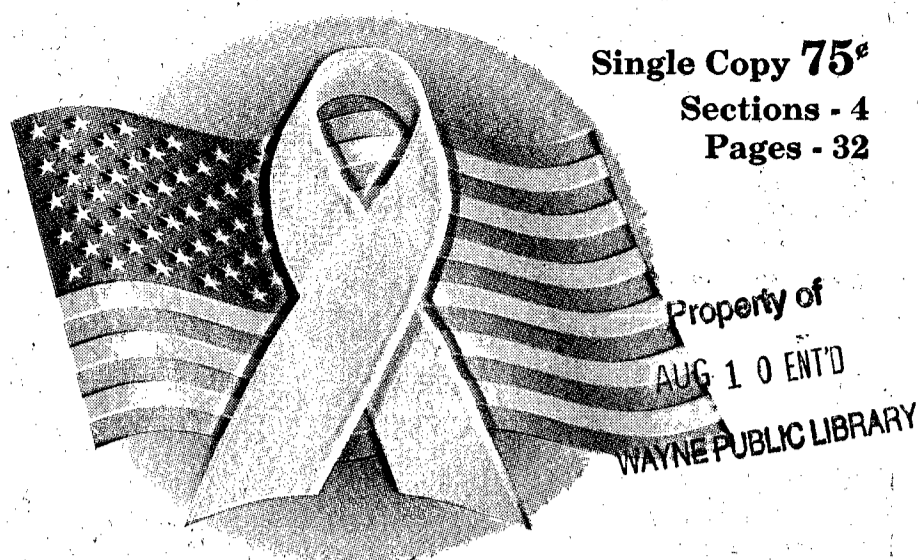

Dirt road cause of concern for neighbors

A dirt street that has recently been installed was the source of considerable debate at Tuesday's meeting of the Wayne City Council.

In question was whether the proper legal channels have been followed and whether the street would impede natural water flow in the area.

The work has been done by R&W Construction to create an additional access to their property.

Property owners in the area were at the council meeting to express their concern about the disrupting of the natural flow of water to Logan Creek and creating a "fish bowl" for the properties in the area.

Lynnette and Mike Sievers, Ron and Jan Brown and Karen McDonald, the property owners who would be affected by the street, all spoke during the meeting and urged the council to have the street removed.

Robert Woehler of R&W Construction noted that the area has been a road "for as long as I can remember" and that he had talked to some of the property owners in the area.

He also stated that the installation of the street was speeded up when the city offered him dirt that was removed during the Main Street Project. He told the council that a 15 inch tube was installed to assist with drainage.

After a lengthy discussion, Council member Verdel Lutt recommended the project be taken back to the beginning and start over.

City Administrator Lowell Johnson told the council the dirt would be removed by the end of this week.

The council also discussed the possibilities of mobile home inspection for fire prevention.

This came about in light of recent deaths in a mobile home fire in Norfolk.

It was noted that inspections need to be voluntary.

Council member Lutt suggested that a service organization, possibly the Wayne County Jaycees take on the providing of smoke detectors to mobile home residents.

The council heard a presentation from Phil Lorenzen on the issuance of \$800,000 in Various Purpose Bonds for work done in Fairway Estates, Country Club Road and Vintage Hill. Lorenzen noted that the city did well in terms of interest rates and com-

mended the city for "a good project."

In other action, the council approved Resolution 2006-57, approving a Use-By-Exception Permit for First National Bank to allow for a kiosk drive-through teller service when the new bank is constructed at 411 East Seventh Street.

Following discussion on which park would benefit most, the council voted to move forward with the purchase of new playground equipment.

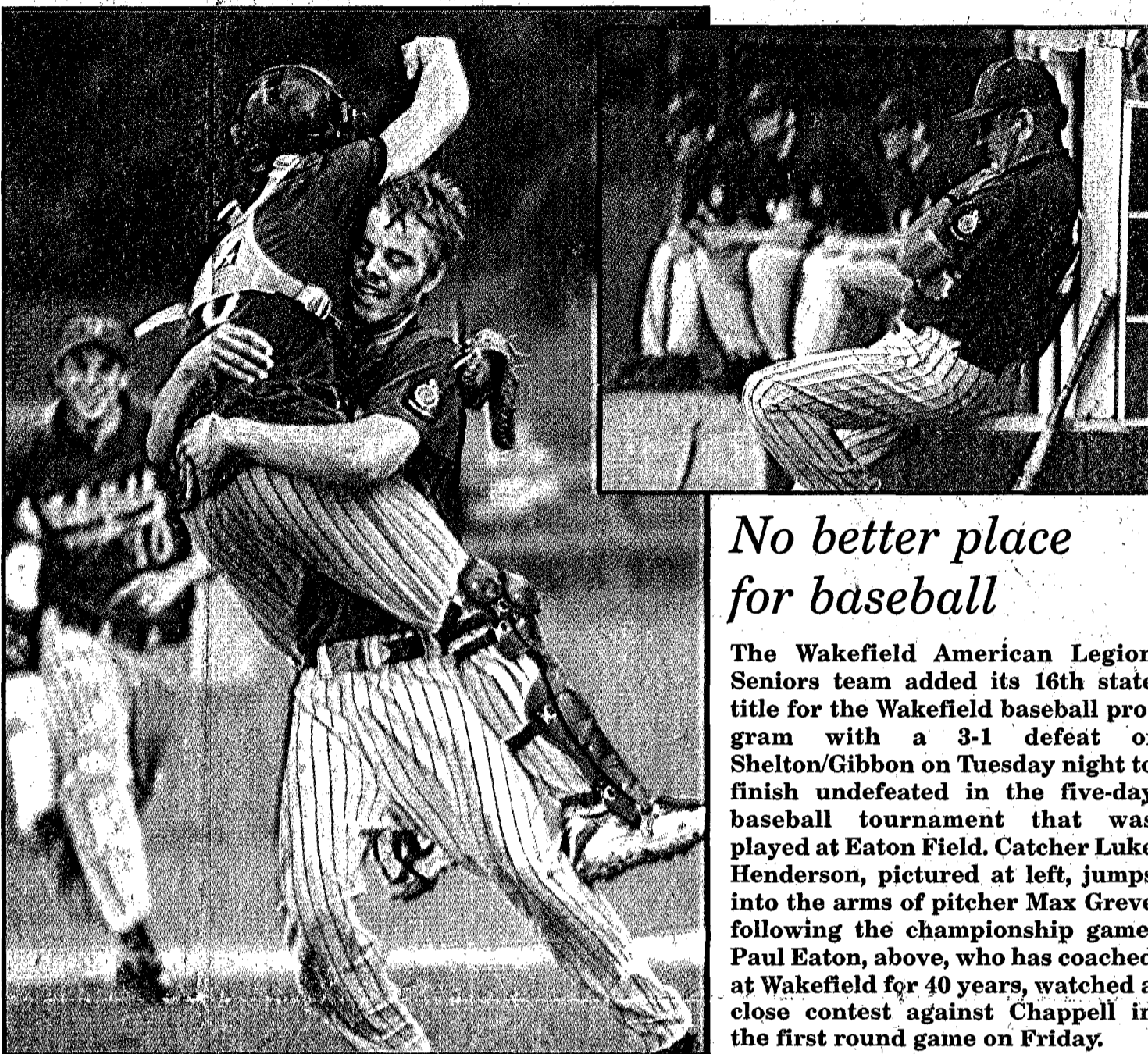
Originally intended for Henry Victor Park, council members felt the new equipment would get more use in one of the city's other parks. Several also felt equipment from one of the other parks could be removed and installed at Henry Victor Park.

The council heard a presentation from Wes Blecke with the Wayne Area Economic Development, Inc. Blecke extended a thank you to the council for their support, both financially and otherwise, since the organization began. He also presented a request for funding for the coming year.

Approval was given to refund an auditorium rental fee for a benefit for Ken and Lorree Dunker which was held Jan. 14. The council also made the stipulation that groups or organizations that conducted benefits could ask for refunds only back as far as Jan. 1, 2006.

The council approved Mayor Lois Shelton's appointments of Mike Grosz to the Recreation and Leisure Commission and Stephanie Hansen to the Planning Commission.

The council will next meet in regular session on Tuesday, Aug. 29 at 7:30 p.m. in council chambers

Support for soldiers can be given through website

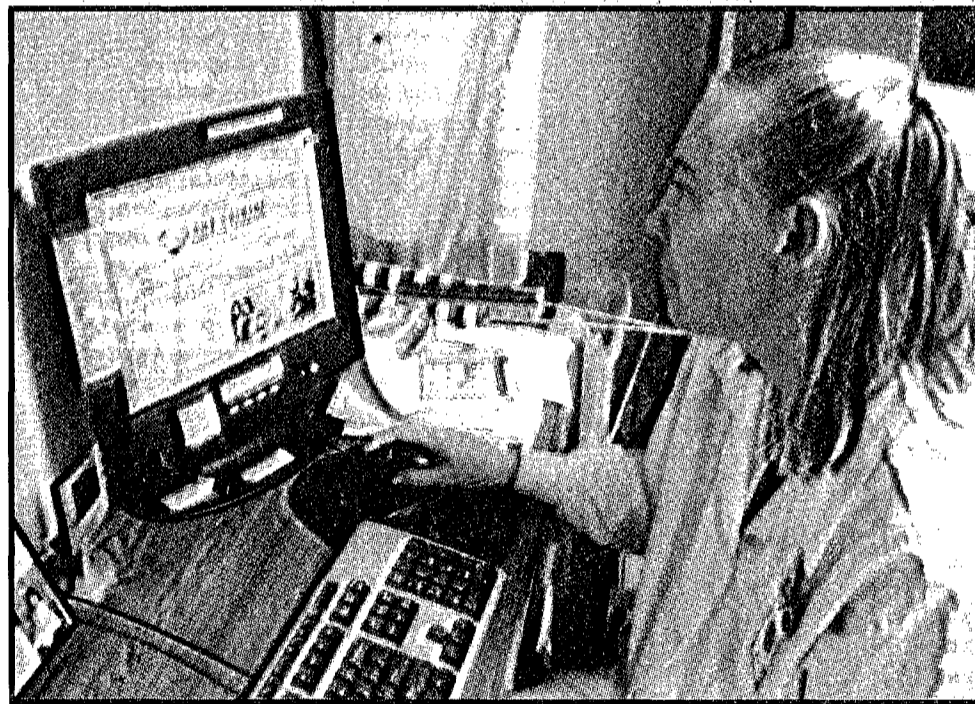
While driving home in July, 2005, Sheila Wieseler of Carroll heard on a Yankton radio station about the website, www.AnySoldier.com, a site to send support to a Soldier in harm's way. Her husband, Mark, was in Iraq and their family was sending him a lot of letters and packages. She thought of other soldiers not so fortunate to have someone and thought finding soldiers on this website to correspond with was a good idea.

