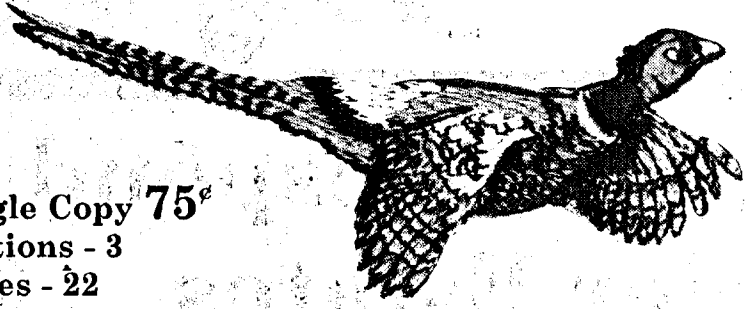

## PMC holds own Biggest Loser; nearly 300 pounds lost and two nurses chosen winners of the contest

Inspired by the Biggest Loser weight loss TV show, nurses at Providence Medical Center (PMC) finished their own contest. Tammie Thomsen and Keri Carlson were the winners of the 12 week program that started on Jan. 5. Thirty nurses participated in the weight loss challenge with a total of 299.4 pounds lost.

Throughout the 12 weeks, the nurses weighed in with a witness, their weight was recorded and entered in a drop box. Some of the nurses worked out in the PMC Wellness Center and some hired a personal trainer to help achieve their weight loss. The competition promoted healthy eating too.

"It was a good team effort, everyone supported each other," said Ginger Nixon, LPN-C, who organized the competition.

Group weight-loss results were: week 1: -100.4 lbs; week 2: -36.7 lbs (total weight loss so far 137.1 lbs); week 3: -31.2 lbs (total: 168.3 lost); week 4: -22.2 lbs (total: 190.5); week 5: -21.9 lbs (total: 212.4); week six: -21.7 lbs (total: 234.1); week 7: -11.4 (total: 245.5; week eight: -10.8 (total 256.3); week nine: -61 (total: 262.24); week

10: -12.5 (total: 274.9); week 11: maintained; week twelve: (total: 299.4 lost).  
The winners had this to say about the

weight loss contest: "It was the PMC sisterhood weight loss challenge," Thomsen said. "Heidi Keller, ACE, one of the certified Personal Trainers at PMC Wellness Center, set up the program for me, which really helped but I had to set my mind to it. A person has to be ready to lose weight. People brought in healthier snacks and that really helped."

Thomsen gave five reasons she wanted to lose weight: 1. Improve flexibility and ease the load on her knees. 2. have more energy and stamina. 3. fit into a greater variety of clothes. 4. be comfortable in her body. 5. be less conscience about her body.

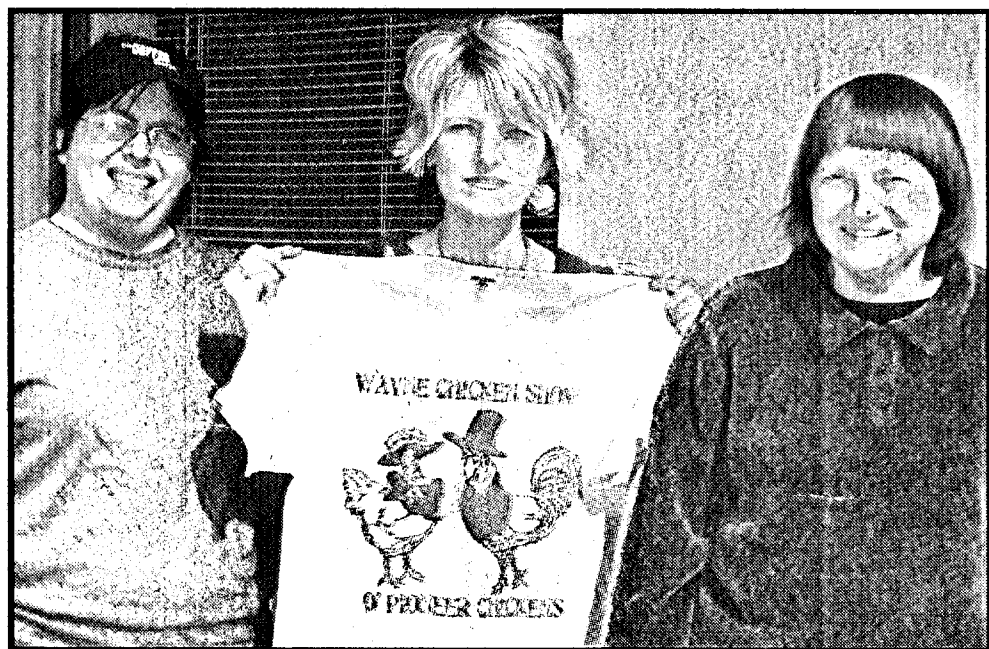
"The one thing I liked about this weight loss challenge is that it felt like a sisterhood," Thomsen said. "We could all be completely honest with each other and we got nothing but support back. We all need to ask this question, 'why do you want to lose weight?' Answer it and then use it to reach your goal."

