


The LB115 smoking ban was the next topic discussed by the senators. All three of the senators believe smoking is bad and that second hand smoke should not be forced onto people. That is where the similarities in beliefs ends and the differences begin with Dierks fully supporting the smoking ban while Engel and Flood believe there should be a compromise added to the bill which would allow the ban to be lifted by local governments.

"I believe it should be a local issue, not a state issue," Engel said.

"Businesses already have the choice to be non-smoking," Flood said. "Where does the bill end?"

The next five topics were discussed briefly. They included: term limits, the Governor's budget proposal, LB696 the marriage prep bill, LB 700 human cloning

## Governor speaks about education

Gov. Dave Heineman was the keynote speaker for the Nebraska Network for Educational Renewal (NeNER) conference held at Wayne State College on Friday. The conference celebrated the 10-year anniversary of NeNER and included an opportunity for discussion regarding topics within the field of education.

In his address, Gov. Heineman noted how important education is in the 21st century. In a global marketplace, education is vital to the economy of our state and we have to be ready to compete; science and math are especially important. Gov. Heineman told educators that Nebraska must try to keep students in the state after

In a diverse economy, Nebraska has great things to offer graduates of all ages. Having I-80 run through the state helps support restaurants and hotels, along with Nebraska's transportation and tourism industries. There are also more ethanol plants opening up in Nebraska than any other state, which is creating new economic development opportunities in small, rural communities throughout the state.

Another booming business is Pay Pal, which is owned by eBay. Pay Pal opened an operations center in Omaha in 2003. The company recently completed an expansion and employs more than 2,000 people, primarily those with finance or MBA degrees from colleges in Nebraska. The business is used 24/7 and has a global-based market.

"There is a relationship between education and the vitality of our state," Gov. Heineman said. "We have to make sure we are providing our students with the right

stuff and educators are key to doing that." Gov. Heineman added that the equation for a good education is the same today as it as 50 years ago saying, "Good teacher and good parental involvement equals

good students." He noted his wife has been in education for 35 years and even since her retirement more than a year ago, you can find her devoting her weekdays, evenings and weekends to her work as first lady, just as other teachers do.

Gov. Heineman told everyone that they already know that parents are the first and best teachers of our children and in a perfect world, it would be best to have both parents involved in their sons or daughters education. Today, there are more single parents than ever before and it's a challenge to get parents involved. Learning takes place not just in the classroom but also in everyday life. In spite of it all, it is the responsibility of parents to help get their children ready for school everyday and sometimes it takes tough love to get that done. Grown children will often thank parents for that kind of involvement in their education.

While Nebraska is fourth highest in the number of students graduating from high school, only 59 percent go on to college, which the governor noted was average.

We can do better," Gov. Heineman said. "We need to raise expectations. Children will respond. We owe it to them."

Gov. Heineman added that schools should have a rigorous curriculum and an assessment system demonstrating school performance. He said the culture in schools needs to change, noting that academic achievement should be promoted as much as athletic accomplishments.

Gov. Heineman noted that in government, there has to be a greater effort made to control spending. "No doubt that will be difficult to do, but I believe it can be done." The challenge for the future is that fund-

The plan proposes the consolidation of 12 Nebraska FSA Offices which will allow the Agency to more adequately staff remaining offices, FSA," said Milton Rogers, State FSA thus improving efficiency and service to Nebraska producers.

"The review of operations was required by the FSA Administrator with the goal of identifying the optimum network of FSA offices, staffing, training and technology within existing budget and staffing resources," said State Executive Director Brian Wolford. "The Nebraska State Committee met with FSA County Committee members, employee associations, and a committee of FSA employees to gather input for criteria used to analyze operations in Nebraska. The Committee's would address agency challenges, better support our staff and improve efficiency and service to producers."

"Maintaining a structure of 81 offices while staffing levels continue to decline has taken its toll on Nebraska Committee chairman. "We agreed with the feedback from those employees that felt something needed to be done to address our most critical staffing challenges."

County office workload was the primary criteria used to analyze and establish operations. The proposal dedicates one County Executive Director (CED) to each resulting FSA location. 


