


Town hall meeting on sales tax planned

Tuesday, May 20 at the Wayne city auditorium at 7:30 p.m. to discuss continuing the one cent sales tax in Wayne. The bond payoff for the community activity center will be done in the fall of 2009. The amount generated from the sales tax has been around \$40,000 a month.

The purpose of the town hall meeting is to explain the continuing of the sales tax, what it can accomplish for the town and residents and to answer any questions the public may have. Also discussed will be the recent sales tax survey, LB840 and LB904 and more. With approval, the issue of continuing the sales tax will be on the November ballot.


A sales tax survey was taken recently with over 200 responses. Eighty-three percent of the responses were positive.

A committee was put together to explore the possibilities of continuing the tax and

A town hall meeting is planned for what could be accomplished by doing so. The group is looking at the tax to continue for 15 years, subject to public and council approval. The committee has been studying LB840 and LB904 (mandated state law) for correct implementation of the funds. For example, by letting the one cent sales tax continue, \$480,000 should be raised and of that, LB904 directs that \$65,000, which was generated from vehicle registrations, etc., must go to street improvement.

Some of the needs the sales tax could go to include specific projects, economic development to help the town grow and in turn offer more job opportunities and to provide downpayment funds so bonds don't have to be put into place, ultimately helping relieve property taxes.

Marguerite Ellen Morris Cortez of Sioux City, Iowa graduated with an Early Childhood Education Unified degree from Wayne State College on May 3. Cortez and her family will celebrate her degree and her birthday with a family gathering on Mother's Day, May 11.

"I feel like I've already had my Mother's Day gift," said Sheila Morris, Cortez's mother after commencement activities. She and her husband had moved in with her daughter to help with her children while she was a student at WSC.

"I had three different jobs while I raised my children. I had seven children. I quit as a junior to raise my children. I went back to school and became a site coordinator. Part of my job was to help students become interested in attending college. My own daughter wasn't as interested at first. She took a few classes. She took some encouraging and convincing, but then she just took off," Morris said.

Morris said Marguerite and her brother Tony raised the younger five in the family when she had cancer twice. This was her chance to give back by helping raise Cortez's children while she took classes and completed her student teaching experi-

"They didn't have a childhood. I didn't want that to happen here," Morris said. "I saw how excited my daughter was when she would come back from working at the daycare. I said you have to go on with this. You were meant to work with children."

Cortez said her children felt better about her leaving for class when they knew that their grandmother would be watching them. She also said she made an extra effort to attend the children's school events while I was in Greece. I called home every

library together for projects. "My professors were wonderful about up," Cortez said. working with me to help me also have time for the kids as well as studying," Cortez of his wife. said. "I worked hard at my school work and got good grades to show my children that they need to work hard to do well in school. I plan to return to school as a graduate student. I am considering coming back to college through a learning community. I would rather spend a weekend away from my children than evenings away from them. I think one weekend a month is something I can do."

"She is very determined," said Professor Marilyn Mudge of the School of Education and Counseling at Wayne State College. "She is so caring about her family and talented as a teacher. When she works with students, her eyes light up. She is a great role model for other students or individuals thinking about going to college."

A Native American mother of three children and 1996 Sioux City West High School graduate, Cortez entered Wayne State College after completing work at Little Priest Tribal College.

Cortez is the daughter of Anthony and Sheila Morris of Sioux City. She grew up in Sioux City and continues to live there with her husband, Rafael. Their three children are Rafael Curtis, Derrik and Kylah. She plans to continue to work in the Winnebago and Macy area. While a WSC student, Cortez participated in Alpha Sigma Lambda and recently traveled to Greece with other WSC students and faculty members. Cortez presented information for Greek students on her life as Native American through translators in Greece.



Al Bahe, 78, of Fremont died Saturday, May 3, 2008 at Parsons House

Services were held Tuesday, May 6 at Salem Lutheran Church in Fremont. The Rev. Michael Thomas officiated.

