Sarah Armstrong has been selected to in elementary education with an endorsegive the invocation at the Wayne State College graduate commencement on Saturday, May 6, at 9:30 a.m. in Rice Auditorium on the Wayne State campus. Sonia Rittscher of Clearwater, a member of the Neligh learning community master's degree program, will give the honor address at the morning exercises. Enrique Jair Guevara of Panama City, Panama will give the invocation at the afternoon commencement on May 6 at 2 p.m. in the Willow Bowl.

Because of the large number of graduate students, Wayne State College will hold separate undergraduate and graduate commencement ceremonies on the same day. The undergraduate ceremony will be held at 2 p.m. in the Willow Bowl, weather permitting. The public is invited to attend the ceremonies. In the event of inclement weather, the afternoon ceremony will be moved inside to Rice Auditorium, and seating will be limited.

Armstrong, who will receive a master of science degree in education (curriculum and instruction), is one of 137 students to complete the Wayne State learning community master's degree program. They are members of the Blair, Neligh and South Sioux City learning communities.

A special educator for eight years, Armstrong teaches in the Bellevue Public Schools. She received a bachelor of science


ment in special education from the University of Nebraska-Kearney. She and her husband Kyle live in Bellevue with sons Luke and Noah.

Rittscher, who has taught high school English and German at Clearwater for the past 11 years, will receive a master of science degree in education (curriculum and instruction). Two agenda items, Ordinance 2006-10 and 2006-4 were tabled following discussion of the language in the ordinances conflicting with each other.

On a 4-3 vote, Ordinance 2006-5, which would have created a three hour time limit for parking on side streets during the Main Street Improvement Project, failed.

Council member Verdel Lutt said he felt the TEAM 15 committee would be the "posse" for the project and save the city money, work and the need for enforcement.

Also on Tuesday's agenda was a presentation by Lou Benscoter with a request for Tax Increment Financing (TIF) funds to build a five-plex on the property located at 814 Windom Street.

Several council members' asked quest tions about the building plans, parking and management of the building. Benscoter told the council that his plans for the building would "make it fit into the look of the community."

Council member Lutt said he saw no problem with going ahead with the plan to obtain TIF funding for the project.

The first authorizes an agreement with Penro Construction Company of Pender to extend water service lines to buildings on Main Street between Clark and Fourth Streets.

The second resolution declares a benefit to the city for this work and allows for the city to bill property owners. Council members discussed a payment plan for this work and made several suggestions for the collection of these bills.

No action was taken on Resolution 2006-28 which would have approved an agreement with RDG Corporation to perform a Wayne Sidewalk Inventory and Evaluation at a cost to the city of \$2,000.

Council member Will Wiseman said the project was "untimely and expensive. When the time is right, the city employees can do the evaluation."

Council member Lutt suggested that each council member be given a map of his or her ward and walk the area, marking the map where work needs to be done. Public Joel Hansen, Works

'In Wayne' project update presented

Scott Brummond, Project manager for the Highway 15 "In Wayne" project, has provided the following update of work completed in the last week and work to be completed within the next week.

"As always, the description of future work is weather permitting and can change," Brummond cautioned.

Work completed includes:

• Completed removal of bricks, concrete base course, sidewalks, and driveways for Phase #2 work area, except some at the limits of construction.

• Removal of trees along project.

• Installation of silt fences to catch any erosion.

• Worked on Water Main installation at the south end.

Monday, April 24:

• Completed Water Main tie in between Fairgrounds Avenue and First Street and continuing with water main installation working north. Tuesday, April 25:

• Continuing with Water Main installation working between 1st Street and Second Street.

Wednesday, April 26:

• Continuing with Water Main installation work between First Street and Third Street.

Thursday through Tuesday, May 2:



• Continuing with Water Main work between First Street and Third Street and may begin on installing water service tie ins after passing tests.

• Tuesday or Wednesday the Third Street crossing may shift to Fourth Street due to water main work crossing Third Street. This closure or shift may last for more than one day.