She shared her plan with co-workers at the laboratory at Providence Medical

Center in Wayne and they started corresponding with soldiers listed on the site. Wieseler and her co-workers try to send something to a soldier at least once a month. They have sent 25-30 packages. There are a few they have picked out that they write to and one of them is from Omaha. Many of the soldiers just want letters of support, some thank them for sending items.

"On the website, we have found that most of the soldiers are in Iraq and some of them are in Kuwait, Afghanistan and Africa. Once you are on the site, there is a list of names or you can choose someone by branch of service," Wieseler said. "There are restrictions and you have to give your name and address. Some of the soldiers will say what they want, some will give a background or a story. We have found some from the Midwest."

Wieseler added that not all of the soldiers want stuff, many just want support. "There are probably several thousand names on the website," Wieseler said. "Some even put their photos on there." About AnySoldier.com-

'In Wayne' project update presented

Scott Brummond, Project manager for the Highway 15 "In Wayne" project, has provided the following update of work completed in the last week and work to be completed within the next week.

"As always, the description of future work is weather permitting and can change," Brummond cautioned.

Work completed includes:

Wednesday through Saturday, Aug. 4:

- Drained water holes from Wednesday's rain.
- Drying, compacting, and trimming 4" crushed concrete foundation course from Third Street to the north end.
- Set steel dowel bars and longitudinal bars for above concrete pour.
- Graded, formed and poured parallel parking between First and Second Street on the west and between Second Street and Third Street on the west.
- Worked on water main crossing near Fairgrounds Avenue and various storm sewer structures.

Monday, Aug. 7:

- Continued getting ready for mainline pour from Third Street to Seventh Street.
- Graded, formed and poured parallel parking between Second and Third Street on the east.
- Grading for driveways near Carhart Lumber Co.
- Completing the water main crossing at Fairgrounds Avenue and continuing with storm sewer structures.

Tuesday, Aug. 8:

- Paved from just south of Third Street to the alley between Fourth and Fifth Street.

• Continue working on storm sewer structures on side streets.

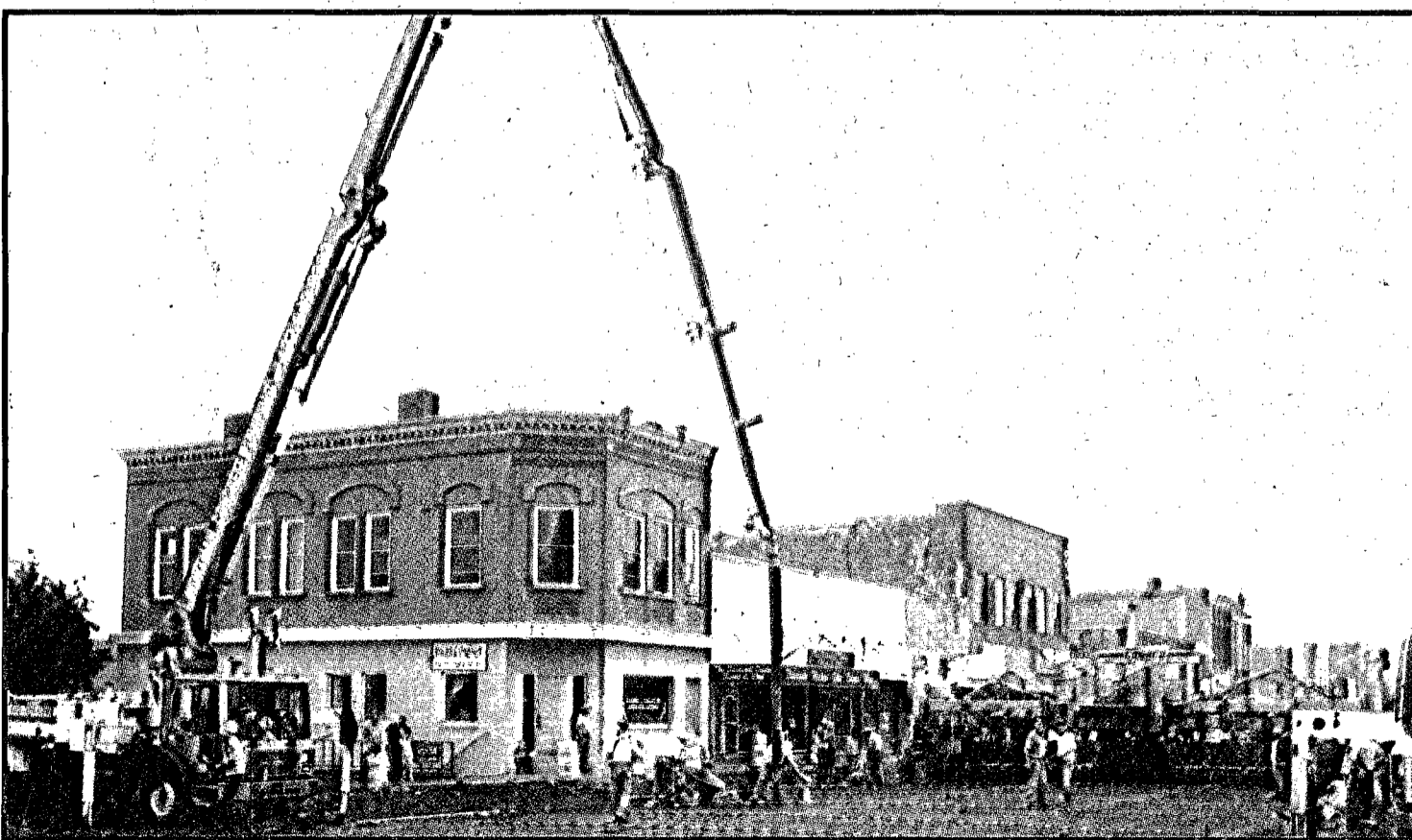
Wednesday, Aug. 9:

- Paving from the alley between Fourth and Fifth Street to just south of Seventh Street.
- Continuing work on storm sewer structures on side streets.

Thursday through Tuesday, Aug. 15:

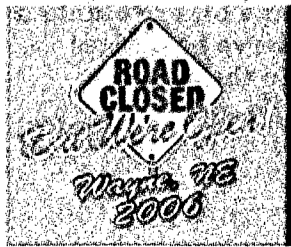
- Complete more parallel parking.
- Complete driveway construction south of 1st Street.
- Begin sidewalk construction tentatively Monday or Tuesday.

NOTE: The Wayne North job Phase #2 work continued the past week with inlets being poured and grading on the West half. Work slowed during in town paving, but will pick up again soon.



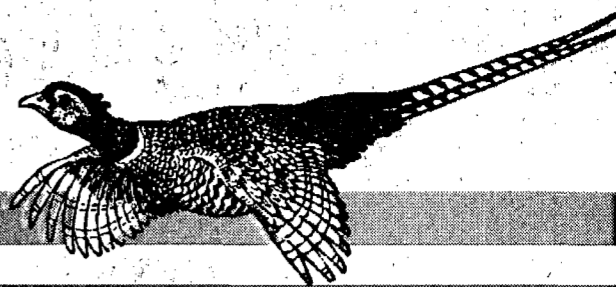
Let the machines roll

Sgt. Joshua Ford, 20, of Pender, Nebraska died on Monday, July 31, 2006 as the result of a roadside bomb attack while serving in Iraq.

Services were held on Thursday, Aug. 10 at St. Mark's Lutheran Church in Pender with the Rev. Margaret Olson officiating.



Josh was born on Sept. 27, 1985 in Pender. He attended Wayne Public Schools in Wayne until his junior and senior year when he attended and graduated from Pender Public Schools. After graduation he attended a semester of college at Wayne State College. He joined the Army National Guard in February of 2003. He enjoyed watching movies, playing games on his computer and the time he spent drawing and painting. He will forever be remembered for his smile, sense of humor and being a very caring and giving individual. He loved being in the 189th and driving the big rigs.

Survivors include his father and step-mother Lonnie and Linda Ford of

Pender; fiancée, Michelle Frohlich of Papillion; sisters Jessica Ford of Wayne, Erin Blaufuss of LaVista and Shawn Ford of Wayne; his nephew William Dyer of Wayne; stepbrother, Jim Burkhead of Dallas, Texas; step-sisters; Katie Burkhead of Wausa, Laura Heise and Megan Heise of Pender; grandmother Ella Petersen of North Bend; step-grandfather Orville Petersen of North Bend; step-grandparents Jim and Maxine Sherlock of Emerson; three uncles, many aunts, many nieces and nephews and his family with the 189th Transportation Company.

He was preceded in death by his grandfather Walter "Bud" Ford Jr., and a step-grandfather Vernon Watt.

Burial with military rites was at the Rosehill Cemetery in Pender. Munderloh Funeral Home in Pender was in charge of arrangements.

Final fossil ID day of the summer to be held Aug. 13

If you missed the first fossil ID day this season, you have another opportunity to bring your rocks and fossils to the Ashfall Fossil Beds State Historical Park to have them identified.

Odd rocks and fossils have a way of accumulating in closets and

boxes in the basement or attic. Curiosity about these "might be treasures" is why we collect them and stash them away. That curiosity can be satisfied by bringing your collected item or items to the park on Sunday, Aug. 13, where Dr. Mike Voorhies will be on hand to tell you what they are.

If you haven't collected any rocks and fossils of your own, you can still watch as Dr. Voorhies identifies them for others. It's always a fun and educational experience to see what people have collected. One of the interesting finds brought into the last ID day was a bison skull snagged on a rod and reel in the Missouri River and a rare mastodon tooth from the Ice Age.

The park is open from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Fossil ID Day and regular admission fees apply.

Soldier's father talks about loss of his son

Lonnie Ford, father of Josh Ford, member of the 189th T.C. who was killed July 31 in Iraq, recently spoke about his son's death at a press conference at Pender High School, where he is a history teacher. He noted when three Nebraska National Guard representatives came to their home that evening, he knew why they were there. He knew his son was gone.

Spc. Joshua Ford, 20, of Pender

was killed when the truck he was driving was hit by an improvised explosive device near the southern Iraq town of An Numaniyah.

Seriously wounded was Spc. Benjamin Marksmeier, 20, of Beemer, who was a passenger in Ford's truck.

Feeling like they needed to tell what happened, Ford and his wife, Linda, drove through the night to

area towns to let family members know what happened.

Ford reflected on his son, noting he enjoyed art and was working on some paintings in Iraq. He had been active in FFA and theater.

Lonnie Ford said Josh had written many emails to his family which includes three sisters. He noted Josh had left an audio will for his friends to hear.

Josh Ford graduated from Pender High School in 2004 and served with the Wayne-based Detachment 1, 189th Transportation Company. Forty-one soldiers from Nebraska or western Iowa have been killed in wars in Iraq and Afghanistan. He enlisted in the 189th in 2003.

A memorial service was held in Iraq on Friday.

