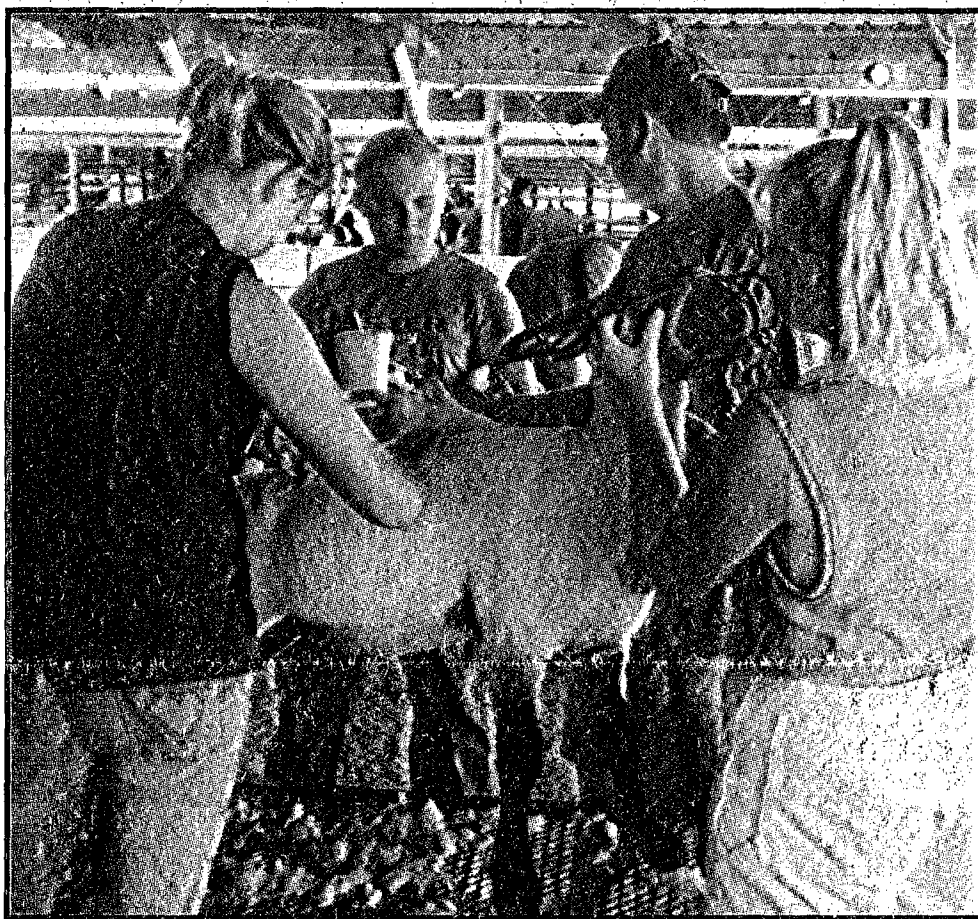
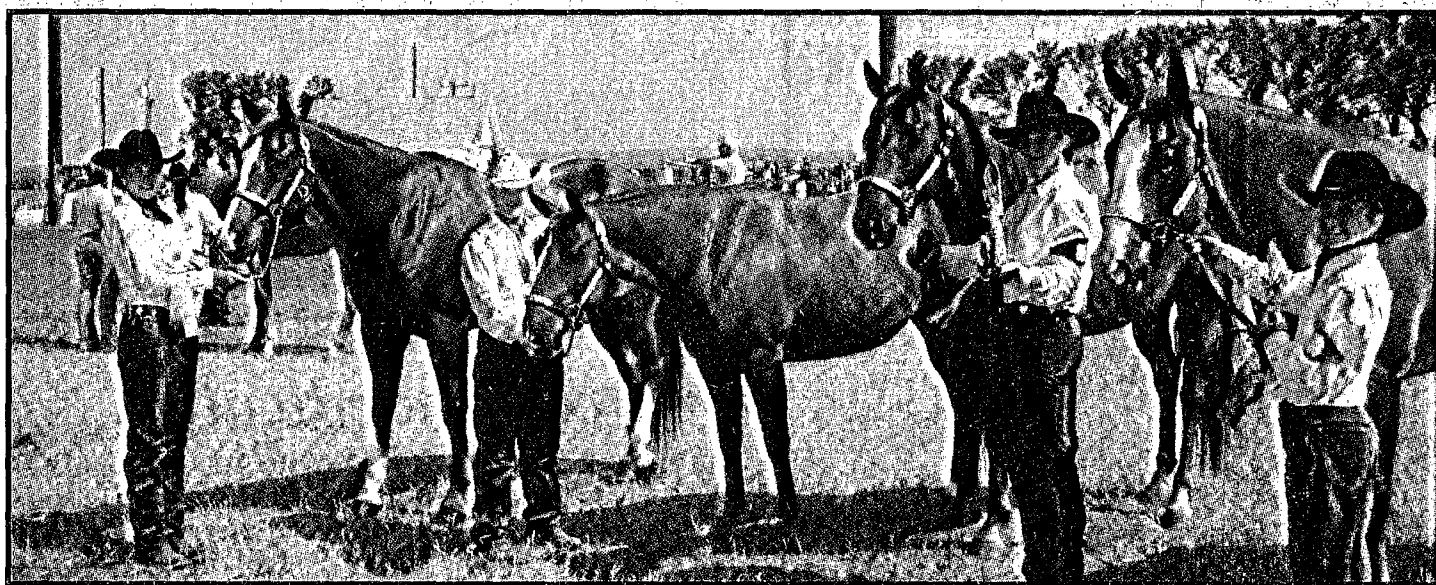

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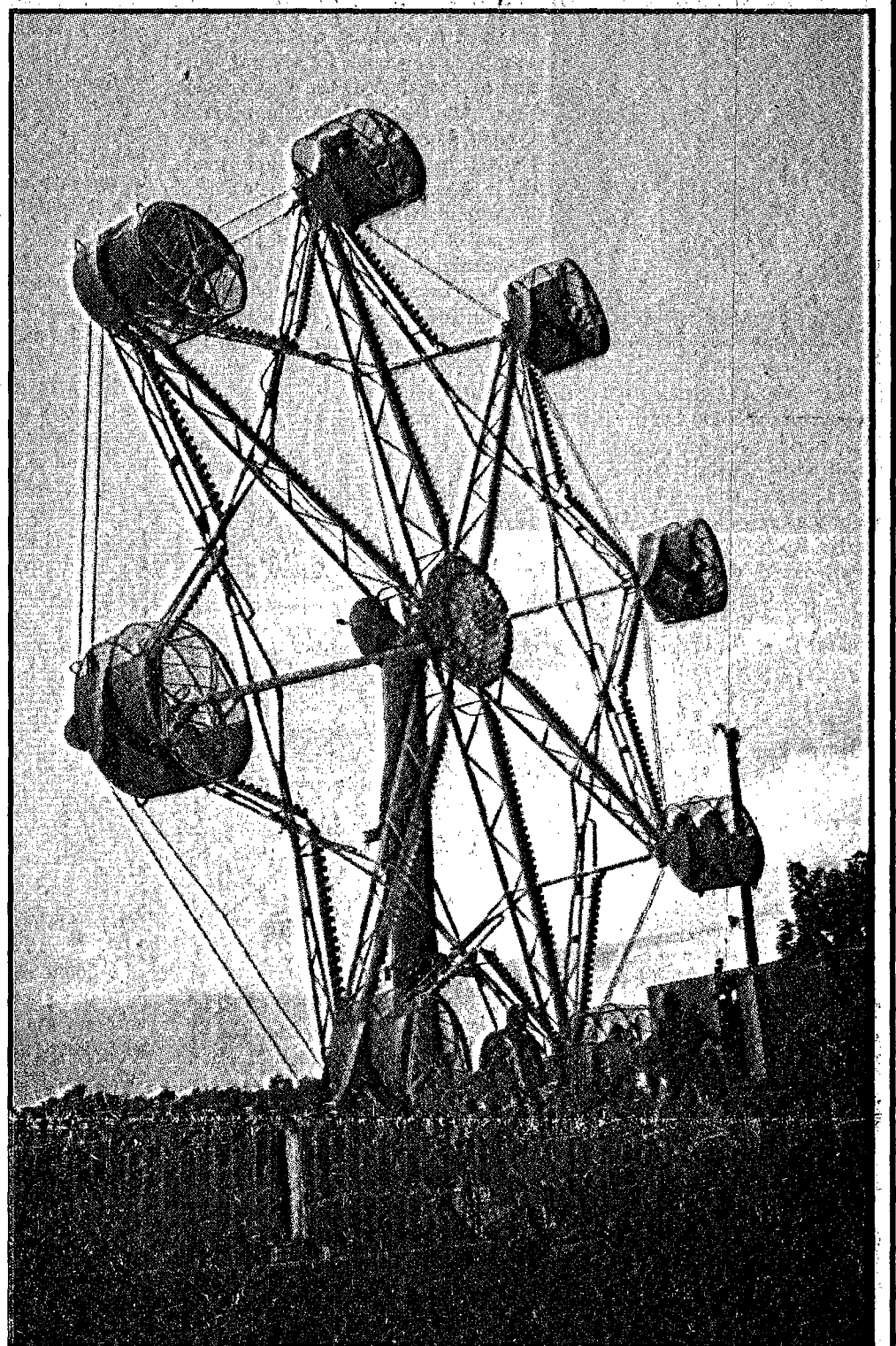

Roof concerns are discussed

Roofing issues at the Wayne Library/Senior Center were raised during Tuesday's meeting of the Wayne City Council.

