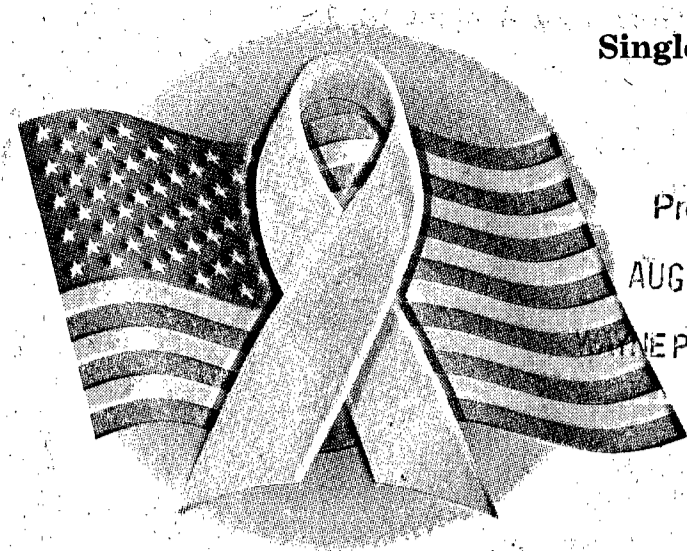

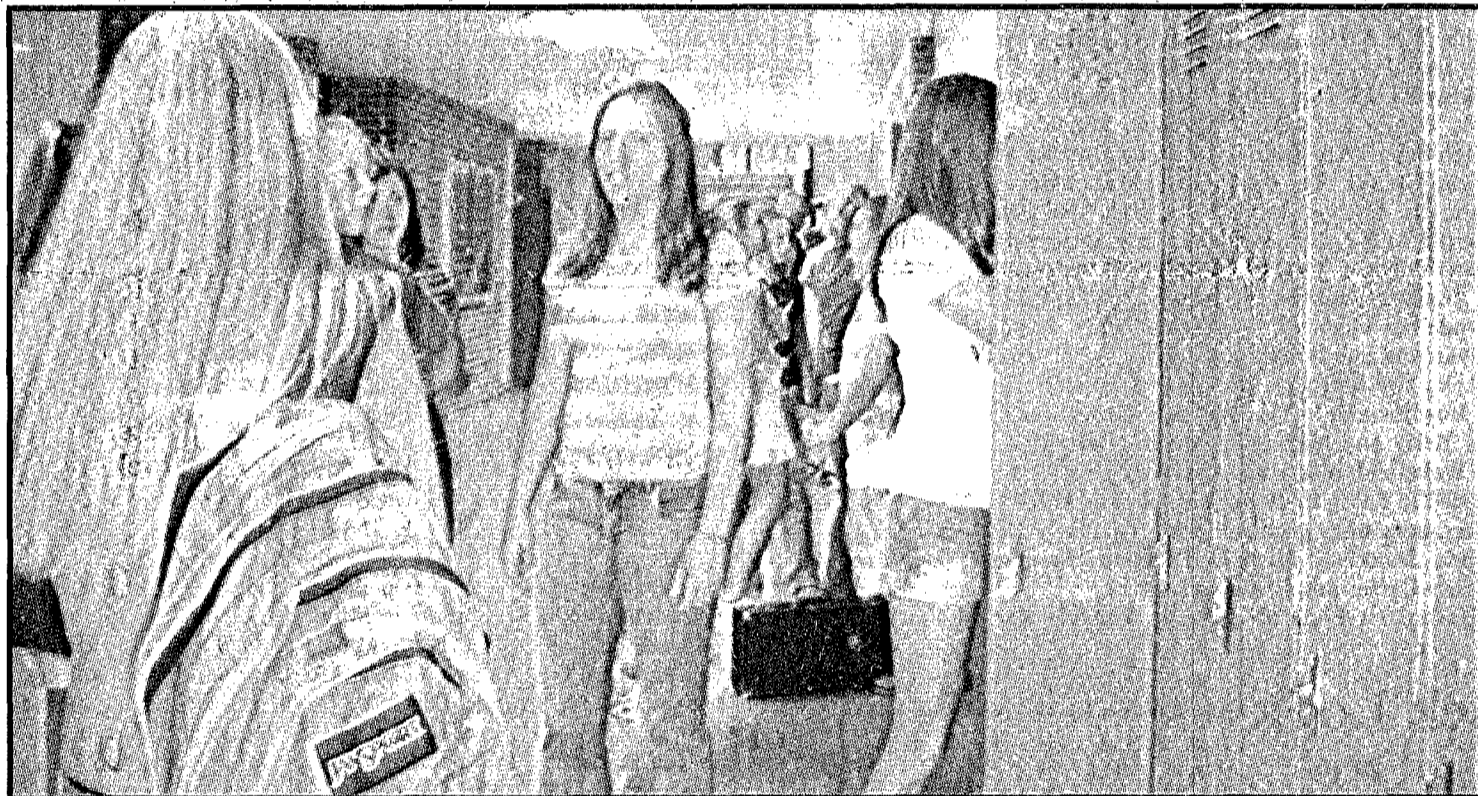
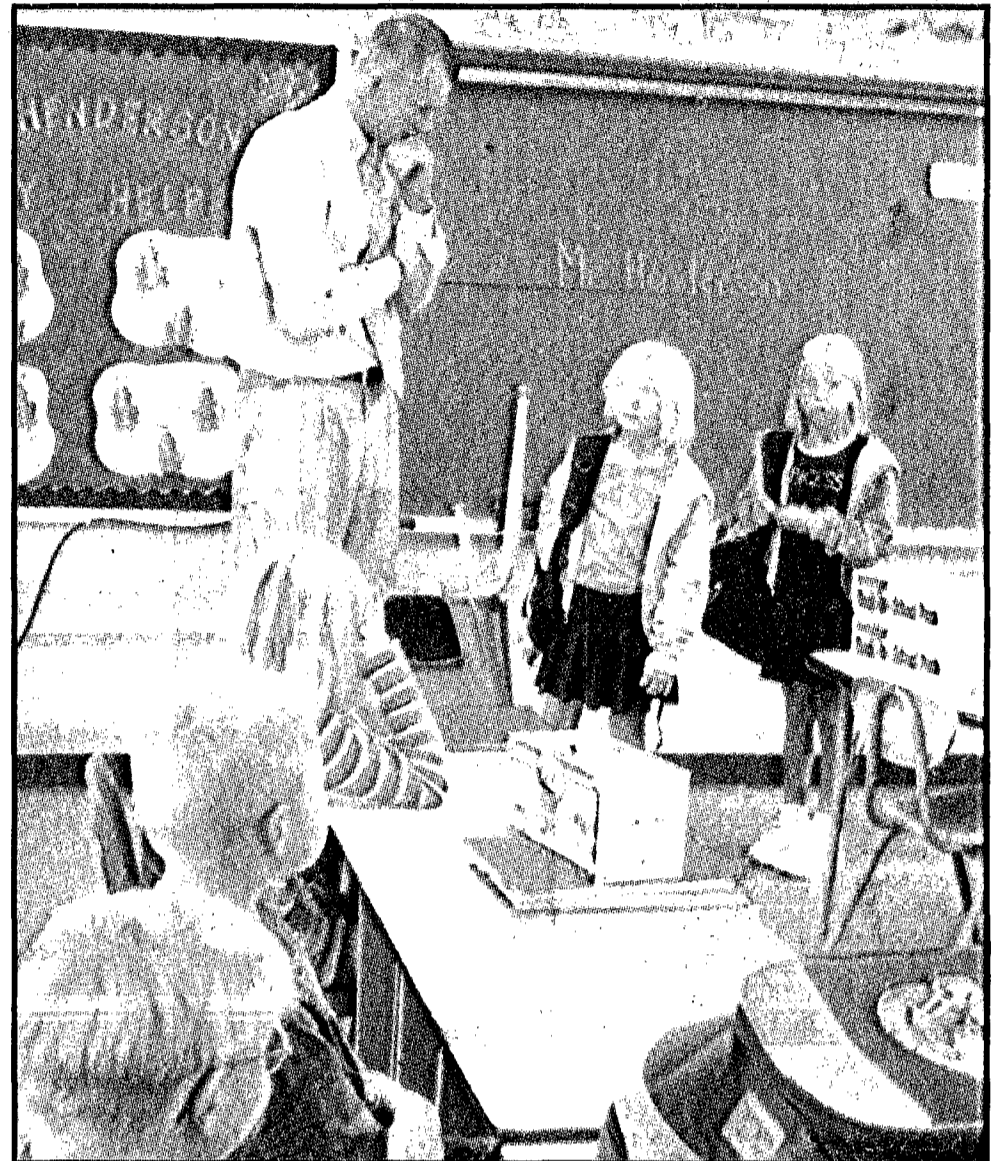

