# Wayne Schools superintendent announces his resignation

Dr. Joe Reinert, Wayne Community Schools Superintendent, announced his resignation effective June 30, 2009 at Monday's Wayne Community School Board meeting. The board accepted his resigna-

Giving the following explanation for his resignation, "My decision is reflective of my belief that the district's interest would be served, at this point, by the search for and selection of a new leader for the 2009-10 school year. I have also decided to move on to other job opportunities and positions with the hope of taking best advantage of

my most productive career years." He added that by announcing his resignation this early, it allows the Board of Education the greatest access to the largest pool of potential applicants available, while allowing him to seek the best match possible between his capabilities, education, experience and the needs and wants of the community.

Kaye Morris, board president, said, "In accepting Dr. Reinert's resignation, the Board of Education would like to express to Dr. Reinert the thanks of the school district and community for his nearly 10 years of service to the children of our schools. We wish Dr. Reinert well in life and his future endeavors. The Board of Education taking office in January will initiate a search process for a superintendent of schools for the 2009-10 school year."

After completing her Ph.D. at Texas Woman's University, she became the first full time psychologist for the Lewisville schools. Later, she became the psychologist for the Santa Fe, N.Mex., schools. When her husband, George, transferred to New York City, she served as a psychologist in a mental health clinic and taught at Pace University in New York.

Throughout the years, Susan served as a school board member, a Child Welfare Board member, a religious education teacher and a 4-H horsemanship leader. Currently, she is a docent at St. Francis Cathedral/Basilica in Santa Fe, N.Mex., and a member of the Marriage Preparation Ministry at St. Thomas Aquinas Church in Avondale, Ariz. Susan is a member of the Board of Trustees for the Wayne State College Foundation.

Susan and George are the parents of five children, grandparents of 10 and greatgrandparents of seven.

George entered the Army after graduation and served his tour of duty in the Counter Intelligence Corps. In 1959, he joined the actuarial department of the

Currently he is a member of the Marriage Preparation Ministry at St. Thomas Aquinas Church in Avondale, Ariz. George is a member of the Board of Trustees for the Wayne State College Foundation.



past two weeks, a number of local and area contractors and their equipment have worked on deepening the lake. Those involved include Oban Construction of Dakota City with a 60' reach backhoe and Woehler Construction with a 25' reach backhoe and other equip-

"It looks like a million dollar grading job with all the activity right now," said Scott Brummond, Secretary-Treasurer of the Wayne Izaak Walton League of America:

In the early summer of 2008, Jeff Blaser, Nebraska Game & Parks Commission - Private Waters Specialist, came to Wayne and surveyed for the existence of any fish species left in the lake. He electroshocked the lake and reported that there were no fish in the lake.

"We discussed options to restore the lake to its past fish carrying capacity and also its ability to survive the harsh Nebraska winters and hot summers," Brummond

In June of 2008 the local Izaak Walton League started a fund-raising campaign to pay for deepening the lake, re-stocking, aeration pumps, and other grounds and building restoration.

In July of 2008 Carlson Clearwater Farms of Wayne stocked the lake with 500 (2"-4") bluegills and then later an additional 100-150 fish of approximately the same

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

# Nebraska has its first flu case - still time to get flu shot

Nebraska has its first laboratory-confirmed case of influenza for 2008, according to the Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services. The case is from Lancaster

"We now know for certain that flu is here in Nebraska," said Dr. Joann Schaefer, Chief Medical Officer. "The best thing you can do to protect yourself from it is to get your flu shot."

Influenza can be a serious illness. It leads to 200,000 hospitalizations and 36,000 deaths in the United States every year.

The very young, the very old, and those with compromised immune systems are most susceptible to viruses. Getting the flu can lead to pneumonia - a frequent cause of death among the elderly.

An antiviral can be prescribed by a physician within the first 48 hours of the appearance of symptoms. This can lessen the symptoms of the disease. After 48 hours, it is generally not effective.

Antibiotics won't work on viruses like influenza. Antibiotics won't make a patient feel better, recover quicker or keep others from getting sick. Widespread use of antibiotics is fueling an increase in drug-resistant bacteria.

Dr. Schaefer said. "They just don't work at all on viruses.' It is especially important to get a

flu shot now.

"Antibiotics are not a cure-all,"

"Holidays mean parties and gettogethers where people mingle and spread viruses," she said. "By getting immunized against influenza, you can greatly reduce your chances of becoming ill."