Al Bahe was born Oct. 21, 1929 in Ohiowa and raised in Wayne. He graduated from Wayne High School in 1946 and Wayne State College in 1950. He married Patti Love on July 4, 1947 in Omaha. He taught and coached at West Point for two years before moving to Central City. In 1957 he moved to Fremont where he coached basketball until 1976 and then served as athletic director until 1989 when he retired. While at Fremont he was also the assistant football coach, golf coach and was the American Legion baseball coach. WSC professor receives State **Teaching Excellence Award** Wayne State College faculty mem-

Dr. Todd Young, associate professor of physics and astronomy at Wayne State College, has been named as the recipient of the Rebensdorf Teaching Excellence Award from the Nebraska State College System. Dr. Young excels in the classroom, his profession and in the community.

The Rebensdorf Teaching Excellence Award is presented annually to a faculty member who demonstrates innovation and leadership in teaching and service in the Nebraska State College system, which includes Chadron, Peru, and Wayne State Colleges. Administrators, fellow faculty, students, and alumni nominate candidates.

In the supporting materials for his nomination for the award, it was noted that Young "constantly stresses the importance of physics as a tool for learning about the world around us" and continuously explores and investigates methods to better educate his students. He has applied this philosophy outside of WSC by helping secure two grants aimed at improving the content knowledge and teaching styles of practicing secondary teachers.

In a letter of support for his nomination, a fellow WSC faculty member wrote that Young receives great reviews from his students regarding the rigor of his classes and his commitment to their success. Other faculty members within Young's department noted that he serves as inspiration for students by challenging them to perform well in physics, which translates to favorable scores on professional school and graduate school entrance exams.

Young is the 24th recipient of the Teaching Excellence Award. He was first selected as Wayne State College's Teaching Excellence Award winner, which qualified him as a candidate for the system award. The NSCS Board of Trustees met in March and after careful deliberation, selected Young as the 2008 recipient. Several

bers have won this statewide award over the years, including Clif Ginn, Cornell Runestad, Russ Rasmussen, Ken Halsey, Pearl Hansen, Deborah Whitt, Jean Karlen, Mary Ettel, Jason Karsky and Tami Worner.

The award includes a \$3,000 stipend funded through an endowment at U.S. Bank. The endowment is given in memory of George Rebensdorf, a former member of the Board of Trustees.

The Wayne State College nominee for the Rebensdorf Teaching Excellence Award also receives the State National Bank Teaching Excellence Award in the amount of \$1,000. Dr. Terri Monk, a professor in the Department of Anesthesiology at Duke University Medical Center in Durham, N.C., was presented with this year's Alumni Achievement Award at Wayne State College's spring graduation on May 3. Dr. Monk delivered the commencement address at the baccalaureate

She earned her bachelor of science degree at Wayne State College in 1973, received her M.D. degree from the University of Nebraska and completed a residency in anesthesiology at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston, Texas. Prior to her move to Duke, she was a faculty member in the Department of Anesthesiology at Washington University in St. Louis, Mo., and at the University of Florida in Gainesville, Fla.

Dr. Monk received a National Institutes of Health Clinical Research Curriculum Award that enabled her to obtain a master's degree in clinical investigation at the University of Florida. She has also been awarded a career development award by the National Institute on Aging. This award supported her clinical research program evaluating the mechanisms responsible for postoperative cognitive dysfunction following major surgery. Her other major research

interests involve blood conservation strategies, geriatric anesthesia, and long-term outcomes following anesthesia and surgery.

Dr. Monk is a founding member and past president of the Society for the Advancement of Geriatric Anesthesia and serves as a representative to the American Geriatric Society's Section of Surgical and Related Medical Specialties. She had the honor of delivering the Rovenstine Lecture at the American Society of Anesthesiologists conference in October 2003. The







Wildcat Softball has five players named to All-NSIC Softball Team

The Wayne State College softball team recently had five players selected for the 2008 Northern Sun Conference All-Conference Softball Team, which was announced last Friday night at the 2008 NSIC Tournament Banquet in Marshall, Minn.

First baseman Jennifer Radley was selected as the NSIC Rookie of the Year by league coaches and was one of four Wildcats named to the All-NSIC First Team.

Joining Radley, was junior Amy Sandstrom, freshmen Samantha Earleywine and Katie Goetzinger, while freshman second baseman Blair Kuhl received All-NSIC honorable mention honors.

Radley, a freshman from Des Moines, Iowa (East High School), set a new single season record with 11 homers this season while posting a .373 average. She also led the team in total bases (95), RBI's (39), home runs (11), slugging percentage (.633) and walks

Additionally, she was the first Wildcat softball player to receive a post-season award since WSC joined the NSIC in 1999.

