

Wayne County Board of Commissioners met in regular session Tuesday. A request was received to move a house over county roads from Norfolk to Hartington on Aug. 22, weather permitting. The board approved the request.

Discussed was the recent scrap tire collection that was held at the Wayne County Fairgrounds on Aug. 5. There were 101 participants and approximately 70 tons collected.

Pine wilt found in trees

City crews have been busy recently removing tress suffering

from pine wilt from Greenwood Cemetery. At least seven tress

Several Scotch Pine trees have been Wayne in recent months as a result of a disease known as pine wilt.

Pine wilt is caused by a microscopic worm-like organism called the pinewood nematode. The nematodes damage the water-conducting tissues of pines, causing the trees to dry up and die. Trees die quickly following the onset of symptoms, often

The pinewood nematode is carried from tree to tree by pine sawyer beetles. Immature pine sawyer beetles live in the wood of dying trees, such as trees dying from pine wilt. The adult beetles emerge from the trees beginning in late May and fly to healthy trees to feed, carrying the nematodes with them.

This is true of the trees that have been

90 and 100 years old, with one estimated at 105 years of age.

to four-inch needles in pairs and an orangish bark in older trees.

Currently a treatment called Greyhound can be used to treat trees if no symptoms of pine wilt are present in the tree. However, the treatment could cost approximately \$300 for a tree with a trunk diameter of 10

Steve Rasmussen, Nebraska Forest Service District Forester, noted that approximately 20 percent of the total number of evergreens in the cemetery are Scotch pine, the most susceptible to the disease. Other species found at the cemetery include Eastern White Pine, Australian Pine, jack Pine, White Spruce, Norway Spruce, Colorado Blue Spruce and Northern White Cedar.



Voters frustrated with property taxes

It appears a good number of

Nebraska voters feel "too much is enough" when it comes to frustration with local property taxes. In the May primary, an uncom-

monly large number of incumbent county board members got the boot. Property taxes are a perpetual annoyance to Nebraskans and thus a perpetual political issue. This year, however, it appears taxpayers are more annoyed than usual, and showing it at the polls. There's no counting the number

of newly elected board members who, over the years, with strong hearts and good intentions, figured they would whack spending down with the fervor of a mongoose killing a snake.

Shortly thereafter, they learned that county government's built-in budget costs - mandates from the state and federal governments, the uncontrollable, increasing costs of simply providing basic services, and the ever-higher costs of education - put serious budget cutting beyond reach.

It's not unlike people who live on just-getting-by budget. Family members might want more things, a fancy television or a new car or whatever, when the reality is that paying for the basics, and paying taxes, leaves just a pittance in the checking account.

Folks can't do much about the rent or the mortgage, the cost of groceries, gasoline and television, but they go to the ballot box and make felt their displeasure with property taxes. When waste or fraud is found in county government, fuel is added to the fire of voter displeasure.

Local property taxes remind people of how much they are paying a couple of times each year.

Income taxes and sales taxes are paid in the course of work and business. They can slide by lots of peo-

Imagine: What do you think would happen if Americans had to pay income taxes in two, annual

installments? The view from here: The feds would never be able to collect what was owed. Too many working people would see that bill and say, "I ain't got it!" or look at it and say, "They want how much? I ain't paying!" It would be the same with Social Security.

The Nebraska Association of County Officials says voters turned out 35 incumbent county board members in May, and some 20 more did not run for re-election. Now add this to the mix: Forty-five incumbents are opposed on the November ballot, virtually assuring even more new faces on county boards.

What county board members run up against: Standards set by the state pretty much control how property must be valued for tax purposes, and county assessors are bound by law to follow the state guidelines. The state guidelines are

reflective of requirements in the Nebraska constitution.

County boards can keep property tax revenues steady by lowering the tax levy when property valuations increase - but when higher costs for just operating county government are beyond their reach, board members literally have their hands tied.

What's left?

The citizenry has only the ballot box to voice its complaint. Elect state senators who oppose higher property taxes? Try to find one who doesn't oppose higher, local property taxes. But they run into the same thing when they get to Lincoln. They see the minimum dollars needed to run government, including the costs of federal mandates, and suddenly realize that the laws of arithmetic don't bend for the wishes of people.

The next thing to consider might

be called the "Just do it" approach. The Legislature could consider what deserves to be called "drastic action." Such could take the form of a huge homestead exemption that



Most property tax dollars go to fund local schools. If school boards begin slashing costs, via some classes and extracurricular programs, including sports, how would voters react? Would school board members face the same electoral axe now being wielded upon county

It is a tough situation for all concerned. It isn't going to get any eas-



City continues to deal with parking issues

Parking in Wayne

The council and planning commission are considering changes in residential parking ordinances. Currently Wayne code prohibits parking major recreation equip-

ment such as RV's and boats on trailers on residential lots unless they are in a carport or enclosed building or behind the nearest portion of a building to a street. Wayne has not enforced this for many years but as RV's and boats get bigger we have received some complaints about them parked in front of homes.

Before we start requiring all to build sheds or find buildings to store these rigs, the council wanted to consider changes to the code. Proposed changes are:

1) Recreational equipment would no longer be required to be stored inside a building. However, it must be parked behind the front line of the house in the side or rear yard;

2) RV's cannot be lived in longer than 30 days in a residential area;



3) Vehicles parked in front of houses cannot be parked on dirt or grass, but must be parked on a surface of concrete, asphalt, brick, rock aggregate, fly ash, cinders or

brick and be free of dirt, grass and give written notice to a property weeds with a containment barrier around it;

4) Commercial rigs, utility trailers, construction vehicles, ag equipment, straight trucks and step vans would not be allowed to park on the city terrace in residential areas. Cars, pickups and motor cycles could park on the terrace if the parking area is surfaced as in #3 above;

5) All driveways must be paved or surfaced with aggregate and the curb must be ground down or removed for the driveway entrance. Don't park across sidewalks

We have heard from people with strollers, wheelchairs and some who have difficulty walking that cars are being parked across sidewalks. Officers are out checking for these so keep that in mind.

Nuisance abatement You may have seen our city crews and trucks out working on private property recently. Occasionally we owner to clean up a yard or a nuisance and we also include a deadline for clean-up.

Once in a while the owner does not do the work as scheduled and we either hire the clean-up to be done or we use city crews and equipment to clean it up. In either case, the cost of clean up and dumping fees is billed to the property owner. If the bill is not paid, we file a lien on the property.

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

He noted that having a mixture of different types of trees helps reduce the risk of losing all trees to the disease.

At the present time, no other trees in the area have been killed by the disease. The disease, however, is very prevalent in areas of southeast Nebraska and appears to be making its way northward.

"Pine wilt should not be confused with natural needle drop which occurs in the fall and involved the interior needles only or needle blight, which includes parts of individual branches. With pine wilt,




Pine wilt has claimed seven trees in Wayne.

the whole tree turns off-brown in color within two to three months," Rasmussen said.

He added that removal of the entire tree is the best way to get rid of pine wilt and prevent it from spreading.

Information from the Nebraska Forest Service estimates 5,000 pines in Nebraska have been killed by pine wilt since it entered the state eight years ago.


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
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Three sign to play at WSC

The Wildcats received 50 points in voting conducted by the league's women's soccer coaches.


Last season, WSC finished in a tie for third place in the NSIC with Northern State.
