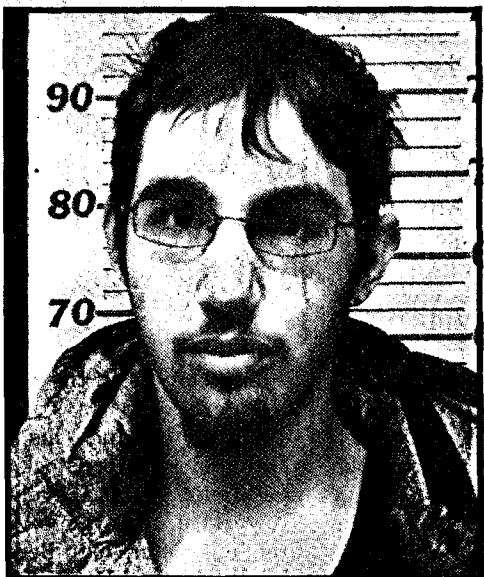
## Wayne sexual assault suspect arrested

On March 23 the Wayne Police Department arrested Tyler Davis, a 19 year old Wayne man, for First Degree Sexual Assault of a Child.

This arrest closed an 11 day joint investigation between the Wayne Police Department and the Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services.

When Health and Human Services received a report alleging the sexual abuse of a child under age 12, that information was given to the Wayne Police Department. A joint investigation was begun on March 12 which lead to Davis' arrest. There is no indication that more than one victim was involved.

Davis is being held in the Thurston County Jail with a bond of \$100,000. Formal charges are pending in the Wayne County Court. Davis is considered innocent until proven guilty.

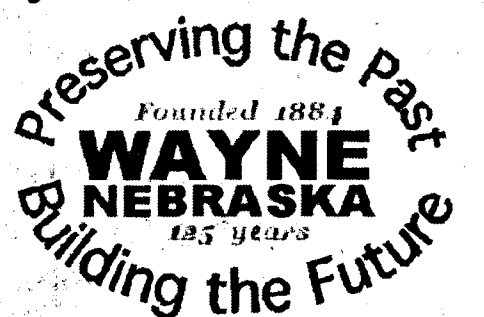
## Q125 musical event planned; looking back 50 years

The Wayne High School musical, "Grease" is scheduled for Thursday-Saturday, April 2-4 with 7 p.m. evening performances in the Wayne High School Lecture Hall. The musical is one of many Q-125 events planned throughout the year.

There is a matinee of the musical on Wednesday afternoon, April 1, for the Middle School students. Middle School students and faculty are being encouraged to dress in 1950's attire. A Q125 Celebration t-shirt will be presented to the "best-dressed" boy, girl and faculty member in the Middle School.

For all three evening performances of the musical, a photo display from the 1950's will greet those attending. Also on Saturday night, out among the '50's cars, Udder Delights will have their "Cow" passing out coupons for \$1 off a sundae at your local Udder Delights Soda Fountain.

Changes are coming to courthouses in Nebraska. Legislative Bill 911 passed in the 2008 Legislative Session and will become law effective on June 22, 2009. During the week of June 22, installation of replace-

ment equipment in the county treasurers offices will be made across the state. The legislation authorized a variety of driver licensing security initiatives.

Driver license and identification card issuance will move from an over-the-counter process to a central card production and issuance process. The digital photo and signature capture will move from the county treasurer to the Department of Motor Vehicles driver licensing staff. County treasurers will continue to collect the fees and issue a 30-day receipt with or without driving privileges. The actual driver license

or identification card will arrive via U.S. mail.

As for titles and registrations, Legislative Bill 49, which mandates one stop issuance of titles and registrations by county treasurers, was signed into law by Governor Heineman on Feb. 12, 2009. The law allows the Department of Motor Vehicles to establish a schedule for transferring the responsibility for title issuance from the county clerk's office to the county treasurer's office. This schedule will allow the completion of

## Statement on economy, campus given from Wayne State College

As the nation weathers this economic crisis and Wayne State College faces the strong possibility of only a small increase, if any, in our state funding it is now obvious that WSC's 2009-11 biennium budget will necessitate eliminating some of our vacant positions.

While making these difficult decisions, we have preserved Wayne State's commitment to teaching and learning excellence, student success and regional service. These efforts have included working hard to preserve our sense of community. While these are difficult decisions, these cuts are necessary to meet the projected funding shortfall.

In order to meet the targeted reductions, Wayne State will be trimming more than \$340,000 from non personnel services

budgets next year. Personnel cuts will total more than \$700,000 in the first year of the biennium. During this first year, retirements and resignations will account for a seven FTE reduction in faculty slots. Retirements and resignations will also account for a 2.58 FTE reduction in professional staff positions. Additional budget reductions have yet to be determined for the second year of the biennium.

We are confident that Wayne State has retained the ability to fulfill its mission. Wayne State has faced economic crises before and we will face them again in the future. The key to the preservation of our academic community of students, faculty, staff, and alumni is how we react to crises. We must support each other through what promises to be a difficult time.

Pack 178 of Pierce will be collecting for the Food Bank at the UCC Church in Pierce.

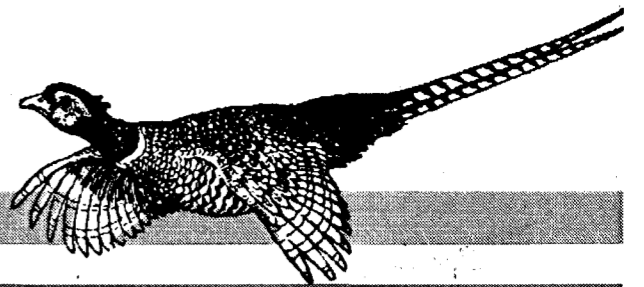
Two units from Neligh will be collecting for the Antelope County Food Pantry.

Robert (Bob) G. Sheckler was born April 6, 1929 to George and Martha (Sward) Sheckler in Omaha. He grew up in the Petersburg area and graduated from Petersburg High School in 1947.

He attended Norfolk Junior College from 1948-1950 majoring in accounting and mathematics and completed his third year at Wayne State Teachers College. He was inducted into the army in August of 1951 and served 13 months in Headquarters Company Forward in the 25th Infantry Division in Korea. He was presented a meritorious citation and medal six months after being released from the service. He received his Bachelor of Arts Degree from Wayne State College in 1954. On Aug. 7, 1955 he married Marlene Jensen at Albion. To this union five children were born: Paul, Debra, Robert, Roger and Beth. His first teaching job was at Center High School in Center for two years. He was the superintendent of Schools at Brunswick from 1956-1960. Bob received his Masters in teaching from Wayne State College. He was the superintendent at Verdigre Public Schools from 1960-1966. In the fall of 1966, Bob accepted a position at the State Capitol in Lincoln being the Coordinator Director for student Financial Aide for the State of Nebraska. He also took classes at UNL for his doctorate's degree. From 1972-1974 he was the principal at Winnebago Public Schools, helping design and build the new school.

He purchased the Chevrolet Dealership from Henry Chalupnik in 1974 in Verdigre and renamed it "Bob Sheckler Chevrolet INC". During this time he won many awards and trips. In 1983, he moved to Wayne where he became the Wayne County School Superintendent until he retired. Even retired he loved to teach and filled in as a substitute teacher in many schools in the area. He married Evelyn O'Mara on June 20, 1988. He enjoyed fishing, camping, ham radios, Nebraska football, raising butterflies and was an avid Chicago Cub fan. He hunted with his sons and grandsons west of Verdigre a "deer camp" until his health would not allow it. Wayne State College will host its fifth annual Language Arts Festival on April 17 for students in grades seven through 12. Students, teachers and parents are invited to participate in workshops on writing, literature, and language from 9 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Teachers with groups attending should register by March 31.

Presenters will include Nebraska writers Barbara Schmitz, Karen Wingett, Twyla Hansen and Matt Mason. The visiting author will

be Jason Glaser, author of books on mythology, history, science, and sports, and scriptwriter of graphic nonfiction books. The festival is organized by Dr. Janet Gilligan, professor of English at WSC.