Carlson said, "I knew how I would benefit from weight loss but never had enough will power to stick to a diet. This competition gave me a great incentive and seemed do-able since it would only last 12 weeks. I set a goal for myself, hoping, but not really thinking I would reach it! To help me achieve my goal I joined Weight Watchers and the Providence Wellness Center. I started a regular exercise routine thanks to trainers at the Wellness Center and I started making healthier food choices. It was definitely easier because I was surrounded by peers making the same good choices."

Carlson continued, "I am excited with the results of the weight loss challenge for the whole group and can't wait to see the pounds drop off as they continue with a second Biggest Loser competition - hospital wide this time. I am lucky to work in a "Well-Work place" that offers a wellness center and a Weight Watchers at Work Program and of course for a husband that always eats my new low-fat recipes with a smile!"

The PMC rematch began April 6 and will run through June 29. It is another 12 week weight loss challenge. The rules will be the same as previously. There will be two winners with the possible chance that the winner of both could be the same person, one for most pounds lost and the other for highest percentage of weight loss. There are almost 30 people in this weight loss challenge that was opened to more staff.

Carlson ended with, "Weight loss is not will power - it is want power."

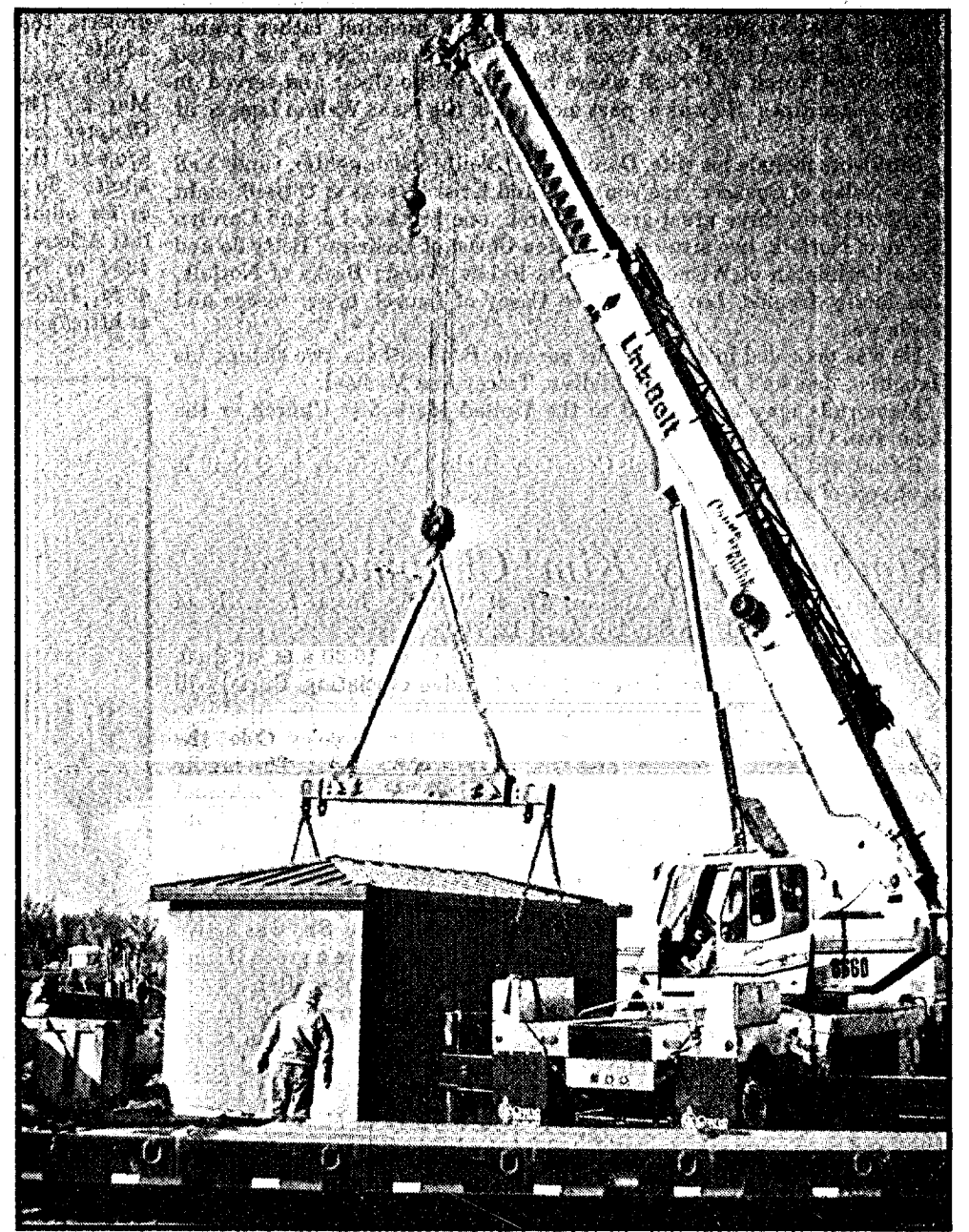
## City of Wayne receives grant from Nebraska Environmental Trust

The City of Wayne has announced that it will receive \$87,450 from the Nebraska Environmental Trust for the "South Logan Creek Bank Stabilization and Restoration". The Trust Board announced funding for the project at its meeting on April 2, 2009 in Lincoln. The project is one of the 82 projects receiving \$15,065,944 in grant awards from the Nebraska Environmental Trust (NET) this year.

