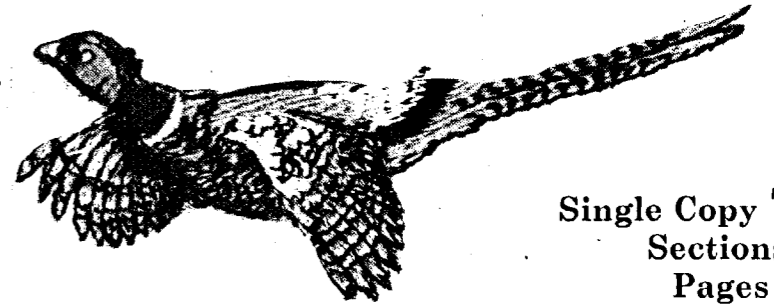

For 2008, organizers have selected a united theme that emphasizes the healing process: "National Hospital Week - Where Healing Happens Every Day."

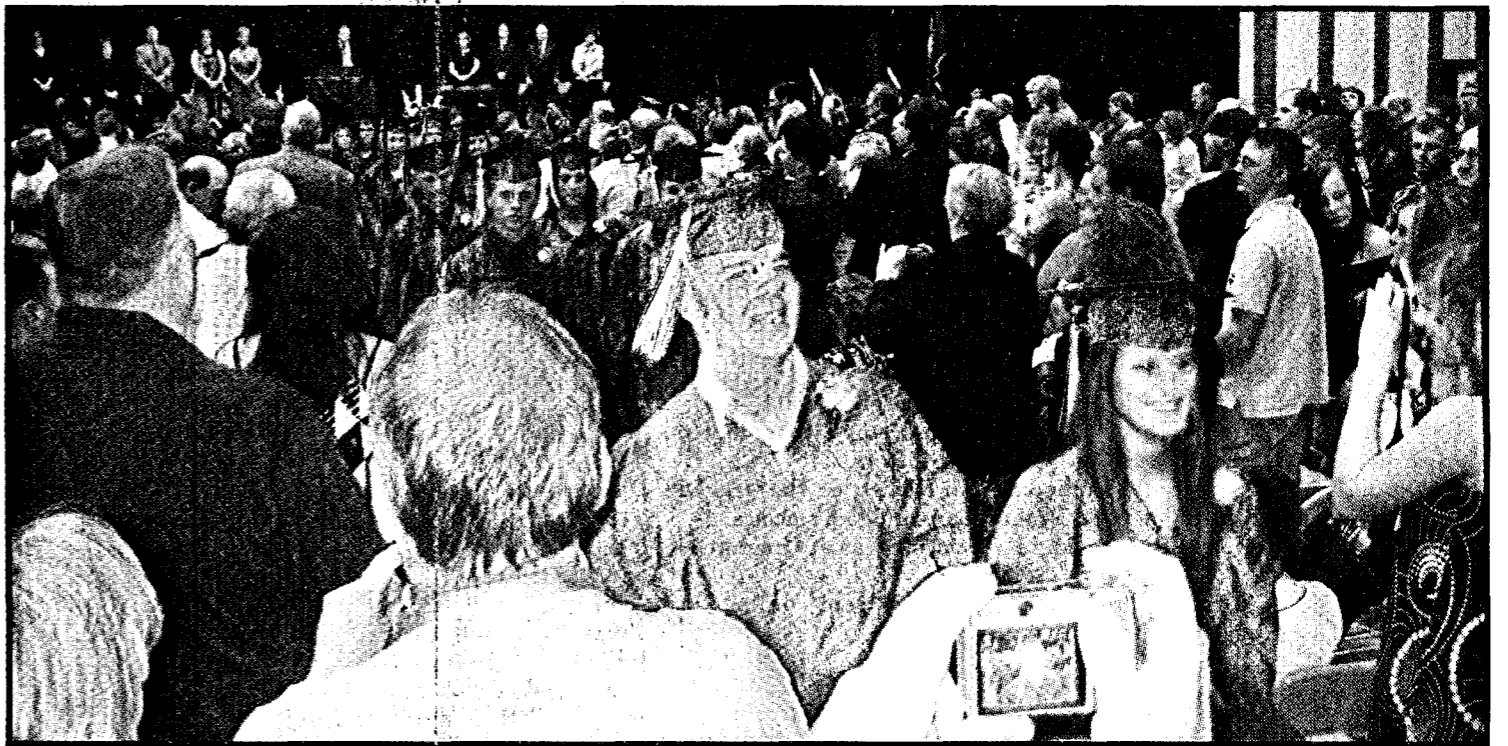
Keeping health care in a positive light is part of the tradition of National Hospital Week, a celebration of care that dates back

Heartland honor flight initial trip to fly World War II veterans

The National Honor Flight program is spreading its wings.

The first Heartland Honor Flight will take to the skies with WWII veterans from Nebraska and western Iowa. Their destination will be Washington, D.C., where they will personally tour America's "Thank You" for their service, their World War II Memorial.

The one-day trip is open to all WWII veterans in Nebraska and western Iowa, departing Omaha Wednesday, May 21.

