

Speakers named for Wayne State morning and afternoon commencement ceremonies

Sarah Armstrong has been selected to give the invocation at the Wayne State College graduate commencement on Saturday, May 6, at 9:30 a.m. in Rice Auditorium on the Wayne State campus. Sonia Rittscher of Clearwater, a member of the Neligh learning community master's degree program, will give the honor address at the morning exercises. Enrique Jair Guevara of Panama City, Panama will give the invocation at the afternoon commencement on May 6 at 2 p.m. in the Willow Bowl.

Because of the large number of graduate students, Wayne State College will hold separate undergraduate and graduate commencement ceremonies on the same day. The undergraduate ceremony will be held at 2 p.m. in the Willow Bowl, weather permitting. The public is invited to attend the ceremonies. In the event of inclement weather, the afternoon ceremony will be moved inside to Rice Auditorium, and seating will be limited.

Armstrong, who will receive a master of science degree in education (curriculum and instruction), is one of 137 students to complete the Wayne State learning community master's degree program. They are members of the Blair, Neligh and South Sioux City learning communities.

A special educator for eight years, Armstrong teaches in the Bellevue Public Schools. She received a bachelor of science

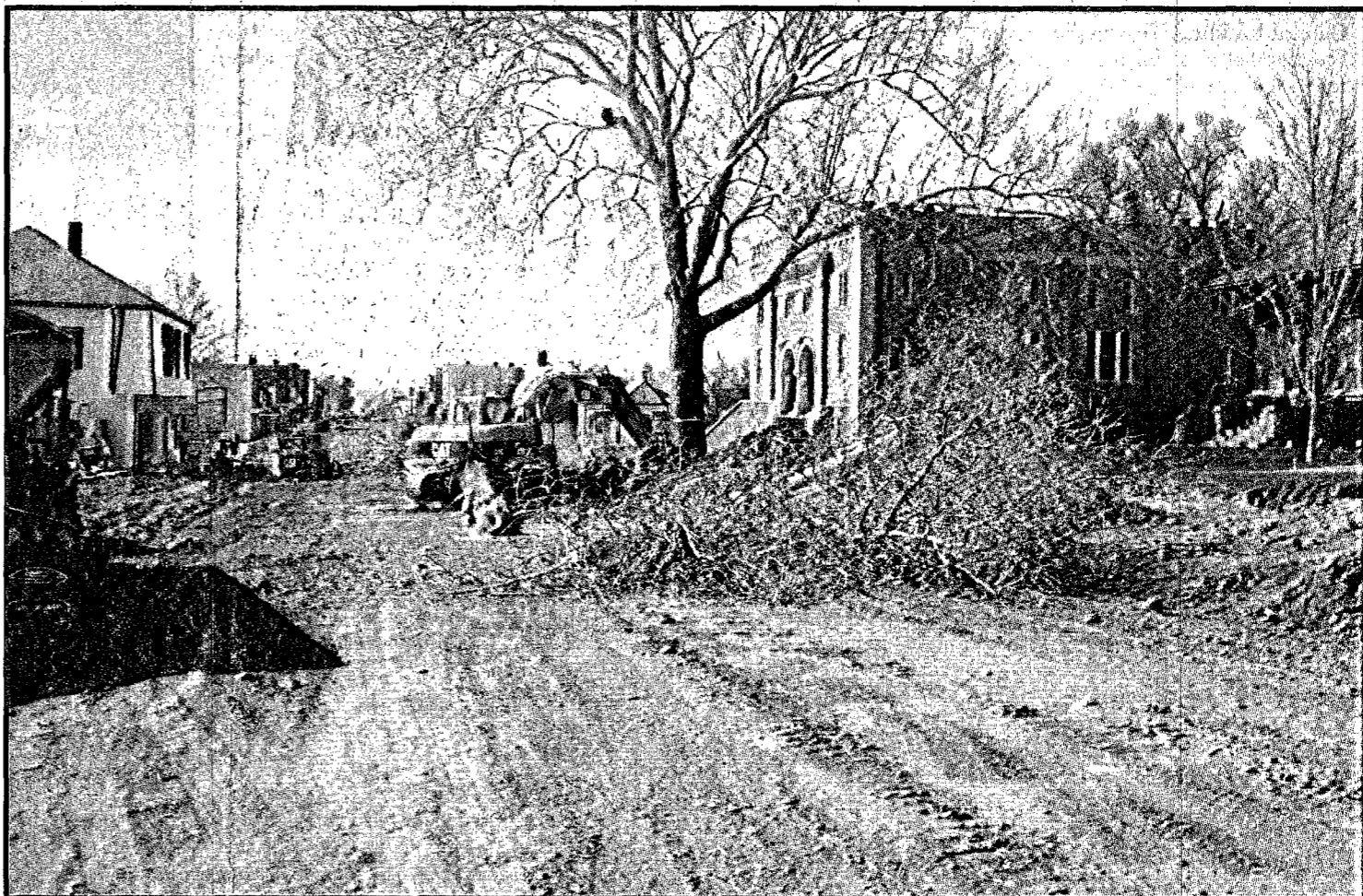
in elementary education with an endorsement in special education from the University of Nebraska-Kearney. She and her husband Kyle live in Bellevue with sons Luke and Noah.

Rittscher, who has taught high school English and German at Clearwater for the past 11 years, will receive a master of science degree in education (curriculum and instruction). She received a bachelor's degree from the University of Nebraska-Lincoln in 1993. She and her husband Kevin live near Clearwater with their three daughters. She is a native of Neligh.

Guevara, an honors student who will receive a bachelor of arts degree, has a major in speech communication with a minor in Spanish and an emphasis in Leadership. He is the son of Enrique A. and Diane (Maxwell) Guevara of Panama City, Panama and the grandson of Gladys Maxwell of Norfolk.

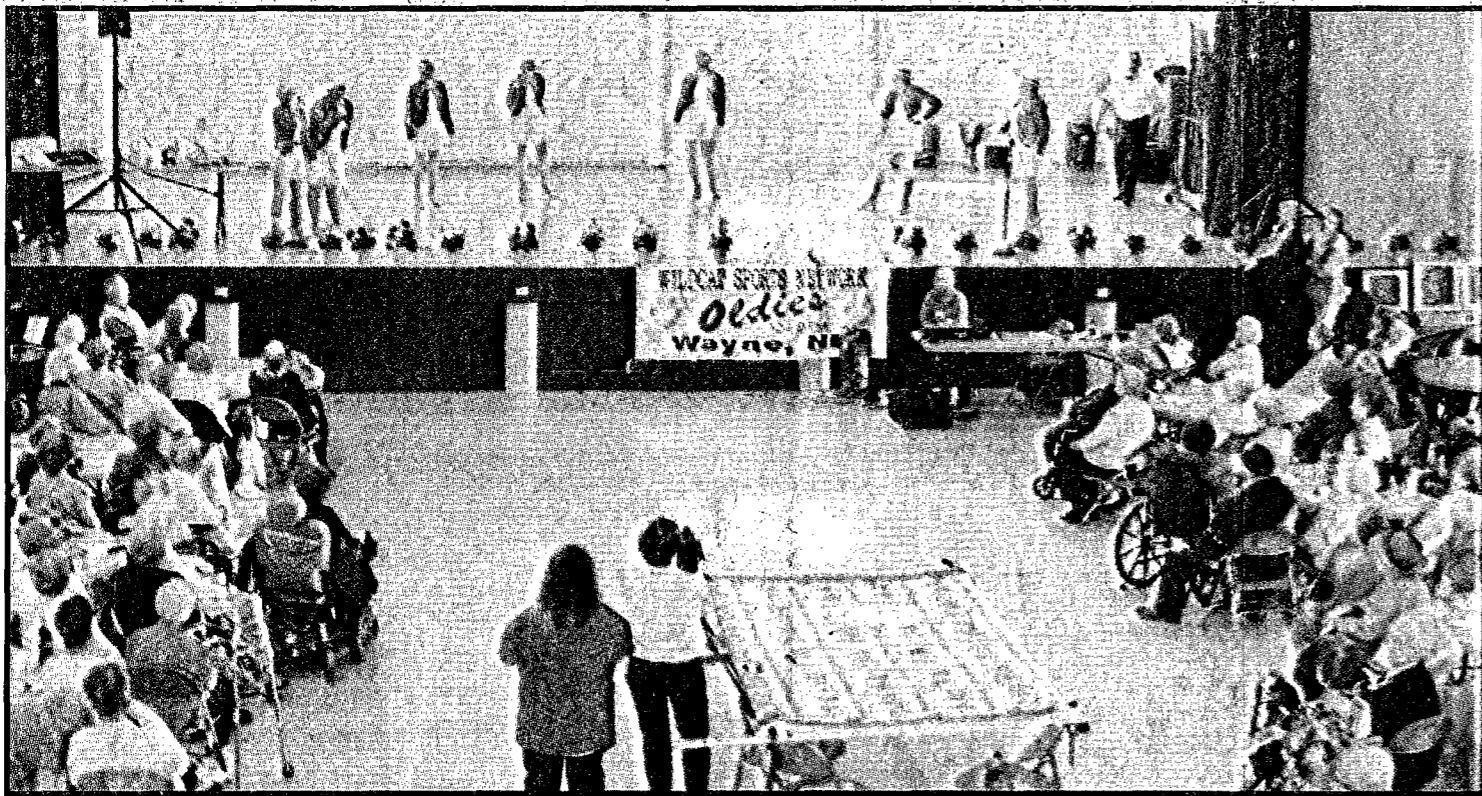

Parking issues put on hold.