City Planner/Inspector George Ellyson told the council that there is a lack of ventilation between the insulation and sheathing in the building and this has "compromised the aging shingles on the building."

The problems with the roof have been discovered by the city and Hattig Construction during a scheduled roof replacement project. Among the issues is the fact that the building was not constructed according to code. Ellyson recommended a review of the construction and ventilation by a Building Mechanical Engineer.

The replacement project has been ongoing for several weeks and has resulted in a number of discoveries in the way the building was constructed approximately 10

years ago.

Tom Hattig of Hattig Construction told the council "there is a lot more that may need to be done."

The council approved the extension of the completion deadline for the project to Aug. 1, 2008 and the purchase of additional supplies for the project.

In other action, the council passed a resolution approving the submittal of an application for grant/loan assistance to construct a 20,000 square foot Opportunity Building shell.

Lisa Hurley, Community Economic Development Coordinator with the Northeast Nebraska Economic Development District, spoke to the council on the grant application and the costs involved to both the city and Wayne Industries.

The grant will be submitted to the Nebraska Department of Economic Development for a building to be constructed on Lot 3 of the Kardell Industrial

Subdivision.

The council also accepted the bids for two generators for use by the city in case of an emergency.

A bid of \$17,920 from Northeast Nebraska Equipment of Wayne for a 45 kva generator and a bid of \$33,896 from Rexco Equipment of Gretna for a 120 kva generator were approved.

A contract was also awarded to Hopkins Cable of Dakota City for the 2007 Project for overhead to underground conversion of electrical lines.

The project involves an area of the city near the Wayne National Guard Armory and the bid was reviewed and approved by the city's engineer for the project, DeWild Grant Reckert and Associates Company.

The council approved Mayor Lois Shelton's appointments of Jeff Brady and Doug Echtenkamp to the Wastewater Committee.

The council will next meet in regular session on Tuesday, Aug. 21 at 5:30 p.m.

Nebraska dentists to provide free dental care in two-day Mission of Mercy

Nebraska dentists, the Nebraska Dental Association and the Nebraska Dental Association Foundation will host a two-day free dental clinic in Norfolk on Friday and Saturday, Sept. 7-8.

The third annual Mission of Mercy will be held at the Divots' DeVent Center, 4200 W. Norfolk Avenue. The center is located on the west side of Norfolk on West Norfolk Avenue/Highway 275. The dentists will treat both children and adults. Child care is available while parents are being treated. Spanish translators will also be on hand to assist the Spanish speaking.

The event is funded privately, with no tax dollars being used.

According to Dr. Bob Smith, retired Norfolk oral surgeon and chairperson of the third annual Mission of Mercy, dentists will begin seeing patients at 6 a.m. each day and continue until late afternoon. Organizers hope to attract more patients than last year's 1,800. Services to be provided include cleanings, sealants, fillings, extractions, and education about dental health, all at no cost to the patient.

The first Mission of Mercy was held in

North Platte in 2005 and drew over 900 patients. Participating dentists, hygienists, chairside assistants, and other volunteers performed about \$357,000 in free dental care.

The 2006 event in Grand Island attracted over 150 dentists, 50 hygienists, 80 chairside assistants, and 140 other volunteers who performed over \$640,000 in free dental care.

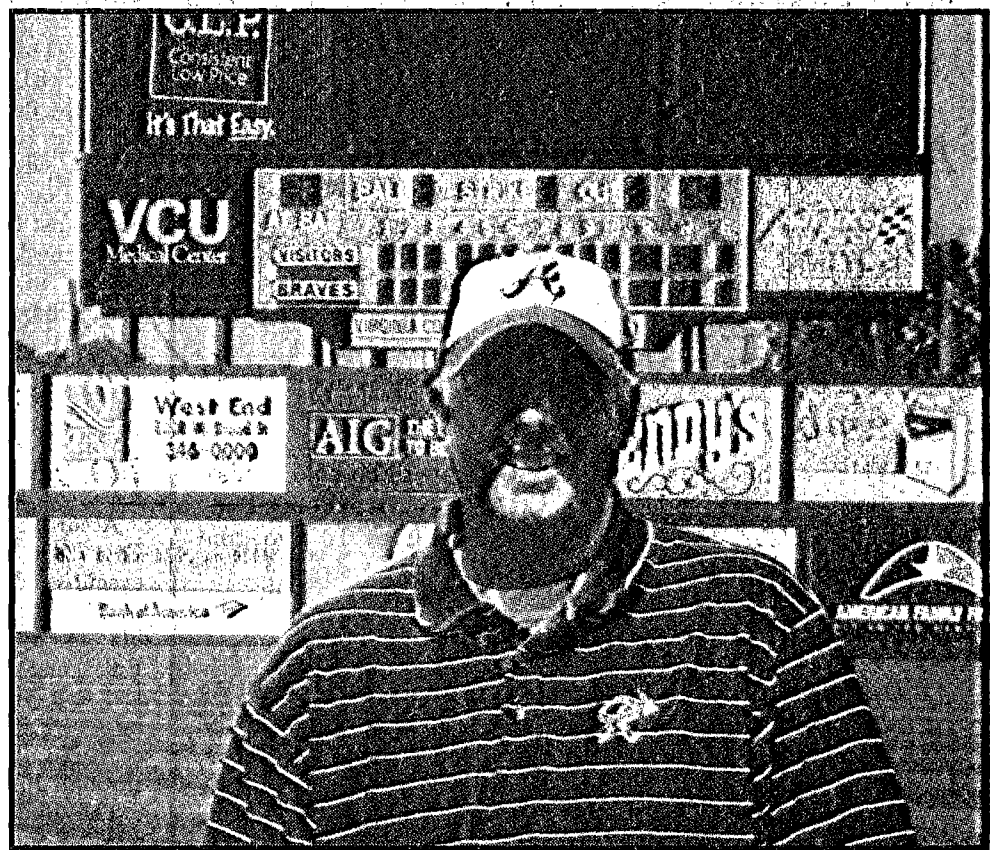
The Mission of Mercy efforts in this area originated in Kansas. The Kansas Mission of Mercy brought more than 50 dental chairs to Grand Island last year. Thanks to a \$100,000 grant from the Peter Kiewit Foundation, the Nebraska Dental Association was able to purchase 30 dental chairs and 40 portable lights last year. An additional 20 dental chairs and 10 portable lights were purchased this year.

"The growth of the Nebraska Mission of Mercy tells us there is a large number of underserved who need our services," Dr. Smith said. "Most come in pain because they can not afford dental care and leave feeling much better after receiving dental care that costs them nothing."

This year's event in Norfolk is expected to attract up to 120 volunteer dentists, 40 volunteer hygienists, 100 volunteer dental assistants, 80 volunteer nurses, and 80 volunteer translators, plus over 300 other volunteers. Dental services will be provided at 94 portable dental units/chairs, with 44 on loan from the Kansas Mission of Mercy.

"We are looking forward to this year's event," Dr. Smith said. "All those involved in past Missions of Mercy have found it to be an extremely worthwhile, gratifying endeavor. Our volunteers on every level enjoy being a part of it while our patients are most appreciative of the free services they receive on those two days."

"Monetary donations are still being accepted to defray expenses for the Mission of Mercy. Volunteers are also needed during the two-day clinic and for set-up and tear-down on Sept. 6 and 9. 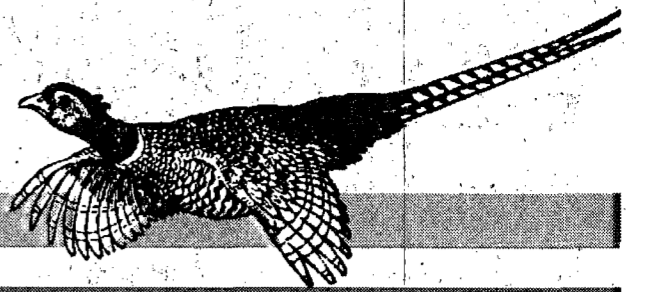
Stoltenberg has high praise for those who helped him develop his skills and love of the game of baseball.

George W. Kyl, 95, of Bloomfield, Iowa, died Monday, July 23, 2007 at the Davis County Hospital Long Term Care.

He was born April 6, 1912 in Wisner to John G. and Johanna (Boonstra) Kyl. He married Rachel Taylor in September 1941. She died in November 1962. He then married Charlotte Smith Brown on May 24, 1963. She died Aug. 9, 1995. He graduated from high school in Mitchell, S. D. in 1930. University research yielding new way to measure tendon injury

A University of Nebraska-Lincoln biomedical engineer is developing a new approach to measuring tendon injury that could lead to earlier detection and improved treatment.