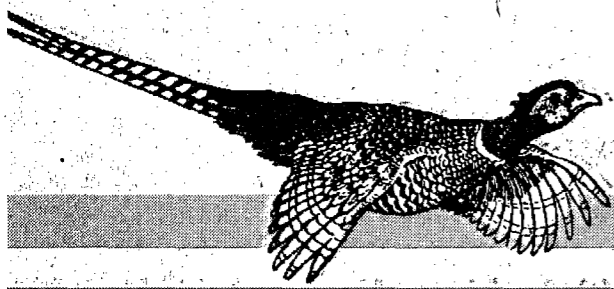

Political advertising often misleading

The television advertising employed by U.S. Senator Ben Nelson and challenger Pete Ricketts has drawn national attention.

An independent organization that specializes in looking into political contests says Republican Ricketts and Democrat Nelson

have both resorted to misleading television spots.

One ploy used by Ricketts has been noticed by some Nebraskans who closely follow politics via their local newspapers.

Politicians have for years used quotes taken from newspaper editorials - the ones that say nice things about them - and included them in their TV advertising campaigns, as well as those placed in local and/or statewide newspapers.

The commercials will often show a quote from a newspaper editorial. Something like:

"Joe Jones is a fine fellow with a proven record of love for puppies, and opposition to the public flogging of Colorado football fans." The *Prairie Times-Gazette*.

Read something like that, and you almost certainly would conclude that the ol' PTG newspaper said those kind words in an editorial.

The Ricketts campaign did something new and, according to FactCheck.org, quite misleading.

Advertising intended to bolster his campaign would display a quo-

tation flattering him, or knocking Nelson, and include a line crediting the quotation to a newspaper.

Something like: "Ben Nelson isn't nice! The *Prairie Times Gazette*."

The misleading part: The flattering or critical quotation wasn't part of an editorial. It was a quote from a Ricketts supporter, or someone else, that happened to appear in a news story that happened to appear in the PTG.

Get it? Any reader might look at such a thing and, based on the traditional use of quotes from newspaper editorials, conclude that the knock on the senator was from the newspaper's management, rather than a Ricketts booster.

Some newspapers around the country, and some broadcasters, are reportedly considering whether such advertisements should be accepted for publication, or airing via television or radio.

For a good many years there has been speculation about whether the U.S. Supreme Court will even-

tually declare use of the electric chair to be unconstitutional.

Nebraska is the only state that relies solely on "the chair" to kill condemned murderers, a fact enhancing the view that the nation's highest court might find it to be unacceptable.

Opponents of the electric chair suffered a loss recently when a panel of the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Eighth Circuit rejected the latest appeal seeking to have that method of execution thrown out.

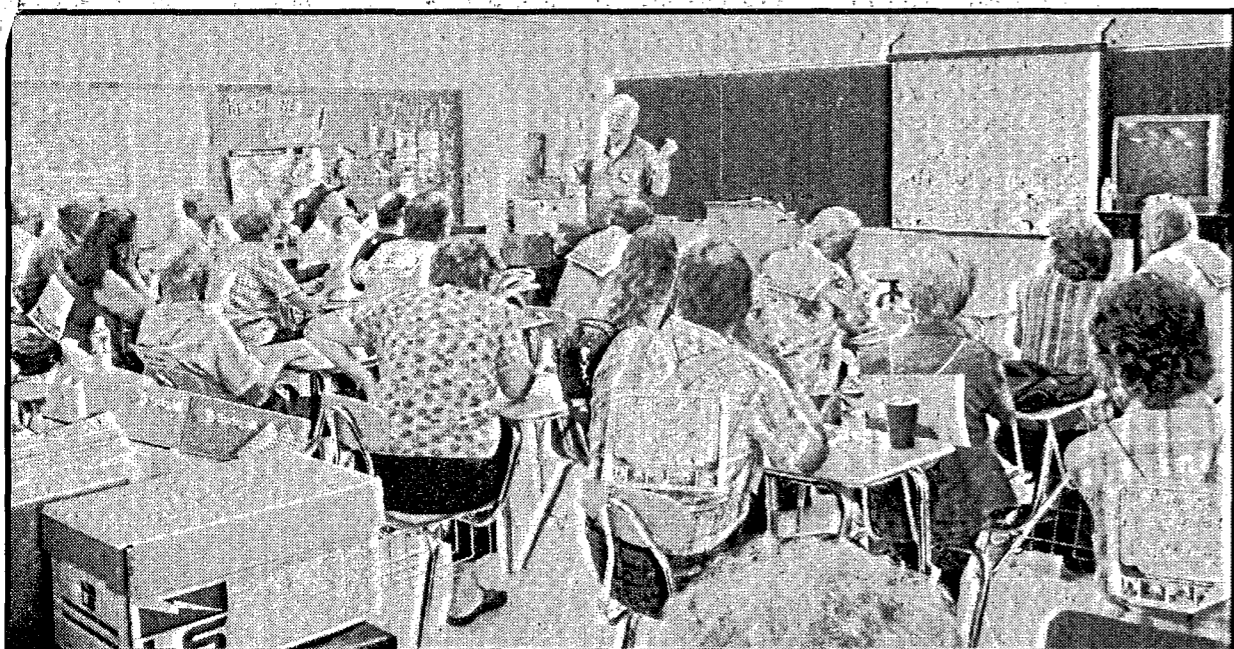
The federal court rejected the appeal on procedural grounds, rather than saying electrocution per se passes constitutional muster.

It is not uncommon for a former state senator to seek some other public office have completing a tour in the Legislature.

The view from here is that Senator Chris Beutler of Lincoln is virtually certain to make a bid to become mayor of Lincoln. Beutler will be term-limited out of the Unicameral when his current term ends in January.

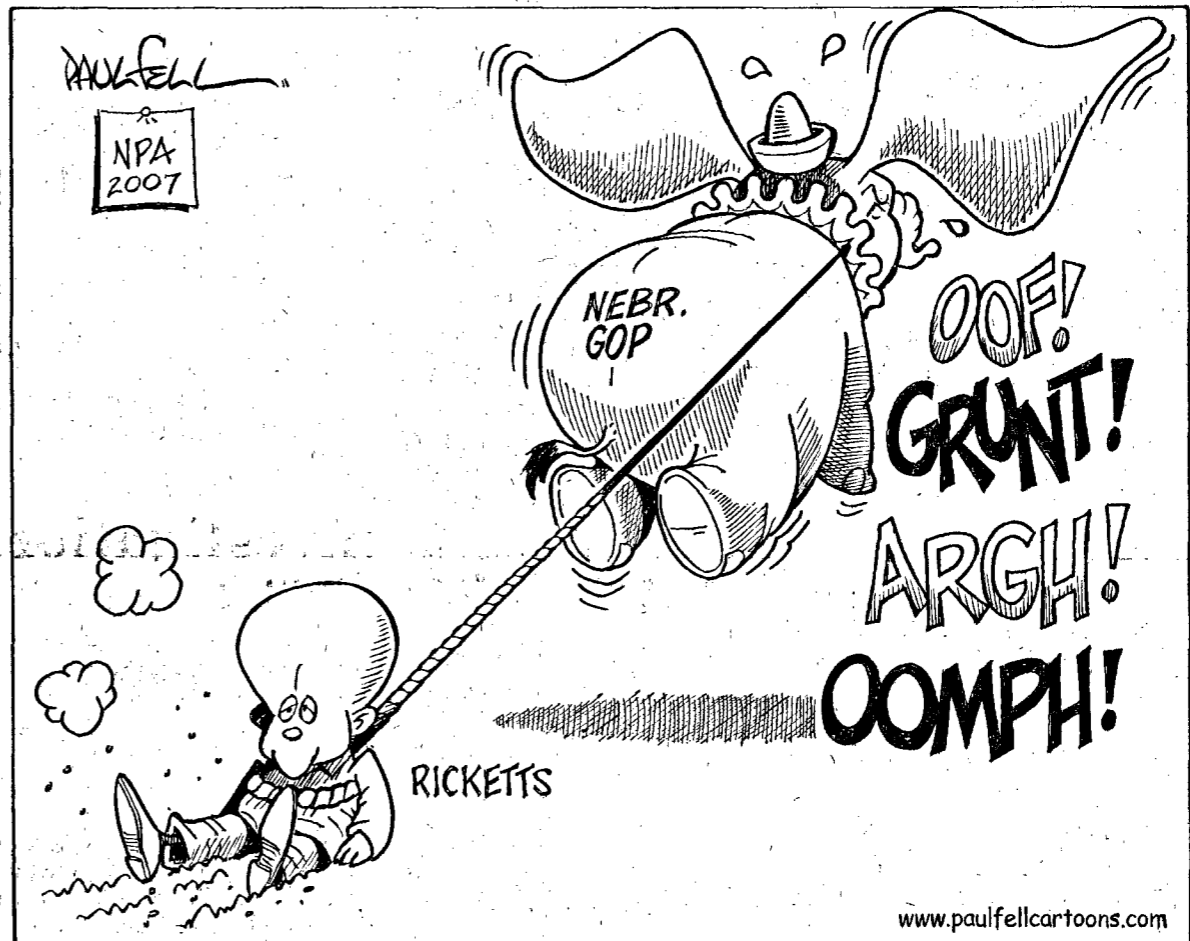
Engel named 'Friend of Agriculture' by Farm Bureau PAC

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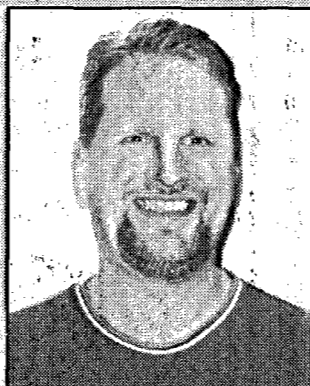

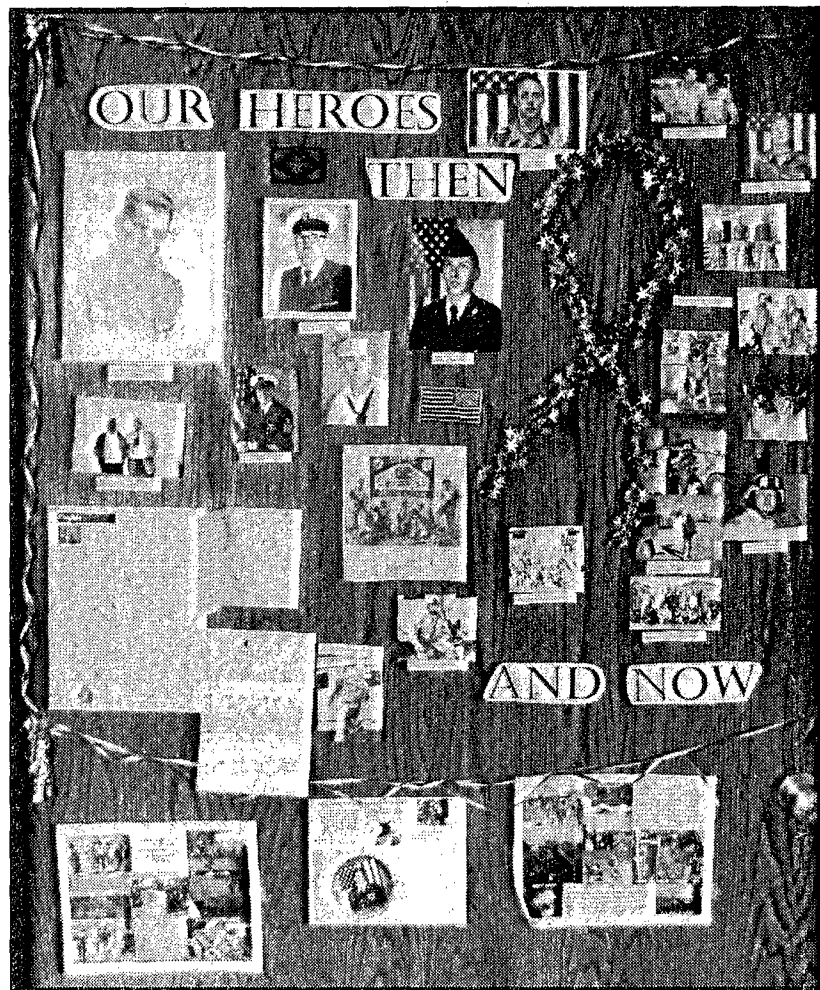
Any Soldier Inc. (www.AnySoldier.com) now helps nearly 100,000 American soldiers in all branches of the military, both active duty and reservists, and has become one of the leading efforts in making sure the men and women who have been deployed for the war are cared for, via letters and packages from "home."

