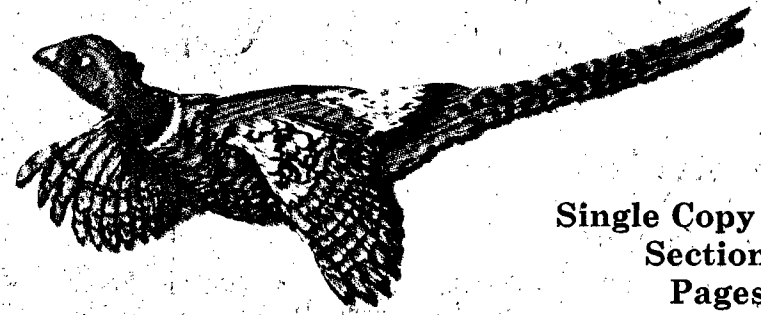

Residents encouraged to prepare for snow season

It is that time of year again, it may snow this weekend and the City of Wayne wants to remind property owners of their snow responsibility.

It is illegal for any property owner to leave snow or ice accumulated on any sidewalks within the municipality. If the City receives enough snow to cause the Public Works Department to plow the streets, sidewalks need cleared of snow and ice as well.

Ordinance 70-44 requires all snow and ice to be removed from sidewalks in the City within 24 hours of the Public Works Department clearing the streets. If a sidewalk is not cleared of snow and ice the ordinance gives the City authority to have the snow and ice removed at the property owner's expense.

The City charges \$75 per hour to remove the snow. Anyone who is going out of town during the winter is asked to make arrangements for someone to clear their sidewalks. This is especially true of rental property.

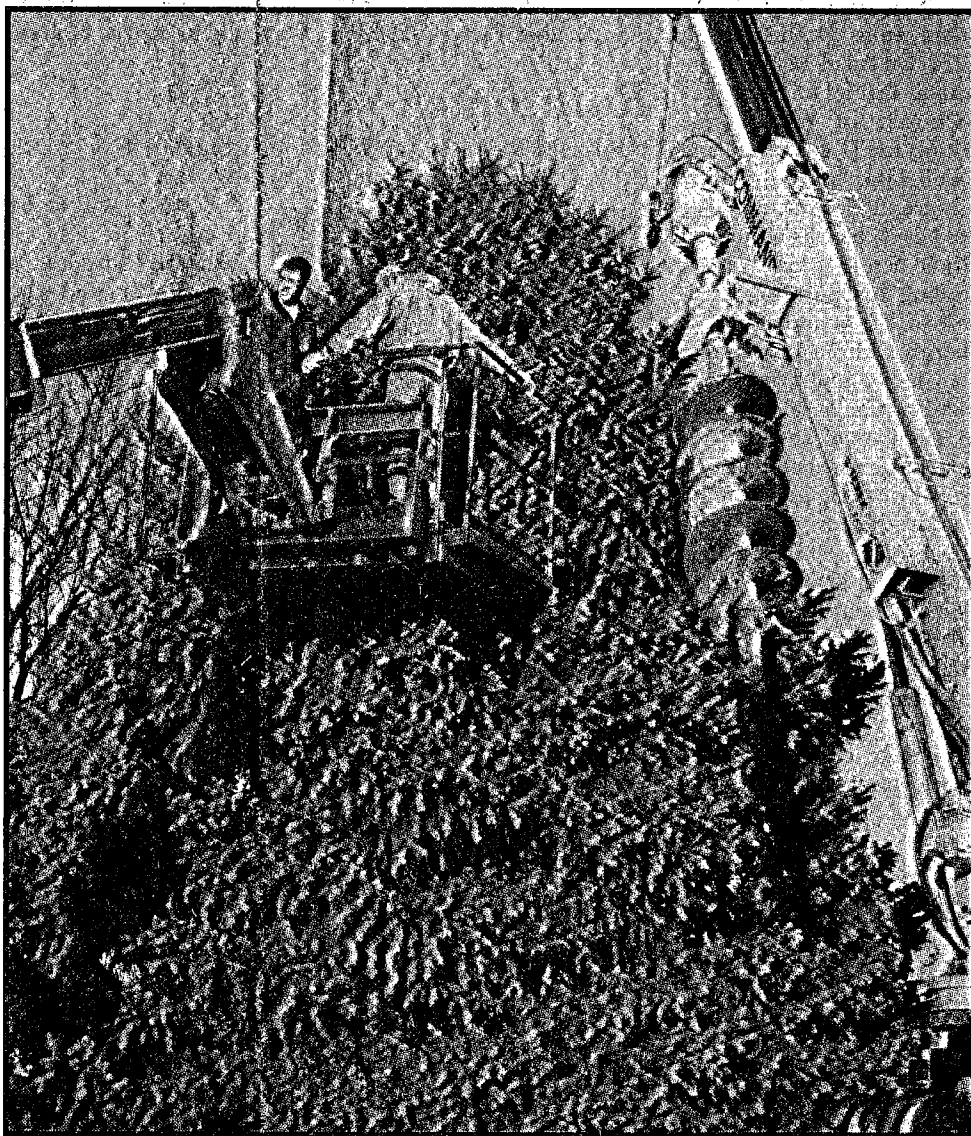
Wayne Police Chief Lance Webster encourages people to report uncleared

sidewalks. He said getting reports saves time and speeds the response of the police department. During snow emergencies, officers are likely busy with other calls and may not have time to look specifically for uncleared sidewalks.

Parking also becomes an issue when it snows: Wayne has a great reputation for clearing snow from our streets but cars parked on the streets slow the process. When a snow emergency is declared, overnight parking will be prohibited on all streets to allow the snow removal crews the chance to clear the snow from curb to curb.

Anyone who lives in a house or apartment where overnight parking is allowed is asked to start planning now to identify an off-street parking location. When a snow emergency is declared, the public is notified by broadcasts on KTCH, the local television stations, and through the cable television system.

"Early planning for a snow emergency will help everyone this winter," Webster said.

Calhoon noted how much it meant to her for Lindsy to get her hair cut and donate it to such a worthy cause.

Benefit for Louise Calhoon planned for Dec. 9

A soup and sandwich benefit lunch will be held for Louise L. Calhoon of Wayne on Sunday, Dec. 9 from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. at the National Guard Armory at 800 E. 7th Street in Wayne. The lunch benefit will include a silent auction and bake sale. T-shirts and wristbands will also be sold. There will be a free will donation for the meal.

Calhoon was diagnosed with inflammatory breast cancer on Oct. 15. Inflammatory breast cancer is the rarest, most aggressive form of cancer. She has to have a total of eight weeks of chemotherapy and it is given every other week. The first round of treatments will go through February, when she will get two weeks off before having surgery to remove one or both breasts. After surgery, she will receive radiation and then more chemotherapy.

Calhoon is the daughter of Merton and Alice Marshall of Wayne. Her husband is Marti. The couple has three children, Katie, 21, twins Joshua and Jessica, 16, and they are grandparents to Kayley. Their son, Joshua, had Carticel Cell implantation surgery in September to re-grow bone that had died near his knee cap from what they think was an old football injury. Cells were taken from Joshua and more were grown in a lab in Boston, Mass. The procedure alone was \$50,000, not to mention doctor bills, etc.

"People from Wayne and the surround-

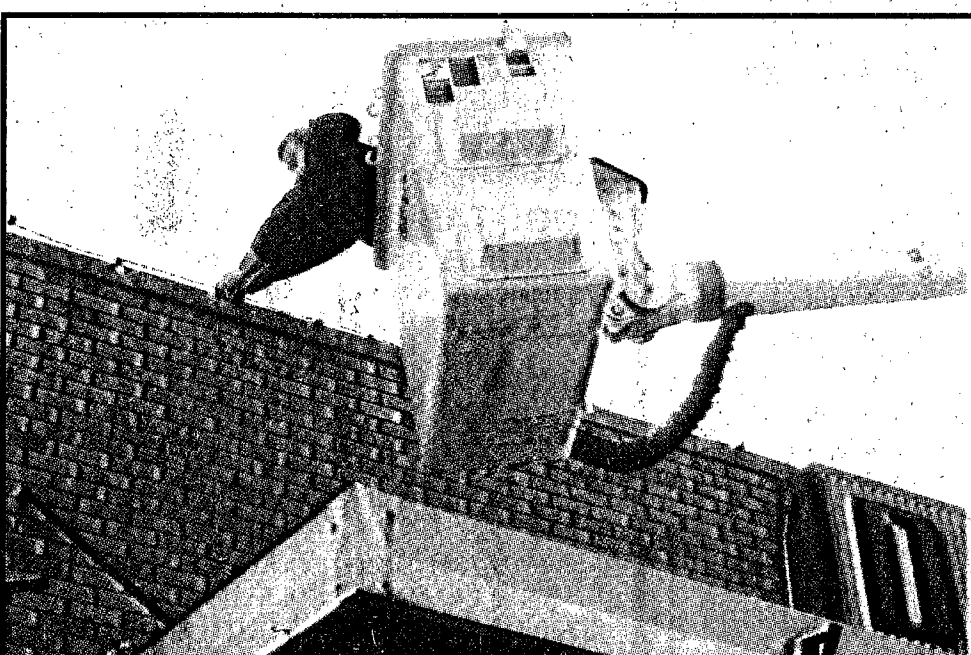
ing community are awesome," Calhoon said. "It has been mindboggling how much they have all lifted me up when I've been down. I get an average of 10 cards a day in the mail and meals are brought in. There are no words to express the gratification I have for the committee for putting the benefit together, for the high school students and for everyone who has been helping us."

