




St. John's Lutheran Church in Wakefield to celebrate 100 years

St. John's Lutheran Church at 412 W 7th St. in Wakefield will celebrate it's 100th anniversary on Sunday, Sept.7, with a 10:30 a.m. worship service. Rev. Ronald Holling will preach. Activities for the day include: Noon: dinner catered by Sidelines, 1:30 p.m. hymn sing, 2 p.m. program with Rev. Bruce Schut speaking and Rev. Donald Meyer attending. Dinner tickets can be purchased until Aug. 31 from Evelyn Lienemann at 402-287-2417.

Looking back at the long history of St. John's Lutheran Church, the congregation was officially organized by Pastor Borneman in the year of 1908. The families of the three charter members were George Fuoss, Henry Kohlmeier and Sievert Hansen. Services were held on alternate Sunday afternoons at Salem Lutheran Church until 1924. In 1911, a regular Sunday School class was started and taught by the pastor.

Services were originally conducted in the German language. On Jan. 12, 1919, it was decided to hold English and German services alternately. On April 19, 1921, the congregation joined the Missouri Synod of the Lutheran Church. The church was an active member of the Northern Nebraska District. Today it is still a member of the Nebraska District of the Lutheran Church Missouri Synod.

Pastor Borneman served the congregation until October, 1928, at which time the congregation numbered 40 communicants and 60 baptized.

Services from 1929 to 1931 were held at the Christian Church. In May of 1929, the Rev. W. A. Gerdes became the pastor of St. Paul's Lutheran Church, LaPorte, and also served St. John's. With the arrival of Pastor Gerdes, services were moved to the Plier Factory located where Salmon Well Company is and they were held in the

In 1931, the city of Wakefield offered for

sale on sealed bids a temporary building, erected and used for school purposes until the completion of the new high school. St. John's Lutheran, at a special meeting on March 6, resolved to place a bid on this structure in the amount of \$752.20. Mr. Ferd Fisher was empowered and delegated to draw up and present this bid to the town board. It was accepted for the above consideration and legal titled conveyed.

Part of the building was resold for \$250 to Mr. Walter Johnson. Mrs. Malinda Utecht and heirs donated the lot at 610 West Third Street for religious purposes and the work was immediately begun to move the building, a basement was dug and repairs and improvements made. The congregation of 26 communicants contributed both labor and finances and helped raise \$2,747.46 of which \$650 was borrowed from the Northern Nebraska District Church Extension Fund.


On July 12, 1931, the chapel was dedicated with appropriate services. Membership reached a high of 130 communicants in

On May 16, 1937, St. John's was incorporated under the legal name of The English St. John's Evangelical Lutheran Church. In 1938, the basement of the church was completed. By 1941, the congregation sustained considerable losses through removals, reducing the membership to 93. Rev. Gerdes served St. John's until October, 1943. During the last year of his pastorate he took up residence in town in a house purchased by St. John's at 602 Michener

Robert E. Kruse served the congregation from December, 1943 to January, 1954. He was the first resident pastor who had charge of St. John's congregation only.

Pastor Samuel Meske of Beulah, N.D. was installed on Jan. 9, 1955. An adult



Looking back on the long history of Concord, the town was platted and came into being Sept. 24, 1883, when the Chicago, St. Paul, Minneapolis and Omaha Railroad line was extended from Wakefield to a point near the center of Cedar County, which was named Hartington. Following is some early history of Concord according to the "History of Wayne County, 1938," by Dorothy Huse Nyberg:

In 1884, Concord had four buildings, the homes of two railroad officials, a depot and post office combined with David Leamer in charge and a general store owned by Orr & Ramsey. Livery stables, elevators, blacksmith shop and Concord's first school were built the following year.

A drug store owned by Dr. W. C. McColm, another general store and more houses were added later. Mr. Orr built a large house which also served as a hotel. Shumway & Everett had the first lumber yard. Miss Mae and Miss Jessie Heinz had a millinery shop in their home. They also taught school, one in town and the other in a district

R. O. Mitcheltree, James Paul, Claus Nelson, C. H. Nelson, P. A. Nelson, E. S. Johnson, Alfred Johnson, Mrs. E. A. Blake, G. O. Johnson, David French, Fred and Otto Johnson, John Hanson were among others who located early in Concord.