Two Wayne State artists, assistant professor Steven Elliott and studio arts student Corbin Sharer, were selected by the Sioux City Growth Organization (SCGO) to include work in the first Sculp Siouxland Auction at the Orpheum Theater in Sioux City, Iowa after a yearlong exhibit that began in April 2005. Elliott and Sharer have been working together as assistant professor and student on campus.

"Locust" by Sharer and "Cryptograph" by Elliott were among 13 sculptures selected and auctioned through Sioux City's first annual sculpture contest. Artists from the region were encouraged to submit' new works to be judged.

Select entries were displayed outdoors at the "Historic Fourth Street" Sioux City Downtown Walking Mall. Sculptures were auctioned off to the highest bidders with some proceeds to the artist and some to the Sioux City GO during an event at the Orpheum at the end of March. Sharer was the only student artist with work selected by the contest judges.

"This event was an opportunity for people who promote the arts to be exposed to the value of Wayne State's sculpture program through television, radio and attend-

ing the auction. We have some good things happening for our program. We also have an upgraded listing on the International Sculpture Registry and I nominated Corbin for an international sculpture student's award," Elliott said.

When Corbin Sharer applies for graduate school, he said he will benefit from the fact that he has already sold work as an undergraduate."The success with Sculpt Siouxland has also been a tremendous motivator for keeping the creative processes going strong," Sharer said. Sharer is a studio arts major. His parents are Dr. Tim and Beth Ann Sharer of Wayne.

"I created the work for an artist statement by bending rusted metal into the representation of a locust. I have been working on taking an item from nature or something I see that inspires me and making it into a visually pleasing representation. I enjoy working with metal because it is forgiving. I can take away what I don,t want to use,," Sharer said. "I can,t say enough about the impact that Prof. Elliot has had on my work and his studio classes. He has been a mentor and has been available to help with my work and other students, pro-

Harr receives sentence for Low 36 38 High Precip Snow 59

child abuse

Michael Harr Sr. of Concord received a prison sentence of up to 36 years for the abuse of his girlfriend's daughter last year in Concord. Dixon County District Court Judge William Binkard handed down the sentencing Monday. Leland Miner, Dixon County Attorney, prosecuted the case. Steve Gabrial of the Attorney General's office assisted. Harr's attorney was Randy Hisey of South Sioux City.

Harr entered a guilty plea in January to two Class III felony charges of first-degree assault (one was amended from felony child abuse as part of a plea agreement).

Some of the abuse to the 8-yearold girl that Harr was accused of included making her eat cat feces, drink urine and hang from a door with her wrists bound. According to court documents, he also knocked out two of her teeth.

According to the sentencing, Harr received 14 to 18 years on each felony charge with the sentences to be served consecutively (giving a total of 28 to 36 years). He could be eligible for parole in 14 years, with good behavior. He's credited for 201 days in the Dixon County jail while awaiting sentencing.

Harr and Tamela Damme, mother of the girl, were arrested on Oct. 5, 2005. Five of their children were living in the home at the time and were taken into protective custody by the Nebraska Health and Human Service System.

Damme pled guilty to felony child abuse for allowing her daughter to be in the abusive situation and agreed to testify against Harr in exchange for dismissal of a firstdegree assault charge. Damme is receiving a mental evaluation and sentencing will be set when that is completed.





Capitol View Legislative decisions still making news

The Legislature has gone home for 2006, but a couple of the decisions made by lawmakers will keep making news for awhile.

On the final day of the session, senators adopted a resolution impeaching University of

Nebraska Regent Dave Hergert. He was immediately suspended from office, and now faces trial before the state Supreme Court. The high court will decide whether Hergert should be removed from the board.

Questions surrounding his 2004 violations of campaign finance laws have sharply divided lawmakers and the public. The impeachment was adopted without a vote to spare, 25-22.

Hergert, representing 35 western Nebraska counties, has rejected suggestions that he resign.

The Supreme Court could address an issue being put before it for the first time. The impeachment resolution says, in part, that Hergert can be removed from office because he filed a false report on his 2004 campaign after taking office in 2005. Critics say the theory is a stretch. Supporters of impeachment say Hergert violated his oath of office when he swore he had done nothing improper to get elected.