Veterans are escorted and cared for by guardians (volunteers) who accompany them as they visit the WWII, Iwo Jima, Korean and Vietnam Memorials. All expenses are provided at no cost to the WWII veterans. In fact, donations from WWII veterans will not be accepted.

"They have given us a free world. Now it's our turn to pay them back," organizers said.

WWII veterans interested in going on the trip may find an application at: www.honorflight.org or www.vfwne.com or by contacting either the VFW in Lincoln (402) 464-0674 or the Honor Flight National Office at (937) 521-2400 in Springfield, Ohio. The veterans are selected based upon the order in which the applications are received.

"Time is not on our side," said Bill Williams, organizer of the event. "According to the Department of Veterans Affairs and Arlington National Cemetery statistics, about 1,200 WWII veterans pass away each day. They youngest WWII vet is 80 years old. In another five to 10 years, most WWII veterans will be gone. We are asking

the public's support to help make this trip possible for these veterans who saved the world... before it's too late. Unfortunately, Honor Flight receives no corporate or government sponsorship. We are funded solely by public donations and we need \$75,000 to make this Heartland Honor Flight happen."

Resignation and hiring approved at recent school board meeting

The Wayne Community Schools Board of Education met in regular session on Monday night. Board action included approving with regrets the resignation of Shannon Corkle as Middle School teacher and assistant softball coach. Also approved was the hiring of Anthony Lawrence as Head Wrestling Coach, contingent on his completion of the professional certification from NSAA.

The board did not approve the bid of \$1,598 from Leonard Jones for cement work at the high school and Middle School. The board decided to wait with the projects.

Accreditation dues of \$625 with North

Central Association for 2008-09 were approved.

The board tabled the Midstate School Bus, Inc. contract until the next meeting to allow more time to look it over.

Rodney Garwood was present to ask the board to disclose how the financial problems in the district happened so there can be closure as the public and staff need to know.

Dr. Joe Reinert, superintendent, talked about the state aid comparison, Oct. 7 - April 8, which was actually \$103,866.20 net reduction from the 07-08 certification rather than around \$133,000, which they previously thought.

Wayne County voters go to the polls

A total of 1,596 Wayne County voters cast ballots in Tuesday's primary election.

This represents 29.5 percent of the registered voters in the county.

Only a handful contested races were on the ballot, as several races will be determined in the November general election.

In Wayne County, the Republican seat for County Commissioner in District 2 was among the contested races.

Incumbent Robert Nissen received 170 votes and new-comer Donald Liedman received 209 votes.

In the city of Wayne's Fourth Ward, three candidates were on the ballot. Incumbent Don Buryanek received 108 votes; Jon Haase received 107 votes and Jane O'Leary received 56 votes. Buryanek and Haase will move on to the November

ballot.

In Nebraska races, the vote for the Nebraska State Amendment received 756 votes in Wayne County and 721 against votes.

For the 17th Legislative seat in the Nebraska Legislature, in Wayne County Doug Garwood received 880 votes; Jason V. Bowman, 356 votes and Robert Giese, 251 votes.

The Wayne County winner for the U.S. Senate seat on the Republican ticket was Mike Johanns, who received 814 votes to Pat Flynn's 253 votes. On the Democratic side, Scott Kleeb received 241 votes; Tony Raimondo received 68 votes; James Bryan Wilson, 46 votes and Larry Marvin, 18 votes.

All votes are unofficial.

