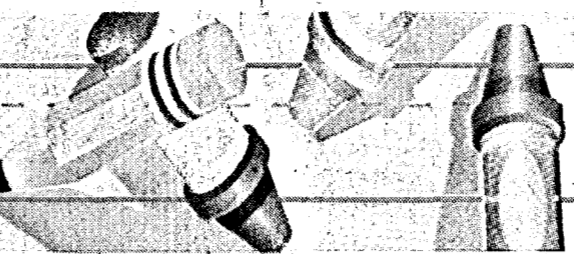


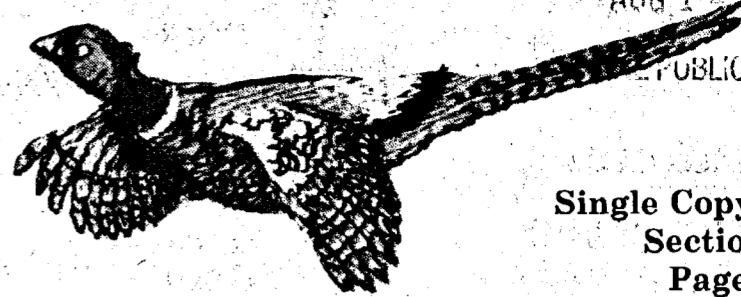

VA offers clinic for Wayne area Veterans

In a unique outreach initiative, the VA Nebraska-Western Iowa Health Care System is offering medical and psychiatric care to returning combat veterans right in their own backyard. VA staff will travel to Wayne to provide a rural outreach "mobile" clinic for veterans. The VA Rural Outreach Clinic will be held at the National Guard Armory in Wayne on Aug. 18 from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.

This pilot VA Rural Outreach Clinic has been established in Wayne to reach out to the returning combat veterans from Operation Iraqi Freedom and Operation Enduring Freedom (OIF/OEF). Although

the focus is the newly returning veterans, the clinic is open to all veterans. Veterans living in Wayne and surrounding areas can receive care for medical and psychiatric symptoms at the Rural Outreach Clinic.

Veterans are encouraged to schedule their appointment in advance by calling (402) 480-1801. The VA Rural Outreach Clinic in Wayne will provide help with enrollment for health care, full history and physicals, mental health assessments, lab work, and clinical care. If needed, appointments will be set up for specialty care referrals to VA facilities at Omaha, Lincoln or Grand Island.

Weatherize your home and use less energy

Editor's note: This is the seventh in a series of articles on saving energy that is being offered by the City of Wayne.

One of the most cost-effective ways to improve energy efficiency is by properly sealing and insulating a home.

According to ENERGY STAR®, a nationwide energy efficiency program sponsored jointly by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency and the U.S. Department of Energy, homeowners can realize a potential savings of up to 20 percent on heating and cooling costs (or up to 10 percent on

their total annual energy bill) by improving the sealing and insulation of a home.

First, help make your house weather-tight. Many air leaks and drafts in the home are easy to find because they are easy to feel - like those around windows and doors. Other leaks may take some hunting to find - like holes hidden in attics, basements and crawl spaces. Sealing any of these leaks with caulk, spray foam or weather stripping will have a great impact on improving your comfort and reducing utility bills.

After any home sealing project, have a heating and cooling technician check to make sure your combustion appliances (gas- or oil-fired furnace, water heater and clothes dryer) are venting properly.

Here's a good rule of thumb - don't scrimp on the insulation. Insulation helps keep your home warm in winter and cold in summer.

There are several common types of insulation - fiberglass (in both batt and blown forms), cellulose, rigid foam board and spray foam. When correctly installed with air sealing, each type of insulation can deliver comfort and lower energy bills during the hottest and coldest times of the year.

To get the biggest savings, the easiest place to add insulation is usually in the attic. A quick way to see if you need more insulation is to look across your uncovered attic floor. If your insulation is level with or below the attic floor joists, you probably need to add more insulation.

Leafy Spurge inducted into 2008 Nebraska Music Hall of Fame

The Leafy Spurge band was recently inducted into the 2008 Nebraska Music Hall of Fame. The induction took place Aug. 1 during the Nebraska Rocks Country celebration held at Karl Stefan Memorial Airport in Norfolk. The Nebraska Rocks Country celebration was added to the annual Nebraska Rocks concert, which highlights Nebraska and Norfolk-area musicians. The event was part of the Hot Summer Nites Rod Run, a national-level car show.

Jim Casey is founder of the Nebraska Rocks and the Nebraska Music Hall of Fame. In his early years, Casey was a member of the local Smoke Ring band.

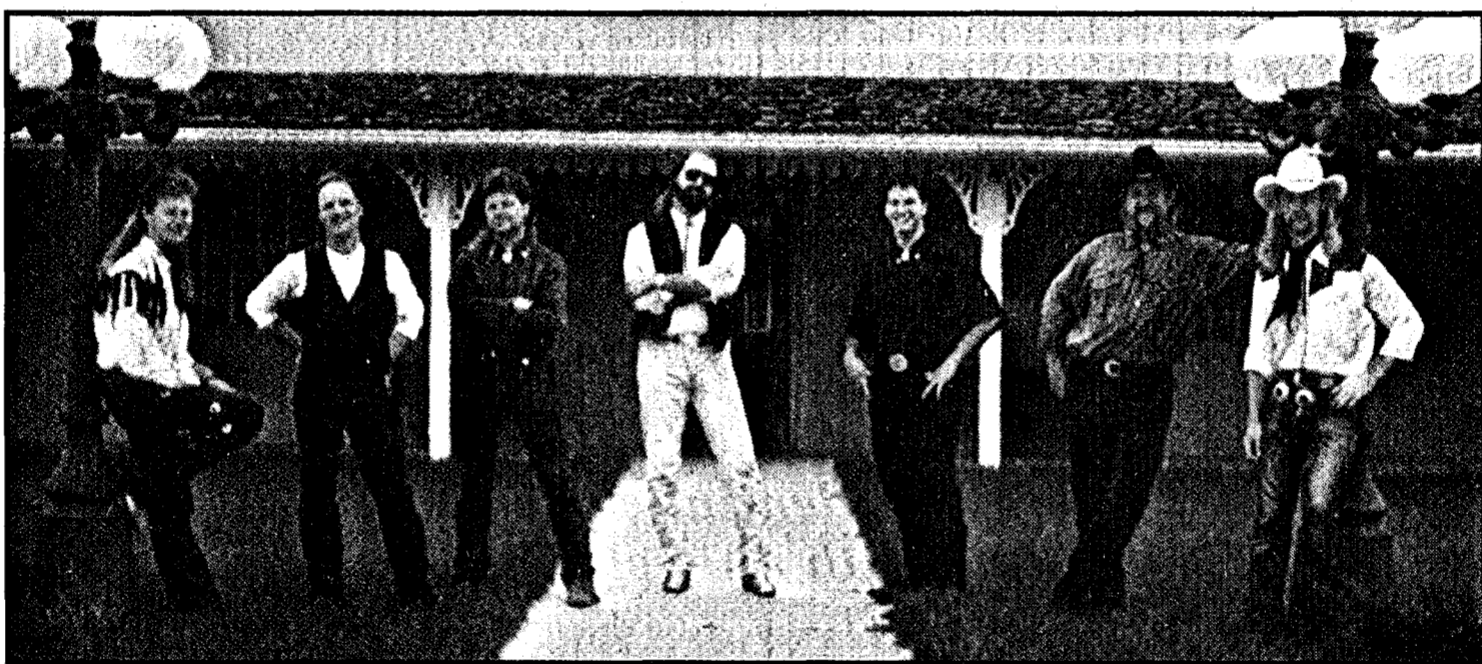
Looking back at the history of the Leafy Spurge Band, brothers Dick, Dave and Jim Broders grew up in Belden. "Wild" Bill Ueding, an old honky tonker, had bought the local bar. He played his guitar and told stories about playing music in bars, in dance halls and about "almost" making "the big time." It was the kind of stories that sparks an interest in young men who are looking for excitement. The Broders boys were already influenced by the music of Hank Sr., Johnny Cash, Bob Wills and Texas Playboys; thus the journey in music began.

