



### Great Dane employee contributes entire paycheck to hurricane relief efforts



# Sisters make rare discovery

The story starts out over two years ago when it was a hot summer day in July, 2003, and the Milenkovich sisters, Sophie, Lesley and Chelsey, decided to go down to the Logan Creek on their parents acreage east of Winside.

The girls made a "neat" discovery of a jawbone and horn tip. "Neat" about sums it up because they didn't realize how important their find was. The jawbone and horn tip sat around the house of Tony and Laurie Milenkovich for a little over a year before Chelsey felt the urge to bring them into Mr. Sok's eighth grade Earth Science classroom at Winside Public. She asked him if he know what animal they were from and if he wanted them for the classroom collection of fossils and bones.

Sok recognized that the jaw bone was very similar to a cow's jaw that he had in the classroom and that the horn tip was much more like the fossilized bison horn that his son, Andrew, found in western See PAYCHECK, Page 4A South Dakota about three years ago.

dabbler but I knew that Rick Otte (Park Ranger at Ashfall) and Dr. Mike Voorhies (Chief Paleontologist at Ashfall and the University of Nebraska) would be able to verify if the find was authentic," Sok said. (Dr. Voorhies identified a three foot long/35 million year old Titanother thigh fossil and several teeth that Josh Sok found in western Nebraska in 1996).

When Sok was returning from his senior Bio Trip to the Blackhills in late May, the class had a scheduled stop at Ashfall and he was able to discuss the situation and find with both individuals. Dr. Voorhies was very excited and noted that if the find proved positive, that it would be the first official fossil find recorded in Wayne County. So, a meeting was set up for July 9, after Sok returned from Japan.

Dr. Voorhies verified the specimen as coming from two separate Bison. He noted that the horn tip would be too small to be from the same animal as the jaw bone specimen. He also added that the fossils would have come from the late Pleistocene/early Holocene Epochs (approximately 11,000-12,000 years ago) in the Quaternary Period of time.

Dr. Voorhies officially verified that this was the "first recorded" fossil discovery for Wayne County. He later commented to Sok that people in the past may have found fossils but did not realize what they had found or that the find would be unique to Wayne County. 



# Seeking answers to the surge in gas prices

Anyone who has filled up their of consumers. Our review showed SUV, pickup or car in the past two weeks has felt the full brunt of Hurricane Katrina's effect on the nation's oil supply. Already high



gas prices shot to as much at \$3.29 in Nebraska. It has many of us asking one question, why? I have pledged to find the answer.

Last week Nebraska joined 42 other states and the District of Columbia in a multi-state inquiry seeking an explanation from the oil industry for the rising fuel prices following Hurricane Katrina. Additionally, I called a meeting with the Nebraska Petroleum Marketers and some of the state's largest gasoline retailers to discuss the surge in prices. I appreciate their willingness to share their financial information.

After reviewing information that showed the suppliers' cost per gallon of gasoline for the past 30 days and what retailers in turn charged consumers. I found no evidence that retailers as a whole are unjustly operating at the expense that most retailers are only making pennies on the dollar for every gallon of gasoline that is sold.

That being said, we remain committed to protecting Nebraska consumers and will keep an eye out to make sure everyone is engaged in fair play. Every consumer complaint our office receives will continue to be taken seriously. The Nebraska Department of Justice is currently looking into one consumer complaint that a gas station in Omaha was charging around \$5 a gallon.







Drs. Mark and Lauri Zink, DVM, have been providing care to animals of all sizes in the Wayne area since the couple purchased the Wayne Veterinary

"We do routine vaccinations, cancer treatments, wellness checks, all aspects of senior care, handle skin problems and do a small amount of orthopedic work. We also do surgeries on those animals who



University in 1988 and practiced in Boyd County for 10 years. They then worked in Laurel, Neb. and Yankton, S.D. before purchasing the Wayne clinic. The family moved to the Wayne area from Laurel in 2004.

Dr. Mark and Dr. Ken Liska take care of the large animals in need of veterinary care. Approximately 50 percent of the calls received by the clinic are ambulatory calls where the two doctors travel to the animals rather than having the animals come to the office.

"We do a lot of herd health type activities for beef and dairy animals, as well as emergency and reproductive procedures for equine. Our office is one of only a few in Nebraska that is equipped to perform ultra sound evaluations for carcass traits in beef," Dr. Mark said.