The fight over dividing the Omaha Public Schools into three smaller districts, which would reflect the current racially distinct attendance patterns, made national headlines.




I recall him saying, "Beware of drugs. The kids can fool you Dads. And you Dads have to speak up, speak out, and be loud in the fight against drugs."







The No. 25-ranked Wildcats extended its lead in the conference race with Winona State with three wins and one loss against the Warriors in action at Winona, Minn. last Saturday and Sunday

WSC also learned last week that they are currently ranked third in the top eight NCAA Division II regional poll.

Senior placekicker. Oscar Cervantes added a 31- Andrew Hurtig 1-7, Tyler Jones 1-0.



Wayne High varsity scores included: John Brady 85, Kyle Kwapnioski 85, Shaun Kardell 89 and Andi Diediker 87.


JV scores were: Taylor Nelson 91, Taylor Racely 96 and Joe Whitt 94.


The girls were highlighted by a gold medal finish by senior Jean Pieper, who set a new meet record in the 100-meter dash with her finish of 12.4 seconds.







a complete game, three-hitter last Saturday in a 9-1 win at Winona State. Mortimore struck out eight batters and walked just two in the win.



IANAGE YOUR SPACE: Leave Room. Leave adequate braking room between your vehicle and the one ahead of you, Also, keep a safe distance between your vehicle and traffic barriers, trucks, construction equipment and workers. J. Morton proposed to the Nebraska State Board of Agriculture "to set aside one day to plant trees, both forest and fruit." The State Board of Agriculture accepted this resolution in 1872 and the first "Arbor Day" was celebrated with more than 1,000,000 trees being planted on that day. Sterling's idea of Arbor Day, "A day set aside each year to plant trees, both flower and fruit" is celebrated each year throughout the United States and in many other countries around the world as well.


Being the birth state of Arbor Day, it's only appropriate that the Lower Elkhorn Natural Resources District (LENRD) promotes tree-planting programs each year. To celebrate the 134th Anniversary of Arbor Day the LENRD will be making seedlings available to the public. Species and inventory are limited; however, the LENRD will try to have as many seedlings available as possible for those who want to plant a tree on Arbor Day. Those interested in purchasing trees on Arbor Day should go to Maskenthine Lake Recreation Area to the LENRD Tree Distribution Center, north of Stanton. Attorney General Bruning reacts as Supreme **Court refuses** to hear cases

Attorney General Jon Bruning said he is pleased the United States Supreme Court has refused to accept the two remaining appeals that deal with how the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers manages the flow of the Missouri River.

"This is a win for all of Nebraska's interests, including the environment. The end of litigation gives us a long-overdue resolution of conflict in the Basin. Now, we need to shift our focus to come up with long term solutions," Bruning said.

The Supreme Court's decision validates the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers' new Master Manual for operations of the Missouri River system.

Nebraska receives more than \$500 million in annual economic benefits from power production, water supply, flood control, navigation and recreation. Each benefit depends on the flow from the Missouri River.

"The court's decision allows us to maintain our level of economic benefits, yet address the needs of endangered species," Bruning said.

The Eighth U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals previously ruled to uphold the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service's proposal and the Corps' plan for operations, which are based on a proposal made by Nebraska in 2003.

Nebraska is well known for being the "Tree Planting State", the state that started Arbor Day and is known as the home on Arbor Day. Since the inception of Arbor Day on April 10, 1872, all 50 states have an Arbor Day observance as well as many overseas countries.

Tree planting is more than a one day event as the planting season can span from early spring, as soon as the soil thaws out, until fall, or until the soil freezes. Planting a tree is important to help increase the number and diversity of species but is only the first step.

Follow-up activities include watering of the tree on a daily basis with about one gallon of water for the smaller trees.