Greg Bashford, a scientist in UNL's Department of Biological Systems Engineering, is working with colleagues at the University of Southern California and Madonna Rehabilitation Hospital in Lincoln to improve early detection of tendon degeneration due to age, overuse or a systemic disease known as tendinosis. The condition can strike tendons in both the legs and arms. "The tendon pain can persist for quite a long time - weeks, months, years," said Kornelia Kulig, a biomechanics scientist at USC who's one of the partners in the research. "The pain comes and goes, and it does affect a person's lifestyle," including ability to work.

Currently, magnetic resonance imaging is used to assess potential tendon injury, but that process is expensive and unable to determine the degree and stage of injury, Bashford said. He and his colleagues set out to see if ultrasound, a more cost-effective procedure, could determine the existence of tendon injury even before there's pain and also measure its severity.

Bashford said the work builds on about a decade of research by Kulig and Judith Burnfield, director of Madonna's Movement Sciences Center.

Researchers gathered about 1,000 ultrasound images of selected tendons in the legs from 40 subjects in California and Lincoln - 10 with no known tendon injury, 10 with suspected tendon injury, 10 runners susceptible to tendon injury and 10 individuals with spinal cord injuries whose leg use is minimal.

Bashford analyzed the ultrasound images using different software approaches, some already

established and some that he created. He was able to determine, with more than 80 percent accuracy, whether the subject had sustained injury to the tendon, resulting in tendinosis.

Ultrasound images of healthy tendons show tissue organized in parallel bundles, Bashford said. Images of damaged tendon show bundles that are disorganized with, in some cases, thicker sections of tissue.

Computer analysis was able to distinguish between normal and damaged tendons with a variety of images taken from different angles, Bashford added.

These findings could have important ramifications for patients dealing with tendon damage, said Kulig and Burnfield.

"If you can detect injury earlier, that allows for therapeutic interventions beyond waiting for surgical solutions," Burnfield said.

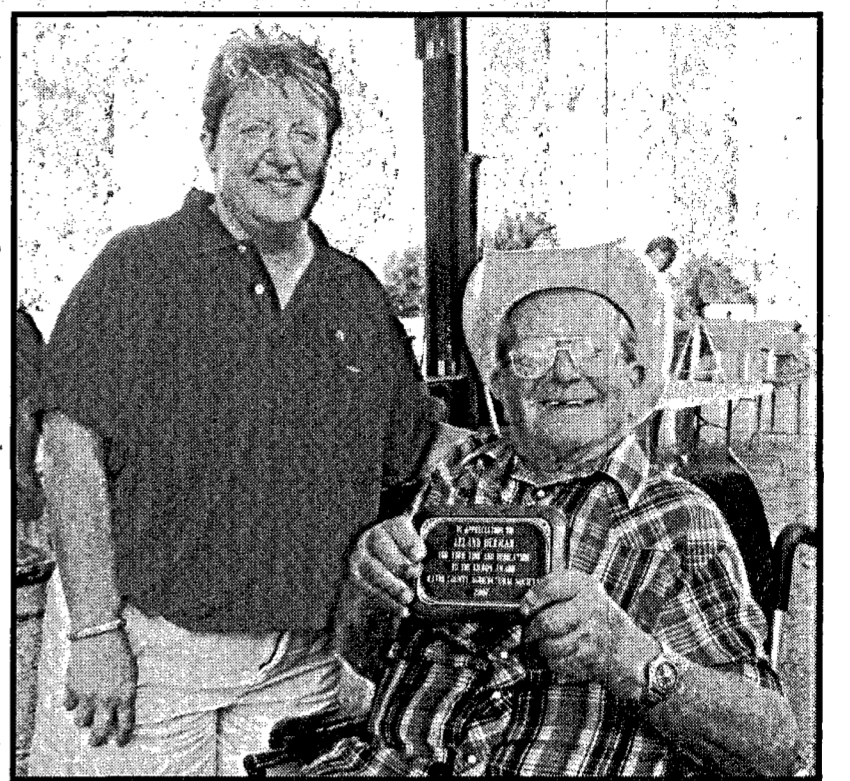
Researchers plan to continue studying the use of ultrasound. They want to focus on its effectiveness in measuring the severity of tendinosis. That could have important treatment ramifications because it could track a patient's progress over time, said Kulig and Burnfield, who are both physical therapists.

The research also gave Nick Tomsen, a biological systems engineering student from Minden, some valuable experience. Tomsen got involved in feeding data into the computer as researchers trained the software to recognize the difference between damaged and undamaged tendons.

"I was given a task and... given a lot of room to try out my own thoughts and learn on my own," said Tomsen, who graduated in May and will enter medical school at the University of Iowa this fall. "It was very cool to have a hand in this at the undergraduate level."

The Department of Biological Systems Engineering is a part of the university's Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources.

The Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources includes UNL Extension, the Agricultural Research Division and the College of Agricultural Sciences and Natural Resources. A 2007 study by an independent organization found IANR annually returns at least \$15 in benefits to Nebraskans for every dollar of state support, making it a primary engine for economic and social sustainability (atworkfornebraska.unl.edu).

Emergency loans available to Nebraska farmers

According to Brian Wolford, Farm Service Agency (FSA) state executive director, family farmers in 44 Nebraska counties are eligible to apply for low interest Emergency (EM) loans due to physical and production losses caused by severe storms, and flooding that occurred from May 28, 2007 through June 2, 2007.

The 15 Nebraska counties that were declared a disaster area became eligible for disaster assistance due to a Presidential Major Disaster Declaration signed on July 24, 2007. Those counties are: Madison, Wheeler, Buffalo,

Frontier, Hitchcock, Lincoln, Custer, Greeley, Howard, Logan, Valley, Dawson, Hayes, Kearney and Loup. Additional counties became eligible for the assistance because they are contiguous to one or more of the primary designated counties and they include: Wayne, Pierce, Platte, Stanton, Antelope, Holt, Boone, Rock and Brown.

Emergency loan applications are available and must be submitted through the local FSA county office from any applicant who qualifies for a physical or production loss (at least a 30 percent reduction from normal) in a single enterprise from this disaster in these counties. The deadline for submitting applications is March 24, 2008.

Churches intrigue traveler

Editor's note: This is the 13th in a series of articles written by Dean Jacobs about his travel excursions through Ethiopia.

Without a doubt, the star of the ancient sites of Ethiopia is

As I walked around the churches through the narrow alleyways or gully that connect the structures, taking photos of monks and pilgrims, a sense of awe overcame me. The time, effort and devotion to

If it were not lost in the mountains of Ethiopia Africa, it would be considered one of the major wonders of the world. It is one of the most profound Christian creations I have ever experienced.

Carved into the shape of a Greek cross, the church is a masterpiece of art, labor, skill and devotion.

I took a moment of silence before leaving on my last visit and walked back to my hotel room for dinner. Later that night, as the wind blew steadily across the mountainside, I set a chair outside in the dark empty space of my hotel compound. For an hour I sat there looking up at the clear nighttime sky, staring at stars often not visible because of city lights and I wondered where the carving angels might be that night.

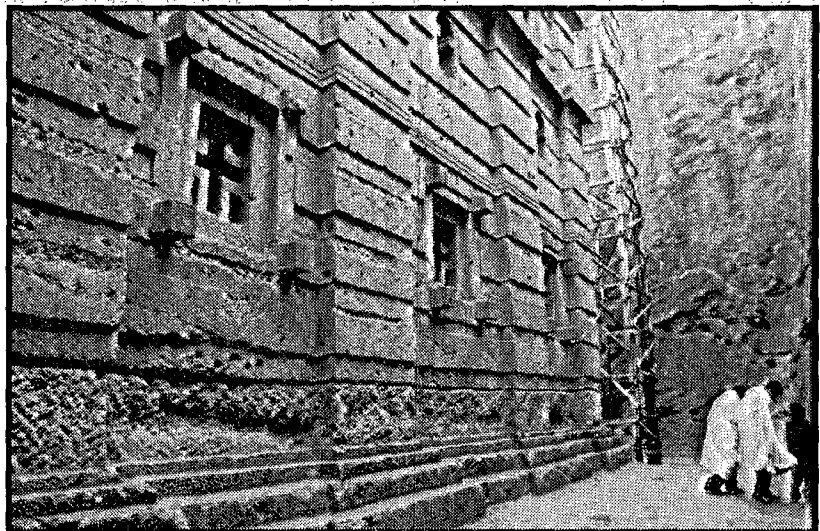
Lalibela, with its rock-hewn churches that date back to the 12th and 13th century.

Named after the king who gave the decree to have them built and set high in the Lasta mountains, the creation of the churches are shrouded in mystery. Some have estimated it would have taken 40,000 workers to carve these amazing structures from stone. Local legends have it that angels came in the night to work as the people slept.

The churches are big, some over 30 feet high, and because they are carved from the rock at ground level and down, all eleven churches are all surrounded by trenches and courtyards that were once solid red rock, creating a cavity with a church at its center.

create such splendid buildings are overwhelming. I can't even carve the frosting on a cake, so the skill and dedication to create these churches is beyond my comprehension.

