

Council has meeting

A use by exception permit, block grant applications and the configuration of the Western Ridge Subdivision were among the items on the agenda at Tuesday's meeting of the Wayne City Council.

The use by exception permit was for Moonlight Towing, LLC and will allow for the operation of a vehicle towing service with the storage of towed vehicles at 123 Fairgrounds Avenue.

Conditions for approval of the permit include installing a fence/ visual barrier of at least eight feet around the storage area, installing a gate and removal of the unlicensed, inoperable vehicles owned by the business by July 1, 2008.

B.J. Woehler, owner of the business, has been in discussion with George Ellyson, City Planner/ Inspector and talked about using a building on the property as part of the visual barrier. He also said he intends to used large blocks of concrete stacked on top of each other as the fence material.

Mark Sorensen, a member of the Planning Commission, which had earlier voted to approved the use by exception permit, told the council that the Planning Commission's recommendation was to have a wood or metal painted fence and had not approved the concrete block fence.

Following considerable discussion, in which City Administrator Lowell Johnson noted that the city has resolved its own issues in regard to compliance with the storage of towed vehicles, the council voted to approve the permit.

A public hearing was held in regard to the

application for Community Development Block Grant Funds to be used for downtown revitalization.

Wayne is one of small number of Nebraska cities, with populations under 20,000, which is eligible to apply for the grant funds.

Lisa Hurley with the Northeast Nebraska Economic Development District, spoke to the council on the process for applying for this two phase grant.

The first part of the grant is for \$30,000 for a planning study. A match of \$7,400 is required for the grant. All but \$1,900 has already been secured from area sources.

Funding for a Blight Study, which is required for the grant study, has been provided by several entities and individuals in the Wayne area.

Wes Blecke, with the Wayne Area Economic Development, Inc. shared with the council the results of the recent community interest survey and noted that the grant application is "a step in the right

direction.' A number of business owners from the downtown area were on hand to express their support for the grant, which would be a \$250,000 Community Development Block Grant for downtown revitalization.

The council listened to a fiscal year 2006-07 audit by Terry Galloway of Almquist, Maltzahn, Galloway and Luth, PC.

Galloway told those in attendance that in regard to assets, "the city is in good shape and has good cash reserves."

He praised the work of the city in a



Another town hall meeting held in Winside; tax levy override election to be held on March 11

Another town hall meeting was held in Winside, this time at the elementary school on March 4. The Winside Public School is preparing for a tax levy override with a special override election set for Tuesday, March 11. This is the third time Winside has had a special override election. The board to levy up to \$1.35. The Winside levies have only gone up to about \$1.19.

Winside Superintendent Donavon Leighton told attendees that the \$.30 over- upcoming school year. Other factors include ride previously passed expires Aug. 31, 2008. The override election being held on March 11 would extend the \$.30 for another three years and the limit would remain \$1.35 for another three years. The question of what happens to the remaining \$.10 if only \$.20 is needed for the levy was explained. 



Update given on opportunity building; dirt moving confirmation requested

The Wayne County Board of Commissioners met in regular session on Tuesday. Wes Blecke, assistant director of Wayne Area Economic Development, Inc., gave the commissioners an update on the spec (opportunity) building and confirmed the county intends to do some dirt moving on site.

Jeff Morlok of Otte Construction asked the commissioners for a time frame as to when they plan to start the dirt work and for them to coordinate with Milo Meyer Construction, who is doing the fine grade work. Commissioner Kelvin Wurdeman noted, weather permitting, they will probably start the dirt work the first part of April.

The commissioners were also asked for a monetary figure for the in-kind dirt work so it can be applied towards getting a grant.

Elizabeth Carlson, highway superintendent, discussed reviewing bid specs for leasing a scraper. She noted so far they have received one bid. Bids are to be opened next Thursday at 4:30 p.m. and commissioners are to act on the bids at the next meeting.

She noted a change order was received on supplemental agreement #1, contractor working without charge of working days for BRO-7090, Wayne Southwest, one mile west and 0.8 mile south of Wayne. The commissioners approved the change order.

Discussion was held on an auction agreement with Stock Realty & Auction Company for the sale of

a motor grader. The sale is to be May 1 in Hastings and the county is to deliver the motor grader there. Terms of the agreement were read and the commissioners decided they wanted to review the agreement further so did not approve it at this time.


Discussion was also held on a request for placement of a utility line in county road right of way. Carlson noted she spoke with the county attorney about penalty if digging is done and lines are buried without prior permission, which she found another resolution must be made first before enforcing the



Wildcat women send Wolves whimpering home

The Wayne State women held off a late second half rally by Northern State at Rice Auditorium on Saturday afternoon to advance to the semi-final round of the NSIC Women's Tournament on Friday.

