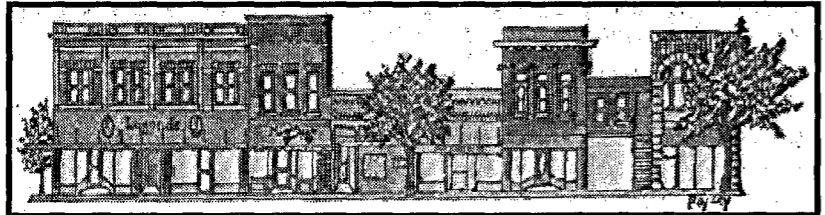

Main Street Focus

During the last month or so a number of former Wayne citizens have returned to town and have expressed a great deal of pleasure in the changes they have seen in the city. Main Street has received a number of raves even though the street is not complete. Still lots to work out and people are confused as to why the street work is not progressing as it should be progressing. The city is as anxious as its citizens are, but the state has possession of the project and is working with various groups to iron out and correct the difficulties. Let's keep our fingers crossed and hope we wake up one day to see a great deal of action happening on Main Street.
The other thing that has impressed our former citizens is the amount of construction throughout the town. On Main Street, The State National Bank on the corner of Second Street is a real gem. Across the street in what was formerly the Legends Building, is now the Jacob's Room with a new store front. In the 100 block, two Karels Buildings have been demolished waiting for someone to come along to join our Wayne business community. In the 300 block where the Black Knight once stood and more recently the Main Street Park was located is an attractive building where Viaero Wireless will soon be opening.
U Save Pharmacy recently opened on Seventh Street and across the street is the Udder Delights with a building that should be soon opening. The First National Bank has a new building under construction next to the Casey's Convenience Store that has recently been remodeled with a kitchen. Also completed in recent years are two strip malls in the area between Bomgaars and Pizza Hut and up Providence Road behind the Sports Club Motel.
Progress is the "key word" for Wayne and much more is in store. Wayne has always been recognized as a city with a good park system. Currently there is a community

group working to expand and upgrade recreational opportunities with a remodeled Summer Sports Complex. This is a great project that will help showcase Wayne as a progressive city and we, at Main Street Wayne, ask you to support the project and attend their fund raiser April 1. Another group in the community is working on developing a Community Clothing Store. They are making a great deal of progress but are limited as to what news they can release to the public because of legal requirements on incorporation.
At Tuesday morning's Main Street Wayne meeting, Wes Blecke said that the state Lied Main Street people will be in town on Wednesday, April 25 for a late afternoon or evening meeting to help us develop a Visioning Statement for our program in Wayne. It is anticipated that on the morning following this work session that the state people will present the results with a Visioning Statement for Main Street Wayne.
We also announced that the PA system has arrived at the WAEDI office and is ready for use by any group who helped purchase the system. We also said that he is working to complete for Main Street the Non-profit Corporation Biennial Report. He also encouraged us to send representatives to the other umbrella organizations of WAEDI - Wayne Industries and the Chamber of Commerce meetings.
Discussion was held on the "Town-Gown" program the college may be planning and it was felt that we need to work to help students understand that the Wayne business community welcomes students and that, in fact, many business owners in Wayne are WSC graduates, have attended WSC, have family that attended and/or graduated from WSC, and make contributions in various amounts to Wayne State College and its various programs. We also employ WSC students and we enjoy having them in our businesses.