In 1884, the stores were located a block west of the present Main street. The early store buildings were moved and houses replaced

James Benefield and Charles Miller built stores in 1885. A bank started in the town in 1890.

First church services in Concord were conducted in the depot by Rev. Mr. Carmen. Concord now (1938) has three churches, Salem Lutheran with Rev. C. T. Carlson pastor, Mission church with Rev.

L.A. Peterson pastor and St. Paul Lutheran with Rev. G. T. Kern pas-

A cemetery association was organized in 1888 with George Acres and Dr. McColm officers. The men conducted this until 1903 when the women took charge.

Concord early set aside grounds for picnicking and this was the start for the Dixon County fair association in 1914. First officers were Chas. Wilson, John Mills, Earl Hughes and Dr. Phillips.

A community band of 20 pieces was formed in Concord in 1900 and has continued an asset to the community.

G. O. Johnson, who came to a farm eight miles north of Wayne in 1884, hunted deer near Concord and often saw Indians traveling through harvesting brome corn for the early settlers. Mr. Johnson broke all of his 160 acres but 25 with a walking plow. He also helped neighbors break prairie. The land was very fertile and moist and when driving with horses to Wayne or Concord one had to be careful in crossing sloughs and valleys because horses and buggies would easily mire down. The Logan valleys were especially treacherous and floods were frequent.


Storms of 1884 and 1888 were especially severe. Mr. Johnson, with some neighbors, traveled to Cedar county seat at St. Helena December 29, 1884. They went by train from Concord to Hartington' and then made the rest of the trip by horse and buggy. A severe storm set in that night and on returning the same day the men were able only to come as far south to' what was then called West Bow. They spent New Year's eve there and finally were able to go by bobsled the remaining seven miles the next day. They then took the train home. A man was frozen to death in that storm near Coleridge. The Concord men had left home Monday and finally returned the following Saturday.

One hundred and twenty-five years have passed since the village of Concord was founded. Residents invite everyone to help them celebrate Concord's Q125.









Bible class began in January, 1955, which had 35 members. At the beginning of 1956, the congregation had a membership of 282 baptized and 216 communicants. The congregation out-grew the Chapel so on March 7, 1955, voters resolved to purchase the former Van Cleave property at 7th and Maple Streets as the site for the future new church building. A contract was signed on July 19, 1957 with the architectural firm of Edw. J. Sessinghaus and Robt. A. Teig, Architects Associated, Omaha. Bids were opened on May 10, 1958, approved and the construction contract was awarded to the Karl F. Otte Construction Company of Wayne. Ground-breaking was held on June 1, 1958 and the corner-

stone was laid Oct. 26, 1958.

Dedication services were held on Aug. 2, 1959. A valedictory service was conducted at the old church building and the congregation proceeded to the new edifice. There was a procession of the clergy, church council, elders and trustees, building and finance committees and the choir. On hand at the new church was Paul Otte, one of the members of the Karl Otte Construction Co. who handed over the keys to unlock the doors and officially start the dedication ceremonies. Mr. Edw. J. Sessinghaus was also present. Former Pastor Rev. W.A. Gerdes was speaker for the service. The new building seated 360 in the nave and an additional 80 in the balcony. The attendance at three services that day was counted at 1,424 people.

On Sept. 2, 1984, Pastor Bruce L. Schut was ordained and installed at St. John's. He served until 2002. In 1985, the wheel chair ramp was added to the front of the church and in 1988 new furnaces and air conditioning units were installed in the church building. The handicap lift was installed in March, 1999. The present pastor, Rev. Terry Buethe, was installed on July 11, 2004. The constitution was revised in 2007.







WSC returns 18 of 22 starters for '08 season Warne Public LIBRIAN COMPLETE after last year's 7-5 breakout season

After recording the school's first winning season on the gridiron since 1995, the Wayne State College football team is hungry for more of the success the team enjoyed in the 2007 season.

The Wildcats finished 7-5 overall and posted a 7-2 record in the Northern Sun Intercollegiate Conference (NSIC), good for a second place finish and a berth in the Mineral Water Bowl last season.

It was just the second post-season appearance for a WSC football team in the program's 92-year history and even though the Wildcats lost a hard fought 20-13 battle to Missouri Western in the Mineral Water Bowl, fourth-year head coach Dan McLaughlin says the team wants to taste more of the success from the 2007 season.