## South Sioux City, Wayne Public Libraries join ONE Library Consortium

Wayne Public Library and South Sioux City Library moved boldly into the future on Aug. 15 when they signed the resolution to become the newest members of the ONE Library consortium. The cost of the project, \$43,000, was completely funded through the generosity of the Peter Kiewit Foundation who awarded the libraries \$10,000 and the Nebraska Library Commission who awarded \$33,000.

ONE Library is a consortium of the Norfolk Public Library, the Columbus Public Library, Northeast Community College and Central Community College that allows patrons to access the informational holdings of all of the libraries through a state-of-the-art library information system, SIRSI.

The library circulation systems of both Wayne and South Sioux City were near the end of their life cycles and needed to be replaced. Since their purchase of the Follett circulation system in the early 1990's, both libraries have grown immensely in materials and patrons. South Sioux City anticipates a very large influx of new patrons as it moves to a countywide library system. Wayne Public Library currently provides county-wide service. SIRSI will allow both libraries to meet patron demands by offering them more avenues of information in a timely manner.

Wayne City Administrator Lowell Johnson commented, "The Kiewit Foundation continues to be a leader in helping create libraries as places that people want to go and learn. This is a great opportunity to collaborate with area libraries and to upgrade the level of service to our patrons."

"This is an excellent example of communities working for the good of their citizens. We are grateful for the funding assistance of the Peter Kiewit Foundation and the Nebraska Library Commission," stated South Sioux City Mayor William McLarty.

Nebraska Library Commission Director Rod Wagner added, "The Nebraska Library Commission is pleased to support the partnership between the South Sioux City Public Library and the Wayne Public Library."

## City Council special session is for you!

Curious to learn more about the Main Street improvement project? Want to express your support for the plan? Come to the City Council special session on Monday night August 22, being held at the City Auditorium at 7 p.m.

As many in the Wayne area already know, Wayne's Main Street is scheduled for its first major overhaul since the bricks were put down at the turn of the twentieth century. Surface treatments and new side-

walks have been added over the past one hundred years but next year's project will replace everything from wall to wall across the street as well as fifteen feet down to water lines and storm drains.

Why is this important to you, the private citizen? Because, simply put, your generation will determine what Wayne's Main Street will look like for generations to come. The City Council wants to know how important this project is to you. Several key funding components are to be considered by the Council; lighting and sidewalk

enhancements are only a part of the total package. Monday night's special session is designed to let your voice be heard. If you are shy like me, written communication will be just as meaningful.

Business owners have spent hundreds of man-hours researching the best and most affordable way to make the project successful. It is hoped that you, the private citizen will take a few hours to learn more about the project and voice your support at the August 22 special session.

## New principal begins duties

The ability to focus on one particular age group of students and having a stable school environment for his own children are among the reasons Wayne Middle Principal Tim Krupicka had for seeking the position in Wayne.

Krupicka began his official duties at Wayne Middle School this week after serving as the K-12 principal in the recently consolidated Greeley-Wolbach schools in central Nebraska.

He grew up in the Milligan area and graduated from Milligan High School and earned his undergraduate degree from the University of Nebraska-Lincoln.

He taught Social Studies at Greeley and coached a number of sports in the two years he was there.

His next teaching assignment was at Dodge where he taught Social Studies and coached boys basketball, track and served as the assistant football coach.

From 1988-99 Krupicka taught at Wilber-Claytonia and coached a number of sports.

"While I was at Wilber-Claytonia, I worked on my administration degree from UNL which I received in December of 1998," Krupicka said.

His first administrative position was

with the Greeley school system. He served as the K-12 principal and athletic director there for six years.

"During my time there, the Greeley and Wolbach school systems went through a merger. Unlike most mergers, the schools had five years for the merger to be complete and this allowed for some unique things to occur. The schools are now being looked to as an example for others," Krupicka said. He served as the principal there for six years.

Krupicka said he is looking forward to being in the Middle School Principal in Wayne and noted Wayne has "a forward looking, progressive education system."

"My family is also planning to take advantage of the cultural things that a larger community can offer," he said.

