) meetings that are Assistance Center-Lincoln-Phone: held across the state are available to anyone with a serviceman or servicewoman that has been activated. The meetings are lead by the Nebraska Army National Guard Chaplains. The ESG meetings offer an opportunity for communication from the chain of command as well as a chance to ask questions and share with others. The State Family Program has a staff member from their Family Assistance Center available at the meetings as a resource also.

There are six Family Assistance Centers that offer Support around the state. These centers are there to help military members, retirees and their families.

The Family Assistance Center's staff is available to assist in all areas related to military service such as answering TRICARE ques-

Maintain quality of leftovers through proper refrigeration, freezing

way a food is handled, prepared for storage, packaged and placed inside the refrigerator or freezer significantly affects its safety and quality later.

Perishable foods such as meat, dairy products, pasta, fruits and vegetables should never be allowed to set out at room temperature for more than two hours, or for more than one hour at temperatures above 90 degrees. If these foods are

the refrigerator or freezer and find increased risk that eating them leftovers that have gone bad. The could cause foodborne illness and cooled in shallow pans. because bacteria in them multiply rapidly. In seven hours, a single bacterium in a perishable food could grow to more than 2 million bacteria at room temperature.

It's OK to refrigerate foods while time they'll be used. they're still warm as long as the container cover is left slightly open until the food has cooled. To speed cooling, refrigerate foods in shallow containers so the food is no more than two inches deep. Large pots of

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It's not uncommon to dig through left out longer, there is an food, such as soup or stew, should be divided into smaller portions

Don't wash fruits and vegetables before storing them. When they're unwashed, they have a longer storage life and better maintain their quality. Wash them only at the

Placement of foods in the refrigerator affects food safety as well as the amount of time foods can be stored and still have the best taste. Perishable foods, including eggs and milk, should not be stored in the refrigerator door. The constant opening of the door makes the temperature of foods stored there fluctuate more than in other areas of the refrigerator.

Raw meats should be stored in sealed containers on the bottom shelf or in a meat drawer of the refrigerator so their juices don't drip onto and contaminate other foods. Fruits and vegetables should be stored in separate refrigerator crisper drawers because fruits give off ethylene gas that can shorten the storage life of vegetables. Also, some vegetables give off odors that can be absorbed by fruits and affect their quality,

Avoid overfilling the refrigerator. Allow room for cool air to circulate, which helps keep foods at the correct temperature. As a general rule, if leftovers won't be eaten within two days, they should be

When storing foods in the freezer, make sure they're packaged in materials that are moisture and vapor resistant, durable, leakproof and easy to seal and mark. Packaging materials also should be resistant to oil, grease, water and the absorption of other flavors and odors. Also make sure they are intended for freezer use and follow any directions on their labels. Freezer paper, for example, usually specifies that its plastic coated side be placed next to the food.

There are two types of freezer packaging -- flexible wrapping materials and rigid containers. Flexible wrapping materials include freezer paper, plastic freezer bags, plastic wrap designed for freezer use and extra heavy or heavy duty freezer aluminum foil. Rigid containers include plastic, glass and ceramic containers labeled suitable for freezing. Avoid using containers such as milk and, cottage cheese cartons that aren't moisture-resistant enough for freezing. Don't use glass or ceramic containers that might break in the

Most foods, particularly fruits and vegetables, expand as they freeze. To allow for expansion, leave some head space between the food and the container closure. Juices or foods that are packed in liquids require more head space than those packed without added sugar or liquid.

Also consider the following food storage tips:

• When freezing meat and poultry in their original shrinkwrap for longer than two weeks, re-wrap the packages in a flexible freezer wrapping material.

• Fatty meats and fish, cured retain their quality for a shorter

• Use a refrigerator/freezer thermometer inside the unit to maintain a constant temperature, which helps prevent textural changes and leakage.

 Label stored food to keep track of its contents, age and origin. Use freezer tape, gummed freezer labels or marking pens or crayons. Include the name of the food, its packaging date, the number of servings or amount and any additional helpful information, such as the form of the food or any special ingredients.

· Avoid freezer burn, which decreases food quality, by properly packaging, sealing, cooling and removing air from food and by not storing it for longer than the recommended time period for that type of food.

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
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
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Ideas shared for fall harvesting for alfalfa

The weather has thrown some northeast Nebraska during the ple of years ago with rains slowing months. curves to the alfalfa producers in early part of 2005 similar to a cou-



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The early rains allowed a good re-growth for the second cutting and now as rain becomes less frequent, one must think about the timing for the fall cutting. Producers may only get three cuttings because of the lack of rain. Producers must remember that the last cutting of alfalfa should be timed close to a killing frost. This will not allow the alfalfa to use root reserves to produce new growth.