"We've had the best off-season and conditioning since we've been here and it's a direct result of the Mineral Water Bowl appearance," said McLaughlin, who was named the 2007 NSIC Coach of the Year.

"When you get a taste of something you haven't had before, you want more of it. Even though we lost the bowl game, the kids got that taste of something they haven't had before and they now want more."

The Wildcats return 18 of 22 starters on offense and defense, so experience is one key component heading into the 2008 season.

Offensively, the Wildcats need to replace three starters on the offensive line.

Lost to graduation was center Jay Winter and starting right tackle Scott Umphenour while starting Brian Locke left school.

WSC does return three-year starter Brian Okonofua, a Second Team All-Northwest Region selecleft tackle.

Sophomores Shane Winter started several games at right tackle last season and will be called on to help fill voids in the offensive line along with junior Jake Runyon and sophomores Joe Bundy and B.J. Lambrecht.

Former tight end Collin Prosser, a senior from Vermillion, S.D., moves to the offensive line this season and will also contend for playing time in the trenches.

Junior Silas Fluellen returns as the Wildcats' starting quarterback after throwing for 2,828 yards and 21 touchdowns last season, completing 216 of 381 passes (56.7 percent). He was tabbed as the NSIC's South Division Preseason Offensive Player of the Year after ors. putting up solid numbers last season as a sophomore.

"The whole offense has pretty much returned, we've all been in the system and our strength is going to be our knowledge of the offense," said Fluellen, when asked about the strengths of this year's

"As for weaknesses, we need to be more consistent. We need to limit our mistakes, no more fumbles and we have to step up."

Senior running back Travis Rhone rushed for 1,013 yards last season with 13 touchdowns, averaging 4.8 yards per carry to become just the seventh back in school history to surpass the 1,000-yard

"We're in a tougher conference and they (coaches) expect more of us, so I feel that I have to make plays," Rhone said.

"We always start kind of late and we have to come from behind, but if we get it rolling early we'll be fine." Junior speedster Eric Meyer,

(Logan View High School) had a strong second half of last season and rushed for 266 yards with four touchdowns while averaging 6.5 yards per carry and adds depth at the running back position.

Junior wide receiver Logan Masters (Storm Lake, Iowa) became just the sixth wideout to surpass 1,000 yards receiving last season when he hauled in a teamhigh 64 receptions for 1,097 yards and six touchdowns.

Masters has caught at least two passes in all 23 games he has played in his first two seasons with the Wildcats.

2007 NSIC Offensive Newcomer of the Year Frederick Bruno added 38 receptions for 567 yards and five scores while senior Brian Chapman added a career-high 37 receptions for 468 yards and five touchdowns and brings leadership to the receivers group.

In addition to his 1,000 yard mark while rushing, Rhone added 29 catches for 247 yards out of the tion last fall, at left guard and two- backfield while sophomore Robert year starter Brandon Carlson at Perry played an increased role with the Wildcat receivers at the end of last season and finished with 21 catches for 221 yards and one


touchdown. At tight end/H-back, Creighton junior Aaron Nielson switched from linebacker to tight end late last season and has impressed coaches with his versatility.

Nielsen caught a touchdown pass in the Mineral Water Bowl last season for his only catch of the season.



Freshmen Joe Chebul (Bellevue West), Adam Meyer (Papillion-La Vista South) and Michael


Schinstock (Lincoln East) bring a wealth of high school success to the Wildcat program and are expected to contend for varsity spots and make WSC a deeper team this

Regionally, Adams State of Colorado has won the last five NCAA National Championships. The top five teams at the regional will advance to the NCAA Division II National Championships this





"Students need to think twice before accepting credit card offers, payday loans, check cashing services and other easy ways to put cash in their wallets," said Bruning. "A seemingly good deal can come with a high price."

Accepting giveaways for filling out a credit card application can leave students with a high interest rate on their new card. Students and parents should compare cards. Look for cards with reasonable interest rates and fees.

Once students get a credit card, it's important to use it wisely.

"Remember dinner out, a tank of gas, and trips to movies can quickly add up. Before you know it, you've got a larger balance than you can afford. Charging too much now means you could still be paying it back after graduation and beyond," Bruning said.