The Krupicka family includes Tim, his wife, Mary Pat and children Ben, who will be in first grade, and Emily, who is 18 months old.

In his spare time, Krupicka enjoys golf, reading and spending time on the computer. He is a member of the Kiwanis Club and Knights of Columbus.

"Mostly, though, my spare time is family time and I enjoying being with my wife and my children," Krupicka said.

## Commissioners approve tax sale certificate resolution

Wayne County Commissioners met in regular session Tuesday at the courthouse in Wayne. Among action on agenda items was their approval of the tax sale certificate resolution which states that all real estate taxes and specials that are delinquent for two years or more can be collected by the foreclosure of tax liens.

Other agenda action included approval to table the bid for the purchase of a used excavator until the next commissioners meeting on Sept. 6.

The board reviewed the 2003-04 audit report. They also reviewed a listing of uncollected personal taxes. In a report by the Wayne County Treasurer, there were

60 distress warrants issued by the Wayne County Sheriff in November, 2004. Of the 60 warrants, 51 were paid. The total amount of distress warrants issued in November, 2004, was \$87,597.21; the amount paid was \$74,404.90, leaving a balance unpaid of \$13,192.31.

An agenda item the board is waiting on is the authorization of making offers to purchase six tracts of right of way on Federal Aid Bridge Project BRO-7090 (16), Wayne Southwest until commissioners review the appraisals.

Continuing business includes budget work session.

The next regular meeting of the Wayne County Commissioners will be Tuesday, Sept. 6, beginning at 9 a.m.





# Cemetery board votes to continue dialogue with city

More than 30 people were on hand at the annual meeting of Greenwood Cemetery lot owners on Tuesday.

Most were present to voice opposition to having Phase II of the Wayne City Trail go through the cemetery.

Russell Moomaw presented a petition with 113 signatures or Wayne residents who opposed having the trail go through the cemetery. He cited the possibility of lit-

ter and vandalism in the cemetery and the fact that the people who signed the petition didn't think there was a need for a trail.

Lee Swinney, President of the Cemetery Board, said that following the presentations by concerned citizens, the board voted to "stay in communication with the city about what is best for everyone concerned."

He also said the board noted the concerns of all those who attended

the meeting and the board would continue working with the proposal presented by the city.

Swinney said no deal has been made with the city and listed several other proposals/options that had been presented to the board.

In other Cemetery Board business, the group voted to retain Donna Shufelt on the board for another five-year term and re-elect Mylet Bargholz as secretary/treasurer for the Association.

It's back to the books for Wayne Community Schools students as school started on Aug. 17. The daily schedule is elementary, 8:15 a.m. to 3:20 p.m.; Middle School, 8:10 a.m. to 3:33 p.m.; and high school, 8:10 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.

Lunch prices this year are as follows: high school and middle school students \$1.65 per day (\$8.25 per week); elementary school students, \$1.55 per day (\$7.75 per week);

reduced-price meal, 40 cents per day; \*adults, \$2.50 per day (only price increase); milk, per carton, 25 cents; ala carte (adults only), \$1.60, roll, etc.; 40 cents. \*Based on the value of commodities, the adult price should be at least \$2.50 this year (NDE Nutrition Services).

## Plea agreement reached in manslaughter case

A plea agreement has been reached in the case involving the death of Sage Gray of Laurel.

Brian Young, also of Laurel, has agreed to plead guilty to manslaughter and assault in the third degree.

In exchange for the plea, the state has agreed to five years' probation for Young, 175 days in county jail and the serving of five days in jail, one each year on the anniversary date of the death of

Gray. In addition, Young will be ordered to complete an alcohol evaluation, not possess, consume or enter any place of business in which alcohol sale or consumption is the primary business and attend an anger management class.

Young will also be required to write a letter of apology to the family of Sage Gray and place a letter of apology in the local newspapers in Cedar County. He is also to have

no contact with the Gray family. Restitution to the Gray family, the insurance company and a fine of \$7,500 will also be assessed to Young.

On the charge of assault in the third degree, the state is recommending that Young serve 90 days in jail, consecutive to the 175 days for the manslaughter charge and pay an additional \$500 fine.

Sentencing is set for Monday, Sept. 12 at 9:30 a.m.

### Many services can be found at Kent's Photo Lab

Customers can find many services available at Kent's Photo Lab, 215 East 10th Street in Wayne. Services include: processing of digital photos, and

Kent's Photo Lab was KIS. Around two years ago, they purchased their fourth machine, "Noritsu" because technology changes so fast and the use of digital photography came into play, so they found they needed to keep up. Last spring, a customer terminal was added. The customer terminal can accept

Advantix, 35 millimeter, slides, and black and white film, as well as making passports, enlargements, and re-prints that start as low as 29 cents each.

Additional services include greeting cards (holiday, new baby, graduation, wedding, etc.); sports layout pages (can insert photo into page); photo calendars; scrapbook pages; index cards (available in larger sizes); panoramic photos; and Blue Tooth technology that allows certain camera cell phones to be downloaded by pointing those phones at Kent's Photo Lab's machine (up to 35 feet away).

Kent's Photo Lab was started by Kent Hall. "Dad was working on film in the basement of his home," said his daughter, Lou Wiltse. "He was doing this for himself, as well as for others, and wasn't charging for it. He decided there was enough demand in Wayne so he went to Chicago for training and started Kent's Photo Lab. He passed away a couple of years later."

Lou noted that their first machine purchased for

any digital media card, CD, or telephone with Blue Tooth technology. Customers can make adjustments, crop, etc. The information from this machine is sent to the big processor downstairs where prints can be made on quality paper.

Besides providing many services, retail items such as cameras, film and batteries are also available.

Staff working in the Photo Shop are Sharon Brentlinger, full time and Laura Crook, part time. Brentlinger is married to Ray and lives in Allen. The couple has three children and seven grandchildren. She has been working at the Photo Lab for 13 years. Crook is single, a twin, and is from Nebraska City. She is a graduate of the University of Nebraska - Lincoln. She has been working at the Photo Shop for one and a half years.