Dick, the oldest of the brothers, began learning licks on the guitar from old Bill songs like "Walking the Floor Over You" by Ernest Tub and "Your Cheatin' Heart" by Hank Sr. and "All Around the Water Tank" by Woody Guthrie. Younger brother, Dave, had always dreamed of being a country singer and would hang out hoping to get a chance to play but he was just an 11-year-old kid, five years younger than Dick. The year was 1969.

But Dave also got his chance to play on one of the old vintage Fender Stratocaster guitars that Wild Bill had and both brothers learned fast. After awhile, Dick, decided to take up the bass guitar and they formed a band with one of their friends, Paul Huetig, on the drums and Roger Pedersen on another guitar. It was 1973 and the Leafy Spurge Band was sprouting. Influenced by new music such as the Rolling Stones and Bob Dylan, as well as southern rock bands like Marshall Tucker and Charlie Daniels, their music took on a new flavor.

In a small way, the band was becoming a part of the music scene in northeast Nebraska and became influenced by more established bands like Jim Casey, Young Country, Bill Legate and the Roving Cowboys, The Red Willow Band, with Chris Gage and Kenny Putnum and a host of players and singers from the Norfolk area like Bernie Kvamme, Warren Frerichs, Nick Leland, Bob Letheby, Robert Lewis and others. The outlaw movement with Willie and Waylon, Jerry Jeff Walker and Steve Earl all played a part in the evolving sound of the band.

The band went through a number of

players, Pedersen left the band and was replaced by a close friend, Cary Pflanz, and the drummers came and went," Dave Broders said. (Grandpa) Willie Burnham came to the bar in Belden and offered the band a place to live, all they could eat and a full-time job as the house band at the Cotton Wood Inn, a road house bar and grill with a dance hall in the back and windows that opened all the way down on both sides.

Dave added that Willie Burnham was an old horn player of national notoriety back in the big band days of the 1920s and 30s. Old Willie was a good promoter and had a plan to build the band's popularity.

From 1976-1978, the band played nearly every weekend to crowds of young fans overflowing into the parking lot and into after hour parties. Willie arranged a meeting with the brothers and drummer, Steve Lange (pronounced Long). Lange had a rock and roll background and had just left the band, Stinger.

The band remained the same until Pflanz left in 1983. Terry Butterfield of Norfolk joined the group in 1984 as a guitarist. "Buck," as he was known to the band, was a fine picker with the ability to produce licks behind the vocals. The boys were making a lot of new fans.

During the 80s, Dave Broders began to write music for the band, which added original songs and the fans loved it.

In 1984, the band met David Sherry, who sat in at a gig in Wayne to play some harp with them. Sherry joined as a full-time member in 1989. In 1991, the band took on another full-time member when Rick Ohm of Sioux City, Iowa, joined. Ohm had worked for seven years for the rock band, Rage. Ohm has been sound engineer for three Hall of Fame bands: two from Iowa:

The Bonesteel Band and The Board of Directors, and The Leafy Spurge.

In 1992, the Spurge was joined by Jason Clark of Mason City, Iowa on the fiddle. "Clarky," as the band called him, was a two time Iowa State Champion and a one-time South Dakota state champion fiddler. Jason was a third generation violinist.

Sadly, Clark died at his home in Mason City in 2006.

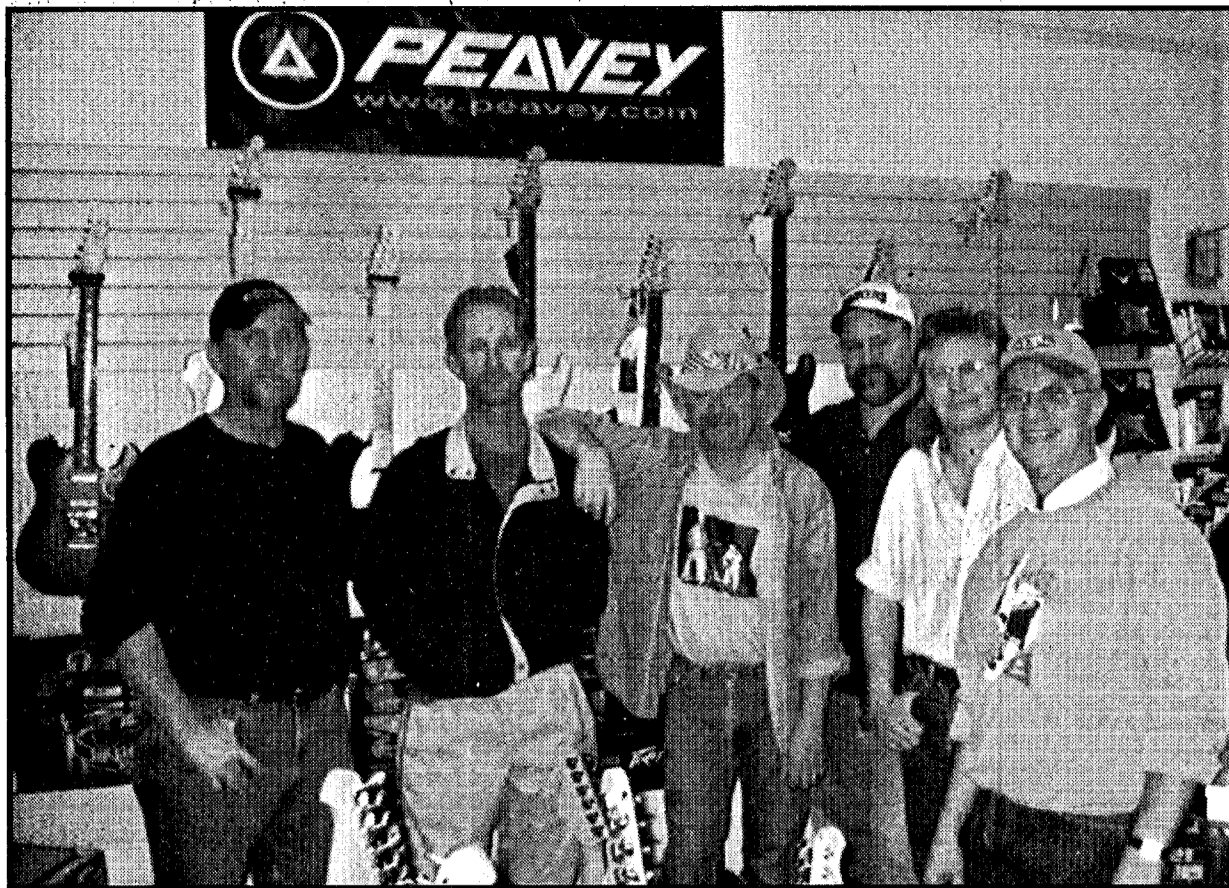
Also in 1992, the band added one more member, veteran pianist Merle Pithan, who started his musical journey when he was 11 and at 13 formed his own band, the "Bell