They are proudly displayed in his front yard and people always drive by after the fair to see if he gained a new one and what it looks like.

## Politicians debate 'robo calls'

There are things you should not say to a politician.

"You can say that again!" is on

Why? Because it is like being at a barbecue with your brother-in-law, and asking for a third recitation of how he scored that touchdown back in high school, in 1963. You shouldn't encourage it unless you really want it to happen.

There are, however, some refreshing exceptions to this rule. These sometimes manifest themselves in classic cases of overstatement, or understatement.

Such a case occurred in the Legislature last week.

Veteran Senator DiAnna Schimek of Lincoln was urging support for a bill that would limit the number of those maddening "robo calls" that plague the citizenry during political campaigns.

"I think it's very irritating to voters," Schimek said.

That, fellow citizens, ranks right up there with "I think property taxes a wee bit too high.'

You probably have received some of those automated robo calls.

"Hello, this is Lefty Loudengross! I am a good guy and I'll do everything right. Vote for me. Thank you. And be sure to vote for me, Lefty Loudengross, the guy who's always right!"

Then there are negative robo ads from the other side.

"Hello. Lefty Loudengross says he is always on his toes - but did you know he only looks that way because he wears shorts that are by 9 p.m. two sizes too small? Loudengross says it isn't true - but he refused to display his underwear when challenged at a recent debate!"

Lawmakers gave first-round approval to the Schimek bill. It would limit each campaign to unleashing no more than two robo calls each day on your residential line. They couldn't be made until after 8 a.m., and would have to stop


Senator Ernie Chambers, the legendary lawmaker who has served longer than any Nebraska legislator, will get what could be his last chance to eliminate the death penalty in 2008.

Chambers will be "term limited out" of the Unicameral at the end of next year's session. He has introduced legislation to repeal the death penalty in legislative session

This year his plan fell one vote short of advancing to the second of three stages of legislative debate.

Even if Chambers could muster the minimum 25 votes needed for its passage, the bill would face a certain veto from Governor Dave Heineman. The chances of garnering 30 votes for an override would be virtually nil.

Waste Water Plant Update

We are working to schedule an April date for the Waste Water Plant Committee to review the final Facility Plan and make a recommendation to the city council for what type of new plant to build and where to build it. Of the six options reviewed by engineering firm, the lowest construction cost appears to be about \$6 million for a plant at the same site that should last about 30 years. That cost does not include the extra costs of extra sewer lines and lift stations from future development in areas downhill from the current site.

We also want to look at the 30

year total life cycle cost of this option versus the life cycle cost of an alternative down stream site which would have fewer lift station costs and less sewer line required. If the two 30-year life cycle costs are reasonably close, this may be the time to relocate farther away from the middle of town.

An approximate timeline is: April 2007 - Committee recommends the option to build; April 2007 - City council distributes information to the public; May 2007 - City council selects the option to build; May 2007

Council approves initial sewer rate increase to start paying for the new plant; November 2007 - Engineer has design complete; December 2007 - City council bids out for construction; 2008 - June 2009 -Construction of the new treatment plant.





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
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## WSC student musician selected as winner to perform with symphony

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




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

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

Featuring the Liberty Bell image and the word "forever," the stamp will be good for mailing one-ounce First-Class letters anytime in the future - regardless of price changes. The Forever stamp goes on sale April 12 at 41 cents. Customers can begin using the stamp when postage changes May

"Who said nothing lasts forever?" remarked Postmaster General and Chief Executive Officer John E. Potter in unveiling the image here

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at the National Postal Forum. "The Forever stamp is a consumer innovation guaranteed to deliver unprecedented convenience and value to our customers. It's good forever.

Potter said the Liberty Bell was

selected because it resonates as one of the nation's most prominent and recognizable symbols associated with American independence.

Research has shown that customers prefer the Forever stamp for the convenience it offers by easing the transition for mailing letters when prices change. When postage changes in the future, it will reduce the need to buy oneand two-cent stamps.