Parking in Wayne was again the main topic of discussion at Tuesday's meeting of the Wayne City Council.

Two agenda items, Ordinance 2006-10 and 2006-4 were tabled following discussion of the language in the ordinances conflicting with each other.

On a 4-3 vote, Ordinance 2006-5, which would have created a three hour time limit for parking on side streets during the Main Street Improvement Project, failed.

Council member Verdel Lutt said he felt the TEAM 15 committee would be the "posse" for the project and save the city money, work and the need for enforcement.

Also on Tuesday's agenda was a presentation by Lou Benschoter with a request for Tax Increment Financing (TIF) funds to build a five-plex on the property located at 814 Windom Street.

Several council members asked questions about the building plans, parking and management of the building. Benschoter told the council that his plans for the building would "make it fit into the look of the community."

Council member Lutt said he saw no problem with going ahead with the plan to obtain TIF funding for the project.

Benschoter said if the project moves for-

ward according to his plans, construction could begin this summer.

The council also approved two resolutions dealing with water lines and the Main Street renovation project.

The first authorizes an agreement with Penro Construction Company of Pender to extend water service lines to buildings on Main Street between Clark and Fourth Streets.

The second resolution declares a benefit to the city for this work and allows for the city to bill property owners. Council members discussed a payment plan for this work and made several suggestions for the collection of these bills.

No action was taken on Resolution 2006-28 which would have approved an agreement with RDG Corporation to perform a Wayne Sidewalk Inventory and Evaluation at a cost to the city of \$2,000.

Council member Will Wiseman said the project was "untimely and expensive. When the time is right, the city employees can do the evaluation."

Council member Lutt suggested that each council member be given a map of his or her ward and walk the area, marking the map where work needs to be done.

'In Wayne' project update presented

Scott Brummond, Project manager for the Highway 15 "In Wayne" project, has provided the following update of work completed in the last week and work to be completed within the next week.

"As always, the description of future work is weather permitting and can change," Brummond cautioned.

Work completed includes:

- Completed removal of bricks, concrete base course, sidewalks, and driveways for Phase #2 work area, except some at the limits of construction.
- Removal of trees along project.
- Installation of silt fences to catch any erosion.
- Worked on Water Main installation at the south end.

Monday, April 24:

- Completed Water Main tie in between Fairgrounds Avenue and First Street and continuing with water main installation working north.

Tuesday, April 25:

- Continuing with Water Main installation working between 1st Street and Second Street.

Wednesday, April 26:

- Continuing with Water Main installation work between First Street and Third Street.

Thursday through Tuesday, May 2:

- Continuing with Water Main work between First Street and Third Street and may begin on installing water service tie ins after passing tests.

- Tuesday or Wednesday the Third Street crossing may shift to Fourth Street due to water main work crossing Third Street. This closure or shift may last for more than one day.



Works by WSC Assistant Professor, student selected for contest auction

Two Wayne State artists, assistant professor Steven Elliott and studio arts student Corbin Sharer, were selected by the Sioux City Growth Organization (SCGO) to include work in the first Sculpture Auction at the Orpheum Theater in Sioux City, Iowa after a year-long exhibit that began in April 2005. Elliott and Sharer have been working together as assistant professor and student on campus.

"Locust" by Sharer and "Cryptograph" by Elliott were among 13 sculptures selected and auctioned through Sioux City's first annual sculpture contest. Artists from the region were encouraged to submit new works to be judged.

Select entries were displayed outdoors at the "Historic Fourth Street" Sioux City Downtown Walking Mall. Sculptures were auctioned off to the highest bidders with some proceeds to the artist and some to the Sioux City GO during an event at the Orpheum at the end of March. Sharer was the only student artist with work selected by the contest judges.

"This event was an opportunity for people who promote the arts to be exposed to the value of Wayne State's sculpture program through television, radio and attend-

ing the auction. We have some good things happening for our program. We also have an upgraded listing on the International Sculpture Registry and I nominated Corbin for an international sculpture student's award," Elliott said.

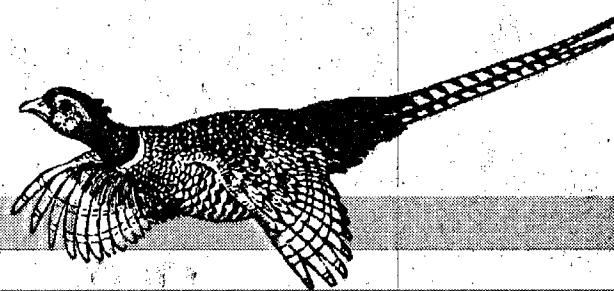
When Corbin Sharer applies for graduate school, he said he will benefit from the fact that he has already sold work as an undergraduate. "The success with Sculpture Siouxland has also been a tremendous motivator for keeping the creative processes going strong," Sharer said. Sharer is a studio arts major. His parents are Dr. Tim and Beth Ann Sharer of Wayne.

"I created the work for an artist statement by bending rusted metal into the representation of a locust. I have been working on taking an item from nature or something I see that inspires me and making it into a visually pleasing representation. I enjoy working with metal because it is forgiving. I can take away what I don't want to use," Sharer said. "I can't say enough about the impact that Prof. Elliott has had on my work and his studio classes. He has been a mentor and has been available to help with my work and other students, pro-

Marialice Ley Champe, 96, of Carmel Calif., died Wednesday, March 15, 2006.

A Celebration of Life for her will take place in May. Marialice Ley Champe, daughter of Rollie W. and E. Pearl (Reynolds) Ley, was born in Wayne on Nov. 5, 1909. She attended Wayne State Teacher's College and trained at the Chicago Academy of Fine Arts. She graduated with a Bachelor of Fine Arts from the University of Nebraska and married E. Allan Champe. Survivors include her children, Tweed Champe Evans, Leslie Champe Talbot, Rollie Allan Champe; grandchildren and great-grandchildren; a sister, Josephine Auker; nieces and nephews.

She was preceded in death by her husband, E. Allan Champe in 1969; her brother, Henry and sisters, Joy and Marjorie.

Pet registrations due

It's that time of year! The weather is turning nice, the trees are leafing out, the birds are singing and, yes, it's time once again to renew your pet's license. The month of May is when Wayne residents who own dogs or cats must visit the Wayne Police Department and renew their pet's registration. From May 1-31 it will cost \$5 to register a pet. On June 1 all of last year's licenses are

expired and the renewal fee is \$20. Pet owners must present proof that their pet's rabies vaccination are up to date and in exchange for \$5 will receive a shiny new green dog registration tag or a purple cat registration tag. In addition to a higher fee if pet owners renew registrations after May 31, they may be subject to misdemeanor charges that could cost an additional \$66.50.