The benefit was organized by Wayne Softball players and their mothers. Committee member Shelly Fehringer is in charge of selling the t-shirts, which are blue with the saying, "Catch the Cure Before it gets to Second Base" or pink with "Live Strong, Save the Fro" (a nickname that the softball players gave Louise because of her hair, which she is losing from taking chemo). Shirts can also be purchased without the sayings. The t-shirts come in small, medium, large, extra large and double X. Anyone interested in buying a shirt can call Fehringer at 833-5362.

Donations received will be used to defray medical costs associated with both Louise's cancer and Joshua's surgery. "We hope many of you will be able to join in the festivities," said Monica Jensen, music instructor at the school.

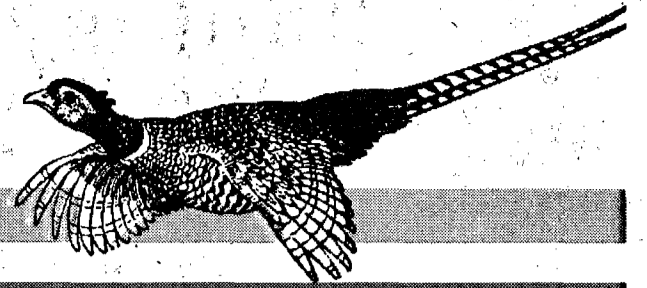

Services were held Thursday, Nov. 29 at St. John's Lutheran Church in Beemer.



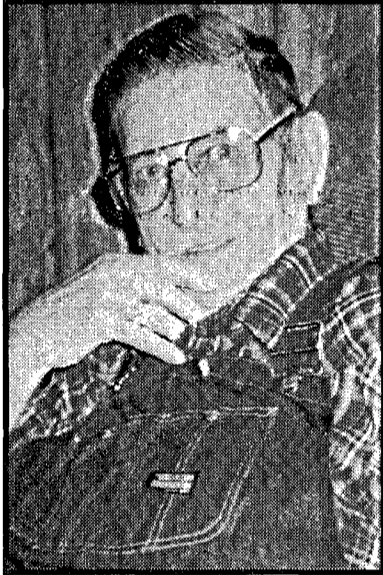

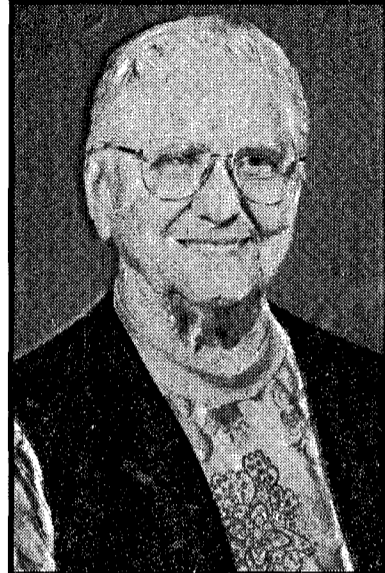
He was preceded in death by his parents; brother, Allen Frahm; and sister, Marian Warrleman.

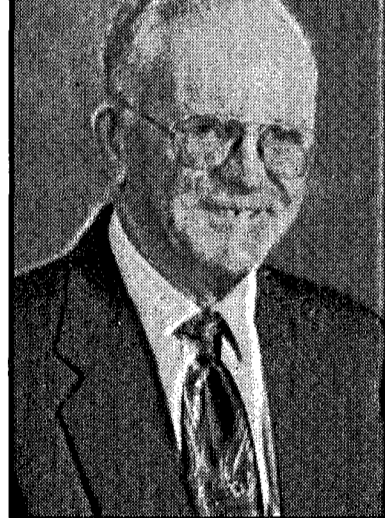

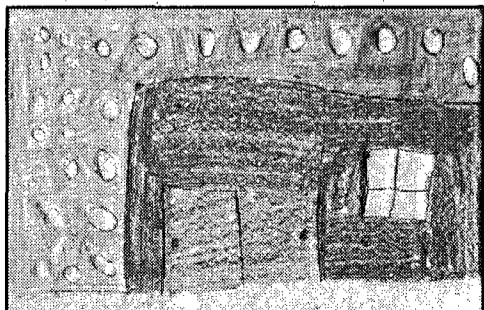

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Wayne State Counseling Center, Catholic Newman organization receive awards from ARC of Norfolk

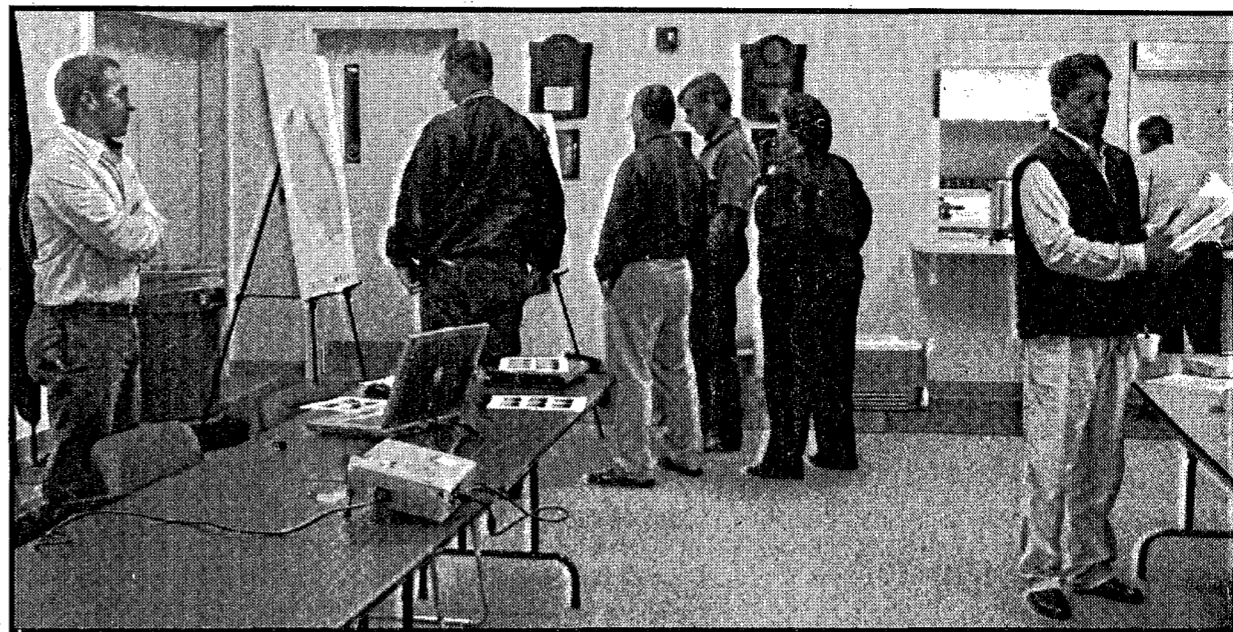

Hazard Mitigation Planning meeting held in Wayne

A Hazard Mitigation Planning (HMP) Hazard identification meeting was held at the Wayne Fire Hall on Nov. 14.

The Lower Elkhorn NRD, located in Norfolk, is undertaking a planning effort to develop a Multi-jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan for the district in coordination with the Nebraska Department of Natural Resources (NDNR), Nebraska Emergency Management Agency (NEMA) and the Federal Emergency Management Agency

(FEMA). Lower Elkhorn hired JEO Consulting Group, Inc. to assist with the development of the plan over the next two years.

At the Nov. 14 meeting in Wayne, Jared Nelson, project manager, Lalit Jha, vice president, water resources engineering and John Callen, project manager, all of JEO in Lincoln, gave a presentation explaining the Hazard Mitigation Plan, which is a pre-disaster planning document, a pro-active approach to reduce damages from disasters through planning, a public-guided document with emphasis on strong, integrated State and local planning that identifies Sound Mitigation Projects.

A Multi-jurisdictional Plan is a HMP prepared jointly by more than one jurisdiction, which can include: county, city or village; other municipality, public authority, school district, rural water district, government entity.

An HMP is developed because it is a requirement in DMA 2000 and to reduce damages from disasters, to develop sound mitigation projects, plus, there are sanctions for not having a FEMA approved plan. Also, to become eligible to receive federal grant funding for mitigation activities.

Funding programs include: Pre-disaster programs, Flood Mitigation Assistance Program (FMA), annual allocation for each state; Pre-disaster Mitigation Program (PDM), annual allocation, competitive nationwide; Repetitive Flood Claims Program, annual allocation, competitive nationwide; Severe Repetitive Loss Mitigation Program, Annual allocation, competitive nationwide.