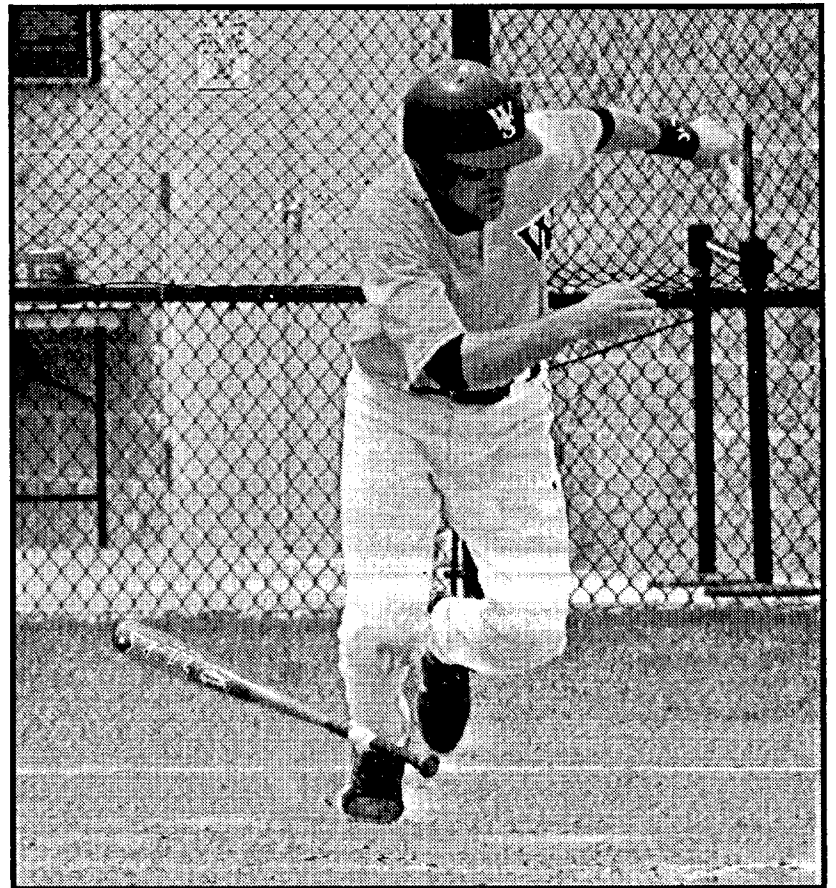

The Wildcats had five players receive First Team honors, in addition to two Second Team selections. WSC also earned three post-season awards recipients, as Nick Schumacher was named the 2008 NSIC Pitcher of the Year, while Marc Manganaro shared NSIC Player of the Year honors with Northern State's Adam Kampsen.

Freshman Nick Bidroski earned the Wildcats' final post season award, as he was named the NSIC Co-Freshmen of the Year with Minnesota, Crookston's Jake Poehler. Schumacher, a senior right-handed pitcher from Nebraska City, Neb., set a new WSC single season win record this season for WSC, with his current 12-1 record and ERA of 1.92 which is a best in the NSIC.

He was fourth in the NSIC in hits with 62 and had five homers and 42 RBI's. Joe Wendte, a sophomore left fielder from Sioux City, Iowa (Heelan High School), was the NSIC's Freshmen of the Year last season and hit a .353 for the Wildcats this season with five home runs and 42 RBI's.

In NSIC games, Wendte recorded a .364 average with four homers and 26 RBI's. Second Team All-NSIC selections for the Wildcats included: Justin Hemauer, a junior outfielder from Moundsview, Minn. Hemauer, hit .352 for WSC this season with three home runs and 20 RBI's from the leadoff position.

On Thursday, WSC opened the NSIC Conference Tournament with a compelling 6-3 win over Winona State, and then went on to dismantle Southwest Minnesota State 9-1 on Friday.

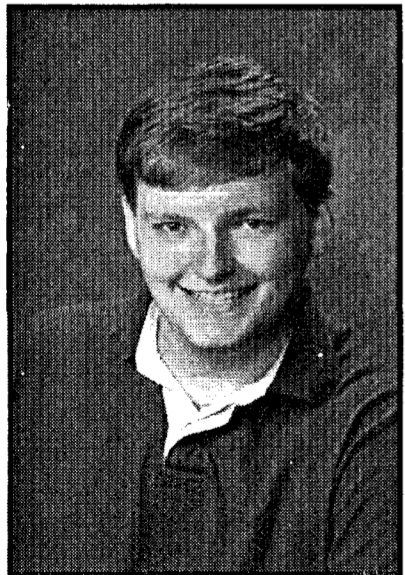
More than 2,400 receive degrees at UNL commencement exercises

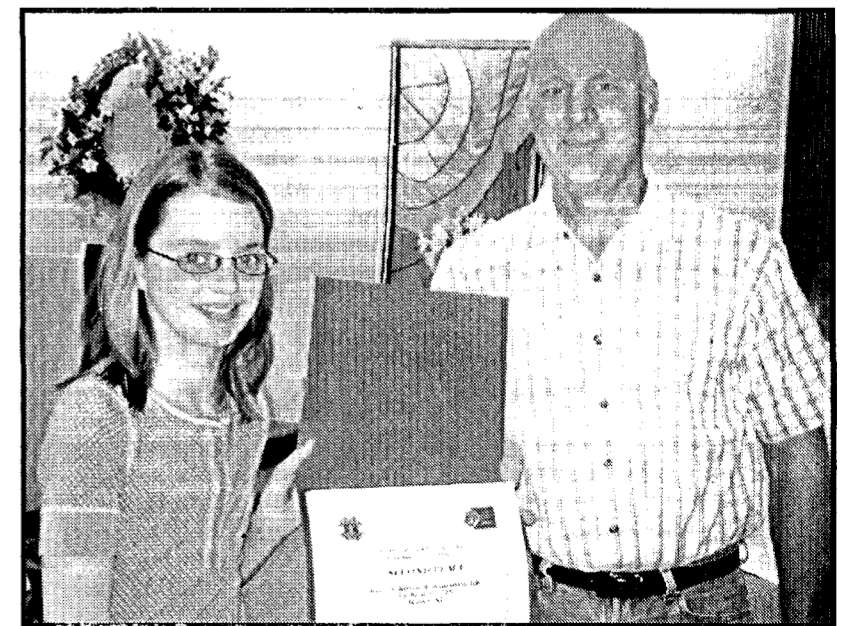

"Warmer weather brings an increase in motorcycle traffic," said

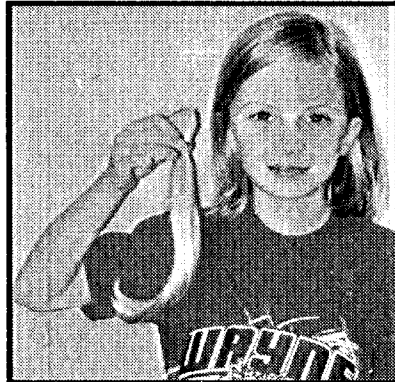
Colonel Bryan Tuma, Superintendent of the Nebraska State Patrol. "Motorcycles are often difficult to see, with that in mind The Nebraska State Patrol encourages motorcycle riders and the motoring public to look twice before changing lanes or entering intersections."