Handwashing can also reduce the chances of contracting viruses

"Handwashing doesn't take much time or effort, but it offers great rewards in terms of preventing illness," Dr. Schaefer said. "Viruses can be on everything you touch - door knobs, keyboards, toilet handles, dishes, etc."

Good handwashing involves wetting your hands with warm, running water, lathering well for 20 seconds, scrubbing all surfaces, and drying with a clean towel. Alcoholbased hand sanitizers are an alternative to hand washing when soap and water aren't available.

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





Wakefield had two players finish in double figures as Chad Clay scored 12 while Nixon added 10.


The Trojans were plagued by turnovers throughout the night as they finished with 15 compared to just 10 for the Knights.



#### WSC volleyball team ranked 25th in final Bison/AVCA Division II Top 25 Coaches Poll

The Wayne State College volleyball team is ranked 25th in the final Bison/American Volleyball Coaches Association (AVCA) Division II Top 25 Coaches Poll that was released late Monday afternoon.

The Wildcats finished the season with a 23-10 record and advanced to the NCAA Division II National Volleyball Tournament for the fourth straight season.

It was also the second time in the last three seasons that WSC ended the season ranked in the Top 25. The 2006 team (30-8) finished the season ranked 20th in NCAA Division II.

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

# Seeing the forest for the tree

The warning inherent in 'not being able to see the forest for the trees' is generally understood to be particularly appropriate where

lawmaking is involved. A public policy debate reflective of inadequate vision might go like

"Well, here we have this rotten tree in the middle of the forest, and science tells us that, unless we get rid of it quick, its infection will spread to the other trees in this beautiful, dense forest. We need to act quickly!"

"Yes, indeed. But, if we chop it down, then we will have to chop it up. And if we chop it up, we'll have to haul it out. And if we haul it out, we might damage more trees. Isn't there a more cost-effective way to get rid of this thing?"

"Certainly! The fastest and most economical way to get rid of this one tree is to just burn it down. One match, one tree! And tree huggers say that when a tree is destroyed by fire it replenishes the soil, or something."

In the wake of the resulting fire, which ultimately took out the tree, the forest, a half-dozen farms and a high-tone suburb, there came an outbreak of headshaking and con-

Everyone was so well intentioned.

Thus it happens. Over and over and over.

In Washington, it can involve anything from notoriously prodigious costs of hammers and toilet seats, to the gargantuan costs of bailing out banks, or whole industries. Somehow, the same questions keep coming up.

"Uh, where'd the money go?"
"Whoa! Did you know that was gonna' happen?"

In Lincoln, and other state capitols, the differences are of scale. But the same sort of whoopsie! is possible.

Now, consider this.

If you've seen very many government buildings, you know that their designers are fond of sayings and slogans and prayers. "In God Trust" and the Ten Commandments have always enjoyed particular favor.

Nebraska's statehouse is inscribed with two assertions of particular worth.

"Political society exists for the sake of Noble living"

And, my favorite: "The salvation of the State is watchfulness in the Citizens"

The thing is, such pronouncements are of a general nature. What has become obvious, in the wake of everything from

Nebraska's safe haven law debacle to the sub-prime lending fiasco in Washington, is that policymakers need reminders that are both more direct, and applicable to virtually every situation - from the lawmaking chamber to the committee

hearing room to the restrooms.

It is with this in mind that we suggest an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Nebraska, requiring that, upon a wall in every senator's office, in every committee hearing room, in several places around the legislative chamber, and even in every restroom accessed by lawmakers in the Capitol, there hang, in bold type, appropriately sized plaques, proclaiming Murphy's Law:

"If It Can Go Wrong, It Will Go Wrong"

Two things prove the worth of this proposal.

The first is history.

The second is the fact that the best indicator of future behavior is previous behavior.


We would further suggest that, when lawmakers are meeting in the legislative chamber, the Clerk of the Legislature be required, every hour on the hour, to make the following announcement:

"Mr. President, in accordance with requirements of the state constitution, and on behalf of the taxpayers and future generations of taxpayers, you and the members of the Legislature are reminded that, if it can go wrong, it will go wrong. You are urged to conduct yourselves accordingly."

Those signs all over the place, and that constant verbal reminder, would no doubt be an almost constant annoyance to a lot of senators, and to most lobbyists.

And some lawmakers would no doubt rail against the whole setup, claiming that it is a waste of time, and time is precious, etc. Such an argument might easily be rebutted, if not refuted, by another old saying reflective of the history of lawmaking.

