

Ashton Becker is too young to understand most of what has been happening in his life in the past two months.

However, the three-year old son of Jenny Becker of Wayne "has been a fighter" through several chemotherapy treatments and surgery to remove a cancerous tumor and one of his kidneys.

Jenny said her son complained of a stomach ache on Feb. 9 and she notice that there was a bulge on his side. A trip to the emergency room at Providence Medical Center and an x-ray indicated a large mass in his stomach and a need to visit Children's Hospital in Omaha for further

"After several days the doctors determined that Ashton had Stage 4 Wilms' Tumor, which is a fairly common childhood cancer." Jenny said. The cancer was located in left kidney and there were several spots on his lung.

Jenny said that while the doctors do not know what causes the cancer, it is possible that is was a mutated gene that Ashton was born with. It is also a fast growing tumor.

Ashton began treatment at that point, traveling to Omaha once a week for chemotherapy. He was hospitalized for 10 days. The treatment involved alternating between three chemotherapy drugs. One of the drugs made him ill, but tests indicated that the tumor had shrunk to one-third its

Ashton has not been able to attend regular day care since beginning his treatment. His mother, who is employed as a criminal justice liaison with Bright Horizons in Norfolk, has been able to work from home in recent weeks. She noted that Bright Horizons has "been very supportive."







# Fireworks, lighting debated

The city's contribution to the annual fireworks display, the lighting at the Summer Sports Complex and the city's responsibility in a code enforcement issue were among the items debated at Tuesday's meeting of the Wayne City Council.

Brian Gibson, representing the Wayne Jaycees, was present at the meeting to request the city increase its contribution to the fireworks display to be held in conjunction with Henoween. He told the council that the show costs the Jaycees in excess of \$6,000 and plans are to increase the display in 2009 for the city's 125th anniversary celebra-

tion. After considerable debate, including where the additional funds would come from and the fact that the display is not held on July 4, the council voted to increase the contribution to \$1,500 for this year's event.

Garry Poutre presented several options for lighting for the softball fields at the Summer Sports Complex. He noted that a bid from Ardent Lighting of Knoxville, Iowa was for \$73,209 for one field and \$53,080 for a second field.

Council members discussed ways to fund the lighting of two fields and the benefits of having a total of three fields lighted for tournaments and over events.

After debating the item, the council voted 6-2 to fund the light-

ing of one additional field. A claim from Jason Karsky was denied on a code enforcement

At issue was whether the city was liable for additional expenses incurred by Karsky when footings on his building project had to be re-located after they were placed

too close to an alley. Debate centered on the fact that City Planner George Ellyson had approved the actual footings, but not the location of these footings when he signed off on a building permit. City officials said it was the responsibility of the contractor, not the city, to determine boundary

Kent Franzen spoke to the coun-

cil on two agenda items.

He told council members that the bids for the Opportunity Building ance carrier, Employers Mutual had come in "very favorably" and that a bid has been awarded to Medallion Construction of Norfolk at a cost of approximately \$15 per square foot. Ground will be broken in the near future as the project moves forward.

Franzen also presented a report from the LB840 Committee. He said the group has looked at a number of options in regard to a one cent sales tax and committee members continue to debate the best course of action before bringing the issue to the voters.

The council also approved the Wayne Volunteer Fire Department's request to submit a grant application to FEMA for replacement of bunker gear and cleansing and disinfecting washing machine for the department. The local match for these items would be \$3,000 and could be shared by both the city and the rural fire board.

Cap Peterson, representing Northeast Nebraska Insurance,

presented two checks to the city as dividends from the city's insur-Company. The Wayne Rural Fire Board received a check for \$766.73 and the city received a check for \$25,208.98. The money is part of the Municipality Safety Dividend Program and represents the 10th time in the last 14 years a check has been presented to the city.

Other agenda items included discussion on establishing a city energy policy and an incentive program and energy incentive agreement with Wayne Community Housing Development Corporation.

