

## DHHS issues heat alert

The high temperatures and high humidity Nebraska is now seeing can be a deadly combination, according to the Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services.

Temperatures of 90-plus degrees and humidity levels of 40 percent or more put people in the danger zone for heat-related illness.

"The body normally cools itself by sweating. When the humidity is high, sweat doesn't evaporate as quickly. That prevents the body from releasing heat, causing its temperature control system to overload," said Dr. Joann Schaefer, Chief Medical Officer and Director of the Division of Public Health.

The risk for heat-related illness and death is higher for infants and the elderly, whose internal thermostats do not regulate body temperature well. Others who are at increased risk are the obese, chronically ill (including heart disease, high blood pressure and asthma), and people who take certain medicines, such as antidepressants and tranquilizers, that interfere with the body's temperature regulation.

Heat exhaustion can develop following exposure for several days to high temperatures. Symptoms include rapid heartbeat, cold clammy skin, nausea, dizziness, weakness, and fatigue.

Heatstroke, the most serious heat-related illness, is a medical emergency characterized by a body temperature of 105 degrees F or greater. Symptoms include hot dry skin, rapid heartbeat, shallow breathing, disorientation, delirium, and ways to cool off.

Anyone suffering from these conditions should be moved into the shade or air conditioning. If heatstroke or serious heat exhaustion is suspected, emergency medical assistance should be sought.

Tips to stay cool Heat-related illness and death are readily preventable. Here are some tips for hot times:

· Spend as much time as possible in airconditioned places:

· Drink plenty of water and don't wait until you are thirsty to drink;

Avoid alcohol and drinks with caffeine;

· Wear loose, light-colored clothing; · If outdoor activity is unavoidable, slow

your pace and take frequent rest breaks to

· Limit your outdoor activity to morning

and evening hours, if possible; · Try to rest often in shady areas;

Protect your skin by using a sunscreen lotion with a protective factor of 15 or greater and wearing a wide-brimmed hat, long-sleeved shirt and pants. Sunburn interferes with the body's job of heat dissipation, and too much sun exposure is a risk factor for skin cancer.

Being in an air-conditioned place for a few hours each day will reduce the risk of heat-related illness. Fans may provide comfort, but when the temperature is in the high 90s and the humidity is high, fans will not prevent heat-related illnesses. Taking a cool shower or bath, or moving to an air-conditioned place are much better

## Salem Lutheran Church in Wakefield celebrating 125 years

The building project goal is \$100 for each year Salem Lutheran Church has been in existence.

The year of 2008 celebration began on Dec. 16, 2007 with entertainment by Julesong Kaffee Kalas - Salem Choir; Jan. 20 was Reminiscing Sunday; Feb. 10 was Winter Festival; March 2, was God's Giggle Gang Mime Graef. Salem Lutheran Church began its life as a congregation, May, 1883. At that time, there were many immigrants coming from Sweden to Iowa, Illinois and Nebraska. The services were held in Gustus Johnson's home or "Park's Schoolhouse," later known as "Parkhill." This schoolhouse was located two miles north and two miles west of Wakefield.

On April 29, 1883, a congregation organized by Pastor Halland, conducted services that day. With Pastor J. Torell conducting services, the Augustana synod constitution was adopted and on Aug. 8, 1883, a petition was sent to the Kansas Conference asking to be a part of it, stating that Salem had 33 members and owned three lots in town in Wakefield and intended to build a church very soon.

At the annual meeting in January, 1884, Gottlieb Dahlbeck from Augustana

Salem Lutheran Church in Wakefield is Father Son Fun Day was on June 21. After College was called to serve the congregation. Services were held in the Wakefield Public School building, then located on the present Presbyterian Church lot. Rev. F. W. Bergquist was the first official pastor being called September, 1884. On Jan. 6, 1885, it was decided to build a new church as soon as \$300 could be secured. It was also decided to organize a Sunday School as soon as possible.

On May 10, 1884, it was decided to build the church which was dedicated Sept. 23, 1885. The church was paid for in 1903. On Sept. 5, 1885, the congregation decided to buy Rev. Bergquist's house and lot south of the church. Rev. Bergquist left the congregation, December, 1886. The congregation had grown to 90 adults and 78 children. They were without a pastor until May, 1888 when Rev. J.P. Aurelius came and stayed until November, 1894.