Boys." As for the Broders brothers, Dick, as well as becoming a solid bass player, has always been manager of the band behind the scenes. Dave was the singer, song writer and front man for the band, as well as largely responsible for the repertoire. The band reunites periodically for special events and members of the band perform as solo, duet or trio. Through the years, The Leafy Spurge Band has opened shows for numerous national acts such as Johnny Cash, Merle Haggard, Willy Nelson, Toby Keith, Marshall Tucker Band, Charlie Daniels Band, Joe Diffy, Tracey Lawrence, Pam Tillis and Asleep at the Wheel for their last opening appearance. The band also appeared before three-time entertainers of the year Brooks and Dunn.

Jim was the youngest of seven children, four sisters and three

brothers. He too had a love for music and the stage. Six years younger than Dave and 10 years younger than Dick, the age difference kept him from joining the band for a long time.

"Jim always had a bold personality even as a child and was never shy," Dave said. "He could spin a tail as well as the old men at the bar by the time he was 10. It seemed he remembered every cliché he had ever heard, every joke, every simile, he was destined to entertain."

Dave added that his mother, Lillian Broders died when Jim was only five years old and his father was gone a lot. The brothers were always doing the band thing.

"I think he craved attention," Dave said. "Jim learned fast to play guitar and sing. At 16, Jim started his own band, The Oiler Brothers. After his band disbanded, Jim got a call from Bill Legate and the Roving Cowboys to play lead guitar. Later he and his friend, Kvamme

with The Tarance County Ballroom Allstars toured in Canada, the Rocky Mountains, Oklahoma, Kansas and South Dakota."

Off and on through the years, he played with his brothers in the Spurge band but Jim had a restless spirit and left for Austin, Texas with his future wife, Julie. There, he had success with his band, Jim Broders and the Cactus County Band. After 11 years, Jim and his family returned to Nebraska where he rejoined the Spurge. Again, he branched out and started the Lonesome Walker Band. He, too, wrote songs. On June 19, 2003, Jim died of a heart aneurism in Saint Paul, Minn. at the age of 39 years.

Thinking of the legacy of the "Spurge," and their induction into the 2008 Nebraska Music Hall of Fame, the band joins other performers who have made significant contributions to the music industry.

Ideas discussed at recent Q125 meeting

The Wayne Q125 committee met on Tuesday. The meeting was called to order by Tony Kochenash. He brought up some items that were discussed at the last meeting. Deb Dickey and Ruth Smith had attended last time and asked how churches could be involved in the Q125 celebration. It was also stated that if a location could be found for a mural, Mrs. Jackson, Wayne High School art teacher and her students, could paint a mural to commemorate the event.

Tom and Pat Cook discussed having the Nebraska Humanities Council chautauqua in Wayne. Towns interested in having it must make proposals by Oct. 1, 2008. It was noted there was a chautauqua in Wayne at the fairgrounds in 1992. The 2009 chautauqua is scheduled for June 18-21 or June 25-28 and runs for five days. The theme for the upcoming chautauqua is built around America in the 30s. Towns wanting to have the chautauqua have to pay \$5,000 and unless there's a grant or donations, that may not be possible.

Ken Liska said the Wayne fair board meets in September and he will try to be on their agenda to see if getting an antique auto, machinery, tractor show at the fairgrounds is a possibility.

Kochenash said the Wayne Herald will run a monthly historical supplement during 2009. A question was asked if historical columns could be included each time.

Jane O'Leary stated oral history is important and needs to be recorded. Sandy Bartling, who was at the meeting to discuss Elderfest, said their committee has recorded stories from 60-80 people. Steve Gross mentioned that if more help is needed on this project, service learning at WSC may be able to help. He added that if more historical stories are needed, not to forget the younger generation as many have stories from their grandparents that should be shared.

Bartling told the committee Elderfest could reflect Wayne's Q125 and asked what they would like to see.

Kochenash showed the committee the Q125 logo that Copy Write Publishing had made and asked what everyone thought of it. O'Leary asked if it was alright if she spoke to them about some ideas for changes. Kochenash noted he will be talking to city council next week and would like to have some things ready to show.

It was noted the Q125 logo could be a possibility for the Elderfest quilt.

The Q125 committee designation and officers were approved. Officers

are: Tony Kochenash, chair; Curt Frye, vice president; Lynn Sievers, secretary and Galen Wisner, treasurer.

Discussed was having an evening parade rather than during the day and possibly on a Saturday rather than a Friday so it didn't interfere with football games.

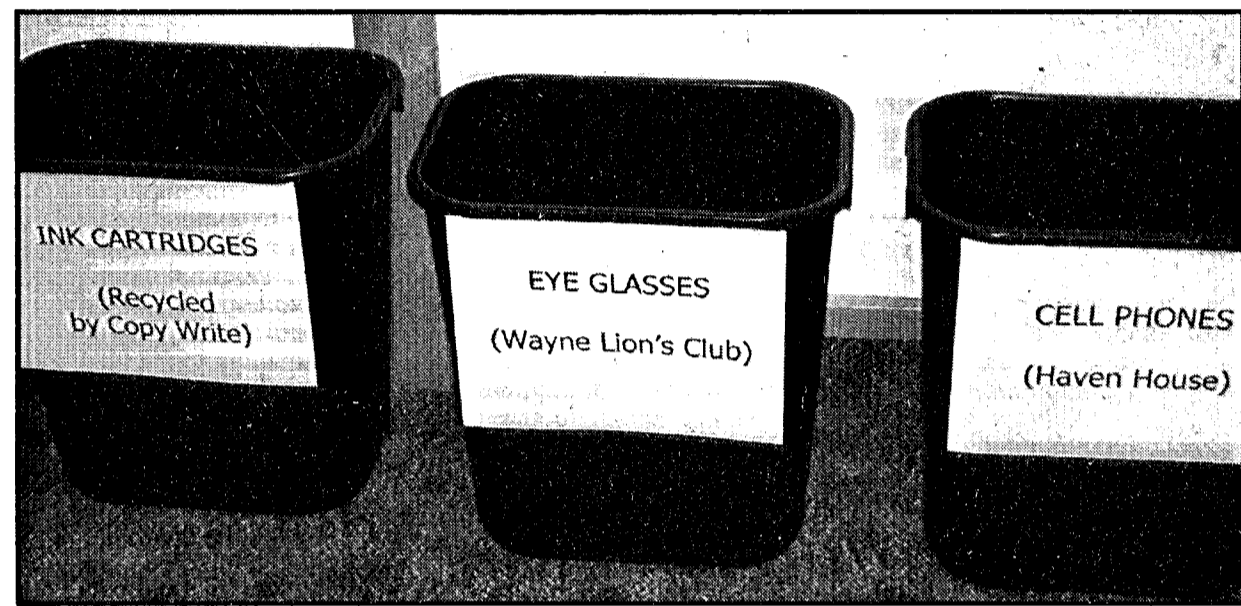
Marie Mohr brought up the idea of having an all-school reunion/banquet and wondered what everyone thought about that.