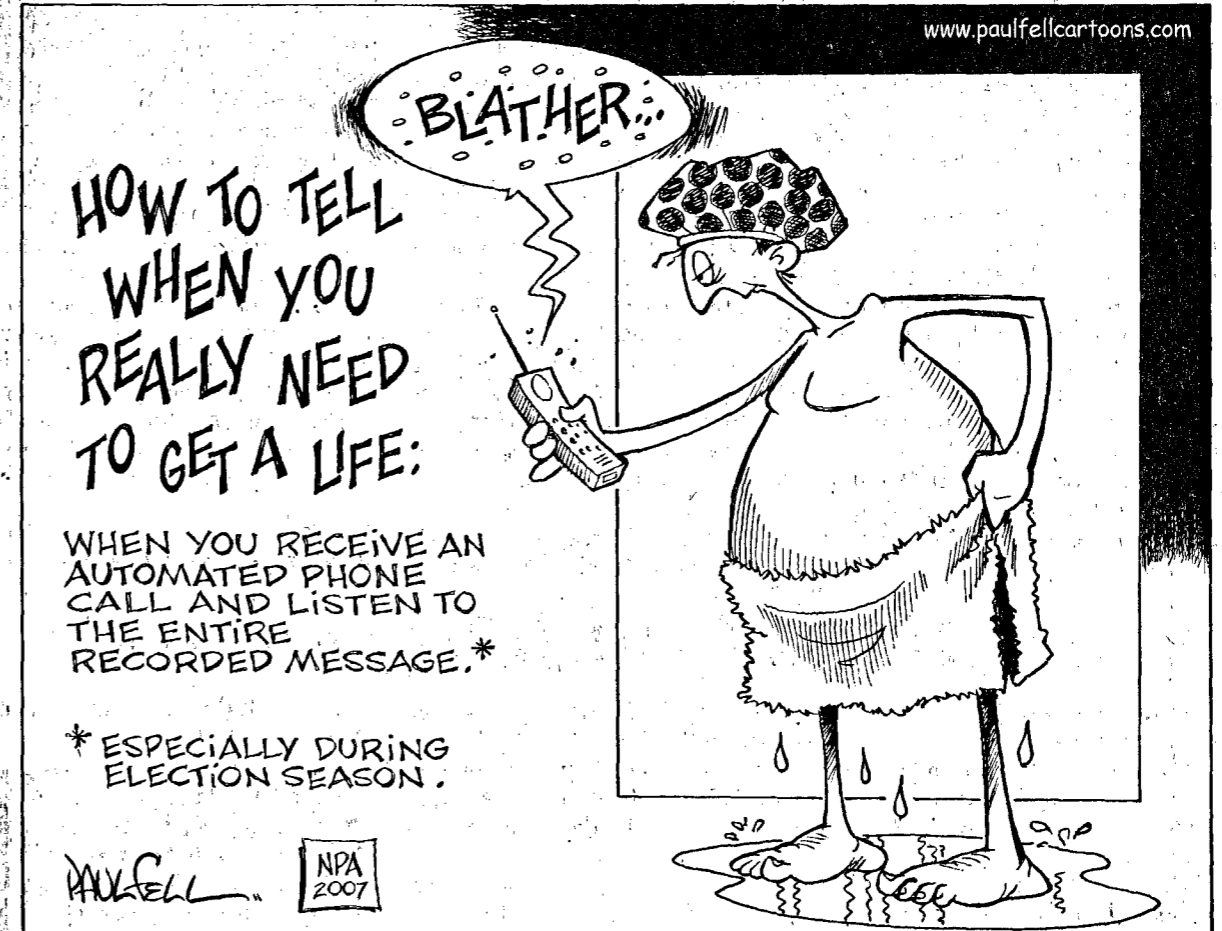

Politicians debate 'robo calls'

There are things you should not say to a politician.
"You can say that again!" is on the list.
Why? Because it is like being at a barbecue with your brother-in-law, and asking for a third recitation of how he scored that touchdown back in high school, in 1963. You shouldn't encourage it unless you really want it to happen.
There are, however, some refreshing exceptions to this rule. These sometimes manifest themselves in classic cases of overstatement, or understatement.
Such a case occurred in the Legislature last week.
Veteran Senator DiAnna Schimek of Lincoln was urging support for a bill that would limit the number of those maddening "robo calls" that plague the citizenry during political campaigns.
"I think it's very irritating to voters," Schimek said.
That, fellow citizens, ranks right up there with "I think property taxes a wee bit too high."
You probably have received some of those automated robo calls.
"Hello, this is Lefty Loudengross! I am a good guy and I'll do everything right. Vote for me. Thank you. And be sure to vote for me, Lefty Loudengross, the guy who's always right!"
Then there are negative robo ads from the other side.
"Hello. Lefty Loudengross says he is always on his toes - but did you know he only looks that way