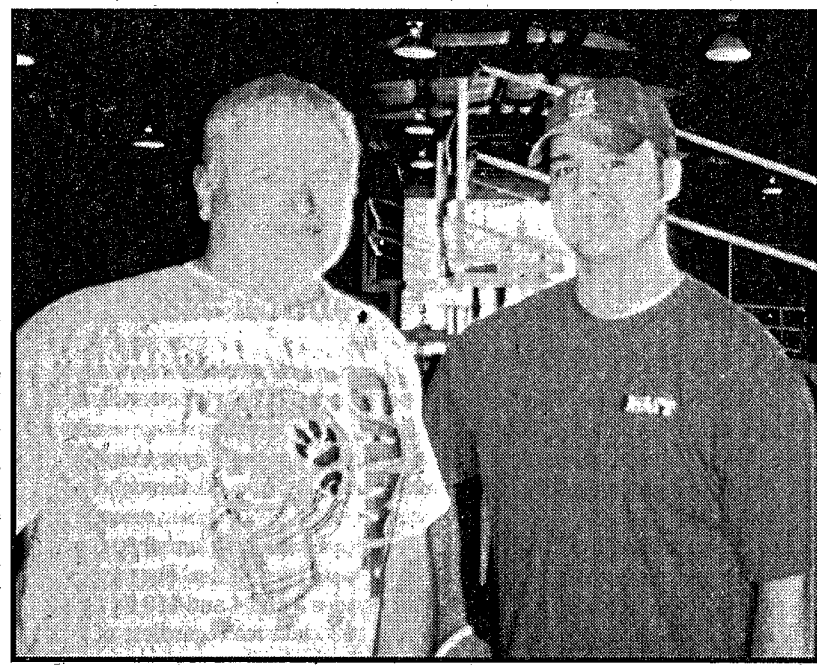

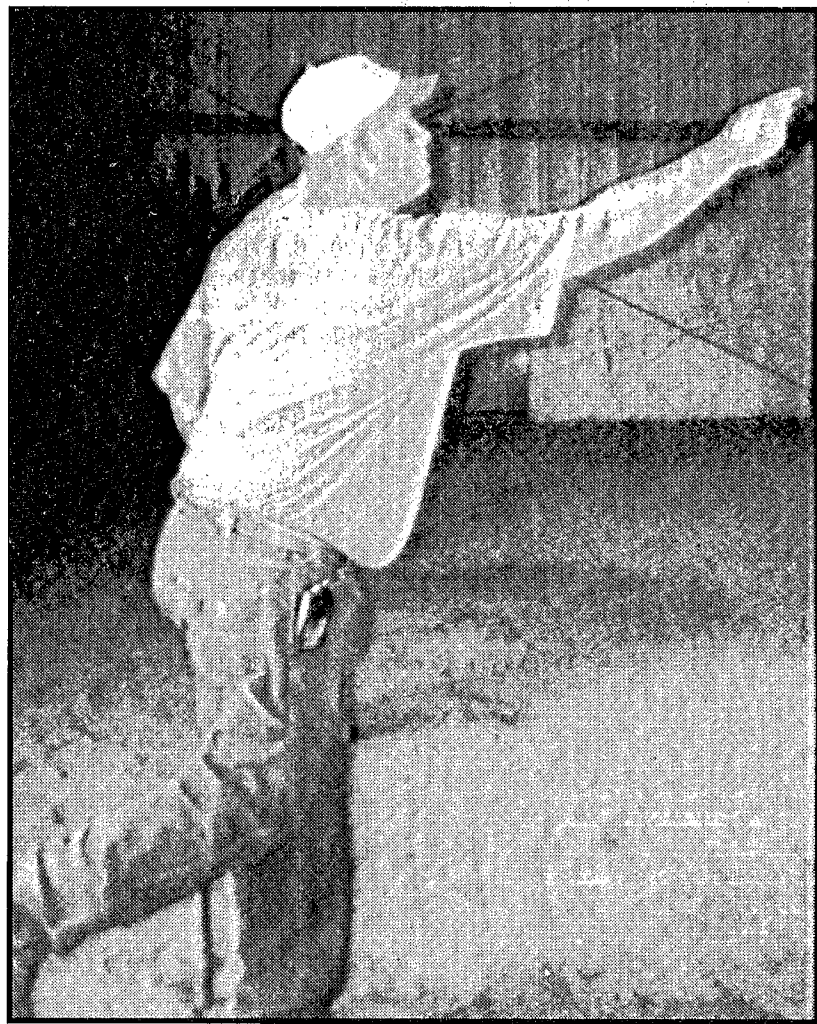

### TeamMates mentoring program hosts annual partnership meeting

**Allegra**  
 The antihistamine Allegra should not be taken with grapefruit, orange or apple juice. These juices decrease absorption of the medication by about 80%. Also St. John's wort, and herbal supplement used to treat depression, should not be combined with Allegra because this can produce high blood levels of the drug. Apple and orange juice are usually safe to take with most medications, Allegra is an exception. **Graduation held at Northeast for PTA program**

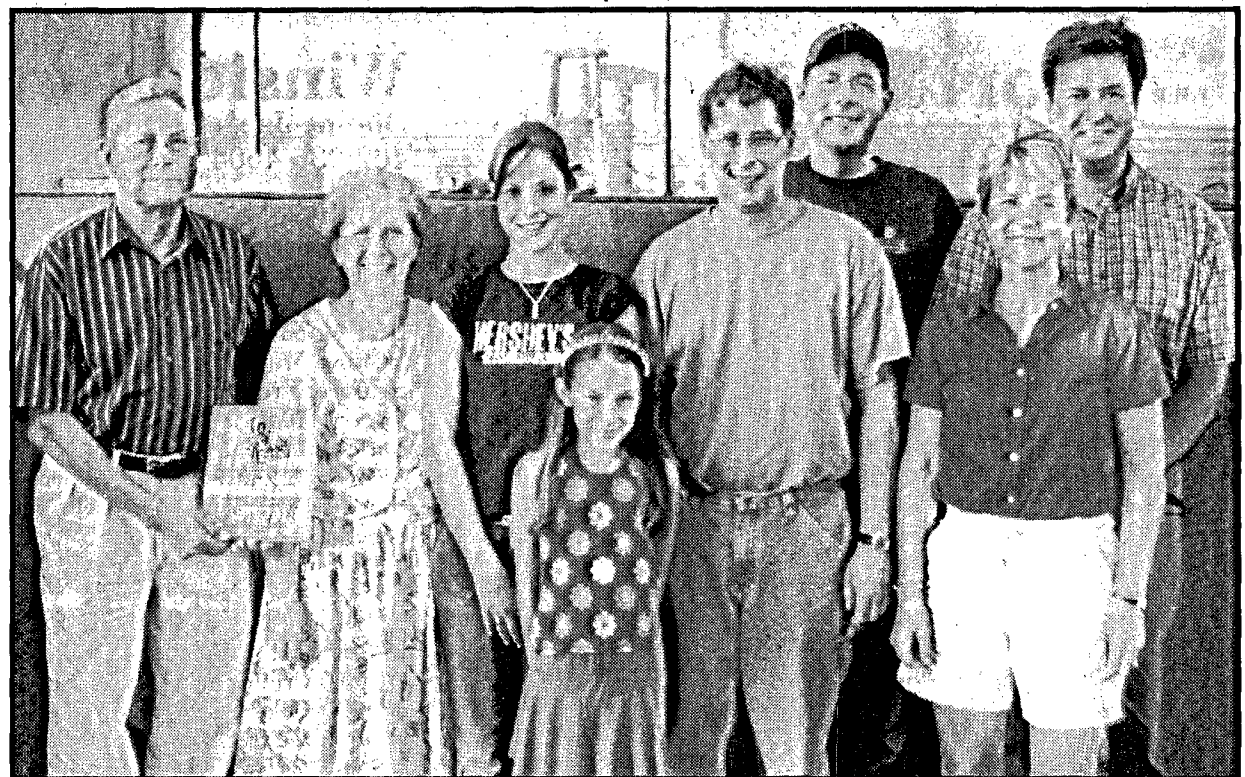
Twelve Northeast Community College students recently completed the Physical Therapist Assistant (PTA) program and were recognized at a special graduation ceremony.