Also discussed were organizations having Q125 fundraisers and the Q125 committee receiving a portion of the profits for advertising purposes. O'Leary noted the Chicken Show committee years ago asked 10 percent but did accept in-kind services instead.

Rita McLean of the Wayne Public Library showed calendar pages with important dates through the 125 years of Wayne. She noted the library wanted to sell the calendars the end of 2008 as a fundraiser for Q125. She asked the committee if they should proceed with the project.

The Q125 committee approved the June Garden Walk proposal by the Plant Market.

The next meeting of the Q125 committee will be on Tuesday, Sept. 9 at 7 p.m. in the south meeting room of the Wayne auditorium. The public is invited to attend.

The Walk is scheduled from 2 to 5 p.m. and will include six stops with information being shared about the lives of those people and events happening within the community at that particular time.

Organizers are working with local actors who will share the lives of early Wayne settlers. The graves of the 'spirits' chosen for this year's

walk are located in close proximity to each other, limiting the amount of walking that will be necessary. For those needing assistance, golf carts will be available to transport from one location to another.

"The cemetery is filled with living history, and although that history is open to interpretation, we would like to share it with the community," said Steve Gross, one of the organizers of the event.

More than 100 people attended last year's Spirit Walk, which included histories on Fr. William Kearns (1873-1952), Mrs. Emma (Wendel) Baker (1956-1954), William "Sailor Bill" Fitzpatrick

(1894-1971), Walter (1882-1949) and Mabel (1884-1989) Savidge, Dr. James M. Pile (1857-1919), Henry Ley (1850-1924), John T. Bressler (1849-1935), George Heady (1850-1937), Amilia Hughs (1836-1894), Angie Miller (1870-1884) and Nels Nelson (1857-1955).

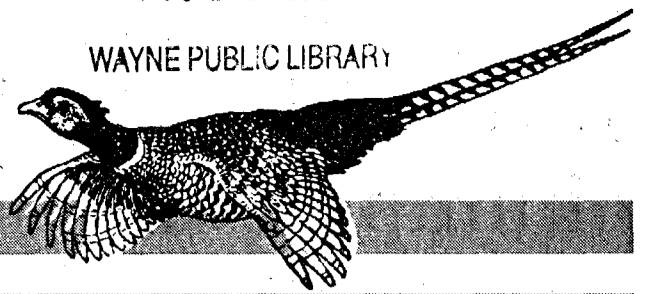
Cost for the event is \$5 for adults and \$3 for children. Proceeds will go toward various cemetery improvement projects.

Defensive woes wreck Wayne's weekend in Blair

Looking to build upon an already rich tradition of Wayne High School girls' softball, several current and future Bluedevils recently took part in the 2008 Nebraska Freshmen State Tournament that was held in Blair on Aug. 8-10.

"This was a great tournament for our youngsters," Wayne head coach Rob Sweetland said. "The competition was solid and it was an eye opening experience for our underclassmen."

In game one of the three day tournament, Wayne defeated the Blair Purple 4-3 on Aug. 8.

Guiding Wayne to the come from behind win was Second Team Class B All-Freshmen Caitlin Fehringer who drove in a game tying run and later scored upon a Lindsay Frahm single late in the game.

While it was Fehringer and Frahm who directed the Bluedevils' offense, it was teammate Cassy Miller who saw extensive time on the pitcher's mound where she was credited with the pitching win.

Following the narrow win over Blair, Wayne returned to action on Aug. 9, where they were downed by Gretna 8-3.

"We gave Gretna too many outs in this game," Sweetland said. "We also left numerous runners on base, including the bases loaded in the last inning."

Offensively, Tia Jech who later earned Class B Honorable Mention, shined in the loss with a flawless three hit performance while Fehringer added a triple and run scored.

Despite Wayne's efforts on offense, it was the defense that succumbed to Gretna as the Bluedevils' allowed five runs in the third inning and saw Miller earn the loss on the mound.

CAC to sponsor \$2 Mondays

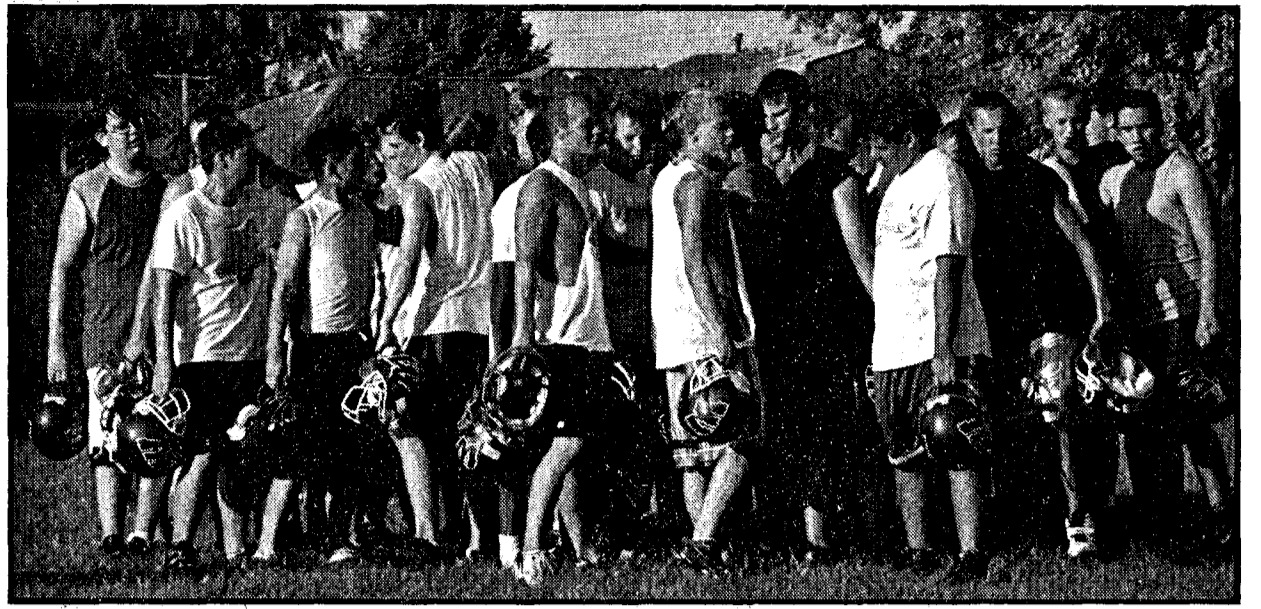
The Wayne Community Activity Center (CAC) will be sponsoring \$2 Mondays for Wayne students throughout the school year.