because he wears shorts that are two sizes too small? Loudengross says it isn't true - but he refused to display his underwear when challenged at a recent debate!"
Lawmakers gave first-round approval to the Schimek bill. It would limit each campaign to unleashing no more than two robo calls each day on your residential line. They couldn't be made until after 8 a.m., and would have to stop by 9 p.m.
Senator Ernie Chambers, the legendary lawmaker who has served longer than any Nebraska legislator, will get what could be his last chance to eliminate the death penalty in 2008.
Chambers will be "term limited out" of the Unicameral at the end of next year's session. He has introduced legislation to repeal the death penalty in legislative session since his election.
This year his plan fell one vote short of advancing to the second of three stages of legislative debate.
Even if Chambers could muster the minimum 25 votes needed for its passage, the bill would face a certain veto from Governor Dave Heineman. The chances of garnering 30 votes for an override would be virtually nil.

Looking Ahead in Wayne

Next City Council Meeting
The next regular meeting of the Wayne City Council will be Tuesday, April 10 at 5:30 p.m. in the city office building at 306 Pearl Street.
Waste Water Plant Update
We are working to schedule an April date for the Waste Water Plant Committee to review the final Facility Plan and make a recommendation to the city council for what type of new plant to build and where to build it. Of the six options reviewed by engineering firm, the lowest construction cost appears to be about \$6 million for a plant at the same site that should last about 30 years. That cost does not include the extra costs of extra sewer lines and lift stations from future development in areas downhill from the current site.
We also want to look at the 30

year total life cycle cost of this option versus the life cycle cost of an alternative down stream site which would have fewer lift station costs and less sewer line required. If the two 30-year life cycle costs are reasonably close, this may be the time to relocate farther away from the middle of town.
An approximate timeline is: April 2007 - Committee recommends the option to build; April 2007 - City council distributes information to the public; May 2007 - City council selects the option to build; May 2007 - Council approves initial sewer rate increase to start paying for the new plant; November 2007 - Engineer has design complete; December 2007 - City council bids out for construction; 2008 - June 2009 - Construction of the new treatment plant.
On Street Parking Overnight
Council members have received recent requests for more on-street

parking overnight and discussed this topic at their annual retreat.
A committee has been appointed to review streets and areas of Wayne where overnight parking is occurring on the street, evaluate how that is working and evaluate increasing the number of areas where there could be more overnight parking. Any proposed changes in parking will be distributed to the public and will need to be approved by the city council at a public meeting.