The South Logan Creek Bank

Stabilization & Restoration project will be making repairs to prevent stream degradation and refuse exposure of the adjacent former "Kardell Landfill," located within the zoning jurisdiction of the City of Wayne, Nebraska. The city conducted a Phase II Environmental Site Assessment of the former landfill that concluded soil and ground water contamination have

## Booster pump installation underway

The new water booster pump station arrived in Wayne at the first of the month and was set in place to provide improved water service to western Wayne.

When Northeast Nebraska PPD built their new facility north of the fairgrounds, city official and staff found water pressure and volume there was less than adequate because of the land elevation. Home owners have also been interested in building in the area of Pheasant Run and being served water from the city, but have needed to dig a domestic well because of the limited ability to serve water to the area.

In early 2008 the City hired Olsson and Associates Engineers to perform a water model/study of the entire water pumping, storage and distribution system.

"This model was done to show us where we have limited ability to adequately serve

new developments while providing continued quality service to existing customers. This model showed significant limitations to serving the area west of Donner Pass," said Garry Poutre, Superintendent of Public Works.

The results of the water model showed the need to boost the water pressure in this area with a booster pump station. This station was purchased from Engineering Fluid Inc. of Centralia, Ill. and placed near the west water tower, near the northeast corner of the new Western Ridge subdivision.

Total cost of the water booster pump project will be approximately \$210,000. The station will be operating in the next few weeks, and will serve a large area west of Wayne both north and south of Highway 35.

Thursday, WSC will host Shane Murphy. He is the former head coach at the University of Sioux Falls and former South Dakota assistant coach.

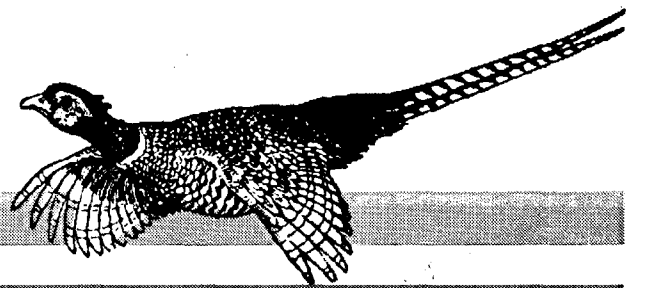

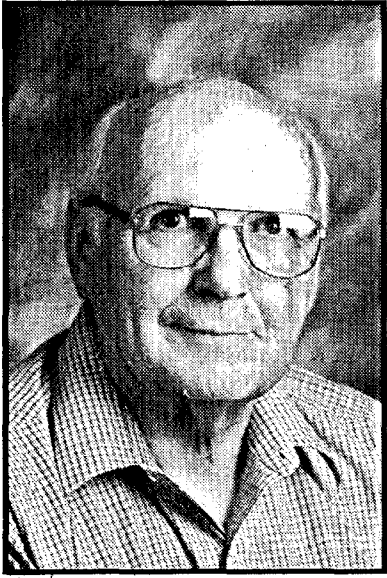

## Fire department, PMC respond to smoke at Premier Estates

The Wayne Volunteer Fire Department and ambulances from Providence Medical Center responded to a call involving smoke at Premier Estates on April 8.

Fire Chief Brent Doring said the call reporting smoke in the vents came in at approximately 7:30 p.m.

When fire personnel arrived at the scene, there was smoke in the Morningside wing of the facility.

Staff at Premier Estates began the process of evacuating the residents while the fire personnel

worked to determine the cause of the smoke.

It was determined that a heating/air conditioning motor had over heated and locked up, causing smoke, but no fire.

The Wayne Volunteer Fire Department remained on the scene for approximately two hours.

Dennis Spangler, Providence Medical Center Ambulance Supervisor, reports that PMC Ambulance crews were called in to provide support and care and to

begin patient evacuation of Premier Estate residents following the report of smoke at Premier Estates in Wayne.

Three PMC ambulances provided transportation to Providence Medical Center for Premier Estate residents following the Wayne Fire Chief's order to evacuate.

According to Spangler, five residents were transported to Providence Medical Center prior to the fire chief's determination that all evacuees could re-occupy Premier Estates. Following that determination, all residents were returned to Premier Estates.

"I want to thank Sister Monica, Sister Rita Marie, Sister Inviolata and Sister Maura for their help. They witnessed all the action from their nearby residence and came to our aid. Wayne resident and retired registered nurse, Betty Reeg, also assisted in caring for the evacuees and helped get residents into the ambulances," said Spangler.

Laura Gamble, Providence Medical Center Director of Nursing,

Pam Matthes RN at PMC, and Sister Cecilia of PMC, went to Premier Estates and provided assistance to their staff in caring for some of the residents after they were allowed to re-occupy Premier Estates.

Spangler remarked that he was "...impressed with the professionalism, attitude, personal care, well-being, safety and concern for patient comfort by the Premier Estate staff. They were organized, continuously monitored the patients, kept the patients informed as best they could, and immediately provided blankets and other personal care items."

