WSC begins semester Aug. 25 with improvements

Wayne State College begins a new semester of classes on Aug. 25 with a number of improvements to campus and a new pilot program this fall in South Sioux City.

The Professional Development School ers for the district. pilot program will send six senior student teachers into the school district for a full year intensive student-teaching experience. Two WSC faculty and teachers from the South Sioux City district will provide

instruction to the students during the year. The program will give the students a better understanding of the profession while at the same time providing full-time teach-

cation but it is new to Nebraska. It's yet another innovative teacher education program using state of the art curriculum for WSC, which has its roots in teacher educa-

tion," said Dr. Bob McCue, Vice President for Academic Affairs. "There has been interest in the Norfolk and Columbus areas in starting a similar program so WSC may expand it after this year. Schools announce opening dates

Much to the dismay of most students and the delight of many parents, it is time for area schools to begin a new school year.

Wayne Public Schools will be the first to begin with classes getting underway on Thursday, Aug. 14.

Classes begin at 8:10 a.m. at each of the three buildings. Elementary students will be dismissed at 3:25 each day and middle and high school students are dismissed at

The district will once again be dismissing at 2 p.m. on Mondays for staff inser-

New faces in the district include Lisa Meyer, who will be teaching kindergarten at Wayne Elementary. Jeanne Brink will be teaching math and science at Wayne Middle School. The district is also in the process of hiring a paraprofessional at Wayne Elementary School.

A number of staff duty changes have taken place in all three buildings.

At Allen Community Schools, students will begin the year on Thursday, Aug. 21, with classes running from 8:15 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. Breakfast and lunch will be served on the first day.

The first full day of classes will be Friday, Aug. 22 with students in session from 8:15 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.

New staff members at Allen Community Schools include a new superintendent, Dr. Katherine Meink; a new principal, Randall Kort; a new K-6 Special Education teacher, Stacie Kingsbury and a new volleyball coach, Cheryl Greve.

The district will be using a new 7-12 Special Education building during the coming year. It is located on the same property as the school.

At Laurel-Concord, students begin classes on Wednesday, Aug. 20 with classes beginning at 8:20 for students in grades K-3 and at 8:10 for students in grades 4-12. On the first and second day of classes,

students will be dismissed at 2 p.m. On Friday, Aug. 22, the regular Friday (2:30 elementary and 2:47 p.m. high school) dismissal time will be followed.

New staff members at Laurel-Concord include Beck Miller and Amber Walters, who will be teaching third grade and Megan Meyer, who will be teaching Vocational Agriculture.

In Wakefield, a flag-raising ceremony on Tuesday, Aug. 19 will be the kick-off for the 2008-09 school year. The ceremony begins at 8:15 a.m.

A "Meet & Greet" will be held Monday, Aug. 18 from 6 to 7 p.m. in which students and parents are being invited to visit classrooms, receive information, deposit money in lunch accounts and ask questions.

New staff in the district include three Wakefield graduates, Timarie Bebee, kindergarten; Brian Johnson, second grade; and Susan Metzler, fifth grade. Other new staff members are Lori Harding, business/computer classes for grades 5-12 and three paraprofessionals, Bree Brown and Donna Johnson in the elementary and Carol Kielty in the media center.

Students at Winside Public School will begin the 2008-09 school year on Monday, Aug. 18.

Kindergarten Night will be held Sunday, Aug. 17 at 7 p.m. It will provide an opportunity for parents and students to get acquainted with the school and classroom.

Registration for new students will take place on Tuesday, Aug. 12 between 9 and 11:30 a.m. Only students new to the district will need to be involved in this registration process.

There are new staff members at Winside this year.

Tim Manzer will be teaching sciences classes; Mike Reichmuth will be teaching social studies and Tara Groene will be teaching elementary P.E. All three teachers will also have some coaching duties.

Suggestions offered to be 'Energy Wise'

Editor's note: This is the sixth in a series Because for 70 percent of the winter, offered by the City of Wayne.

Today's energy costs are rising, and there is something you can do about it.

For some homes, up to 50 percent of the energy used is for heating and cooling. Fortunately, there are options to minimize this expense.

What is a heat pump?

When you drive by a house, you can't tell if the heating/cooling equipment is a heat pump or an air conditioner - they look the same, are connected to the furnace the same way, perform the same in the summer in terms of cooling and efficiency. However, heat pumps are also able to heat in the winter and deliver 200-300 percent efficiency.

Why does this matter?


of articles on saving energy that is being the heat pump is able to heat the home by itself. When it gets really cold, the thermostat senses the heat pump needs help and it cycles the electric or gas furnace with it to heat the home. All this is done automatically by simply setting the thermostat to 'heat.'

Why do you care?

Based on today's electric and fossil fuel costs, an average home can save \$300-\$400 a year in heating costs because the heat pump is so efficient. For the majority of the winter, homes are heated with a system that is 200-300 percent efficient rather than the normal 80-95 percent efficiency of a fossil fuel furnace.