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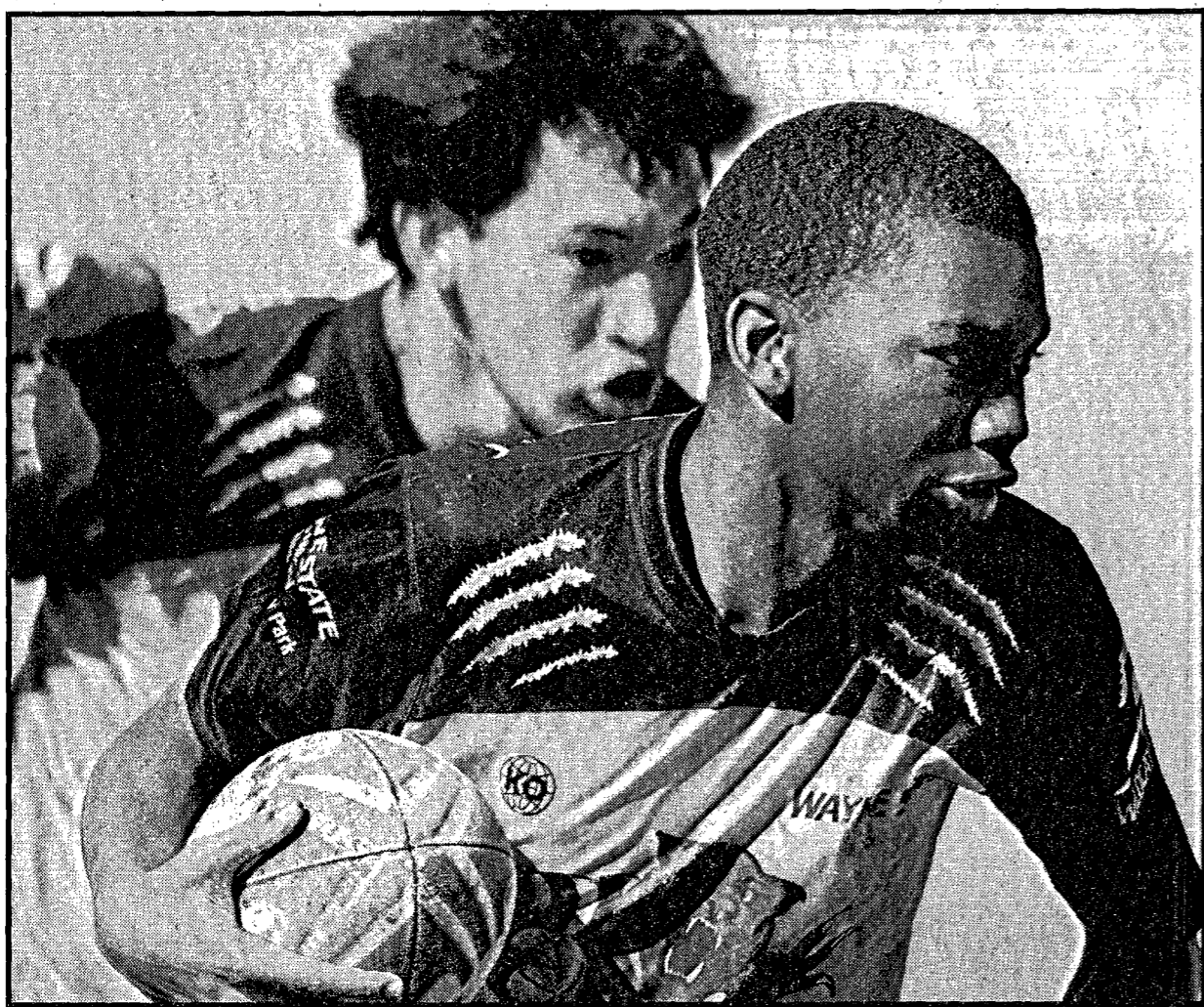
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Chris Madison advances the ball along side teammate Andrew Hurting in last weekend's Wayne Rugby Tournament at the Wayne Rugby Park.

WSC hosts annual rugby March Madness tourney

The annual Wayne Rugby Tournament is now history and this year's event drew 45 teams from 12 different states and Canada to Wayne on March 24-25. At the end of play on Sunday, both the WSC mens' and womens' teams qualified for the playoffs after going 6-0 in pool play. The WSC men posted wins over Duluth 27-0, Moorhead St. 24-0, and Macalister 20-0 on the opening day. The wins advanced WSC to Sunday's action against Central Missouri State, where the 'Cats fell 27-7. The WSC women defeated Moorhead State 20-0, Wisconsin River Falls 17-7 and St. Cloud State 7-5 in Saturday play.

They advanced to Sunday's championship game against the Heart of America All-Stars. WSC fell in the championship matchup by a mere five yards to be edged by the America All-Stars. "We were massive underdogs against this team, and there is no doubt this is the youngest and smallest team we have had in years, the girls did just what I told them, and played as hard as they could. On paper, we were 40 point underdogs in that game, and were just 5 yards short from winning the tournament championship," WSC rugby coach Darrin Barner said. With the WSC men and women starting up rugby conference play at South Dakota in Vermillion, S.D. on Saturday, the men will be

entering the game a bit bruised, while the WSC women will be going into the game without the starting quarterback or back up quarterback in the starting line up because of injuries from last weekend, Barner said. With both teams going to the first round of the national playoffs in Denver in two weeks, Coach Barner said he is hoping to fine tune the ruggers this week with a big victory over a very tough USD team this Saturday. WSC men will play SW Texas State in the first round of national playoffs, while the women will play the University of New Mexico.

Wayne golf team opens new season

As winter has quickly given way to spring, the Wayne High golf team has already logged three meets in the past week.

The squad opened the season on March 24 at the Crofton Invitational and then returned to the Crofton Lakeview Country Club on March 26 for a dual with Crofton.

The team also traveled to Indian Trails Country Club near Beemer for a triangular and JV meet in Madison on March 27.

In the opening meet, Andi Diediker fired an 86 to place third overall, while the team also took third with 369, behind Crofton (354) and Ponca (348).

