The National Honor Flight program is spreading its wings.

The first Heartland Honor Flight will take to the skies with WWII veterans from Nebraska and western Iowa. Their destination will be Washington, D.C., where they will personally tour America's "Thank You" for their service, their World War II Memorial

The one-day trip is open to all WWII veterans in Nebraska and western Iowa, departing Omaha Wednesday, May 21.

Veterans are escorted and cared for by guardians (volunteers) who accompany them as they visit the WWII, Iwo Jima, Korean and Vietnam Memorials. All expenses are provided at no cost to the WWII veterans. In fact, donations from WWII veterans will not be accepted.



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

The Wayne Community Schools Board of Education met in regular session on Monday night. Board action included approving with regrets the resignation of Shannon Corkle as Middle School teacher and assistant softball coach. Also approved was the hiring of Anthony Lawrence as Head Wrestling Coach, contingent on his completion of the professional certification from NSAA.

The board did not approve the bid of \$1,598 from Leonard Jones for cement work at the high school and Middle School. The board decided to wait with the projects.

Wayne County voters go to the polls

A total of 1,596 Wayne County voters cast ballots in Tuesday's primary election.

This represents 29.5 percent of the registered voters in the county.

Only a handful contested races were on the ballot, as several races will be determined in the November general election.

In Wayne County, the Republican seat for County Commissioner in District 2 was among the contested races.

Incumbent Robert Nissen received 170 votes and new-comer Donald Liedman received 209 votes.

In the city of Wayne's Fourth Ward, three candidates were on the ballot. Incumbent Don Buryanek received 108 votes; Jon Haase received 107 votes and Jane O'Leary received 56 votes. Buryanek and Haase will move on to the November

ballot. In Nebraska races, the vote for the

Nebraska State Amendment received 756 votes in Wayne County and 721 against votes.

For the 17th Legislative seat in the Nebraska Legislature, in Wayne County Doug Garwood received 880 votes; Jason V. Bowman, 356 votes and Robert Giese, 251 votes

The Wayne County winner for the U.S. Senate seat on the Republican ticket was Mike Johanns, who received 814 votes to Pat Flynn's 253 votes. On the Democratic side, Scott Kleeb received 241 votes; Tony Raimondo received 68 votes; James Bryan Wilson, 46 votes and Larry Marvin, 18 votes

He was preceded in death by his parents; wife, Vera, in 2005, and one brother, Marvin.



Thursday, May 15 is National of duty at the Nebraska Police Police Memorial Day and in recognition of law enforcement officers who have given the ultimate sacrifice the flags at all City of Wayne locations will be flown at half mast.

The United States has more than 900,000 sworn law enforcement officers, and about 12 percent of those are female. In 2005 there were an estimated 5.2 million violent crimes committed in the United States. On average 56,000 law enforcement officers are assaulted every year, resulting in over 16,000 injuries.

Last year, in the United States, 181 law enforcement officers were killed in the line of duty. Memorial services are being held in every state this week to honor these exemplary men and women. Wayne Police Chief Lance Webster will help read the names of Nebraska officers killed in the line

Memorial Day ceremony being held in Grand Island on Thursday.

Webster said he in honored to be able to help memorialize Nebraska law enforcement officers who have been killed in the line of duty, especially two friends, Sgt. Glenn Haas of the Gothenburg Police Department, who was shot and killed by a 17 year old, and Trooper Mark Wagner, who was killed in a training accident.

Webster added that it is important for the community to understand that any of our police officers understand the risk of their jobs and, if called upon, will put their lives at risk to protect any citizen of Wayne. When getting stopped for speeding, or when calling about a barking dog, it is easy to forget that the officer you speak to may someday have to risk their lives to protect you, or someone else.

In states where EAB has been detected, the movement of firewood is regulated by state departments of agriculture and federal agencies. 





Izaak Walton League plans lake restoration project and fundraiser



The Wayne Izaak Walton League Walton League was formed on May 13, 1954 by local citizens who wanted to create a place people could gather and enjoy the outdoors. The chapter location is 4 1/2 miles north and two miles west of Wayne. They used an oxbow of Dog Town Creek and created dikes to form a lake. They removed trees in a damp area where cattle had perished after being stuck in the marsh. They then dredged almost three acres of land and let the natural springs fill the new lake. Later the chapter stocked the water with fish and a lake was formed.