AnySoldier.com features emails from different military personnel regarding the type of support needed in the field. The support could be in the form of a simple letter or package, or it could toiletries, food or even newspapers and magazines. Donors address their letters and packages to the writer's name, but also add the words "ATTN: Any Soldier" on the second line. The writer shares the mail with fellow servicemen and women. If there is "Any Soldier" who is not receiving a lot of mail from home, that soldier will be the first person to receive the letter.

The organization grew through a network of family and friends. When the website launched in 2004, seven soldiers had been added to AnySoldier's contact list. One year later, the list has ballooned to over 3,500 contacts, and the web site has received over 4.5 million visitors from around the

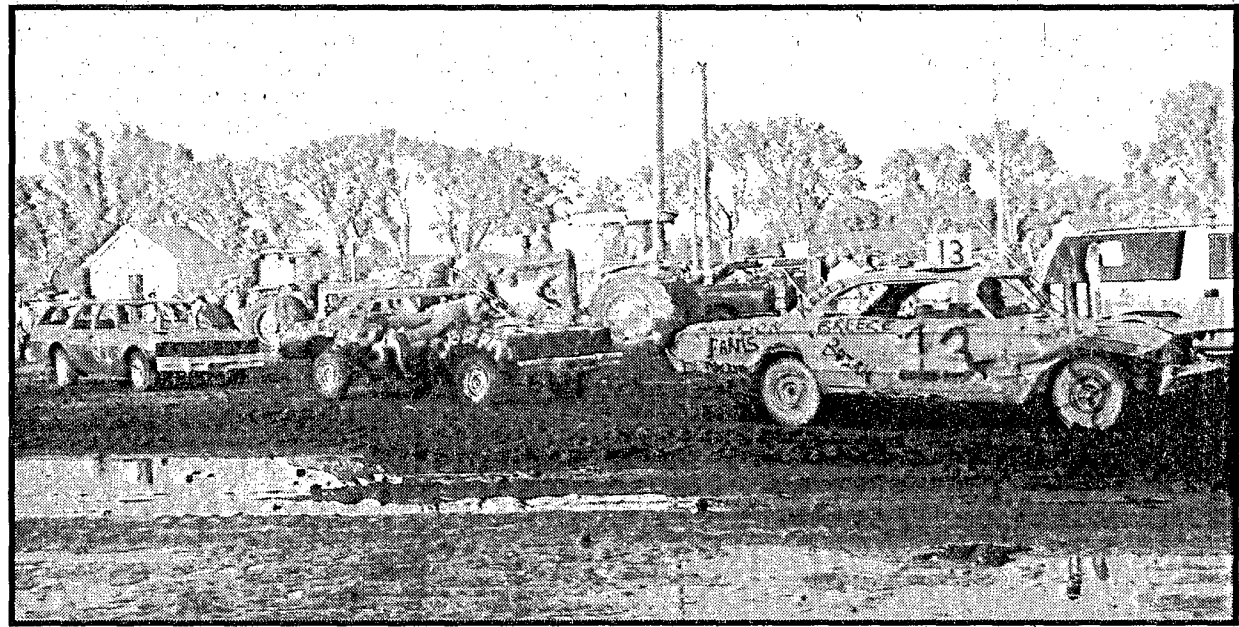

Other acceptable identification that contains a photographic likeness of the potential donor includes current student identification card, corporate identification card or a credit card.

High school students without identification may have their identity confirmed by a school official. There are also exceptions in place for donors who do not carry identification for religious reasons.

Darrell noted that the family is glad to part of the community and is happy to be able to provide the services they do.

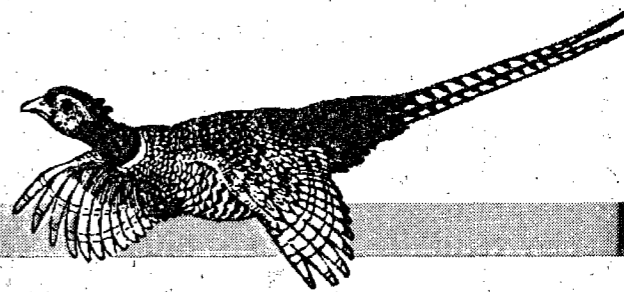

Leadoff hitter Joel Nixon reached base off a hit pitch and Eric Husen made it on after taking a walk in first inning action.

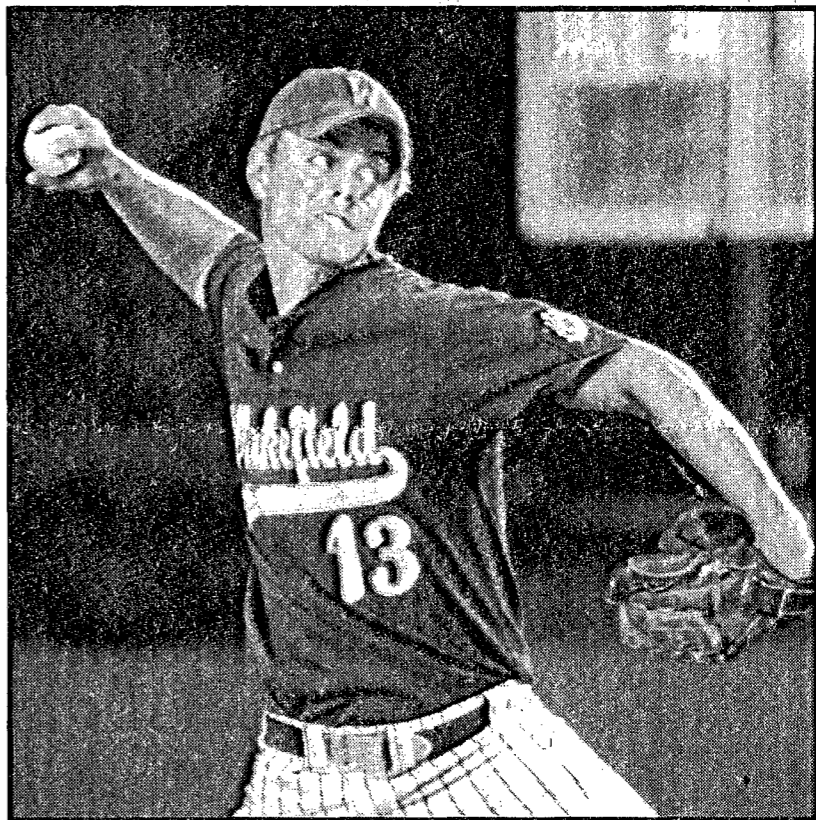
Tanner Soderberg hit the first half of his four RBI night with a single to give Wakefield a 2-0 lead after the first.

Conference coaches pick preseason favorites

The coaches of the conference have weighed in with their preseason favorites and it looks as if Wayne State figures to be in the thick of things this fall.

The WSC volleyball team was picked to finish third this season, while the football squad was tabbed for fifth place by conference coaches.

After finishing in a three-way tie for second place in the Northern Sun Intercollegiate Conference last season, the WSC volleyball team is predicted to be one of the elite teams once again.

The Wildcats are expected to finish third in the conference. Wayne State received 76 points in voting conducted by the league's volleyball coaches.

Concordia-St. Paul, the defending conference champion, led the preseason rankings with 85 points. Southwest Minnesota State was a close second with 84 points. Each team received five first-place votes.

Following Wayne State in the poll were: Minnesota State-Moorhead (63 points), Northern State (58),

Winona State (54), Minnesota-Crookston (35), University of Mary (34), Bemidji State (28) and Upper Iowa University with 23 points.

Individually, junior libero Laura Dolezal of Columbus was voted by league coaches as a player to watch this season. The conference' co-Libero of the Year last season tallied a new school record 818 digs (6.60 dpg), ranking fifth in NCAA Division II, to earn Second Team All-Region honors.

The team finished the 2005 campaign with a 25-10 record.

The Wildcats will open the 2006 season at the University of Nebraska-Kearney Tournament on Friday, Aug. 25. Wayne State's opening opponent will be Iowa Wesleyan.

The WSC football team was picked to finish fifth in the 2006 Northern Sun Conference Preseason Football Coaches Poll released by the conference office last week.

The Wildcats picked up 60 points in voting as determined by the league's head coaches.

WSC finished in a tie for fourth in the Northern Sun Conference in 2005, going 4-3 in league play and 4-7 overall. It marked the first time since joining the NSIC in 1999 that the Wildcats finished with a winning record in conference play.

For the third year in a row, Winona State was selected as the team to beat in the preseason coaches poll.

The Warriors, co-champions with Concordia-St. Paul in 2005, received nine of 10 first place votes and had 90 points to lead the poll. Concordia-St. Paul received the other first place vote and had 77 points to come in second place. Northern State was a close third with 75 points while Bemidji State was fourth with 63 points, three ahead of WSC.

Following WSC in the poll were Southwest Minnesota State (54), Upper Iowa (39), MSU Moorhead (35) and Minnesota-Crookston (29).

Running back Zach Molacek and strong safety Adam Peterson were tabbed as players to watch in the NSIC by league coaches.

Molacek, a senior from Stanton, is a two-time All-NSIC running back that ranked fifth last season in rushing yards per game at 81.3 and led the Wildcats in touchdowns with 10. He finished the season with 604 yards rushing after missing the early part of the season with a shoulder injury.