Sandstrom, a outfielder from Millard North High School, led WSC in batting this season by hitting a .375 with four homers and 22 RBI's. She led the Wildcats in hits (63), runs scored (41), at bats (168) and stolen bases (7).

This season in the NSIC, Sandstrom finished second in hits, runs scored, total bases and doubles (14).

Earleywine, a catcher from Sergeant Bluff, Iowa (Sgt. Bluff-Luton High School), held a .361 batting average with one home run and 14 RBI's. Her 60 hits ranked third in the NSIC as she struck out six times in 166 at bats

Furthermore, Earleywine caught all 50 games for WSC and did not commit a single error behind the plate.

Goetzinger, a pitcher from Harlan, Iowa (Harlan High School), was 22-12 this season with an ERA of 2.43. Her 22 wins set a new single season school record, which topped the previous mark of 20 that was set by Roni Johnson Wobken in 1990.

Goetzinger recorded 132 strikeouts in 218.2 innings worked this season, and had five shutouts and 17 complete games.

Kuhl, a secondbaseman from Logan, Iowa (Logan-Magnolia High School), posted a .314 average this season with nine homers and 38 RBI's to rank second for WSC in both categories.

The secondbaseman, also started and played in all 50 games at second base for WSC and led the team in sacrificed hits with 15.

She also ranked third in the NSIC in RBI's (36) and was fifth in total bases with 85.

WSC finished the regular season with a 29-21 overall record, while going 12-6 in league play.



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

for \$1 a year."


Even with the low cost of rent for the fields, there are still several problems that continue to plague the Lightning, the largest being funding.

The open houses are set for Tuesday and Thursday, May 27 and 29, from 7-9 p.m. at Northeast Community College. The homes will be auctioned Saturday, June 7, at 10 a.m. at the college.

The first home, a 1,500-squarefoot, two-bedroom home with double-attached garage, also has twobaths, formal dining room, mainfloor laundry room, and vaulted ceilings. This home also has Andersen Windows LoE insulated glass with argon gas.

The second home is a 1,550square-foot, two-bedroom, two-

and coffered ceilings. It has Integrity by Marvin Windows LoE insulated glass with argon gas.

According to Lyle Kathol, dean of applied technology at Northeast, both homes have Ferché oak millwork stained to match the built-in. custom cabinetry, laminate flooring, and satin, nickel finish Seagull lighting fixtures. The homes also feature fiber cement siding, 30year, laminate shingles, and Therma-Tru insulated, exterior doors with leaded glass sidelights.

Both homes also have R-21 sidewall and R-44 attic cellulose insulation. There are also central vacs and other built-ins in these custom homes designed and constructed by Northeast building construction students. Electrical work on both homes was done by Northeast elecbath home with formal dining room trical construction and control stu-

Both homes include all water, vent and waste lines extended to floor joist level for ease of hook-up and 2 x 6-inch exterior stud walls. According to Kathol, these homes meet or exceed local and state building codes. All electrical conveniences were installed in accordance with the national electric and FHA code. Circuits are tested and connected to a 200-amp breaker panel.

Buyers must pay 20 per cent down the day of the sale and the balance when the home is moved at buyer's expense within 75 days. A sales tax of 7 percent will be collected at final closing.

communicable diseases

There are many germs that cause problems but one in particular is causing a lot of concern and that is MRSA MRSA stands Methicillin Resistant Staphylococcus (Staph) Aureus. 'Staph' is a germ that is commonly found on the skin and in the nose and can cause skin infections.

Northeast Nebraska Public Health Department (NNPHD) recently partnered with Providence Medical Center and Wayne Public Schools to offer and provide education on this disease to the school systems throughout the Health District (Cedar, Dixon, Thurston and Wayne Counties).

Several schools participated in the event but for those that could not, NNPHD provided resource materials to them so they can be prepared for preventing this disease from infiltrating their facility. NNPHD also provided the resource materials to barbers, hair dressers, cosmetologists and massage therapists throughout the district so they would have the latest up-todate information on the disease and how to prevent its spread.

MRSA is a form of the Staph germ that penicillin and some other antibiotics won't kill. In addition to infecting the skin, MRSA can spread to other parts of the body including the blood, joints and other vital organs.