Nebraska is one of 20 states including the District of Columbia requiring motorcycle riders and passengers to wear an approved motorcycle helmet. Twenty-seven other states have partial helmet laws, and three states (Illinois, Iowa, and New Hampshire), do not require helmets to be worn.

The half-marathon started and ended on the UNL Campus in Lincoln, Nebraska.

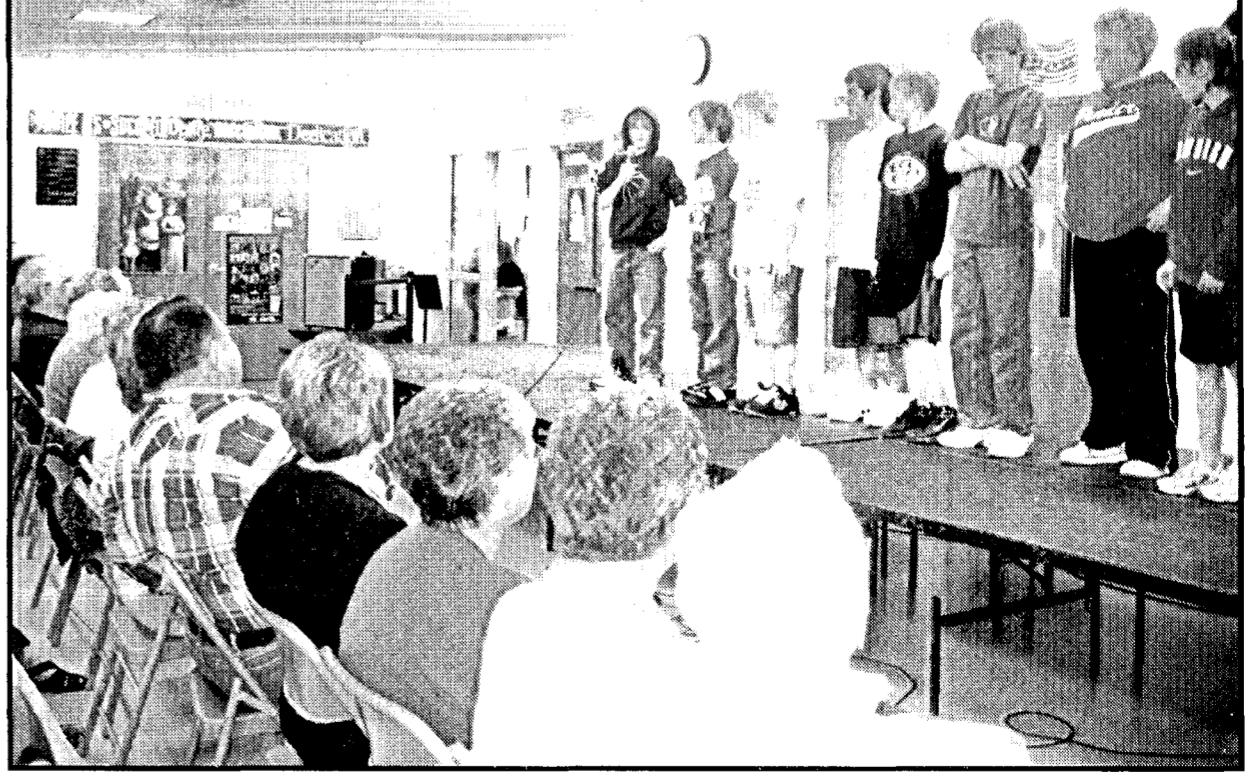
Another CPR class for healthcare providers set at NECC in Norfolk

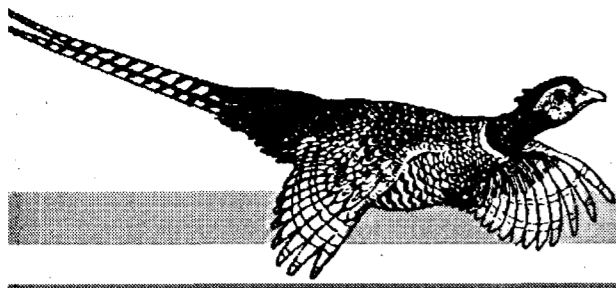

Those that follow the game of high school golf know that you play five and score four. Until Sunday evening, Wayne had three players after having sidelined two players for an off-course incident.