Peterson, a senior from West Des Moines, Iowa, recorded 76 tackles last season to go with seven pass breakups, three interceptions, two fumble recoveries and one blocked kick to earn All-NSIC honorable mention honors.

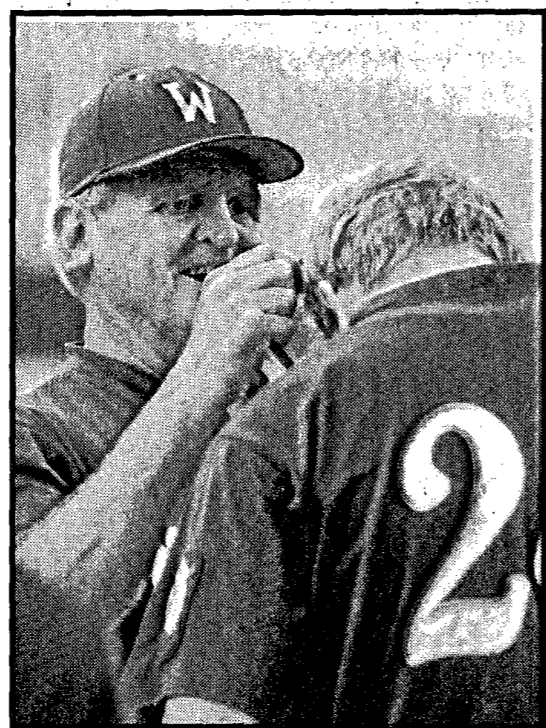
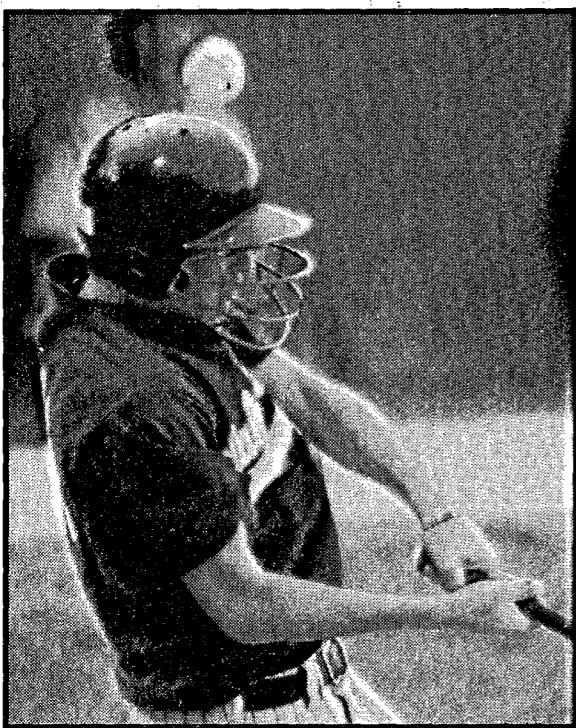

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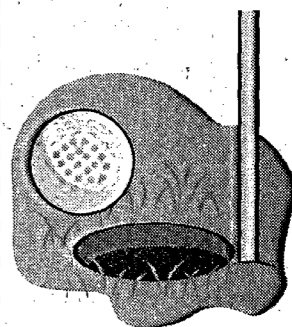
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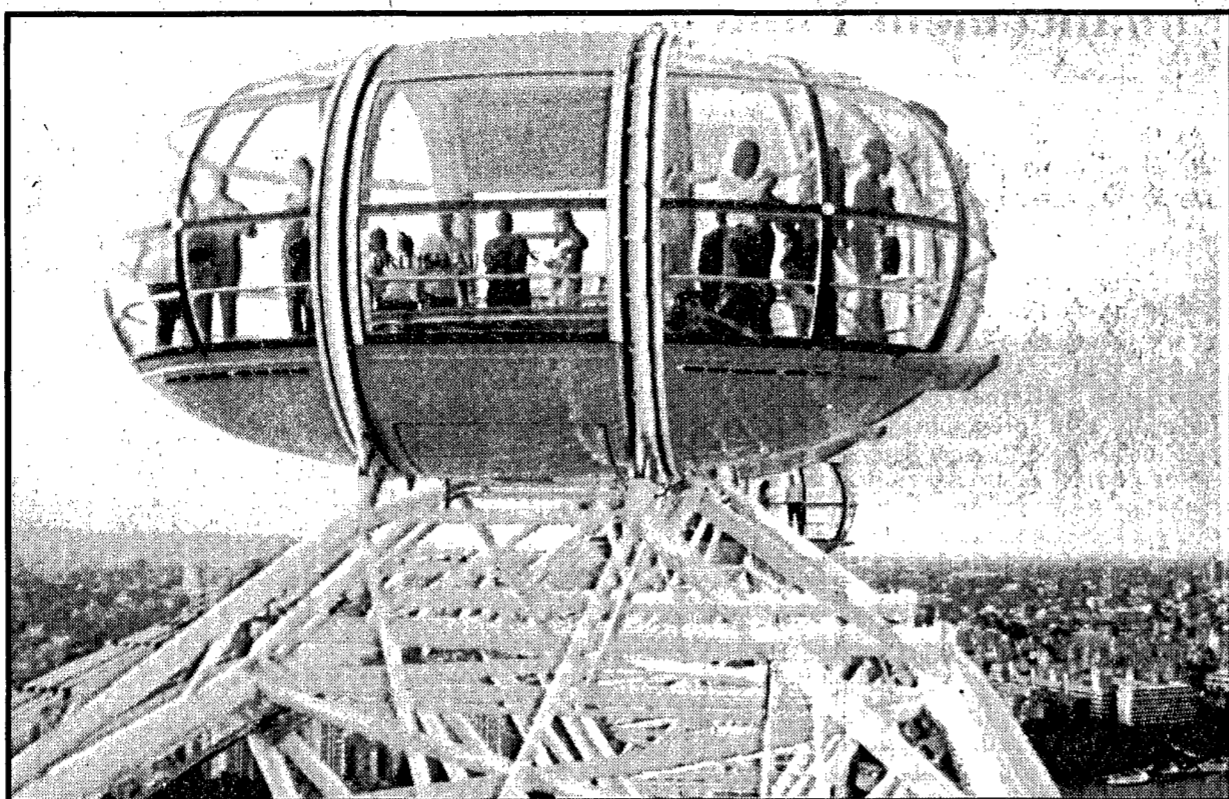
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Warner tours London as People to People Student Ambassador

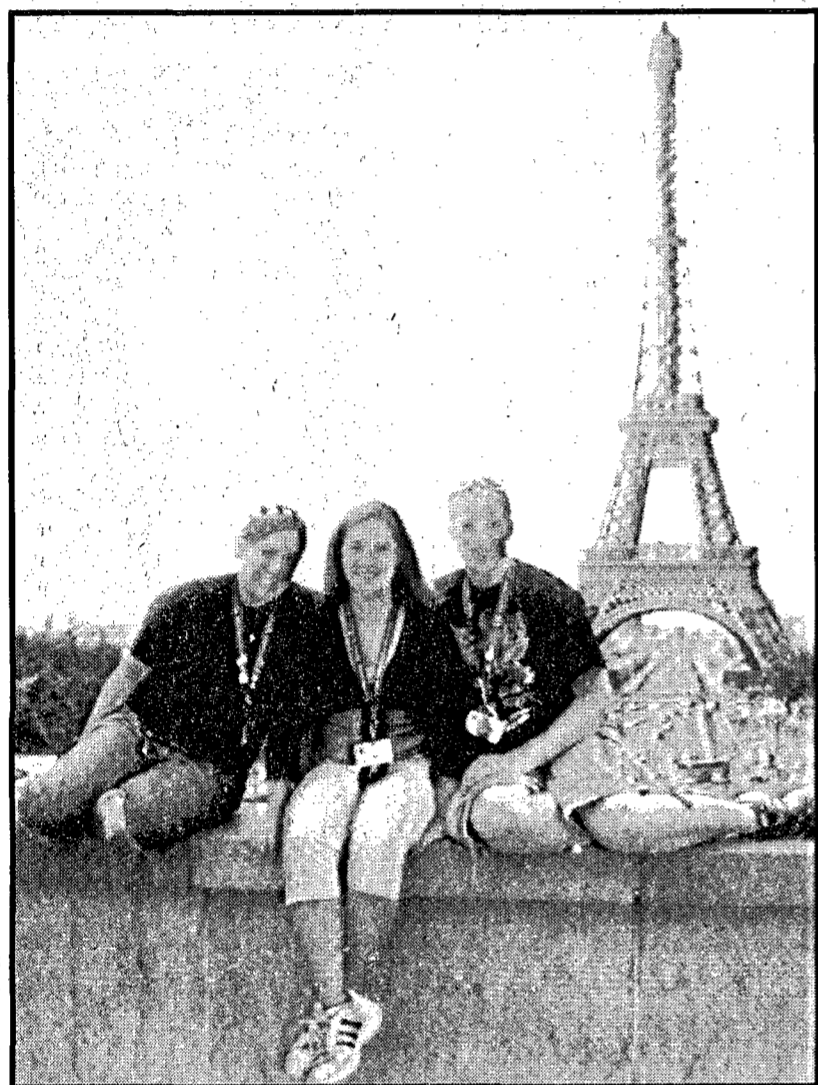
Jenny Warner, daughter of Jack and Rhonda Warner of Allen, was selected to represent the United States as a Student Ambassador for People to People. Dwight Eisenhower started the organization to establish cultural relations between different countries.

After applying, along with interviews and lengthy meetings, Warner was approved for the foreign travel to England and France. Leaving Omaha with 39 other students and four sponsors from Nebraska, Iowa, Kansas, South Dakota and Illinois the group began their tour flying to London. The first stop was King Henry VIII's home, Hampton Court Palace, along with the garden maze and astrological clock.

The next stop was a meeting with a member of England's Parliament to tour the Tower of London, they saw the Crown Jewels, Sir Winston Churchill's Museum, the precision movements of the Changing of the Guards at Buckingham Palace, then to a British Museum. Before leaving London they rode on the London Eye, the largest ferris wheel in the world that was built for the millen-

nium celebration. Over 443 feet high, it gave a panoramic view of the city.

The tour led them to the Globe Theater, Oxford University Christ Church College, where Harry Potter was filmed and Warwick Castle, the most magnificent medieval castle fortified in 1068 by William the Conqueror and the birthplace of William Shakespeare's playworks.

A three-day homestay allowed the group to see the lifestyles of the English. Many of the student ambassadors found their English lifestyles and meals about the same as theirs.

Continuing on, Stone Hedge Monument was the next stop. Built in 3,000 B.C., it was constructed with basic hand tools and transported many miles by manual labor.

The United Kingdom Sailing Academy, home of America's Cup Sailing Race, allowed the students to test their skills at water polo, wind surfing, kiyaking and rafting. Boarding a ferry on the English Channel lead the way to France's Caen Museum, which highlights the effects of D-Day, (the journey into war, Hitler's rise to power and the Allied victory). The group went to the Omaha and Utah beaches, off the coast of Normandy, where "Saving Private Ryan" was filmed. A tour of the American Cemetery overlooking Omaha Beach was much like Arlington Cemetery in the U.S.A.