Western Iowa are eligible to participate.

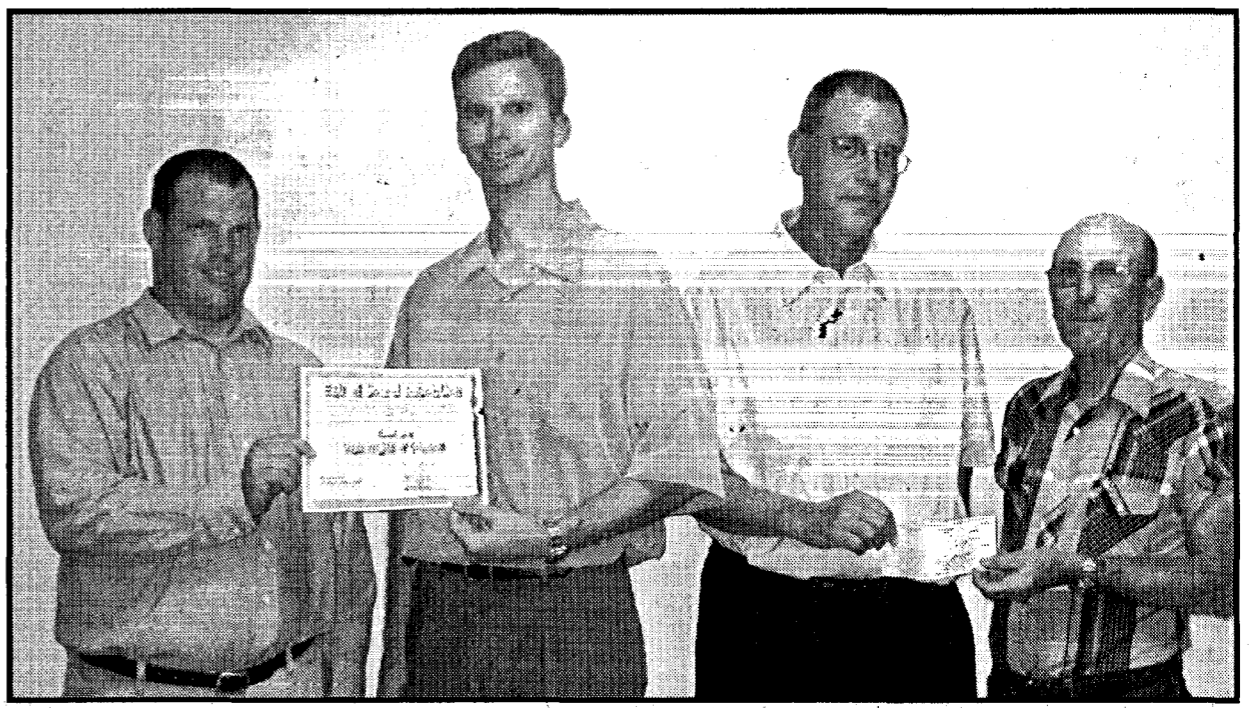

Part-time evening classes at NECC can lead to diploma or degree

Prepare for a rewarding, full-time career by attending classes on a part-time basis at Northeast Community College in Norfolk. For the busy individual working a full-time job, the business, math and technology division at Northeast will offer several evening classes when the new semester begins Monday, Aug. 18.

Those interested in a career as a drafter can begin work on an associate of applied science degree by enrolling in a three-credit Microcomputer Application class or a four-credit Architectural Drafting class. The Microcomputer Applications class meets on Monday evenings while the drafting class meets on Tuesday and Thursday evenings.

Several classes for an administrative assistant degree or diploma will be offered in the evening this fall at Northeast Community College. They include the three-credit-hour Microsoft Word I, Online, Intermediate Keyboarding, Accounting I, Business English, and Excel Spreadsheet Applications. A one-credit hour Microsoft PowerPoint and Web Page Development Online class can also be applied to an administrative assistant diploma or degree.

Work for the Microsoft Word I Online class must be completed between Aug. 18 and Dec. 17. The Web Page Development Online class begins Monday, Oct. 13, and must be completed by Dec. 17. The Accounting I and Excel Spreadsheet Applications class meets Monday evenings, the Microsoft PowerPoint and Business English classes meet Tuesday evenings, and the Intermediate Keyboarding class meets on Thursday evening.

Students can also begin working on a new certificate program at Northeast, Visual Programming for Personal Computers, by enrolling in the Programming in Visual Basic class that meets Tuesdays

and Thursday evenings this fall semester. The class is a five-credit-hour class.

"This certificate option is specifically designed for those who want to update their skills in today's rapidly changing environment of visual personal computer programming," John Blaylock, dean of business, math and technology, said. "This PC programming certificate option is also ideal for those who want to learn entry-level programming skills so they can change occupations."

Those wishing to upgrade their current skills by working on a Computer Application Specialist Certificate can enroll in three-credit-hour evening classes like Excel Spreadsheet Applications or Dreamweaver, Flash and Fireworks. The spreadsheet applications class meets on Mondays while the Dreamweaver class meets Wednesday evenings. Another one-credit-hour class, Microsoft PowerPoint, meets Tuesday evenings from September 9-October 7 and can be applied to the specialist certificate.

"A computer application specialist certificate assures an employer that the certified individual has a strong desire to upgrade skills to become an even better employee," said Paul Brown, associate dean of the division. "The certificate implies dedication and ambition to become better at one's job."

Northeast Community College will also offer two evening classes this fall for those interested in pursuing a real estate license. The three-credit-hour Real Estate Principles and Practices class meets on Monday evenings from August 18-December 17 while the three-credit Real Estate Law class meets Tuesday evenings this fall semester.

NECC governor gets 100 percent on project

In the world of academia, a perfect score of 100 percent on any assignment, project or test is much sought after and only occasionally attained. But that is exactly what Northeast Community College Governor John Winkleblack, Tilden, got on a recent project. Winkleblack volunteered to solicit pledges from the Northeast Board of Governors for the proposed University of Nebraska Medical Center (UNMC) College of Nursing Northern Division on the campus of Northeast Community College.

"It gives me great pleasure to report that fully 100 percent of our Governors back this proposal with not only their words, but their hard-earned money too," he said recently.

Winkleblack, general manager and co-owner of Greenline Equipment in Norfolk, Plainview, and Neligh, has served on the Northeast Board since 2001. He represents the Fifth District of Northeast's 20-county service area, which includes all of Madison County.