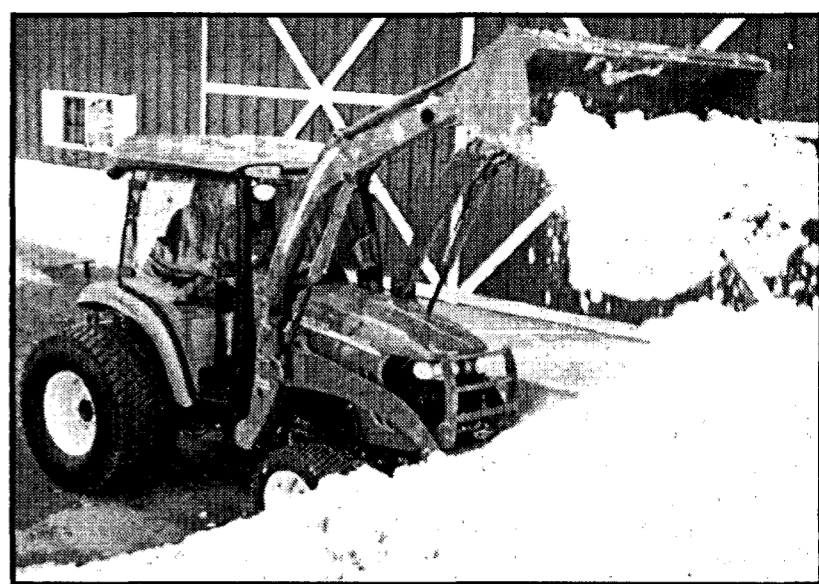

## Details announced for summer Driver's Education

The Summer Driver Education Program begins Tuesday, May 26 and runs through Friday, June 5 at the Wayne Middle School Cafeteria.

During the first week classes are held from 8:30 to 11:15 a.m. and during the second week, they run from 8:30 to 11 a.m. Students are required to be present in the classroom for 20 hours of class work. Driving time behind the wheel for each student is five hours plus testing time. Driving times can be adjusted to meet the needs of the individual student while class time cannot.

The cost of the class is \$225 per student. This is made payable to Wayne Community Schools and is due by Monday, May 11.

A scholarship is provided by Providence Medical Center for those who financially qualify. Those interested in finding out more about the scholarship program are asked to contact the Wayne High School Guidance Office, (402) 375-3150, for more information.

Students who attain the age of 14 on or before Oct. 15, 2009 are eligible for the Wayne Schools Driver Education Program. When students are ready to apply for a Provisional Operator's Permit (POP), they may complete a Department of Motor Vehicles approved driver safety course such as the one offered at Wayne Schools and successfully complete a written and driving test given by the Wayne Driver Education Instructor at the end of the course.

The student will not have to take either a written or a driving test at the court house to receive the POP. The testing procedures are the same for those seeking a school permit.

"They are the true heart and soul of The American Red Cross Disaster Action Response as they are usually the first ones to answer 'YES' when we put out our requests for help, especially outside our local chapter area," according to Lori Carollo, Executive Director of the Northeast Nebraska Chapter.

Chapters were put on alert last week and received a request for assistance on Monday asking for

volunteers. The work in North Dakota will mostly be Mass Care, which will include mobile feeding for both workers who are doing sandbagging efforts as well as any clients who may be asked or forced to evacuate their homes. If families are asked or required to evacuate and have no other place to stay, the Red Cross will then care for them and arrange a safe place for the people to stay.

"Until we know the extent of this operation, we just take each day as it comes," according to Carollo. "We have been told that our volunteers will be working under what we call 'Hardship Codes' which include extremely cold temperatures and water."

## Salesman goes 'extra mile' for customer

Going the extra mile, Derek Hill, a salesman at Northeast Equipment, Inc. of Wayne, had a customer with a unique situation. Ken "Easy" Dohren of Dohren Truck Repair in Wisner came to him looking for a new mode of transportation.

Easy had suffered a stroke a few months earlier and had lost most of the use on the left side of his body. He needed something to save him some steps. "I got a used John Deere Gator we had and let him test drive it," Hill said. "It was just what he needed." A new Gator was ordered, but that is just the beginning of the story.

When Easy and his wife Donna came to pick up their new Gator, Easy asked about a different tractor, one that would be easier for him to drive. At the time he owned a tractor that needed his left leg to push in a clutch and this was difficult for him. "I was slow getting to the clutch and almost had some crashes," Dohren said.

Hill thought of the perfect tractor, a John Deere 4520 compact utility tractor, with a hydro transmission. Hydro is short for Hydrostat, and with that type of transmission the speed and direction of the tractor is controlled by two foot pedals on the right hand side. There is one pedal to go forward and one to go in reverse. By having these on the right side,

Hill knew this would be the right fit. "Another cool thing about this tractor is almost all of the controls are on the right hand side; the igni-

tion key, the joystick to control the loader, the levers to control all of the hydraulic functions, and controls for the radio, heater and air conditioner." One short test drive and Easy was sold.

Northeast Equipment ordered Easy his new tractor. "We did a few small things to the tractor when it arrived," Hill said. "We added another step to the bottom of the ladder to get into the cab. It was a little high to the first step and by adding one more step, it lowered that by at least 10 inches."

A set of rear weights and some rear work lights and it was ready for delivery. Easy uses his tractor to do snow plowing in the winter and around his business the rest of the year. "The tractor is the cat's meow and I wouldn't trade it for nothing," Dohren said. "Northeast Equipment is one of the better dealerships in Northeast Nebraska. The way they take care of their customers is really great. They go the extra mile to do what you want."

Hill added Easy was a really unique case of a person who needed something to give him a big part of his life back and Northeast Equipment was just lucky he gave them a chance to help. Easy has added another piece of equipment to his collection, a new John Deere Gator. The first Gator he bought had a pesky choke lever on the left hand side. His new Gator has fuel injection, so no more choke lever, and guess where all of the controls are...the right hand side.

## Some electric customers to receive energy-use survey

In a continuing effort to provide for the future needs of their service area Nebraska Public Power District (NPPD) is conducting a study of the energy use characteristics of its residential customers.

The 2009 Residential Appliance Survey is the 14th such survey since 1980.

During late March, questionnaires will be sent to a random sample of 4,000 residential customers of utilities served at wholesale by NPPD and 2,500 NPPD retail residential customers.

The wholesale random sample was acquired from Experian of Lincoln.

According to Sheila Grieb, Account Management Coordinator for NPPD, "this survey is important for many reasons:

- We need to identify the residential energy use as part of a long-term load forecast;

- This information is key to residential growth modeling variable that is part of the overall load forecasting model development and is gathered on a three-year cyclic

basis;

- Historically, residential energy use has made up over 40 percent of total energy use at the meter;

- We project that residential energy use will make up approximately 36 percent of total energy use at the meter in future years.

- Past incentive programs have played a part in the market share growth of these residential appliance systems (heating and heat pumps especially). We need to continue collecting this data to determine if incentive programs (when used) effect market share growth.
- This survey will provide information on customer's reactions to recent fluctuations in the natural gas and propane prices.

This study will provide information for NPPD's wholesale service area as a whole. The sample size is not sufficiently large enough to obtain information for individual utility service areas.

Copies of the final results of the survey will be made available to wholesale customers in the NPPD service area.

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# Local Red Cross provides military assistance to families

The Northeast Nebraska Chapter of the American Red Cross has always been the main communication system in providing messages between military soldiers and their families. This system has been in place since the early 1900's and all messages requesting emergency leave MUST go through the Red Cross as they do all the verification and then a message referred to as an "AM-GRAM" is put through to the soldier's commanding officer to determine whether or not that leave request will be granted.

"Even if a soldier is within the United States, the process is still that a message needs to go through the Red Cross," according to Lori Carollo, Executive Director of the Northeast Nebraska Chapter. "Another thing that I don't think many people know is that there is a cost for us to put these messages through. We now have to pay \$23 for every military message that is sent through the Red Cross to a member serving stateside or overseas in the military."

With the war still on-going, the local chapter continues to assist anyone with a loved one overseas or anywhere in the military with any communication need they may have. The local chapter actually has processed 21 military communication messages so far this fiscal year, and they continue to see an increase every year it seems.