Other funding programs include: Post-disaster programs, Hazard Mitigation Grant Program (HMGP), Funding allocation based on a percentage of damages, 75 (Federal) /25 (Local) cost-share.

Since 1990, there have been: 23 disasters in Nebraska; six counties NOT declared disaster areas; \$51.6 million allocated in HMGP funding. There's \$30-35 million anticipated for 2007-08. *On average, one dollar spent by FEMA on hazard mitigation provides the nation with \$4 in future benefits (*from the 2006 report by the Multi-hazard Mitigation Council of the National Institute of Building Sciences).

Examples of eligible projects include: Volunteer property acquisition, Upgrading bridges or bridge protection, Flood control projects, Tornado shelters and Burying power lines.

The HMP process includes: project initiation, public involvement-input, analysis/draft plan development, public involvement-input,

finalize plan, adoption/FEMA approval. The plan components are: planning process, community profiles, risk assessment, mitigation strategy and implementation and maintenance. The planning process includes preparation of the plan, a Hazard Planning Committee that will include appropriate personnel representing Lower Elkhorn NRD to reflect the goals and objectives of the NRD, and to review existing plans or studies, get public involvement, make sure there is a reasonable number of public meetings, as well as public announcements.

The community profile for each participating jurisdiction includes: location, geography, climate, history and structural inventory (which provides context for understanding mitigation alternatives). Plan components: risk assessment includes: identify hazards, profile hazards (location, extent, probability of future hazard events, history of past hazard events) and Assess vulnerability (jurisdiction vulnerability to each hazard identified and estimate potential losses to infrastructure). Risk assessment provides a basis for making decisions for mitigation strategy.

The mitigation strategy includes: goals and objectives, which reflect the goals and objectives of the stakeholders and mitigation alternatives, such as development of proposed mitigation alternatives or projects to reduce potential losses, prioritized using the STAPLEE methodology (benefit/cost) and directly linked to goals and objectives.

Further plan components are: implementation and maintenance to finalize plan, coordinate with participating jurisdiction within NRD, each jurisdiction approves and adopts, FEMA is to review and approve, FEMA has 45 days to review. When the plan is approved, the planning process ends and moves towards implementation, which opens the door for funding projects identified in the plan. There is a plan update every five years.

Goals and objectives include: 1. protect the health and safety of residents. 2. reduce future losses from hazard events. 3. increase public awareness and educate on the vulnerability to hazards. 4. improve emergency management capabilities. 5. Pursue multi-objective opportunities wherever possible.

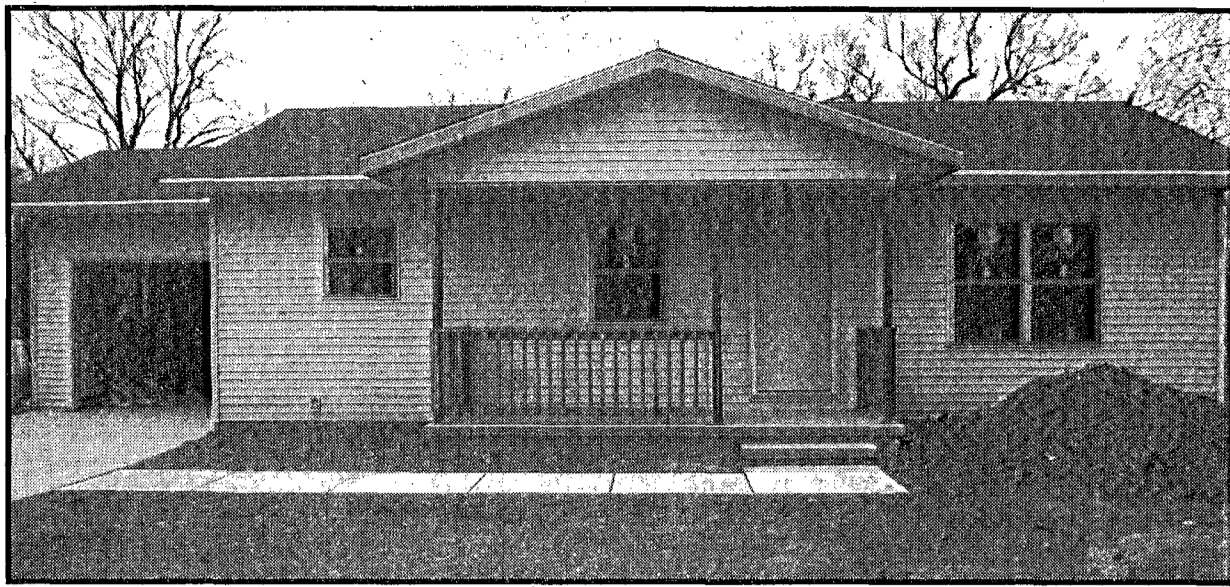

Nationally, the fiscal year (FY) 2007 AFG awards, which will be distributed in phases, will ultimately provide over \$490 million to fire departments and nonaffiliated emergency medical service organizations throughout the country.

"Thanksgiving is a time for sharing and caring throughout the United States, and not a time for recovering from a fire in our homes and businesses" said U.S. Fire Administrator Greg Cade. "These grants continue FEMA's commitment to ensure fire departments are receiving much needed funds to better protect the communities they serve."

AFG awards aim to enhance response capabilities and to more effectively protect the health and safety of the public with respect to fire and other hazards. The grants enable local fire departments and

emergency medical services organizations to purchase or receive training, conduct first responder health and safety programs, and buy equipment and response vehicles.

AFG also supports regional projects in which multiple organizations serving more than one local jurisdiction benefit directly from activities implemented with grant funds.

Since FY 2001, and including FY 2007, over \$3.3 billion in AFG funding has been distributed to fire departments and first responder organizations to purchase response equipment, personal protective equipment, vehicles and fire prevention activities. AFG is administered cooperatively by two FEMA components: the National Preparedness Directorate and the United States Fire Administration.

FEMA coordinates the federal government's role in preparing for, preventing, mitigating the effects of, responding to, and recovering from all domestic disasters, whether natural or man-made, including acts of terror.

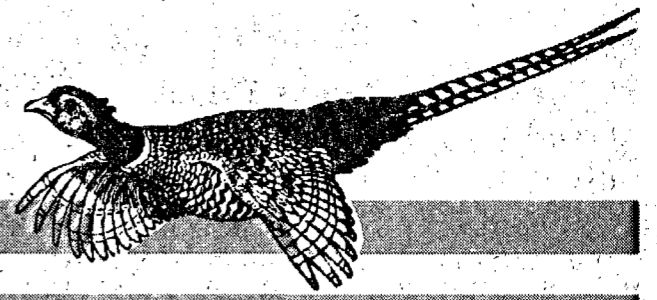

Wayne State finished the 2007 season with a 28-22 record under first year head coach Krista Unger. It was the first winning season in softball at Wayne State since 1992 and the 28 wins were 18 more than the 2006 mark (10-34) for the Wildcats. Wayne State College is an NCAA Division II school located in Wayne, Nebraska and competes in the Northern Sun Intercollegiate Conference.

Jamar Diggs scores career-high 30 as WSC rallies for 75-72 win at Chadron State

Sophomore guard Jamar Diggs scored a career-high 30 points and Wayne State rallied from a 16-point first half deficit to edge Chadron State 75-72 in men's college basketball played Saturday evening in Chadron, Nebraska. The Wildcats improved to 3-1 on the young season while keeping Chadron State winless at 0-4.

Wayne State trailed by as much as 16 points in the first half, 37-21 with 6:13 left in the first half, and trailed by 10 at halftime 42-32. The Wildcats slowed chipped at the Eagles' lead and took their first lead in the second half at 59-58 with 8:35 to go following a three pointer by senior guard Bryce Caldwell. After exchanging the lead several times, Chadron State grabbed a 70-67 lead with 2:52 remaining, but WSC scored the next seven points to go in front 74-70 with 57 seconds remaining in the game. A pair of Kyle Cotton free throws pulled CSC within two points at 74-72 with 43 seconds left. Wayne State's Jamar Diggs sank one of two free throws with 11 seconds left to give WSC a 75-72 lead. Chadron State had a chance to tie the game, but Tim McLaurin missed a three pointer as time

expired to give Wayne State the come-from-behind win.

Diggs scored his career-high 30 points on 10 of 14 shooting from the field, including 7 of 8 from the three point line. He also sank 3 of 6 free throws to account for his 30 points. Senior guard Bryce Caldwell added 21 points on 8 of 17 shooting, which included four three pointers.

As a team, WSC shot 29 of 61 from the field (47.5%) and hit 11 of 25 three pointers for 44 percent. The 'Cats were just 6 of 14 at the charity stripe. For Chadron State, Kyle Cotton scored 16 points with Tim McLaurin adding 13. The Eagles hit 23 of 58 shots from the floor for 39.7 percent, 12 of 28 from the three point line (41.4%) and 14 of 23 at the free throw line.

Both teams finished with 38 rebounds as Matt Rathje grabbed seven boards to lead Wayne State while McLaurin hauled in a game-high nine rebounds for the Eagles. WSC had just 11 turnovers, one less than CSC. Caldwell was credited with six assists to lead the Wildcats with David Walters handing out four.