Mulching is very critical and needs to be provided as soon as the tree is planted. Mulch keeps the soil moist, roots cool and prevents weeds from competing with the

Protection of the tree stem or trunk needs to be provided during the winter to keep rabbits and deer

from harming the tender bark on the young tree. The protection can be hard plastic wraps available from garden centers. These devices need to be removed in the spring to allow sunlight to shine on the bark. There is normally no need to tie or secure the tree with wire, twine and rope unless the tree is in a very

windy site or high foot traffic area like a park or walking trail. If the tree needs to be held in place, the best material to use is lawn chair webbing. This provides a wide and soft material that will degrade over a couple of years and break as the tree moves in the wind.

The last other item that needs to be done is to prune the tree from year two to five to remove any dead, diseased, or crossing branches in order to have the best looking tree for the space provided.

Arbor Day provides the first step in getting a plant started for future generations to enjoy. Participate in Arbor Day observances sponsored at your local school or local community tree board activities.







Goteral also presented a public reading of his works on April 2 in the WSC Humanities Lounge.



TEXT OF PROPOSED AMENDMENT NUMBER 1

THE MEMBERS OF THE NINETY-NINTH LEGISLATURE **OF NEBRASKA, FIRST** SESSION, RESOLVE THAT:

Section 1. At a special election on May 9, 2006, the following proposed amendment to the Constitution of Nebraska shall be submitted to the electors of the State of Nebraska for approval or rejection:

To amend Article III, sections 7 and 19 and 19 III-7 At the general election to be held in November 1964, one-half the members of the Legislature, or as nearly thereto as may be practicable, shall be elected for a term of four years and the remainder for a term of two years, and thereafter all members shall be elected for a term of four years, with the manner of such election to be determined by the Legislature. When the Legislature is redistricted, the members elected prior to the redistricting shall continue in office, and the law providing for such redistricting shall where necessary specify the newly established district which they shall represent for the balance of their term. Each member shall be nominated and elected in a nonpartisan manner and without any indication on the ballot that he or she is affiliated with or endorsed. by any political party or organization. Each Until January 3, 2007, each member of the Legislature shall receive a salary of not to exceed one thousand dollars per month during the term of his or her office. Beginning January 3, 2007, each member of the Legislature shall receive an annual salary during his or her term of office equal to twenty-one thousand dollars in 2007 and increased annually thereafter by the change in the prior calendár year in a consumer price index designated by law, not to exceed four percent. In addition to his or her salary, each member shall receive an amount equal to his or her actual expenses in traveling by the most usual route once to and returning from each regular or special session of the Legislature. Members of the Legislature shall receive no pay nor perquisites other than his or her salary and expenses, and employees of the Legislature shall receive no compensation other than their salary or per diem. III-19 The Legislature shall never grant any extra compensation to any public officer, agent, or servant after the services have been rendered nor to any contractor after the contract has been entered into, except that retirement benefits of retired public officers and employees may be adjusted to reflect changes in the cost of living and wage levels that have occurred subsequent to the date of retirement. Except as otherwise provided in section 7 of this Article, the The compensation of any public officer, including any officer whose compensation is fixed by the Legislature, shall not be increased or diminished during his or her term of office, except that when there are members elected or appointed to the Legislature or the judiciary, or officers elected or appointed to a board or commission having more than one member, and the terms of such members commence and end at different times, the compensation of all members of the Legislature, of the judiciary, or of such board or commission may be increased or diminished at the beginning of the full term of any member thereof, adaption that the property of the second property of the

Nothing in this section shall prevent local governing bodies from reviewing and adjusting vested pension benefits periodically as prescribed by ordinance.

The surviving spouse of any retired public officer, agent, or servant. who has retired under a pension plan or system, shall be considered as having pensionable status and shall be entitled to the same benefits which may, at any time, be provided for or available to spouses of other public officers, agents, or servants who have retired under such pension plan or system at a later date, and such benefits shall not be prohibited by the restrictions of this section or of Article XIII, section 3 of the Constitution of Nebraska. Sec. 2. The proposed amendment shall be submitted to the electors in the manner prescribed by the Constitution of Nebraska, Article XVI, section 1, with the following ballot language:

A constitutional amendment to provide for an annual salary for members of the Legislature equal to twenty-one thousand dollars in 2007 and increased annually thereafter by the change in the prior calendar year in a consumer price index designated by law, not to exceed four percent.




Children's play presented