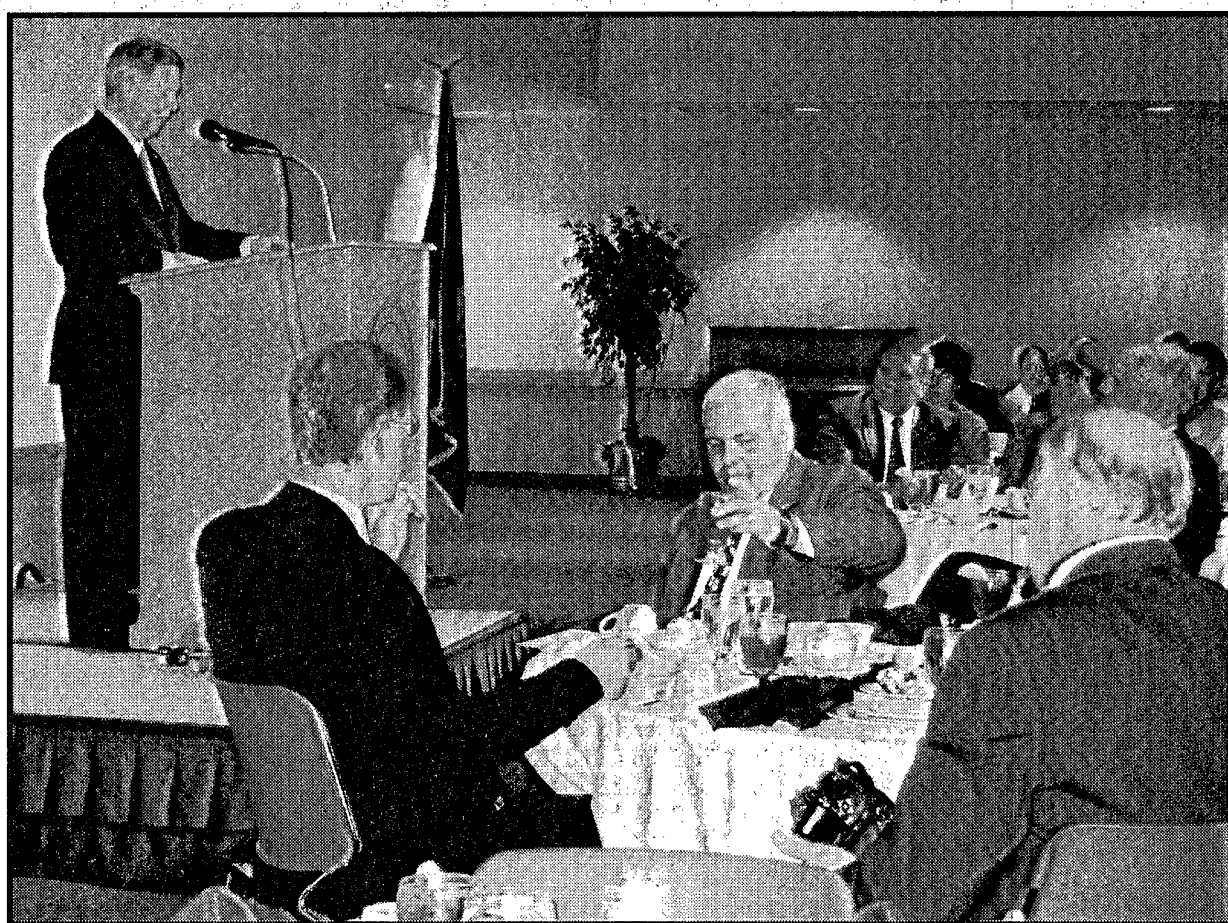
Accidents occur in Winside area

At about 5:30 p.m. on April 19, a SUV driven by 20-year-old Spencer Tullberg of rural Wayne was eastbound on Wayne County Road #848, lost control and went into the ditch striking the creek embankment just east of the intersection four miles south of Winside along Highway # 35.

Winside Rescue was called to the scene and a passenger, 18-year-old, Megan Baldwin of Springview, was taken to Faith Regional Health Services in Norfolk to be treated for her injuries. Seat belts were in use at the time of the accident.

At about 4 p.m. on Saturday, April 22, a 1990 Mercury Cougar driven by Ivan Martinez of Norfolk, lost its brakes at the intersection of Highways # 35 and # 98 four miles north of Winside.

The driver attempted to put the car in reverse but was unsuccessful in stopping the vehicle. The car veered to the right and then went down the embankment to the south and went through a fence at that location. No one was injured and the car was considered a total loss.

Harr entered a guilty plea in January to two Class III felony charges of first-degree assault (one was amended from felony child abuse as part of a plea agreement).

Some of the abuse to the 8-year-old girl that Harr was accused of included making her eat cat feces, drink urine and hang from a door with her wrists bound. According to court documents, he also knocked out two of her teeth.

According to the sentencing, Harr received 14 to 18 years on each felony charge with the sentences to be served consecutively (giving a total of 28 to 36 years). He could be eligible for parole in 14 years, with good behavior. He's credited for 201 days in the Dixon County jail while awaiting sentencing.

Harr and Tamela Damme, mother of the girl, were arrested on Oct. 5, 2005. Five of their children were living in the home at the time and were taken into protective custody by the Nebraska Health and Human Service System.

Damme pled guilty to felony child abuse for allowing her daughter to be in the abusive situation and agreed to testify against Harr in exchange for dismissal of a first-degree assault charge. Damme is receiving a mental evaluation and sentencing will be set when that is completed.

Legislative decisions still making news

The Legislature has gone home for 2006, but a couple of the decisions made by lawmakers will keep making news for awhile.

On the final day of the session, senators adopted a resolution impeaching University of Nebraska Regent Dave Hergert. He was immediately suspended from office, and now faces trial before the state Supreme Court. The high court will decide whether Hergert should be removed from the board.

Questions surrounding his 2004 violations of campaign finance laws have sharply divided lawmakers and the public. The impeachment was adopted without a vote to spare, 25-22.

Hergert, representing 35 western Nebraska counties, has rejected suggestions that he resign.

The Supreme Court could address an issue being put before it for the first time. The impeachment resolution says, in part, that Hergert can be removed from office because he filed a false report on his 2004 campaign after taking office in 2005. Critics say the theory is a stretch. Supporters of impeachment say Hergert violated his oath of office when he swore he had done nothing improper to get elected.

The fight over dividing the Omaha Public Schools into three smaller districts, which would reflect the current racially distinct attendance patterns, made national headlines.

One argument centered on whether the law represented de-

facto segregation. Senator Ernie Chambers of Omaha, the only black member of the Legislature, said it clearly did not. Any student could attend any high school in any of the other districts.

Some rural lawmakers noted that Chambers and other supporters of the plan were echoing a war cry familiar to them: local control of schools.

Chambers said the three smaller districts would elect board mem-

bers from communities closest to the schools.

Some opponents of rural school consolidation have for decades argued that creating larger districts takes local control away from many communities. Supporters of the consolidations have argued that financial efficiency and better educational opportunities are enhanced by consolidation.

A reminder: Twenty new lawmakers will enter the Legislature

in 2007.

A hypothetical question raised previously in this space: What would happen if the freshman senators have a mind to take a cleaver to state spending? What if they choose to "damn the torpedoes" and the federal mandates and screaming local governments and just slash spending?

It would make national headlines. Not as exciting as the move to divide OPS, but it would be far longer lasting.