A report was also presented on cost estimates for a pumping station for the western area of Wayne. Additional discussion and decisions will be take place at future meet-

Two mayoral appointments were approved during the meeting. They include Jean Lutt to the Housing Authority and Lee Brogie to the Planning Commission.

The council will next meet in regular session on Tuesday, April 15 at 5:30 p.m.





# 'Cats drop in baseball polls after recent blunders

The #28 Wayne State College baseball team dropped 10 spots in the recent NCAA Division II poll

after going 2-2 over the weekend. Wayne State swept Upper Iowa in a doubleheader on Sunday in Wayne, but not before the Peacocks dealt WSC two losses on Saturday.

The Wildcats are currently 16-6 on the season and 2-2 in the NSIC. "Right now our record states that we are off to a good season," WSC

left fielder Joe Wendte said. "In our eyes we can play much better then we have been. Lately, we have been playing just good enough to win games that we could

be winning by six or seven runs." Game one of Sunday's doubleheader saw both teams held scoreless until the bottom of the third inning when Marc Manganaro connected on a RBI single to give the 'Cats a 1-0 lead.

After Manganaro's initial spark to ignite the Wildcats, WSC added two runs in the fourth inning on RBI's by Matt Dunn and Justin

The Peacocks responded back with one run in the top of the fifth inning, however, WSC fired back with four runs that were highlighted by a Seth Chadick three-run double to put WSC ahead 7-1.

Upper Iowa closed out the game scoring a lone run in the sixth inning, but it wasn't enough as the Wildcats recorded the 7-2 win.

WSC pitcher Mitch Herrick (3-1) earned the win for WSC, as he gave up two runs on five hits with two walks and five strikeouts.

"Our pitching has been outstanding all year with starters as well as the bullpen," Wendte said.

In the second game on Sunday, the Wildcats used solid pitching to hold off the Peacocks 2-0.

WSC took the lead in the third inning on a RBI single by Hemauer, while adding a single run in the fifth inning on a Jereme Johnson pinch hit RBI single that scored Chadick and gave the Wildcats the eventual 2-0 win.

Eric Dye (2-0) worked the first six innings for WSC and gave up no runs on four hits with one walk and four strikeouts.

Chad Moreland worked the seventh inning and recorded his first save of the season giving up no runs on no hits with one walk.

Before the Wildcats swept Northern Iowa Sunday, the Peacocks defeated WSC 4-2 in game one, and then trounced the 'Cats 12-8 in game two.

WSC scored its only runs of the game in the first inning off an Alex Koch RBI single that scored Hemauer.

Josh Yost followed suit, as he added another RBI single that scored Marc Manganaro and made it a 2-1 contest.

Upper Iowa then went on to tie the game in the third inning after Seth Fox scored on a Manganaro

The sixth inning saw the Peacocks use a pair of walks and a bunt single by Fox to load the bases with one out.

With the bases loaded, the Peacock's used a Kreston Albright single up the middle to score two runs and claim the 4-2 win.

WSC finished the game with eight hits compared to five for Upper Iowa

Koch, Chadick and Treye Hacker recorded two hits apiece and led WSC in hits.

'Cats pitcher Nick Schumacher dropped to 4-1 on the season, after he gave up four runs on five hits with five walks and five strikeouts.

Saturday's final game for WSC ended in a bitter affair as the Peacocks outlasted the 'Cats 12-8. "Coach Maganaro continues to tell us that we need to stay focused and play one game at a time," Wendte

WSC held a 5-4 lead after two innings; however, Upper Iowa retaliated in the fourth inning with four runs to jump ahead 8-5.

## Wildcat softball goes 4-1 over weekend at UNO Tournament

The Wayne State College softball team advanced to 14-12 on the season after going 4-1 this past weekend in the UNO Tournament at Omaha.

WSC recorded two wins and a loss on Sunday after finishing Saturday 2-0.