Today the purpose of the Wayne Chapter Izaak Walton is to continue to provide a location for local area residents to enjoy nature including fishing, watching the local wildlife and primitive camping. We also strive to educate people about conservation issues, especially those related to northeast Nebraska.

Positive attitude help with cancer treatment

what have kept Jana Anderson about midnight. going since being diagnosed with Inflammatory Breast Cancer on March 19, 2007.

"Earlier I had noticed that there was soreness on my breasts but was not too concerned. I just thought it was a breast infection," Jana said.

Inflammatory breast cancer is an aggressive, less common form of breast cancer and is often not diagnosed early. It often occurs in younger patients and can be found in both men and women.

She said that a number of events happened "really fast" in the days following the diagnosis.

Dr. Lindau at Wayne Mercy Medical Clinic recommended she see a surgeon.

On March 20 she was referred to Dr. Rao, an oncologist with the June E. Nylen Siouxland Hematology.

On March 23 a port was put in her chest and she started chemotherapy that same day.

Her first series of chemotherapy lasted for approximately 12 weeks and tests revealed that while the tumor had shrunk, a second series of treatments would be necessary. These weekly treatments lasted through the end of July.

The actual treatments took two to three hours, but the entire process took most of the day.

On Aug. 14 Jana had a double mastectomy at Providence Medical Center in Wayne. During surgery, a number of lymph nodes were removed.

"I am very thankful I was able to have my surgery here in Wayne. Dr. Volstedt (the surgeon) and the staff at PMC did an excellent job. I was allowed to stay for three days, which was very beneficial," Jana said.

In September Jana began another round of weekly chemotherapy and received 28 radiation treatments. Both were finished before Christmas.

Following her diagnosis, several of her friends and a number of Justin's basketball teammates part of the team.

This year Jana will be a part of the Amazing Grace team from Grace Lutheran Church. Her family members will also be involved in this year's event.

"One of the treatment plans that I am on was not available just a few years ago. The research and help that is received from Relay For Life and other areas help improve our chances of beating cancer. There has been a remarkable increase in my chances of survival for long term as opposed to not having this treatment available," Jana said.

"Throughout all my treatments, I have been overwhelmed by the unbelievable support my family and I have received from our family and friends. There has always been someone who provided a meal, visited the carepages where I kept a "diary" of what was happening in my treatment and those who left inspirational messages," Jana said.

Anderson said one of the hardest parts of being diagnosed with cancer was telling her family, especially her mother. Jana lost her father to cancer several years ago.

Jana's family include her husband, Mike and children, Justin, a freshman at Wayne High School; Jared, a sixth grader at Wayne Middle School and Shania, a second grader at Wayne Elementary.

She said that she and Mike have tried to keep the children informed of what has been happening in regard to the treatment.

She noted that while she has, for the most part, been able to remain positive through her treatment, she knows each person is an individual and no one in invincible.

"My motto through the cancer treatment has been 'God is Great' and I have tried to keep a positive attitude, but I know there is nothing wrong with asking for help, whether it be from talking to someone or medication," she said. "I have tried to stay as busy as possible. I have been lucky because I was not working outside the home, formed "Jana's Jocks," a Relay For I was able to rest when needed. I Life team. "Nebraskans need to be vigilant to help prevent the introduction of the emerald ash borer into Nebraska," said Nebraska Department of Agriculture Director Greg Ibach. "Simple steps, such as not transporting firewood across state lines, can help prevent the spread of the beetle.

Emerald ash borers have been found in Indiana, Illinois, Maryland, Michigan, Ohio, Pennsylvania, and West Virginia. The beetle has killed more than 30 million ash trees in southeastern Michigan alone. Tens of millions more trees have been lost in Ohio and Indiana.

Emerald ash borer is a small,

Governor Dave Heineman has metallic green beetle that infects damages, and eventually kills, the tree.

> Trees that are infected with emerald ash borers will exhibit canopy dieback, water sprouts, bark splitting, serpentine-like galleries, and D shaped exit holes. Nebraskans are encouraged to examine their ash trees for these symptoms.