Earlier that day, the Wayne Volunteer Fire Department had responded to a report of smoke at a residence on Providence Road.

When they arrived on the scene it was determined that there was fire in the attic of the home, caused by an overheated motor.

Fire personnel were on the scene for approximately 45 minutes.

No one was injured in either of the two calls.

## Easter Egg Hunt on-going for more than 30 years

Several days ago residents of Wayne and the surrounding area began paying a little more attention than usual to their surroundings in hopes of locating the KTCH / KCTY Easter Egg. Not much of a challenge? Think again.

When station manager Dean Craun brought the promotion with him from KHUB in Fremont 31 years ago, it really was a plastic egg. But those days are long gone. Now the challenge for Program Director and station personality Dan Baddorf is finding an object that will blend into the surroundings and create clues that will keep listeners guessing up until the day before Easter.

The rules are simple. The object (Easter egg) must be in plain sight. It must be on public property so it can be accessed by anyone. And finding the egg cannot involve digging, moving or destroying public property. While there are no geographical limitations, the egg is usually within or just outside Wayne's city limits.

# Sok earns international study tour to Costa Rica

Paul Sok, a teacher at Winside High School, has been awarded a competitive study tour opportunity through the Toyota International will travel to Costa Rica April 18 through May 2.

Sok, a natural science instructor at Winside Public School, will collaborate with other U.S. and Costa Rica educators in hopes of encouraging environmental stewardship among his students and community.

Committed to providing the best education and training for environmental leaders and teachers of tomorrow, the Toyota International Teacher Program is an international study tour for secondary teach-

ers of all disciplines focused on promoting environmental conservation and sustainability, as well as global understanding.

"The program provides educators with the unique opportunity to exchange innovative ideas with Costa Rica educators and environmental experts," said Michael Ruse, vice president, philanthropy and community affairs at Toyota Motor Sales (TMS). "Students benefit from their teachers' experiences abroad, fostering a dialogue in classrooms about global conservation issues and enhancing cultural learning."

A new element to this year's Costa Rica trip is the creation of

the Toyota4Education.com wiki. Established to serve as a virtual classroom and provide updates during the program, this social media tool enables teachers to communicate their experiences in real time with their schools and communities. Educators will blog about their Costa Rica experiences, post photos and lesson plans and correspond with their students.

"I am pretty excited about the trip. We will get to do a number of things from hiking up a volcano, going on a zip-line over the tree tops, over night stay at an area farm/medicinal plant operation, visiting an ancient Mayan Archeological Dig, attending the National Theater in San Jose, staying at EARTH University, and participating in a number of lecture/discussion sessions during the trip," Sok said.

"The bulk of this trip will be geared toward world wide conservation efforts. It will be a great educational experience and I should be able to bring back some new ideas for the classroom. I have already been able to share a little info with some of my classes since we had to read 'The Green Republic' and a number of internet articles (150 pages worth). It is definitely an honor being selected as one of 25 teachers from around the country and the only one from Nebraska, Sok said.

Prior to departure, teachers will gather at Everglades National Park in Miami for a brief orientation and exploration of the Everglades biosphere to begin the conservation about environmental issues here in the United States

and Costa Rica. Toyota has contributed more than \$1 million and five vehicles to Everglades in support of environmental initiatives of the park during the next three years. Committed to fostering park environmental education programs, the Everglades was among five national parks to receive a donation of \$5 million and 23 vehicles under Toyota's Leadership in Environmental Awareness for the Future (LEAF) initiative.

While in Costa Rica, a country dedicated to protecting its natural resources, area experts will educate Sok and his fellow program participants on sustainable development, agronomy, ecotourism and other conservation practices. Other activities include researching methods in sustainable agriculture at EARTH University.

For the first time, educators will travel to Monteverde, heralded as one of the best bio-diverse refuges in the world and widely considered the quintessence of Costa Rica's conservation movement. Monteverde is base for researchers, international NGOs, and other civil society working on conservation biology and sustainable development issues. While there, the U.S. teachers will meet with researchers, visit local schools, engage in service projects and explore the role of environmental education in spreading environmental awareness.

Through a partnership with the Bren School of Environmental Science and Management, a graduate program at the University of California, Santa Barbara, participating teachers will be eligible for

professional-level credit from the university. The Bren School plays a leading role in researching environmental issues, training environmental management professionals and identifying and solving environmental problems around the world. Bren professor of geomorphology and hydrology Thomas Dunne will serve as the official study-tour leader, helping teachers to connect their experiences in Costa Rica back to classroom lesson plans.

"The chance to travel with a group of talented secondary-school teachers will provide a unique and rewarding experience," Professor Dunne said. "I'm also looking forward to interacting with some of Costa Rica's educators and environmental professionals and comparing their ideas with the challenges and approaches to environmental management in the United States."

The 25 participating teachers represent 22 states and were selected through a competitive, merit-based process administered by the Institute of International Education in Washington, D.C., the nation's most experienced nonprofit educational exchange organization. Selection criteria include professional qualifications, evidence of interest in international education and feasibility of incorporating the environmental study experience into the curriculum.