What does MRSA look like? It could look like: *Spider bite, Turf Burn, *Abscess, *Boil, Impetigo, or * Infected skin or wound.

How does MRSA spread? *MRSA spreads by contact with someone's skin that has it. *Touching surfaces that have MRSA on them (workout equipment, doorknobs, etc.). *Sharing personal items (bar soap, towels, razors, clothes, sheets, etc.) *Not having the ability to keep

Misusing antibiotics causes germs to become stronger instead of killing them. Ways that people antibiotics include: *Stopping them early *Missing doses *Demanding antibiotics for an infection even if your doctor says you don't need them *Saving some for use later *Using someone

else's prescription

How can MRSA be stopped? You can stop the spread of MRSA by practicing good hygiene: *Wash Your Hands, a lot! Use running water and soap. If you don't have access to that use a hand sanitizer that is at least 60 percent alcohol. ·Do NOT share towels or other personal items with others. • Keep the environment clean. Do NOT touch other people's wounds. ·Keep cuts and scrapes clean and covered with a dressing. Keep wounds covered with a clean, dry dressing and taped on all four sides. · Visit your doctor if you suspect a skin infection. You can NOT tell if an infection is caused by MRSA without having a culture done by your medical provider.

Schools, especially the sports departments, have special instructions to follow to keep MRSA out of their facilities. Parents should talk to the coaches, school nurse or school administration to ask what precautions they take to prevent

NNPHD followed-up on over 75 reports of communicable disease in our Health District in 2007. All follow-ups done were for diseases that could cause or were causing an outbreak such as West Nile Virus, food-borne illnesses, respiratory illnesses, and rabies. Follow-ups would not be provided for MRSA but rather this is a disease in which the presence is simply monitored.

"The important things for people to be aware of is that MRSA is present in our environment. What used to infect only an unfortunate few hospitalized patients has now grown in strength and number to find its way out into the community at large. This germ sits silently in peoples' noses, on their skin and also on objects where there is high traffic skin contact (such as sports equipment) and waits for an opportune time to make its ugly presence known," said Julie Rother, Director of Public Health Nursing at NNPHD. "It is estimated that slightly more than 2 million people in the United States harbor the MRSA bacteria (according to the Centers for Disease Control and

Prevention). These people may or may not develop an obvious infection.

People should feel free to talk with their medical provider about this topic or they can call the Northeast Nebraska Public Health Department at 402-375-2200 for more information.



Looking Ahead in Wayne

City Council meeting

The next regular City Council meeting will be held Tuesday, May 20 at 5:30 p.m in the council room. What does "blight and substandard determination" mean?

· Our house on Oak Drive is over 40 years old. It doesn't meet current insulation and ventilation building code standards, the driveway is cracking and it needs new shingles and would likely be determined to be blighted and substandard in a "blight and substandard; study" of the area.

· Almost every home in Nebraska over 40 years old would likely qualify.

· Land in the city limits that is poorly drained or has problems with storm water run-off, is underdeveloped or has unsightly stuff on it would likely qualify as "blighted and substandard

 Most commercial properties down town would likely qualify because they are over 40 years old unless they have been totally renovated

Why do we care about this?

· No building lasts forever;

· Where do we get the money to fix up or tear down old buildings and replace them?

• If a building isn't maintained what will it look like in another 20

Should a community care if buildings aren't maintained? What about down town?

Most Nebraska towns were railroad towns and were built about the same time.

• New state grant assistance and tax credit programs are being made available to property owners to help pay the costs to repair and extend the life of older buildings, fix sidewalks and streets.

To qualify for some of these programs a "blight determination study" (Congress gave it this name) has to be done for the area.

Some communities will take advantage of these new programs and some won't.

Wayne is seeking grant funds to assist building owners down town and is doing the required "blight and substandard determination" study of the down town area.

What Tax is Increment Financing (TIF)?

TIF is a financial incentive to build and renovate property in areas determined to be "blighted

and substandard."

State law allows cities to approve a private TIF loan to a builder to help pay for removal of old buildings and new construction and renovation projects that create "new" real estate property valuation in an area that is "blighted and substandard."

What affect will Nebraska primary have?

The answer is: Don't know, don't care, and it don't matter.

The question is: What do you hear about the May 13 Nebraska presidential primary?

Even a talking, talking, talking head like Wolf Blitzer would have a hard time working up so much as a breathless sentence about it.