Students can prevent preapproved credit card offers from being mailed to them by opting out at www.optoutprescreen.com

Students also need to be careful with their personal information. Identity theft happens on college campuses too. Bruning said sensitive documents with bank account, credit card or Social Security numbers need to be kept in a safe location, away from roommates, friends and other visitors. Explaining the difference between 'reform' and 'revise'

Each election cycle serves as a reminder of how casually and consistently the English language is

Politicians, reporters, pundits and professors refer to "campaign finance reform."

And it annoys some of us to no foreseeable end.

Reform means to improve, to make better.

The appropriate word for change in campaign finance law, whether at the federal or state level, is revi-

Revise means to change. In the political context, one might say revise/revision are nonpartisan.

Changing campaign finance law doesn't guarantee that it will be better; because "better," as we all know, is in the eye of partisans involved in pushing money around to influence elections.

The view from here: Every news story that reports on purported "reform" of campaign finance rules should carry a plain-language disclaimer, Like:

"WARNING: This story isn't intended to make you believe that anything of ultimate substance will change. People in the business of politics will find 1,000 ways to get around this law before it takes effect. Money is still the name of the game, and money will continue to flow like waters, particularly into negative advertising, including attack ads."

The downstream impact of changes in finance regulations has given rise to one of the nastier, and more effective, developments in modern politics - that being the creation of "independent" committees

one candidate while not (nudge, nudge, wink, wink) overtly supporting another.

In Nebraska, a candidate for the Legislature can accept \$44,500 from groups. This presents no problem for those who want to enhance their candidate's political fortune, figuratively and literally. They can form an independent organization and do as they wish. It's a First Amendment thing, a free speech

spent both major political parties in advertising for legislative candidates in the May primary.

This situation also enhances the opportunity for interest groups to "go negative" on a particular candidate, while their preferred candidate remains above the fray, technically.

Dramatic voice: "Joe Jones tells us that he has never been indicted. But think about it. Does that mean he will never be indicted? For anything? Don't send a guy to the

and organizations to sling mud at independent organizations out. Nebraska Legislature who might be indicted!"

That would be an extreme (we hope) example, but the fact remains that any number of officially independent committees can spend big bucks on political advertising, and a lot of it is going to be negative.

That's because negative advertising almost always works, easily outdistancing advertisements that call for honest and honorable campaigning.



RUST Coalition meets recently on WSC campus

"The newly identified population in Missouri demonstrates that the insect is able to travel on infested firewood and establish itself long distances from other known populations," said Eric Berg, Nebraska Forest Service community forestry program leader. "The Missouri population also is of particular concern as it brings the insect one step closer to Nebraska and demonstrates its potential to be almost anywhere in the U.S. when-

ever people are transporting infested firewood into areas where ash trees are present." Emerald ash borer is a non-native, or invasive, insect that attacks and kills all native ash species, including white, green, black and autumn purple. The beetle disrupts the tree's ability to transport water and nutri

EAB most commonly is spread through the transport of infested firewood. For this reason, citizens are urged to buy local firewood at their campsites and burn all their wood on site.

EAB was first detected in southeast Michigan in 2002. The insect currently is present in Michigan, Illinois Indiana, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Maryland, West Virginia and Ontario, Canada, as well as Missouri and Wisconsin. Experts estimate EAB has killed more than 50 million ash trees. In Nebraska, there are an estimated 2.2 million ash trees planted in towns and cities, and in some Nebraska

communities, 20 to 30 percent of the total tree resource is ash. Additionally, there are an estimated 30 million ash trees in forests and conservation plantings. When EAB arrives in Nebraska, these trees all will be at risk However, state and federal agencies are preparing for EAB's arrival. "About three years ago we started to realize that EAB would eventually be a problem in Nebraska," says

Mark Harrell, Nebraska Forest Service forest health program leader. "Several of us from the Nebraska Forest Service, Nebraska Department of Agriculture and U.S. Department of Agriculture's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service began talking about what we should do to get ready for it." Harrell says those discussions led to the formation of Nebraska's EAB Working Group and eventually the

Nebraska EAB Readiness Plan, which outlines what various agencies and professional groups will do before and after the insect arrives in Nebraska.

Since October 2007, state forestry agencies in Kansas, Nebraska, North Dakota and South Dakota have been working together to prepare for the arrival of invasive species, such as EAB, in the Great Plains by assessing the region's tree resources, determining and addressing the potential impacts of invasives to those resources, creating public awareness of invasives and promoting species diversity. The project, the Great Plains Tree and Forests Invasives Initiative, is funded in part by a U.S. Forest Service grant.