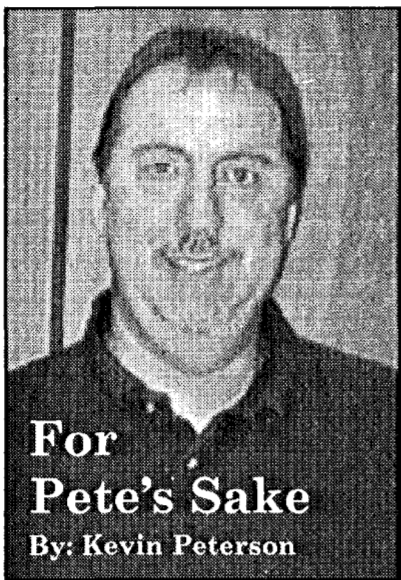

Attorney General Bruning announces agreement with Facebook to make site safer for underage users

Attorney General Jon Bruning along with Attorneys General from 48 other states and the District of Columbia announced today that Facebook agreed to changes to better protect children from predators and inappropriate content.

Facebook agreed to: provide automatic warning messages when a child is in danger of giving personal information to an unknown adult, restrict the ability of users to change their listed ages, act more aggressively to remove inappropriate content and groups from the site, and require third party vendors to follow Facebook's safety and privacy guidelines.

"We know predators use Facebook and other social sites to prey on children," said Bruning. "Facebook's changes will help provide a safer online environment for Nebraska's kids."

The agreement is similar to one that MySpace reached in January with 49 states and the District of Columbia. MySpace agreed to head a task force, which Facebook has joined, to explore and develop age and identity identification for

social networking sites. Internet safety has been and continues to be a top priority for the Nebraska Attorney General's Office. Over the last five years, the office:

- Reached an agreement with Yahoo! that shut down 70,000 chat rooms frequented by sexual predators.
- Worked with the legislature to create the offense of Online Enticement.
- Worked with the legislature to pass cyberstalking legislation. LB 142 made it a felony for an adult to send sexually explicit material to a child under 16.
- Increased penalties for the possession of child pornography - one to 20 years for the first offense. One to 50 years for each subsequent offense.
- Hosted Websafe, an internet safety conference for local law enforcement and prosecutors, educational administrators, community officials and victim advocacy groups.
- Launched www.safekids.gov, an Internet safety Web site.

School aid debate continues

An every-so-often event came and went early this year.

A touristy looking couple walked the street on the south side of the Capitol. They stopped to confer, then stopped a passerby ... and asked directions to the Capitol.

The occasional example of folks not seeing the tower for the plains, or whatever, is more likely to occur in August, when temperatures can overheat the brainpan.

A major school aid bill drew hundreds of rural Nebraskans to the statehouse some years ago. Then-Gov. Bob Kerrey, smiling but disgruntled (he could do that) was leaving the building after meeting with lawmakers.

One of a few people standing on the sidewalk stepped forward and said: "Excuse me. That is the Capitol, right? We had a heck of a time finding it. We wanted to talk to some senators about this school bill."

Kerrey assured them they were in the right place. "Go on in," Kerrey said, flashing that famous scimitar smile. "And don't be embarrassed. Most of them are lost, too."

Secretary of State John Gale reported last week that the number of Nebraskans registered as Democrats increased by approximately 14,000 since January. The number of registered GOP faithful declined by 5,000.

The Democratic jump no doubt reflected interest in the Obama/

Clinton saga. Might an increase of 14,000 voters boost Democratic chances in November's top-of-the-ticket presidential and Senate races?

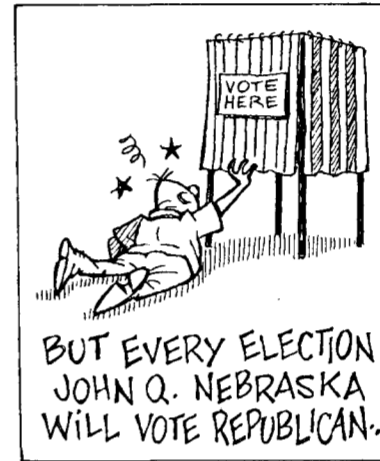
Nope. Any number of things can turn a political race on its head, but John McCain and Mike Johanns enjoy such overwhelming voter registration advantages that their presidential and senate bids, respective-

ly, are odds-on favorites. Some 49 percent of registered Nebraska voters are Republican, about 33 percent Democrat. There are about 185,000 registered independents.

The inner workings of the United States Supreme Court are a mystery to almost everyone. Their honors traditionally keep their internal doings to themselves. That is why the Jeffrey Toobin book, "The

Nine," is especially intriguing.

Toobin's documented accounts of the high court's machinations in the historic 2000 presidential elections are must-read stuff for junkies of the history and political variety. Even putting aside that central element of the book, his reporting on the interactions of the justices, their personalities and personal relationships make for a terrific read.

(arc), (oxy-acetylene); and welding (wire).