The Wayne State College women's golf team faced stiff competition at the Missouri Western Invitational played March 25-26 at Fairview Golf Course and Moila Country Club in St. Joseph, Mo. The Wildcats finished the two-day tournament in seventh place with a team score of 812 after shooting rounds of 401 and 411. Nebraska-Omaha captured the team title with a 664 (339-325), 28 shots better than Upper Iowa's 692 (351-341). Leading the way for Wayne State was senior Johnna Olson, placing 30th overall with scores of 94 and 101

for a two-day total of 195. Norfolk Catholic freshman Hayley Pile followed in a tie for 31st at 200 (97-103) with Gretna freshman Kelsey Katsampas next in 34th place at 210 (107-103). Featuring the Liberty Bell image and the word "forever," the stamp will be good for mailing one-ounce First-Class letters anytime in the future - regardless of price changes. The Forever stamp goes on sale April 12 at 41 cents. Customers can begin using the stamp when postage changes May 14.

"Who said nothing lasts forever?" remarked Postmaster General and Chief Executive Officer John E. Potter in unveiling the image here



at the National Postal Forum. "The Forever stamp is a consumer innovation guaranteed to deliver unprecedented convenience and value to our customers. It's good forever."

Potter said the Liberty Bell was

selected because it resonates as one of the nation's most prominent and recognizable symbols associated with American independence.

Research has shown that customers prefer the Forever stamp for the convenience it offers by easing the transition for mailing letters when prices change. When postage changes in the future, it will reduce the need to buy one- and two-cent stamps.

Beginning April 12, the Forever stamp will be available in booklets of 20 through www.usps.com, by calling 1-800-STAMP-24 and in Post Office lobbies nationwide. Customers may also purchase the stamps in Post Office vending machines beginning April 14. Forever stamps will be available through Automated Postal Centers May 14. Automated Teller Machines (ATMs) will begin offering the Forever stamp in sheets of 18 later in May. Once prices change May 14, the Forever stamp will remain on sale at the 41-cent First-Class one-ounce letter price until the next price change. The Forever stamp will then be available at the new price.