He has also served as a member of Northeast's agriculture program advisory committee and has employed Northeast cooperative internship students in his business.

The UNMC College of Nursing Northern Division would house Northeast's basic nurse aide (commonly called certified nurse aide), licensed practical nursing and associate degree nursing programs and UNMC bachelor's, master's and PhD nursing programs.

"I think the 100 percent commitment speaks volumes about the support our Board of Governors has for this UNMC College of Nursing on the campus of Northeast Community College," Winkleblack said.

According to a feasibility study done for the project, it is estimated there will be a shortfall of 1,216 full-time registered nurses by 2010 and 3,838 full-time registered nurses by 2020 in Nebraska. Northeast Nebraska, with already the fewest RN's, BSN's and advanced practice registered nurses (mastered-level prepared nurses) will be hit particularly hard by this shortage.

The UNMC College of Nursing Northern Division in Norfolk will help alleviate that shortage while providing close-to-home education for students.

Based on the successful completion of a capital campaign to raise

funds for the facility, ground breaking has been tentatively scheduled for 2009. The first classes in the new building are tentatively set to start in the fall of 2010.

The UNMC Facilities Planning and Construction Department projected this joint center would require 34,973 square feet. The total project cost is estimated at \$12,900,000. These funds will be provided by private donors, foundations, and federal appropriations. Northeast Community College will donate the land, valued at \$500,000, for the structure.

A capital campaign to raise the monies was launched in early February with Ron Stauffer, Norfolk, as general campaign chairperson.

"I would love to say that this was a very arduous task," Winkleblack said. "But it really wasn't. Our Board is a visionary board and quickly realized what this proposed project would do to provide improved health care throughout our 20-county area. And Board members will back up their support with their own cash."

"We are extremely pleased with the generous support of the Northeast Board of Governors for this endeavor," Stauffer said. "It just doesn't get any better than 100 percent. I give Governor Winkleblack an A+ for his efforts on this project."

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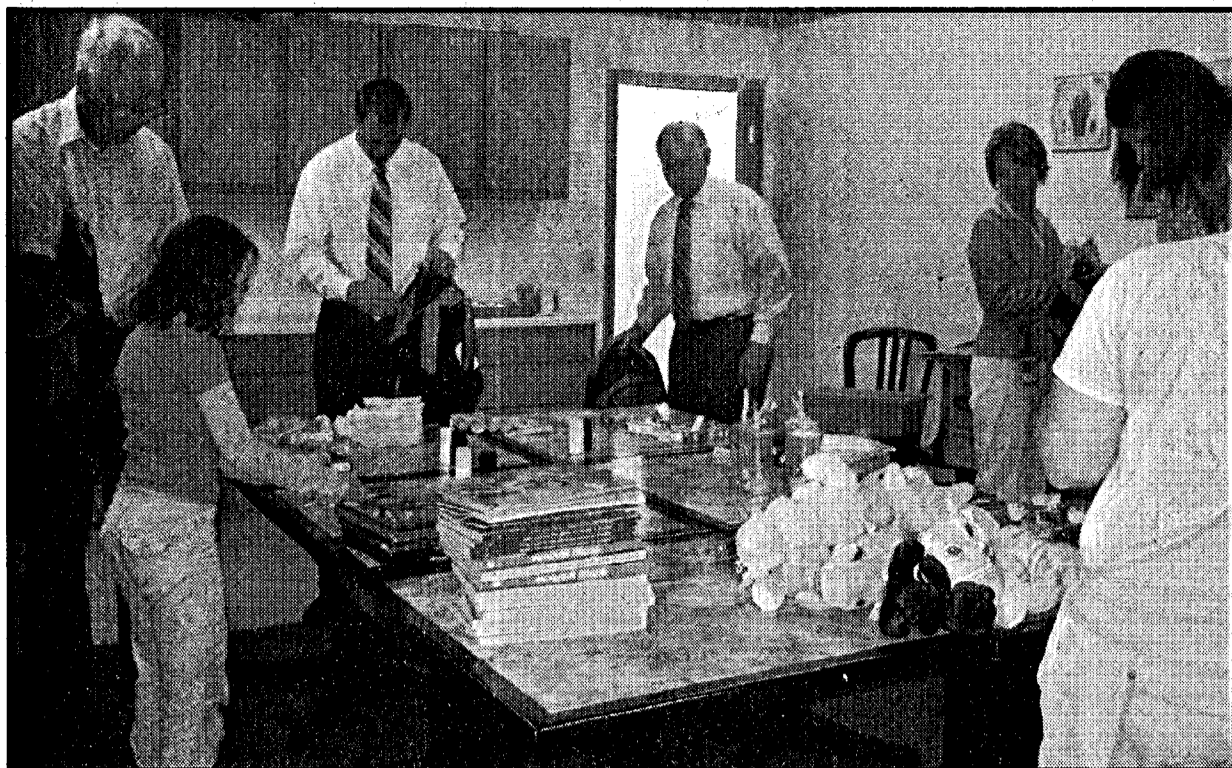
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Donation day