Part of the appeal of these amazing structures is the fact they are still in use today. They are not a relic from the past that is taken from the closet and paraded around to show camera-toting tourists but are active Christian shrines that have inspired pilgrims for 800 years. If you quiet yourself and listen close enough to the red pillars, carved windows and doorways, and as the wind blows through the narrow passages, you can hear the whispers and prayers of saints and angels. The place is alive, with monks and worshipers.

Tree planting and landscape improvement funds available

Tree planting and landscape enhancements for public spaces can get a boost from a grant program coordinated by the Nebraska Statewide Arboretum and Nebraska Forest Service, both

based at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln.

Sue Kohles, NSA special projects coordinator, says, "The funding assistance is meant to help communities develop landscapes that reflect and enhance the beauty of Nebraska. One of the goals of NSA, NFS and this grant program is to create long-term, sustainable projects that utilize diverse plants and encourage environmentally-sound landscape practices. We hope that these projects not only improve the landscape of Nebraska roadways, but also provide an example for others and contribute to the health and viability of its communities."

The Nebraska Community Enhancement Program funds tree planting and landscaping that improves the state's transportation corridors, including public streets, highways, entryways and trails. This can involve areas along parks, schools, fairgrounds, college campuses, libraries, courthouses, hospitals, welcome signs and other public properties. Tree planting is an especially important component of this program although shrubs and herbaceous plantings are also eligible.

The Community Enhancement Program is funded by the Transportation Enhancement Program of the Nebraska Department of Roads. It is an 80 percent/20 percent matching grant program with a maximum funding award of \$20,000 per project. The application deadline is Nov. 16, with funding awards announced by January 2008.

Since 1996 the Community Enhancement Program has awarded over \$3.5 million in landscaping grants to over 530 projects in communities all across Nebraska.

Wanda said the homebuyers class was very interesting. "I have

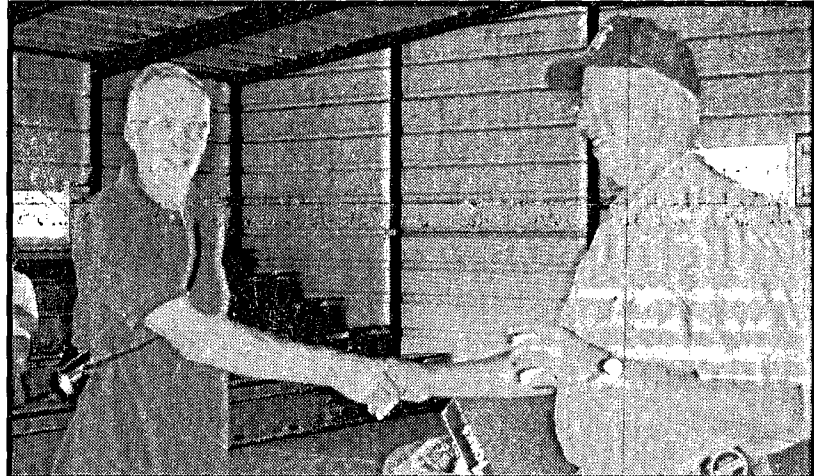
learned about the mortgage process and have also learned about the housing rules in Wayne."

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Commissioners approve valuation changes

Wayne County Board of Commissioners met in regular session on Tuesday. On the agenda was a list of valuation changes made after completion of the 2007 abstract by the county assessor. The abstract and changes must be sent to the state property assessment and taxation division. The commissioners approved the changes that were made.

George Ellyson, Wayne city planner, discussed an access request from Great Dane corporation for their property in the Kardell Industrial Park. The commissioners feel a concrete approach onto Centennial Road would be the best option in order to help keep rocks from coming into the road.

A public hearing for the vacation of Highview Drive was held. No one from the public was in attendance to oppose the issue and there was no written opposition received. Elizabeth Carlson, highway superintendent, said she was in contact with the Muhs Acres Homeowners Association and they are not opposed to vacating Highview Drive. The proposed cul de sac in that area was discussed which will need dirt hauled in to complete.

Mike Pieper, county attorney, was present for the public hearing. It was noted that the county approval for vacating Highview Drive could be contingent on the terms of acquiring the dirt needed for the project. It was decided that the landowners involved will be contacted and a resolution should be ready for approval at the next commissioners meeting.

Road/bridge business included discussion by the commissioners on a proposal from Mainelli Wagner & Associates for engineering services for a Federal Aid Soft Match project to replace bridge C009001720, two miles west and 0.3 miles south of Winside, 566th Avenue, Mile 851. The highway superintendent noted their proposal was \$7,980 for a concrete box culvert but if a bridge is needed, then it is \$10,450. Commissioners approved the proposal.

August is National Immunization Awareness Month

August is National Immunization Awareness Month, and with cold and flu season close behind, the Nebraska Senior Health Insurance Information Program (SHIIP) is encouraging people with Medicare to take advantage of the immunization services available to them through Medicare's preventive benefits.

Medicare provides coverage for the Influenza vaccine, the Pneumococcal Pneumonia vaccine, and the Hepatitis B vaccine. Medicare Advantage Plans also cover these vaccinations.

"Pneumonia and influenza are the fifth leading cause of death in older Americans," said Jina Ragland, Director of the Nebraska SHIIP.

"Additionally, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, 1.25 million people in this country are infected with Hepatitis B, which can cause liver cancer, liver failure, or death."

Medicare will pay for one Influenza immunization for all people with Medicare each year. Generally, one Pneumococcal Pneumonia immunization is covered during a beneficiary's lifetime, except for high-risk individuals, who may qualify for a booster vaccine. Medicare will cover Hepatitis B immunizations for persons at high or intermediate risk.

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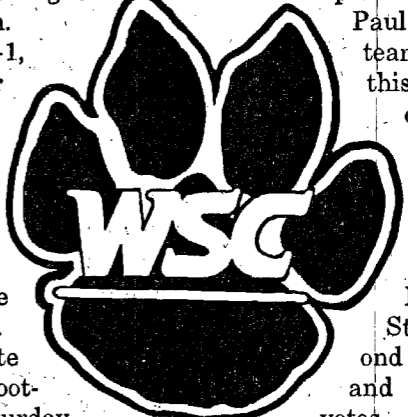
Wayne State football, volleyball teams selected to finish in fifth and third place in Northern Sun

Preseason predictions for the seasons to come were released this week for the Wayne State football and volleyball teams. The Wayne State College football team was selected to finish fifth in the 2007 NSIC Preseason Coaches Poll released by the league office in St. Paul, Minn. The Wildcats received 49 points in voting as determined by the league's 10 head coaches. WSC returns 14 starters from the 2006 team that finished with a 5-6 overall mark and tied for third in the Northern Sun Conference with a 4-4 league record, the best-ever finish for a Wildcat football team since joining the NSIC in 1999. Defending league champion Bemidji State collected seven of 10 first place votes and finished with 88 points to top the 2007 NSIC Preseason Poll. Winona State, an

NCAA Division II playoff qualifier last season, was second in the voting with 82 points and two first place votes while the University of Mary came in third with 72 points and one first place vote. Concordia-St. Paul garnered 69 points and was fourth in the poll, followed by Wayne State (49 points), Southwest Minnesota State (46 points), Northern State (43), MSU Moorhead (36), Upper Iowa (35) and Minnesota, Crookston (19). Junior offensive lineman Brian Okonofua and senior linebacker Nick Baldetti were listed as players to watch for Wayne State this season. The 6-5, 330 pound Okonofua was a Second Team All-NSIC left guard last season and is one of four returning starters on a Wildcat offen-

sive line that allowed just two sacks in eight league games last season. Baldetti, a 6-1, 230 pound senior linebacker, had 73 tackles for the Wildcats last season and ranked eighth in the league in tackles per game last season at 7.6. Wayne State opens the 2007 football season on Saturday, September 1 at Chadron State College with kickoff set for 1:00 p.m. Central Time. The Wildcats' home opener is Saturday, September 8 vs. Nebraska-Kearney at 1:00 p.m. at Cunningham Field in Wayne.

the poll. Defending league champion Concordia-St. Paul was voted the team to beat again this year by league coaches, collecting 85 points and seven first-place votes. Southwest Minnesota State came in second with 81 points and two first-place votes. Following Wayne State in the NSIC Preseason Coaches Poll in volleyball were MSU Moorhead (63 points), Winona State (60), Northern State (50), Mary (43), Upper Iowa (32), Minnesota, Crookston (25) and Bemidji State (23). The Wildcats finished the 2006 season ranked 20th in the nation with a 30-8 record and a semifinal berth in the NCAA North Central Region Tournament. The Wildcats were second in the Northern Sun Conference with a 15-3 league mark and return four starters from last season's squad. Senior Emily Schroeder was tabbed as Wayne State's player to watch in the NSIC this season. The 5-11 middle blocker from Belden became Wayne State's first-ever All-American in volleyball last season, receiving Second Team All-American honors from AVCA (American Volleyball Coaches Association) and Daktronics. Schroeder set a new single season record for kills at Wayne State with 599 and ranked fourth in NCAA Division II in blocks per game at 1.54. Wayne State opens the 2007 volleyball season on Thursday, August 23 at Shepherd University in West Virginia.