In March, 1895, Rev. P. Sjoblom became the third pastor and left in March, 1900. The pulpit was vacant until September, 1901 when Rev. N.P. Tuleen came. During his stay, the old parsonage was sold and the three lots north of the church were secured. A new parsonage was built. By 1905, it was

evident that a larger church was needed so on Jan. 25, 1905 it was decided to build. Rev. Tuleen left in June, 1905 and Rev. J.E. Rydbeck came in September, 1905. First services were held in the basement on the first Sunday in Advent, 1905 and in the church the beginning of 1906. The church was dedicated March 11, 1906.

Rev. Rydbeck left and Rev. J.T. Kraft came in the spring of 1910. Rev. Kraft resigned and left in 1919. Rev. E.G. Knock soon followed as successor. During Rev. Knock's stay, more services were held in English. In 1920, the constitution was changed to grant women the right to vote. In 1924, Rev. Knock left and Rev. J.A. Martin came and stayed until October, 1931. During his stay, the name of the church was changed "The Salem Evangelical Lutheran to Church."

In August, 1932, Pastor Arthur L. Peterson became the new minister. There was a membership of 729. The 50th anniversary of the church was observed. In 1939, Pastor Clarence Hall came as minister and served the pulpit until 1943. In the fall of 1943, Pastor Curtis W. Wiberg was filling the pulpit. In June, 1953, Pastor C.

Willard Carlson began his ministry. Pastor Robert V. Johnson came in November, 1961 and held the honor of serving the congregation the longest time, 21 years.

In 1962, the church paper, "Spire" was started. In 1963, approval was given to add a brick structure to the north of the church. The lot and house south of the church was bought and preparations began for a new parsonage which was dedicated in 1968. In 1971, the basement was remodeled. The first women were elected to the church council in 1977. On June 13, 1982, groundbreaking was held for a ramp link to the church and dedication was on Dec. 5. The church's centennial was celebrated each month in 1983.

In 1984, Pastor Johnson announced he was retiring the end of the year. In March, redecorating was done in the Sanctuary. In October, Pastor Wm. R. Conrad was interim pastor. Pastor Joe Marek was installed March 3, 1985. By Sept. 23, there was an average of 230 people worshipping each Sunday. The fall of 1987, Bruce Peterson of Minnesota was interim pastor.







### Students can begin nursing classes this fall at NECC

Before the ground is broken 1140) and English (ENGL 1010) on a new facility at Northeast Community College in Norfolk, students can begin their studies this fall in preparation for pursuing a bachelor of science degree in nursing from the University of Nebraska Medical Center College of Nursing.

The capital campaign for the University of Nebraska Medical Center (UNMC) College of Nursing Northern Division on the Northeast campus continues. More than \$7 million of the total project cost of \$12.9 million has been raised to

When completed, tentatively in 2010, the facility will be able to accommodate all Northeast nursing classes, from basic nurse aide (commonly called certified nurse aide). licensed practical nursing and associate degree nursing, and UNMC bachelor's, master's and doctoral studies in nursing.

Students planning to enroll in the UNMC Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN) degree studies in Norfolk can take their general education requirements through Northeast Community College. Students will pay Northeast tuition and fee rates of \$78 a credit hour this academic year.

"Students interested in enrolling in the UNMC Bachelor of Science in Nursing program should begin taking prerequisite and co-requisite courses this fall," said Louise M. LaFramboise, Ph.D., R.N., director of undergraduate programs, UNMC College of Nursing. "A total of 62 credits of coursework must be completed before admission to the UNMC College of Nursing."

First semester general education classes will include General Biology (BIOS 1010), Math. English, and Sociology (SOCI 1010) or Psychology (PSYC 1810). The math and English classes will be determined by placement scores. UNMC targets Northeast's Intermediate Algebra (MATH

as general education courses for its students.

Second- and third-semester general education Northeast classes for a UNMC BSN will include Introduction to Human Anatomy and Physiology I and II (BIOS 2110 and 2120), Speech (SPCH 1010), and either Sociology (SOCI 1010) or Psychology (PSYC 1810).

