# VA offers clinic for Wayne area Veterans

# Weatherize your home and use less energy

One of the most cost-effective ways to improve energy efficiency is by properly sealing and insulating a home.

According to ENERGY STAR®, a nationwide energy efficiency program sponsored jointly by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency and the U.S. Department of Energy, homeowners can realize a potential savings of up to 20 percent on heating and cooling costs (or up to 10 percent on

First, help make your house weathertight. Many air leaks and drafts in the home are easy to find because they are easy to feel - like those around windows and doors. Other leaks may take some hunting to find - like holes hidden in attics, basements and crawl spaces. Sealing any of these leaks with caul, spray foam or weather stripping will have a great impact on improving your comfort and reducing utility bills.

After any home sealing project, have a heating and cooling technician check to make sure your combustion appliances (gas- or oil-fired furnace, water heater and clothes dryer) are venting properly.

Here's a good rule of thumb - don't scrimp on the insulation. Insulation helps keep your home warm in winter and cold in summer.

There are several common types of insution - fiberglass (in both batt forms), cellulose, rigid foam board and spray foam. When correctly installed with air sealing, each type of insulation can deliver comfort and lower energy bills during the hottest and coldest times of the year. To get the biggest savings, the easiest place to add insulation is usually in the attic. A quick way to see if you need more insulation is to look across your uncovered attic floor. If your insulation is level with or below the attic floor joists, you probably need to add more insulation. # Leafy Spurge inducted into 2008 Nebraska Music Hall of Fame

The Leafy Spurge band was recently inducted into the 2008 Nebraska Music Hall of Fame. The induction took place Aug. 1 during the Nebraska Rocks Country celebration held at Karl Stefan Memorial Airport in Norfolk. The Nebraska Rocks Country celebration was added to the



annual Nebraska Rocks concert, which highlights Nebraska and Norfolk-area musicians. The event was part of the Hot Summer Nites Rod Run, a national-level car show.

Jim Casey is founder of the Nebraska Rocks and the Nebraska Music Hall of Fame. In his early years, Casey was a member of the local Smoke Ring band.

Looking back at the history of the Leafy Spurge Band, brothers Dick, Dave and Jim Broders grew up in Belden. "Wild" Bill Ueding, an old honky tonker, had bought the local bar. He played his guitar and told stories about playing music in bars, in dance halls and about "almost" making "the big time." It was the kind of stories that sparks an interest in young men who are looking for excitement. The Broders boys were already influenced by the music of Hank Sr., Johnny Cash, Bob Wills and Texas Playboys: thus the journey in music began.

Dick, the oldest of the brothers, began learning licks on the guitar from old Bill songs like "Walking the Floor Over You" by Ernest Tub and "Your Cheatin' Heart" by Hank Sr. and "All Around the Water Tank" by Woody Guthrie. Younger brother, Dave, had always dreamed of being a country singer and would hang out hoping to get a chance to play but he was just an 11-yearold kid, five years younger than Dick. The year was 1969.

But Dave also got his chance to play on one of the old vintage Fender Stratocaster guitars that Wild Bill had and both brothers learned fast. After awhile, Dick, decided to take up the bass guitar and they formed a band with one of their friends, Paul Huetig, on the drums and Roger Pedersen on another guitar. It was 1973 and the Leafy Spurge Band was sprouting. Influenced by new music such as the Rolling Stones and Bob Dylan, as well as southern rock bands like Marshall Tucker and Charlie Daniels, their music took on a new flavor.

In a small way, the band was becoming a part of the music scene in northeast Nebraska and became influenced by more established bands like Jim Casey, Young Country, Bill Legate and the Roving Cowboys, The Red Willow Band with Chris Gage and Kenny Putnum and a host of players and singers from the Norfolk area like Bernie Kvamme, Warren Frerichs, Nick Leland, Bob Letheby, Robert Lewis and others. The outlaw movement with Willie and Waylon, Jerry Jeff Walker and Steve Earl all played a part in the evolving sound of the band.

players, Pedersen left the band and was replaced by a close friend, Cary Pflanz, and the drummers came and went," Dave Broders said, (Grandpa) Willie Burnham came to the bar in Belden and offered the band a place to live, all they could eat and a full-time job as the house band at the Cotton Wood Inn, a road house bar and grill with a dance hall in the back and windows that opened all the way down on both sides."

Dave added that Willie Burnham was an old horn player of national notoriety back in the big band days of the 1920s and 30s. Old Willie was a good promoter and had a plan to build the band's popularity.

From 1976-1978, the band played nearly every weekend to crowds of young fans overflowing into the parking lot and into after hour parties. Willie arranged a meeting with the brothers and drummer, Steve Lange (pronounced Long). Lange had a rock and roll background and had just left the band, Stinger.

The band remained the same until Pflanz left in 1983. Terry Butterfield of Norfolk joined the group in 1984 as a guitarist. "Buck," as he was known to the band, was a fine picker with the ability to produce licks behind the vocals. The boys were making a lot of new fans.

During the 80s, Dave Broders began to write music for the band, which added original songs and the fans loved it.