"The win gave us a sense of confidence for the next round," WSC forward Kylee McGill said. "It moved us up to seventh in the region so we shouldn't get knocked

Northern State was the first to score in the game and took an 2-0 lead, which was the last time the Wolves held a lead throughout the

After the initial push by the Wolves, WSC went on to score eight consecutive points to take a 8-2 lead.

The Wildcats continued to score at will, and led 16-12 with 13:35 left in the half.

With an aggressive punch of offense and defense, WSC went on a 10-2 run to increase the lead to 26-14 at the 8:49 mark.

The remainder of the first half resulted in WSC taking advantage of a 19 point 41-22 lead, before the Wildcats closed out the half ahead

WSC highlighted the first half with deadly three point shooting, as the Wildcats hit 8 of 15 shots from the arc.

In the second half WSC con- Wayne State (74)

trolled a double digit lead, before the Wolves surmounted a comeback to pull within six at 63-57 with 4:05 remaining.

"We had to keep our focus, we knew they were going to come back," McGill said. "They had their run, and we had ours and we knew what we had to do to keep it."

While the Wolves tried to force themselves back into the game, WSC responded back with a combined effort of six points by Laquisha Cook, Jodie Boss and Teresa Case to climb ahead 69-57.

Northern State who refused to be bullied by WSC got within seven points two more times, before the Wildcats hit some big free throws in the final stretch to seal the first round 74-65 win.

The Wildcats leading scorer was Cook with 20 points, while Case and McGill finished with 16 and ten points respectively.

The Wildcats will look to keep things alive in the semi-finals as they face the #3 seed University of Mary in St. Paul, Minn. at the Gangelhoff Center at 6 pm.

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
Wildcat Soccer adds depth to roster with signees

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
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

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

Stamps increasing by one cent on May 12


The price for a one-ounce First-Class stamp will increase from 41 to 42 cents on May 12. Prices for other mailing services, such as Standard Mail, Periodicals, Letter (2 oz). Current: .58 cents, Package Services (including singlepiece Parcel Post), and Special Services will also change. The average increase by class of mail is at or below the rate of inflation as measured by the Consumer Price

"The Postal Service developed the Forever Stamp for consumers to ease the transition during price changes," said Postmaster General John Potter. "We encourage Americans to buy Forever Stamps now for 41 cents, because like the name suggests, they are good forever." The price goes up to 42 cents on May 12.

The Postal Service has sold 5 billion Forever Stamps since the launch last April and plans to have an additional 5 billion in stock to meet the expected demand before the May price change.

Consistent with a new law*, prices for mailing services will be adjusted annually each May. The Postal Service plans to provide 90 days' notice before the price changes each year. 

How Clean is Our Water?

Wayne and Muhs Acres get our water from four wells north of town. We use 500,000 to 1 million gallons of water daily that is pumped directly from underground aquifers to our two water towers with only fluoride added.

Wayne is fortunate because area aquifers range from 70 feet to 200 feet below ground and yield a high quality water that is tested frequently for purity. The many feet of soil and clay above the aquifers clean and filter rainfall infiltration as it moves down to replenish the

Wellhead Protection?

Three of the city wells are on land owned by others. Area ground water generally moves from northwest to east/ southeast for many miles. How do we keep an eye on potential contamination sources like underground fuel tanks, old abandoned wells, old fuel or fertilizer spills from that past, farm fertilizer and chemical usage, nitrates from feedlots? Fortunately the area where our wells are is primarily ag land with deep clay soils and low odds of these problems.

However, we are preparing a plan to pay attention as follows:

1) Delineate a Wellhead Protection Area that has a travel time for problems of 100 years or

The legislature giveth and taketh away

It goes without saying that the Legislature giveth and the Legislature can taketh away.

It's being said here, anyway, because a classic example of the taking away part was recently suggested in a hearing before the Judiciary Committee. Some lawmakers want to repeal the policy allowing qualified children of illegal immigrants to attend the University of Nebraska system at in-state tuition rates.

The University says 28 students have taken advantage of the law. It applies only to youngsters who have graduated from a Nebraska high school.

Sen. DiAnna Schimek of Lincoln convinced her colleagues to enact the law two years ago by overriding Gov. Dave Heineman's veto.

She was confronted in the Judiciary Committee last week with a bill aimed at two things: Making certain all state agencies uniformly comply with federal law which denies some state benefits to illegal aliens; and repealing the instate tuition provision for those qualified children of illegal immigrants.