"I find that we still need to stress to families that even though there is email and even personal telephone calls, there are still the military regulations in place that require a Red Cross notification that confirms any information that is requested to be given to the soldier in request for any type of leave," states Carollo. "This system has been in place for years

and military units across the world have come to know that when a communication is received from the Red Cross, all information has been confirmed and is accurate. There is also the determination regarding whether other military personnel or a chaplain needs to be present when giving the information to a soldier."

The Northeast Nebraska Chapter is fortunate to have five trained Red Cross Military Case Workers - Wayne Denklaue, Layne Beza, Brad Wieland, Heather Claussen and Lori Carollo.

Calls can be initiated through the chapter office at 402-375-5209 and after hours by contacting the Wayne Dispatch at 402-375-2626 and they will reach a Military Case Worker immediately. The time frame is usually very quick depend-

ing on the type of message (how much confirmation needs to be done before putting in the request) and then the location of the soldier, but the average time over the past 6 months has been 4 - 6 hours from the initial call to the Red Cross until the time it reaches the soldier overseas!

March is Red Cross Month. Customers: Customers handle vehicle issues with one office, which should reduce the time involved in transactions and allows for one

payment to the county at the time of vehicle purchase. Eliminates the confusion that customers have about which office has which responsibilities.

Counties: Reduces the amount of computer equipment in the courthouse. Reduces the amount of time spent on each process via the elimination of duplicate keystrokes. The process to issue both the title and registration by the same customer service representative is handled on the vehicle title

and registration system.

DMV: Reduces the cost of supplying duplicate equipment in both the treasurer's and clerk's offices. Reduces maintenance costs of duplicate equipment. Allows for a most cost effective and timely replacement of vehicle title and registration system.

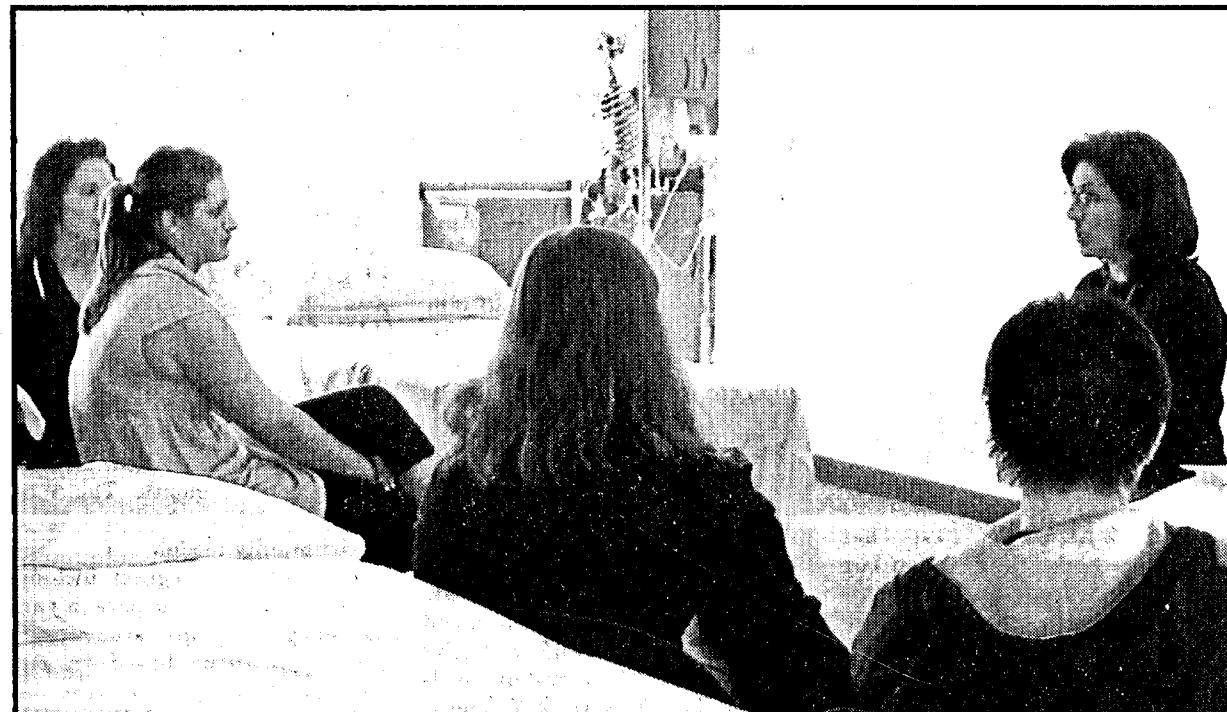
The students also had the opportunity to view a number of anatomical specimens, ranging from heart and lungs to the kidneys.

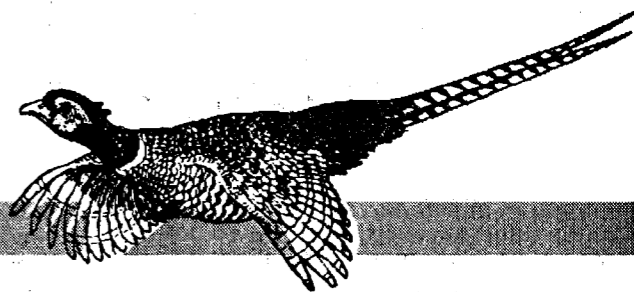

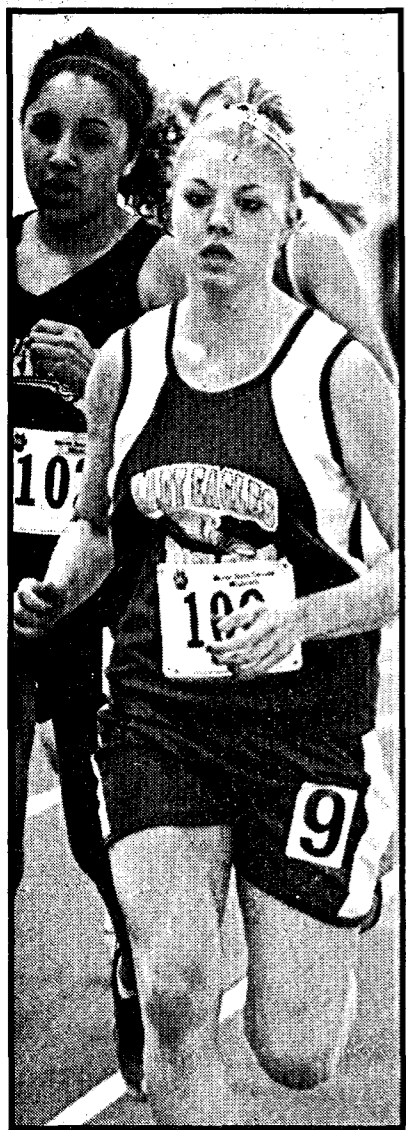
## Area teams get a head start on '09 track and field season at WSC Invite

The Eagles were led individually

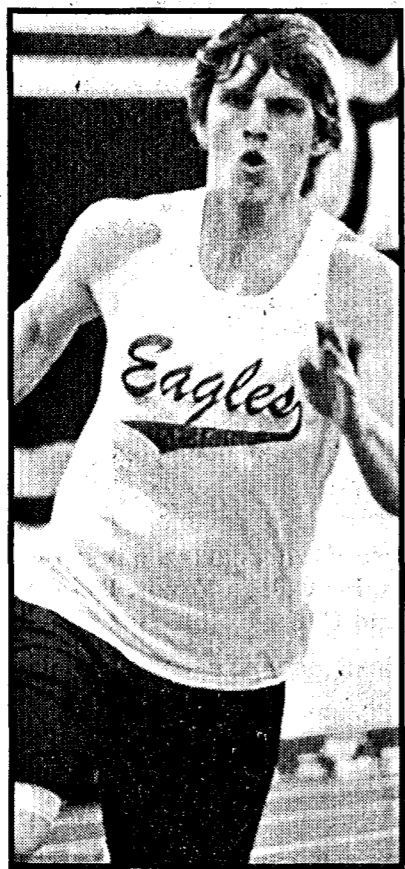

Following Bodlak was Clay, who earned a pair of silver medals in both the 55-meter dash (7.04) and 200-meter dash (24.93).