Hot shooting lifts St. Cloud State men to 99-71 win over Wayne State College

St. Cloud State used 58.8 percent shooting (40 of 68) to roll over Wayne State 99-71 in non-conference men's college basketball played Tuesday evening in St. Cloud, Minnesota. The Huskies moved to 3-0 with the win while sending Wayne State to 2-1 overall.

The Wildcats never led in the game as the host Huskies used 61 percent shooting in the first half (24 of 39) to build a 58-34 lead at the intermission. SCSU led by as many as 27 points early in the second half but Wayne State cut the lead to 14 points, 74-60 with 8:36 remaining, following a pair of David Walters free throws for the Wildcats. But the Huskies went on a 13-4 run over the next two minutes to push the lead back up by 24 points and the Huskies cruised to the easy win.

Sophomore guard Jamar Diggs scored 23 points on 10 of 14 shooting to lead the Wildcats in scoring. Senior guard Bryce Caldwell

accounted for 14 points while senior backup center Matt Rathje recorded a double-double with 12 points and 10 rebounds. WSC shot a respectable 47.4 percent from the field, making 27 of 57 shots. The 'Cats were 7 of 14 from the three point line and 10 of 16 at the charity stripe.

For St. Cloud State, sophomore center Ross Winniekins poured in 24 points on 10 of 15 shooting to lead the Huskies. David Dreas finished with 11 points while Matt Schneck added 10 for the Huskies, who shot 40 of 68 from the field for 58.8 percent. SCSU canned 10 of 17 three pointers (58.8%) and was a perfect 9 of 9 from the free throw line.

St. Cloud State held a slight 33-29 edge in rebounding over the Wildcats as Winniekins grabbed six boards to lead the Huskies while Rathje hauled in 10 cars to pace Wayne State. WSC had 18 turnovers to just 11 for SCSU.

Laquisha Cook and Andrea Schoepf of Wayne State College were named to the Hyatt Place Mountain Lion Women's Basketball Classic played in Colorado Springs, Colorado over the weekend. Cook was named Tournament MVP while Schoepf was one of six players named to the All-Tournament Team. Wayne State won a pair of games at the tournament, topping host UC-Colorado Springs Friday night 80-63 and edging Adams State on Saturday 61-58.

Cook, a 5-9 junior guard from Houston, Texas, scored 34 points in two games, shooting 16 of 33 from

the field. She scored a season-high 28 points on Friday night in a 80-63 win over UC-Colorado Springs, hitting 13 of 24 shots from the field to go with seven rebounds.

Schoepf, a 5-9 senior guard from South Sioux City, Nebraska, had a game-high 18 points to lead the Wildcats in Saturday's 61-58 win over Adams State. In the two games, she finished with 27 points, eight rebounds and six assists.

Wayne State College built a big lead in the first half, then rallied late in the second half for a 61-58 win over Adams State of Colorado at the Hyatt Place Mountain Lion Women's Basketball Classic in Colorado Springs, Colorado. Wayne State is now 4-1 on the season with the win while sending Adams State College to 2-2 overall.

The Wildcats held the lead for a good share of the first half and led by as many as 13 points at 24-11 with 6:59 to go in the first half, but Adams State went on a 10-0 run over the next 2:53 to cut the lead to three, 24-21 with 4:06 remaining in the first half. But WSC finished the first half with a six point lead at halftime 31-25.

But WSC used back-to-back three point plays by Andrea Schoepf and Jodie Boss to regain the lead at 59-55 with 50 seconds to go. A three-point play by

Adams State's Nicole Tatum pulled the Grizzlies within one at 59-58 with 41 seconds remaining. Wayne State's Jennifer Yee was fouled with eight seconds remaining and made both free throws, putting the 'Cats ahead 61-58. Adams State had a chance to tie the game, but a jumper by Bustos was off the mark and the rebound grabbed by Wayne State's Jodie Boss as time expired allowing the Wildcats to escape with the win.

Senior guard Andrea Schoepf was the only player in double figures for the Wildcats, scoring a game-high 18 points. Wayne State shot 42.1 percent from the field, making 21 of 57 shots. The 'Cats were just 4 of 16 from the three point line and 9 of 14 at the charity stripe.

For Adams State, Nicole Tatum had a double-double with 16 points and 10 rebounds while Vera Jo Bustos finished with 12 points. The Grizzlies made 24 of 52 shots for 46.2 percent, made 3 of 6 three pointers and hit 7 of 8 free throws. Adams State won the rebounding battle over WSC 37-25 thanks to Tatum's 10 boards while Mara Hjelte grabbed six rebounds to lead Wayne State. ASC had 22 turnovers to just 13 for the Wildcats.