The public hearing drew a crowd that overwhelmingly favored the measure. Schimek drew boos, cat calls and one shout of "Go some place else!" when she criticized the proposed repeal of the in-state tuition policy.

In contrast, Heineman drew applause when he entered the hearing room to support and defend provisions intended to make sure the state is checking with a federal registry to be sure federal policy is followed in denying illegals such services as retirement,



Several members of the Judiciary Committee expressed doubts about the need for the bill, indicating they might block its advancement.

Individual senators have all manner of procedural tools to attempt to circumvent a committee that won't advance, or kills, a bill they want.

Some involve convincing the full Legislature to ignore the committee and bring a bill to the floor. Another involves trying to use the provisions of the controversial bill as an amendment, and attach it to other measures already before the full Legislature.

Lawmakers have come and gone since the in-state tuition bill was passed in 2005. In such situations, the question is whether such a measure would still have enough support to survive if it faced another full-fledged debate.



Smoking, State Fair highlight legislative agenda

The Governor has signed the statewide smoking ban legislation, LB 395. Beginning June 1, 2009, it will be unlawful for any person to smoke in a place of employment or public place, which includes all restaurants and bars.


The Governor indicated that he made his decision after careful consideration of the issues regarding local control and business rights versus health concerns and the rights of the public to clean indoor

Last week, I mentioned that LB 606 had been advanced from the Judiciary Committee. It would prohibit state facilities or state money from being used to destroy human embryos for the purpose of Legislature research. The advanced this bill to the second stage of debate on a 45-0 vote, without much discussion, which is reflective of the true compromise reached in the amended version of the bill. Should the State Fair remain at

its present location? Should it move across Lincoln to the Lancaster Event Center (located at 84th & Havelock) or should it move to Fonner Park in Grand Island? The University of Nebraska wants to expand its Lincoln campus for a research and development park, which they would call the Nebraska Innovation Park. They believe that the best place for the park is the current State Fairgrounds. The University thinks that this public/private partnership would stimulate Nebraska's economy and create numerous new jobs. This initiative is supported by 2015 Vision, a coalition of Lincoln business and civic leaders.

The Legislature's Agriculture Committee held a public hearing this past week on bills that were introduced regarding the State Fair. Over this past interim, a consultant was hired to estimate costs to develop a new site for the State Fair versus upgrading the current fairgrounds. The consultant determined that building an ideal State Fair from scratch would cost \$175 million. Whereas, upgrading the current fairgrounds to a comparable standard would cost closer to \$31 million.

At the public hearing, Lincoln leaders testified in support of moving the State Fair. Their cost estimates predict that it would cost \$62.2 million to renovate the Lancaster Event Center. These costs include \$20 million for a race track and grandstand and \$8.5 mil-







Private pesticide applicator training scheduled

Private pesticide applicators whose licenses expire in 2008 and those seeking first-time certification can find information on pesticide safety education programs at their local University of Nebraska

Licensing as a private applicator allows farmers to purchase and use pesticide classified for restricted use by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency in their own farming operations.

Extension provides the educational program, while the agriculture department is responsible for licensing. The training fee is \$30. An applicator may also certify by self-study for a \$60 training fee.

In 2001 the Nebraska Legislature created a state pesticide license fee of \$25 for private applicators. The fee covers a threeyear license period.

This years training program includes information on the emerging new disease, soybean rust, which is a great concern for Nebraska producers. Soybean aphids and their identification and management will also be covered. Other topics include drift reduction nozzles, pesticide residue in tractor cabs, protective pesticide clothing and equipment, corn soil insect management, and special emphasis on pesticide laws and regulations and pesticide storage securi-





Bruning calls on Congress to restore funding for enforcement efforts

Attorney General Jon Bruning, along with 55 Attorneys General from all jurisdictions of the United States, issued a letter calling on Congressional leaders to restore funding to the Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant Program.

Byrne funds are currently the only source of funding available to local and state law enforcement for multi-jurisdictional drug enforcement, including meth initiatives,

collaboration, gang prevention, and prisoner re-entry programs.

"Byrne funds are critical in our fight against drugs and violent crimes," said Bruning. If funding isn't restored, we'll see more criminals on our streets, more drugs in our neighborhoods and innocent people paying the price."

In fiscal year 2007, the Byrne program was funded at \$520 million. For 2008, the Senate had originally funded the Byrne proand are a crucial source of funding gram at \$660 million and the

respective appropriations bills. However, in the omnibus 2008 appropriations bill signed into law in December of 2007, Byrne program funding was cut to \$170 million for the coming year - a 67 percent decrease from 2007 funding levels. Nebraska received just over \$3 million in Byrne funding in
