



The afternoon will include self-directed tours of the school and church, as well as the raffle of a quilt donated by the Afternoon Council of Catholic Women.



The town of Wayne was platted in 1881 and several men of faith arranged for Mass to be said in the home of John N. Geitzen in the spring of 1882. Wayne was a Mission parish for several years. Fr. Daniel Moriarity was the first pastor.

The first church was built on land north of town in 1886. The resident pastor arrived in 1887 and Holy Communion classes were held at the church. In 1896 land and a house was purchased for a rectory and the church building was moved to East Fourth Street. Wayne and Dixon came under the same pastor at that time. Under the pastorship of Father Haley, the church building was doubled in size with the addition of a sacristy, bell tower, and confessional.

In 1903 Dixon built a parish residence and Wayne was left on its own. In 1904 Our Lady of Sorrows Church was built in Carroll and became a Mission of Wayne and was served by St. Mary's priest until it became a Mission of Randolph in 1946.





Attorney General files charges against gas station owner, distributor

filed charges in Burt County against a gas station owner and a distributor. A joint investigation between the Attorney General's Office and the Nebraska Department of Agriculture's Division of Weights and Measures showed both people were involved in a scam where ethanol-blend gasoline was sold to customers at the higher unleaded price.

"Gas prices are high, times are tough and Nebraskans should get what they pay for," said Bruning.

Tom Wiese, who owns gas stations in Scribner (Scribner Express) and Decatur (Decatur Express), faces three counts of criminal simulation, and one count at 9 a.m. on Sept. 9. of deceptive advertising.

Tim Kaup is the general manager of the Sapp Bros distribution around 90 gas complaints from concenter in West Point. He's charged sumers across Nebraska involving

deception, one count criminal simulation and one count of deceptive advertising.

The investigation found that Kaup actively promoted the idea of selling ethanol-blended gasoline at unleaded prices to store owners, and Weise took him up on it. Both men deceived customers for over a

Theft by deception is a class II misdemeanor with a penalty of up to six months in jail and a \$1,000 fine. Criminal simulation and deceptive advertising are class III misdemeanors punishable by up to three months in jail and \$500 fine. Both Wiese and Kaup will appear theft by deception, one count of in Burt County Court in Tekamah

In the last year, the Attorney General's Office has received with aiding and abetting Wiese in 35 stations. Issues raised include

Attorney General Jon Bruning committing seven counts of theft by pricing, advertising and pump calitinue to test pumps across the bration. The office continues to work with Weights and Measures on investigations.

Greg Ibach, Director of the Nebraska Department Agriculture said, "We are committed to making sure gas stations are playing by the rules and will con-

state."

"We know there are more stations taking advantage of unsuspecting customers. We intend to prosecute those who deceive the public. If they think they're going to get away with it, they're wrong, said Bruning.



Commissioners request more information for memorial project

Wayne County Board of Commissioners met in regular session on Tuesday. Among agenda items was Veterans Memorial committee representatives Layne Beza and Bud Neel on project clarifica-

Details on the project were discussed. Commissioner Bob Nissen said a survey would be good. Beza said Paul Otte did some survey work and several committee members will travel to Luken Memorials, Inc. in Yankton, SD to discuss the project with them as they will construct the memorial.

Installing a retaining wall was discussed and Commissioner Kelvin Wurdeman said it is a concern to him as to how big of a drop there will be as people could get hurt. He would prefer the ground around the memorial to be as level as possible. Neel noted plans are for the memorial to be handicap accessible on the west side. Beza asked about taking out three trees so there will be better visibility from Pearl Street. He wondered who would cover the cost? Nissen noted it would be nice to know more about the project so they knew what they were dealing with. Beza said they would find out more and bring it back before the commissioners.

Terry Erickson of Northeast Nebraska Telephone Company CenCom spoke to the commissioners about franchise agreement for internet protocol television service. He noted his company has launched an IP digital format television service taking place of analog format. With the service, customers won't have to buy a converter box. He said the t.v. services would run over existing telephone fiber cable lines in the Winside area. Commissioner Jim Rabe moved to approve the video franchise, Commissioner Wurdeman seconded the motion and it was approved unanimously.

