## A flag on their shoulder and sand on their boots

As he walked down the ramp of the C17, the intensity of the bright sunlight hit his eyes. A split second before a blast of heat hit his body, almost driving him back into the cool darkened belly of the transport, the young soldier thought that surely the gates of hell had been flung open. Even with sunglasses on, he stumbled along the tarmac trying to adjust his eyes to the harsh sunlight and still stayed in a single file behind the others.


The heat seemed to add 30 pounds to his body armor,

weapon and ruck. "Be careful what you boots. wish for," this young soldier, with a flag on his shoulder and sand on his boots quietly said to himself. The realities of his decision were beginning to manifest themselves.

With barely any time to move into their housing units or store their equipment, this soldier, with a flag on her shoulder and sand on her boots, was thrown into her training. In a short time, they must be able to take up the pace that was set before them by others. Training, oppressive heat, accountability, more heat, practice, practice, more heat, "rehydrate, rehydrate." Where is that water detail? Slowly the accumulation of months of training begins to gain purpose as they prepare themselves for missions into the bowels of this huge sandbox.

The tensions begin to subside as they become familiar with the equipment and operating procedures. While going over the inspections of their up-armored vehicles, someone produces a camera. Now for a Kodak moment. Ah Ha, there, sitting on the gun mount, a blonde-haired, blue-eyed soldier, with a flag on his shoulder and sand on his boots. "Can't wait to email this pic to mom."

Days have turned into weeks, missions in his heart and dust on his boots.

have turned into miles and unbearable heat into fatigue. The names of days have no meaning, just one less day "in country." A day off is a day without a mission, with nowhere to go and nothing to do if you got there. Computers, phone calls to home and video games soon become the norm. Time becomes a villain, not enough time on the phone, too much time on the road, not enough time for sleep, too much time left "in the country." "When do I get R & R?" she says to herself while standing in front of a mirror adjusting the flag on her shoulder and brushing the sand off her

Rocket attacks on the bases and near misses from roadside bombs, reminds one of their own mortality. It also reminds them of why they are over here and why they volunteered; bringing freedom and democracy to others is no easy task. As they say, "Freedom Isn't Free." These new millennium warriors, with a flag on their shoulders and sand on their boots, come from a long tradition of warriors giving their all. Soldiers of the 600th Transportation Company have picked up that gauntlet and accepted the challenge. To quote from a letter from an angry woman, "only two defining forces have ever offered to die for you: 1. Jesus Christ 2. The American G.I. One died for your soul and the other for your freedom.'

No one knows what these soldiers will see or what they'll talk about when they come home but all will know what they stand for and why they serve. These soldiers know it's a privilege to wear that flag on their shoulder and an honor to serve the country that flies it. There will always be those for or against us and one will believe what one wants, for these are just comments made by an old soldier with a flag

## Discussion on Voluntary Reduction in Force severance program is held

Wayne Community Schools Board of Education met in special session on Monday at Wayne High School. Many teachers, some of their family members and some parents were in attendance to listen to discussion on the 2007-08 Voluntary Reduction in Force (VRIF) severance program. Handouts of the resolution, which provides for the payment of certain dollar amounts to certified employees in exchange for their resignation effective at the end of the 2007-08 contract year, were available. A decision is to be made in March, when the VRIF program ends.

Several people commented on the severance program: Rodney Garwood noted he feels the VRIF program is really about money. He said special education is near and dear to his heart and has noticed that a couple of aides' contracts were not renewed. He feels funds spent in special education are reimbursed so those employees cost the least and are very needed.

Keith Jarvi said he thought the budget would be discussed, not just the VRIF program. He stated that many places have emergency funds set aside and wondered if there are contingency funds other than the

Lee Brogie, Wayne Middle School teacher, asked if questions could be asked after the

program. Wayne School Board President Kaye Morris told her a letter was going out to the administration and certified staff the next day and that an NSEA (Nebraska State Education Association) representative will be at the school on Thursday, Jan.

Mary Carstens said they have two children near the end of their education journey in the Wayne School system and they have an affection for the school. She asked if staff other than teachers are being considered to be let go? Morris noted every area is being looked at. Board member Jodi Pulfer said that how the VRIF program goes and a combination of everything will determine what happens in March.

Deb Garwood stated their son loves this school and everyone does a great job with him. Months ago teachers' negotiations were held so she's shocked at the VRIF program. As a taxpayer, she wonders what happened as livelihoods are now being threatened. Have other things that don't affect the students been considered, such as travel expenses, etc.? Morris said that 85 percent of the school expenses are payroll and benefits. She added there was a zero increase in health insurance and the usual three percent pay increase was given, which maybe shouldn't have been.

Dr. Joe Reinert, superintendent, noted

board gives more information on the VRIF the resolution will be discussed on Monday, Jan. 14 at the school board meeting, which is at 6 p.m. at Wayne High School. The resolution is comprised of the resignation (effective May, 2008), severance benefits which are either \$750 x the number of years of service (to be paid on or before Sept. 20, 2008) or 18 months of health and dental insurance; taxes information, interview time (during which time the school district will hire a substitute), release of school district, indemnification, letter of recommendation from the school district

Jill Sweetland asked for clarification and was told every certified staff member and administration will receive a letter that identifies education areas that the board could potentially be looking at for the VRIF program. Pulfer noted the board will vote on voluntary severance potential education areas on Jan. 14 but nothing is being forced at this time and the VRIF program will only be accepted in certain areas.

