

'In Wayne' project update presented

Scott Brummond, Project manager for the Highway 15 "In Wayne" project has provided the following update of work completed in the last week and work to be completed within the next week.

"As always, the description of future work is weather permitting and can change," Brummond cautioned.

Work completed includes:

Last Wednesday through Friday, May 12:

Janssen noted he was at the last meeting of Northeast Nebraska Public Health Dept. where the topic was discussed to see if surrounding counties would be interested in going together and have one person fill this position. Phil Lorenzen of Kirkpatrick Pettis was present to give commissioners his findings on jail feasibility. He noted that having a jail can be positive financially but it has to be well thought out and the revenue source needs to be decided, if it can support itself or if it needs tax support or both. He said in this case, it looks like there's not enough prisoners locally to support a facility so would have to also look at regional sup-

Lorenzen found the city and county show expansion in economic base. The population is growing moderately. The report showed growth in arrest pattern. To that comment, Janssen noted there are more officers, so it would reflect number of


Lorenzen said the study was not strong on detail of budget so he would like to see a breakdown on how dollars are spent. Lorensen said his study showed there's a strong tax base locally and with the city's aggressive attitude on having a jail, he feels the city and county should work together. He would like to see a committee setting with an upcoming meeting. Lorensen feels there's merit in a regional setting and if Cuming County is looking at putting up a regional facility, then maybe it should be here rather than there.


Kelvin Wurdeman, commissioner, said when thinking regional, you can't expect each county to give money to another county and have a facility built there.



He noted, the general election in November is too soon to try to put it on the ballot so there's time to check into things. He suggested that he could put together questions as more data is needed and then a group meeting could be put

Minnie Rice, widow of former Wayne State President, dies at 103

Minnie Caress was born May 27, 1902 at Gandy, Neb., and grew up in the central Nebraska town of Overton, where she graduated from high school. One of three children, Mrs. Rice said education was very important to her parents.

"My mother decided the day I was born that I was going to college," she once told a

She received a bachelor of arts degree with a major in mathematics from Grand Island College, a Baptist college that closed a number of years ago. She once recalled that her first year's college education was paid with S & H green stamps that her mother had saved.

Minnie and John D. Rice, whom she met at Grand Island College, were married on Aug. 1, 1926. They were parents of a son, John David, Jr., who died in 1995.

John Rice was superintendent of schools in the Nebraska towns of Holbrook, Arapahoe, Superior, Glenvil and Kearney,

president of Wayne State College from schools in Aberdeen, S.D. when he was 1951-56, died May 12 at Providence hired as president of Wayne State Medical Center in Wayne following a short Teachers College, as it was then called, in

In 1958, she received a master of science degree in education from Wayne State and was named assistant professor of English. She taught English at Wayne State until July 1, 1970, when she retired.

> Throughout her life, Mrs. Rice maintained an avid interest in many things. She was a member of Delta Kappa Gamma, an education honorary; the Minerva Club, a literature club; the Cameo Club; and helped organize the Wayne State Faculty Wives organization in September 1955. She loved playing bridge and golf, and until her early 90's could be found at the Wayne Country Club on Tuesdays, playing golf in the morning, having lunch with friends, and playing bridge in the afternoon. She traveled extensively, visiting Europe, Egypt and Alaska among many other destinations. She was a mem-





Loss for Osborne 'hurts'

Osborne announced he would run for governor, the odds for him were so good that in Las Vegas he would have been considered "off the

That means he was such a lopsided favorite that no right-thinking bookie would have put up money against him.

When Tuesday's voting ended, Governor Dave Heineman had won convincingly.

Not only had the iconic one-time NU football coach lost, his ignominious defeat came on his home

The enormous Big 3rd had elected Osborne to three consecutive terms in the House. Now, it had rejected him.

Heineman was conciliatory and reserved. He praised Osborne, and every other Republican candidate or worker within range of his microphone.