The students toured Mount St. Michael castle, the Versailles Palace and Paris. The Mona Lisa masterpiece was viewed in the

Northeast Nebraska RC&D tour upcoming

Visiting quaint rural cemeteries, log cabins, Indian churches and ghost towns is the theme for the 8th annual Fall Tour to be held Saturday Sept. 9.

The annual tour sponsored by the Northeast Nebraska Conservation and Development Council at Plainview will make the crisscross trip through Knox County taking motor coach passengers to little known cemeteries and several "ghost towns" which once dotted the pages of early plat books.

According to research projects completed in the late 1960s, Nebraska has over 900 abandoned or nearly abandoned towns. Northeast Nebraska, including Knox County can attest to being home to a number of them.

Barb Hoffart, Program Support Assistant with the RC&D said, "It is a good way to familiarize the participants to the history and beauty of our local area. The Council has conducted this nearly identical tour last year and it was so successful we filled two buses. We started with a waiting list for this year. It seems many people can relate to their roots that lead back to pioneers and homesteading in rural Nebraska."

Sites of interest will be several Indian churches and cemeteries, Walnut, Venus, Sparta, Tewsville, Lindy and Winnetoon. A stop at Oak View Park will be one of the main things to see on the tour.

"The charm of the old buildings and scenic landscape along with the historic information from the

step-on guide, Janet Eckmann will make this a trip for all ages," said Hoffart. "Of special interest will be guest speaker Judy Carlson, Knox County historian and author of a recently published book on local cemeteries." Carlson will demonstrate "grave divining" at the cemeteries on our tour." Hoffart added, "Rods or "witching sticks" have been used since ancient times to find underground water or minerals but people also use them to locate unmarked graves. This is a real photo opportunity for those with a camera."

The motor coach will pick up passengers at Jerry's Hilltop and Lindy. A noon lunch in Verdigre and afternoon snack will be provided. Sitting is limited and more information is available at the RC&D office in Plainview or by calling 402-582-4866.

Benefit of traditional landline phone given

A June survey results revealed general public confusion on how 9-1-1 works when dialing from cell phones or Internet phones versus a traditional landline phone.

Two-thirds of people don't think landline phones are necessary and 37 percent of survey respondents have ONLY cordless phones in their home. However, more than half do not understand that cordless phones rely on electricity, and will not function if the power goes out.

Furthermore, 9-1-1 operators do not receive location information when a caller dials from a cell phone - it has to be communicated verbally between both parties, which slows emergency response

time. Incoming calls to 9-1-1 centers in the western region of the U.S. surged in July with 140,000 more calls than in May. The increase was due in large part to many parts of the country experiencing excessive heat and resulting power outages.

The National Emergency Number Association is urging Americans to keep at least one corded phone with traditional landline phone service in their homes in case of an emergency at home, especially during a power outage, when cable, Internet and cordless phones will not work.



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
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Pre-application deadline is Sept. 1 for Nebraska Internet Enhancement Fund grants

A pre-application period for communities wishing to obtain grants from the second offering of the Nebraska Internet Enhancement Fund (NIEF) opened June 1. Forms for the pre-application period may be obtained online from the Commission's website at www.psc.ne.state.us or by contacting the Commission by telephone toll-free at 1-800-526-0017. Commission Attorney Nichole Underhill said pre-applications would be accepted through Sept. 1 with the formal application period beginning Sept. 15. Pre-applications are required before an invitation to submit a formal application is issued.

The Nebraska Public Service Commission announced that the fund would start the application process with a pre-application period to determine whether potential projects might be qualified for a grant to install or deliver broadband or other advanced telecommunications products throughout the state.

NIEF was established by the 2001 Nebraska Legislature to give priority to high cost factors such as population scarcity and remote geographical locations. A share of the proceeds from public entities that lease unused, dark fiber optics principally funds NIEF. The maximum amount available to successful grant applicants is \$50,000.

Six grants were awarded in the initial NIEF offering to the City of

Chappell, Box Butte County, Cheyenne County, Dawes County, and Nemaha County. The grants were used to finance projects ranging from construction and deployment of local high-speed broadband internet service networks to deploying wireless internet services to extend the range of high speed internet services to rural areas.

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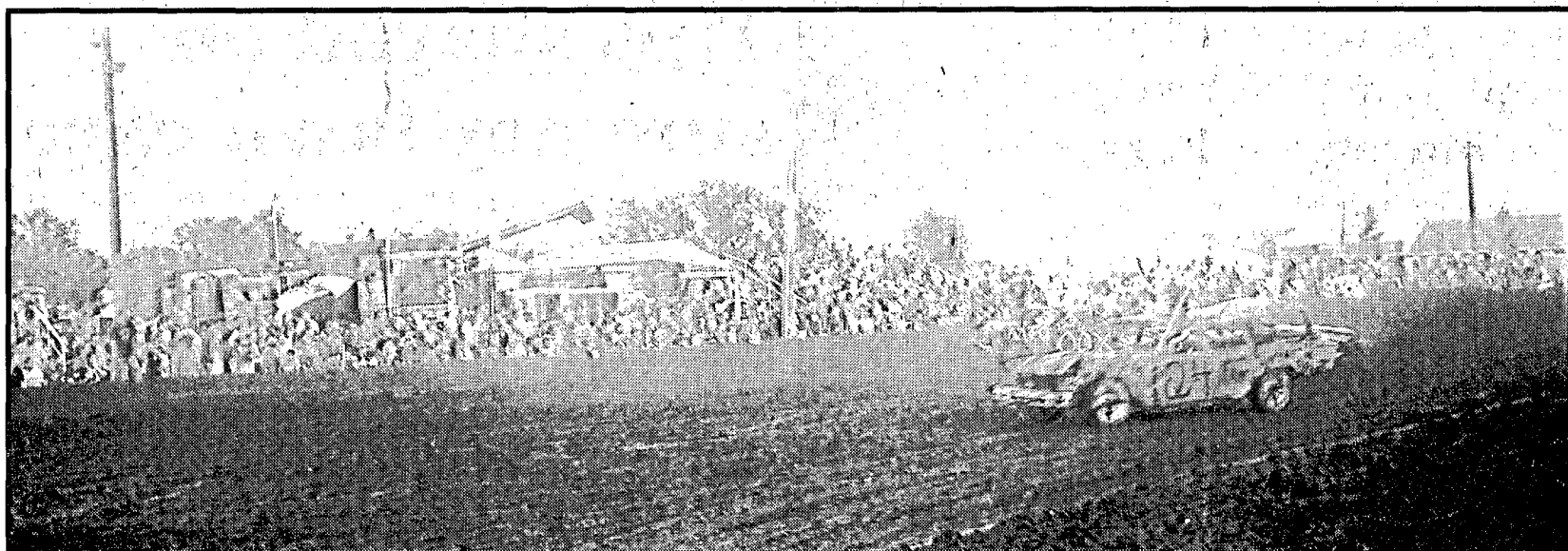

Northeast, Wayne State presidents appreciate efforts of Nebraska senators

The presidents of Northeast Community College and Wayne State College expressed appreciation this week for the efforts of Nebraska's two U.S. senators to bring a proposed college center in South Sioux City closer to fruition.

Dr. Bill Path, president of Northeast Community College, and Dr. Richard Collings, president of Wayne State College, were informed recently that the Senate Appropriations Committee passed two federal funding bills which include \$1.35 million for the college center.

A proposed Northeast Community College-Wayne State College Center would allow students to take their freshman- and sophomore-level courses from Northeast and then take junior and senior-level or graduate-level courses from Wayne State College, all in the same location in South Sioux City. This proposed center is the first collaborative effort in higher education between a two- and four-year institution in Nebraska.

Some \$700,000 have been earmarked jointly by Sen. Ben Nelson (D) and Sen. Chuck Hagel (R) in the Senate version of the Labor/Health and Human Services (HHS) subcommittee bill. Another \$400,000 have been earmarked by Sen. Nelson in the Transportation/Housing Urban Development (HUD) subcommittee bill. And, in the same bill, another \$250,000 were earmarked by Sen. Hagel.

"We are most appreciative of their bi-partisan efforts," Dr. Collings said. "Both our senators, even though they represent both sides of the political aisle in the U.S. Senate, are working together to bring federal funds for higher education to Nebraska. And, most importantly, both have assured us that both earmarks look very favorable."

"We really do like to think of this proposal as visionary and, with

these two bills, it is obvious that our U.S. Senators from Nebraska share that vision with us," Dr. Collings said. "We are so very grateful and look forward to the day when we can give both senators a tour of our new college center in South Sioux City."

"This is extremely good news for our project," Dr. Path said. "We have always felt that our plans would help meet the needs of the minority, first-generation, and place-bound students in the Greater Siouxland area and now our U.S. senators have given us their stamp of approval with these two bills. Obviously, they, too, feel it is a very worthwhile endeavor."

Dr. Path said that the \$650,000 from the Transportation/HUD bill will be used for exterior projects like a drainage ditch, parking lots, and lighting while the \$700,000 from the Labor/HHS bill will be used to fund educational technology like computer, biology/chemistry, nursing, and distance-learning labs.

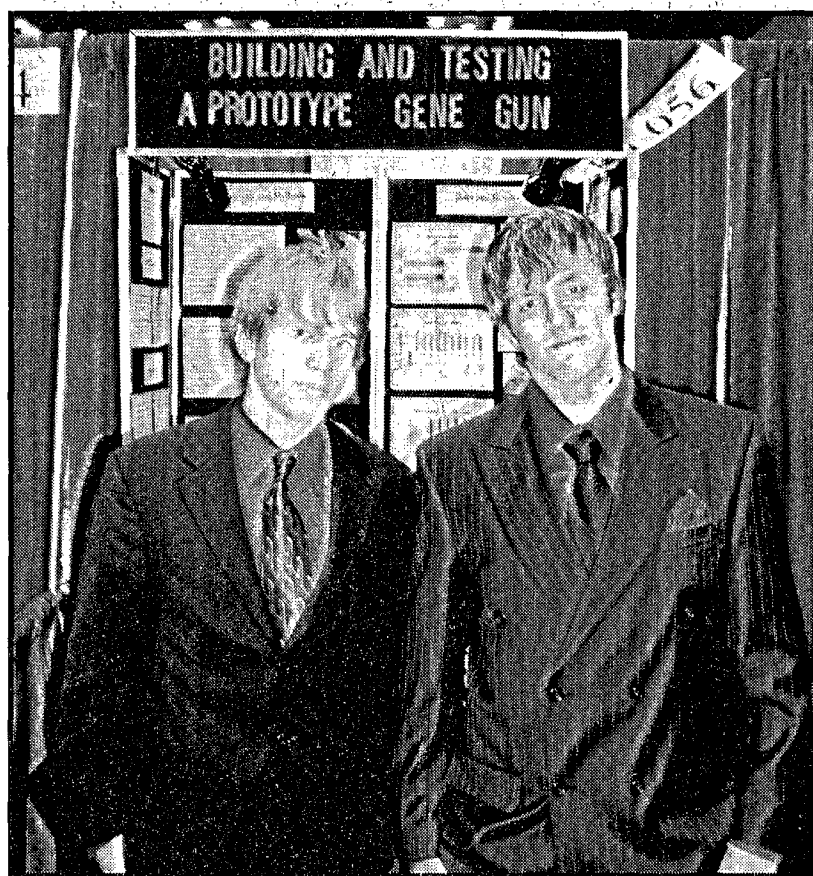
"None of these dollars in either bill will go for brick and mortar construction," Dr. Path said. "But they will pay for other expenditures we must make to get this center up and running."