School board member Jeryl Nelson said the board hasn't come forth with recommendations yet. The VRIF program will be broader than the final RIF.

It was noted it is the hope of the board there will be enough VRIF come through so they won't have to have an RIF. Travel, text books, some supplies, etc. have been put on hold to also help cut expenses.





## Van purchase, roofing concerns addressed by council members

The purchase of an additional handi-van for the city of Wayne and repairs to the roof of the Library/ Senior Center were among the items that highlighted the first meeting of 2008 for the Wayne City Council.

A public hearing was held during last week's meeting in regard to a grant for the purchase of an additional handi-van for the city.

Connie Christensen with the Senior Center and City Treasurer Nancy Braden spoke to the council in regard to the need for a second van and the cost of operation for the vehicle.

Braden presented a list of cities throughout the state with public transportation systems and the cost for using these services. They range from a donation to \$6.25 per round trip with a number of variations, depending upon distance.

Christensen said she felt the van service was essential, especially to allow people to be a part of the community and be independent. She noted that the van is used by all ages, from school children to those needing to get to classes at Wayne State College or jobs within the community to senior citizens needing to get to appointments.

Council member Verdel Lutt said that while he was not opposed to use of the van by seniors, he was concerned about using it for transportation for children "at a low cost to parents. It is a convenience for them and we have to pay for conveniences."

Following the public hearing, the council voted to move forward with Resolution 2008-01, which will allow for the submittal of a grant application for the vehicle.

Also on the agenda was a change order for the roofing contract for the Library/Senior Center.

City Planner George Ellyson had put together drawings for proposed changes and worked with Tom Hattig of Hattig Construction to come up with solutions for the problems with the building.

Also on the agenda was the approval of an interlocal agreement for use of the Rugby Field for amateur football.

Darrin Barner, representing the Rugby Club, and Brent Pick, a member of the contact football league, spoke to the council on the advantages of the football team using the field. They noted that there would be no overlap of use of the field, as the season for the respective sports are at different times of the year.

Among the advantages of the agreement would be that the two groups would be able to share the workload for caring for the field.

The council also voted to spend up to \$2,200 from the city's park fund to cost share in the renovation of the press box at Hank Overin

Jackie Zeiss, representing the American Legion Baseball program in Wayne, said that an improved press box would increase the city's chances of hosting state events and the press box had not been updated since it was constructed in 1962.

Acting as the Community Development Agency (CDA), the council voted to accept a professional services agreement with Kirkham Michael for the Western Ridge Subdivision area.

Rich Robinson, with Kirkham Michael, spoke during the meeting and said that decisions need to be made as soon as possible to meet construction deadlines. He presented two alternatives with regard to the number and configuration of the lots in the development area. He suggested using narrower street widths to allow for more lots and reduce costs.

Following his presentation, the CDA voted to move forward with alternative 1, which provides for wider streets and a total of 55 lots that could be developed in three phases. The plan calls for the entrance to the subdivision to line up with Donner Pass rather than







The center is open Wednesdays, 2-6 p.m., Thursdays, 10 a.m. - 4 p.m., Saturdays and other days by appointment by calling (toll free) 1-866-844-5683. Agape Pregnancy and Parenting Center is a "life affirming Christian ministry." Agape is a Greek word that means "Unconditional Love."

Agape Pregnancy and Parenting Center is a non-profit organization supported entirely by private donations from churches, organizations and individuals. Agape Pregnancy and Parenting Center helps women find answers to some of life's toughest questions. The counseling is free and confidential. Professionals at APPC respect thoughts and feelings and can help through issues related to pregnancy. The goal at APPC is to help women and their partners through unplanned pregnancy, which is a challenge for anyone.

Services at APPC include: free pregnancy testing, education on parenting options: adoption, single parenting and marriage; education on fetal development, parenting classes (newborn to age 12). APPC serves couples, families and parents with information about infant and child

Trained volunteers at APPC encourage adoption or parenting and they listen by offering non-judgmental support through one on one mentoring and education. APPC is not an adoption agency but they will refer to local agencies. Staff at APPC also refer clients to community services such as doctors, counselors, Goldenrod Hills services, etc.

"We are also trying to reach out to men better," said Amber Olson,



APPC offers "Earn While You Learn" classes where parents can get "Baby Bucks" they can spend for items (including clothing, up to 24 months) in the Parent and Baby Store.


She also said that APPC reaches out to anyone who has had an abortion in the past. They also offer an 8-10 week study, HEART (Healing Effects Abortion Related Trauma), which is a spiritual and emotional healing support group for those who have had an abortion in the past. Olson noted they want to include men in the group too as some have been involved in driving women to abortion clinics or they didn't have any say when a woman in their life decided to have an abortion.

Staff working at Agape Pregnancy and Parenting Center include Olson, who has a master's degree in counseling. Olson also has a teaching certificate and was a school counselor in Canada for 17 years. Locally, she has worked for the Educational Service Unit in Wisner as a behavioral counselor, as an adjunct instructor in the Human Services Counseling program at Wayne State College, and part-time counseling at Oasis Counseling International in Norfolk.

Hill amassed 22 points, while four other Blue Devils also hit double digits.


"Wayne shoots well, they always do," Benson said.







# Is fate against Nebraskans?

"Her patience is in her spirit; there is never a cross word from


Doris," one of her students wrote. "Her ability to share what comes naturally for her infects others with the same calmness and smile that she exudes."

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
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