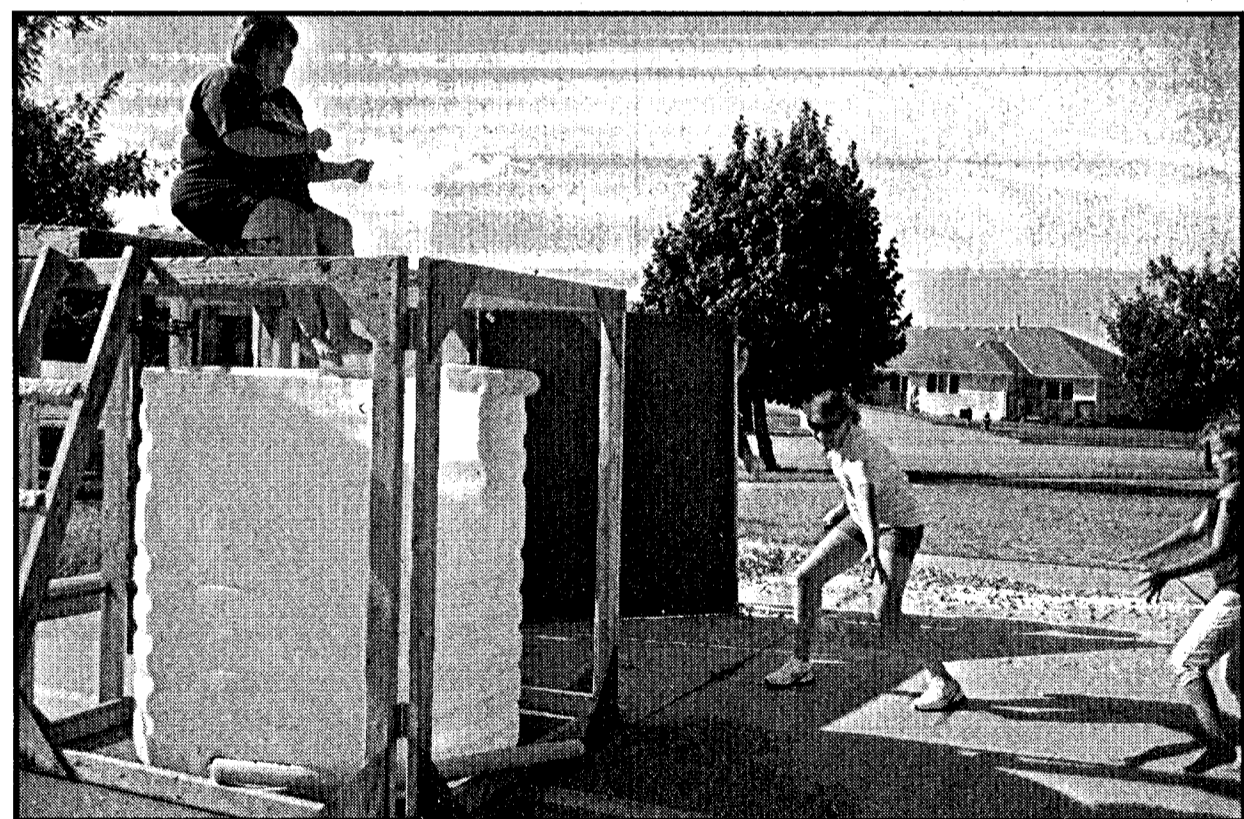

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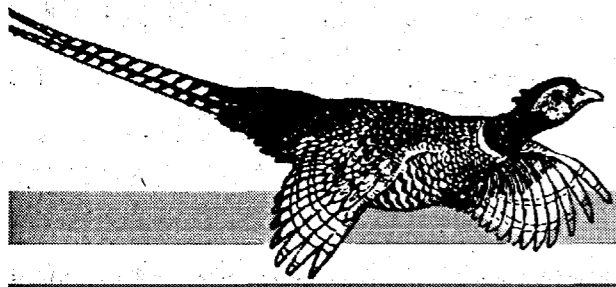

About one year ago, a regular Al-Anon meeting was established at the United Methodist Church of Laurel on Monday evenings at 8 p.m. at 302 Elm Street. Through Alcoholics Anonymous meets at the same time and location, Al-Anon meets separately in the Prayer Room.
I hope to assist in the sponsorship of an Alateen program in the future. This step can be taken only when both Al-Anon meetings become stronger fellowships.
Al-Anon is a world wide fellowship with one purpose: to provide comfort and support to relatives and friends of alcoholics, and to provide understanding and encouragement to the alcoholic. The "12 Steps of Alcoholics Anonymous" are the spiritual guide. Alateen is the same type of fellowship with its focus on the children who are affected by alcoholism.
At an Al-Anon meeting, the sharing of experience, strength and hope assists members in solving common problems. There is no "advice giving," yet through this confidential sharing, attitudes are changed and progress is made in the recovery from the family disease of alcoholism.

Anyone who is troubled by another person's drinking behavior is welcome to attend, whether or not there is an admission of alcoholism. "Many who attend no longer live with active alcoholism, yet feel that their lives have been deeply affected by the disease, or their family's reaction to it. They feel their adult lives have become unmanageable because of the heavy emotional involvement they continue to have with the past." ("A Guide to the Family of the Alcoholic," p. 15).

Anyone wishing to know more about Al-Anon and Alateen is welcome to contact me anytime. My husband succumbed to the effects of alcoholism last October. The "12 Steps" have deepened our faith in God, and given us the courage to keep trying "One Day at a Time."

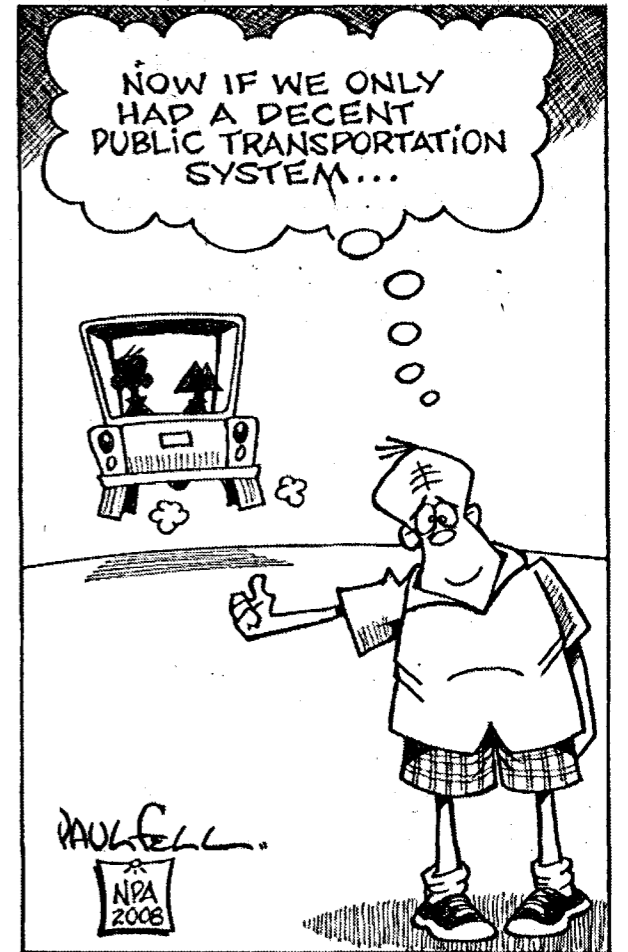
'Filling stations' a thing of the past

The "gas wars" of yesteryear are gone, but it is interesting/amusing to watch some companies try to woo customers with deals on gasoline.
Might we be on the verge of "Free Husker Mug With Every Fill Up!" or something comparable?
Probably not.
But some car manufacturers are offering deals to guarantee potential buyers a specific price on gasoline, based on time and/or mileage criteria. A few companies that sell gasoline are offering modest deals.
Baby boomers remember (depending on the quality of their aging memories) when virtually every major purveyor of gasoline tried to entice consumers with gifts.
Free sets of tumblers were routinely offered with purchases of various sizes. Some offered prizes based on the number of stamps a motorist received, which reflected purchases of gasoline.
Better yet, I pumped gasoline at a Clark station in Ohio where, if an attendant failed to offer to wash a motorist's windshield, the driver was eligible for 1,000 such stamps. On some days, the attendant's failure to offer to wash the windshield and check the oil meant the driver's full purchase was free! "Pump jockeys" who forgot such manners more than once usually found themselves in search of other summer work. (This is the voice of experience talking.)
For the younger among us, "attendants" were guys who came to your car and asked you how much gas you wanted. They pumped the gasoline, and they

washed the windshield and rear window, at least. They asked if they could check your oil and/or the air pressure in your tires. If you qualified, they also brought your prize to you - those glasses, or whatever.
It has been decades since "filling stations" had to do anything but open their doors and wait for the captive audience to show up.
However, if there is going to be a scintilla of competition among the gasoline peddlers, you can bet on which promotion will draw the most Nebraskans.
The guy who offers free Husker glasses, cups, towels, playing cards, toilet tissue or matchbooks (even with smoking in sharp decline) is going to do a little more business on game days, for sure, and probably on most other days.
Some pundits are talking about the possibility, some say likelihood, of Republican Sen. Chuck Hagel delivering the keynote address at the Democratic National Convention.