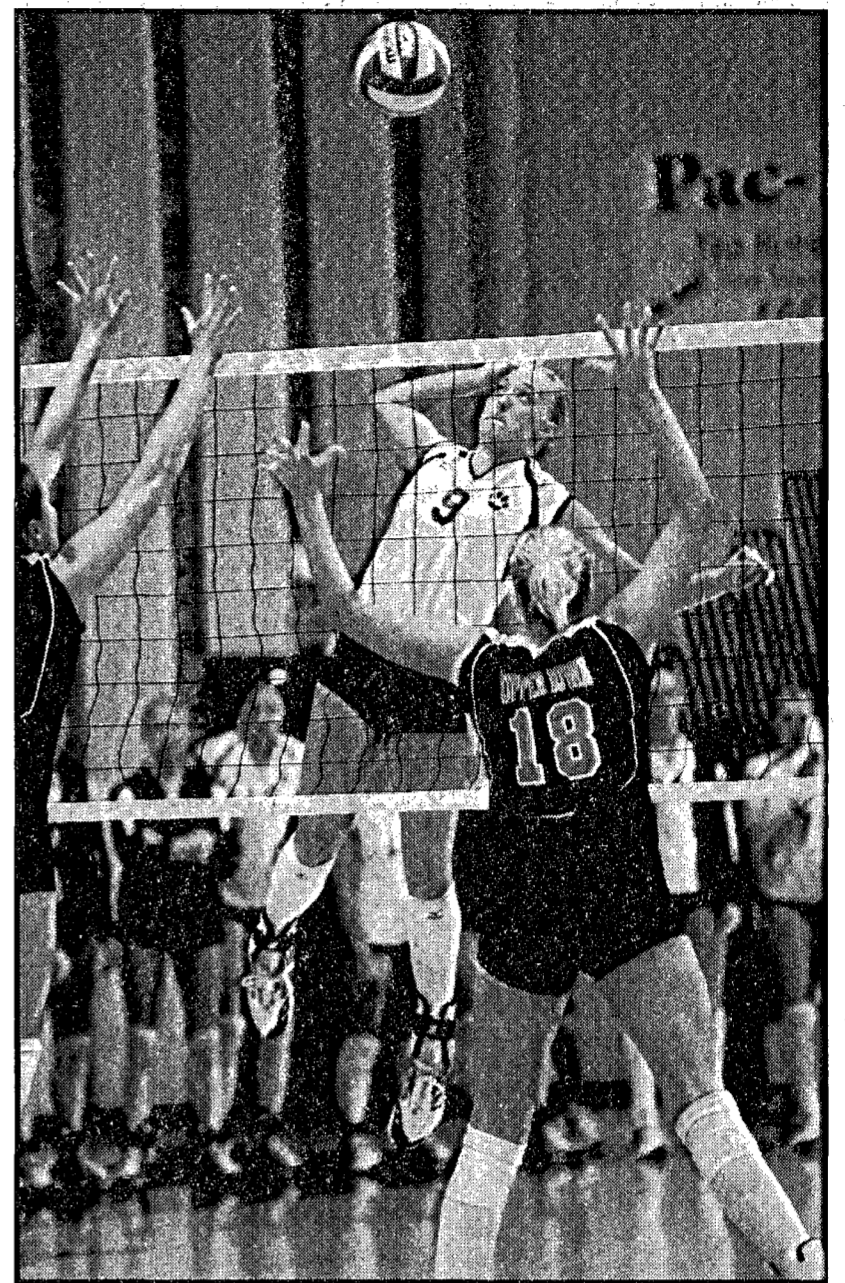

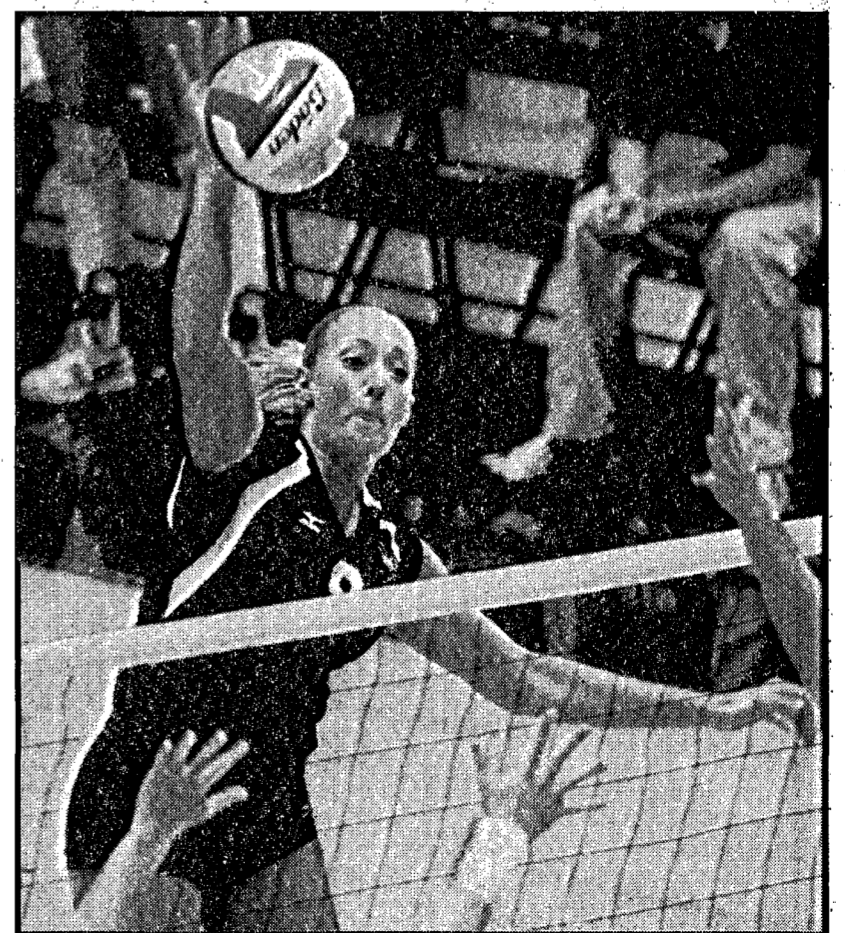

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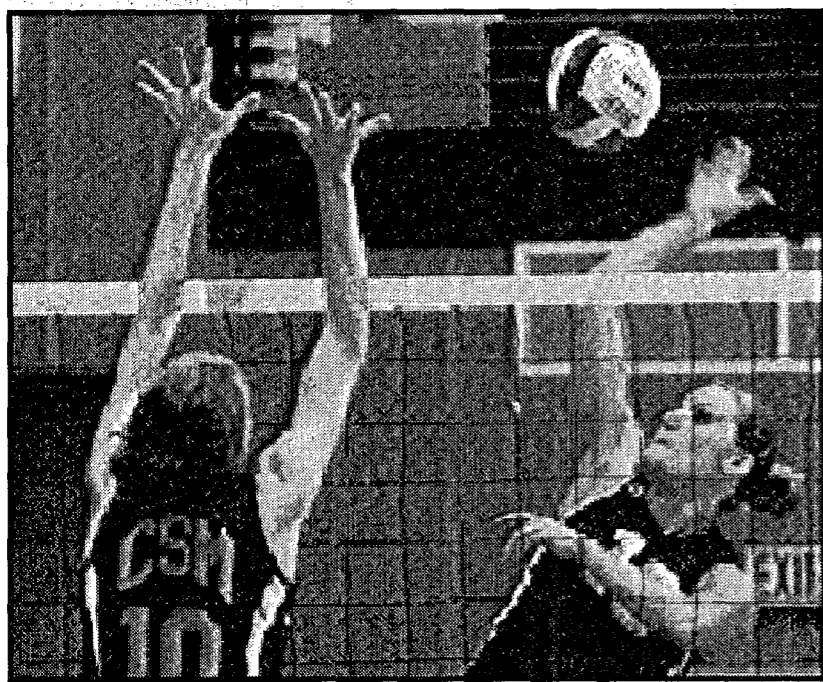

Security equipment to be purchased includes locks and doors at a cost of \$2,013.30 by the Village of Hoskins.

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

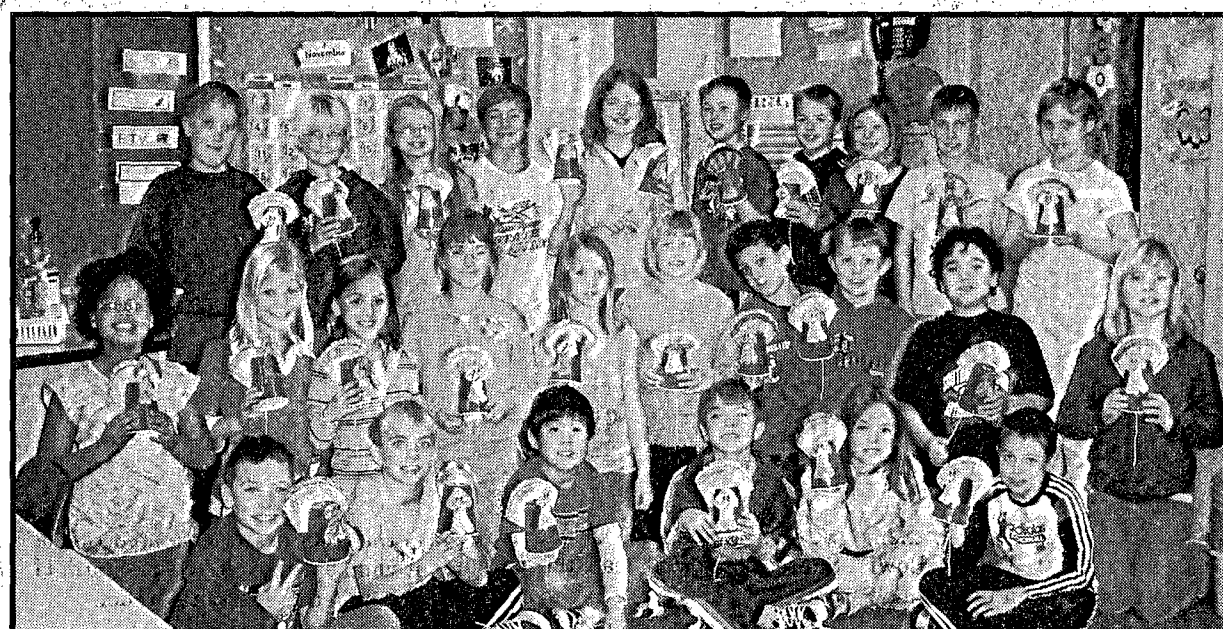

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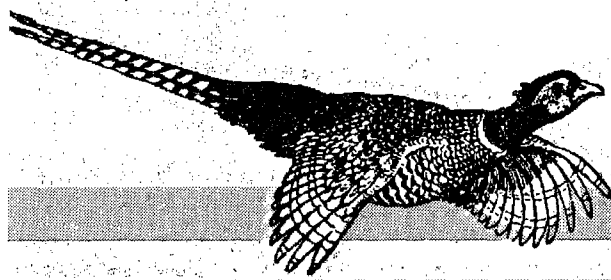
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Looking Ahead in Wayne Capitol View

City Council meeting

The next regular meeting of the Wayne City Council will be Tuesday, Dec. 4 at 5:30 p.m. in the council room.

Western Ridge Subdivision Housing Development

What is it? A single family housing subdivision west of the cemetery using \$387,000 in state housing grant funds to lower the cost of 17 new homes for families. It will extend Oak Drive north across Highway 35 into the field. The target of this project is families with annual incomes at or below the median income for Wayne County. For a family of four, this is \$52,500 per year.

Why are these houses being built?

- maintaining the Wayne County population and
- maintaining school enrollment are two of the primary goals the mayor and council have focused on for a number of years.
- 42 housing units were lost in Wayne between 1996 and 2006 as the result of fire, conversion to commercial property and city code enforcement. These residences were in poor condition but are still a loss in the total number of places to live.
- To maintain our population, they must be replaced and most of

the new housing in that time period was costing \$150,000 and higher per residence;

• This project will replace 17 of the 42 that were lost.

Who is developing this project? Wayne Community Housing and the Wayne Community Development Agency are jointly planning this development using the grant funds. We are soliciting private developers to develop the property and build the houses.

Who will sell these homes? The homes built will be listed through local real estate firms.

How much will the homes cost? Eight of the homes must be sold for \$150,000 or less and nine of the homes must be sold for \$120,000 or less. Down payment loans up to \$20,000 at 0 percent interest will be available for families making the county median income or less.

Will any bare lots be for sale to build my own home on? Yes if the home meets the price limitations for the project.

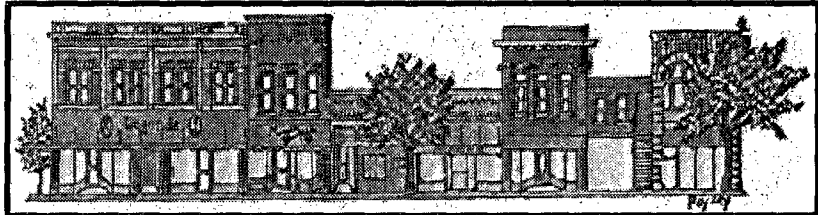

Debate continues on handling cash reserves

The road to hell is paved with good intentions.* And the road to endless, frustrating debate is paved with ideas for spending cash that accumulates in the state's reserve fund.