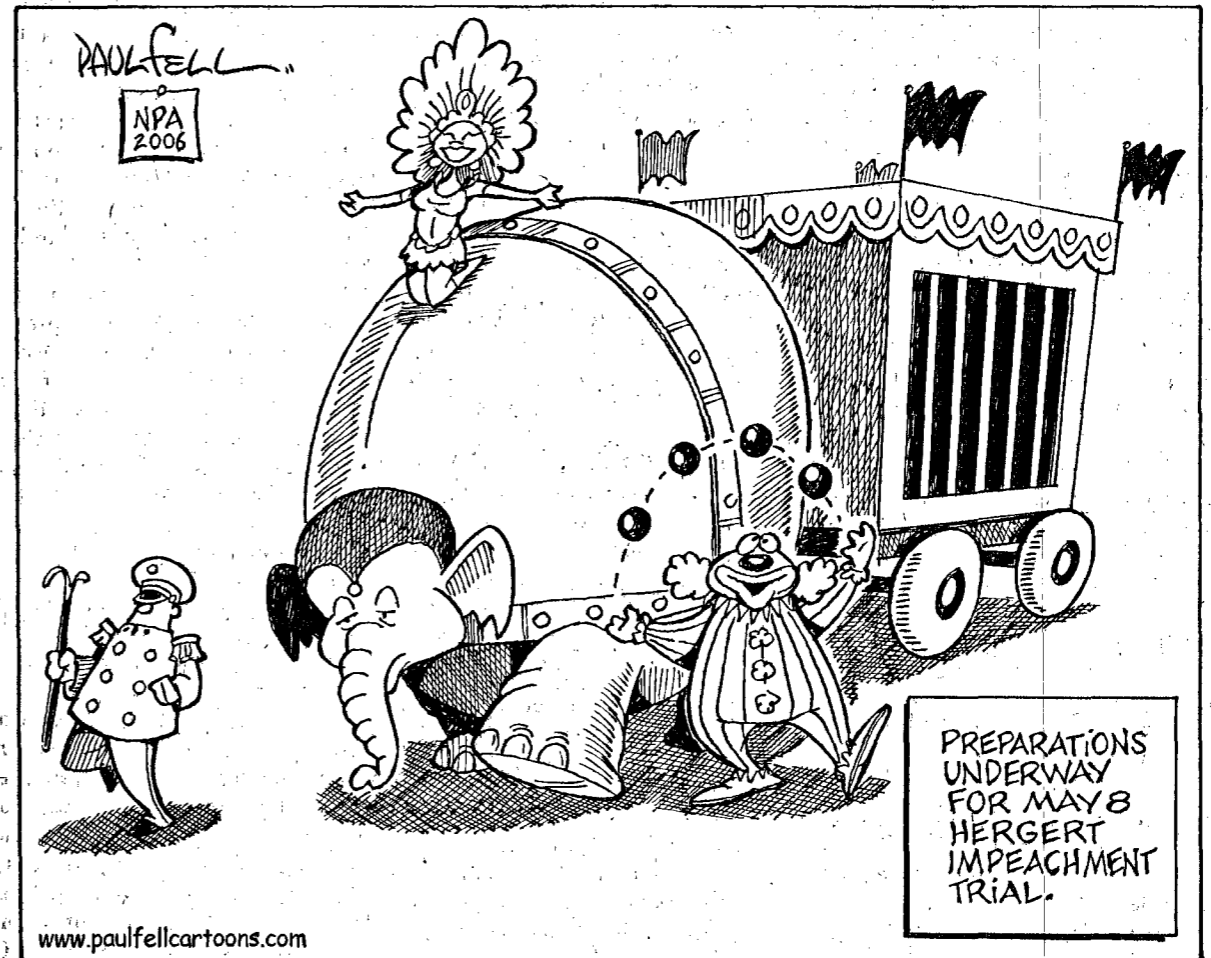
The Alley Mural Project is mov-

He is a faculty advisor of Phi Alpha Theta, the history honorary at Wayne State College, and a member of the American Historical Association

and the Organization of American Historians. Blayney is the author of *Democracy's Aristocrat: The Life of Herbert C. Pell*.

Janet M. Brumm, circulation/interlibrary loan librarian at Wayne State College since 1977, when she was hired as an instructor/technical services assistant and cataloging librarian with faculty status. jects in a collaborative atmosphere."

Elliott said he has worked at larger universities and can compare the level of attention that students get at Wayne State. "Our students benefit from more opportunities for professors to elaborate on concepts outside of the classroom and form more supportive relationships with students."

Corbin is a good student who takes advice well. He has also been working on independent study and helping other students with processes. His success is an encouragement to other students to enter their work in competition," Elliott said. He stressed that students need to remember to keep sending in their work through a constant process of deadlines and applications.

In addition to teaching, Elliott said he keeps current in display arenas for his own work. The auctioned work from his "Cryptograph" series was based on the idea of three-dimensional printing objects.

His large-scale installations and mixed-media sculptures emphasize repetition with thousands of three-dimensional fragments involved. This work involved welded steel and wood. Pieces were moved

along a threaded steel rod axis and tensioned into place. He will be displaying another work from the series and making an April 26 presentation for the "Visual Artist Series" through the Plattsburgh State University of New York Sculpture program in Plattsburgh, N.Y. Elliott was selected by a curator as one of less than half a dozen artists to display work, give public lectures, workshops, demos and critiques.

Elliott teaches sculpture and design at WSC. After serving on active duty in the Marine Corps and travel overseas, he received a B.F.A. degree in sculpture from the University of Kansas and an M.F.A. degree from the University of Maryland, College Park, where he taught sculpture, drawing, and design. His work has been exhibited nationally in more than 30 one-person and group shows.

Recent outdoor exhibitions include large-scale installations in Kansas City, Mo., Sioux City, Iowa, and Lawrence, Kan. Recent gallery exhibitions include SoOh Gallery in Lincoln, the Zone Gallery in Kansas City, Mo., and the Joseph A. Cain Memorial Gallery in Corpus Christie, Texas.

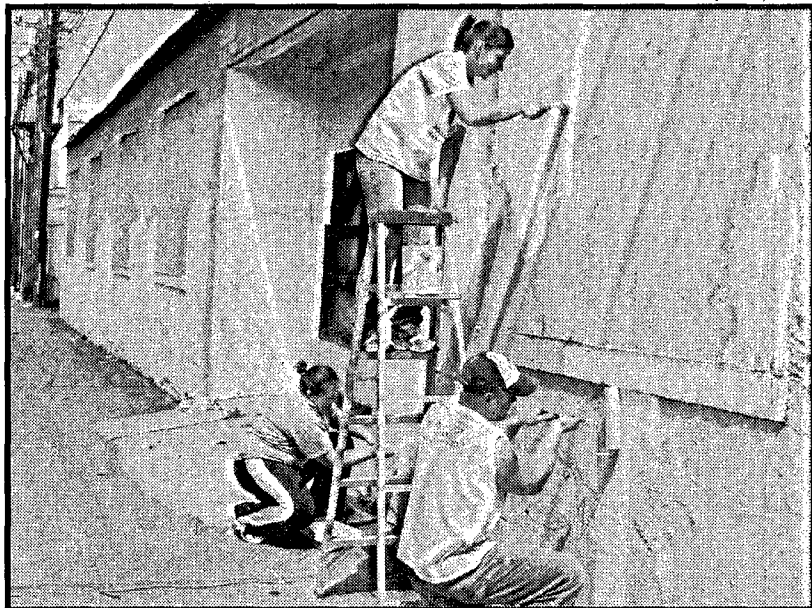

The firm has a service area of up to a 150 mile radius of Wayne.

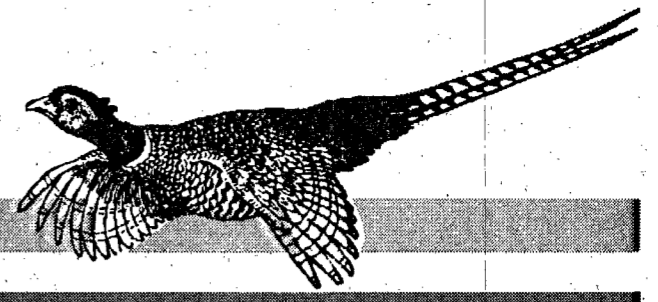

Wayne State drops its first NSIC game this season

It was a pivotal conference weekend for the Wayne State College baseball team.

The No. 25-ranked Wildcats extended its lead in the conference race with Winona State with three wins and one loss against the Warriors in action at Winona, Minn. last Saturday and Sunday.

WSC also learned last week that they are currently ranked third in the top eight NCAA Division II regional poll.

The wins gave WSC a three-game lead over Winona in the league standings, while the sole loss of the weekend was only the first time this season that the 'Cats have lost to a Northern Sun foe.

The team started with a 9-1 and 4-2 sweep over the Warriors at Saturday afternoon.

In the first game, Wayne State starter Travis Mortimore fired a complete game, three-hitter to shut down the Warriors 9-1.

The junior left-hander from Torrington, Wyo., improved to 6-1 overall and 5-0 in the NSIC with the win, striking out eight and walking only two.

WSC struck early with a four-run second inning as Scott Bidroski's two-run

double and an RBI double by senior first baseman Ben Albury helped the 'Cats to a quick start.

After Winona State scored its only run of the game in the fourth inning, WSC scored a single run in the fifth inning on Alex Koch's RBI single to put the Wildcats in front 5-1.

The Wildcats added two runs in the sixth inning, on Bidroski's RBI single and a run-scoring double by Albury, to give WSC a comfortable 7-1 cushion.

WSC added two runs in the seventh inning on a two-run single by Dustin Jones to make the final 9-1.

WSC had 13 hits in the game compared to Winona State's three.

Albury had three doubles and was 3 for 4 to lead the Wildcat in hitting.

Bidroski also went 3 for 4 with Jones and Koch each adding two hits to the Wildcat attack.

The second game saw WSC rally from an early 2-0 deficit to down the Warriors 4-2. A three-run sixth inning, highlighted by Marc Manganaro's two-run homer to snap a 2-2 tie, was the difference in the game.

Winona State used solo home runs by Joe Magee and Brian Menard in the second and third innings respectively to take a 2-0 lead after three innings.

WSC pulled to within 2-1 in the fourth inning when Albury's RBI groundout scored Jones, who walked to start the inning.

In the sixth inning, Albury's RBI double scored Scott Bidroski to tie the score at 2-2, then Manganaro delivered his team-leading sixth home run of the season to score Albury to put WSC in front 4-2.

The rally took place with two outs and no runners on base for WSC in the sixth inning.

B.J. Wierzbicki (7-1) worked five strong innings to get the win for Wayne State, allowing two runs on four hits with six strikeouts. Michael Donohoe tossed the final two innings without giving up a hit to earn his first save of the season.