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



The Wayne State College volleyball team has been honored by the American Volleyball Coaches Association (AVCA) with the Game Plan/AVCA Team Academic Award for the 2006-07 season.

The Game Plan/AVCA Team Academic Award honors institutions that have displayed excellence in the classroom by maintaining at least a 3.3 cumulative grade point average on a 4.0 scale.

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ASK THE TRAINER

This week I am going to talk about the anterior cruciate ligament or ACL. As fall sports return to practice, it is a good time to talk about the ACL and how to reduce injuries to it. The ACL provides a majority of the stability for the knee. It is not the only ligament in the knee, which also has the posterior cruciate, medial collateral, and lateral collateral ligaments. The combination of these powerful ligaments helps to keep the knee operating like a hinge. The ACL is the most often talked about because along with the medial collateral ligament they are the most often injured in athletics. The ACL's primary job in the knee is to prevent the tibia (lower leg) from moving forwards below the femur (upper leg), but the ACL also limits rotational movements of the knee. Often times the ACL is injured from hyperextension and/or rotation. In sports, these events can happen by landing from a jump improperly or from impact to the front of the knee causing excessive hyperextension. Women seem to have a greater risk for injury than men generally due to weaker quadriceps and hamstrings, poor landing mechanics, and also from hormonal influences on joint laxity. Preventing an injury to the ACL requires strengthening the quadriceps and hamstrings as well as a look at an athlete's movement mechanics. A few examples of exercises to implement include squats, lunges, and stiff-leg deadlifts. Watching form and technique is crucial as some of these exercises, if done improperly, can add to the injury risk. If you have more questions give me a call at the Providence Wellness Center. Cornhusker State Games end

Athletes came from 86 of Nebraska's 93 counties. Lancaster and Douglas counties produced the highest number of athletes with 5,044 and 1,829 respectively. Other top counties included Sarpy (669), Buffalo (290), Hall (288), Platte (236) and Seward (186).

The youngest athlete, Riya Kar, age 1 from Omaha, and oldest athlete, Anne Harrison, age 98 from Lincoln, both participated in Volkswalk. The average age of the athletes was 27 with a gender breakdown of 63 percent male and 37 percent female.

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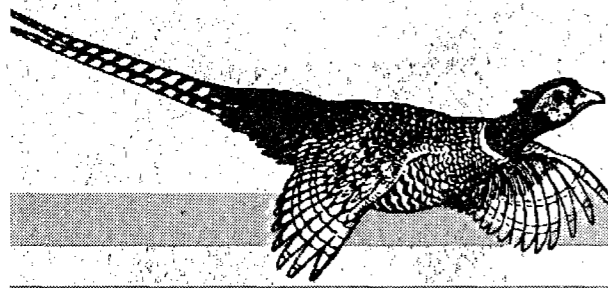

Bruning meets with Indian Foreign Secretary, discusses U.S. India relations

Attorney General Jon Bruning recently met with Indian Foreign Secretary Shivsankar Menon in New Delhi. The two discussed U.S.-India relations. Bruning's visit to New Delhi is part of the Aspen Institute-Rodel Fellowships in Public Leadership program.

Menon was appointed to his top diplomatic position in October 2006 after a distinguished career. Throughout his tenure with India's Ministry of External Affairs, he has held positions, including High Commissioner to Pakistan and Sri Lanka and Ambassador to Israel and China. Menon also served as Director of the Department of Atomic Energy where he advised India's Atomic Energy Commission.

Menon has stressed the development of bio-technology, nanotechnology and defense technology in his relations with the United States. In July, he announced a revised cooperative agreement between the U.S. and India to develop nuclear capability for India's power needs.

"India is making a name for itself in energy, in technology, and as a force regionally," Bruning said. "U.S.-India relations are vital to the fight against terrorism and the preservation of a stable balance of power in Asia over the long term."

As an Aspen-Rodel fellow, Bruning is meeting with government officials, business leaders and diplomats in China and India. The purpose of the seven-day trip is to understand how developments in Asia impact American policy.

The Aspen-Rodel Fellowship program was founded in 2005 to provide the nation's top young political

leaders with a better understanding of America's underlying democratic principles and to help foster civility in the public arena.

Debating the move from public to private work

Andy Pollock's new career might prompt the Legislature to reconsider whether public employees and lawmakers should be allowed to jump directly from government work to jobs as lobbyists.

Or, not.

Pollock will be the executive director of the Public Service Commission until August 18. Thereafter he will work for the Rembolt Ludtke law firm in Lincoln, and part of his job will be lobbying the PSC.

How would you like to have the former, top administrative guy at the commission working for your private interests, urging lawmakers and commissioners to choose this or that policy?

How would you like to have him working against your private interests?

No criticism of Pollock is implied here; Pollock's ethics have never been an issue. There is absolutely nothing in state law or regulations to prevent any other public employee or lawmaker from making such a move.

Several things make Pollock, 41, a terrific lobbying prospect. Knowledge of the subject matter. Knowledge of the people at the PSC who make the most important decisions about the subject matter.

Having been the commission's top guy since 2000, he has had working relationships and no doubt some friendships among staff and the elected members of the PSC.

When he travels from his law office to the PSC office he will be lobbying or otherwise working with people of his acquaintance. Individuals who likely have respect for his expertise. They will include commissioners who received and often depended upon his advice,

and staffers who previously called him "boss."

So, should high-ranking public employees and/or state senators be allowed to move directly from their government duties to posts where they are paid to influence government action?

Lots and lots of state senators have moved quickly from the legislative chamber to the lobby right behind the legislative chamber. Few members of the Unicameral have shown an interest in restricting such moves.

Pollock said he wouldn't lobby the PSC for the first six months

after he moved to his new job. He called it a "cooling off period."

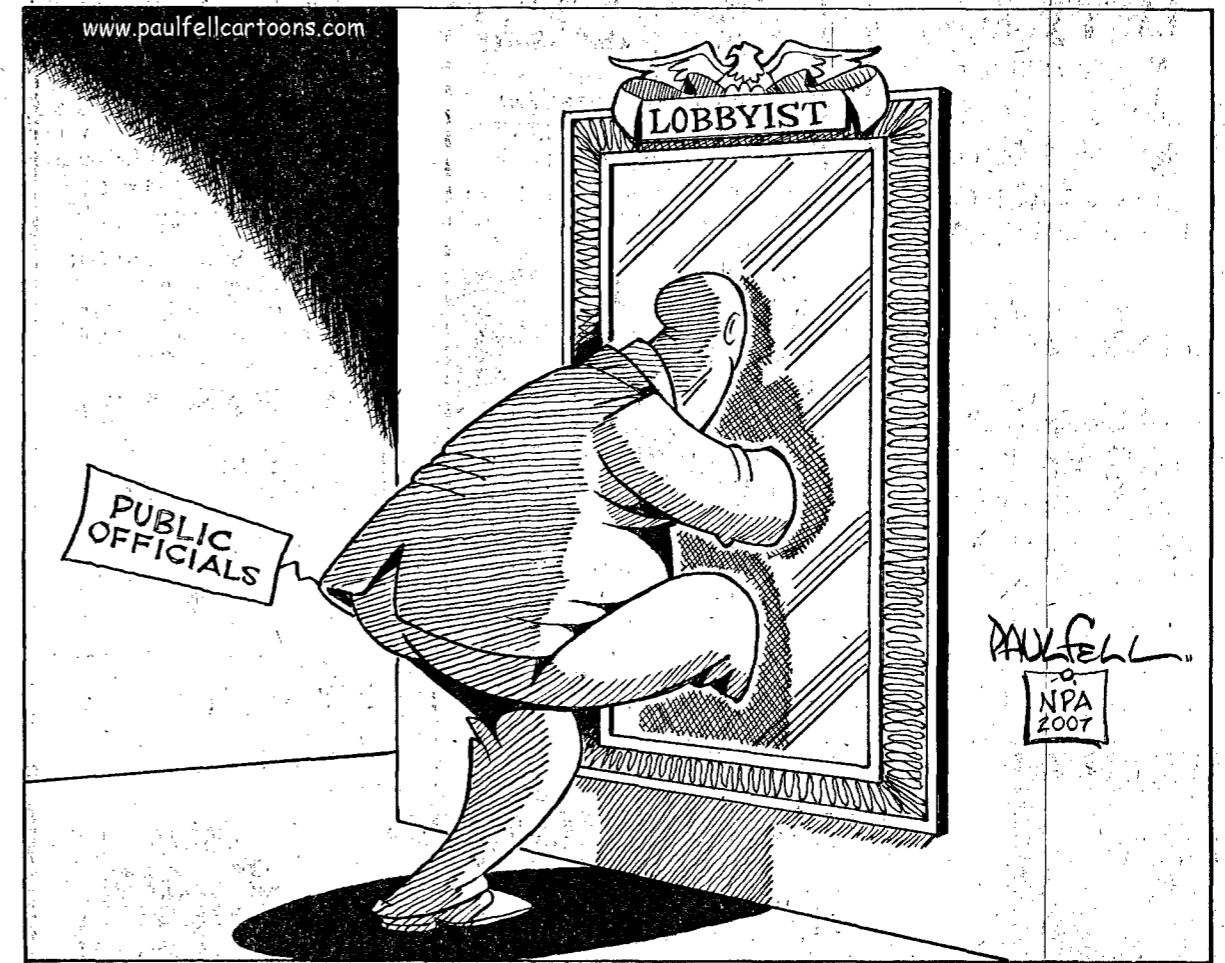
Question: How much difference do you think that will make?

