Commissioners approve local health department's request to apply for grant

Wayne County Commissioners met on Tuesday at the courthouse in Wayne. Agenda items included a request from Kelly Heithold of Northeast Nebraska Public Health Department (NNPHD) to pass a resolution so their agency can apply for a one year grant.

The grant they want to apply for is for up to \$50,000 and is from the Nebraska Children & Family Foundation. If received, the grant will be used for substance abuse prevention. Commissioners gave their approval but told her that it is their policy that when grants run out, the requests, which should be from 8 a.m. to 5 county doesn't take over giving the funding.

Heithold also noted that NNPHD will be giving a Pandemic Flu presentation this

Friday from 11 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. at the fire department in Wayne. The presentation is for the community and will cover what the Pandemic Flu is and why we should be concerned about the possibly of it spreading to our area.

Bud Neel, who works in maintenance at the courthouse, discussed the elevator maintenance agreement from the KONE Company, which is costing around \$3,000 yearly. He noted if they went to quarterly payments, there is a discount, but the payment needs to be made in advance.

Neel also voiced several concerns with maintenance contract: service the p.m. or else it costs extra. Also, the indemnity clause, which he feels the county


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

Surrounded by model trains of every size and scale, one would think the 1979 Wayne High graduate would have one of the best jobs in the world.



Seat belt usage being encouraged


The Nebraska State Patrol joins the Nebraska Office of Highway Safety (NOHS) in an effort to emphasize seat belt usage through two mobilization efforts. "Buckle Up in Your Truck," runs from Sunday, May 7 through Saturday, May 13, while the nationwide "Click It or Ticket" mobilization will take place May 22- June 4.

The biggest factor in preventing death or serious injury in a motor vehicle crash is the proper use of seat belts and child restraints. Statistics from NOHS show during the past six years, only five of 74 pickup truck drivers involved in fatal crashes were using seat belts.

"Last year 20 people lost their lives in roll-over crashes involving pickup trucks," said Colonel Bryan Tuma, Superintendent of the Nebraska State Patrol. "Of those 20 fatalities only three were wearing seat belts. That number is too high. We want pickup truck drivers and all drivers to realize buckling

Just say "Ernie."

If the conversation involves government, anyone with more than a passing interest in the subject understands the reference to Senator Ernie Chambers of Omaha.

The fiery orator has been the most consistent darling or devil (choose one) of legislative observers for better than three decades.

The only black member of the Unicameral, Chambers describes himself as a champion of the downtrodden.

There are those who believe voter approval of term limits on Nebraska legislators was bolstered mightily by those who just can't stand Ernie. A master of procedural rules, he has sometimes brought the Legislature to a virtual halt as he opposed one thing or another.

Chambers will be "term limited out" of the Legislature in a couple of years.

What next? Although he came no where close a commitment, Chambers recently said he just might run against Douglas County Commissioner Chris Rodgers in a couple of years.

Rodgers is opposed to a law, championed into enactment by Chambers, dividing the Omaha Public Schools district into three smaller, independent entities.

The view from here: If Chambers is ever elected to a local office, news from Omaha will be of markedly increased interest to lots of folk in small-town Nebraska. Chambers has entertained and/or outraged folks - some of them grateful and some of them hateful - to the point of iconic status. Lots of them will still have an interest in what "Ernie" says and does.

I'm not spending a lot of money, and the theme of my campaign is 'reality,' and what choices Nebraska has to make."


technology. The critical issues expressed to date are cost of operation, odor. reduction, location, future EPA requirements for waste water and expandability in case a new industry is located here.

A committee of citizens, city staff and elected officials has been appointed to work on this project. **Main Street Project**

The water main is being laid and covered. The contractor will dig in the water service lines to the buildings later when the new water main is tested and passes inspection.

It is easier and safer to dig the service lines in separately than having two sets of water line. trenches open.




Conference on meth was an 'eye opener'

Wayne Police Chief Lance Webster and several other people from the Wayne area, representing the Northeast Nebraska Public Health Department and the Wayne County Foster Care Review Board recently attended a conference in Norfolk that dealt with the significant negative effects methamphet amine has on children.

Webster said the conference dealt with the physiological effects children caused o'n by Methamphetamine labs. He noted it is not unusual for children to be present in homes where Methamphetamine is manufactured and/or sold. The long term effects on the development of child dren exposed to Methamphetamine addicted parents is stagger ing, and costly. One problem often seen is that parents who are addicted to Methamphetamine very often forgo their children in an effort to get more Meth. Statistics bear out that children raised by meth users are very likely to be abused and neglected. The positive aspect of the conference was the concept of community coalitions being developed to combat the use of meth. Webster said the cost of prevention is \$1 compared to \$14 per person incarcerated.

Following high school graduation, Swanson attended Wayne State College for one year and transferred to the University of Nebraska-Lincoln to study journalism and English.

Swanson soon developed his interest in photography and completed his education at Woodland School of Photography in West Virginia.

His first job out of college was as a photographic copy and restoration specialist at a lab in Lexington, Kentucky.

"It was interesting work, but it didn't demand much creativity," Swanson recalled. "I quit and moved home to Nebraska and pondered what to do with my life."

He put his journalism skills to use as a Wayne County correspondent for the Norfolk Daily News. Swanson joined the paper as a fulltime reporter in 1986.

He still credits his five-years of experience of working for a daily newspaper as a foundation for his job today.

"Good reporting in any form book, magazine or newspaper requires balance, judgement and the human side of railroading. an appreciation for solid facts. It

was there I learned these skills Railroading," gave Swanson an which help me every day in my work," Swanson said.