WSC had just five hits in the game with three coming in the pivotal sixth inning. Manganaro's home run led WSC in hitting, followed by doubles from Albury, Jordan Deglan and Bidroski.

The other hit was a single by Jones to start the game.

Wayne State split doubleheader on Sunday afternoon, suffering its first loss in conference play.

After rolling to a 13-2 win in the first game, WSC lost to Winona State 6-1 in the second game to fall in conference play for the first time in 18 league games this season.

Wayne State holds a three-game lead over Winona State with just four league games remaining, a home series next weekend against Northern State.

The first game saw WSC score in six of the seven innings as the Wildcats rolled to a 13-2 win over the Warriors.

Albury and Bidroski homered to lead a balanced hitting attack for Wayne State in the win. Albury finished the game 2 for 3 with two RBI's and two runs scored.

Freshman second baseman Vicente Cafaro was 2 for 3 with three RBI's and two runs scored. Jones was 2 for 4 with three runs scored and Ian DeLaet added two hits for the Wildcats.

Junior left hander Josh Andersen (6-1)

worked four innings to get the pitching win. He allowed two runs on six hits with five strikeouts and two walks. Nathan Gettler pitched the final three innings to earn his second save of the season.

The second game saw Winona State score four runs in the fifth inning to break open a close game and pull away for a 6-1 win over the Wildcats.

The lone run of the game for Wayne State came in the seventh inning on Ian DeLaet's solo home run in the seventh inning.

Wayne State had just five hits in the game, led by DeLaet's home run.

Albury and Koch each added doubles. Senior right hander Steve Walsh (3-1) suffered the pitching loss for Wayne State, allowing four runs on five hits in four and two-thirds innings.

Wayne native Adam McGuire pitched the final one and one-third innings, allowing two runs on three hits.

Wayne State is now 30-11-1 overall and 17-1 in the NSIC and was scheduled to play at Augustana College on Wednesday in a non-conference doubleheader.

yard field goal for the White team.

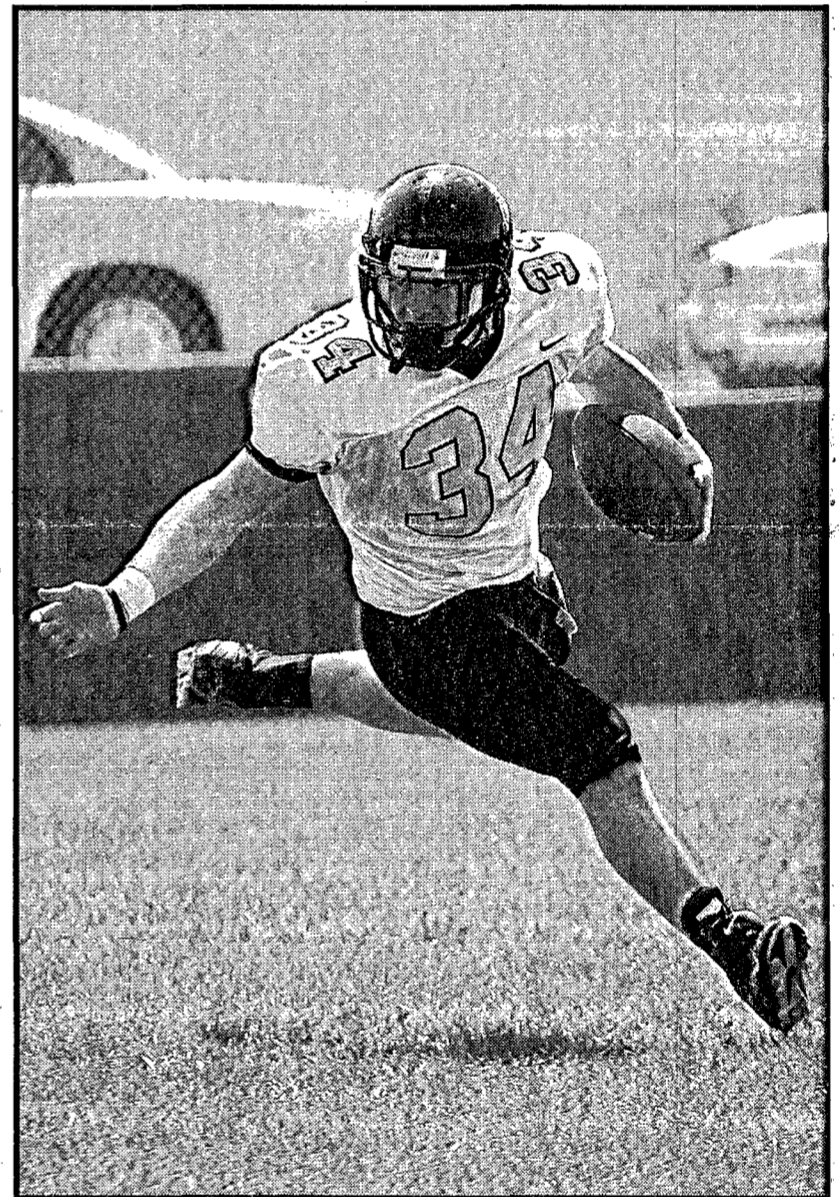
Defensively, senior defensive lineman Sean Tili recorded a fumble recovery, while senior defensive back Adam Peterson had an interception.

The Wayne JV team also finished second at the meet with a 370 among the JV teams.

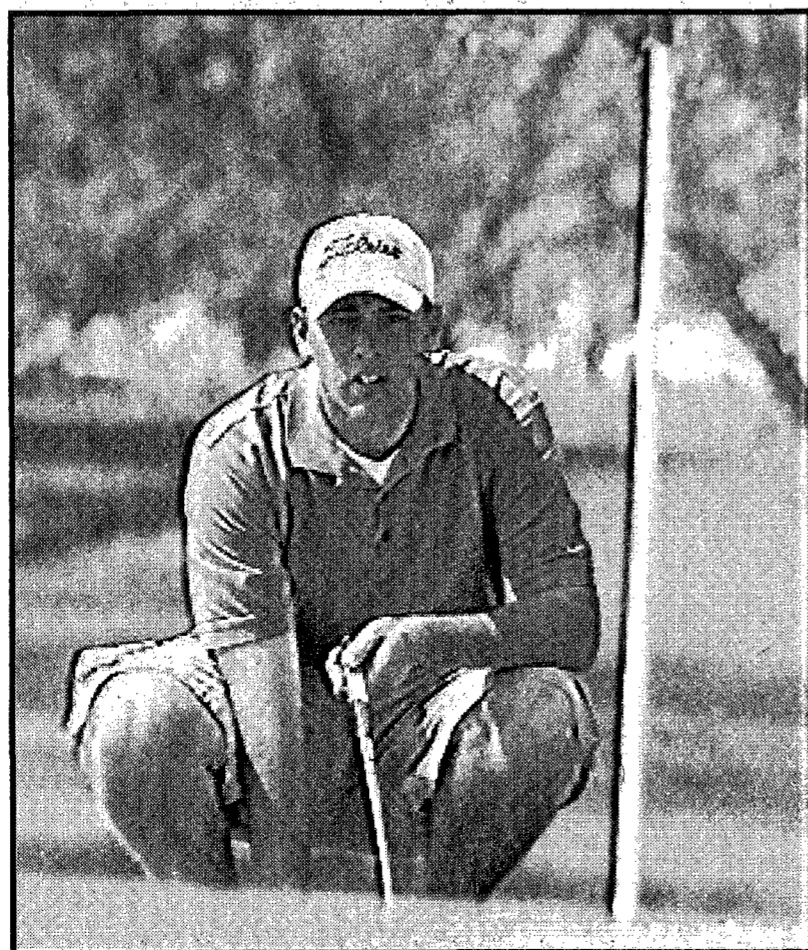
Wayne High varsity scores included: John Brady 85, Kyle Kwapniosk 85, Shaun Kardell 89 and Andi Diediker 87.