The program will take place at 1 p.m., April 22 across the parking lot from the Wayne Activity Center and will include the planting of 25 trees in what will be the Q-125 Orchard. General Mad Anthony Wayne will read the city's proclamation at that time.

The Most Unusual Tree and Largest Tree Contest proposed by District Forester Steve Rasmussen was discussed. Rasmussen is in the final stages of developing the rules and guidelines and the information on that should be released soon.

The committee will meet on Tuesday, April 28 at 7 p.m. at the Coffee Shoppe on Main Street. There are no membership fees and the meetings are open to volunteers with creative low cost ideas for activities that would enhance the Wayne community year-long celebration of its 125th anniversary.

## Wayne Housing Authority among those across state to receive stimulus funds

Nebraska Senator Ben Nelson announced recently that the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) is sending more than \$13 million to Nebraska for 98 public housing renovations and energy efficiency improvements in communities statewide as part of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009. Among those receiving the funds is Wayne Housing Authority. Wayne Housing Authority received \$50,025.

The funds Wayne Housing Authority received will pay for new siding, trim, windows, doors, soffits and the contractor Ardyce Stanley of the Wayne Housing Authority noted bids are out for work on apartments #1, #2 and #3 and should know the end of April who got the low bid.

"We had apartments #7 and #8 done recently," Stanley said. "We're happy to get the stimulus funds so we can get more of the apartments finished."

"With unemployment and homelessness rising each day due to our country's current economic crisis, these funds are vital in ensuring the continued viability, safety and energy efficiency of public housing," said Senator Nelson. "This money

not only helps some of the people most in need, but it will provide numerous jobs for those making the improvements and making a lasting impact on Nebraska communities."

The Omaha Housing Authority, the largest recipient of Nebraska public housing funds through the stimulus, is the process of bidding a massive \$6 million renovation project of a high rise complex. The stimulus package will cover a 3.2 million shortfall for this long-awaited and much needed project. An additional \$1.9 million will be used to install sprinkler, systems and upgrade fire safety systems in two additional high rise towers that are mandated by the Omaha Municipal Code but have been shelved due to lack of funds.

"These projects will enhance the quality of life and provide for the safety of the authority's low-income residents," said Stan Timm, executive director of the Omaha Housing Authority. "In the spirit of providing economic impact through the stimulus funding effort, these projects will put many people to work including bricklayers, steamfitters, drywall hangers, painters, HVAC installers, concrete workers, window crafters, roofers and general laborers. The economic impact to the metro area will be much greater than the \$5.1 million investment of stimulus funds."

Other projects planned through this funding include installment of a high efficiency gas-fired boiler, elevator upgrades, replacement of the fire alarm system and complete kitchen renovations in Fremont. Hall County is planning to replace roofing at two developments, waterproof buildings currently having mold problems, expand the current parking lot and modernize the security system. The housing authority in Lincoln will replace the roofs at 13 single-family homes and add insulation to 50-year-old homes, among other projects. Many other projects are planned throughout the state.

Nebraska housing authorities are receiving this money through the HUD Public Housing Capital fund formula allocation. This funding mechanism is one of a few that flows directly to each public housing authority, bypassing the need for state allocation.

Senator Nelson played a key role in the passage of the \$787 billion stimulus bill. He worked with a bipartisan group of nearly 20 Senators to better focus The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act on tax cuts for the middle class and job creation for million of Americans. Senator Nelson led the group to go through the initial bill line by line, dollar by dollar, to reduce spending and cut out \$108 billion of inefficient or less-stimulative spending. The bipartisan group helped the improved bill win congressional approval. President Obama signed it into law Feb. 17. Senator Nelson is posting information about the release of stimulus funds on his website as it becomes available.