Marvin Hall, director of Rehab Central at Faith Regional Health Services in Norfolk, returned to Northeast to address the 11th class of PTA graduates. Hall developed the PTA program at Northeast. In introducing Hall, program director Jodie Aller, said, "He is a friend, a mentor, and he hires our graduates, the best compliment of all."  
 "Do good well," Hall told the graduates. He encouraged them to have a passion for what they do and a passion for their patients. He also told them to always be prepared and to keep up. "Set goals for your future and write them down. Always be part of the solution, not part of the problem," Hall said. Finally, he encouraged the students to be patient with themselves, co-workers, supervisors, and patients.

The program concluded with a speech by class president Seier and a class video.  
 According to the American Physical Therapy Association, a physical therapist assistant (PTA) is a paraprofessional health worker who works under the direction and supervision of a licensed physical therapist. Successful completion of the national PTA examination is required by law before beginning employment as a physical therapist assistant.

Physical therapist assistants complete a two-year education program usually offered in a community or junior college. Northeast's course of study includes one year of pre-PTA freshman courses and one year of PTA sophomore courses in physical therapy procedures plus clinical experiences. Graduates earn an associate of applied science degree.

Northeast's Physical Therapist Assistant program has received the maximum five-year accreditation from the Commission on Accreditation in Physical Therapy Education. Accreditation assures employers that graduates have met strict national standards and are eligible to take the national examination.

## Maintain quality of leftovers through proper refrigeration, freezing

It's not uncommon to dig through the refrigerator or freezer and find leftovers that have gone bad. The way a food is handled, prepared for storage, packaged and placed inside the refrigerator or freezer significantly affects its safety and quality later.

Perishable foods such as meat, dairy products, pasta, fruits and vegetables should never be allowed to set out at room temperature for more than two hours, or for more than one hour at temperatures above 90 degrees. If these foods are

left out longer, there is an increased risk that eating them could cause foodborne illness because bacteria in them multiply rapidly. In seven hours, a single bacterium in a perishable food could grow to more than 2 million bacteria at room temperature.

It's OK to refrigerate foods while they're still warm as long as the container cover is left slightly open until the food has cooled. To speed cooling, refrigerate foods in shallow containers so the food is no more than two inches deep. Large pots of

food, such as soup or stew, should be divided into smaller portions and cooled in shallow pans.

Don't wash fruits and vegetables before storing them. When they're unwashed, they have a longer storage life and better maintain their quality. Wash them only at the time they'll be used.

Placement of foods in the refrigerator affects food safety as well as the amount of time foods can be stored and still have the best taste. Perishable foods, including eggs and milk, should not be stored in the refrigerator door. The constant opening of the door makes the temperature of foods stored there fluctuate more than in other areas of the refrigerator.

Raw meats should be stored in sealed containers on the bottom shelf or in a meat drawer of the refrigerator so their juices don't drip onto and contaminate other foods. Fruits and vegetables should be stored in separate refrigerator crisper drawers because fruits give off ethylene gas that can shorten the storage life of vegetables. Also, some vegetables give off odors that can be absorbed by fruits and affect their quality.

Avoid overfilling the refrigerator. Allow room for cool air to circulate, which helps keep foods at the correct temperature. As a general rule, if leftovers won't be eaten within two days, they should be frozen.

When storing foods in the freezer, make sure they're packaged in materials that are moisture and vapor resistant, durable, leakproof and easy to seal and mark. Packaging materials also should be resistant to oil, grease, water and the absorption of other flavors and odors. Also make sure they are intended for freezer use and follow any directions on their labels. Freezer paper, for example, usually specifies that its plastic coated side be placed next to the food.

There are two types of freezer packaging - flexible wrapping materials and rigid containers. Flexible wrapping materials include freezer paper, plastic freezer bags, plastic wrap designed for freezer use and extra heavy or heavy duty freezer aluminum foil. Rigid containers include plastic, glass and ceramic containers labeled suitable for freezing. Avoid using containers such as milk and cottage cheese cartons that aren't moisture-resistant enough for freezing. Don't use glass or ceramic containers that might break in the freezer.

Freeze foods in quantities that

will be used for a single meal. According to the National Center for Home Food Preservation, fruits and vegetables stored in containers that can hold more than a half gal-

lon freeze slowly enough that their quality decreases. The exception is tray-packed foods, which are frozen in a single layer on shallow trays or pans before being transferred to freezer bags. Such foods, often fruits or vegetables, remain in individual pieces and can be removed in the amounts needed.

Most foods, particularly fruits and vegetables, expand as they freeze. To allow for expansion, leave some head space between the food and the container closure. Juices or foods that are packed in liquids require more head space than those packed without added sugar or liquid.

Also consider the following food storage tips:  
• When freezing meat and poultry in their original shrinkwrap for longer than two weeks, re-wrap the packages in a flexible freezer wrap material.

• Fatty meats and fish, cured meats and shellfish generally retain their quality for a shorter

time when frozen than lean meats, fish and poultry, so they should be eaten more quickly.

• Use a refrigerator/freezer thermometer inside the unit to maintain a constant temperature, which helps prevent textural changes and leakage.