Obviously there will be a new executive director at the commission. The duty of that person, along with staff, will include putting into proper perspective the vested interests of those clients Pollock will represent. That's what they are always supposed to do.

Here is what the Nebraska Constitution says about the PSC:

"There shall be a Public Service Commission, consisting of not less than three nor more than seven

members, as the Legislature shall prescribe, whose term of office shall be six years, and whose compensation shall be fixed by the Legislature. Commissioners shall be elected by districts of substantially equal population as the Legislature shall provide. The powers and duties of such commission shall include the regulation of rates, service and general control of common carriers as the Legislature may provide by law. But, in the absence of specific legislation, the commission shall exercise the powers and perform the duties enumerated in this provision."

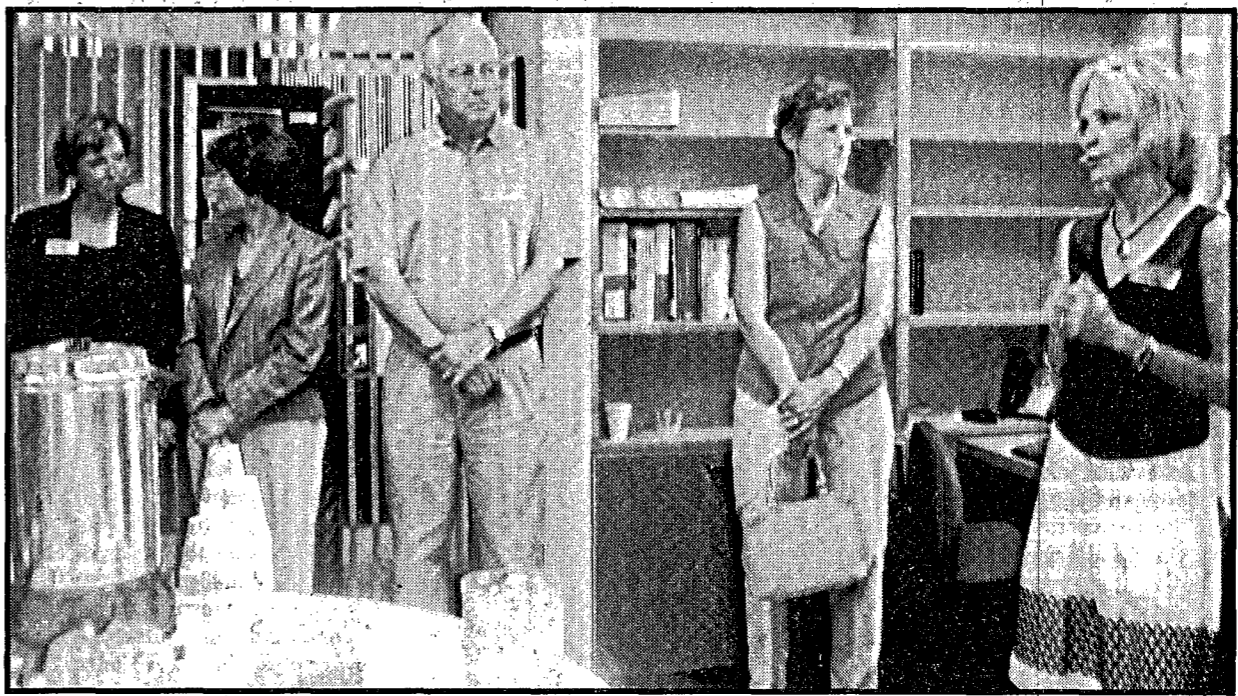

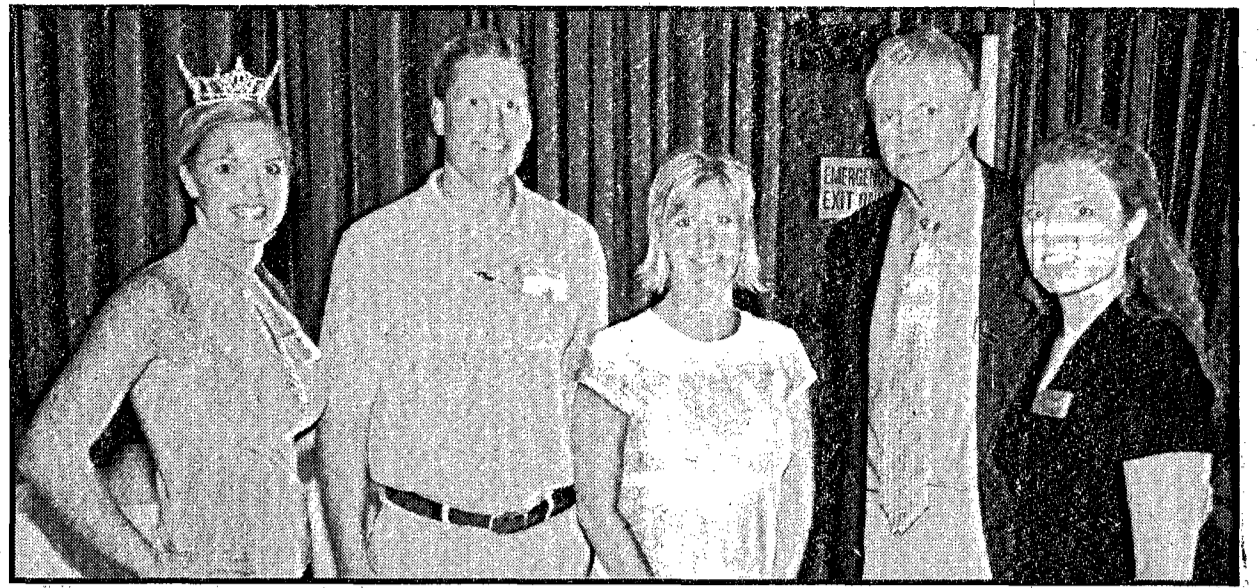

Protect Your Retirement Savings in the Event of a Job Change

If you've made the decision to leave your job, you probably thought carefully about how your decision would affect your financial situation. You may have explored the salaries and benefits at other companies, ensured that you have enough money saved up to carry you through unexpected time away from work, and investigated your health care coverage transition options. However, don't forget one important task that is often overlooked when people transition from one job to another: protecting the retirement savings amassed in your company 401(k).

Your retirement plan assets may be one of the most important things you take with you as you leave an employer and you have some important decisions to make regarding how you handle the transition. It is essential that you evaluate all of your options - quick, impulsive decisions can be costly. Take the time to map out a plan to protect your retirement savings. Careful management and wise investments will help ensure your funds will be available when you need them.

The responsibility of safeguarding your money falls on your shoulders and you will generally have four different options for your plan balance: leave your savings in your former employer's plan, transfer the balance to your new employer's plan, roll over the balance into an IRA, or take a cash distribution. There are advantages and disadvantages with each option. It is important to consider each and determine the best choice for your individual situation. **Leave the funds where they are**

Keeping your retirement savings in your former employer's 401(k) is a convenient option that may be a good idea if you are happy with the investment alternatives and fund performance or if you need additional time to explore other options. Although you won't be able to make any additional contributions, you can still benefit from tax-deferred compounding of any investment earnings.

This option may not be available to you if your vested account balance is less than \$5,000. Be sure you understand all of your company's 401(k) policies as well as federal rules on distribution requirements.

Transfer savings to the new employer's plan

Moving savings accumulated through previous 401(k) plans to your new employer's 401(k) plan allows you to make contributions to the new account and keep all of your funds in one place, minimizing time spent monitoring and tracking your funds. However, before transferring money you should compare the benefits of the two plans. Some of the factors to consider include: fund performance, costs/fees, scope of fund choices, rate of return, and ease of manageability. You'll want to be sure your new plan is an upgrade.

Roll over into an IRA

It may also be a wise decision to move your money into a qualified retirement account, such as an individual retirement account (IRA). Putting your savings into an IRA allows your investments to continue compounding tax-deferred, while offering maximum control over and asset allocation. An IRA usually gives you more flexibility and decision-making power than a 401(k) plan, which may offer limited choices. An IRA will likely have more investment options from which to choose based on your individual needs and expectations. Rolling your retirement savings from a 401(k) into an IRA also allows you to avoid current taxes and penalties that may apply to an early withdrawal.

There are a few potential drawbacks to be aware of when considering whether an IRA is the best choice for your situation. Generally, account holders cannot borrow against their IRA; however, you may be able to borrow against the value of your 401(k) account. Additionally, a 401(k) account offers the highest level of protection from creditors; assets in your IRA may be taken to satisfy debts in certain scenarios.