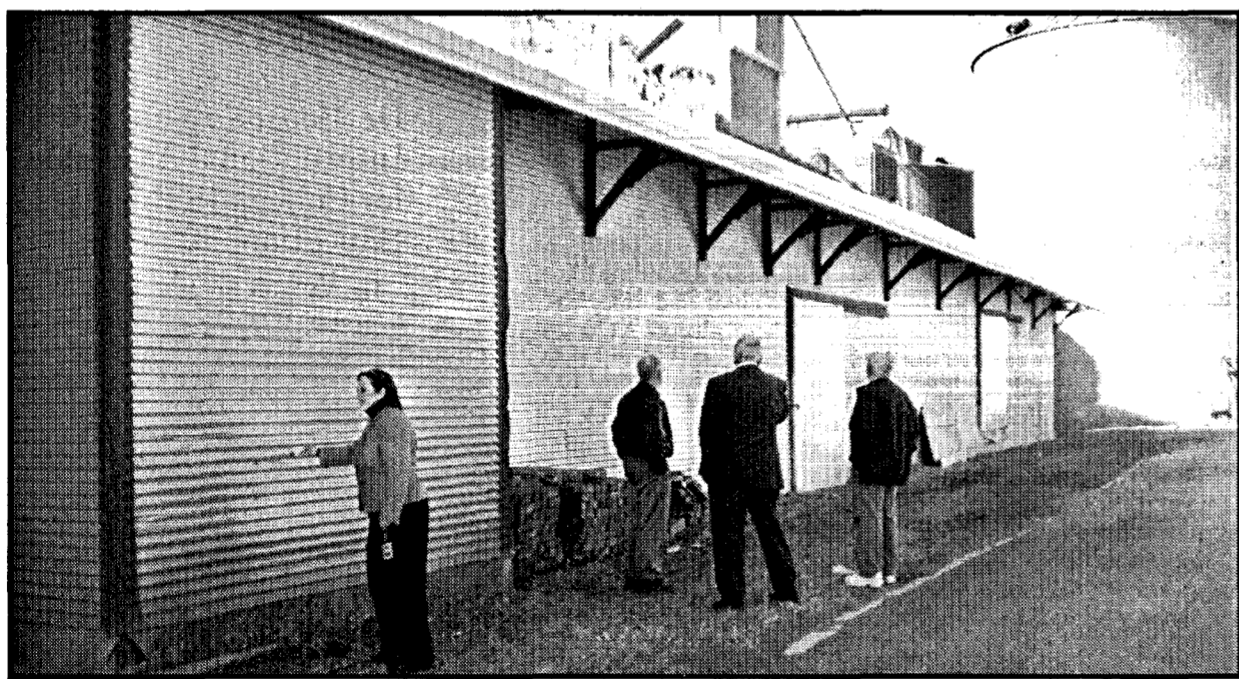

## Arbor Day celebration planned in Wayne

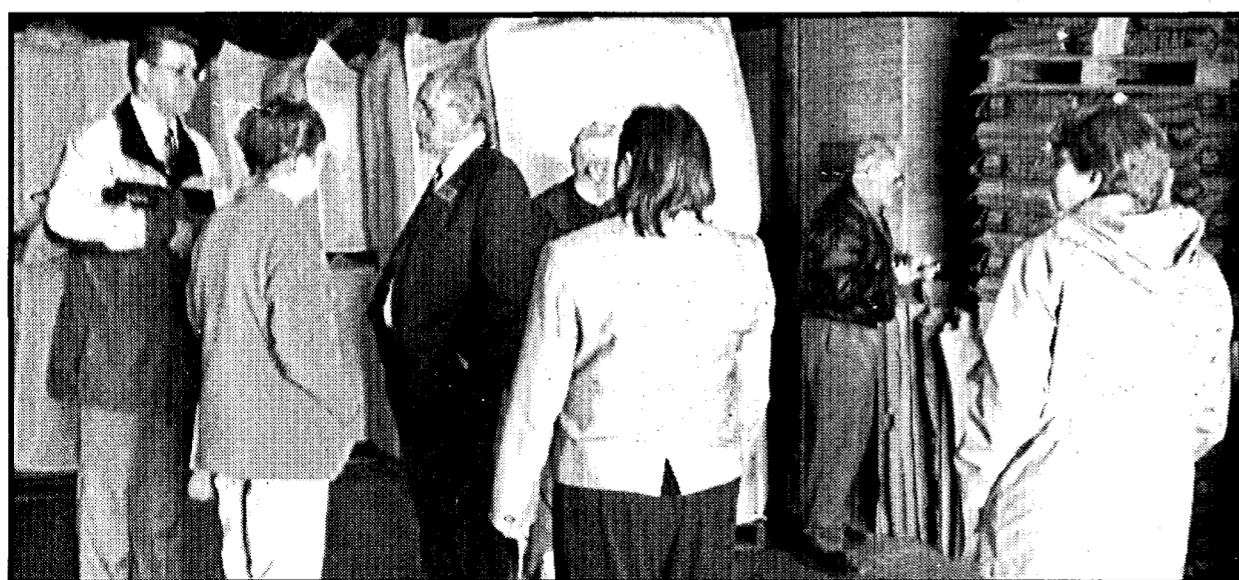

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## Wayne State professor to participate in Oxford University Round Table

Dr. Patricia Arneson of Wayne State College will participate in the 20th anniversary of the Oxford Round Table, July 5-10, 2009, at Oxford University in Oxford, England. Arneson is one of 40 international scholars to be invited to attend as a discussant and/or pre-

sender. Fellow participants include governmental and business leaders, ministers of education, and educational leaders and faculty from institutions and countries worldwide.

The purpose of the Oxford Round Table is to promote education,

art, science, religion and human rights through academic presentations and scholarly discussion. First held in 1989, the Oxford Round Table is a unique forum that provides the opportunity to discuss important policy questions over a five-day period in a collegial "think-tank" atmosphere. This year's forum is "Women's Careers: The Presumption and Burdens of Proof." Topics include career traps for women, women's career investments and returns, workplace politics, social and cultural restraints on equal pay, workplace discrimination, and gender equity issues.

Participants will reside on the Oxford University campus during the week, dining at the famed medieval Exeter Dining Hall (1314) used in the Harry Potter films. Formal Round Table sessions are held in the Rhodes House (home of the Rhodes Scholars), the Oxford Union Debating Society (famously, "the last bastion of free speech in the western world") or in the Examination Schools or halls of one of the 39 Colleges within Oxford University.