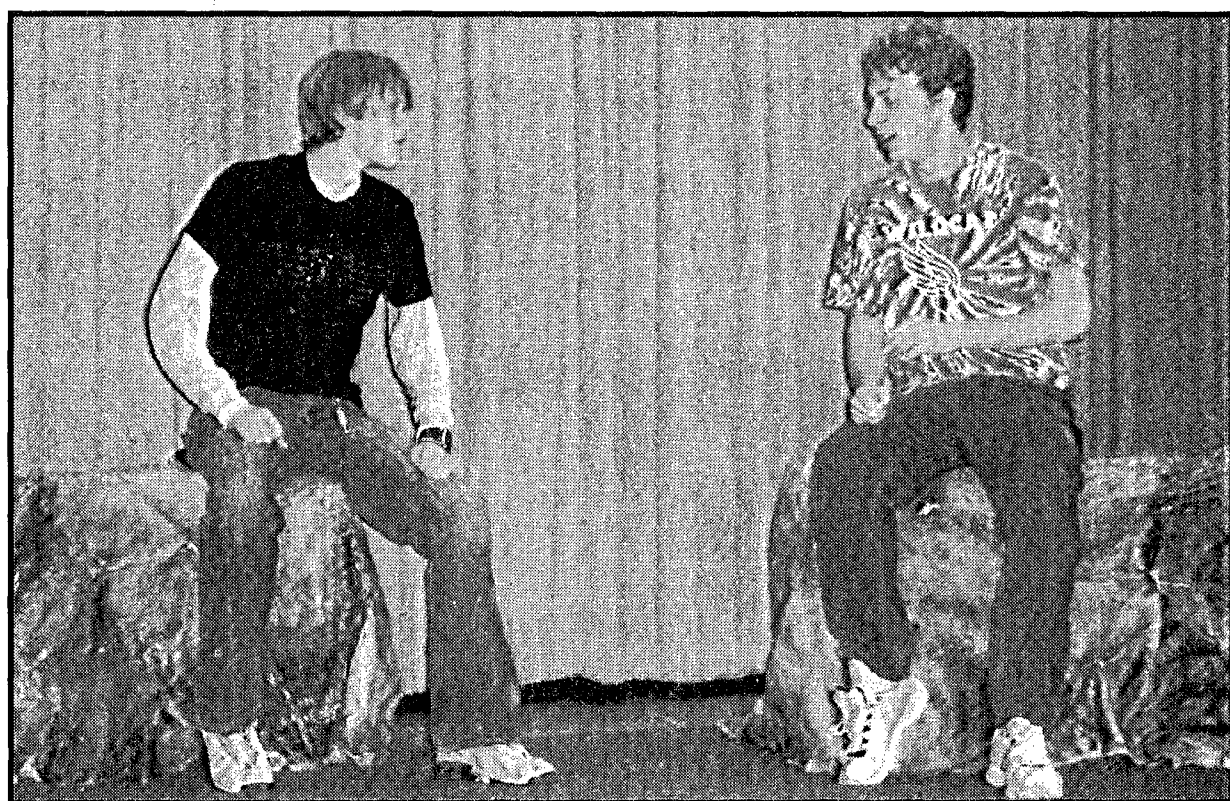

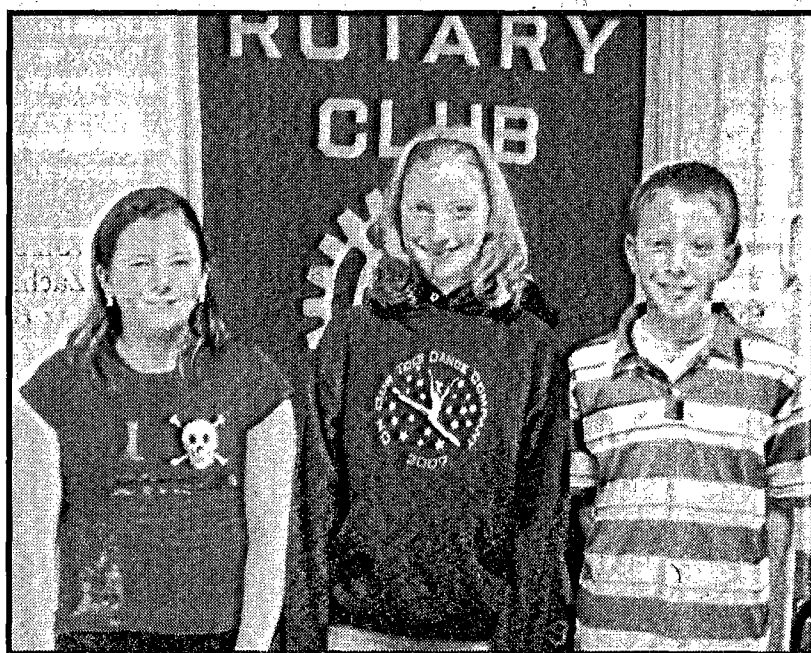

Christians approach Holy Week

The final week of Lent begins with the Sunday of the Passion: Palm Sunday. The week concludes with The Three Days: Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and The Easter Vigil.

"Maundy" is Latin for "command." The "command" which the church contemplates during the week is Jesus' One Command to Love the Lord God with heart, mind, and soul; and neighbor as oneself.

The most distinctive feature of the Sunday of the Passion is the procession with palms. This tradition originated in the church in Jerusalem during the fourth centu-

ry. The oldest Greek and Latin liturgical texts understand the branches as symbols of hope, life, and victory. The hero's welcome accorded Jesus was seen as anticipating his impending victory over death.

The week remembers Jesus' celebration of the Passover, his betrayal, persecution, trial, and crucifixion. The intensity of Jesus' suffering is upheld during this time—as dreadful as it is, it is not to be denied. Crucifixion was reserved for opponents of Roman authority. In that Jesus advocated the reign of God, he was opposed to earthly powers that used God's name for

their own sake. But suffering, especially the suffering of a crucifixion, once thought to be a curse, is not outside the realm of God's redemptive power. It takes much faith to embrace this idea, and that is the faith we see in Jesus.

A familiar hymn from Christian tradition attests to the church's understanding of this final event of Holy Week. "O Sacred Head now wounded, with grief and shame weighed down, now scornfully surrounded with thorns, thine only crown. O sacred head, what glory, what bliss till now was thine! Yet, though despised and gory, I joy to call thee mine."