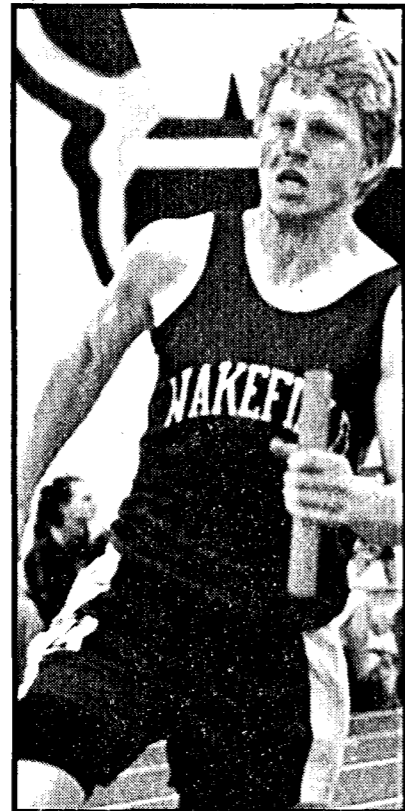
In addition to Bodlak and Clay's success, the Trojans also saw their 4 x 400-meter relay team finish first after they turned in a time of 3:51.04.

The Wayne State College softball team picked up a pair of shutout wins on Sunday at the Missouri Western Tournament in St. Joseph, Mo., as the Wildcats blanked Truman State 4-0 and Northwest Missouri State 3-0.

The Wildcats improved to 15-9 overall with the two wins and finished the two-day tournament with a 2-2 record.

"I was pleased with how our team handled situations during these two games," WSC head coach Krista Unger said.

"They (players) stayed calm and composed at the plate and on defense."

In the second game, WSC saw Goetzing pitch six scoreless innings and belt a two-run homer in the fourth inning to carry the Wildcats to a 3-0 win over Northwest Missouri State.

The Wildcats opened the scoring in the first inning when Amber Baird singled and scored on an Earleywine RBI single to give the Wildcats a 1-0 lead.

From that point on, WSC would be held scoreless until the fourth inning when Greenwood singled and then scored on a two-run homer by Goetzing who closed out the scoring as the Wildcats held on for the 4-0 win.

The Wayne State College softball team ran its record to 13-7 overall following a two-game sweep over non-conference rival Nebraska-Kearney (7-9) last Wednesday in Wayne.

WSC edged UNK 6-4 in game one and then went on to defeat the Lopers by a score of 8-4 in game two.

With the two wins, WSC has now won three straight games.

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# Wildcats overcome three-shot deficit to top Peacocks 598-601 and win WSC Spring Invite

After falling behind 300-303 on Sunday afternoon, the Wayne State College men's golf team rallied for a 598-601 win over Upper Iowa on Monday, to win the two-day WSC

Spring Invitational Men's Golf Tournament at the Wayne Country Club.

WSC shot an impressive 295 on Monday, in extremely windy conditions after hitting a 303 on Sunday

to combine for a two-day total of 598 while runners-up Upper Iowa shot rounds of 300 and 301 for a 601.

I was very excited for the men's team, they have worked very hard. It is great to see their hard work finally get rewarded. Going into the tournament I thought we could possibly get first or maybe last," WSC head coach Troy Harder said.

"The teams have been very close whenever we have played against them in the past. We have played well on day one in the past and not played well on day two, so it was great to see the guys come from behind and get the win. This was a big step for these kids, this will help their confidence going into the spring season."

Freshman Tyler Thompson led a balanced attack for WSC finishing in second place overall with a two-day total of 148 after shooting rounds of 77 and one-under par, 71 on Monday.

"Tyler is going to be a great player for our team. I have been waiting for him to break through and start shooting some great scores for us," Harder said.

"I think he now feels like he can compete against other college golfers. We need some consistent rounds out of him this spring."

Tyler DeJong, earned seventh place with a 151 (76-75) followed by Adam Fields in eighth at 152 (79-73) and Jake Hirz in ninth at 152 (74-78).

Blake Thompson, rounded out the stellar scoring for WSC with a 152 after shooting back-to-back rounds of 76.

The WSC Gold Team (JV) had two players finish in the top 10 to earn medals as Brett Shively finished fifth overall with a 150 (77-73) while Michael Phillips collected 10th with a 152 (78-74).

"The JV team also played great we have several of the JV players that are pushing the starting five for playing time," Harder said.

"I was very proud of these guys to post the scores in which they did. I have about 10 guys that could play in the top five varsity spots. This is a great problem to have."

The Wildcats will return to action on Sunday, March 29 when they travel to St. Joseph, Mo., for the two-day Moila Country Club Spring NSIC Meet.