Shannon Peterson, librarian at the Carroll Public Library, was present to request funding for equipment and furniture for the library. She noted they will be moving Labor Day weekend from the old library to the auditorium. The old library is in bad shape and will be taken down. Fundraising is to every six months rather than

ongoing for a different building to be moved into Carroll. She noted the \$1,500 they receive from the county is a great help but more money is needed to restock books, get a better computer, table and chairs, etc. She requested \$3,000. Nissen told her they would get back to her after the budget is finished.

Elizabeth Carlson, highway superintendent, discussed road and bridge business. She wanted authorization for solicitation of a proposal for engineering services for a Federal aid project to replace bridge C009003315, two miles west and 0.7 miles south of Wayne, 574th Avenue, Mile 855. A motion was made by Wurdeman to solicit an engineering proposal from Mainelli-Wagner, seconded by Rabe and approved unanimously.

The commissioners discussed and acted on solicitation of sealed bids for the sale of a 1968 Chevrolet CS1 1/2 Ton pickup truck, serial no. CS148J159537. Wurdeman made the motion to go with sealed bids and place an ad into the next Wayne Herald, Rabe seconded it and the motion passed unanimous-

Wurdeman made a motion to approve solicitation of bids to purchase a used motor grader for road district #1. Rabe seconded the motion and the motion passed unanimously.

Discussion was held on the county's position on the Nebraska Department of Roads hiring engineers to inspect county bridges. Wurdeman noted he had a meeting with Congressman Jeff Fortenberry recently and later talked to his representative for northeast Nebraska. Wurdeman voiced his concern on how inspections are taking place including rural roads compared to state highways. He noted cyclical traffic is being taken into consideration which apply to the highways but does not apply to rural roads.

Wurdeman asked if a letter should be drafted and sent to congressmen and senators about the concern. He added that many bridges are being closed and if it continues, how can counties afford to fix them? He said that maybe they could ask if they could reduce tonnage and increase inspections

every two years. Carlson will put together a letter and have the commissioners look at it at the Sept. 16 meeting.

The commissioners discussed and acted on two requests for permission to bury utility lines in county road right of ways. The first was by Northeast Nebraska Public Power District for upgrading purposes on the Vernon Bauermeister farm. Rabe made a motion to approve NNPPD's request, Wurdeman seconded it and the motion passed unanimously.

The second request was by F & S Farms west of Carroll for a machine shed. Wurdeman made a motion to approve the request, Rabe seconded it and it was approved unani-

Also approved was to cancel Special Police fund warrant 08080084. Rabe made a motion to cancel the warrant, Wurdeman seconded it and the motion passed unanimously.

Also approved was a partial fund transfer of \$20,000 to the SPP fund. Wurdeman made the motion, Rabe seconded it and the transfer was approved unanimously.

The Wayne County Board of Equalization was held. Approved motor vehicle exemption by Rainbow World for a van that will be used to transport children to and from school.

Wayne County Assessor Joyce Reeg gave the commissioners the three year plan for the assessor's office. The highlights are: GIS is used; all land parcels are done and land use is half done. There are new soil conversions, which are mandated by the government. Property is recorded with a camera program as well as updates. In 2006-07, aerial shots were taken of Wayne County property and yearly updates are done through GIS. Reeg noted a lot of value was added through the GIS system. She noted the total valuation for Wayne County for 2008 is \$839,927,666. The 2008 value up is \$75,605,682 compared to \$64,828,546 which

was the value up for 2007. The commissioners spent the afternoon working on the 2008-09 budget, which will be discussed at the next regular Wayne County Board of Commissioners meeting on Tuesday, Sept. 2 at 9 a.m.

of West Point and Father Carney of Norfolk, who served while the parish was a Mission; Father Daniel Moriarty, who built the first church; Father Mugan, Wallace, Bary. During Fr. Bary's tenure Wayne became a Mission of Emerson because there was no rectory. In 1896 Wayne again had a resident pastor, Father McGrath. Father James B. Fitzgerald, Father Weber and Father T.P Haley served the church in Wayne through 1906.

Fr. William Kearns arrived at St. Mary's in 1906. During his 44 year tenure, the parish enjoyed growth and provided Catholic ministry to the county. Annual vacation Bible school was conducted for the religious education of the children and the parish secured land for a Catholic cemetery from the Public Cemetery Association for the use of Catholics in Wayne County.

In 1950 with the arrival of Father Robert P Hupp, the dream of building a Catholic elementary school became reality. Ground was broken in 1952 and with the dedication and hard work of parishioners, the school was opened in the fall of 1953 under the leadership of Father William Kleffman. Missionary Benedictine Sisters served the school and 43 students enrolled just one year after ground breaking. Kindergarten was added in 1980 and preschool in 1997.