"We had a good tournament this weekend going 4-1," WSC head coach Krista Unger said. "We played solid defense for the most part and our pitchers did a great job of keeping us in each game."

WSC opened Sunday morning with a deafening 8-0 win over the University of South Dakota.

The Wildcats used a four-run first inning to take a 4-0 lead with run-scoring singles by Valerie Robinson and Katie Goetzinger.

In the fourth inning the 'Cats scored three runs on an Amy Sandstrom RBI double and a tworun single by Jennifer Radley.

WSC closed out Saturday's opener with an RBI single in the fifth inning by Samantha Earleywine to chalk up the 8-0 win.

"Defeating USD was a big win for us," WSC second baseman Blaire Kuhl said. "We played good defense and had quite a few hits."

Earleywine led WSC in hits, going 3 for 4 with two runs scored. Novotny was 2 for 2 with a pair of doubles and two runs scored, while Radley was 2 for 2 with two RBI's.

Goetzinger tossed a two-hit shutout with four strikouts and no walks to earn the win for the

Kiley Peterson pitched the loss and allowed just one earned run (six total runs) on eight hits with one strikeout and five walks.

WSC finished Sunday with a hard fought 3-1 win over Augustana College.

The Wildcats scored three runs on three hits in the first inning to claim the early lead.

Dear Editor,

At the first hint of spring, the annual flight to the north for geese

And so begins the annual trip to the south for high school state basketball tournament fans.

Towns are deserted, maps are downloaded to find Lincoln gyms, coolers are packed, hotels are terrorized, and pocket books are emptied. And when the dust settles, we all return home to begin another season and take our place in the stands . . .

I've been sitting in bleachers around the Wayne community for a while now. Just like you I listened to the comments about "this team" and "this herd of senior boys". Expectations were high and speculation was great as to the possibility of a trip south for this young group of student athletes.

These boys have grown up together; attended school and church together, sat in hospital rooms with each other, rallied against bullies for each other, worked on science fair projects together, stood by each other through a death of a teammate's dad, bickered over girl friends, and grew together as a team of boys to a team of accomplished young men.

a flock of geese knows each other. Most importantly, each has memorized the other's strengths and weaknesses on the basketball floor. They know each other's thoughts ...

They know each other ... just as

Roles have evolved over the seasons, individual abilities have changed along the way and physical strength has matured. One thing has remained the same: this team shared a common direction and a sense of unity, knowing that to obtain their goals they needed to rely on each other and depend on one another's thrust. Just like the flying "V" formation, as each bird flaps its wings, it creates an uplift for the bird immediately following.

Valuable lessons have been learned over the seasons for these young men. And these lessons were no more evident than throughout the 07-08 season. Capitol View Discriminatory use of death penalty? to go south more then these young men. It wasn't meant to be. This experience has changed them. It might not be evident to them now,

The Legislature's recent debate on repeal of the death penalty included a reference to what some regard as among the strangest of decisions by the Nebraska Supreme Court.

Lawmakers refused to advance a measure that would erase the death penalty from Nebraska statutes, rejecting the latest effort by Sen. Ernie Chambers of Omaha in his 38-year battle against capital punishment.

Critics of the death penalty regularly argue that it is applied in a discriminatory way. Wealth, status and race - of the victims and/or killers - are seen as factors that can weigh heavily, and unfairly, when authorities decide whether to seek the death penalty.

Chambers noted examples of what is called "prosecutorial discretion," the authority of prosecutors to decide what charge to bring and what penalty to seek.

Two people who commit the exact same crime, but in different counties, could face entirely different legal scenarios. One might be able to "cop a plea" to a lesser offense. The prosecutors could have entirely different views of when or whether a death sentence is appropriate. One of the defendants could find himself eligible for parole down the road. The other could find himself on death row, watching "American Justice."

In the 1980s, Chambers succeeded in enacting a law intended to require the high court to review comparable cases to determine whether prosecutors and judges were consistent in bringing charges and imposing sentences.