Osborne was reserved, even more than usual, when he conceded

"Losing the last one hurts," he

It no doubt hurt especially much,

since the defeat came "at home." Heineman's margin of victory was made secure by his win in the 3rd District.

Osborne, 69, said he didn't know what he would do when his Congressional term expired - but he said he would not retire.

It wouldn't be unfair to say that in the political game, he didn't have the killer instinct.

Just do your job, don't worry about the things you can't control, and be ready in the fourth quarter. That was his motto in football as well as politics.

In his last political game, Osborne got thrashed in the final period.

His statements on major issues were vague. He seemed always to be returning to them, to clarify

some point or another.

But when Osborne walked out of the big room where his supporters had gathered, he showed his true

There was Osborne, standing on the sideline, with an aide beside him. The pass intended to secure the win bounced on the ground as he watched.

Tuesday night he was standing beside his wife, Nancy; she had been an aide in countless ways.

One last person had to stop Osborne for a greeting. As that person walked away, the legendary coach looked down at his wife. Then he looked up, straight faced but visibly tired, and he mouthed the word.

"Okay," he said. Then he walked out the door, and into another life.



Nebraska ranks among best states in school technology access

Nebraska has been named a Christensen. technology leader when it comes to providing students access to computers, training teachers in technology use and for its policies encouraging the innovative use of technology.

Nebraska was ranked 10th overall nationally, receiving a B grade from Education Week, a national publication that released its study May 4. Two of the top 10 states received an A and the other 8 states received a B.

"We're pleased with the recognition our state and our schools received. Nebraska has focused on technology and worked to assure that our students have access wherever they live. We also have worked hard to make our reports on student achievement useful to schools as they work to continuously improve," said Nebraska Education Commissioner Doug

The study showed that Nebraska schools provide one computer with high speed internet access for every three students and one internet-connected computer in classrooms for every 6.5 students. Nebraska also was recognized for including technology in its state standards for what students,

"It will be hard for our state to move forward in areas where we were rated low such as the instructional options of virtual schools and classes without a statewide infra-

teacher and administrators should

know.

structure to provide equitable access and without state level equity-based funding," Christensen said.

Nebraska also was noted as one of nine states that require teachers to complete technology coursework before they receive a license to teach. Thirty states have no requirements and 11 require both coursework and a test.




serious cold blooded killers.



Wayne State College baseball and men's track teams win Northern Sun titles

Even though Concordia-St. Paul gave Wayne State everything it had, the Golden Bears' effort came up short.

WSC won its fourth consecutive Northern Sun Intercollegiate Conference baseball title with a convincing 22-7 victory over Concordia on Saturday afternoon at the Pete Chapman Baseball Complex in Wayne.

The win punched the ticket for the Wildcats to advance to the NCAA Central Region Tournament for the third straight season and the fourth time in the last six years.

WSC (37-13-1) will enter the tourney as a No. 4 seed and was to face third-seed Nebraska-Omaha (43-12) at noon on Thursday (today) at Emporia,

The Wildcats earned the conference tourney crown after posting a pair of wins over Concordia and an opening round victory over Southwest Minnesota State.

In the championship game, WSC trailed 2-0 after the opening half of the first inning.

That would be the only time the Golden Bears would hold a lead over the feisty Wildcats.

Wayne State tallied five runs in the first, four in the second and put the game away by scoring 10 runs in the fourth inning when WSC sent 15 batters to the plate and notched seven hits.

Tournament MVP Scott Bidroski had a run-scoring single in the first inning and a two-run single in the second inning to help the Wildcats take momentum

early in the championship game. Vicente Cafaro and Alex Koch each produced two-run singles to highlight the 10-run fourth inning as WSC had seven hits in

the inning. Wayne State finished the game with 19 hits compared to Concordia-St. Paul's 10.

Marc Manganaro was 3 for 5 with a triple, two singles and four RBIs to lead a balanced hitting

Dustin Jones added three hits, going 3 for 5 with four runs scored. Alex Koch also had three hits, going 3 for 6 with two RBIs.