Dr. Path said that the next step for the bills is review by both the Labor/HHS and Transportation/HUD conference committees. Final versions of the bills from the conference committees will be voted on separately by both the House of Representatives and Senate before reaching the president's desk for his signature.

"It may be many months before it reaches President Bush's desk for his signature," Dr. Collings said. "But this is a huge first step that shows strong support for our project by our Nebraska senators. We couldn't be more pleased."

In the meantime, officials from both institutions will continue to meet to evaluate possible programming, space requirements, and

joint funding efforts for the Wayne State College College Northeast Community College Center.

Brogie Wins Intel ISEF Grand Award

Joseph K. Brogie's high school research project, "Building and Testing a Prototype Gene Gun," received the \$1000 Biochemistry Third Place Grand Award during this year's Intel International Science and Engineering Fair.

In his fourth year of genetic related research, Brogie modified a paint ball gun to successfully "shoot" bacterial DNA into Allium cells. This process produced transgenic cells.

Joe's previous research involved building and testing a home made DNA thermocycler. His thermocycler research received regional, state, and national recognition.

This year's Intel ISEF was held in Indianapolis, Indiana May 7-13. Intel ISEF is the world's largest celebration of science, showcasing the world's most promising young scientists and inventors in grades 9 through 12. This year's 1,500 finalists came to Indianapolis from 47 countries, regions, and territories across the globe.

A total of \$4 million in scholarships, grants, awards, and cash

prizes was awarded to top projects. To win the right to participate at Intel ISEF, these finalists competed among 65,000 students at more than 558 regional Intel ISEF-affiliated science fairs around the world. Joe's research received top honors at the Greater Nebraska Science and Engineering Fair (GNSEF) qualifying him to present his research at Intel ISEF. In addition, GNSEF funded Joe's trip.

Laurel-Concord student Ian Engebretsen also qualified to attend ISEF this year as an observer. His research project, "The Effects of L-arginine Supplementation on Daphnia magna Heart Rate - Phase III," received third place honors at GNSEF. Ian has been working on this research for the past three years, receiving regional, state, and national recognition.

Also attending Intel ISEF was Ed Brogie. Brogie is the father of Joe Brogie and is Ian Engebretsen's Independent Science Research instructor at Laurel-Concord Community Schools.

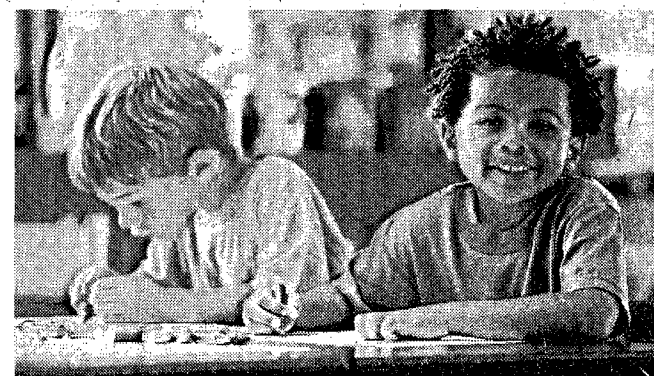
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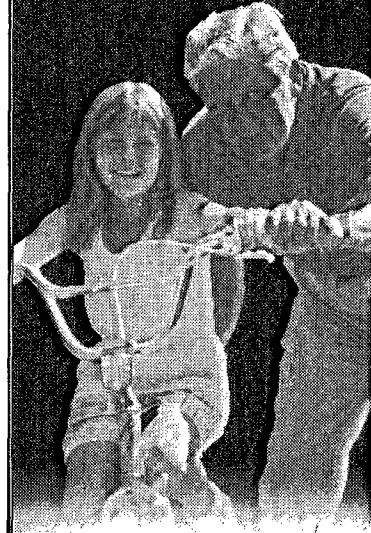

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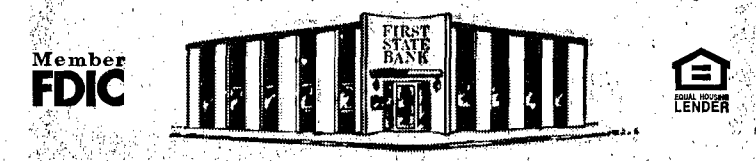
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Mitchell recognized for coaching abilities

He is a second-time recipient of this award.

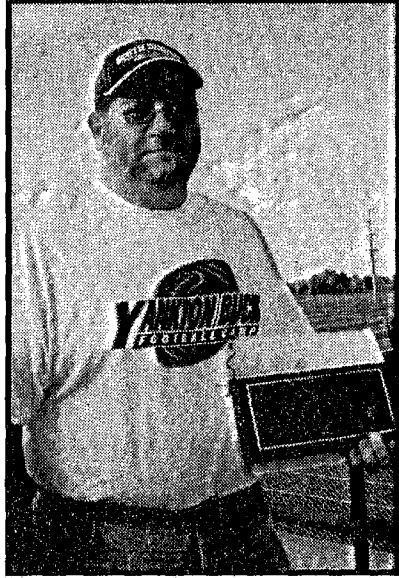

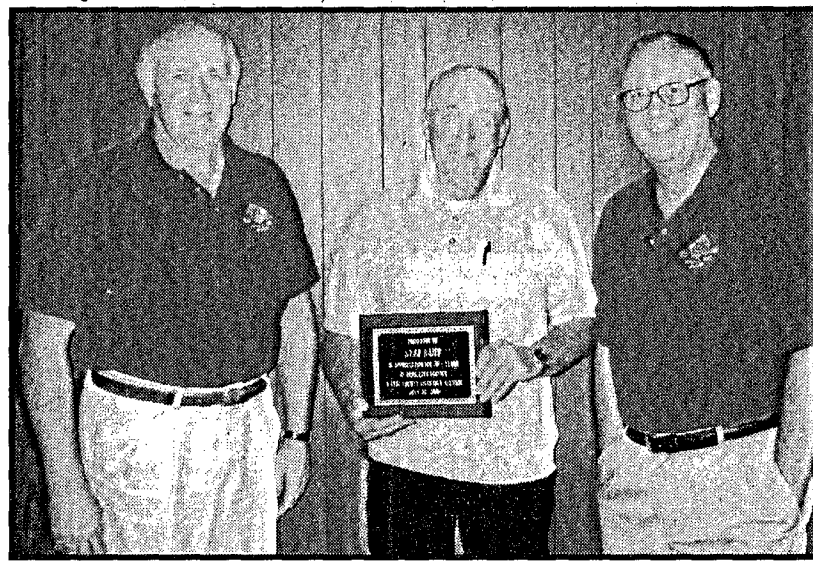

ment devices and do not use bottled water for drinking will be considered for the study. These devices may include reverse osmosis, distillation and ion-exchange units but do not include water softeners.

This study will attempt to determine how treatment units are selected by consumers, how they are being maintained, how they are functioning, and what type of contaminants are being removed from private water well supplies.

A total of 100 households across the state will be selected for sampling this summer and fall. There is no cost for the testing and each participant will receive their water test results. Testing for contaminants will include bacteria, nitrates, heavy metals and pesticides.

To be considered for the study, homeowners should contact Environmental Health Services at (402) 471-2541 and inquire about the Private Household Water Treatment Study.

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Tips shared on summer lawn care

It doesn't take long for the hot sun to change green grass brown. Fortunately, even if Mother Nature isn't being too helpful, homeowners still can keep things green with the right management and irrigation practices.

Anne Streich, horticulture educator has some ideas for how to keep lawns green and healthy. Continue mowing lawns regularly, but increase mowing height. If the mowing height was increased before the summer heat hit, the turf will have the opportunity to develop a deeper root system. Increasing the mowing height after the heat has hit won't give the turf a chance to develop some of those deeper roots.

Longer grass conserves moisture and shades turf so there is less water loss due to evaporation. For example, cut Kentucky bluegrass 3 to 3.5 inches and cut tall fescue grass 3.5 to 4 inches.

Grass can lose a half to a third of an inch of moisture per day. Be sure to water to the depths of its roots. Depending on the soil type, watering may need to be split into two different cycles to avoid water runoff or puddling, which can cause problems on soils high in clay. Be sure not to overwater.

Depending on the weather, wait three or four days before watering again. Watering lightly every day will produce shallow roots and is not recommended.

Most grass lawns in Nebraska are bluegrass or fescue with some mixing of the two. Both are cool season grasses and their normal behavior is to be green and lush in the spring and again in the fall. In the summer heat, these grasses naturally turn brown and become dormant as a defense from the heat.

Watering can keep them green, but in dry hot years the battle can be up hill and it may be easier to accept a little brown in exchange for less work and lower water bills. If you want a grass that loves the heat, buffalo grass could be for you, greening up in late May and staying green through the hot months with little or no watering. Again the real challenge is a change in philosophy and accepting a brown lawn in the spring and fall when your neighbors cool season lawns will be green.

Remember to enjoy your lawn and don't let it work you to death.

A primary requirement for the local substitute teaching certificate is a community college associate

degree or at least 60 college credit hours.

Another requirement for the local certificate is a professional education course and this Northeast Community College Introduction to Education course that begins Aug. 14 fulfills that requirement, Ausdemore said.

A third education requirement is a college class in Human Relations. Wayne State College is offering an online class, "Human Relations in a Pluralistic Society," (EDU 396) from Aug. 23 - Oct. 27. To register for this class, call the WSC Continuing Education office at 800-228-9972.

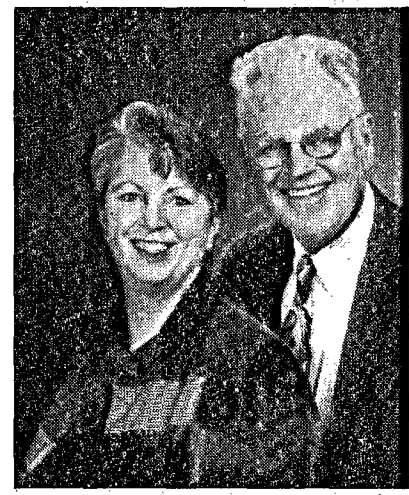
The True Sandwich Generation: Surviving the Financial Squeeze

As the oldest baby boomers reach their 60s and plan for their own retirement, millions are faced with the unexpected responsibility of caring for an aging parent. This life-changing new role can be emotionally draining and financially devastating. According to a survey released in 2005 by Campbell-Ewald Health, thirteen million baby boomers are caregivers for sick parents and are involved in every facet of their care. These are just average costs for one disease, but you can see how caring for an aging parent could wipe out your entire investment and savings portfolio. It is essential that people caring for both young and old family members take the time to address estate planning issues to ensure the financial security of all generations.