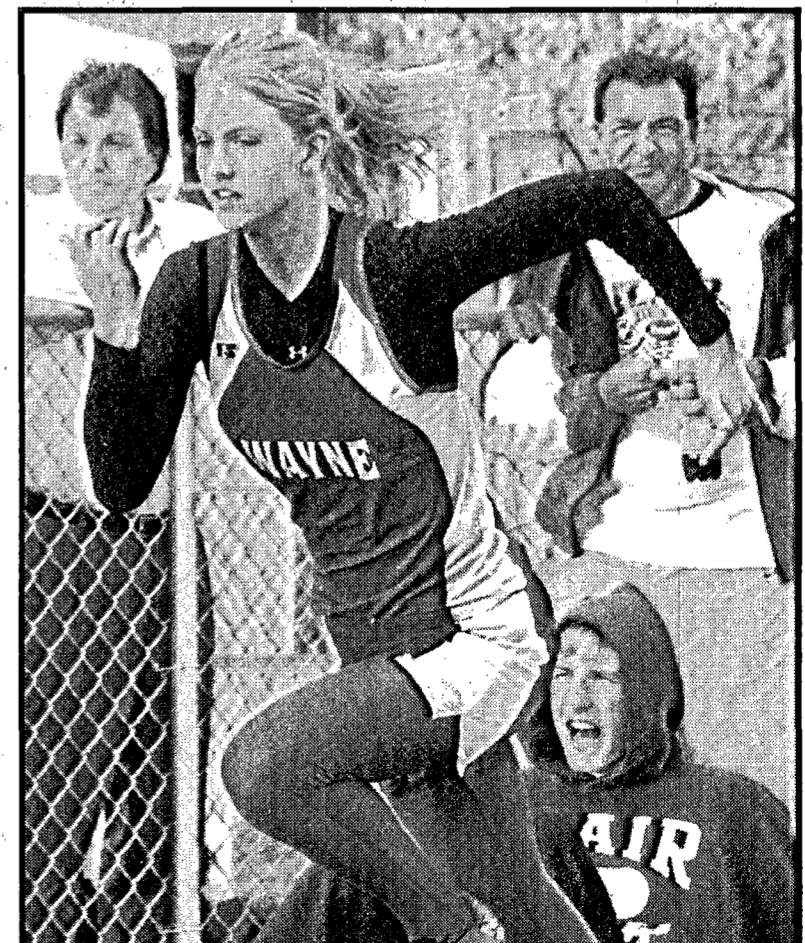
The girls were highlighted by a gold medal finish by senior Jean Pieper, who set a new meet record in the 100-meter dash with her finish of 12.4 seconds.

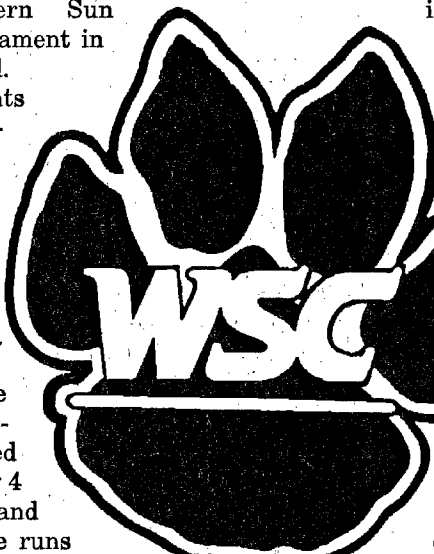
Northern State scored single runs in the sixth and seventh innings to make the final score 5-2.

Midland Lutheran won the tournament with a 303.

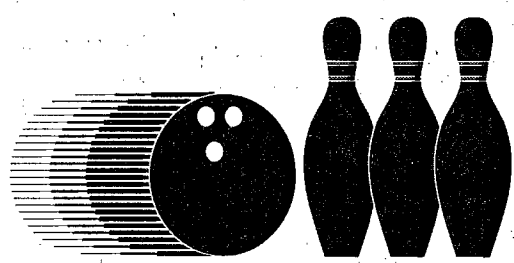

- Watch Out for Tailgaters. Do not force tailgaters to back off by slamming on your brakes or reducing your speed significantly. This practice can lead to road rage and increases the chances of a collision.

MANAGE YOUR STRESS:

- Keep Your Cool. Calm down and don't rush.
- Pay Attention. Avoid cell phone or radio distractions, as well as those of other stopped cars or construction.