The Nebraskan was at the right hand of Democratic candidate Barack Obama during the latter's recent overseas tour. Hagel is regarded as a foreign policy wonk - a good one if you agree with him, and a lousy one if you're in step with President Bush.
Hagel, the senator who has voted most often with Bush on legislative matters, has called the Iraq war the biggest foreign policy mistake in the nation's history. That he isn't seeking re-election goes without saying.

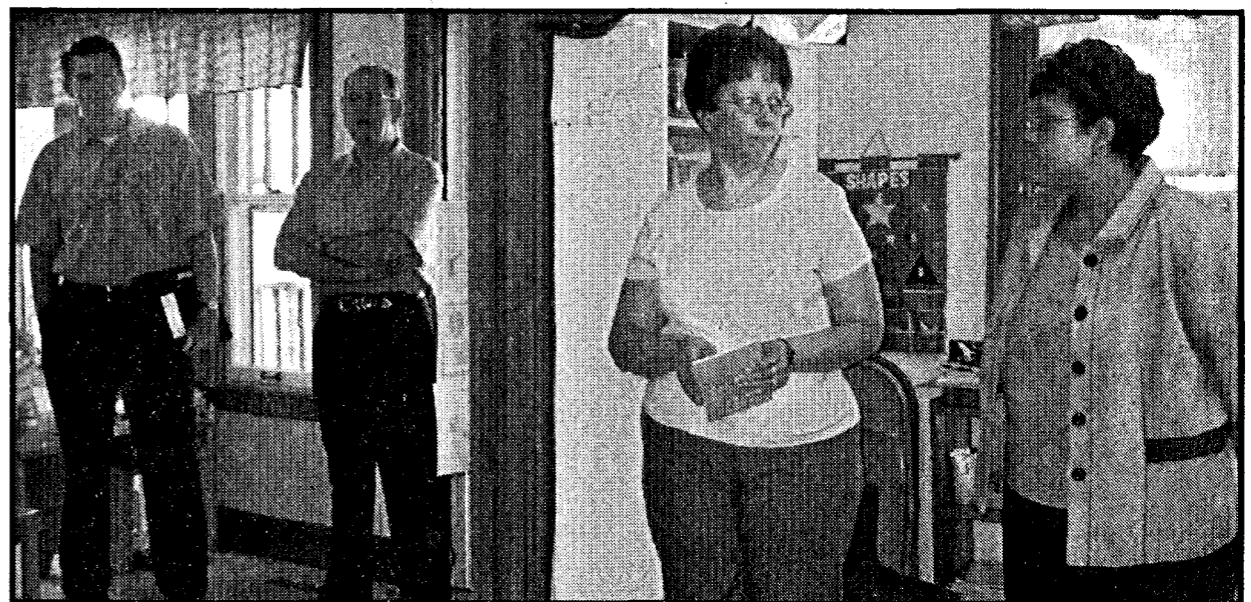
Ak-Sar-Ben's River City Roundup parade entries open

There were interesting costumes, and equally interesting stories about the flag bearers. The US team chose one of the "lost boys of Sudan", which I found particularly

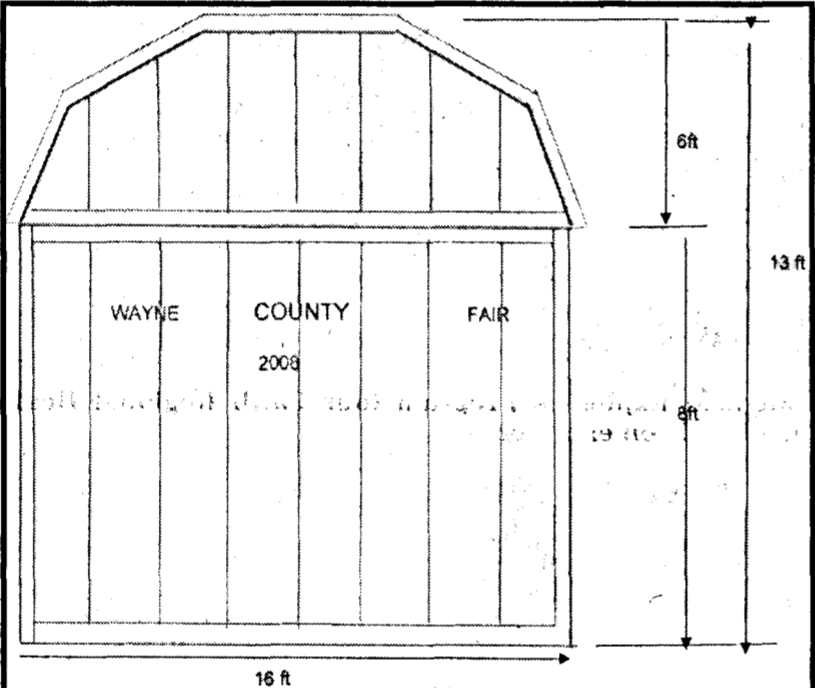
inspiring. Losing their parents, escaping from their captors, and spending years in a refugee camp after walking many dangerous miles, probably makes this assignment a walk in the park.

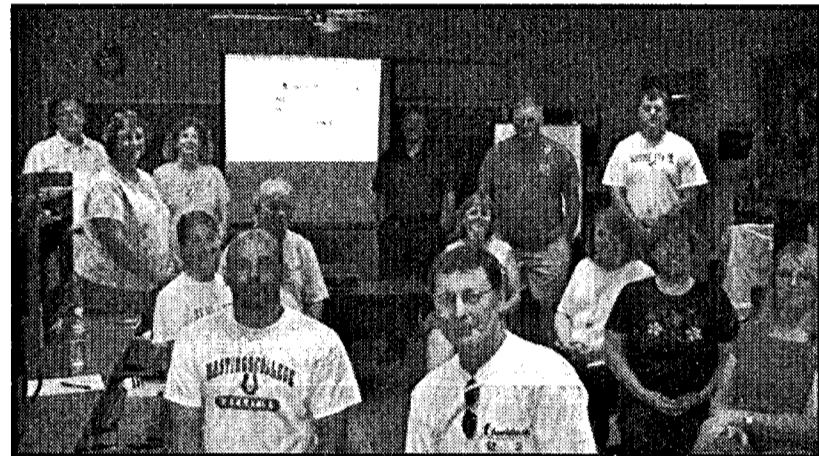

NECC Associate degree nursing program granted continuing accreditation

Officials at Northeast Community College were recently notified that its associate degree nursing program has been granted continuing accreditation for 2008-2016 by the National League for Nursing Accrediting Commission (NLNAC).