The church in Wayne continued to grow and also served the students at Wayne State College. Four Masses each Sunday could no longer accommodate the parishioners and students. Fr. Kleffman set the wheels in motion for the building of a larger church on land north of the school building on Seventh Street. When Fr. Paul Begley arrived in Wayne in 1968 he continued the planning and ground was broken in 1969 for a 407 seat nave. Dedication ceremonies took place June 6, 1971.

Other Archdiocesan priests who were assigned to Wayne included: Father Tom McDermott, Jim Buschelman, Donald M. Cleary, James F. McCluskey and Mark Tomasiewicz.

St. Mary's celebrated its centennial the summer of 1982. Parish groups and organizations were

remembered and recognized at this St. Mary's pastor as chaplain. historical celebration. They includ-

St. Mary's Women's Guild whose purpose was to raise money for parish needs. Their focus was the spring and fall dinners which not only raised funds but provided socialization and community ser-

Newman Club serving the spiritual needs of Wayne State College students began in 1892 as the "Catholic Club" and is the oldest organization of the WSC campus. The Newman Club itself was chartered in 1931 and each priest of the parish also served the club. In 1968 the Archdiocese also work with the college students. In 2001 Newman Ministry was placed under the responsibility of the Office of Religious Formation and today Sister Cynthia Hruby, ND directs the organization with


In the 25 years since the centennial celebration many improvements and changes have taken

Holy Family Hall in the basement of the new church was dedicated in 1987. The kitchen in the social hall was completed in 1990. A new rectory with office/meeting rooms was built in 1996 north of the church and commemorative stained-glass windows were installed in the church in 1996-97 and dedicated in 1998.

On Feb. 28, 1984 Father Kearns Council 8579 of the Knights of Columbus was chartered with 36 members. Approximately 130 members are now involved in contributing to the welfare of St. Mary's and the surrounding area.

Fr. Joe Dorcey was ordained a Redemptorist priest in 1979, the first parish son to be ordained. Fr. Joe is the fourth child of the appointed the pastor in Laurel to late Joe and Patricia Dorcey of St. Mary's.

Fr. Tom McDermott was ordained in 1981 as a member of the Order of Friar Preachers (Domincans). Fr. Tom is the son of the late Charles and Evelyn McDermott of Wayne.









4. The U.S. and 62 other nations boycott the 1980 Olympics in Moscow, due to a Soviet Union invasion of Afghanistan that later led to a U.S. supported Taliban and Soviet backed Afghanistan standoff.

5. The U.S. hockey team who was comprised of mostly amateurs and collegiate players defeats the juggernaut Soviet Union during the 1980 Winter Olympics in Lake

Placid, N.Y., after years of cold war tension and a possible Olympic ban by President Jimmy Carter.

6. Derek Redmond injures a hamstring during the 400-meter run in the 1992 Barcelona Olympics and falls to the ground. Redmond was later picked up by his father who helped the injured athlete finish out the remainder of the race.

7. Wyoming farm boy and Greco-Roman wrestler Rulon Gardner upsets Russia's Alexander Kardin during the 2000 Sydney Olympics. Kardin was previously undefeated in 13 years of competition.

8. And lastly, U.S. swimmer Michael Phelps' eight gold medals at the 2008 Beijing Olympics, which bested Mark Spitz's previous record of seven gold medals that was set at the 1972 Olympics in Munich.

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
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Rural community success stories wanted





School is in, watch out for cyberbullies

Our sons and daughters are enjoying these final carefree days of summer as only children can. Swimming in the pool, catching fireflies, sitting by the campfire, staying out until the street lights come on, and spending time with family and friends. But it's August which means summer days are about to end and schools will come to life once again.

More and more technology is being used in the classroom. Computers are a learning tool and teachers are helping students navigate information on the Internet like never before. Social sites allow kids to talk to their friends and form homework help groups. However, not all cyber exchanges are good. Sometimes kids can be lies: bullied even in the safety of their own homes.

Cyberbullying is using electronic communications to intentionally harm or threaten another person. Bullies e-mail, send instant messages or text messages, and use networking sites, chat rooms, or blogs to threaten and harass their victims. Attacks can target a single person or a group. The Internet allows bullies to access large amounts of people anonymously.