In 1984, the band met David Sherry, who sat in at a gig in Wayne to play some harp with them. Sherry joined as a full-time member in 1989. In 1991, the band took on another full-time member when Rick Ohm of Sioux City, Iowa, joined. Ohm had worked for seven years for the rock band, Rage. Black Hills Energy, formerly contact Black Hills Energy at 888-Aquila, is refunding approximately \$5.7 million to its residential customers in Nebraska.

Beginning with bills dated Aug. 14 and continuing through Sept. 15. any residential customer of Black Hills Energy who received service during the interim rate period of Feb. 15, 2007, through March 30, 2008, will receive a refund. The refund will appear as a credit on monthly Black Hills Energy natural gas bills and will be identified on the bill as "Rate Refund."

While a typical residential customer will receive a refund of approximately \$31, actual refunds will vary because they're based on the number of months natural gas service was received during the interim rate period.

This refund is a final component of the company's 2006 general rate increase application for the natural gas delivery service Black Hills Energy provides in Nebraska. The company Public Nebraska Commission (NPSC) rates April 1.

The NPSC approved the company's interim refund plan June 24. Nebraska law allows utilities to implement interim rates while their rate cases are being decided. The current refund is the difference between interim and final rates plus interest.

Black Hills Energy has approximately 174,750 residential customers in Nebraska. However, about 220,000 people are eligible for the refund. The difference is due to people who received service during the interim rate period but who are no longer customers. Customers with questions can



turfgrass during drought explained

**Management practices for** 

Turfgrass plants need soil moisture to sustain normal growth and development. The water use rates of cool season turfgrasses during the summer period will often exceed the rate which natural rainfall returns water back into the soil. Once the soil moisture reserves are nearly depleted, the turfgrass will begin to wilt and turn from green to either bluishgreen or gray-green. Wilt is a sign of water stress and is usually most evident during mid to late afternoon. The continual water stress that limits or prevents the growth of plants is termed drought. Once drought conditions develop, the lawn will stop all growth and development and proceed into dormancy. Dormancy is characterized by the development of brown turfgrass. The turfgrass is not dead but in a condition which preserves the vital parts of the plant. Turfgrass dormancy reduces water usage and can concentrate the limited amount of available moisture into the crown, rhizomes and roots. This dormant condition will allow the turfgrass plant to survive adverse conditions for extended periods until soil moisture reserves are replenished.

The length of time lawn grasses can survive in a dormant condition is dependent on a number of factors including soil moisture levels, daytime temperatures, condition of the turfgrass at the onset of dormancy, etc. In general, turfgrasses can be expected to survive in a dormant condition for up to four to five weeks with limited damage if temperatures are at or below normal. If daytime temperatures are high (mid-80's or higher) consistently through the stress period, only three to four weeks of survival can be expected. Dormant grass is lost once the crowns, rhizomes and roots begin to dehydrate. The areas of the lawn along sidewalks, curbs, driveways, south facing slopes, etc., will encounter the most stress and will be the first areas to die during extended periods of drought.

Homeowners have little control over the daytime temperatures in the lawn. However, they can improve the survivability of the turfgrass in their lawn through proper management. This management includes proper cultural practices and/or irrigation.

The most stressful time of the year for cool season grass is typically in the summer (i.e., June through August). This period is often characterized by hot, sunny days with daytime temperatures routinely in the mid 80's to low 90's (F). In addition to high temperatures, moderate to severe moisture stress is often imposed on the turfgrasses. The combination of high







The city's fiscal year runs from Oct. 1 through Sept. 30.



Herald will run a monthly historical supplement during 2009. A question was asked if historical columns could be included each time.





"We gave Gretna too many outs in this game," Sweetland said. "We also left numerous runners on base, including the bases loaded in the last inning."


Offensively, Tia Jech who later earned Class B Honorable Mention, shined in the loss with a flawless three hit performance while Fehringer added a triple and run scored.

The class is a five-credita part-time basis at Northeast Community College in Norfolk For the busy individual working a fulltime job, the business, math and technology division at Northeast will offer several evening classes when the new semester begins Monday, Aug. 18.

"I think the 100 percent commitment speaks volumes about the support our Board of Governors has for this UNMC College of Nursing on the campus of Northeast Community College," Winkleblack said. According to a feasibility study done for the project, it is estimated there will be a shortfall of 1,216 full-time registered nurses by 2010 and 3,838 full-time registered nurses by 2020 in Nebraska. Northeast Nebraska, with already the fewest RN's, BSN's and advanced practice registered nurses (mastered-level prepared nurses) will be hit particularly hard by this shortage. The UNMC College of Nursing Northern Division in Norfolk will help alleviate that shortage while providing close-to-home educations for students.

The "gas wars" of yesteryear are gone, but it is interesting/amusing to watch some companies try to woo customers with deals on gasoline

Might we be on the verge of "Free Husker Mug With Every Fill Up!" or something comparable?

Probably not. But some car manufacturers are offering deals to guarantee potential buyers a specific price on gasoline, based on time and/or mileage criteria. A few companies that sell gasoline are offering modest deals. Baby boomers remember (depending on the quality of their aging memories) when virtually





# Summer lawn mowing tips shared

Sound mowing practices are necessary to obtain a good quality lawn.