Currently the depth of the lake at most locations is only three to four feet in depth. The shallowness of the lake causes excess vegetative growth and winter fish kill.

"We spend \$750 annually on chemicals to try to control excess weed growth. Arrowhead growing along the water's edge (which is very hard to control) hampers people who want to fish; especially children. Also the dry conditions of recent years have left the water table in Nebraska at lower levels than we have seen in many years. In the heat of the summer the water table recedes because the local farmers start irrigating," Brummond.

During the irrigation season, this virtually eliminates any natural spring water flowing into our lake. We have a well that we keep running all summer long to try to keep the water level up, but it's a losing battle. We have had large fish kill in the summer the last three years due to the extreme heat and low water levels. This year we also had a major winter kill of fish, a condition that happened statewide on many Nebraska lakes.

4A Participates in 'pony express' to bring Q125 proclamation to Coleridge and Hartington

Many towns in northeast Nebraska are sharing something in common. Many are getting ready for their Quasi-Centennial celebrations. Coleridge and Hartington will each celebrate this year with Hartington's Q125, May 23-26 and Coleridge's, July 4-6.

Committee members decided to go back in time to around when the Pony Express was in existence to bring a proclamation from Governor Dave Heineman in Lincoln to announce the upcoming Q125 celebrations in Coleridge and Hartington. Last Saturday, 40 horses and 40 riders were positioned from Lincoln to Coleridge to carry the official papers. Among those riders was Ashley Sukup of Wayne.


This is not the first time that Coleridge and Hartington have set into motion the authentic act. Riders brought notice of the centennial to the towns 25 years ago and the plan is to continue the tradition in another 25 years.

"We started at 7 a.m. on Saturday at the state capitol and my step dad, Darin Hoesing of Coleridge and I were the first ones riding traveling two miles through Lincoln," said Ashley Sukup. "Each rider and horse rode one mile at a time and handed off the official papers to the next rider."

Sukup went on to say it took a total of 12 hours to complete the ride to Hartington from Lincoln. The youngest person riding was 12 and the oldest person riding was 80. She noted the reason the 'pony express' started in the first place was because both towns were founded at the same time and are only 15 miles apart.

"It was a blast," Sukup said. "I was sore for a couple of days but I definitely want to do this again in 25 years."

Sukup will be a junior at Wayne High School and works every other weekend at CD Feedlots in

ing as a pen rider for the past two years. She has a lot of experience with horses having been around them since she was 10 years old. She belongs to the Newcastle Saddle Club.

Most of the riders on Saturday were between the ages of 20 to 50 years old and some were fellow pen riders who work with her at CD Feedlots. Each rider rode between five to six miles on the trip from Lincoln and each horse can run between 10-15 miles per hour. Twenty horses were hauled to Lincoln on Friday night to get to be bailed out for \$10," Sukup ready for Saturday.

"It was really cold early Saturday morning," Sukup said. "We didn't wear coveralls through Lincoln but bundled up after that. Each trailer had 4-5 horses in, enough for a 20 mile stretch. Other teams were in North Bend and in Wisner."

Sukup said that after riding out Hartington and Coleridge Q125 of Lincoln, she rode again 10 miles from Lincoln, a mile by North Bend and a mile south of Wayne near tington.ne.us and www.coleridgethe home of her grandparents, Dan

"It took a little practice to pass off the bag of papers because you had to be in sync," Súkup said.

She added that the horses spooked at guardrails and signs and they were told the trip took longer this time than 25 years ago.

Sukup said when they rode into Hartington, there were some interesting things going on. "Every man has to have a beard for the upcoming Q125 or is put into jail and has said. 





Kielsmeier comes to WSC after serving eight years as the head coach at Howard Payne University in Brownwood, Texas, an NCAA Division III school.


He compiled a 179-44 record as head coach and led the Lady Jackets to a 33-0 record and the NCAA Division III National Championship this past season.





To further compliment her season, Radley was named the NSIC and Field Championship.













Attorney General Bruning announces agreement with Facebook to make site safer for underage users

Attorney General Jon Bruning along with Attorneys General from 48 other states and the District of Columbia announced today that Facebook agreed to changes to better protect children from predators and inappropriate content.