The suspect email claims to come from an individual who has been paid to terminate the life of the receiver of the email. The sender offers to spare the recipients' life for a fee. The amount of the fee can vary, but is usually thousands.



Sales tax issue to be on the ballot

Wayne residents will vote on whether or not to continue the onecent city sales tax following action taken at Tuesday's meeting of the Wayne City Council.

For several months work has been done to develop a plan and work on ballot language on the

The present city sales tax, which is being used to pay for the construction of the Community Activity Center, is set to expire in 2009.

Approval by the voters of the tax would extend the tax for 15 years, to June 30, 2024.

The division of the tax money was also discussed. Approximately \$50,000 per year would be designated to the street department, as required by state law. The remain ing money would be split, with 60 percent going to capital improvements of over \$5,000 in initial costs and having a useful life expectancy of more than seven years. The remaining 40 percent would be used to fund economic activities under the Wayne Economic Development Program using LB840 guidelines.

The second question facing voters will be whether or not the city should establish an economic development program by appropriating funds to create jobs and generate employment opportunities.

The sales tax question is scheduled to be on the Nov. 4 general election ballot.

In other action, the council accepted a bid for razing of property at 509 Nebraska Street. The owner of the property has been given a deadline and an extension to make the necessary repairs.

The bid from Benscoter Construction was accepted with council members noting that if a buyer for the property can be found, an extension could be granted for making the necessary improvements to the property.

Several council members questioned the bid process for demolition of the property and the process the city goes through before arriving at this point.

ing Tuesday's meeting. Council member Doug Sturm told the council that he had received several phone calls in connection with the city's plan to implement a new parking ordinance on Oct. 1 of this year.

Sturm told the council and those in attendance that the council's goal was to "make the town look


The CDA also approved the terms of sale for lots in Western Ridge II. Discussion was held on a potential apartment project on Windom Street and the request for TIF

In April of 1903 three acres of land was purchased at the cost of \$50 per acre. That year the members built and dedicated the present school house, which served as a house of worship until 1913.

In February of 1913 the congregation voted to construct a new church building. This was completed by Nov. 23, 1913 when a dedication ceremony was held. The cost of the construction was \$5,785.40. The church had no basement or kitchen, only a basement dug to house the coal furnace. Coal-oil chandeliers served as lights until 1940 when electric lights were installed in the church and parsonage.

The congregation used the German language for the school and orders of worship until 1918 when English was introduced, due to World War I. The pastors taught school five days a week until it was decided to phase out the school as a means of educating the children and work towards a Sunday School which was organized in 1925.

Through its early history, the congregation grew and flourished. Old customs were replaced by new. The German language began to fade out in the 1940's. The Rev. Emil Boelling, who served the congregation for 32 years (1922 -1954), translated the church's constitution into English in 1933. In 1935 he also implemented the envelope system as a new way to gather offerings.

For many years services were held twice a month in German. In May of 1952 the German services were discontinued.

In 1964 the church's interior was remodeled with wood paneling and acoustical tile on the ceiling installed. In 1975, in preparation for the church's 75th anniversary, new red carpet was installed in the church. The school house was completely renovated at that time also.

New entrance doors were donated and installed in 1980. In 1993 two new gas furnaces were installed in the church and in 1994 a donation was made to pad the pews. New ceiling tile was installed in the balcony in 1998.

In the church's first 100 years of existence, there were 749 baptisms, 722 confirmations, 186 weddings and 223 funerals.

A total of 15 pastors have served the church in its 106 year history.



Fluellen named NSIC South Preseason Player of the Year

Wildcats picked third in NSIC South Division Coaches Poll

The Wayne State College football team was recently picked to finish third in the South Division and seventh overall in the 2008 Northern Sun Intercollegiate Conference preseason football coaches poll that was released by the NSIC on August 4.

The NSIC which expanded to a 14-team league on July 1 will have two seven-team divisions in football (North and South) this season with a 10-game league schedule.


Each team within the NSIC will play 10 conference games that will count towards the NSIC Overall Champion as well as six divisional games that will count towards the NSIC North and South Division Championships.

In the South Division poll, WSC received 25 points and trailed the defending league champion Winona State (35 points) and Minnesota State with 29 points. Rounding out the seven-team South Division poll was Augustana (23), Concordia-St. Paul (17), Southwest Minnesota State (10) and Upper Iowa (8).

In the overall NSIC football coaches poll, WSC was picked seventh out of 14 teams with 109 points.

Division preseason favorite Minnesota Duluth was chosen as the overall league favorite with seven first-place votes and 151 points while Winona State finished second with four first place votes and 148 points.

Minnesota State was selected third overall with 141 points and received three first-place votes. Augustana was picked fourth overall with 127 points and was followed by St. Cloud State (120), the University of Mary (116) and WSC

Bemidiji State was selected to finish eighth in the overall league poll with 96 points and was followed by Concordia-St. Paul (76), Northern State (60), Southwest Minnesota State (46), MSU Moorhead (37), Upper Iowa (32) and Minnesota, Crookston (15).