Josh Andersen (8-1), the Most Valuable Pitcher of the Tournament, worked five innings to notch his second win of the tournament. He allowed three runs on four hits with two strikeouts and three walks.

The 22 runs were the most scored by a WSC team in the conference tournament.

WSC vs. Concordia-St. Paul It was a long afternoon and the

WSC outlasted Concordia-St. Paul 14-12 in 11 innings on Friday afternoon in a four hour, five minute marathon in the winner's bracket final in the NSIC











Northeast nursing students pinned in combined ceremony

For only the second time in nursing education history at Northeast Community College in Norfolk, both associate degree nursing and licensed practical nursing students received their nursing pins in a special pinning ceremony last

The ceremony marks the end of the second year of the integrated jursing program at Northeast. Both the associate degree nursing and licensed practical nursing programs now have the same entrance criteria, require many of the same general education courses, and share the first two semesters.

In addition to the pinning ceremony, two associate degree nursing and two practical nursing students were presented the Essence of Nursing Award for their consistent academic effort, caring actions, positive motivation toward classroom learning and clinical experience and professional behaviors.

New CRP or new grass that was established after Jan. 1, must certify you have new grass or no-till crop plantings ALL five years of the pilot program through 2010. Soybeans cannot be planted more than three of the five years in a corn-soybean rotation or the field is ineligible for the carbon pay-

Some spot tillage is allowed to loosen soil of field end rows or to level off areas not to exceed five percent in an individual field. Whole field tillage with discs, field cultivators, chisel plows, one pass tillage tools, etc. would cause the applicant to surrender any payment on that field, plus interest and penalties. All farms are subject to random spot checks.

Nebraska farmers have not been a major player in the CCX exchange with carbon offset payments, thus the need for a pilot work through 2010. To apply for cash payments over the next five years, go to www.saline.unl.edu and click on the carbon payment contract information due the end of June 2006.

Fill out the farm worksheet describing the eligible acres, provide a copy of the FSA farm maps and include FSA form 578 for the 2005 crop year. Forms need to be mailed to Iowa Farm Bureau, 5400 University Avenue, West Des Moines, Iowa 50266 by June 30, 2006. The person that makes the functional day-to-day farm decisions needs to sign the contract.

Farm program deadline nears

"A \$100 is the late fee for not enrolling into the DCP program," said Brian Wolford, State Executive Director for Nebraska's Farm Service Agency (FSA) in Lincoln.

That is what it will cost farmers and ranchers who miss the June 1 cutoff to enroll for 2006 in FSA's flagship farm program, the Direct and Counter-cyclical Payment Program.

Sign up began last October and producers have until the close of business on Thursday, June 1 to sign contracts for the 2006 Direct and Counter-cyclical Payment Program. After that, they will be assessed a late filing fee of \$100 for each farm signed between June

and Sept. 30,2006. "The majority of eligible producers in the state have already signed contracts for the year," said Wolford, but he is trying to encourages the remaining producers to contact their local office. "If producers wait too long, we may not be able to accommodate them before want to to see anyone have to pay a

8100 late fee. The Direct and Counter-cyclical Payment Program provides a safety net for American farmers and ranchers. Producers receive two types of payments, direct and counter-cyclical, based upon their historical acreage base and yields for specific commodities.

Producers receive an annual direct payment for each eligible

crop. They payment equals 85 percent of the farm's base acreage for that crop times the farm's established yield times the payment rate established in the 2002 Farm Bill. These payments are known at the time of signup and have resulted in \$342 million issued to Nebraska producers each year for corn, wheat, soybeans and grain sorghum.

Counter-cyclical payments occur only when the market price for an eligible commodity falls below the target price set in the farm bill. The payment rate for each crop is determined by subtracting its market price (what producers are receiving) from its target price. Counter-cyclical payments are calculated by multiplying the 85 percent of the farm's base acreage times the farm's counter-cyclical payment yield times the payment tenn. which wary not - as of 29184. >> Producers can sign-up online for at http://www.fsa.