This is especially true during the summer months. Improper mowing practices during periods of drought and high temperatures may seriously damage turfgrass.

Kentucky bluegrass lawns should be mowed at a height of 3 to 3 1/2 inches during the summer months. Bluegrass lawns should be mowed at a height of 2 to  $2 \frac{1}{2}$ inches in the spring and fall. The additional leaf area during summer shades and cools the crowns of the turfgrass plants.

During hot weather, the temperature near the crown area of shortmowed turfgrass may be 20 degrees F or more above the air temperature. Extremely high temperatures at their crowns can kill turfgrass plants. The higher mowing height also provides more foodproducing foliage and promotes deeper root growth.

When mowing the lawn, never remove more than 1/3 of the total leaf area at any one time. Removing more than 1/3 of the leaf area severely injures the turfgrass plants and reduces their ability to withstand additional environmental stresses.

If possible, mow in the cool of the morning or evening. Mowing at midday places additional stress on the turf and may also cause heat stress related problems for the individual mowing the lawn.

Another important key to proper mowing during the summer months is a sharp blade. Dull blades tear and bruise the leaf tips. The damaged tissue dries out giving the turf surface a whitish appearance. The damaged leaf tissue also suffers greater water loss. The mower blade doesn't have to be razor sharp. A properly sharpened blade has no nicks and is smooth on the bottom with a 30 to 45 degree bevel towards the top of the blade.

Change the mowing direction or pattern each time the lawn is mowed. Different mowing patterns reduce soil compaction and turf wear from the mower wheels. Wear damage is most likely in thin or shady areas. Also, mowing the lawn repeatedly in the same direction pushes the grass over rather than cutting it cleanly.

Dormant lawns (those that have turned brown) should not be mowed. Pedestrian and mower traffic could damage the turf. Grass that is still growing should be properly mowed following recommended practices.

strength and spirit at Madonna following injuries at day care

Chase Junck is an active toddler with "personality plus" who loved to run and play. His perfect world toppled on March 19, when the 15month-old suffered severe injuries that were consistent with shaken baby syndrome at a day care in his hometown of Randolph.

Left with retinal hemorrhaging, a fractured skull and having suffered a massive stroke, Chase was lifeflighted to Mercy Medical Center in Sioux City, Iowa. "I begged the crew to keep my son alive until we could be with him," said Chase's mother, Jill. Having lost half his blood volume, Chase underwent emergency surgery at the hospital to stop the bleeding on his brain. Chase's father, Scott, said medical personnel gave their son a 10-20 percent chance of survival.

Chase was flown on to Children's Hospital in Omaha, where he spent the next three weeks sedated, paralyzed and on a ventilator in the pediatric intensive care unit. His neurosurgeon upgraded the toddler's survival odds to 50/50. It would be two agonizing weeks before his parents could wrap their loving arms around their son.

Scott and Jill began to contemplate acute rehabilitation for Chase. Jill, a registered nurse, was with Madonna familiar Rehabilitation Hospital. "I was excited after what I learned Madonna could do for patients," said Jill.

On April 10, Chase got an ambulance ride to Madonna's pediatric unit. Shortly after his arrival, Chase was fitted with a helmet to protect the fragile cranial bone flap surgeons had created.

"When I first met Chase, he couldn't sit up or roll over," recalled Madonna physical therapist Laura Corbridge. Together with Chase's therapy team, Scott and Jill devised physical, occupational, vision and speech goals for their son. Scott shared, "I just wanted to see my son do his normal 'Chase' stuff again." The emphasis in therapy shifted to fun and play time for www.Madonna.org

Chase. Gradually, he began to amaze everyone with his progress. "Chase was soon able to roll over and progressed to sitting and playing with toys," said Corbridge. "As he became more mobile, I spent a lot of time on my knees!" she added with a smile. She said he enjoyed using a toy lawn mower in outdoor therapy sessions, adding his own


"vroom" sounds. Madonna's Child Development Center also provided peer interaction for the pint-sized patient who won over staff with his infectious smile. "Chase loved to laugh and make animal noises," said occupational therapist Jennifer Slyvan. He wore prism glasses to increase visual tracking skills. "He was always willing to work hard and his smile brightened my day," Slyvan commented.

Chase benefitted from a supportive network of family, friends and Madonna staff. Jill shared that Chase's personality gradually resurfaced. On April 15, he uttered his first word since the accident "Da-da" and two days later, he was giving people a "high five." Riding his "Rockin' Pony" and pushing his popcorn popper became favorite pastimes again.

"I thought my faith was deep before," said Jill, "but now, I know it can grow. You just have to pray that God will take care of things." Both Jill and Scott were quick to credit the Madonna staff with Chase's positive outcomes. "You don't have to look anywhere else for rehabilitation; just come to Madonna, believe in the staff and it will happen," said Jill.

On May 25, nearly six weeks after his traumatic injury, Chase Junck was in his car seat, traveling back home to rural Nebraska. He still visits as an outpatient at Madonna and continues to thrive in his recovery.