• Label stored food to keep track of its contents, age and origin. Use freezer tape, gummed freezer labels or marking pens or crayons. Include the name of the food, its packaging date, the number of servings or amount and any additional helpful information, such as the form of the food or any special ingredients.

• Avoid freezer burn, which decreases food quality, by properly packaging, sealing, cooling and removing air from food and by not storing it for longer than the recommended time period for that type of food.

# Ideas shared for fall harvesting for alfalfa

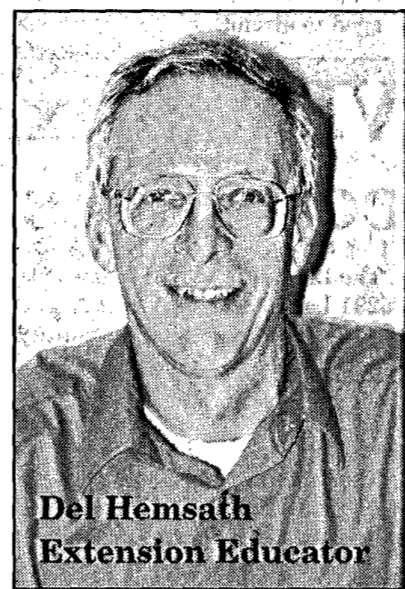
The weather has thrown some northeast Nebraska during the curves to the alfalfa producers in early part of 2005 similar to a couple of years ago with rains slowing harvest.

The early rains allowed a good re-growth for the second cutting and now as rain becomes less frequent, one must think about the timing for the fall cutting. Producers may only get three cuttings because of the lack of rain. Producers must remember that the last cutting of alfalfa should be timed close to a killing frost. This will not allow the alfalfa to use root reserves to produce new growth.

If timing does not allow the cutting at this time, waiting until after the frost is another option. Cutting time decisions need to be timed according to the rain and frost forecasts for this coming fall. This is difficult to do, but it is time to do some planning about the upcoming harvest cutting times. Under normal conditions, fall rains allow some late cutting of alfalfa, but under drought conditions the re-growth from the third cutting may not occur and that does not allow root reserves to be built up for the winter months.

These types of decisions are especially critical for new plantings of alfalfa where the cutting times are a little different from the established stands. It is critical for the new plantings of alfalfa that the new plants be allowed to develop root reserves for the winter months.

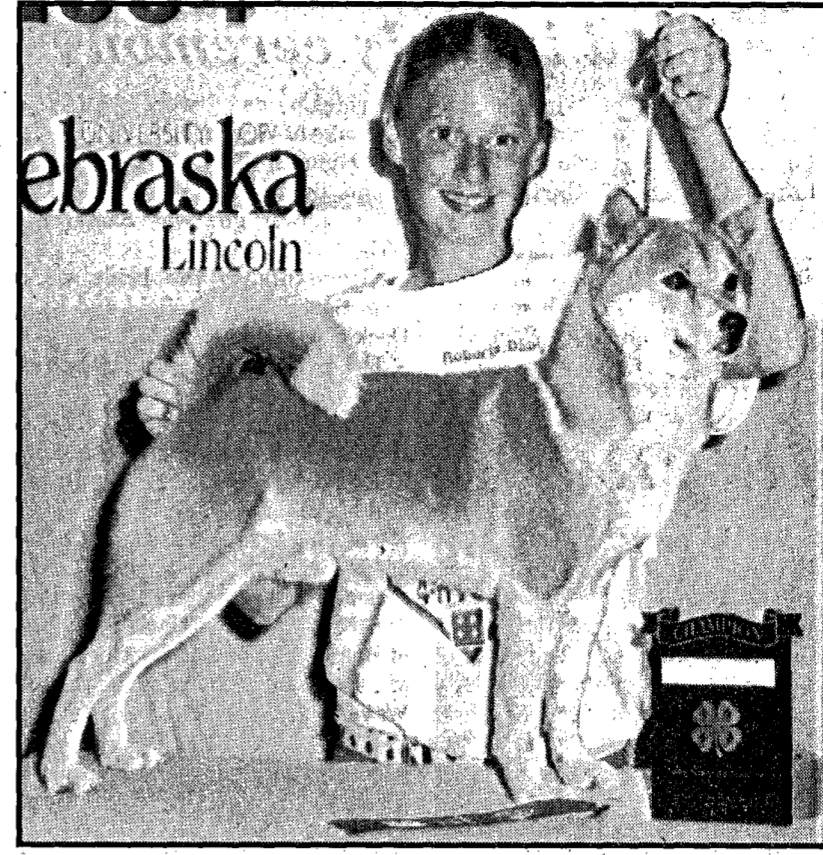
The options to consider for fall harvest time should be centered around allowing enough time for

the alfalfa to establish root reserves before a killing freeze. Cutting too late will not allow adequate re-growth and cutting too early will reduce the tonnage. The last cutting is a valuable source of protein for feeding of livestock and is a commonly the best quality alfalfa for the producer.

Early planning will make the decisions a little easier this coming fall.

## Dog show intriguing

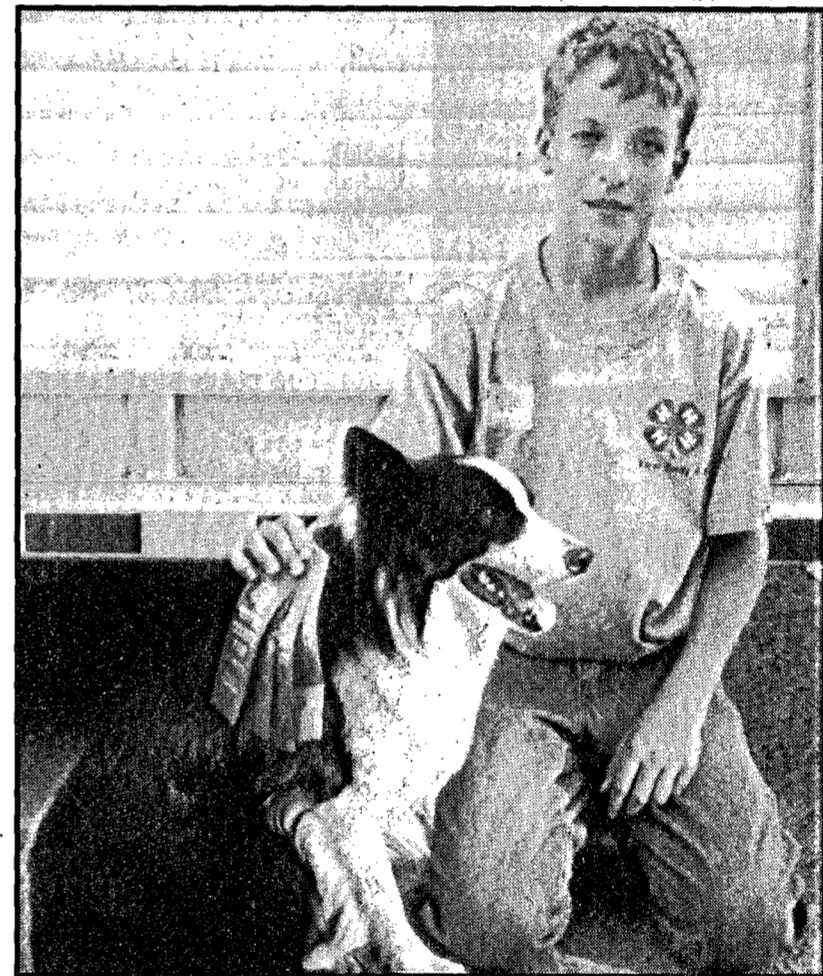
My name is Dacia Gansebon. I'm 14-years-old and a seven year member of the Combination Kids 4-H Club.