"A whopping \$542.1 million, or 15.7 percent of the state's annual tax revenue, will be there in late June 2008," the AP reported recently.

Governor Dave Heineman was quick to note that Nebraska's economy has shown a consistent pattern in recent decades: It trends upward for three or four years before dropping into a period of lower-than-hoped-for revenue receipts. The governor believes it best to mostly keep those dollars in reserve, for use when the high times turn to low.

Heineman's view represents a position of longstanding among some policymakers.

Senator Tom White was quick to note the perennial pleading of Nebraskans for property tax relief. It remains steady, with notable and vocal increases when those taxes fall due twice a year. The senator believes it best to mostly return to taxpayers many of those dollars generated by state taxes. The idea is that those who pay local property taxes would get a little something from the state to ease the burden - just a little.

The Legislature and the governor will ultimately decide what to do with the substantial sum in the reserve. But keep in mind, it is only a "substantial" sum. It ought not be viewed as huge or enormous; it is no embarrassment of riches by today's standards.

Odds probably are good that - if lawmakers decide to spend a chunk of the reserve - at least a portion of it will be dedicated to some form of attempted property tax relief.

The view from here, based on watching "property tax relief" schemes, scams and programs since 1974: If the Legislature wants to be certain those who pay property taxes actually realize

some modicum of relief, the best method might be to take the most direct approach. Let checks go directly from the state to the individual taxpayers.

No funneling state dollars through local governments with nothing but legislative "good intentions" for that money to be spent by local governments, with the "good intention" that those dollars will guarantee a lower property tax burden.

Former Governor Kay Orr went along with a "give it to local governments" vehicle for property tax relief. She and the payers of property taxes were greatly and legitimately disappointed in the results.

Don't forget: These thoughts are based solely on the possibility that the verdict from the Statehouse is to spend some of the reserve in yet another property tax relief effort. The verdict of policymakers might

not involve such a notion.

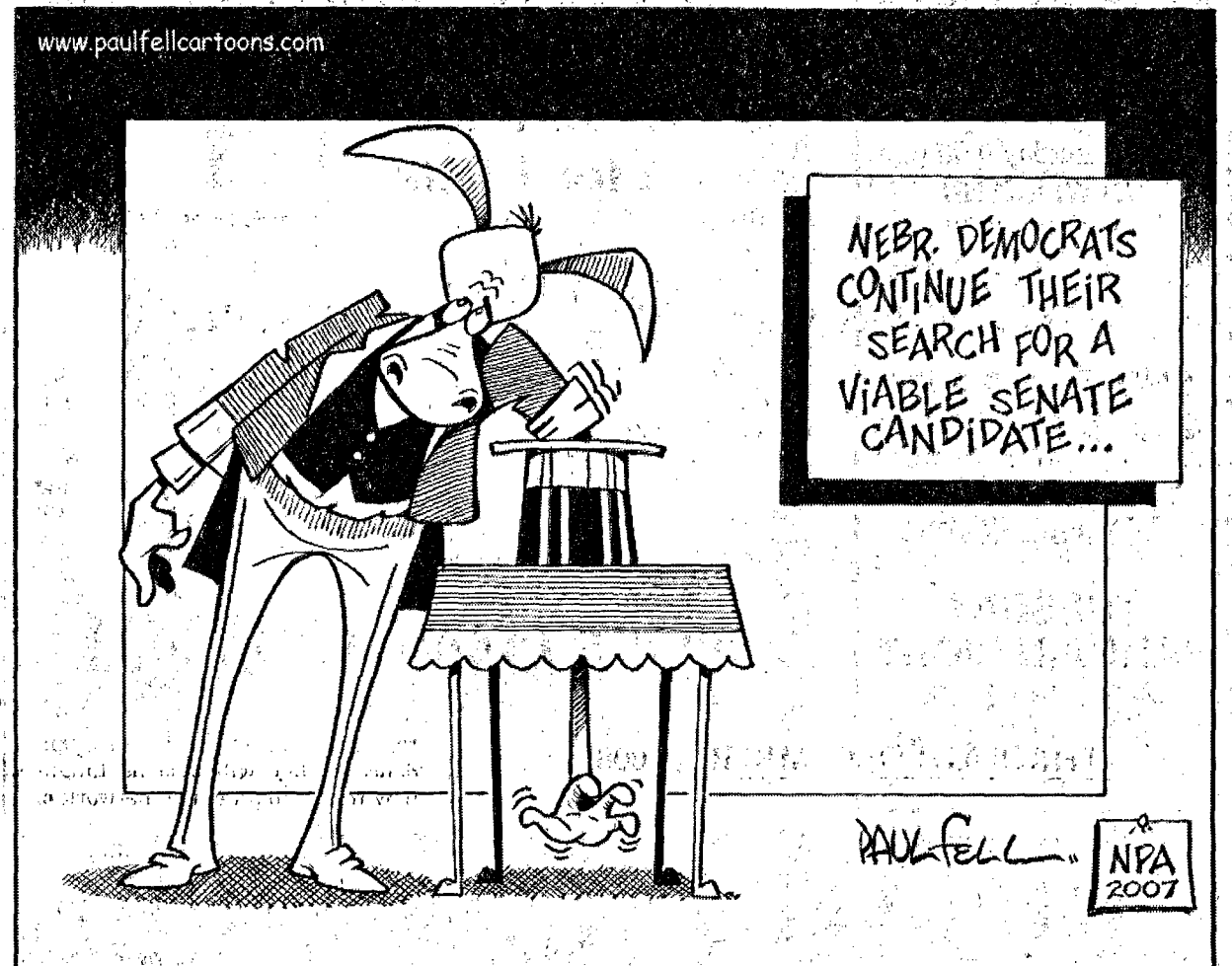
Calling all Democrats! And we do mean all. If ever you have desired to run for high office, your best-ever opportunity could be at hand.

The above could be Want Ad text for Nebraska's increasingly minority party as its search continues for someone willing to accept its nomination for the U.S. Senate.

As forecast here - and just about everywhere - Omaha Mayor Mike Fahey declined to accept the honor. The hope by some, in the Party whose symbol is the donkey, is that Scott Kleeb will run the risk of being a sacrificial lamb on the altar of the two-party system. Kleeb made his maiden bid for office in 2006 when he lost the 3rd District House race to Adrian Smith. Smith, a former state senator, won a first term in the overwhelmingly GOP district.

Things change quickly in politics, but the current forecast is that former Republican governor/ U.S. Ag Secretary Mike Johanns will have no competition for the GOP nomination. Attorney General Jon Bruning signaled he would back out of the primary contest. Bob Kerrey was the Democrats' best hope for a competitive candidate. Once former Democratic governor/U.S. Senator Kerrey decided to stay at the helm of the New School University in NYC, the party's nomination took on the allure of ingrown toenails on a 20-mile hike. Uphill.

Topp gives presentation at Wayne Rotary Club

Amy Topp, UNL Extension Educator for Wayne County, was a guest speaker at a recent Wayne Rotary Club meeting. Her presentation was on "Spending, It's More Than Just Money."

The program on credit card debt is important because when University of Nebraska Extension staff members asked citizens to identify topics of concern, survey participants overwhelmingly identified credit card debt as a high priority issue. Those responding suggested that college-aged students should be targeted for educational interventions. These findings are corroborated by research:

•More students are obtaining their first credit card at a young age. In 1994, 66 percent of students received their first card by the end of their freshman year. In 1998, 81 percent had received their first card by the end of their first year in college.

•Many students hold multiple credit cards. Thirty-two percent of those who applied for education loans had four or more cards. A University of Nebraska study showed that the average student had three cards.

•Many students are carrying credit card balances forward. The average credit card balance among students is estimated to be \$2,327.

Of students who carry balances forward, 20 percent have debts greater than \$10,000.

•Nebraskans are not immune: Midwesterners carry the highest card balances of any group studied. The consequences of credit card debt are far-reaching. Research has shown:

•Credit card debt can influence future earning potential. Students who feel they must take fewer classes or drop out of school entirely to pay off debts may be limiting the experiences which could improve their earning potential. In 1998, a University of Indiana administrator suggested, "We lose more students to credit card debt than to academic failure."

•Credit card debt may adversely impact future employment opportunities: According to Barbara O'Neil of Rutgers Cooperative Extension, "Increasingly, students with high credit card debt are also having trouble getting good jobs because employers are reviewing credit reports."

Through the program, "Spending, It's More Than Just Money," people can learn about credit card use and develop knowledge and skills to make wise decisions, manage credit wisely and protect their identity. Credit cards are convenient, there's no need to

carry a checkbook, there's no additional identification needed, no need to carry cash and credit is available to cover emergency needs. But, they are to be used with the promise to pay back.

Protect yourself against identity theft by protecting all personal information: name, address, date of birth, Social Security number, mother's maiden name and account numbers. Also, be sure to shred all bills, credit card applications, junk mail, etc. and never give out information over the phone.

To report a missing credit card, immediately notify the company, you may have to send information in writing. Also, contact law enforcement, national credit reporting agencies and Social Security.