One caveat when rolling your funds over to a new 401(k) plan or an IRA - be sure to have your old employer transfer the funds directly to your new employer or to an IRA you have already established (direct rollover). If you follow federal rollover rules, the transition will be seamless and no federal income tax will be withheld.

Cash out your savings

Although it may seem tempting to take the money and run, a cash distribution can lead to hefty taxes and penalties and put your hard earned savings in jeopardy. When retirement assets are paid directly to you, your employer is required to withhold a minimum of 20% for federal taxes. In addition, if you don't meet minimum age requirements when the distribution occurs, you may be subject to an additional 10% early distribution penalty. Cashing out your retirement savings is almost never advisable unless you are faced with no other choice.

No matter which option you choose, it would be wise to discuss your particular situation with a qualified financial planner. The laws governing retirement assets and taxation are complex. A tax or financial professional can help you determine the most effective strategy for preserving your retirement savings to help ensure that your financial cushion will continue to grow into your retirement years.

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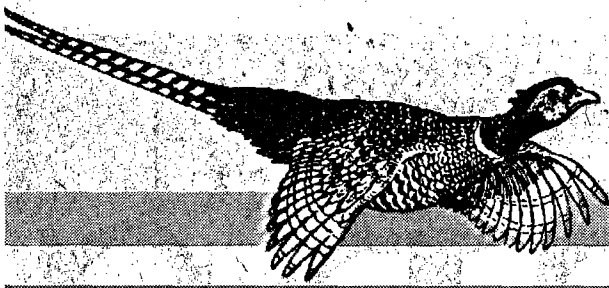
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Summer busy with attending golden anniversary parties

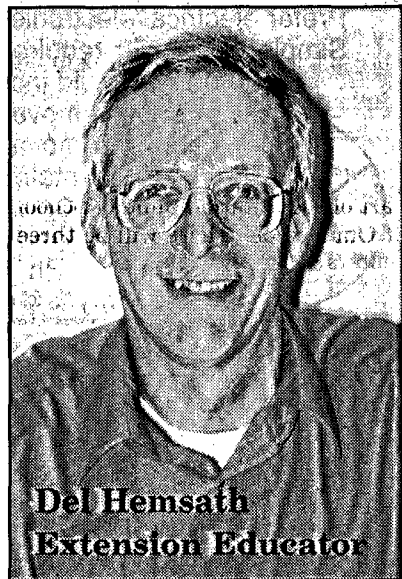
Fall webworm are abundant

This has been a good year for the webworm to develop on trees. The web is most commonly noticed when the unsightly, light gray webbing appears on the branch tips especially when the morning dew is on the webs. Inside the webbing are small worms that are feeding on the leaves.

Fall webworms have been known to feed on over 85 species of trees but are more common on walnut, cottonwood, apple and plum.

Caterpillars remain inside the webbing feeding on the leaves and when the food runs out, more webbing is created so the web size keeps increasing. Even though the webbing looks bad, the leaves disappear, there is little health damage to the tree. During this time of year, there is no harm in the loss of tree leaves.

The pest overwinters in the ground but can remain in the old

nest material, under loose bark and in leaf litter. The adult is a butterfly like insect and lays eggs on the underside of leaves.

Control is handled in several

ways, one can simply remove the branch affected by pruning, allow biological controls of other insects to reduce numbers, apply Bacillus thuringiensis (Bt), to the small larva, or one can use various types of insecticides that can be applied to the nest area or the surrounding foliage.

The main consideration is that the fall webworm is not considered a serious pest of trees and control is strictly aesthetic in nature.