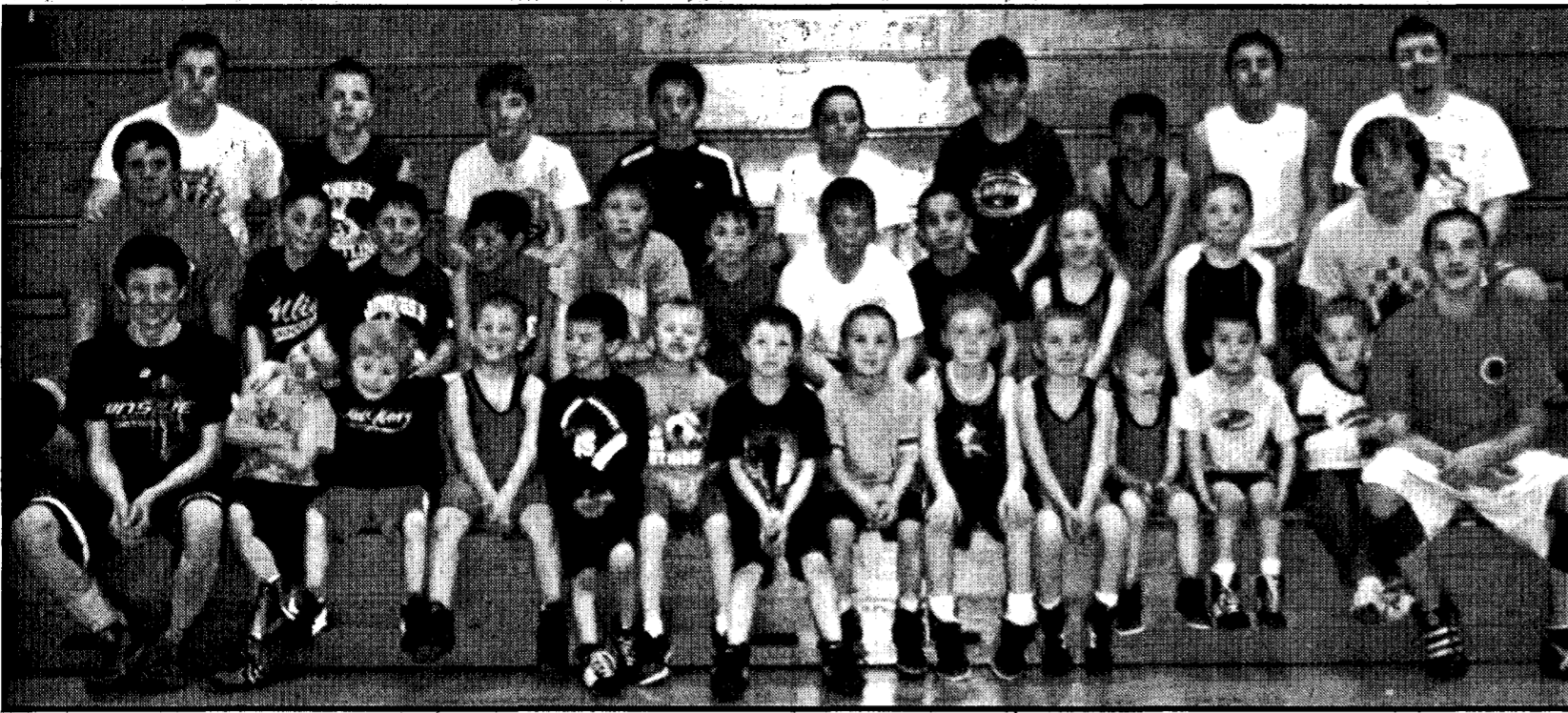

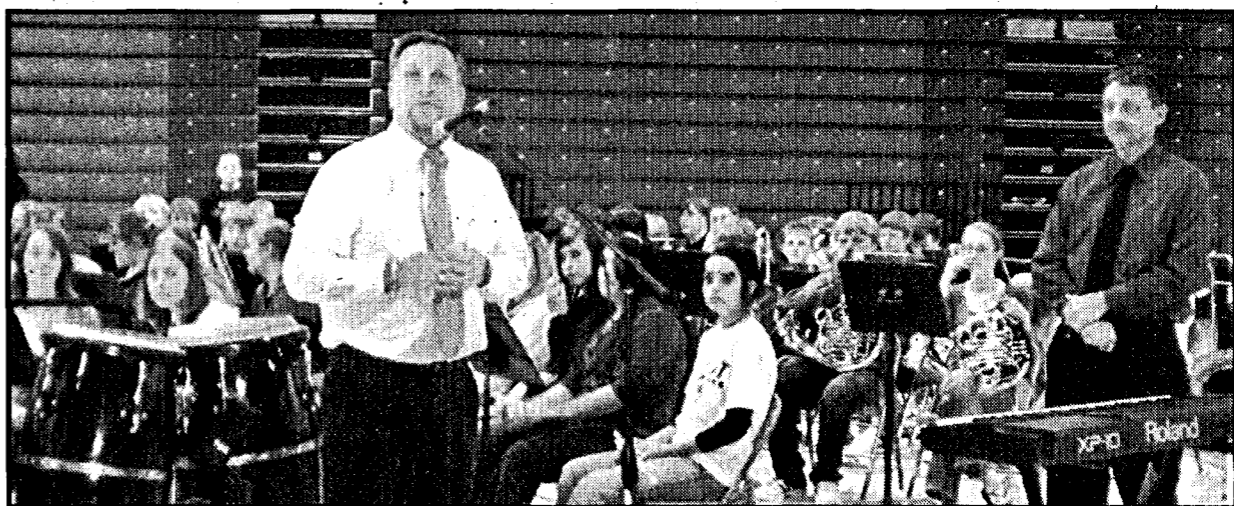

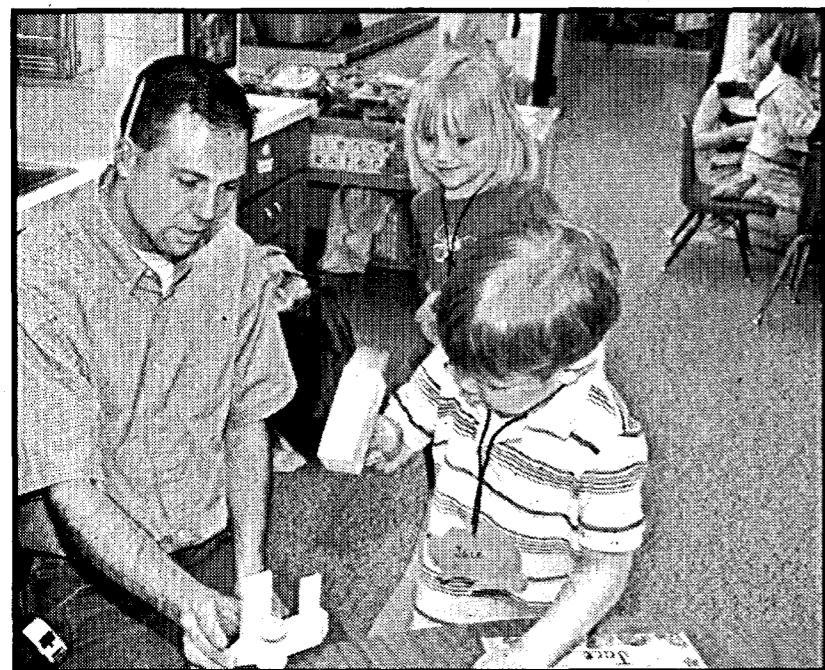

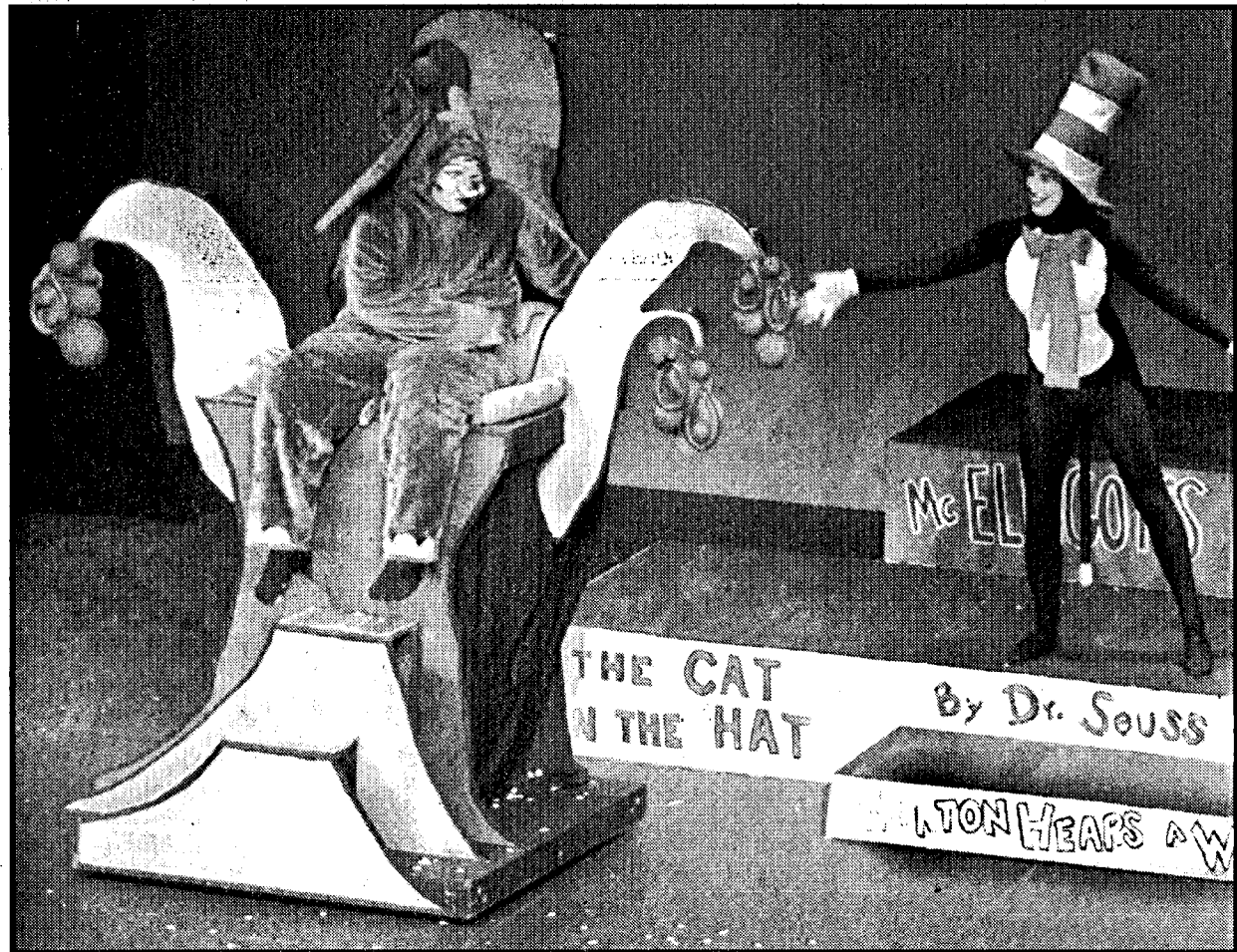

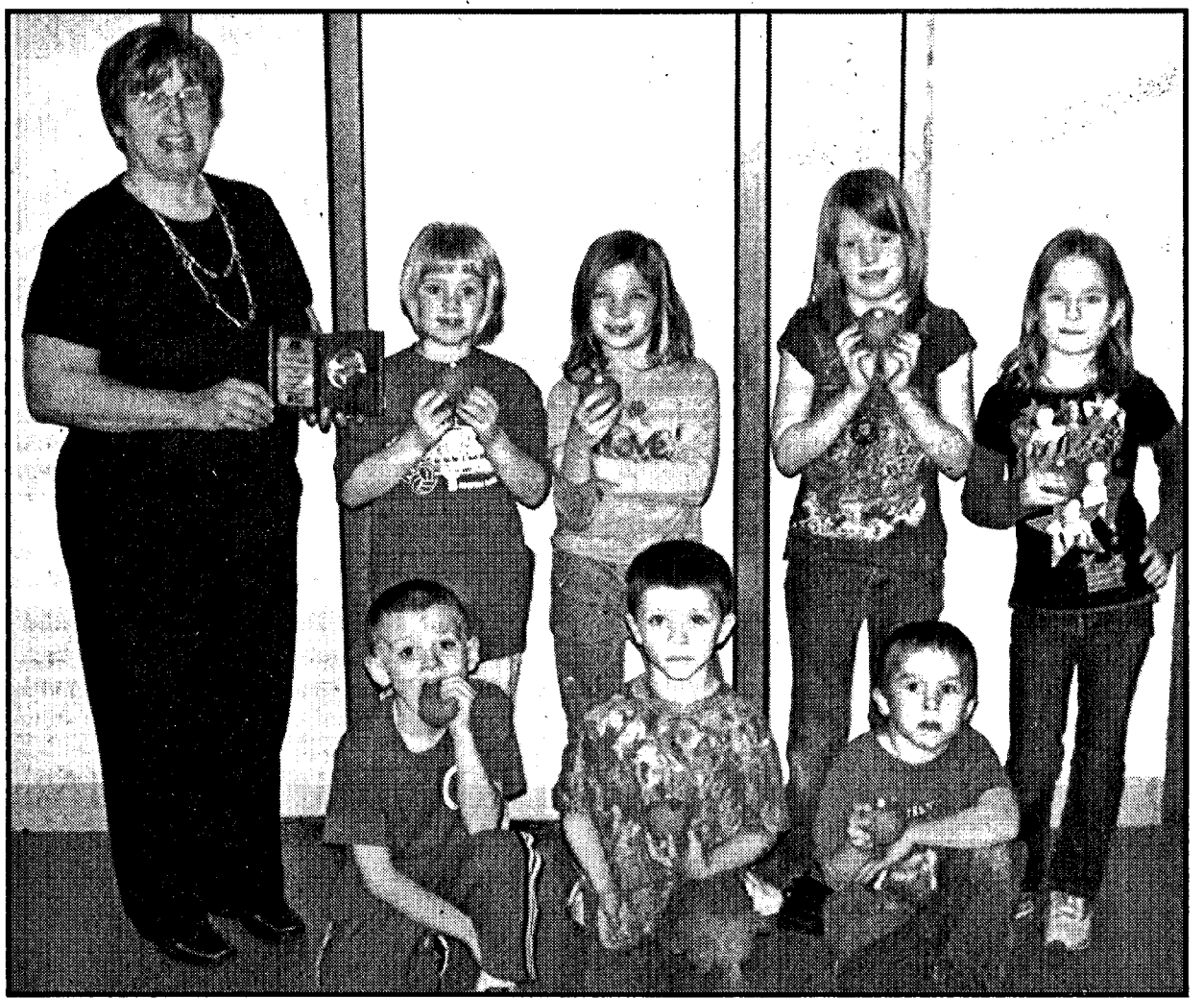

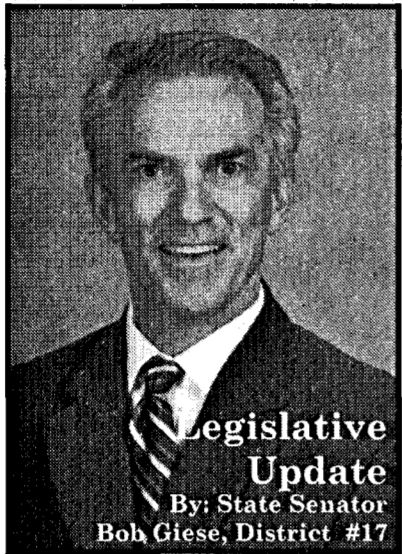
## Weekly Legislative Update

Greetings from the Unicameral! Discussion of senator priority bills continued on the floor last week, among them a bill to change fines for speeding in a construction zone. LB 111, sponsored by Senator Fischer and prioritized by Senator Janssen, would require that in order for speeding fines in a construction zone to be doubled, there must be construction workers actually present. The bill advanced to the second round of debate, and we will likely take up the issue again later this week.

Up and down the hallways of the capitol, the big discussion is what will be done with the nearly \$234 million in stimulus money the state has received for education. In order to give state education officials the time to respond to the ever-changing budget picture, the Education Committee advanced LB 548, which would move back the certification date for state aid to school districts to no later than June 1.

With the budget forecast becoming increasingly hazy, this extension of the deadline will give the Education and Appropriations Committees the time to ensure that stimulus funds are used in the most efficient manner possible while still maintaining our commitment to a strong K-12 education system. LB 548 was advanced to Final Reading on Monday, and will likely be passed sometime next week.

Of course, these education funds are only a fraction of the larger

stimulus picture, and it can be frustrating to try and find out what exactly the stimulus package is helping pay for. To help Nebraska taxpayers follow what money is going where, the Executive Board of the Legislature has established a website at [www.nebraskalegislature.gov/stimulus](http://www.nebraskalegislature.gov/stimulus). Additionally, a public hearing on LB 680, which would appropriate federal money received as a result of the stimulus package, is scheduled for this Thursday before the Appropriations Committee.

# Variety of issues keep legislators busy

There are only three states that don't have laws which specify a woman's right to breast-feed in public.

You guessed it, didn't you? Nebraska is among them. The other two are North Dakota and Idaho.

A legislative committee heard testimony recently on a measure that would make Nebraska the 48th state to enact such legislation.