In addition to power of attorney, make sure your parents have a will. This ensures your parents' assets are distributed according to their wishes and may minimize the effect of taxes upon the estate. Consider exploring other means of protecting your parents' (and your own) assets, including long-term

care insurance, annual cash gifts and bypass trusts. A bypass trust stipulates that when the first spouse dies, his or her assets go into a trust, that the surviving spouse can use as needed. When the other spouse passes away, all trust assets pass to heirs free of estate taxes through a one-time exemption. A bypass trust involves changing a will, so it must be set up by your parents and not by power of attorney.

Prepare for children's college expenses. If you find that you are in the position of caring for your parents financially as well as saving for your children's education, you'll definitely feel a financial squeeze. The key here is to start saving for college as early as possible to take advantage of years of tax-deferred growth through compounding. Even if you contribute only a small amount of money to your child's college fund each month, you will be surprised at how quickly it will grow. And remember, there is always the possibility of financial aid, grants or scholarships to ease the financial burden of paying for college.

Don't neglect your own finances. Though caring for your parents and saving for college are certainly important goals, don't sell yourself short. You need to make your own health and well-being a priority. Continue to prepare for your own retirement needs and explore the qualification requirements for flexible savings accounts and dependent care tax credits. Depending on the parameters of your specific situation, you may be eligible for additional tax savings.

When you are caught in the middle of family needs and obligations, physical, emotional and financial pressures are common. 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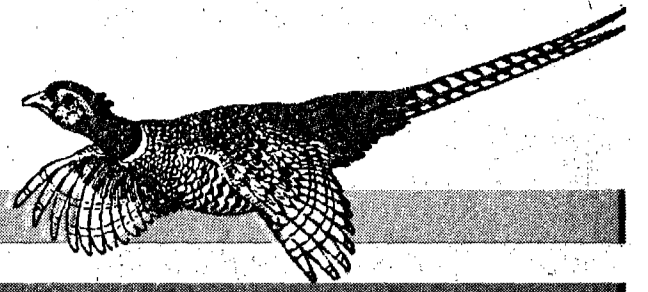

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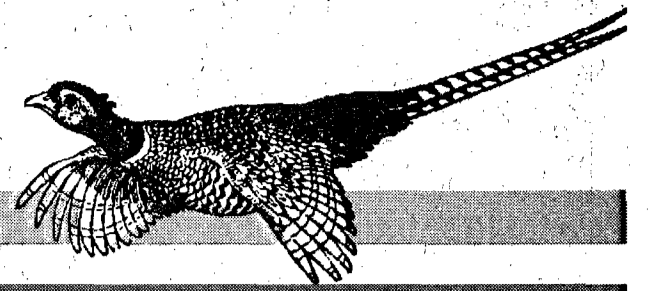

More West Nile Cases reported

Three more cases of West Nile virus among humans have been reported to the Nebraska Health and Human Services System (HHSS) this week, bringing the total of cases in the state so far this year to eight. The latest cases are from Seward, Douglas and Colfax. Previously reported cases have been from Platte, Saline, Lancaster (2) and Douglas counties.

The virus is transmitted through the bite of a mosquito that has picked up the virus by feeding on an infected bird.

To avoid mosquito bites, the Health and Human Services System recommends that people "fight the bite" during outdoor activities by:

- Applying mosquito repellent containing DEET, picaridin or oil of lemon eucalyptus;
- Wearing long-sleeved shirt,

pants, and socks;

- Avoiding going out at dawn and dusk, when mosquitoes are most active; and
- Eliminating standing water to reduce mosquito breeding sites.

Though the state hasn't had many cases so far, the peak weeks for the reporting of cases to HHSS are the last week in August and the first week in September.

"I expect more cases to come," said Dr. Annette Bredthauer, the state's public health veterinarian. "Now is not the time to let our guard down. People should be taking precautions to avoid being bitten by mosquitoes."

Most people who are infected by a mosquito have no symptoms or only mild flu-like symptoms. Less than one out of 150 people who get bitten by an infected mosquito and become infected will get seriously

ill. However, people over 50 and those with weakened immune systems are especially vulnerable to the disease and are more likely experience serious consequences.

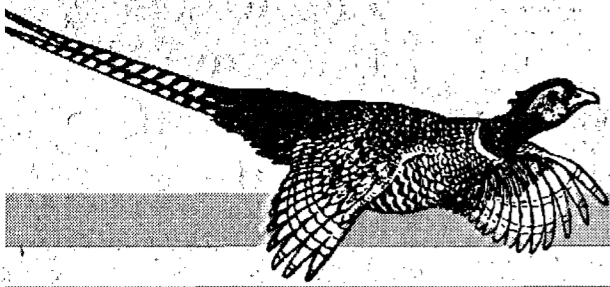
West Nile fever includes flu-like symptoms such as fever and muscle weakness. Symptoms of West Nile encephalitis include inflammation of the brain, disorientation, convulsions and paralysis.

Last year there were 188 human cases of the virus reported in Nebraska, with five deaths. In 2004 there were 54 cases and no deaths. In 2003 there were 2,366 cases with 29 deaths. In 2002, the first year that the virus appeared in the state, Nebraska had 174 cases and eight deaths.

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Free soybean test available

The worst disease in the US for soybeans is still Soybean Cyst Nematode (SCN). Even with all the resources going into monitoring for soybean rust, rust is still only a future threat.

Cyst Nematode is still No. 1 as far as a reduction in soybean yield. What makes cyst nematode so bad is its ability to reduce yield without any visual symptoms. I have had conversations with producers about yield plateaus and fields that did not seem to yield to their potential. After testing, some of those fields came back positive for SCN. In some instances the yield plateau came from SCN but other times the yield questions were just a good reason to test for SCN and other fields are not being tested.

Cyst Nematodes are microscopic parasitic roundworms that live in the soil waiting to infect a soybean plant. Once inside, they feed on the plant reducing the plant's vigor from below. In many cases SCN is not bad enough to show visual symptoms but just had enough to reduce yield by 10 bushels per acre.

The only way to know whether you have SCN is to do a soil test. A

test can be done any time a year with a simple soil probe or shovel. SCN can live in the soil for more than 13 years without a host and thus is virtually impossible to eradicate, but management is possible.

Some varieties of soybeans are resistant to SCN and will help maintain higher yields in infected fields. Management consists of choosing a resistant variety and then planting a non-host crop at

least every other year, which fits into most producers' crop rotation. Resistance to SCN came from a few different sources and rotation source of resistance can also help keep SCN numbers in check.

Cyst Nematodes travel with the soil so flooding can easily move SCN from field to field. Also machinery can move SCN from infected fields. When testing, first test bottom areas that have a tendency to flood, then think about areas near field entrances, and finally test areas where yields have been depressed without explanation.

SCN exists in nearly every county in eastern Nebraska and I have heard in up to 75 percent of all fields in Iowa. Nebraska may not be to that extent yet, but many fields in Nebraska remain untested.

A state wide study was done in 2005 giving free SCN tests. Results showed that 25 percent of fields tested were positive. This was true for Pierce County which had eight sites tested and two positive tests. UNL is again doing a survey in 2006. If you are interested in a free SCN test bag (\$20 value) please call or stop in at your local extension office.

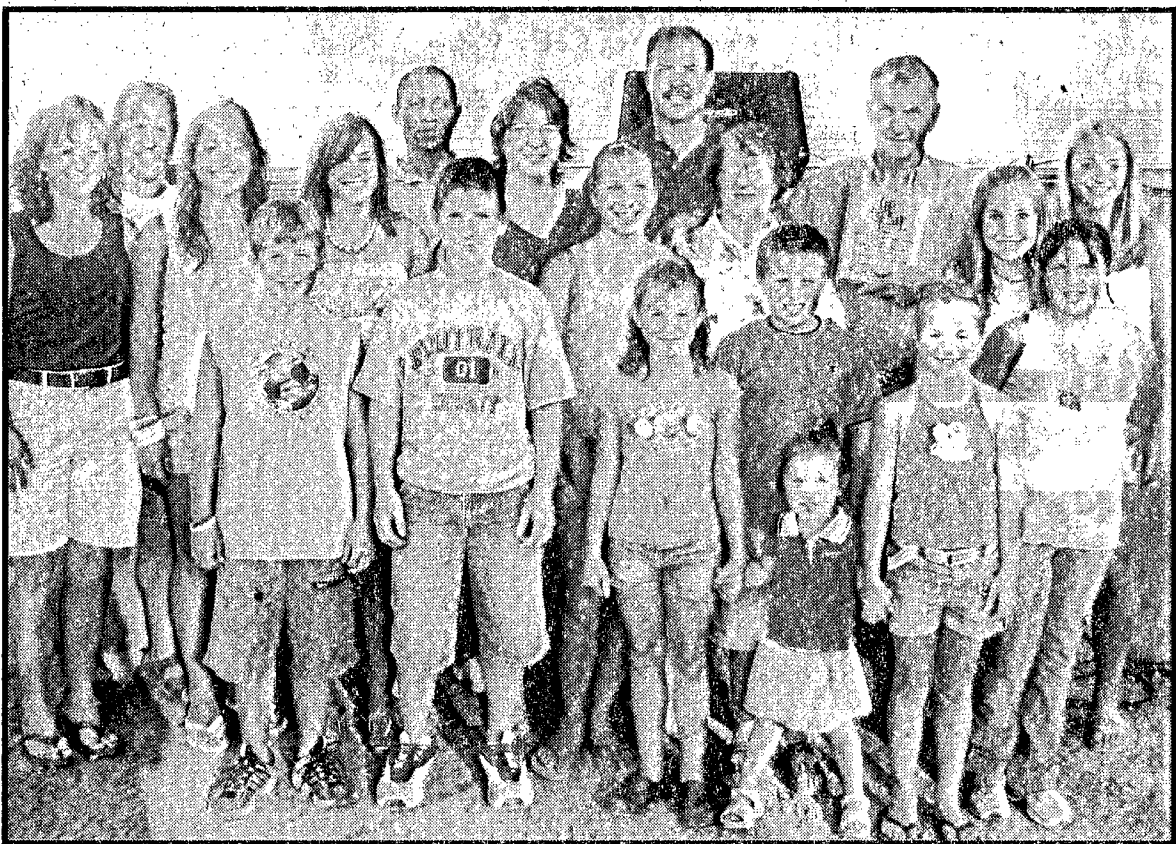