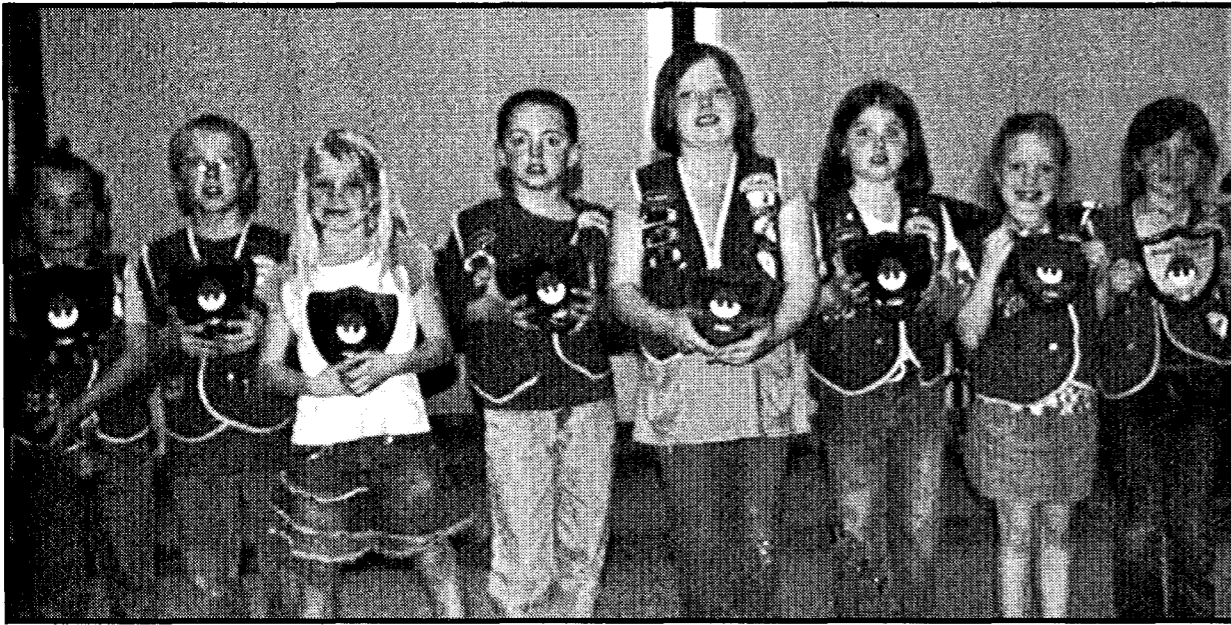

world. For over 60 years the organization has been encouraging and equipping women to live out their Christian lives in active mission ministries and to financially support global missions.

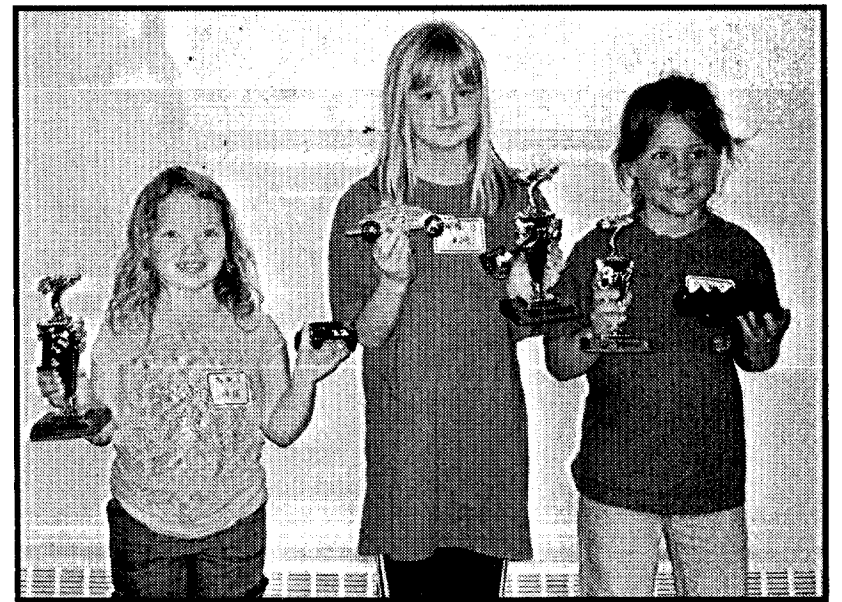

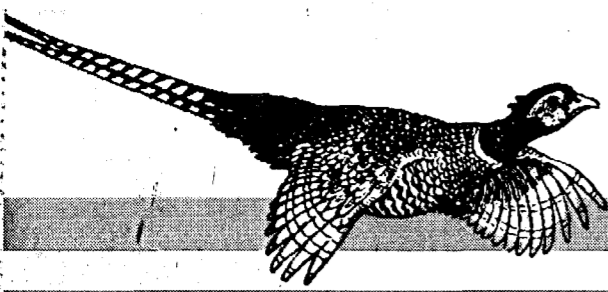

Two UNL Extension Organic Farm tours offered June 17 or 18

Two University of Nebraska-Lincoln Extension organic farm tours June 17 or 18 will cover topics ranging from winter wheat varieties to flaming for weed control.

The June 17 workshop—Organic Winter Wheat Varieties and Integrated Pest Management—will be at UNL's Haskell Agricultural Laboratory near Concord. The evening tour will begin at 5:30 p.m. and will conclude at 7:30 p.m. with a barbecue.

Speakers and topics include: Tom Hunt, UNL entomologist, integrated pest management, identifying and attracting beneficial insects, economic threshold development and resistance management; Richard Little, UNL organic wheat breeding specialist, organic winter wheat variety research; Santiago Ulloa, UNL graduate student, demonstration of flaming research on various crops to control weeds; and Liz Sarno, UNL organic project coordinator, update on the organic farming project and answer questions about organic farming.