He noted he enjoys all types of animals but especially likes working with dairy animals.

Dr. Mark said that veterinarians need to complete 32 hours of continuing education every two years to retain their licenses and those at the Wayne Veterinary Clinic try to attend at least one continuing education conference each year.

"The veterinary business is changing extremely fast. With the implementation of mandatory animal identification and a central data base, we are seeing an increase in radio frequency tags and other types of identification in cattle," Dr. Mark said.





Two athletes, one coach, two contributors and one team will be inducted into the Wayne State College Athletic Hall of Fame during Homecoming/Hall of Fame weekend at WSC on Oct. 1.

The inductees will be honored during halftime of the Minnesota State University-Moorhead/Wayne State football game on Oct. 1 and will inducted into the Hall of Fame at a banquet that evening in the Frey Conference Suite at the WSC Student Center with a social hour at 5:30 p.m. and the banquet sched-

uled for 6:30-8:30 p.m. The inductees include Dennis Wagner (coach), Ed Jochum (athlete), Jeff Lutt (athlete), Gene and Jan Casey (contributors) and the 1973 Wayne State baseball

Wagner, the former WSC head football coach, compiled a 44-37 record, including a 9-1 mark in 1993 during his eight seasons at the Wildcat helm.

His record ranks second in school history behind the 62-win coaching career of Del Stoltenberg.

Three Wagner-taught players — Bryon Chamberlin, Brad Ottis and Kevin Swain - all advanced to play in the National Football League.

Wagner left WSC to join the Division I ranks at Fresno State and currently serves as the offensive line coach at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln.

Jochum, a native of Norfolk, ranks as one of WSC's all time leaders at quarterback from 1982-85.

He still holds the school record for 44 career touchdown passes and passing attempts in a season with 449.

Jochum also holds the record for the longest pass play in school history, a 98yard completion to Sonny James in 1985, He wrapped up his career at WSC with 5,916 total yards.

Lutt was a two-sport standout at WSC as he excelled in both baseball and football.

The Wayne High graduate played baseball from 1991-92 and football in 1991, 94-

Lutt was drafted by the Pittsburgh Pirates and played for two of the organization's farm teams in 1993-94.

In football, he recorded a team-high 11 quarterback sacks in 1994 and finished the following season with 64 tackles and 11 sacks.

Gene and Jan Casey of Wayne are known for their work as scoreboard operators for WSC home basketball games.

Gene has volunteered his time to run the clock for 27 years, while Jan has worked the player/foul scoreboard at Rice Auditorium for the past decade. Gene also can be found operating the clock at Wayne

High basketball games. The 1973 Wildcat baseball team is regarded as one of the most successful in school history.

The team took the NAIA District 11 championship with a 26-3 record and

advanced to the NAIA Area Three playoffs in Oklahoma,

Head coach Fred Pierce was named the district's coach of the year in 1983.

The team batting average of .349 ranked in the top three nationally and set a school







Louise Smith

Louise Smith still has that twinkle in her eye when talking about the "good ol" days" of racing.

Known as racing's "Good ol" Gal," Smith experienced life to the fullest, trying her hand at the "good ol" boys," in NASCAR's fledgling days, and she's the first to admit she wishes she was still young enough to strap on a helmet and go fender-to-fender with NASCAR's best. In an era when no one thought it possible for a lady to get behind the wheel of a race car Smith, a Greenville native proved everyone wrong. She was defiantly ahead of her time. She raced anything that had wheels, from Modifieds, to Sportsman cars and the Grand Nationals (now NASCAR Winston Cup). From 1946 through 1956, Smith was widely known throughout the racing world.

"I enjoyed every minute of it," Smith says of her career. "I traveled all over North America, racing everywhere I could, and I had fun with it. Didn't make a whole lot of money, but if I could do it again today, I'd do it, and I think I'd make it."

Those who knew her thought Smith was crazy. In the early years of NASCAR, Bill France Sr., NASCAR's founder, used Smith to promote races from the Southeast to Canada. She was a novelty and had talent.

Once when NASCAR was having a race at Greenville-Pickens Speedway — her home track — a gimmick was needed

was crazy. In the early years of NASCAR, Bill France Sr., NASCAR's founder, used Smith to promote races from the Southeast to Canada. She was a novelty and had talent.