In addition to the preseason coaches poll that was announced, WSC junior quarterback Silas Fluellen was selected by coaches as the NSIC South Division Offensive Preseason Player of the Year.

Last season, the Bellevue West graduate threw for 2,828 yards and 21 touchdowns and completed 216 of 381 passes while averaging 235.7 passing yards per game to rank seventh in the NSIC. Fluellen also rushed for another

324 yards and four touchdowns on the ground to rank fifth in the NSIC in total offense per game. The Wildcats finished the 2007

season with a 7-5 mark, which was the first winning record for a WSC 7. Upper Iowa

football squad since 1995.

The 'Cats finished second in the NSIC with a 7-2 league record, despite their fifth place prediction by the coaches, and went on to represent the NSIC at the Mineral Water Bowl, which was only the second post-season appearance in 91 years of WSC football.

WSC will open the 2008 season at Nebraska-Kearney on Saturday, August 30 at noon.



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

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

Capitol View

'Now' and 'then' in regard to support

It is a matter of history. Promises from presidential candidates come in two sizes, those being "Now" and "Then."

"Now" applies to now. Promises flow from presumptive candidates in what seems like the endless campaign toward the November election. The flow will go uninterrupted until one of them puts a hand on the Bible in January, promising to do his best to "preserve, protect and defend the Constitution of the United States."

When the oath is out of the way, all previous promises shift into the "then" category.

You know the deal. "That was then, and this is now.'

This tradition generally applies to elections from the local to the national. It simply gets more attention when the winner is the nation's chief executive.

Now, then. About this corn-based ethanol business.

In a 2000 bid for the Republican nomination for president, Sen. John McCain opposed federal subsidies for the ethanol industry and its product. He said it wasn't a practical source of alternative energy since it was a net energy loser. He skipped the Iowa caucuses, figuring it would be futile in the nation's leading corn-growing

However, early this year McCain saw the light, or something, and endorsed ethanol. Corn growers were happy. But in a June speech in California, his ardor seemed to have cooled.

"Corn-based ethanol, thanks to the money and influence of lobby-

ists, has been a case study in the law of unintended consequences," McCain said on June 23. He simultaneously knocked tariffs on Brazil's sugar-cane based ethanol.

"The result is that Americans take the financial hit coming and going," McCain told the California audience. "As taxpayers, we foot the bill for the enormous subsidies paid to corn producers. And as consumers, we pay extra at the pump because of government barriers to cheaper products from abroad."

Enter Sen. Barack Obama, hailing from Illinois, the nation's second-largest corn-growing state. Some critics have accused the Democrat of being a shill for the ethanol industry. However, Obama responded in

April to a question this way: "Look, I've been a strong ethanol supporter because Illinois ... is a major corn producer."

Folks here in the Cornhusker state are currently reassured by both campaigns that ethanol continues to be looked upon favorably. This is "now."

January will be "then."

Sometime thereafter, corn growers will learn whether a continued presidential endorsement of ethanol will be refined, and whether corn will continue to be a major part of it, compared with the sugarcane and/or switch grass varieties, both of which have their own advantages and disadvantages.

That's it for now. January is coming. We'll talk more then.

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Now Accepting Larger IRA Contributions

Research shows that many people approaching retirement lack confidence that they have saved enough to live comfortably once they retire. In addition, a significant number of today's retirees are discovering, too late, that they don't have as much money as they had hoped. According to the 2008 Retirement Confidence Survey conducted by the Employee Benefit Research Institute (EBRI), only 26 percent of current retirees are very confident that they were financially prepared for that stage of life. Rising contribution limits

If you are determined to put more money away to help build a more secure retirement, recent changes in contribution limits allow you to do so. The maximum individual contribution to an IRA in 2008 has risen to \$5,000 tion for those worried about (from \$4,000 in 2007), or 100 percent of earned income, whichever is less. That means a married couple can saving vehicles, such as IRAs save up to \$10,000 in an IRA in 2008.

In addition, individuals 50

most concerned about their pending retirement, can add another \$1,000 in "catch-up" contributions starting in 2008. So a couple, age 50 or older, can potentially invest up to \$12,000 in their IRAs this year.






K-9 unit demonstration was new feature of Wayne County Fair

The K-9 unit dogs are bred in Germany and purchased in responds to around 20 calls à Arizona. The officers are trained by month in Norfolk.

New to the Wayne County Fair the Nebraska State Patrol and are internationally certified K-9 handlers. They train with the dogs at the State patrol academy for 14 weeks and then they train weekly for eight hours to maintain training. Officers give commands to their dogs in German.

The officers and their dogs are available 24 hours a day. They assist all other law enforcement agencies in the area of Norfolk as often as needed. The K-9 unit