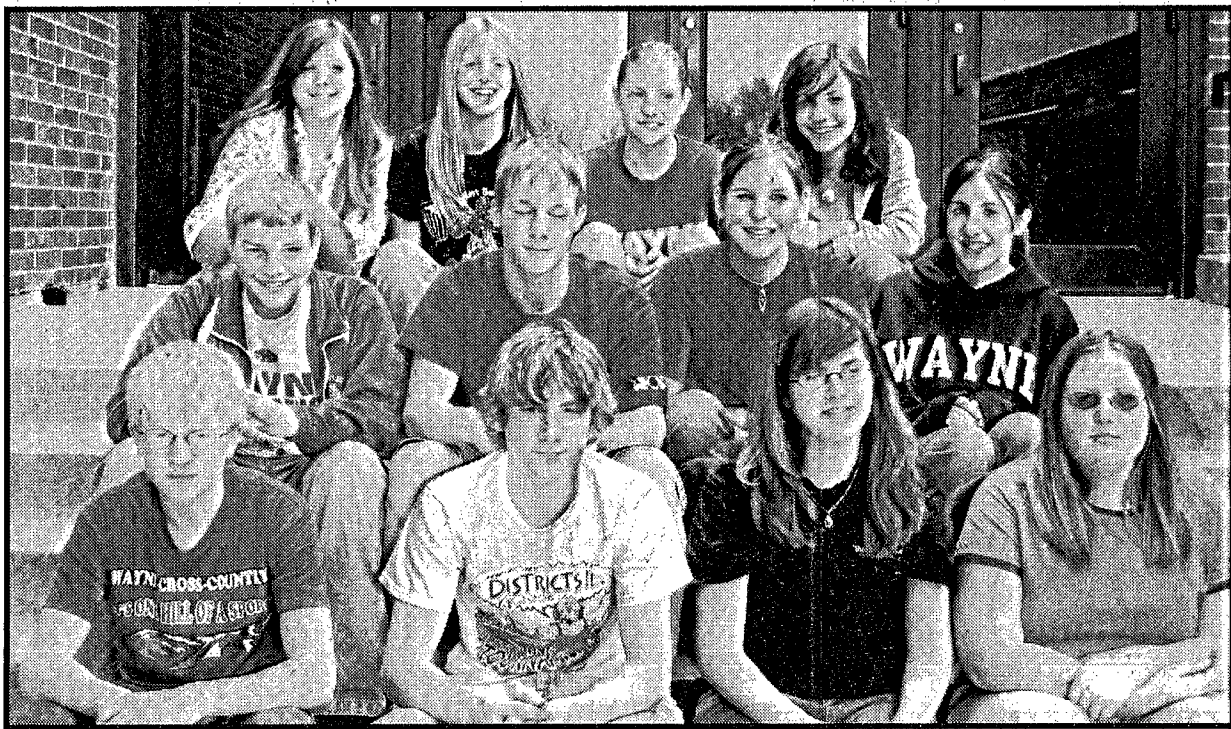

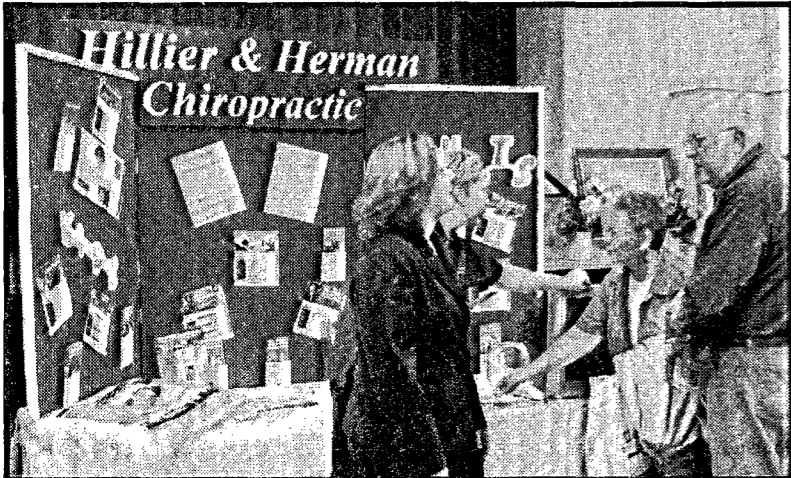

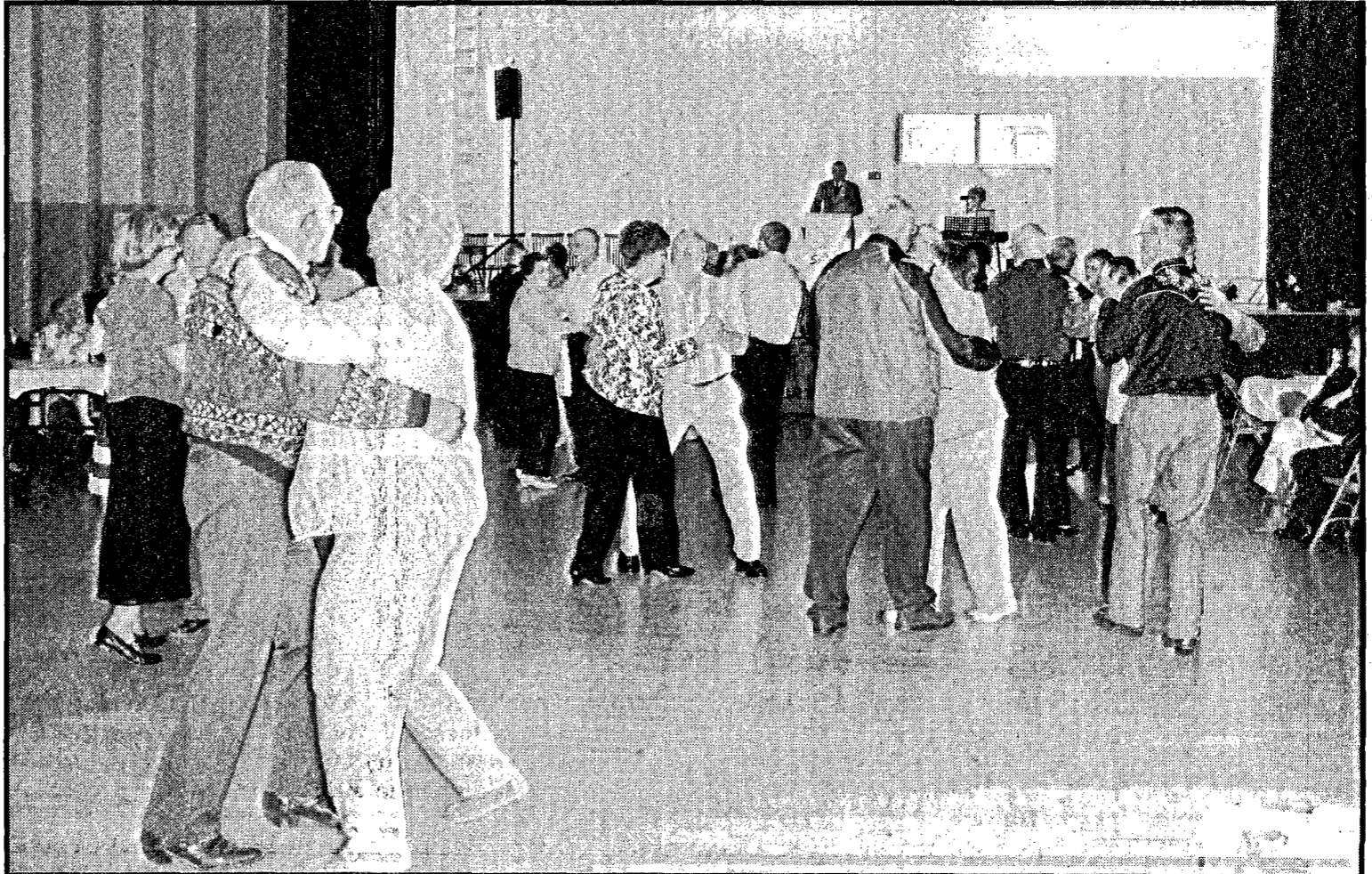

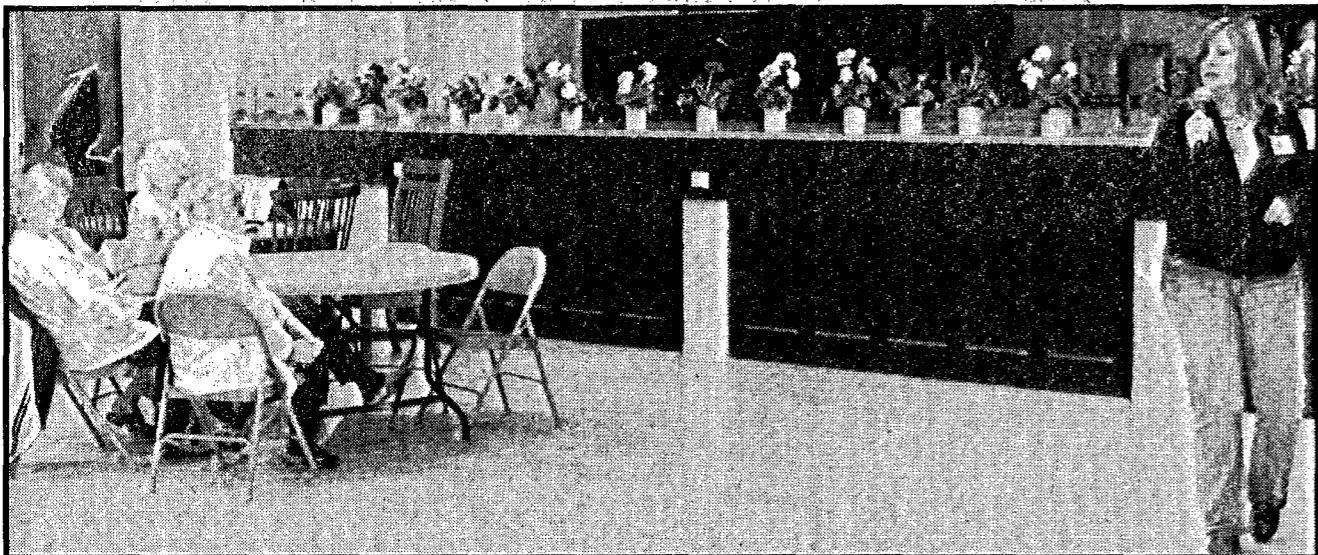

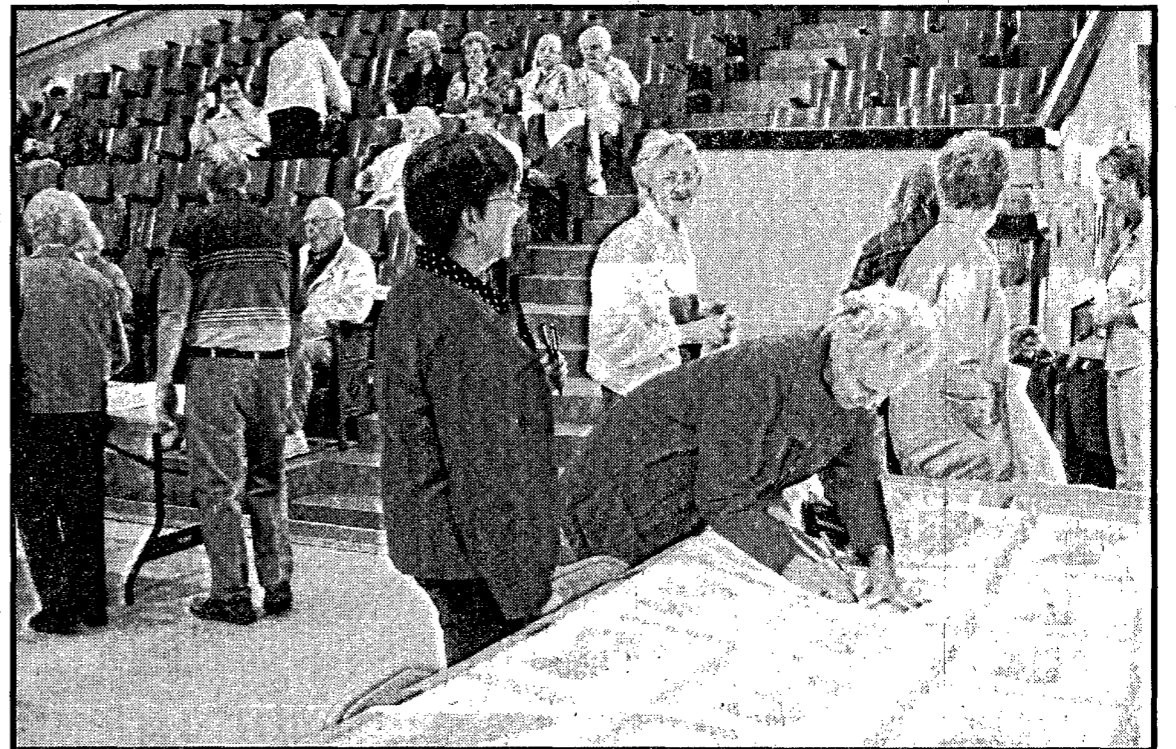

If a couple has a strong relationship they can handle conflict and negotiate to resolve the problems without destroying their relationship. In fact, some

couples who argue often have a strong relationship if they do not demean the other person.

As parents, couples need to come together in disciplining and raising children. Parents serve as their children's role models for conflict. Children can learn to disagree or to fight fairly by watching their parents. Parents should take the time to look at both sides, cool down and avoid using the children purposefully to be an audience during a heated argument.