Swanson, a lifelong fan of railroads and model trains, got his opportunity to take his career to the next level in 1991 when he was offered a job in Milwaukee as editor of Passenger Train Journal, a publication produced by another company in that city.

He accepted the job, got married, bought a house and started a fami-







The Wayne State College athletic department recognized its top student-athletes for the 2005-06 school year on April 30 during its annual athletic honors banquet held at the WSC Student Center.

A dedication ceremony was also held to name the baseball and softball complex in honor of the late Pete Chapman.

The ceremony was moved indoors due to the cancellation of Sunday's NSIC baseball doubleheader with Northern State at Wayne State.

The Pete Chapman Baseball/Softball Complex honors the first full-time athletic director at Wayne State, who served 17 seasons at the school. Chapman was instrumental in Wayne State's acceptance into NCAA Division II in 1989 and the Northern Sun Conference in 1999.

Chapman died in 2003 at the

age of 53 following a lengthy battle with cancer.

Seven major awards were handed out at Sunday evening's athletic banquet as baseball player Dustin Jones was named the Male Athlete of the Year, while basketball player Nicole Gruntorad received the Female Athlete of the Year Award.

The Male Freshman Athlete of the Year was given to baseball standout Vicente Cafaro, while the Female Freshman Athlete of the Year went to basketball player Kylee McGill.

The second annual Wildcat Inspiration Award was given to Cody Gregory from the men's track and field team.

In addition, senior basketball players Ashley Arndorfer and Dusty Smith received the Bob Scholar-Athlete Cunningham Awards.

The Cunningham Awards,

named after longtime supporter Bob Cunningham, are presented to the department's top male and female scholar athletes.

A brief summary of the athletes honored include:

Jones, a junior from Dakota Dunes, S.D., is just 20 hits shy of becoming the all-time hits leader in WSC baseball history with one full season left to play. He has played on two NSIC championship teams and two NCAA regional clubs and was named the MVP of the 2005 NSIC Baseball Tournament. This season, he leads the NSIC with a .414 batting average and also ranks first in hits (65), stolen bases (19) and plate



Rudloff is the fifth player to sign with Wayne State in the 2006 recruiting class.





Last year, Jacobsen served as a student representative on the **Biology Faculty Search Committee.** He is also a member of the WSC Chapter of Association for Computing Machinery.

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



Spring is here again. This means er, the oil will come over the top, that we can be outside to do some of our cooking. There are some precautions that we should be aware of while we are grilling, cooking over an open fire, or using the turkey cooker that we got for Christmas.

Let's talk about the grill, whether it is gas or charcoal. Both of these devices create a lot of heat, therefore they must be used in the open areas of our yard. They should not be used on a wooden deck, or on a porch, and not under an overhang. When lighting a charcoal grill, use enough starting fluid to start the charcoal. Never put starting fluid on a smoldering or burning charcoal fire base. When the dinner is cooked, either allow Looking for the grill to sit where it is, or put the charcoal fire out with water. In correspondents either case, don't move the grill till it is cool.



Information shared on establishing grasses

Many areas around homes, acreages, and farms are good sites to put some native grasses. Native grasses, both tall and short, have a desirable appearance both in the summer and in winter.

Buffalo grass can be started in an area where you still want a shorter grass that after establishment would need little mowing and no irrigation. Tall native grasses like big bluestem, switchgrass and Indiangrass can be great for areas near streams or drainages, Walking in well established tall native grasses can give you the feeling of what it might have been like to walk east of the Mississippi into the seemingly endless prairie. Whatever your desire for native grass planting, establishment can be a bit challenging. **Preparing the Site**

It is essential to manage weeds and erosion before, during and after planting grasses. In general, weeds are controlled with chemicals, mowing, or hand picking. An effective approach is to plant Roundup Ready soybeans the year before the grass buffer is installed. Although soybeans don't provide as much residue as corn, grass can be easily planted into the residue. Weed control can be improved by using a glyphosate herbicide the year before grass planting.

Seeding. Seeding of warm season grasses takes place in late May or June. Broadcasting involves spreading seeds on the ground and then incorporating them with light Mechanical drilling tillage. involves inserting the seed directly in the ground at a uniform depth. Drilling provides more accurate seed placement and is the preferred method. One common reason for grass establishment failure is placing the seed too deep in the ground. A drill can ensure that the seeds are placed only 1/4- to 1/2inch deep. The mechanical drill does three things: 1) cuts and handles the residue, leaving some on the ground during planting for erosion control; 2) inserts the seed 1/4to 1/2-inch deep; and 3) covers the seed to ensure seed-soil contact.

Seed sizes and weights vary



bluestem are fluffy seeds and switchgrass is a small smooth seed. If you want to plant these seeds, it can be done correctly with a drill. Indiangrass and big bluestem fluffy seeds need to be metered by a finger-type mechanism. The switchgrass smooth seeds need to be metered by a fluted-type mechanism. Calibrate the drill for each type of seed before use to ensure that the metering mechanisms are releasing the right amount of seed. In some areas, drills may be rented from your local Pheasants Forever chapter or your Natural Resources District (NRD).

Post Planting. Buffalograss can be watered similar to establishment of cool season grasses, keeping the soil moist during the first few weeks to months. The primary postplanting concern in grass planting is weed control. Use mowing or herbicides to control weeds. If weed pressure is high, mowing or shredding may help, but to protect wildlife, grasses should remain at least six inches tall after mowing. Use the proper herbicide for the weed species you are trying to control, and note that warm season , \$65 to \$70. grasses require different herbicides than cool season grasses. Check herbicide label restrictions for use near water and other plants.