ATM safety and security tips: When a transaction is complete, take card, receipt and money and put them in your pocket and don't count your money at the ATM. Most ATM robberies occur after the transactions. Missing cards should be reported to issuer immediately.

Limit credit card use to what you can pay off in full when the next bill arrives.

As for late fees and costs, remember that the bill has to make it to the payment center by the due date and possibly by a specified time so

allow seven to 10 days. A late fee averages from \$19 to \$29. And, a late payment can cause introductory interest rates to jump to regular rates or jump to an even higher APR than regular rate. It is not your parents' responsibility to pay your debt (however, if a parent co-signs the credit card application then the parent would be responsible).

Your signature means that you agree to the terms and conditions on the reverse side of the form and that means you agree to pay according to the credit card company's terms: Fixed or variable APR, on time, and with at least the minimum monthly payment.

Debit cards: Transactions come directly out of your checking account, it provides access to your own money, it limits the amount you spend and it requires a PIN number.

Credit card abuse puts YOU at risk. A negative report can make it harder to rent an apartment, make it harder to buy a house or car, hinder you from obtaining your dream job. Remember, establishing a good credit history means handling credit wisely. Having a credit card is not what establishes a good credit history, it's establishing a good record of repaying your debts that really matters.

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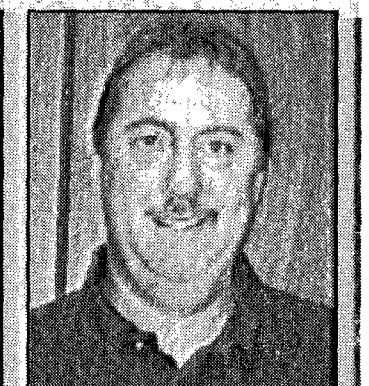
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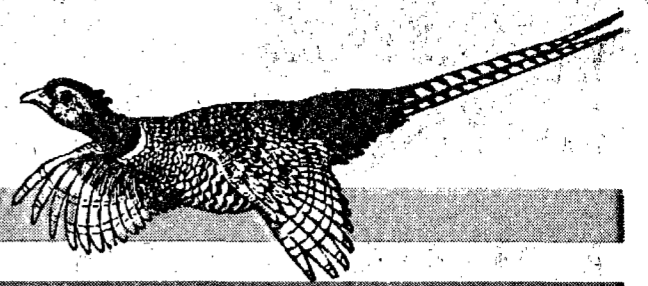

Transferring assets?

Don't just show them the money

Most of us spend so much time focusing on accumulating assets to meet our long-term goals that we give little thought to what will happen to the assets we may have available to pass on to heirs or others. In some circles, these are known as "residual assets" - money and property that is left at the end of life. It is also considered part of estate planning. But today, estate planning can take on a more significant dimension - leaving not just money, but a legacy as well.

We are in the early stages of what is considered the largest transfer of wealth in history, taking place across multiple generations. By some estimates, more than \$40 trillion will be transferred over a 55-year period ending in 2052. Given that death can never be accurately predicted, every adult (or couple) with assets of any kind should ideally have at least a current, simple will.

But as you become older and accumulate more assets, a simple will is only the beginning of the process. If you have not conducted a more thorough review of your estate planning needs, it may be time to take a closer look. While it is an easy issue to put on the back burner, the decisions you make regarding your legacy might be the most lasting of any of the financial choices you must make.

The financial stakes
 There is plenty that can go wrong if you fail to have a valid will and other legal documents in place to deal with the disposition of any assets you may have at death. One of the great myths is that if your assets don't add up to much, you don't have any estate planning concerns. This may be true insofar as estate taxes are concerned (though as the laws are laid out now, there will be less protection from the risk of estate taxes after 2010). Taxes are only one concern. Without a will, trusts and other measures, it is possible that your "residual

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assets" will never end up with the appropriate family members or other intended beneficiaries. Lacking your clear directives, laid out in writing and properly certified, it is possible that family members could become involved in a legal tussle over your estate.

If you don't have a will, now is a good time to put one together. If your will is more than two years old, you should review it to make sure everything included is current. It may be best for you to consult with an attorney for help.

Trusts can play a part
 A will deals with the disposition of assets upon your death. But the process of transferring assets can begin sooner with trusts. You can establish trusts while you are living in order to share your wealth with family members, charitable organizations or others. Trusts tend to be more complex than wills, and professional legal help is recommended. Nevertheless, they can be an effective way to pass on your legacy while you are still living.

A living trust can be used to manage your assets before and after your death. It also can specify

ways both the assets and any income generated by the trust are distributed after your death. One of the attractions of establishing a trust is to avoid probate, a court procedure that comes into play even with a will. This way, none of the provisions laid out in a trust become a matter of public record. It also is beneficial in situations where property is held in more than one state, thereby avoiding court proceedings in multiple locations. Consult with your financial advisor, tax professional and attorney to determine whether there will be value in considering the establishment of a trust.

Leaving a lasting impression
 Beyond dealing with property and financial assets, estate planning can also be wrapped around your personal values. If you are concerned about efficiently transferring your assets, legacy planning could become a valuable part of your approach.

The idea with legacy planning is to make sure your values live on with children, grandchildren and any other people or organizations that stand to benefit from your generosity.

This begins with a discussion of your values. Think about how much you value your family. But your values may also center on other aspects of your life that may be very important to you, such as education, faith, the environment, the arts, medical research or other causes that are near and dear to you.

If you are truly concerned about leaving a lasting legacy that can make a meaningful difference to people or organizations that are important to you, this type of values discussion is important. The end result can be a wealth transfer strategy that not only ensures efficient distribution of your assets, but one that also keeps the value of your most cherished memories alive for generations.

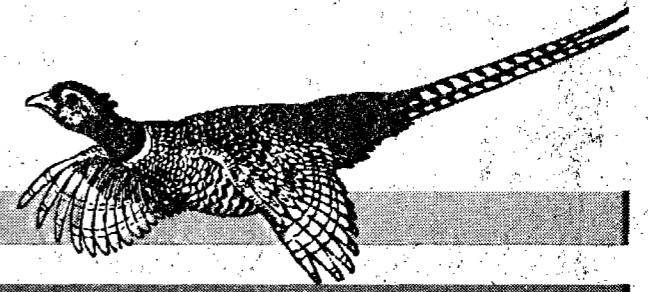

Managing a two-income household requires working together

Managing finances in a two-income household is common today. Deciding on joint or separate accounts and how to fairly share the burden of paying bills are ques-

One way is for each person to put an equal amount of money into a joint checking account that is only used to pay bills. The biggest disadvantage with this system is if one person earns a lot more money than the other, they will have more discretionary money.

Another way is for each person to put an equal percentage of their paycheck into a joint account that is used to pay the bills.

The most common way for couples to pay bills is to pool all their money into one account.

There is not one right way for two-earner households to manage their money. The most important thing to remember is that you respect each others' feelings when handling your family's finances, and that you work together to find

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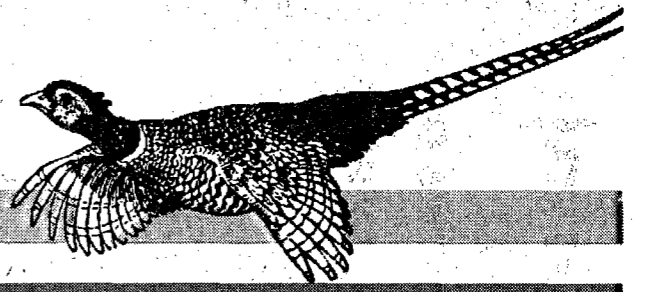

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St. Mary's Church celebrating 125 years

In 1881, the first Catholic Mass was said in Wayne. In the 125 years since that time, the town and the church has flourished and continues to strive to fill the needs of those it serves.

St. Mary's Parish is in the middle of a year-long celebration of this milestone, which began with a parish picnic in September and will end in late August of 2008 with a special Mass and a visit from the Archbishop of the Omaha diocese.

Events scheduled for the month of December include a Christmas tree at Fantasy Forest Dec. 6-7 and the annual St. Mary's Elementary

School Christmas Program on Sunday, Dec. 16 at 2 p.m.

St. Mary's Parish began with a small number of Catholics who settled in this area about the time the town was being platted. Father Nicholas Horn of West Point came in the spring of 1882 to celebrate Mass in the home of John B. Geitzen. Twenty-five people were present at this first Mass.

Father Carney of Norfolk succeeded Father Horn and attended the Wayne Mission for approximately two years, celebrating Mass in the Geitzen home until the summer of 1883. Mass was then held at

the home of Maurice P. Ahren and in the old courthouse for some time.

Father Daniel Moriarty of Lyons came to Wayne in 1885, still using the Ahren home and the courthouse for celebrating Mass. In 1886, the first church was erected in the north part of town, now known as Eighth and Main Streets. In 1887, Father Moriarty was appointed the first resident pastor of Wayne, remaining here for about one year.

Between 1888 and 1896, the church had no resident pastor and was served by three different priests; Father Muga, Father Wallace and Father Barry.