Jeanne Stolzer, a faculty member at the University of Nebraska - Kearney, made an interesting point. She told the panel that Americans see the female breast as such a sexual thing that it interferes with their understanding that breast-feeding is natural, and good for babies.

She apparently was referencing Americans in Nebraska, North Dakota and Idaho, in particular.

The proposal that would install lethal injection as the state's method for killing condemned killers was being held up in a legislative committee at this writing.

At issue was whether the Legislature should increase the standards for issuing a death sentence. A controversial amendment would require that a sentencing judge, or three-judge panel, find that at least two aggravating circumstances exist, among a list of several, before sending someone convicted of first-degree murder to death row.

The full Legislature can vote to take a bill from a committee and bring it to the floor for debate.

The view from here: Odds are that there are more than enough votes to do just that if the committee doesn't muster enough votes to

advance the bill.

The Legislature's budget-writing duty is becoming ever more complicated.

Example: Money from the federal stimulus package will provide Nebraska with an estimated \$1 billion or so. Meanwhile, the state's income tax system could generate somewhat less revenue when the federal income tax rate is decreased for many Nebraskans. The state's system is connected to the federal system, thus explaining the projected decrease.

The state's expected revenue shortfall keeps growing and it has some state employees worried.

The Appropriations Committee's preliminary budget plan doesn't include enough dollars for the state to live up to its agreement - negotiated and previously approved by the state - for increased benefits and pay for state workers. Union representatives said that as many as 400 employees could lose their jobs if the Legislature doesn't fully fund the agreed-to contract. Gov. Dave Heineman's proposed budget also failed to provide for the government's contractual obligation.

In a report examining the status of the Republican Party around the nation, Salon.com acknowledged the indisputable fact that

"Nebraska remains a Republican stronghold."

While acknowledging President Obama's winning of an electoral vote in the Omaha-dominated 2nd Congressional District, it also reported: "Gallup ranks it the fifth most Republican state in the nation. Nebraska's Republican governor, Dave Heineman, seems poised to win reelection, and the new head of the state GOP, Mark Fahleson, vows to use new technology to help Republicans Twitter their way to victory. He also predicts that the lone Nebraskan Democrat in Congress, Sen. Ben Nelson, will be vulnerable in his 2012 reelection bid."