In other words, to see to it that a fellow in eastern Nebraska isn't sentenced to die when, in virtually the same circumstances, a guy in the western part of the state got a

life sentence, or wasn't even exposed to the risk of a death penalty.

The phrase "no-brainer" might have been coined to describe what the obvious outcome would have been if the high court had followed the law's clear and unambiguous intent. It would have all but eliminated the death penalty, since differences or discrepancies (take your philosophical pick) in the handling of capital cases varies from prosecutor to prosecutor, and from judge to judge.

However, the high court came up with an extraordinary or peculiar (again, choose a preference) interpretation of the law.

A Supreme Court majority inter-

preted the law to mean that it should compare each case in which a death sentence had been issued with other cases in which a death sentence had been issued. It thus ignored the clear intent of the law: to require the high court to compare similar cases in which some person or persons did receive a

death sentence, and others did not. Then-Chief Justice Norman Krivosha dissented from the dizzying majority decision.

As Chambers recalled in last week's debate, Krivosha said the high court majority had effectively concluded that it should only compare discrimination to discrimina-


If the question is whether people

are discriminated against because they are forced to ride at the back of the bus, Krivosha said, the courts cannot reach a legitimate decision by comparing them only to other people who are forced to ride at the back of the bus.

It should be noted that Krivosha was not a judicial opponent of the death penalty. He voted to sustain death sentences in several cases, and wrote the majority opinion in at least one.

Some court watchers, including this one, have for decades been puzzled as to why the high court didn't just throw out the "comparison" law. It's interpretation of the statute was somewhere between comical and silly.

It still is.



# Legislature has productive week

Senators debated the controversial issue of whether to repeal the death penalty. Senator Ernie Chambers has attempted repeatedly throughout his career as a state senator to accomplish this goal. The vote on advancement was 20-28, falling five votes short of the number required for advancement. Last year, similar legislation received 24 votes, only one vote shy of advancement. I voted against the bill, as I feel that the death penalty is a necessary tool for the most heinous of crimes.


The Legislature gave first round approval to LB 846, which alters the method used for taxing fuel. It would impose a 5 percent tax on the wholesale price of gasoline. To offset this new tax, the fixed portion of the fuel tax would decrease from 10.5 cents per gallon to 2.5 cents per gallon. The benefit of this change would allow the fuel tax to increase with inflation. I predict more debate on this issue during the second stage of debate, as sena-

Senators also gave first round approval to LB 895, which estab-



lishes a new tier in the Nebraska Advantage Act. The intent of the legislation is to provide incentives for the creation of high paying jobs, in an attempt to keep our young adults in Nebraska, instead of seeking higher paying positions in other states.

Second round approval was given to LB 988, which revamps the state aid formula for K-12 school districts. An amendment reducing projected state aid for

lion was adopted. Even with the amendment, state aid will still increase by 9.2 percent over the amount distributed to schools this

The budget bills were given final approval. The Governor now has five days to decide whether to sign the bills or use his authority to line-item veto specific items from the budget.

Earlier this month, the United States Department of Justice issued a report on its investigation of the Beatrice State Developmental Center. The report identified numerous conditions and practices at the center that violated the constitutional and federal statutory rights of the facility's residents. The center faces the potential loss of \$28.6 million in federal funding for failing to meet care standards and a possible lawsuit by the Justice Department alleging violations of residents' civil rights.

In response to the Justice Department's report, LR 283 was introduced to create the Developmental Disabilities Special Investigative Committee of the Legislature. This past week, after a public hearing, the Executive Board of the Legislature, of which I am the chairperson, unanimously advanced LR 283 to the full Legislature for discussion.

The resolution authorizes the special committee to study the quality of care and related staffing

Developmental Center, the placement and quality of care statewide for the developmentally disabled in Nebraska, and the Department of Health and Human Services with respect to facilities for the developmentally disabled, including how and why services were allowed to decline to the level outlined in the Justice Department Report.