Once when NASCAR was having a race at Greenville-Pickens Speedway—her home track—a gimmick was needed to promote the event. Someone suggested that woman driver—Smith—because she'd "outrun every highway patrol and awman in Greenville." Thus, began her driving career.

"They told me if I saw a red flag to stop," remembers Smith. "They didn't say anything about the checkered flag. I wondered where all the cars were and then as I was all alone on the track, I noticed them all in the pits. They finally threw the red flag and I pulled in. I had finished third."

In her career, she captured 38 victories. In the mid-1970s she became nvolved in the sport again, sponsoring such drivers as Ronnie Thomas, Bobby Wawak and Larry Pearson. She remains nvolved in the sport today as part of the viss Southern 500 Scholarship Pageant at Darlington Raceway.

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



The Blue Devils were swept by visiting Norfolk Catholic 27-25, 25-20, 25-18 after service errors early in the night triggered other breakdowns for the team.


Wayne was able to tie the first set several times, but the Knights seemed to pull ahead to keep the game out of reach for the Blue Devils, now 7-5.


The Nebraska State Patrol, with assistance from the South Sioux City Police Department, conducted surprise commercial vehicle inspections on Sept. 20, from in South Sioux City. The morning and afternoon inspections were conducted just east of the Marina Inn at Fourth and B Streets and at the Junction of Highways 110 and 20.


The Metropolitan Aggressive and Preventive Selective (MAPS) Team, which is funded largely by the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration, performed the inspections. Troopers assigned to the Carrier Enforcement Division of the Nebraska State Patrol checked for compliance with federal safety regulations and enforce laws pertaining to weight, size, registration, and permits associated with commercial vehicles (trucks, truck tractors, semi trailers, and buses).

During the special enforcement effort, MAPS conducted 91 inspections, discovered 284 violations, and took 42 vehicles out of service. Vehicles are placed out of service for violations relating to bad brakes or tires, or other problems that pose immediate safety risks.

In addition, one driver was taken out of service (not allowed to continue driving) for not having a Commercial Drivers License (CDL). Officers issued a total of \$5,125.00 in fines. The MAPS Team was implemented in 1998 and consists of 36 troopers from the Nebraska State Patrol's Carrier Enforcement Division. On average, 20 25 troopers work each MAPS event.























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#### Harvest is a good time to scout for conservation practices

Fall harvest is a good time to scout fields for places where conservation practices would be beneficial, a University of Nebraska-Lincoln agricultural engineer said. Work on grassed waterways, field borders, water and sediment control basins, windbreaks, conservation buffers, and/or no-till planting can start now or be followed up next spring, said David Shelton, an Institute of Agriculture

and Natural Resources agricultural engineer at UNL's Haskell Agricultural Laboratory. "With corn and soybean harvest rapidly approaching and most field scouting for insects, weeds and other pests winding down, this is an excellent time to begin these practices," Shelton said. "The combine cab offers an excellent vantage point to note where channels have developed in the field from the concentration of runoff water."

Gullies and rills typically develop in the same place each year. Spring tillage may fill these spots, but they redevelop during the growing season. Grading these waterways and seeding to grass can help control these problems," Shelton said. "This will allow

the water to flow down the slope in a controlled manner." Erosion is reduced because water flow velocity is slowed by the grass stems and the roots help hold the soil. Grassed waterways also can reduce chances of equipment damage from going over the gullies. Field borders can provide a convenient place to unload combines into trucks or grain carts, or for turning around

combines, planters and equipment, he said. "Controlling field traffic can greatly reduce compaction problems," Shelton said. "Field borders also can eliminate crop rows that would otherwise be planted up-and-down hill, which further reduces soil erosion." Shelton said water and sediment control basins can reduce gully erosion where a grassed waterway cannot be

installed or maintained because of large volumes of runoff water. Producers can also scout for areas that would benefit from tree protection. Living snowfences often are established along roads or lanes to control drifting snow. Windbreaks and

shelterbelts usually are planted to protect farmsteads, feedlots and other structures. "Windbreaks can be effective in reducing heating costs and improving cattle performance in the winter, and they also can provide excellent wildlife habitat," he said.