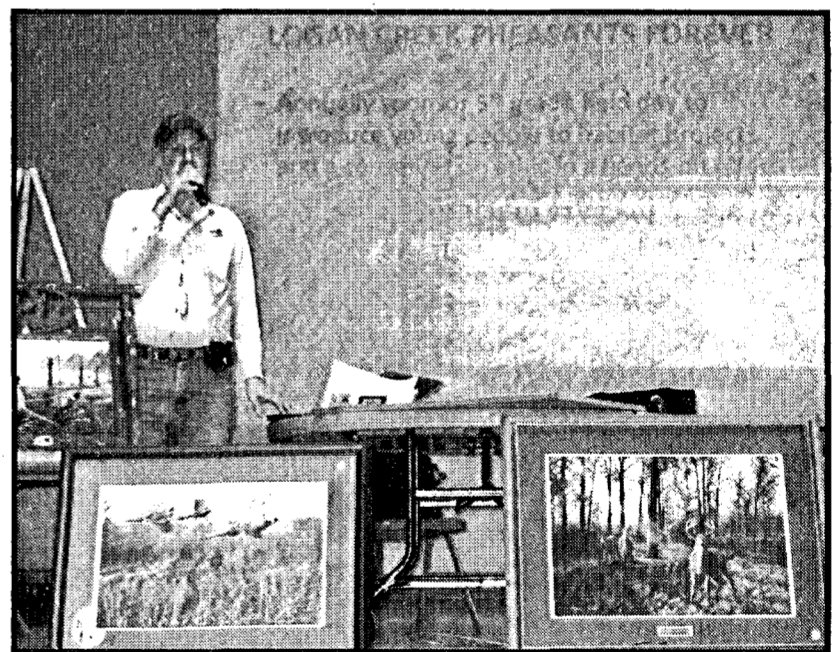

As Martin Luther King said, "Everybody can be great... because anybody can serve."



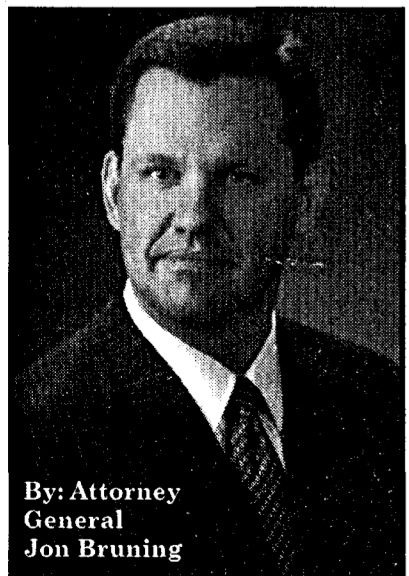
## Explaining the effort

# Law enforcement collaborates to reduce underage drinking

Three (12.5 percent) of the 24 on- and off-sale establishments in Cedar County sold alcohol to underage purchasers. The checks were conducted March 13 by the Laurel Police Department, Cedar County Sheriff's office, Coleridge Police Department, Hartington Police Department and Randolph Police Department.

"This is the first time these five agencies in Cedar County have worked together on alcohol compliance checks," said Cedar County Sheriff Larry Koranda. "The 87.5 percent compliant rate is encouraging but we remain committed to consistent alcohol compliance checks as they are one of the most effective ways to prevent youth access to alcohol."

None of the three businesses that failed the compliance checks had a prior sale to a minor violation on record with the Nebraska Liquor Control Commission. Two of the non-compliant businesses (indicated with an \*) checked the minor's identification and sold to them regardless.

"It's encouraging that the majority of retailers are working to prevent alcohol sales to minors," said Steve Shear, project coordinator for Project Extra Mile. "With prom and graduation season approaching, we ask that retailers continue to be diligent about checking identification and do their part to prevent illegal alcohol sales to minors."

Consistent compliance checks decrease alcohol sales to minors and reduce underage drinking, as well as traffic crashes, violence and other health problems associated with alcohol, according to the Alcohol Epidemiology Program at the University of Minnesota. Future research indicates the deterrent effect of alcohol compliance checks dissipates within months, thus making it key for law enforce-

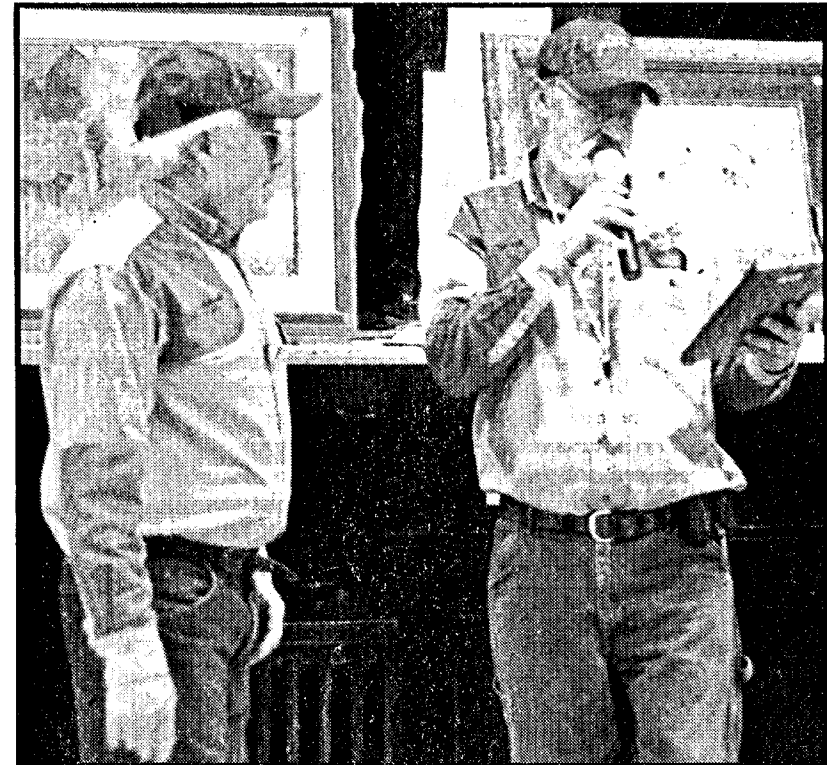
ment to conduct them regularly to be effective.

Six minors, with an average age of 19 years old, worked with the officers to conduct the compliance checks. All participating minors must use their valid drivers license or a valid Nebraska state-issued identification card. Law enforcement worked collaboratively with Project Extra Mile to coordinate the enforcements and the Nebraska Office of Highway Safety provided funding for the increased enforcement operation.

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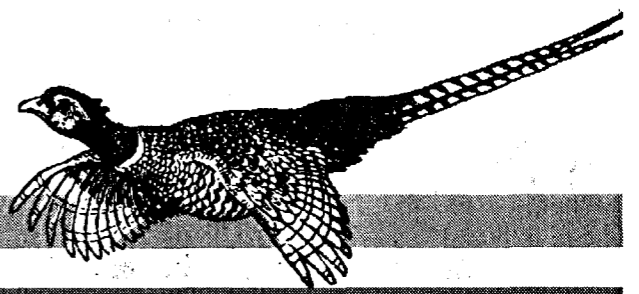

voice. Thirty-five percent of that understanding is based on body movements and facial expressions. Only seven percent of understanding is based on what is actually being said. Some teenage children don't even hear in words.

That's why it's important to speak in a relaxed setting that allows a family to have a conversation. When a family is laughing together or sitting around talking together, that's a good sign that communication exists within a family. Families should feel they have a connector, and members should feel that they can talk to each other and not feel put down.

In the long run, family communication is important because successful communication will prevent children from engaging in risky behaviors. They will know they have a support system in place.

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## Repair leaky gates/gaskets to save money, add profit

Keeping up on gravity irrigation repairs not only saves water, but time, money and labor, a University of Nebraska-Lincoln irrigation engineer said.

The off-season is the perfect time to make these repairs, said Dean Yonts, irrigation engineer at UNL's Panhandle Research and Extension Center at Scottsbluff.