Students hoping to enroll in the UNMC BSN program must also take courses in Human Growth and Development, Chemistry, Nutrition, Microbiology, Ethics, Statistics, and Principals of Heredity-Genetics to complete studies for a bachelor's degree. One humanities, political science, family and human behavior, or diversity class is also required by UNMC for its BSN degree. All can be taken through Northeast Community College.

These classes will be offered on the Northeast campus, online, via two-way interactive TV at Northeast or through its education centers in West Point, O'Neill and South Sioux City, or via telecourses



Nebraska's electric system must be flexible to supply reliable power to homes, businesses and industries under a wide variety of conditions.

This takes a complex system of power plants, sub-stations, transmission and distribution lines to get energy to where it needs to go. As energy consumers, there are many things customers can do to reduce energy usage, particularly during hot days in the summer months when demand for electric-

ity is typically at its highest. These energy-wise tips include: · When temperatures top 90 degrees, find ways to reduce your energy usage between 3 and 8 p.m. when energy usage is typically at

its highest. · Raise your thermostat to a 375-2866.

# Special meeting held at site of housing development

An outdoor meeting of the Wayne City Council was held Tuesday in the newly created Western Ridge II Subdivision of Wayne.

Council members first approved Resolution 2008-68, ratifying a letter to the Nebraska Department of Environmental Quality. The letter involved a compliance permit in regard to the construction of a wastewater treatment facility and a subdivision construction permit.

The remainder of the meeting involved the council acting as a Community Development Agency on issues related to the Western Ridge II Subdivision.

Discussion was held, but no formal action taken, on a purchase agreement to sell 10 lots in the subdivision to Rob Woodling's Foundation Development, LLC to build 10 rent-to-own homes. Earlier es built and people living here,"

on Tuesday, several council members had toured homes in Valley and Nebraska City which have been constructed by the firm. The lots would be scattered throughout Phase I and Phase II of the development area.

The item will be on the council's agenda at next week's regular meeting.

The CDA voted to limit lot sales in Western Ridge II to one per person until Oct. 1 of this year, with the exception of the 10 lots that are scheduled to be sold to Rob Woodling's Foundation Development, LLC.

Council member Doug Sturm voted against the limit, stating that anyone should be allowed to purchase as many lots as they wanted to get homes built in the

"I want to get the lots sold, hous-

Council members discussed the issue, noting that any lot that is sold needs to have a home built on it within a year.

There are currently 15 lots available at market rate in Phase I and Phase II of the development.

Council members walked the development area to get an idea of where lots would be situated and discussed a plan to install a detention dam above the north side of the project and install a 36 inch pie and construct a one foot deep by 20 feet wide overflow channel to deal with water run off.

Several other issues dealing with the lay of the land in the subdivision were discussed with Council member Verdel Lutt questioning the engineer's original design.

The next regular meeting of the council will be Tuesday, Aug. 5 at 5:30 p.m. in the council chambers.


In addition to his efforts on offense, Hill was also tagged with the pitching win as he gave up just six hits and one earned run in six innings of work.

While the offense had their way with Aurora, it was Poutre who was credited with the pitching win as he gave up eight hits, three



To accommodate busy people with full-time jobs, Northeast Community College in Norfolk will begin a new section of its freshman architectural drafting classes that meet in the evenings and on week-

Beginning this fall semester, all courses for the first year of the proapplied science degree can be taken in the evening or on weekends. Students will take 2-3 classes per semester, possibly a Saturday or summer class, and finish the 38 credit hours in May 2010 to advance to the sophomore level. The 38 credit hours include general education and drafting courses.

According to John Blaylock, dean of business, math and technology, the second year of the program will be offered on a part-time basis if there is sufficient interest. "This means a minimum of 12 students," he said. If the second year is not offered on a part-time basis, students can transition to full-time status to finish their studies for an associate's degree.

They may also be able to join previously-scheduled morning or evening classes to complete their

Blaylock said that the architectural drafting profession is expected to grow six percent between now and 2016. According to Nebraska

Workforce Development, it is estimated that there are 650 architectural and civil drafters in Nebraska. Median wage in Nebraska is \$40,220 with an average starting wage at \$29,135 and an average experienced wage at

Northeast drafting graduates between \$10-\$17 an hour, with an average starting wage of \$11.58 an hour. "Of the 18 graduates in our Class of 2007," Blaylock said, "11 were employed in their chosen field and three chose to continue their educations. Opportunities are plentiful for those who work hard at Northeast Community College and choose to enter the field immediately after graduation."