Shrubs, grasses or trees planted as conservation buffers along the edges of streams, lakes or ponds can serve as a last line of defense to trap sediment and other pollutants that might enter the water. They also enhance the infiltration of runoff water, Shelton said. Buffers improve safety by keeping equipment away from stream edges and they provide wildlife habitat. When planted to trees, a buffer may provide income for future generations.

"All conservation practices require a commitment of land and planting of permanent vegetation (grasses, shrubs, trees)," he said. No-till planting also can aid conservation.

The first step in establishing a no-till system is to make sure residue from the harvested crop is uniformly dis tributed behind the combine, Shelton said. "When harvesting soybeans or small grains with a combine head greater than about 20 feet wide, a chaff spread er also may be needed for more uniform residue distribution," he said. Next spring, simple planter adjustments may

be all that is needed. The federal Continuous Conservation Reserve Program can help landowners adopt and maintain conservation practices, Shelton said. For more information about conservation or no-till, consult a local Natural Resources Conservation Service, Natural Resources District or UNL Extension office.

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

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### Awareness key in safe delivery of mobile homes

The Nebraska State Patrol is urging motorists to pay special attention to the possibility of an increase in the number of oversized vehicles traveling Nebraska roadways as a result of relief efforts in the wake of Hurricane Katrina.

An executive order signed by Gov. Dave Heineman waives vehicle size and weight regulations for commercial vehicles towing singlewide or double-wide mobile homes through the state over the next 90 days. The order is intended to speed delivery of about 150,000 mobile homes to people and emergency service workers in the areas affected by the Hurricane.

"We want the motoring public to be aware they may encounter an increase in the number of these large vehicles as they travel across Nebraska," said Col. Bryan Tuma, supt. of the Nebraska State Patrol. "It is important for all drivers to pay extra attention when traveling at night and through construction zones. Being aware of the type and not see your vehicle.

size of the vehicles around you, will help ensure everyone reaches their destination safely."

During normal travel, oversized vehicles are required to have an escort vehicle traveling with them to warn motorists of the increased size. The 90-day order waives the use of escort vehicles.

"It is possible for drivers to come upon these slower moving vehicles rather quickly," Enforcement Division Capt. Jim Doggett said. "It is important for drivers traveling at night to be aware they may be sharing the road with vehicles towing single or double-wide loads."

When encountering the oversized vehicles, motorists are urged to leave extra room when passing, obey the posted speed limit, and exercise caution while in construction zones. Never travel in a vehicle's blind spot. If you cannot see the rear view mirror of the driver ahead of you, chances are he can-

### Nebraska reports its first West Nile death

and Licensure reports the state's first death from West Nile virus. Test results indicate that a man in his seventies from the Panhandle died in mid August.

So far, the state has 69 cases of West Nile reported from 34 counties. Affected individuals ranged in age from nine to 94 years.

In addition, 51 birds from 18 counties in the state have tested positive for West Nile virus; and 19 counties have had positive mosquito collections.

Late August and early September are the peak time of year for cases of the virus.

Last year, there were 54 cases of the virus reported in the state, with no deaths. In 2003, there were 2,366 cases, with 29 deaths. In 2002, the first year that the virus appeared in the state, Nebraska had 174 cases and eight deaths,

People can take precautions to avoid being bitten by mosquitoes. The virus is transmitted through the bite of a mosquito that has picked up the virus by feeding on an infected bird.

Most people who are infected by a mosquito have no symptoms or

The Nebraska Dept. of Health only mild flu-like symptoms. Less and Human Services Regulation than one out of 100 people who get bitten by an infected mosquito and become infected will get seriously ill. The risk of serious illness is higher for those age 50 and older.

West Nile fever includes flu-like symptoms such as fever and múscle weakness. Symptoms of West Nile encephalitis include inflammation of the brain, disorientation, convulsions and paralysis.

To avoid mosquito bites, the HHS System recommends that people "fight the bite" during outdoor activities by: •applying mosquito repellent containing DEET, picaridin or oil of lemon eucalyptus; •wearing long-sleeved shirts, long pants and socks; •avoiding going out at dawn and dusk, when mosquitoes are most active; and •eliminating standing water to reduce mosquito breeding sites.

Picaridin and oil of lemon eucalyptus are newly approved by the federal centers for Disease Control and Prevention for the prevention of mosquito bites.