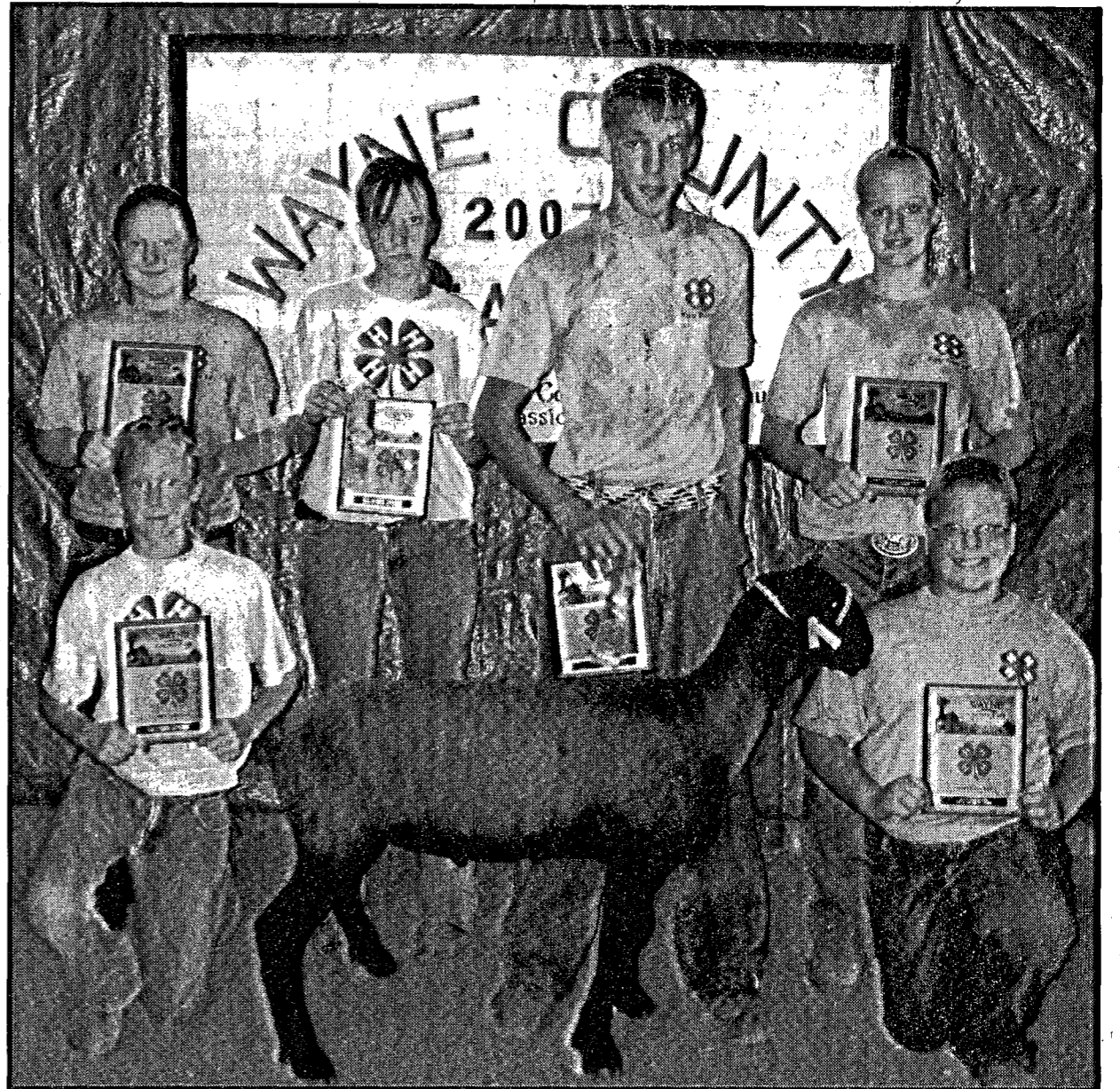

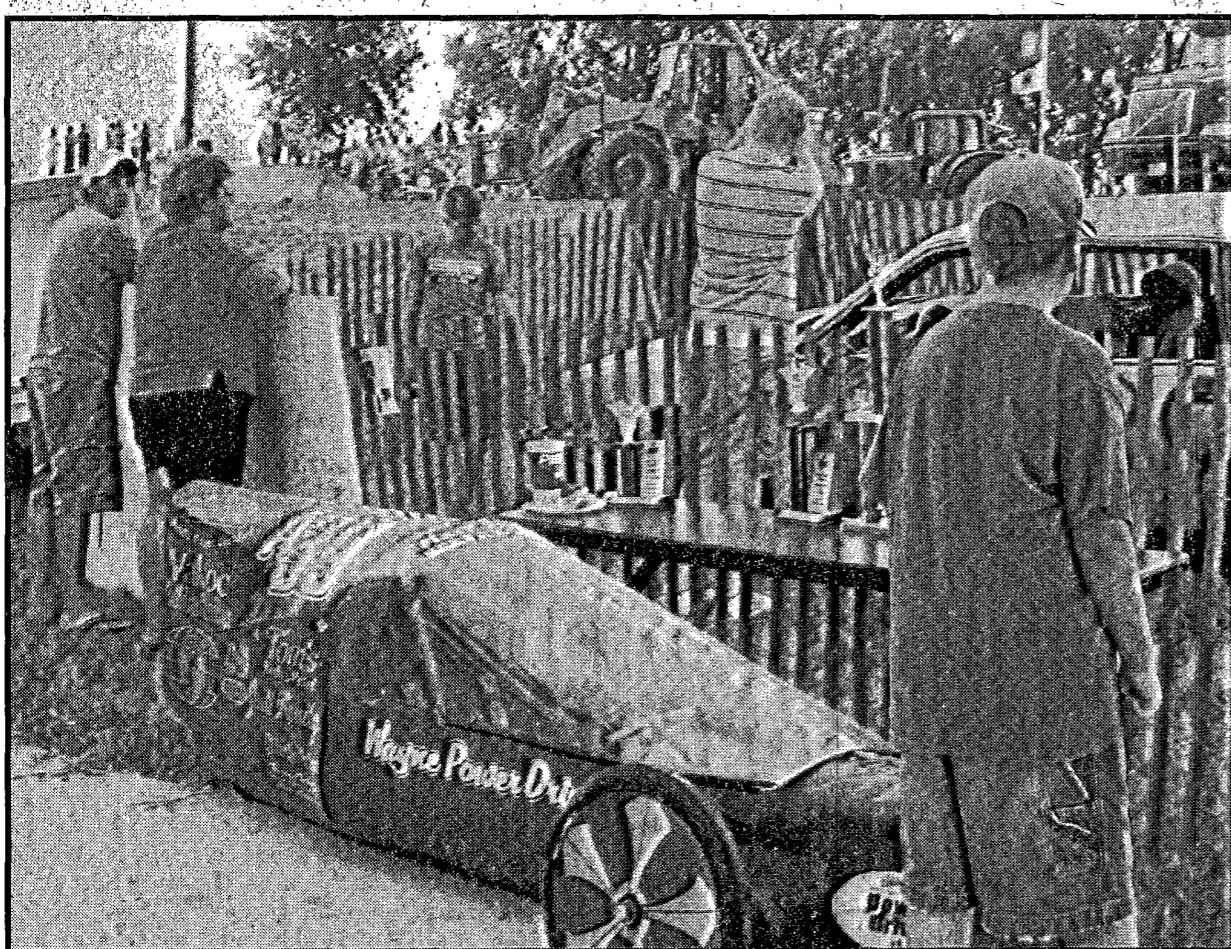

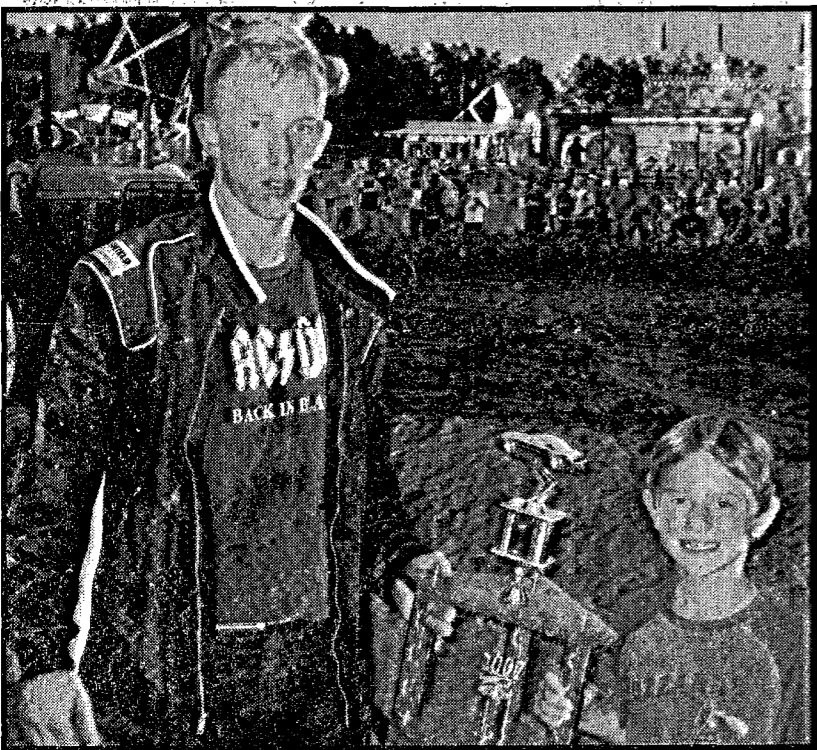
Ag Olympics

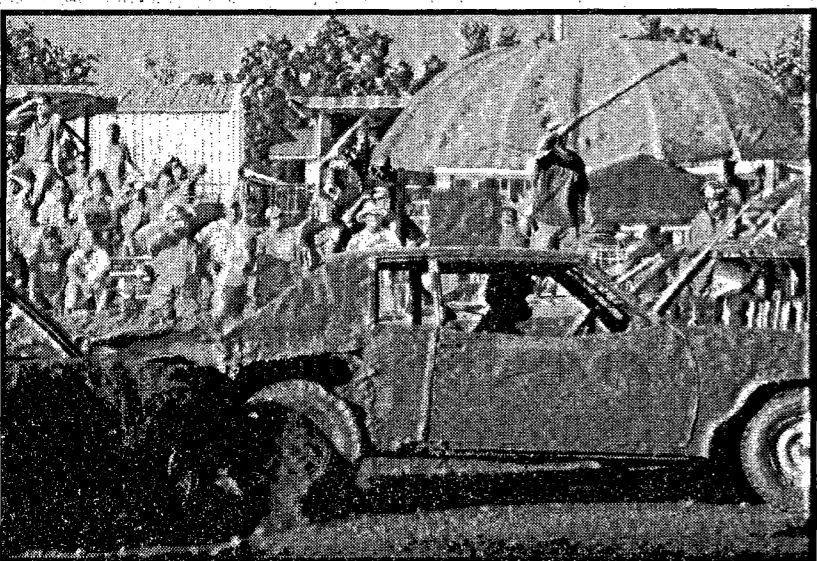

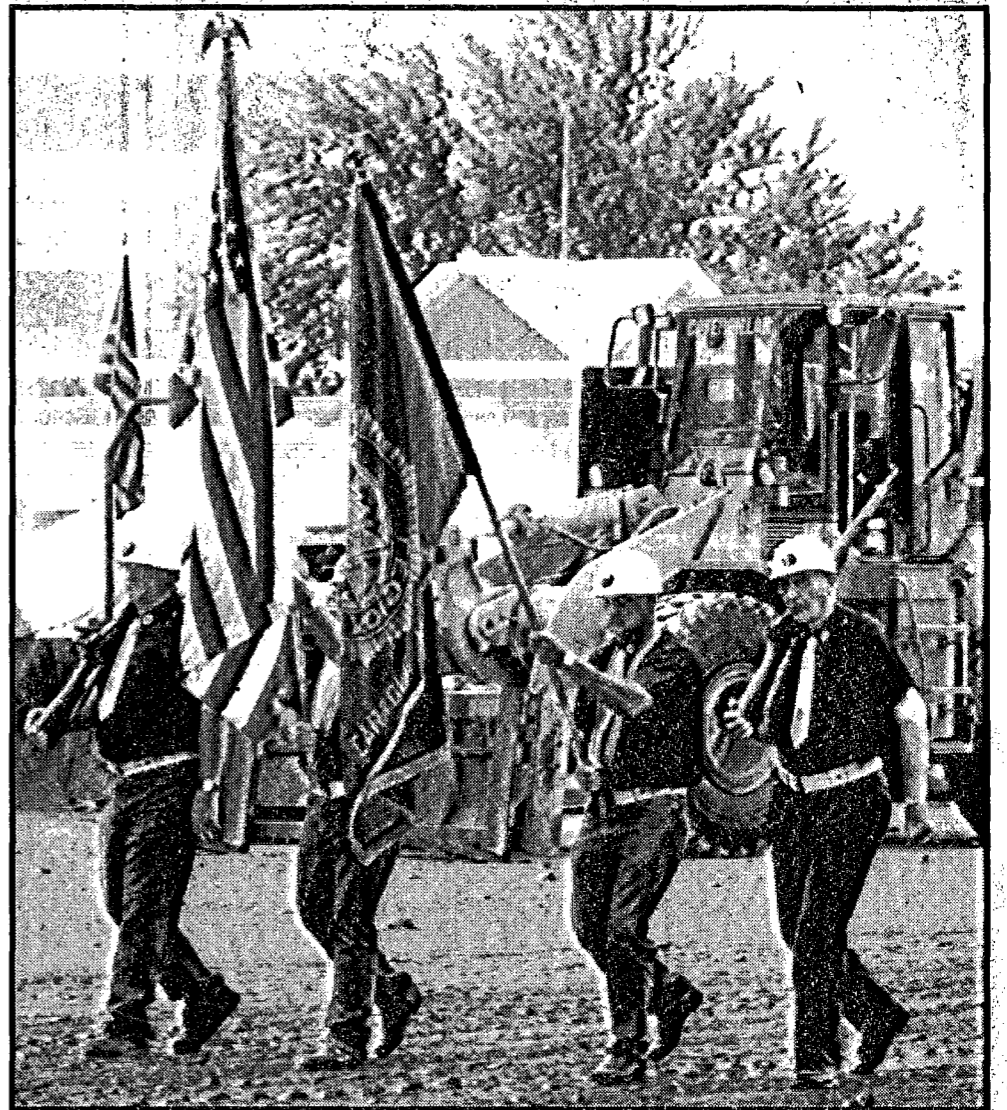