The June 18 workshop—Organic Winter Wheat Varieties and Various Methods and Equipment for Weed Control in Organic Crops—will be at the Forestry Research Area at UNL's Agricultural Research and Development Center near Mead. The evening tour will be from 5:30 to 7:30 p.m. with a picnic afterwards.

Participants also can view displays of various equipment used for weed control in organic crops and

will discuss cultural practices.

Speakers and topics include: Richard Little, UNL organic wheat breeding specialist, organic winter wheat variety research; Santiago Ulloa, UNL graduate student, demonstration of flaming research on various crops to control weeds; John Quinn, UNL graduate student, conservation demonstration of native bird populations in working farm systems and discussion of the Healthy Farm Index, an assessment tool to help evaluate a farm's ecological and economic health; and Liz Sarno, UNL organic project coordinator, update on the organic farming project and answer questions about organic farming.

To get to the Forestry Research Area, start out on Highway 77 north of Lincoln toward Wahoo. Turn east on Highway 66 and travel seven miles to the top of the hill, just past the August N. Christenson Research and Education Building. Entrance to the Forestry Research Area is on the left, next to a row of trees. Take the farm road north one-half mile to the buildings on the left. If coming from the north via Mead, take Road 10 south to Highway 66, turn west and go one-half mile to the gravel farm road on the right. Enter and go one-half mile north to buildings in the center of the section.

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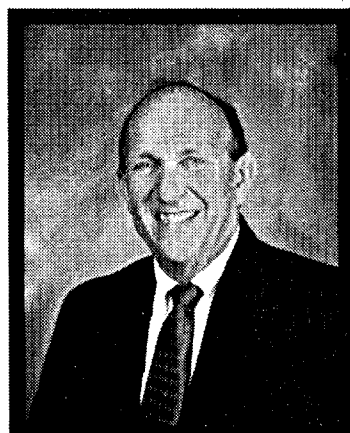

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Prevent Pine Wilt's spread by removing dead trees

Since entering Nebraska nearly 10 years ago, pine wilt has killed an estimated 7,000 pines across the state, a Nebraska Forest Service forest health expert said.

Trees infected with pine wilt die from the disease, so it is important to take steps to prevent its spread, said Mark Harrell, forest health program leader with the Nebraska Forest Service.

"A chemical treatment to protect healthy pines is available, but its cost will likely limit its use to very valuable trees," Harrell said. "The only approach we have for dealing with pine wilt in most of our trees is to reduce its spread by quickly removing and destroying the trees that die from it."

Pine wilt is caused by a microscopic, worm-like organism called the pinewood nematode. These nematodes live in pines and are carried from tree to tree by insects called pine sawyer beetles. Once inside the tree, the nematode disrupts the flow of sap, causing the tree to turn brown and die.

Harrell said the pine sawyer beetle is active from May through September, so if trees dying of pine wilt are discovered during the fall and winter, the deadline for safely removing and destroying them is the end of April.

Trees that die while the beetle is active should be removed within a month of the tree's death to prevent the beetles from re-emerging and spreading the disease to new trees.

Once removed, trees should be disposed of by chipping, burning or burying to ensure beetles in the wood are killed. Chipped trees can safely be used as mulch in gardens

or around trees, even pines. Because mulch resting against a tree's trunk can trap moisture and lead to decay and diseases, mulch should be kept several inches away from the trunk.

Additionally, Harrell says research shows a slight risk of pine wilt spreading through infected mulch that comes in contact with trunk wounds on Scotch pine. Keeping the mulch away from the tree's trunk can help prevent this.

Approximately 95 percent of the pines killed are Scotch pines, but Austrian pines occasionally are killed from the disease as well. While trees stressed by drought are

slightly more susceptible to pine wilt, it easily can kill healthy trees, Harrell said.

Pine wilt is very common in southeast Nebraska and is spreading to the west and north. The leading edge along which many trees are beginning to die extends from Grand Island in the west and West Point in the north.

called the Chicago-St. Paul-Minneapolis-Omaha Rail Line and later became the Chicago Northwestern Railroad. It became a part of the Wakefield Heritage Organization in 2006.

The meeting was very informative and showed slides and told about the early days of Wakefield and how it was settled about 127 years ago. Those present introduced themselves, mentioned the museum they represented and told about their recent activities. Information was handed out on "Preserving Your Past and Your Future."