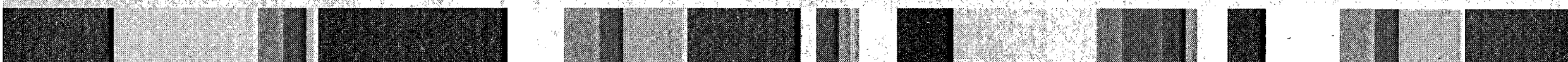




# WELCOME BACK TO SCHOOL

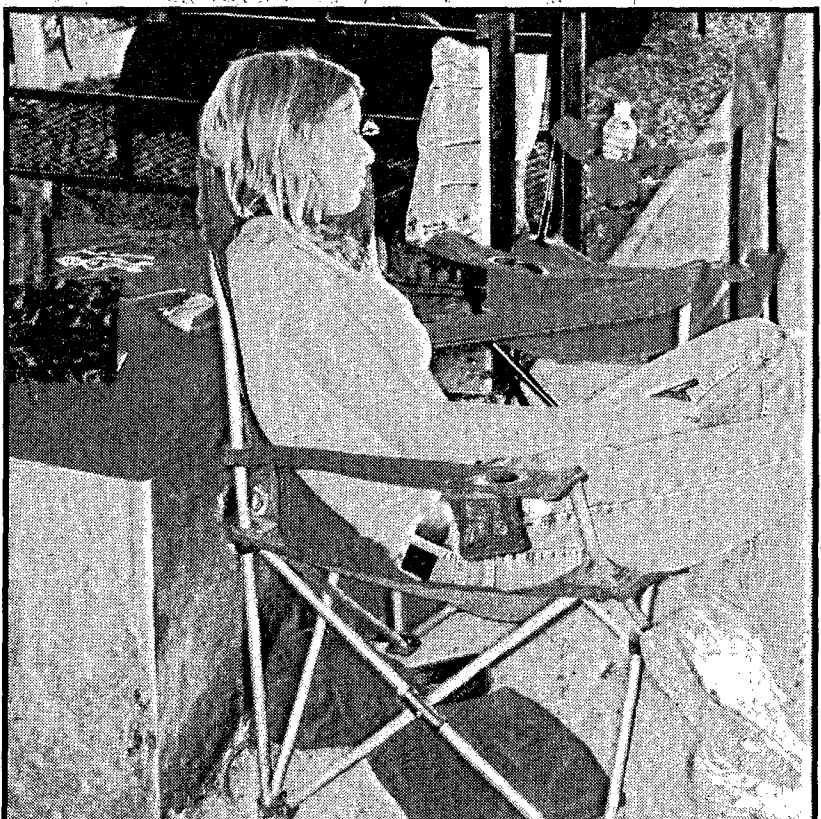