Arneson is Professor of Business at Wayne State College, teaching in the disciplines of Human Resource Management and Business Teacher Education. She has been the recipient of teaching and service awards for her contributions to Business Education. Arneson is a member of the Society for Human Resource Management, as well as the Nebraska State Business Education Association, Mountain-Plains Business Education Association, National Business Education Association, and Delta Pi Epsilon graduate honorary.

occurred in the vicinity of the site. The former landfill abuts the bank of South Logan Creek. Cover over the landfill in the vicinity of the stream bank crest has begun to erode away due to natural and man-made impacts. An Environmental Mitigation Concept Plan was prepared to define alternative repairs. Rock riprap will be used to stabilize approximately 300 feet of stream bank length, provide in-stream channel stability, and provide a stabilized outlet below concentrated flows. Clay fill materials will be compacted over the exposed landfill surface to mitigate surface infiltration to the maximum extent possible. The area of the bank crown will be elevated slightly above the

surrounding area to redirect flow to the south along an established drainage path. The area will be seeded with dense native grasses to trap sediment and disperse flow.

The Nebraska Legislature created the Nebraska Environmental Trust in 1992. Using revenue from the Nebraska Lottery, the Trust has provided over \$142 million in grants to 1,134 projects across the state. Anyone - citizens, organizations, communities, farmers and businesses - can apply for funding to protect habitat, improve water quality and establish recycling programs in Nebraska. The Nebraska Environmental Trust works to preserve, protect and restore our natural resources for future generations.

Wayne High School has announced the theme and date for this year's prom.

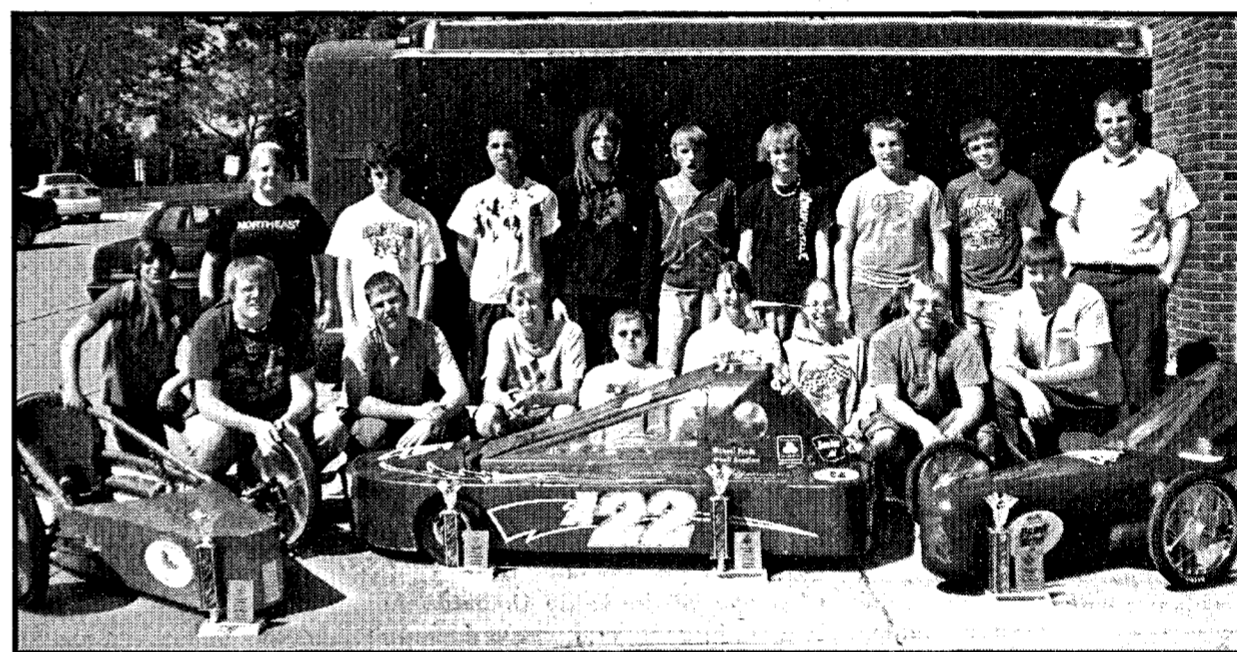

Dr. Benson has been an active participant in the IACBE, including serving as a member of the Board of Commissioners, as a regional officer, and as a conference presenter.

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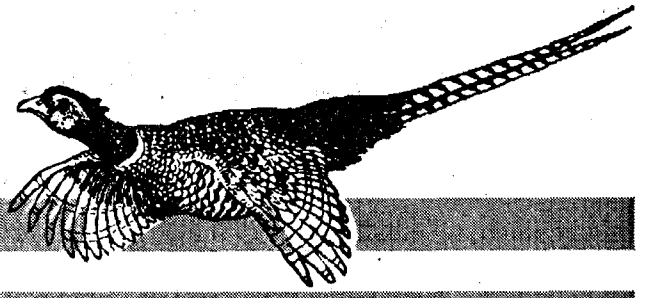

Kristi Meneely went 3 for 3 to lead the way offensively for UNO in the loss while Lindsey Slocum added two hits.