William Filter, Ph.D., has been a professor of business at Wayne

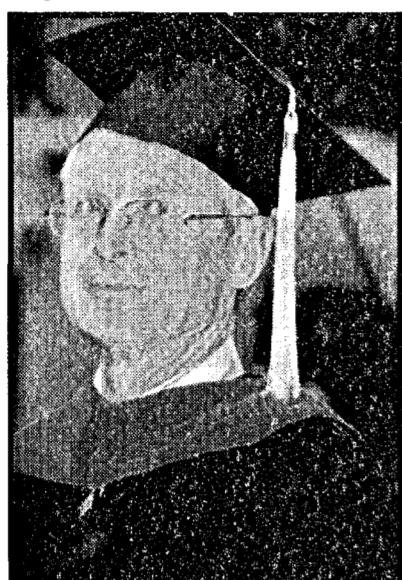


Dr. William Filter, Professor of Business

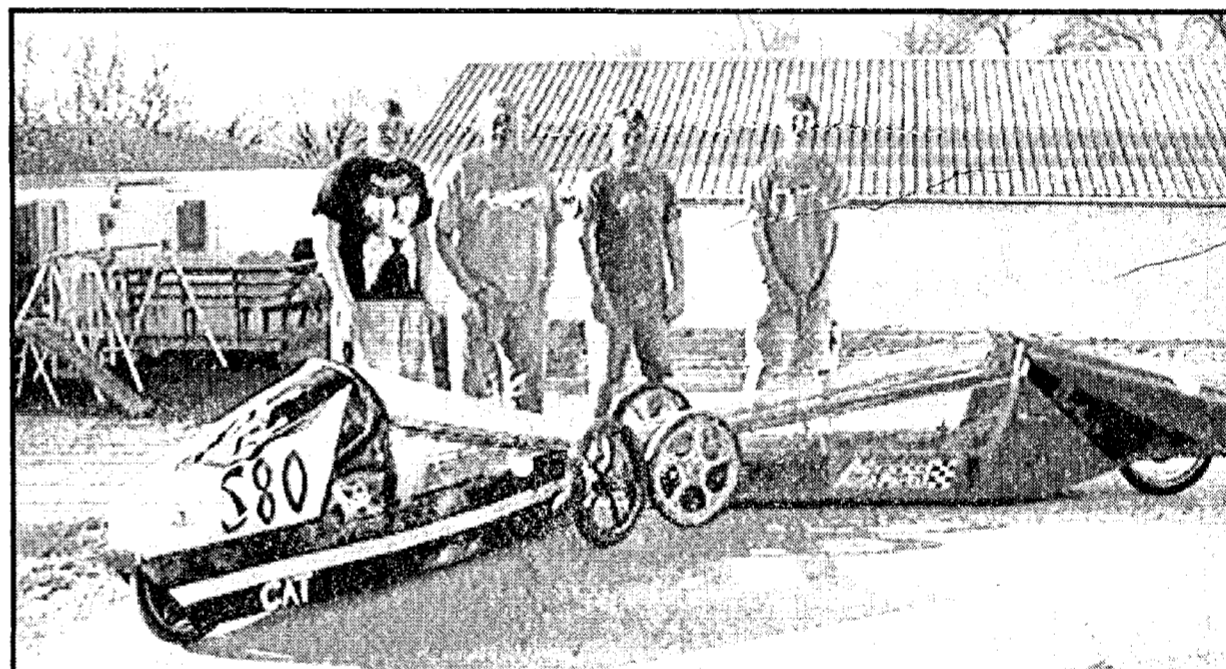
POWER DRIVE

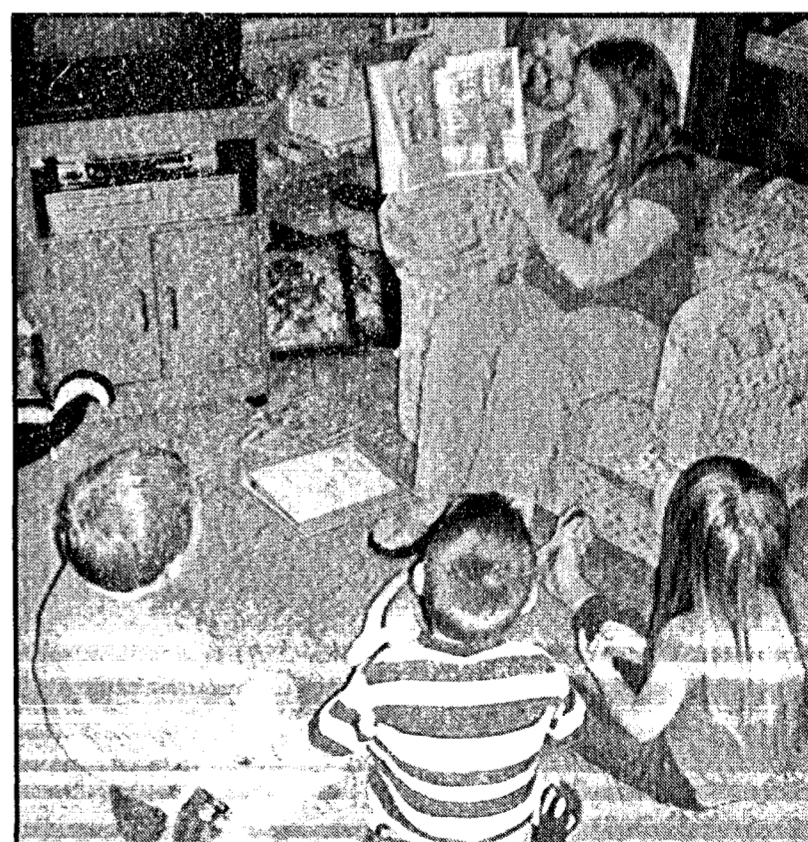
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Award project