Parents should avoid devaluing or attacking one another by calling each other names or bringing up past issues. It may be hard, but during conflict one should stick to the facts of the issue without bringing their personality into it. Placing children in the middle of an argument will confuse them. If the conflict is about the children, it should be private.

It is important to work through the issues. There are some intense issues and some insignificant; one must choose battles carefully. An important tool in resolving conflict is listening to each other. It is human nature for one to want things their own way, and it is a major reason for most conflict. Listening allows couples to learn more about the other and, possibly, themselves.

Some issues may be unresolvable, but a couple can still have a loving relationship. A couple who feels their conflict is out of control

may benefit by visiting with a therapist or counselor.

Love and mutual respect between partners is important in working together to resolve conflict. For parents, working as a team when it comes to issues about children can help avoid conflict.

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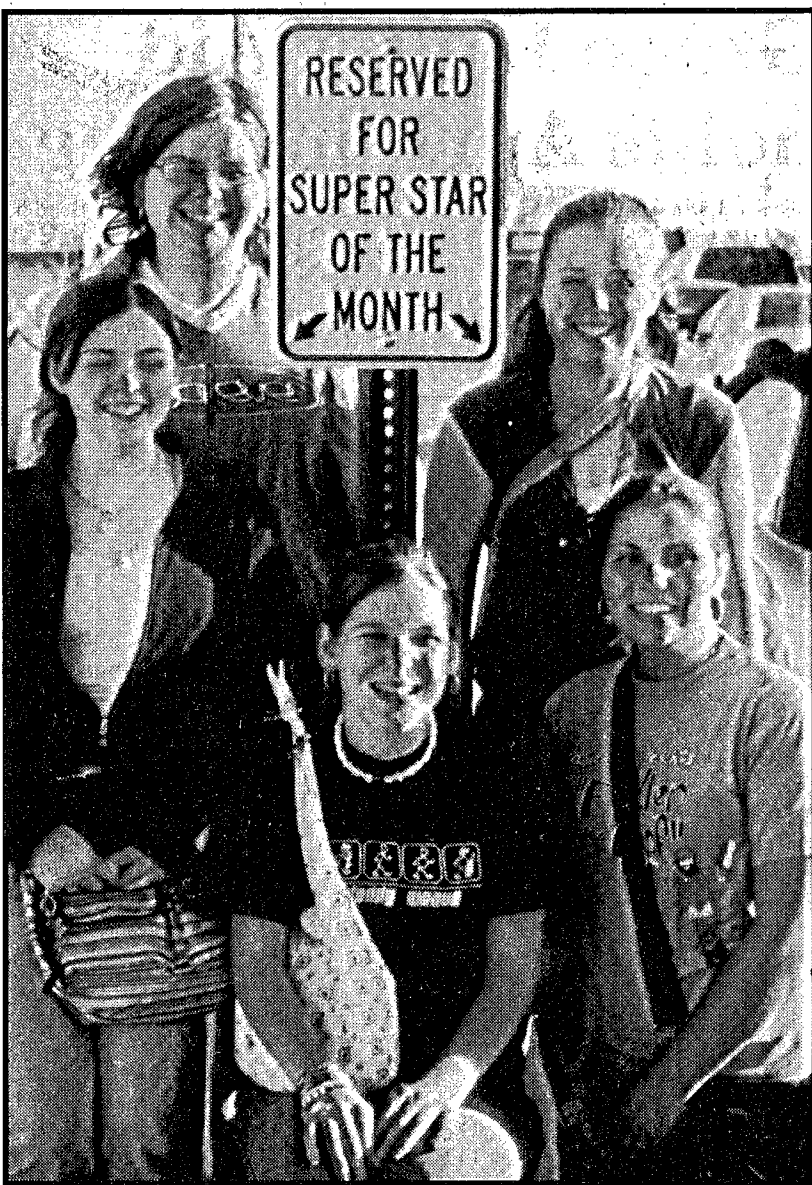

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Lower Elkhorn NRD promotes Arbor Day with tree sales

This year we celebrate the 134th Anniversary of Arbor Day. We traditionally celebrate Arbor Day on the last Friday in April. This year Arbor Day will be celebrated on April 28.

J. Sterling Morton, the founder of Arbor Day, once said that "The cultivation of flowers and trees is the cultivation of the good, the beautiful, and the ennobling in man, and for one, I wish to see this culture become universal." Morton proposed to the Nebraska State Board of Agriculture "to set aside one day to plant trees, both forest and fruit." The State Board of Agriculture accepted this resolution in 1872 and the first "Arbor Day" was celebrated with more than 1,000,000 trees being planted on that day. Sterling's idea of Arbor Day, "A day set aside each year to plant trees, both flower and fruit" is celebrated each year throughout the United States and in many other countries around the world as well.

Being the birth state of Arbor Day, it's only appropriate that the Lower Elkhorn Natural Resources District (LENRD) promotes tree-planting programs each year. To celebrate the 134th Anniversary of Arbor Day the LENRD will be making seedlings available to the public. Species and inventory are limited; however, the LENRD will try to have as many seedlings available as possible for those who want to plant a tree on Arbor Day. Those interested in purchasing trees on Arbor Day should go to Maskenthine Lake Recreation Area to the LENRD Tree Distribution Center, north of Stanton. From Norfolk, the lake is located 10 miles east on highway 275 and then two miles south on Ridge Road. Signs will direct you to the trees.

J. Sterling Morton said that "Other holidays repose on the past; Arbor Day proposes the future." LENRD Assistant General Manager Ken Berney said, "Plant a tree for the future. Our parents did it for us we should return the favor and do it for our children and grandchildren."

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Attorney General Bruning reacts as Supreme Court refuses to hear cases

Attorney General Jon Bruning said he is pleased the United States Supreme Court has refused to accept the two remaining appeals that deal with how the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers manages the flow of the Missouri River.

"This is a win for all of Nebraska's interests, including the environment. The end of litigation gives us a long-overdue resolution of conflict in the Basin. Now, we need to shift our focus to come up with long term solutions," Bruning said.

The Supreme Court's decision validates the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers' new Master Manual for operations of the Missouri River system.

Nebraska receives more than \$500 million in annual economic benefits from power production, water supply, flood control, navigation and recreation. Each benefit depends on the flow from the Missouri River.

"The court's decision allows us to maintain our level of economic benefits, yet address the needs of endangered species," Bruning said.

The Eighth U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals previously ruled to uphold the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service's proposal and the Corps' plan for operations, which are based on a proposal made by Nebraska in 2003.

Observe Arbor Day - plant a tree

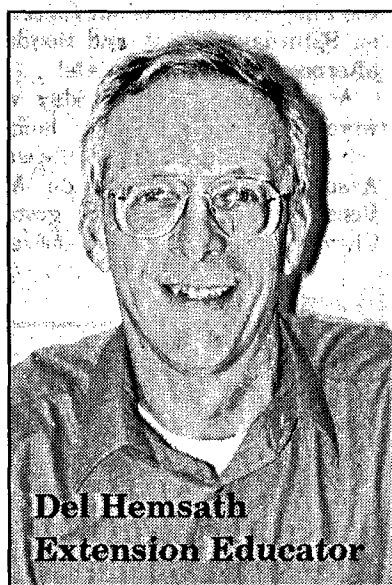
Nebraska is well known for being the "Tree Planting State", the state that started Arbor Day and is known as the home of Arbor Day. Since the inception of Arbor Day on April 10, 1872, all 50 states have an Arbor Day observance as well as many overseas countries.

Tree planting is more than a one day event as the planting season can span from early spring, as soon as the soil thaws out, until fall, or until the soil freezes. Planting a tree is important to help increase the number and diversity of species but is only the first step.

Follow-up activities include watering of the tree on a daily basis with about one gallon of water for the smaller trees.

Mulching is very critical and needs to be provided as soon as the tree is planted. Mulch keeps the soil moist, roots cool and prevents weeds from competing with the tree.

Protection of the tree stem or trunk needs to be provided during the winter to keep rabbits and deer

windy site or high foot traffic area like a park or walking trail. If the tree needs to be held in place, the best material to use is lawn chair webbing. This provides a wide and soft material that will degrade over a couple of years and break as the tree moves in the wind.

The last other item that needs to be done is to prune the tree from year two to five to remove any dead, diseased, or crossing branches in order to have the best looking tree for the space provided.

Arbor Day provides the first step in getting a plant started for future generations to enjoy. Participate in Arbor Day observances sponsored at your local school or local community tree board activities.

The best time to plant a tree was yesterday, so if you have the space, why not plant a tree on Arbor Day in 2006.

Outstanding faculty and staff were also honored at the convocations.