The state's Democrats divided their nominating convention delegates in a February caucus. Barack Obama claimed 22. Hillary Clinton received 8. On the GOP side, Sen. John McCain has the nomination virtually in hand.

In the very strangest of all possible worlds, how could the Nebraska balloting be newsworthy?

If Hillary outpolled Barack, it would actually give pundits something to talk about. And, given that this campaign has gone on so long and become soooooo boring to so many, they would analyze it more closely than a Hannah Montana photograph.

McCain doesn't have an opponent for the nomination these days, but Republican voters will see Ron Paul's name on their ballot. Now, if Paul were to run close to McCain, the political world as we know it would come to an end. Wolfman Blitzer would faint, at least.

On a matter with some practical significance, Nebraskans will decide whether to allow public endowments to earn more money.

Amendment 1 would allow public endowment funds to be invested in stocks. Since 1875 the state constitution has limited them to bond investments - a comparatively lowyield market.

What's a public endowment? It's a sum of money held by a city for a specific purpose. Example: Lincoln created a health program fund when it sold a public hospital. There are only a few endowment funds around the state.


In 2006 voters rejected a similar proposal, but most Capitol observers figure it was because a lot of controversial stuff was also on the ballot - expanded gambling and such.

The company a constitutional amendment keeps is important. Nebraska has the nation's only unicameral Legislature. Voters approved the idea the same year they cast a big "yes" vote for parimutuel racing.

The 2009 Legislature will convene with a membership possessing only a comparative modicum of experience. Long-serving lawmakers have been term-limited out of

Much has been written about how a lack of institutional memory and expertise can play into the hands of interest groups and their lobbyists, along with bureaucrats.

Equally as interesting is the fact that many voters believe term limits on state lawmakers can have the opposite impact - that inexperienced legislators, who can only be around for a maximum of eight years at a stretch - might be less subject to influence.

could be fined up to \$10,000 for each violation for each day the violation persists up to a maximum of \$500,000.

"It just doesn't pay nor does it step, even if all you're doing is dig ging in your backyard," said Proksel. "So before you dig, call for a utility line locate. It's free, it's easy and it's the law."

To request a line locate, dial 811 nationwide, (800) 331-5666 statewide in Nebraska, or (402) 344-3565 in metropolitan Omaha.

In Nebraska, Aquila provides natural gas to approximately 197,000 customers, with state headquarters in Lincoln.

Our first session, Aging, Drama & Creativity, not only made us laugh, but made us realize how little we laugh. Picasso had a wonderful insight into successful aging when he said, "As one grows older, life and art become one and the same." More and more research is being done on the impact of Arts on health and wellness, revealing the potential for using creative processes (in drama, music, drawing, painting, dance, writing, etc.) to develop psychological growth, social connection, and problem solving abilities. Another concern which was brought up is becoming familiar with the foundation upon which successful interactions with older people are built. What communication techniques need to be used, what about the generation gap, and do we value life differently?

Number six, "When I'm 67: A Future Self Exercise" - we needed to think beyond the first job and the children. We were asked to visualize our physical, psychological/ spiritual, financial, social and environment as an older person.

Housing is a huge issue. Research states that almost all of us want to stay in our homes until we die. This can be done with a little research about the options in your community, what In-Home Services are available. Are these organizations reputable? We have to be realistic about our shortcomings, stop denying them and have someone add those safety measures to our homes.

The final session was "Aging Network 101." What services are available; what entitlement programs like Social Security, Medicare, and Medicaid are available; and are there respite care resources available for you and the family care giver. There are resources available but unearthing them maybe difficult.

There is so much to do before those golden years sneak up and grab us. We truly need to be proactive. Look at your family history and ask yourself about your future. What do you really want to be like when you grow up?

THE MEMBERS OF THE ONE

HUNDREDTH LEGISLATURE OF NEBRASKA, FIRST SESSION, **RESOLVE THAT:**

Section 1. At a special election on May 13, 2008, the following proposed amendment to the Constitution of Nebraska shall be submitted to the electors of the State of Nebraska for approval or rejection:

To amend Article XI, section 1:

XI-1 No city, county, town, precinct, municipality, or other sub-division subdivision of the state; shall ever become a subscriber to the capital stock, or owner of such stock, or any portion or interest therein of any railroad,