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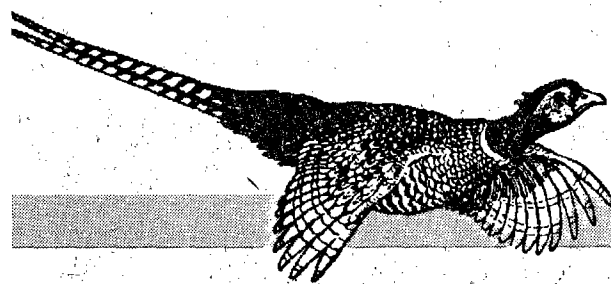
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Recent legislative debate brings about feelings on the death penalty

I was a student nurse when Charlie Starkweather was running loose in Lincoln, terrorizing everyone. Seventeen months after he was captured, he was executed. I don't remember any editorials at the time regarding "cruel and unusual punishment."

This year, on May 8, another man who killed has been sentenced to the electric chair, after almost 30 years on death row and many, many appeals.

One of the things the Big Farmer has enjoyed in his retirement is watching the state legislature on cable TV. I must admit that when a certain senator from Omaha is speaking, he sometimes finds the mute button. But, for the most part, he can indulge his interest in the legislative process from our living room.

Last week, the legislature debated the death penalty, after Senator Chambers introduced his annual bill to repeal it. There were thoughtful, cogent arguments presented both for and against, and the vote was 25 to 24 to retain it.

Ironically, our grandson, Alex, was in a play presented by Concordia University last week called Dead Man Walking. I didn't see the movie, though I certainly

knew the story. In fact, at a recent Women of Faith conference, I had heard a woman speak who was one of the rape victims of the man featured in the story.

As most of you know, it's a powerful narrative by a nun who befriended people on death row; most notably, a man sentenced for the rape of a woman and the murder of both her and her boyfriend on a lover's lane in Louisiana.

Of course, because Alex was in it,

we made plans to see it. And of course, I didn't sleep very well that night. The student who portrayed the nun did a fantastic job, as did the young man who played the murderer.

Sister Helen even visited the families of the murdered boy and girl and attended a support group of parents who have lost children to violent crime. She also joined a protest vigil outside the state prison on the night of the execution.

I think the important thing was that the perpetrator received redemption before his death. That certainly made her efforts worthwhile. And I am sure that anyone accused of murder has access to spiritual counsel.

One of the problems with the death penalty is that it is unevenly enforced. The two young people who murdered the Stocks at Murdock pled guilty in exchange for life sentences. And I can certainly understand Senator Mike Flood's concern that the men involved in the bank shootings in Norfolk be properly punished.

I guess I still don't know how I stand on capital punishment. I do know it is a serious subject; one that will continue to be debated, as it should be.

Getting the most benefit from fertilizing grass pastures

Bruce Anderson, UNL forage specialist shares his recommendations for fertilizing cool season grasses.

As temperatures warm and spring nears, cool-season grass pastures will be greening up. If you're planning to fertilize your

pastures, get the most from your investment by combining fertilizer use with efficient harvest of the extra growth.

If you fertilize pastures in spring and then let animals graze continuously throughout the season, most of the extra growth is wasted. Livestock will trample some of the grass and manure will foul some of it so that cattle won't bed down in it and may refuse to eat it. Eventually, as little as one-third of the grass produced will end up in the mouth and stomach of your livestock.

To make fertilizer pay, manage grazing so more of what you grow

actually gets eaten. This will happen if you subdivide pastures with cross-fences and control when and where animals graze. Give animals access to no more than one-fourth of your pasture at a time and preferably less. Then graze off about one-half of the growth before moving to another area.

Another step is to time fertilization to stimulate grass growth when you need it. Many pastures grow faster than we can use them in spring. Why fertilize the pasture in early spring to grow more grass than you can use at that time?

Instead, fertilize some pastures now, and wait until mid-May to fertilize the other pastures for extra summer growth. If it happens to be dry at that time, you can save your fertilizer dollars since fertilizer will do little good without rain.

Keep these principles in mind as we approach springtime. Northeast Nebraska has received very beneficial rain and snow this spring so there is adequate moisture for the grasses to be stimulated for growth with more nutrients. This would be a good year to take advantage of the grass growth this spring.