In 1896 Father McGrath became a resident priest in Wayne. The following year a house and three lots were purchased and the church was moved to a location on East Fourth Street. Father McGrath remained for two years and was succeeded by Father James B. Fitzgerald, who remained for five years. During his tenure, the church enjoyed substantial growth in membership and all indebtedness was paid off. Father Weber came next, remaining one year.

Father T. P. Haley came in December of 1902. During his administration the church building was doubled in size, a bell tower was built, a sacristy was added, new altars, a bell, pews and a confessional were added to contribute to the beauty of the church, parish house and the grounds.

When Father Haley was appointed to the Wayne Parish, Dixon was attached to it. Mass was said every second Sunday at Wayne and Dixon. In 1903 a pastoral residence was purchased at Dixon and plans were made to build a church at Carroll. On Jan. 1, 1904 the first Mass was said in the new Church, Our Lady of Sorrows, which became a mission of Wayne. At this same time two and one half acres of land was acquired from the Wayne Public Cemetery Association for the exclusive use of the Catholics of Wayne County.

In 1906 Father Haley resigned and was succeeded by Father William Kearns, whose 44-year

tenure is the longest of any St. Mary's pastor.

Father Kearns retired in 1950 and was succeeded by the Reverend Robert P. Hupp. During Father Hupp's administration, land was purchased on East Seventh Street for the present school, church and rectory. Father Hupp left in 1953, but not before putting in countless hours toward the completion of the school building.

Father William Kleffmann came to Wayne in 1953, completing the school and beginning plans for the present church. Father Kleffmann served St. Mary's until August of 1968, at which time Father Paul Begley arrived to serve the parish.

Shortly after Father Begley's arrival, a new rectory was purchased at 723 Walnut Drive. In April of 1969, ground was broken for the present church which was officially dedicated on June 6, 1971.

Father Begley remained until June of 1974 when Father Tom McDermott came to St. Mary's in Wayne. In 1972 the old church and parsonage were sold and converted into several apartment units that remain today. Father McDermott served until 1981, at which time Father Jim Buschelman arrived. Father Jim was the only pastor to die while serving St. Mary's, passing away suddenly from a brain tumor on Aug. 11, 1986.

At this time, Father Don Cleary assumed his duties as pastor of St. Mary's. During his tenure, a new rectory was constructed to replace the old one on Walnut Drive. This facility includes living quarters, offices and meeting facilities. Father Cleary remained pastor until 1998.

Father James F. McCluskey came to St. Mary's in June of 1998 and served St. Mary's Parish until June of 2003 when the present pastor, Father Mark Tomasiewicz came to Wayne to continue to build on the tradition of community within St. Mary's parish.

In its 125 year history, St. Mary's has had three men join the priesthood. They include Fr. Joe Dorsey, Fr. Tom McDermott and Fr. Joseph Finn.

N-Lighten Nebraska 2008 kicks off annual campaign

N Lighten Nebraska 2008 has officially kicked off its annual campaign and is calling for companies, communities and families to get entered in the statewide wellness program. Officials announced the opening recently and unveiled an updated website with new registra-

tion options and an increased partnership with Subway, the official team meeting place of N Lighten Nebraska. Over 10,000 people are expected to participate in 2008.

The three month team wellness program offers assistance to teams of 2-10 people in healthy weight loss and/or increased physical activity. The program runs from Feb. 1 - May 1, but officials encourage participants to sign up by Jan. 19. 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Bruning announces ConAgra settlement

Attorney General Jon Bruning recently announced that a settlement has been reached in the matter of Nebraska Department of Environmental Quality (NDEQ) vs. ConAgra Fertilizer.

ConAgra will pay a civil penalty of \$40,000 to the Nebraska Common Schools Fund, half of which will be waived if the company maintains compliance with Consent Decree and all applicable environmental laws for a period of 180 days. ConAgra has also agreed to pay \$40,000 into the Attorney General's Environmental Protection Fund as a voluntary supplemental environmental project.

Nebraska's environment must be protected, Attorney General Jon Bruning said. We appreciate ConAgra's quick response in cleaning up the spill.

The settlement stems from an accidental spill of 3,800 gallons of liquid nitrogen fertilizer from a railcar at ConAgra's Hastings plant in January of 2006. ConAgra responded immediately to the spill, provided notification to both the NDEQ and EPA, and worked quickly to contain the spill and minimize environmental impact.

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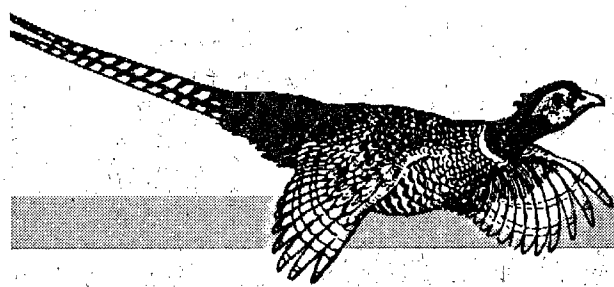

ORDINANCE NO. 2007-14

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 22 BUSINESS, ARTICLE II OCCUPATION TAX, SECTION 22-31 TELEPHONE COMPANIES; PROVIDING FOR THE REPEAL OF CONFLICTING ORDINANCES, AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE Mayor and City Council of the City of Wayne, Nebraska:

Section 1. That Chapter 22, Article II, Section 22-31, of the Municipal Code of Wayne, Nebraska, be amended to read as follows:

22-31 Telephone Companies
For the purpose of raising revenue, an occupation tax is hereby levied on telephone companies as follows:

1. Amount. All telephone companies doing business in the City are required to pay an occupation tax in an amount equal to five percent (5%) of the gross receipts from legally established basic monthly charges collected for local exchange telephone service from subscribers within the City.

2. When Paid. Payment of the tax levied in this section shall be made four (4) times annually, using the calendar quarter year as a basis for computing the amount due. Each quarterly payment shall be due within 45 days after the end of each calendar quarter year. The occupation tax levied in this section shall be paid to the City Clerk as prescribed and he/she shall furnish a proper receipt upon payment. The amount of payment shall be recorded and credited by the City Clerk to the General Fund.

3. Delinquent Payments. Payments of the occupation tax which are made after the due date shall be subject to a penalty of one percent (1%) of the amount due for each month or fraction of a month past due; this amount shall be paid in addition to the tax which is due. Payment of the occupation tax shall be accompanied by a statement of receipts subject to the tax; such statement shall be certified by an authorized representative of the paying company.

4. Adjustments. Each succeeding payment of the occupation tax levied pursuant to this Section may include any adjustment which is shown on any previous report. Such adjustments may include uncollectible amounts or other amounts which cause an increase or decrease in the amount of tax paid in any previous quarter.

5. Records. The City shall have the right, at any reasonable time, to require any telephone company to produce all books and records necessary to verify any report submitted.

6. Collection. In case any telephone company shall fail to make payment of the occupation tax provided for by this Section at the time specified for such payment, the City shall have the right to sue any such company in any court of competent jurisdiction for the amount of such occupation tax due and payable under the terms and provisions of this Section and may recover judgment against any such company for such amount so due, together with interest and penalties, and may have execution thereon.

Section 2. That any other ordinance or section passed and approved prior to the passage, approval, and publication of this ordinance and in conflict with the provisions is hereby repealed.

Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect and be in full force from and after ninety (90) days of its passage, approval and publication or posting as required by law.

ORDINANCE NO. 2007-13
AN ORDINANCE AMENDING WAYNE MUNICIPAL CODE, CHAPTER 18, ARTICLE II BUILDING CODE BY ADDING SECTIONS 18-46 BUILDING PERMITS; CASH DEPOSITS; AND 18-47 BUILDING PERMITS; PENALTY; TO REPEAL CONFLICTING ORDINANCES AND SECTIONS; AND TO PROVIDE AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE Mayor and City Council of the City of Wayne, Nebraska:

Section 1. That Chapter 18, Article II Building Code of the Municipal Code of Wayne, Nebraska, shall be amended by adding the following sections:

Sec. 18-46. Building Permits; Cash Deposits
(a) Cash deposits shall be required with the submission of each building permit application. The cash deposits shall be set by the Council, and a schedule of the same is on file and available in the City Clerk's Office.

(b) The cash deposit shall be forfeited to the City if the contractor fails to call the Building Official to request the required inspections as noted on the building permit card. Upon forfeiture of the building permit cash deposit, a new cash deposit of the same amount shall be required before construction can continue.

(c) The building permit cash deposit may be waived, provided the applicant has had no violations of the progress inspection requirements in the City during the previous twelve months.

(d) The cash deposit shall be returned to the

owner or contractor as stated on the building permit application within two business days after issuance of the Certificate of Occupancy.

Sec. 18-47. Building Permits; Penalty
A penalty for not obtaining a building permit prior to the start of the project shall be established in an amount of two times the building permit fee.

Section 2. Any other ordinance or section passed and approved prior to the passage, approval, and publication of this ordinance and in conflict with its provisions is repealed.

Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect and be in full force from and after its passage, approval, and publication as required by law.