"There's never time to do it right, but there's always time to do it

Wayne was the Revolutionary equivalent of Gen. George Patton, for whom retreat and surrender unthinkable. His most famous battle, in 1779, was Stony Point, near West Point, where he led a small group of elite troops who scaled a steep fortified hill at midnight and captured a strategic fort on the Hudson from a much larger contingent of British.

His final battle was the Battle of Fallen Timbers in 1794, which broke the alliance between the British and the Indians and opened the door for an entire century of rapid westward migration.

Although this battle was fought in Ohio, it was directly relevant to the eventual settlement of places like Nebraska, which might not even have become part of the USA if Wayne's crucial victory had not begun the period of national expan-

sionism now known as Manifest Destiny.

### USDA to conduct request for referendum on pork check-off

Agriculture's (USDA) Agricultural Marketing Service (AMS) has announced that it will conduct a Request for Referendum next month among eligible producers and importers of hogs, pigs, pork, and pork products to determine if they want a referendum on the Pork Promotion, Research, and Consumer Information Order, commonly known as the Pork Checkoff Program.

Participation is voluntary, and only individuals who desire a referendum on the Pork Checkoff Program should participate.

USDA will only conduct a referendum on the order if at least 15 percent of the total number of eligible pork producers and importers

The U.S. Department of request a referendum.

The total number of producers and importers eligible to participate in the Request for Referendum is approximately 69,446; therefore, at least 10,417 eligible producers and importers must request a referendum. If necessary, the referendum will be conducted within one year after the results of the Request for Referendum are announced. If results of the Request for Referendum indicate that a referendum is not supported, a referendum would not be conducted.

The Request for Referendum will be held Dec. 8, 2008 through Jan. 2, 2009. Producers and importers who were engaged in pork production or in the importation of hogs, pigs, pork, or pork products between Jan. 1, 2007, and Dec. 31, 2007, and were at least 18 years of age on or before Dec. 31, 2007, are eligible to participate.

For producers, the Request for Referendum will be conducted at the USDA County Farm Service Agency (FSA) offices where their administrative farm records are maintained. For producers not participating in FSA programs, the opportunity to participate will be provided at the County FSA office where the person owns or rents land. Eligible producers may obtain form LS-54-1: Pork Promotion, Research, and Consumer Information Request for Referendum from those offices either in person, by mail or by facsimile. Forms may also be obtained http://www.ams.usda.gov/ LSMarketingPrograms.



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
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
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# Attorney General Jon Bruning launches PSA campaign on video game ratings just in time for holiday shopping season

With the holiday shopping season underway, Attorney General Bruning and the Entertainment Software Rating Board (ESRB), which assigns ratings for computer and video games, recently announced a new Public Service Announcement (PSA) campaign to educate Nebraska's parents about the video game rating system. In the new TV and radio spots, Bruning urges parents to check the rating symbol each time they buy or rent a video game to make sure it's suitable for their children and

"Parents should be involved and take an active role in choosing games for their kids," said Bruning. "The ESRB ratings are an effective tool every parent can use to pick video games that are age-appropriate and family-friendly. I use them when I buy games for my children. I hope Nebraskans will too."

The PSAs are being delivered to radio and television stations and local cable TV operators in Nebraska this month as parents head to the stores to buy video games as holiday gifts. The PSAs can be viewed on ESRB's Web site: http://www.esrb.org/about/media\_library.jsp

ESRB has also prepared a brochure providing additional information about the rating system. Parents can download the brochure from the Attorney General's Web site at http://www.ago.ne.gov. Click on the "Kids and Parents" section.

"Video games are no different than movies and TV shows in that they are created for a diverse audience of all ages," said ESRB president Patricia Vance. "That is why it is so important that parents remember to check the rating when purchasing games for their children. We're grateful to have Attorney General Bruning's support in reaching out to Nebraska's parents and educating them about the ratings so they can be sure that the games they give as gifts

this year are ones they consider appropriate."

The ESRB video game ratings employ a two-part system. As seen in the illustration below, rating symbols on the front of virtually every game package sold at retail provide an age recommendation, such as EC (Early Childhood 3+), E (Everyone 6+),

E10+ (Everyone 10 and up), T (Teen 13+) and M (Mature 17+). On the back of each package, next to the rating, are content descriptors that provide information about what's in the game that may have triggered the rating, or may be of interest or concern to parents.