"If you didn't flag leaky gaskets and mark leaky gates last irrigation season, be sure to do it this season," he said. "This way if you don't have time to change damaged gates during irrigation season, gaskets can be discarded at the end of the season and gates can be replaced after harvest."

Replacing gaskets and leaky gates can be a significant way to reduce irrigation costs.

This and other cost saving tips to help deal with high input costs in crop production can be found at UNL's Surviving High Input Costs in Crop Production Web page at <http://cropwatch.unl.edu/survivinghighinputcosts.htm>.

A flow meter also is a good way to estimate the amount of water that leaks from gates and gaskets, Yonts said.

"While leaks are not losses from the field, they do reduce the amount of water delivered to the set being irrigated," he said.

A Tri-Basin Natural Resource District study in the early 1990s showed that losses can exceed 50 percent. Often, losses can be 20 percent to 30 percent, which is 5 to 6 gallons per minute per 30-foot length of pipe on most systems, Yonts said. A quarter mile length of pipe on a 1,000 gallon per minute well would deliver only 750 gallons per minute to the set if the water loss is 25 percent.

"Reducing leaks also saves labor by having to have fewer sets per irrigation," Yonts said.

If you were to eliminate two sets at 12-hours per set with a 1,000 gallon-per-minute well that did five irrigations per year at \$10 per acre-inch pumped and \$1.03 per acre per year to replace gates and gaskets, it would result in an added profit of about \$32.10 per acre.

Fixing leaks also can improve water quality, Yonts said. Severe leaks can add a constant supply of water to one area during irrigation. On silt-loam soils, one gallon per minute running down a row will advance only about 100 feet. If that loss were to occur uniformly along the pipeline, it would amount to about 3 acres along the pipe. If 250 gallons per minute in leaks run for three days, 40 acre inches per irrigation will be applied to about 3 acres of cropland.

Previous research has found this can move an estimated 5 pounds of nitrate with every inch of water that leaches below the root zone.

"Continuous leaking has the potential to flush hundreds of pounds of nitrogen into the aquifer," he said. "Aside from contamination of the aquifer, it would take excess nitrogen to offset the loss, or acceptance, of fewer bushels produced from those three acres."

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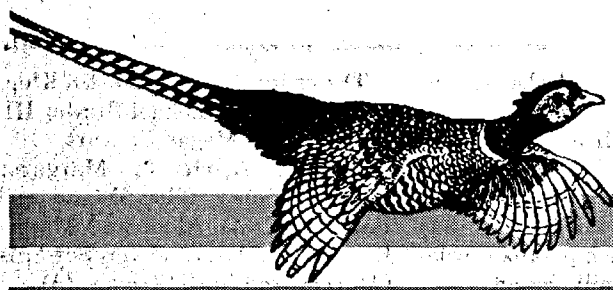

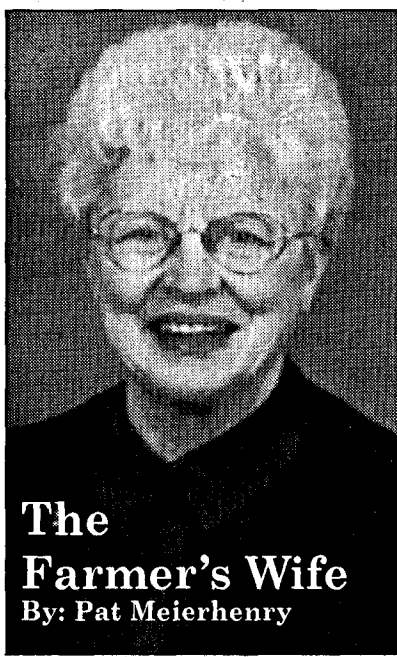
## Spring weather, basketball and music make for interesting mix

## NDA to facilitate USDA cost-share program for Nebraska's certified organic industry

Nebraska Department of Agriculture (NDA) Director Greg Ibach recently announced that Nebraska will receive funding from the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) to aid the state's organic producers and processors with certification costs. "Nebraska's organic industry continues to grow. This cost-share program will provide our producers with an incentive to continue its growth," said Ibach. "Nebraska producers were able to utilize \$35,000 in funds from this program when we were able to offer them in

2005 and 2006." Authorized by the 2007 Farm Bill, the National Organic Program's (NOP) Cost-Share Program is designed to assist producers and handlers of agriculture products in obtaining certification under the NOP guidelines. Those guidelines require certification and compliance with national standards in order to sell, label, or represent agricultural products as organic. Producers and handlers can receive reimbursement for up to 75 percent of the costs of obtaining certification, with a maximum payment

of \$750. The actual cost-share amount will be based on a percentage of the total the applicant paid for NOP certification. Nebraska has received \$60,000 in federal funds for reimbursement to eligible participants.

Applicants must have incurred costs for organic certification or renewal certification between October 1, 2007, and September 30, 2008, in order to be eligible for cost-share reimbursement. The funds will be reimbursed in the order applications are received, until the monies are exhausted, or until the eligibility period ends. All applications for reimbursement are due by April 30, 2009.

## Weed Management Area's workshop successful

The theme for the day was "the value of partnerships" at the Landowner and Educator Weed Management Area workshop on Thursday at Niobrara State Park. More than fifty students, educators, landowners, tribal members, and agencies participated. Speakers highlighted the partnership work of the Weed Management Area's programs. Its success has been based on working together to address the most critical weed control needs.

Chemical as well as biological control efforts have been used on Leafy Spurge, Saltcedar, Purple loosestrife, Spotted knapweed and Canada thistle. GPS is used to map all biocontrol releases and Saltcedar infestations in the 8-county region. The organization works to protect three threatened and endangered species with their treatments.

Niobrara Public School is engaged in experiential learning using the natural lab they have right in their own backyard - the Missouri River

water's edge. Science teacher Sharla Hanzlik has actively engaged her sophomore classes by studying the environment through Purple loosestrife. They've loved learning about how that plant impacts their community, its growing habits, and how it affects soil and water. They're excited about what they're learning and that's what Hanzlik and Superintendent Sandoz shared. There are opportunities for other educators to start similar programs in their schools and the Niobrara Public School along with the weed control professionals and agencies present are ready and willing to help.

The Northeast Nebraska Weed Management Area is supported by the Northeast Nebraska Resource Conservation & Development (RC&D) Council. This workshop was funded in part by a grant from the Nebraska Environmental Trust Fund.

## UNL receives grant to improve toxicity testing of genetically-engineered foods

EPA's National Center for Environmental Research has awarded a \$372,982 grant to the University of Nebraska-Lincoln for a research project designed to improve the testing of genetically-engineered foods.

The university's grant for Exploratory Investigations in Food Allergy comes from EPA's Science to Achieve Results (STAR) Program. STAR engages the nation's best scientists and engineers in targeted research that complements EPA's intramural research program and those of EPA's partners in other federal agencies.

Through the grant, University of Nebraska-Lincoln researchers

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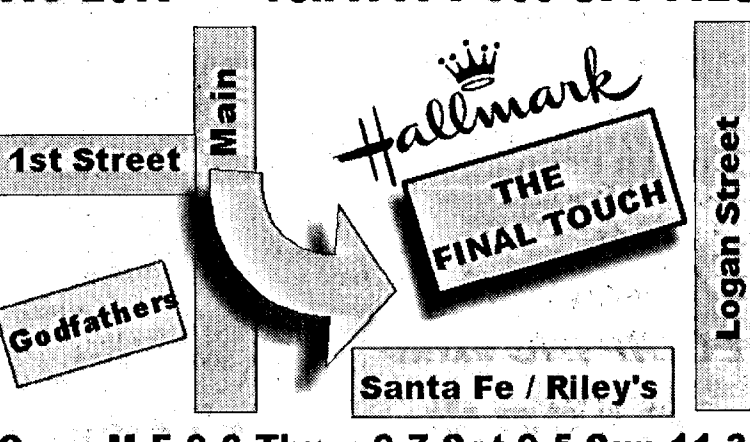

### Plan to save dollars on food

Estimates suggest that nearly 70 percent of Americans don't know what they'll have for dinner until 4 p.m. or later.