Facebook agreed to: provide automatic warning messages when a child is in danger of giving personal information to an unknown adult, restrict the ability of users to change their listed ages, act more aggressively to remove inappropriate content and groups from the site, and require third party vendors to follow Facebook's safety and privacy guidelines.

"We know predators use Facebook and other social sites to prey on children," said Bruning. "Facebook's changes will help provide a safer online environment for Nebraska's kids.'

The agreement is similar to one that MySpace reached in January with 49 states and the District of Columbia. MySpace agreed to head a task force, which Facebook has joined, to explore and develop age and identity identification for

social networking sites. Internet safety has been and continues to be a top priority for the Nebraska Attorney General's Office. Over the last five years, the office

·Hosted Websafe, an internet safety conference for local law enforcement and prosecutors, educational administrators, community officials and victim advocacy groups.

Saving in tough times

When the economy is struggling, we seem to put more thought into our financial decisions. not tuck it away for a time when you may really need it? 2: Cut back on eating out - bring lunch to work a few days a week. Buy fewer expensive gourmet coffees, and see how fast the savings add up.

3: Try budgeting - if you can't discipline your spending habits, you need a budget to keep you in line and live within it.

4: Cut energy costs today's high gas prices dictate smarter driving. Carpool when possible and eliminate unnecessary trips. At home, see if you can adjust your thermostat by a degree or two to reduce heating or cooling bills, and turn off lights when you aren't using them.

5: Go to the store with a

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list - plan ahead what you are buying before you go to the grocery or discount store. Buy only what is on the list and avoid impulse purchases.


6: Get rid of credit card debt - interest rates on credit cards are extremely costly. The sooner you can eliminate credit card debt, the better.

7: Consider refinancing your mortgage - check current interest rates to see if you can reduce your monthly payments enough to justify the costs of refinancing your mortgage. If you're able to refinance, invest the savings.

8: Put a plan in place your financial advisor can help you develop a long-term financial plan that can provide you with a roadmap to reach your financial goals. A financial plan may also help you determine how much you should be saving to make your goals a reality.

A little more diligence about saving can go a long way. If you can find an extra \$100 per month, continue doing it over thirty years and earn an 8 percent average annual return, you will accumulate an additional \$85,000 in savings.



Prevent Pine Wilt's spread by removing dead trees

10 years ago, pine wilt has killed an estimated 7,000 pines across the tree's trunk can trap moisture and state, a Nebraska Forest Service forest health expert said.

Trees infected with pine wilt die from the disease, so it is important to take steps to prevent its spread, program leader with the Nebraska Forest Service.

healthy pines is available, but its cost will likely limit its use to very valuable trees," Harrell said. "The only approach we have for dealing with pine wilt in most of our trees is to reduce its spread by quickly removing and destroying the trees that die from it."

Pine wilt is caused by a microscopic, worm-like organism called the pinewood nematode. These nematodes live in pines and are carried from tree to tree by insects called pine sawyer beetles. Once inside the tree, the nematode disrupts the flow of sap, causing the tree to turn brown and die.

Harrell said the pine sawyer beetle is active from May through September, so if trees dying of pine wilt are discovered during the fall and winter, the deadline for safely removing and destroying them is the end of April.

Trees that die while the beetle is in Plainview. active should be removed within a month of the tree's death to pre-

Since entering Nebraska nearly or around trees, even pines. Because mulch resting against a lead to decay and diseases, mulch should be kept several inches away from the trunk.

Additionally, Harrell says research shows a slight risk of pine said Mark Harrell, forest health wilt spreading through infected mulch that comes in contact with trunk wounds on Scotch pine. "A chemical treatment to protect Keeping the mulch away from the tree's trunk can help prevent this.

Approximately 95 percent of the pines killed are Scotch pines, but Austrian pines occasionally are killed from the disease as well. While trees stressed by drought are

slightly more susceptible to pine wilt, it easily can kill healthy trees, Harrell said.

Pine wilt is very common in southeast Nebraska and is spreading to the west and north. The leading edge along which many trees are beginning to die extends from Grand Island in the west and West Point in the north.


POWER DRIVE