Many of the problems found at BSDC stem from the shortage of staff. Thus, current employees are forced to work many hours of overtime. In response to this situation, the Legislature adopted an amendment to the budget bill that sets aside \$1.5 million in federal funds for the specific purpose of recruiting and retaining staff at BSDC. The Department of Health and Human Services is trying to downsize the population at BSDC, providing eligible residents with appropriate community services. Federal law requires individuals to be served in the least restrictive environment. Another amendment was adopted to allow money appropriated to BSDC to follow clients as they transition to communitybased services.



Recently, Pat Gerdes, Phelps County Emergency Management Director, was in Wayne at the Wayne Fire Hall to do a presentation on the January 2007 ice storms which impacted portions of several counties in Nebraska Gosper, Hitchcock, (Phelps, Frontier).

Gerdes has been an emergency management director for six years and in that time, he has put in nine federal declarations for disasters. The presentation was sponsored by the Wayne County Emergency Phelps county residents but could-

The first ice storm in that time ing is picking up. Our view of the period was from Dec. 19-21, 2006 in. Gerdes noted it took completing and started around 3 a.m. As a result, power was knocked out in the area. Highways became impassable, utility poles snapped off at the ground (because of moisture that builds up at that level); lines and trees were down everywhere. Generators were brought in volunteer firemen/EMS worked hard taking care of the generators and transporting elderly to

shelters that the Red Cross set up. The second storm hit on Dec. 29, 2006 into Jan. 1, 2007 so there were problems on top of problems. All highways in Phelps county closed. By that time, there were 109 wood utility lines down by Holdrege. Wires were everywhere, even across the railroad tracks and at one point, a moving train caught some wires and snapped poles two miles in each direction before it came to a stop. Gerdes said in the end, the Hazard Mitigation fund paid for two and a half miles of the snapped off poles which were replaced by steel poles.

By the time the second storm hit, there were 11,612 NPPD customers without power and around 10,000 of them were in Phelps county.

Public safety was an issue, as well as adequate food and water. Also, residents were purchasing personal generators and many were installing them incorrectly. He added that if the generator isn't large enough to accommodate a residence, people should not turn on electronic devices as the current isn't strong enough and the fluctuation can burn out the device. "One guy ruined three televisions and a computer in his home before he figured that out," Gerdes said. He added that FEMA reimburses public entities (with proper documentation); not private owners.

Other problems included a lack of communication as cell phones didn't work, power was down so computers couldn't be used, radio communications failed, public radio didn't work and there was little service from the land line phone



By the time all of the broken trees and wood utility poles in Holdrege were cleaned up, there was enough debris to cover a football field 10 feet high.

Gerdes stressed that when there's a disaster, everything must be accounted for if reimbursement from FEMA is expected.

The packaging for one energy drink, called Rockstar, is similar to the alcoholic version, called Rockstar 21. A mother had mistakenly bought the drink for her preteen child.

To be safe for playgrounds and landscapes, products made from shredded tires can't contain exposed wire or entrapped steel bits. CIRAS' Paul Gormley brought in Iowa State's Institute for Physical Research and Technology (IPRT) to review the company's process. IPRT helped the company improve metal detection and sorting capabilities to remove the wire and steel.

As a result, the company's black shredded tire material "had all the positive characteristics it needed to be sold, except it didn't look like the products it was supposed to replace," said Tire Environmental's general manager Dennis Froehlich.


Once again, enter Gormley. "I knew of two Iowa companies that work in the colored wood mulch industry — Becker-Underwood and Marion Mixers — that could help Tire Environmental make their ideas real. So I set up some phone calls, and they took it from there. Sometimes it's just about putting the right people together."


In 2007 Tire Environmental implemented the new coloring technology and sold 50 tons of the colored, shredded tire material and 200 tons of black ground cover. Froehlich said. "We have had nothing but good comments from our dealers and customers; sales are increasing as more and more people are exposed to our mulch."