Blaylock noted that Northeast drafting graduates have found employment locally, across northeast Nebraska, and in other states. "We have graduates working in Sioux City, Kansas City, Lincoln, Omaha, and Grand Island, in addition to those working here in Norfolk or our 20-county service area," he said.

Fall semester classes start Monday, Aug. 18.

## Looking Ahead in Wayne

City Council meeting

The next regular City Council meeting will be Tuesday, Aug.5th at 5:30 p.m. in the council room.

How Much Will It Cost To Flush?

This week, the city council approved a plan to build a replacement waste water plant in Wayne by August 2011.

Why are we doing this?

We have had a few not-so-serious test violations of our current permit to release clear water into Logan Creek from our treatment plant. We believed that we could resolve these issues with increased maintenance and some upgrades of our existing plant.

-However, we submitted a sewer plan for 57 lots in Western Ridge subdivision to Nebraska Department of Environmental Quality for approval and they refused to approve connecting more housing to the existing plant without a com-

three years. We had expected the existing plant to operate for up to five years yet but construction costs are rising fast and it may be better to build a couple years soon-

What will this cost?

The projected cost of a new sequential batch reactor plant in the Wayne Facilities Plan that was completed last year was \$6+ million. Over a 10 year period that could translate to a pretty high sewer bill to pay off the construction and operate the plant. Some other towns are paying high sewer use fees but this council has objected to that kind of cost and we are researching lower cost options. We have until the end of this year to find a lower cost option to be approved by NDEQ. The council has appointed a committee of staff and citizens to make a recommendation to the council.

We're talking more than \$570 million.

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Wollen, Iowa State Extension, offers four key actions that will make it a little easier to meet those challenges:

1) Identify and prioritize needs -When it comes to kids' clothing, the picture is always changing, because kids grow and clothes wear out. So before you start back-toschool clothes shopping, go through your children's current clothing and have them try things on to see what fits. Then list what additional items you need or want, and mark which are the most important. You might also divide your list according to which things that you could buy used and which you need to buy new.

2) Use all available resources- In any "crunch situation" it is smart to use all the resources at your disposal. Take advantage of hand-medowns from friends and relatives, check out what is available at garage sales and thrift stores, and use sewing skills to mend or alter clothing to meet your needs. In addition to the resources you can access directly, think about asking others for their help. You may have a friend who can help with some sewing, who can cut hair, or who

has more time to shop garage sales, or who can take advantage of bargains available in a different town. It is never wrong to ask for help when you need it.

3) Make a Back to School Spending Plan - Begin with normal monthly essentials. Even with special needs, your basic living expenses must come first. Also, don't forget to plan for special expenses that may be scheduled for these months - bills or expenses that don't come every month, but that need to be planned for, such as license tags, birthdays, subscriptions. Determine how much you have available to spend on back-toschool needs and stay within that limit. Overspending will only cause problems later. Place priority on your household's basic needs - it doesn't do any good to get great school clothes if the water gets turned off on the first day of school.

4) Communicate well within your family- Talk with your spouse and your children about the fact that there are limits on what you can spend. Include them in the decisions about what purchases are most important. Children or teens will often be more satisfied with the results if they are involved in (or even in charge of) the decisions about their back-to-school clothing and supplies. In these discussions, be sure to avoid making your children feel worried or guilty about family finances. Instead, simply present the information in a matter-of-fact way, and ask for their suggestions and ideas. Be optimistic that together you can meet the challenges of the back to school

It was also the day for Sunday drives. One summer, I went to a baseball game every Sunday evening because that was what the

I remember a friend telling me about a man in her home community who didn't know if it was right for him to watch baseball on had to work, but even that was Sunday After all, the players were

working, sort of. And there were a lot of "town teams" in those days.

Even on the acreage, neighbor Ross typically did not tend to the farm on Sunday, saying he had learned through the years that whatever he did on that day usually was followed by some breakdown on Monday that put him behind anyway.

On the way home from Bible study, the Big Farmer remembered the days of the threshing crews, It seems there was one fellow who always pushed to work straight though on Sunday, but he was always voted down.