Beginning April, 12, the Forever stamp will be available in booklets of 20 through www.usps.com, by calling 1-800-STAMP-24 and in Post Office lobbies nationwide. Customers may also purchase the stamps in Post Office vending machines beginning April 14. Forever stamps will be available

through Automated Postal Centers May 14. Automated Teller Machines (ATMs) will begin offering the Forever stamp in sheets of 18 later in May. Once prices change May 14, the Forever stamp will remain on sale at the 41-cent First-Class one-ounce letter price until the next price change. The week remembers Jesus' celebration of the Passover, his betrayal, persecution, trial, and crucifixion. The intensity of Jesus' suffering is upheld during this time--as dreadful as it is, it is not to be The most distinctive feature of denied. Crucifixion was reserved for opponents of Roman authority. In that Jesus advocated the reign of God, he was opposed to earthly powers that used God's name for


especially the suffering of a crucifixion, once thought to be a curse, is not outside the realm of God's redemptive power. It takes much faith to embrace this idea, and that is the faith we see in Jesus.



## Recent legislative debate brings about feelings on the death penalty

Charlie Starkweather was running loose in Lincoln, terrorizing everyone. Seventeen months after he was captured, he was executed. I don't remember any editorials at the time regarding "cruel and unusual punishment."

This year, on May 8, another man who killed has been sentenced to the electric chair, after almost 30 years on death row and many, many appeals.

One of the things the Big Farmer has enjoyed in his retirement is watching the state legislature on cable TV. I must admit that when a certain senator from Omaha is speaking, he sometimes finds the mute button. But, for the most part, he can indulge his interest in the legislative process from our living room.

Last week, the legislature debated the death penalty, after Senator Chambers introduced his annual bill to repeal it, There were thoughtful, cogent arguments presented both for and against, and the vote was 25 to 24 to retain it.

Ironically, our grandson, Alex, was in a play presented by Concordia University last week called Dead Man Walking. I didn't see the movie, though I certainly

I was a student nurse when knew the story. In fact, at a recent we made plans to see it. And of Women of Faith conference, I had heard a woman speak who was one of the rape victims of the man featured in the story.

> As most of you know, it's a powerful narrative by a nun who



befriended people on death row; most notably, a man sentenced for the rape of a woman and the murder of both her and her boyfriend on a lover's lane in Louisiana.

Of course, because Alex was in it,

course, I didn't sleep very well that night. The student who portrayed the nun did a fantastic job, as did the young man who played the murderer.

Sister Helen even visited the families of the murdered boy and girl and attended a support group of parents who have lost children to violent crime. She also joined a protest vigil outside the state prison on the night of the execution.

I think the important thing was that the perpetrator received redemption before his death. That certainly made her efforts worthwhile. And I am sure that anyone accused of murder has access to spiritual counsel.

One of the problems with the death penalty is that it is unevenly enforced. The two young people who murdered the Stocks at Murdock pled guilty in exchange for life sentences. And I can certainly understand Senator Mike Flood's concern that the men involved in the bank shootings in Norfolk be properly punished.

I guess I still don't know how I stand on capital punishment. I do know it is a serious subject; one that will continue to be debated, as it should be.



## Getting the most benefit from fertilizing grass pastures

Bruce Anderson, UNL forage actually gets eaten. This will hapspecialist shares his recommendations for fertilizing cool season cross-fences and control when and grasses.

As temperatures warm and spring nears, cool-season grass pastures will be greening up. If you're planning to fertilize your



pastures, get the most from your investment by combining fertilizer use with efficient harvest of the extra growth.

If you fertilize pastures in spring and then let animals graze continuously throughout the season, most of the extra growth is wasted. Livestock will trample some of the grass and manure will foul some of it so that cattle won't bed down in it and may refuse to eat it. Eventually, as little as one-third of the grass produced will end up in the mouth and stomach of your livestock.

To make fertilizer pay, manage go to a rail fence pillow workshop grazing so more of what you grow

pen if you subdivide pastures with where animals graze. Give animals access to no more than one-fourth of your pasture at a time and preferably less. Then graze off about one-half of the growth before moving to another area.

Another step is to time fertilization to stimulate grass growth when you need it. Many pastures grow faster than we can use them in spring. Why fertilize the pasture in early spring to grow more grass than you can use at that time? the grass growth this spring.