If timing does not allow the cutting at this time, waiting until after the frost is another option. Cutting time decisions need to be timed according to the rain and frost forecasts for this coming fall. This is difficult to do, but it is time to do some planning about the upcoming harvest cutting times. Under normal conditions, fall rains allow some late cutting of alfalfa, but under drought conditions the re-growth from the third cutting may not occur and that does not allow root reserves to be built up for the winter months.


These types of decisions are especially critical for new plantings of alfalfa where the cutting times are a little different from the established stands. It is critical for the new plantings of alfalfa that the new plants be allowed to develop root reserves for the winter

The options to consider for fall harvest time should be centered



the alfalfa to establish root reserves before a killing freeze. Cutting too late will not allow adequate re-growth and cutting too early will reduce the tonnage. The last cutting is a valuable source of protein for feeding of livestock and is a commonly the best quality alfalfa for the producer.

ORDINANCE NO. 2005-20 AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 66, SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT, SECTION 66-2 TRASH AND WASTE, SEC. 66-3 CON-TAINERS, AND SEC. 66-4 ADDITIONAL CON-TAINERS OF THE WAYNE MUNICIPAL CODE: O PHOVIDE FOR THE REPEAL OF CON FLICTING ORDINANCES OR SECTIONS; AND TO PROVIDE FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and the Council of the City of Wayne, Nebraska: Section 1. That Section 66-2 Trash and Waste of Wayne Municipal Code is amended as

Sec. 66-2. Trash and waste. (return to

ch. 66) It shall be unlawful for any person to keep in, on or about any dwelling, building or premises, or any other place in the city. decayed vegetable or animal substance, garbage, or refuse matter of any kind that may be injurious to the public health or offensive to the residents of the city unless it is kept in containers not exceeding a 35gallon capacity, unless they are a dumpster that can be mechanically lifted and dumped by a truck for single-family dwellings and as nearly airtight as may be practical. Owners of duplexes, apartments, and mobile home courts may provide roll-off dumpsters with lids for use by multiple families in lieu of individual trash cans. It shall be unlawful to throw or sweep into the streets, alleys, parks or other public grounds any paper, nails, pieces of glass, refuse, waste or rubbish of any kind. No person may permit garbage, rubbish, waste or refuse to collect: and all persons shall remove such materials from their property within 24 hours after being notified to do so by the police chief, or his designate, who shall represent the board of health. Any person having garbage, rubbish, waste or refuse that is subject to decay or fermentation within a short period of time shall be required to place it in a standard garbage can with a tight cover, or a durable plastic container that is securely tied at its opening. All persons shall have the contents of their garbage cans removed at least once per week; provided garbage shall be removed more often at such times as the council or the board of health shall deter-

Section 2. That Section 66-3 Containers of the Wayne Municipal Code is amended as fol-

Sec. 66-3. Containers. (return to ch. 66) Every householder or occupant of any dwelling, house or other building used for the housing of persons, and the owner, keeper or manager of every hotel, restaurant, store, wholesale business and retail business, or other place where garbage accumulates in the city, shall provide one or more suitable plastic or metal garbage containers, including roll-off dumpsters, which shall have a close-fitting lid and which shall be placed on the premises owned or occupied by that person at a place that can be easily reached by the garbage collector; provided the garbage container shall be kept in locations most accessible to the collector and never upon the street or sidewalk; and all such containers, where not easily accessible, shall be delivered promptly to the collector when called for. Only roll-off dumpsters may be used for the reception of garbage by more than one family, household, apartment, mobile home park, hotel, restaurant: store, wholesale or retail business. All garbage created by or upon the premises occupied by such persons shall be deposited in garbage containers which shall be kept tightly covered at all times. Garbage shall be removed under such rules and regulations as provided in this

Section 3. That Section 66-4 Additional Containers of Wayne Municipal Code is amended as follows

Sec. 66-4. Additional containers. (return to ch. 66)

The board of health shall have authority to require the owners, managers or renters of restaurants, hotels, meat markets, stores, retail business, and other places where garbage accumulates in quantities to furnish a sufficient number of garbage containers to take care of such accumulations. The board may also require that such receptacles be removed in any of the ways contemplated by this Code and as often as necessary. Failure to obey any order or regulation of the board of health in connection with the administration or enforcement of the provisions of this chapter shall be construed as a violation of this chapter and shall subject the owner, manager or renter to a fine of \$50.00 for a first offense. \$75.00 for a second offense and \$100.00 for a third and subsequent offense.

Section 4. All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith are repealed. Section 5. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect after the passage, approval, and publication in pamphlet form as provided