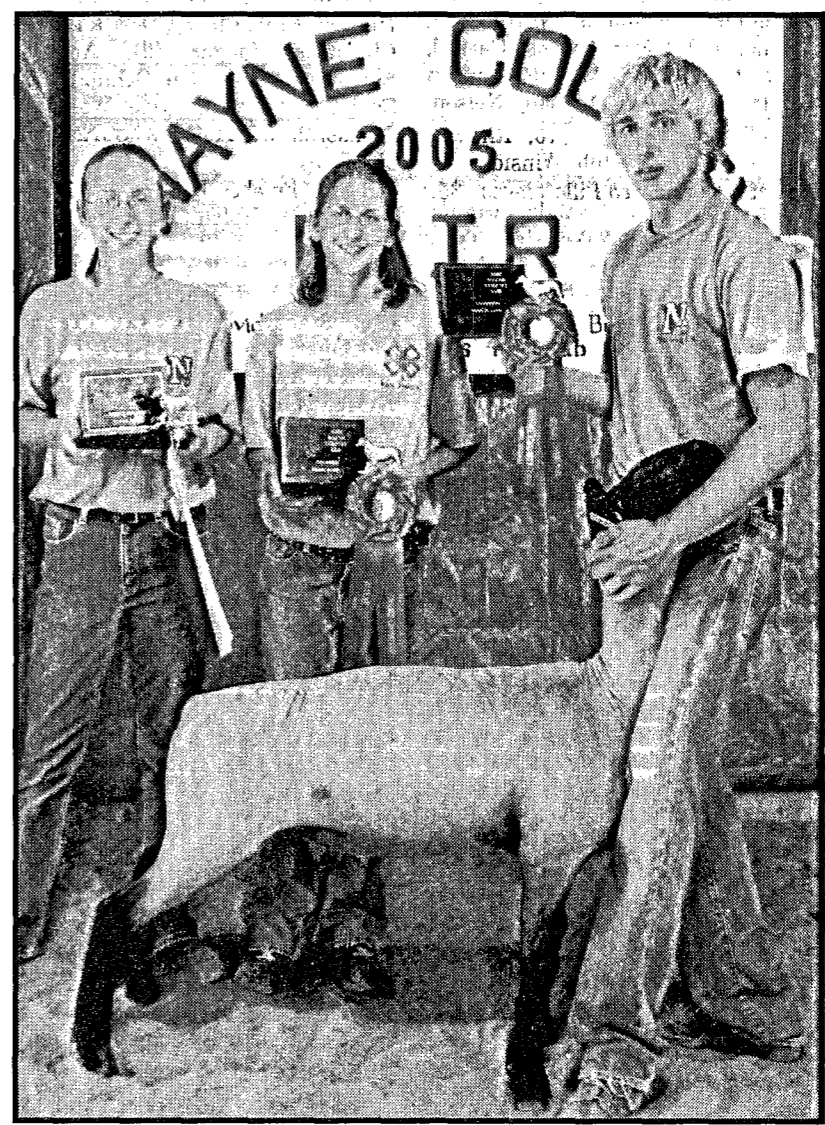

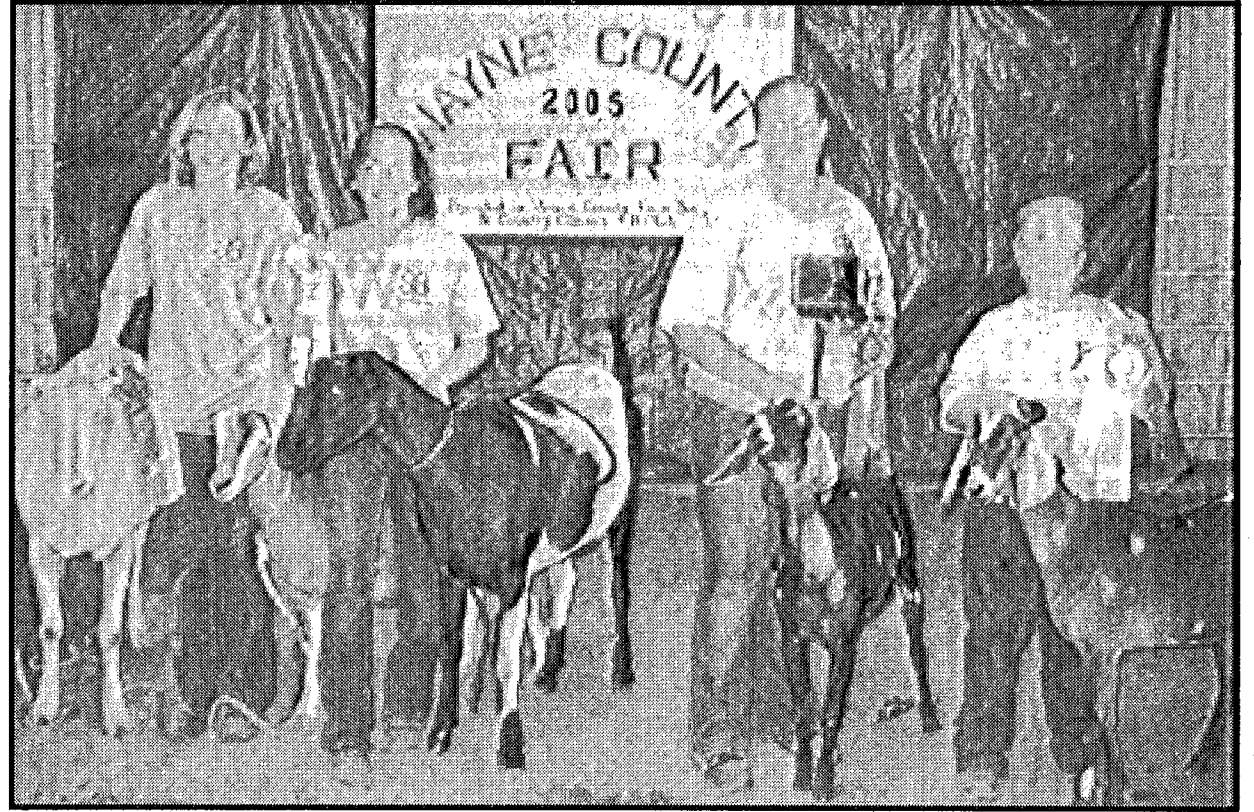

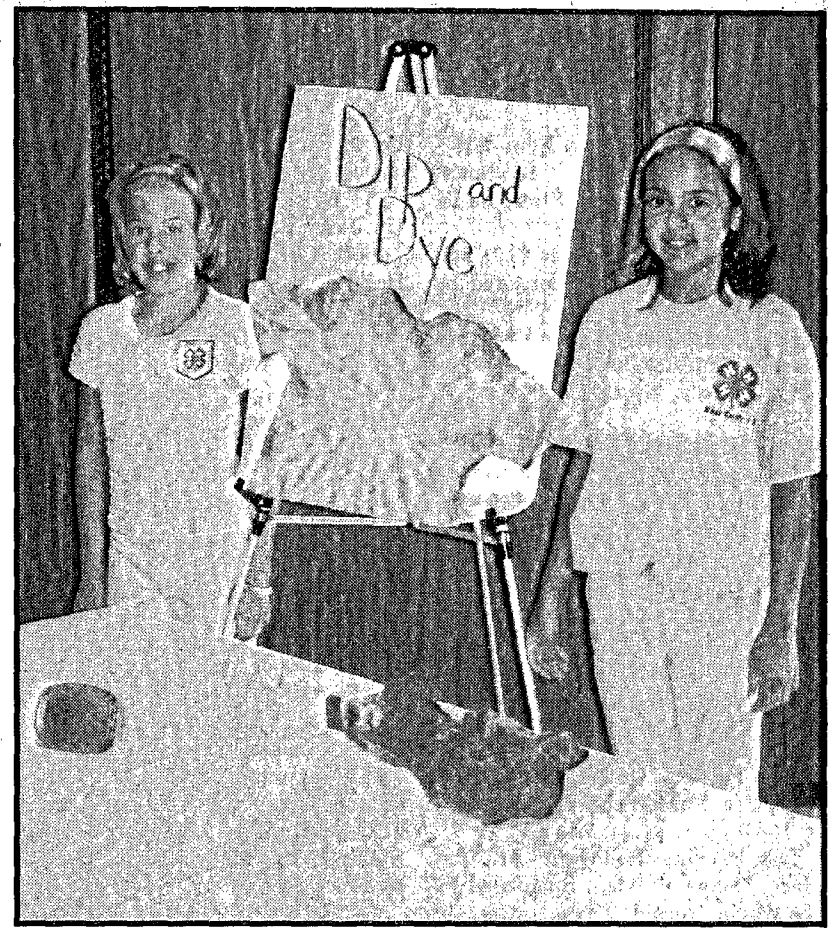