Symptoms of EAB include winding tunnels just under the bark, one-eighth inch, D-shaped exit holes on the trunk, as well as canopy loss, usually from the top down. Ash trees infested with EAB also may have sprouts growing from the roots or trunk of the tree. Other symptoms include vertical splitting in the bark on the trunk and increased woodpecker activity.

The insect itself is bright, metallic green with a flat back. Adults typically are one-half inch long. Researching agriculture's impact on prices for food

withdrawal" mode this week. It's a good thing the first football game is right around the corner. And hasn't this month been a delight for weather? Less heat, less humidity, a nice breeze, who can ask for anything more?

I've been collecting some items regarding the price of agricultural products lately; it seems we are being blamed for the high price of food! I admit I never thought I would see \$7 corn. But I refuse to believe it's responsible for the food shortages.

For instance, in a 14-oz. box of corn flakes costing \$2.79, the value of the corn is 4 cents.

Americans still spend only 10 percent of their personal income on food, the lowest of any nation in the world. The impact of 39 percent higher corn prices on all average food prices is 1 percent, while the impact of energy prices is 300 percent! These facts all come from the national corn growers association, and the USDA.

Then there is the report of a study at Texas A&M in the Nebraska Farmer that shows that beef actually protects from heart disease. It shows that by increasing the grain in the cattle's ration we increase oleic acid, which tends

Nebraska Cattlemen, has refuted that very handily.

The EPA does not even list livestock as a concern in the US with regard to carbon dioxide emissions. Methane emissions from beef cattle declined by 3 percent because of decrease in cattle population and improvement in feed quality.

Apparently, the largest emitter of methane gas is solid waste landfills. However, overall, from 1990 to 2005, emissions of methane from all sources decreased by 11.5 per-

Larry points out that our beef production system does not require clearing forest land for grazing and we can actually boast of more acres of forestland now than 100 years ago. We graze cattle on land that is unsuitable for crop production, which more than doubles the land area that can be used to produce food in this country and across the globe.

He adds that eating less beef will not solve the greenhouse gas problem, but it will negatively affect our diet quality by restricting an important source of protein, iron, and zinc. Iron deficiency is the most common nutritional deficiency worldwide, and beef provides the most readily available and easily absorbed source of iron.

Program (ELAP).

The 2008 Act requires producers who wish to participate in the new disaster programs to have crop insurance or noninsured crop disaster assistance (NAP) coverage for the land for which assistance is being requested, and for all farms in all counties in which they have an interest.

The 2008 Act authorizes a waiver that allows producers to pay a fee, called a "buy-in" fee, to be eligible for this new disaster assis-Every producer whose tance. crops, including grazing lands, are not fully covered by crop insurance

The buy-in fee is due no later than Sept. 16, 90 days after the date of enactment, as required by the 2008 Act. Those who miss this opportunity will not be eligible for disaster assistance.

Producers are also reminded that the payment of the applicable buyin fee does not afford the producer crop insurance or NAP coverage; it only provides eligibility for the 2008 disaster programs.







School has started and the Winside Rescue Unit has been busy with SAC Testing (Standardized Assessment of Concussions) of the high school athletes to set up a baseline score to go by if they should receive a mild TBI (Traumatic Brain Injury, otherwise called a concussion).

The baseline test consists of testing for orientation, immediate memory, concentration, and delayed recall. This test equals 30 points, if perfect. So if they have an incident during the sport activity, there is a sideline test that is given and it is compared to the baseline test and if they differ from the baseline to the time of the incident by 1-3 points and are symptomatic, they are taken out of play for the game and will be evaluated by qualified medical personnel. Then, they are evaluated when asymptomatic for a week and if they aren't exhibiting any deficits and have second leading cause of a TBI. Along with the SAC Testing they did the BESS(Balance Error Scoring System) and this test consists of three different stances each with their eyes (opened and closed). This reassessment test does not take place until after 24 hour period of time if student is asympto-

Concussions are classified as a Simple Concussions and Complex Concussions. The simple concussions are signs or symptoms and the complex concussions are symptoms reoccur with exertion.

The top reasons athletes choose not to report concussions are they don't think it was serious, don't want to leave the game, didn't realize they sustained a concussion, and they didn't want to let your teammates down.