A nationwide poll commissioned by Fight Crime: Invest in Kids shows that one in three teens and one in six preteens have been victims of cyberbullying. Of those bullied teens, only 30 percent told their parents and most of them reported receiving harmful messages at home or at school.



Wayne County Coalition of Project Extra Mile holds meeting

Project Extra Mile met in regular session on Aug. 8. Among agenda items was discussion on the highlights of the Summer Youth Leadership Training that was held during July.

The Summer Youth Leadership Training was held at "The Voice of the Master" Lutheran Church in west Omaha. The training was attended by approximately 32 young people from across the state. The young attendees were engaged in rapport and team building exercises that were designed to develop leadership traits. They were provided with additional instruction and illustration of the qualities of leaders, as well as specific information regarding the democratic process and make up of the legislature here in Nebraska.

The group also discussed the effects and extent of underage drinking in Nebraska and the ways to prevent youth access to alcohol. At the conclusion of the training the youth had an opportunity to participate in a press conference

At the conclusion of the hearing, the Commission agreed to allow further public comment through Aug. 31 and will render their decision shortly thereafter.

Shear of Project Extra Mile reported that the Law Enforcement Work Group meeting was held on July 21. The meeting was held in Wayne and consisted of representatives of Wayne County law enforcement agencies, including Wayne State Security Officers. The purpose of the meeting was to develop strategies and plans for future compliance checks of alcohol retailer outlets throughout Wayne County as well as other enforcement and deterrence efforts.

Shear added that Wayne State College security officers will begin more strict enforcement of alcohol violations on campus during football games and tailgating events.

Project Extra Mile is working with law enforcement trainers to provide training to local officers on the proper protocol for compliance checks in accordance with state law. Although an exact date for the training has not yet been established, the training will be conducted before any enforcement efforts begin in the local area.

He also noted that regional compliance and enforcement training is being scheduled for sometime in mid-September.Compliance checks will be scheduled after the train-

The immunization clinic is open to the public, and there are no income guidelines. Each child should be accompanied by the parent or guardian. Past immunization records are required. Proxy forms are needed when a parent or legal guardian is unable to accompany the child to clinic. Proxy forms may be obtained by contacting the Wisner office at (402) 529-

A suggested donation of \$20 per child would be appreciated to help defray administrative costs. If a child only receives one immunization, then the suggested donation is \$13.50. No one will be denied immunizations for inability to make a donation.

Immunizations are needed at ages: 2 months, 4 months, 6 months, 12-15 months, and 4-6 years. This project is supported in part by Federal Immunization Program funds awarded to Goldenrod Hills Community Action by the Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services.

The Governor's Opportunity Award will cover half of the tuition costs for a student enrolled in one of the three state college and can be renewed for four years at Chadron, Peru and Wayne State Colleges. Three students will be awarded scholarships for 2009-10 academic

"I want to thank the Nebraska State College System Board of Trustees for their willingness to think innovatively on this issue." Gov. Heineman said. "This scholarship will provide students who are passionate about the opportunities they've had growing up in Nebraska and want to continue their education at one of our three state college campuses. This is a great way to encourage more Nebraska students to pursue their college education in our state and develop leaders for tomorrow."

Students eligible for the Governor's Opportunity Award will have a cumulative ACT score between 21 and 24 or an SAT score ranging from 1500 to 1650, and must plan to attend one of the state college campuses next fall.

Applicants will be asked to write an essay detailing their interest in staying in Nebraska after college graduation, how they plan to become a leader in their community and contribute to the state's economic landscape. Grade point average and involvement in activities, organizations and service projects will also be taken into consideration.

NSCS Chancellor Stan Carpenter said, "This award is about helping students who have a real desire to contribute to Nebraska's future and attend college. Our goal is to provide financial assistance to bright, talented, driven individuals who have a commitment to our state. This award will help offset the costs of attending college. We want to ensure that our students' level of debt upon graduation is minimal because we know that with less debt, they are more likely to stay in Nebraska after college."

Application materials are on the Nebraska State College System Web site, http://www.nscs.edu, and can also be obtained from high school guidance counselors. The deadline to apply is Dec. 1. A committee of state college admissions directors will select the recipients. The Nebraska State College

System serves 8,500 students from Nebraska and surrounding states through three geographically diverse institutions. The three campuses combined offer more than 200 degree, certificate and pre-professional programs accessible on campus, via the Internet, and in several satellite locations throughout the state.