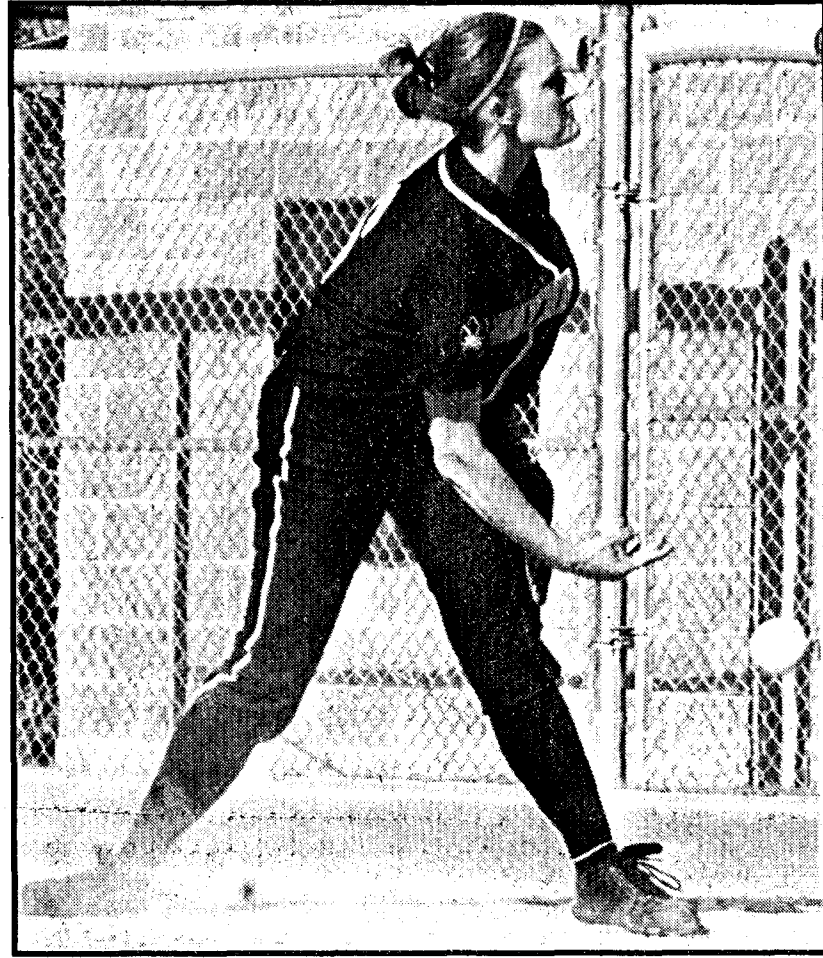
Melissa Negrete (13-4) took the loss on the mound for the Mavericks, allowing just one run and five hits with two walks and three

He joins Luke Farrar of Grand Island, Michael Frericks of St. Joseph, Minn., Jared Kraus of Cedar Rapids, Iowa and Benjamin Strellner of Marion, Iowa, who signed during the NCAA early signing period last November, as members of the 2009 WSC recruiting class.

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# Wayne State track and field teams earn seven NCAA provisional marks at UNL Invite

The Wayne State College outdoor track and field teams achieved seven NCAA provisional national qualifying marks at this past Saturday's University of Nebraska Invitational held in Lincoln.

The women's team had two wins and five NCAA provisional marks while the men's squad achieved two NCAA provisional marks during the day.

"This was possibly the best single meet regular season performance weekend that we've had in WSC history," WSC head coach Marlon Brink said.

"Not only did we set several NCAA qualifying marks, but also many personal best marks across the board."

Leading the WSC women was senior thrower Katie Wilson.

The Glenwood, Iowa native won the shot put (49' 3 1/2"), took third in the hammer throw with NCAA provisional mark of 164' 0" and was fourth in the discus with another provisional mark of 146' 7".

"Katie is very focused on having a great senior season, so I think she will continue to compete at a very high level. She is determined to go out on top," Brink said.

Megan Zavorcka won the steeple-

chase in a time of 11:11.48, good for an NCAA provisional mark, while teammate Sarah Thomsen placed second in the event at 12:04.03.

Other NCAA national provisional qualifying marks were set by Paige Pollard in the 400-meter hurdles, placing second in a time of 1:02.26, and Misty Rystrom in the high jump, taking third by clearing 5' 7".

Junior sprinter Christina King placed in two events, taking fourth in the 200-meter dash (25.59) and fifth in the 400-meter dash (56.81).

"All three of these young ladies are very talented and also focused on making it to the National Meet," Brink said.

"I think we will continue to see them compete this season at a high level and moving even higher up on the National Rankings lists."

Jade Lippman took ninth in the 400-meter hurdles (1:06.08) while Casey Buskirk finished eighth in the shot put (41' 0 1/4") followed by Lachel Milander in tenth at 38' 10 1/2".

For the WSC men, junior Nate Preston and senior Matt Schneider achieved provisional marks by placing second and third respectively in the 3,000-meter steeplechase.

Preston crossed the line in a time of 9:10.85 while Schneider was right behind at 9:20.70.

"Nate and Matt both reached their goals of running some fast times. Nate's time was a new school record and just off the NCAA Automatic Qualifying time, so we were happy about that, as it should get him into Nationals," Brink said.

"Matt ran his second fastest time ever, so after red-shirting last year due to injury it was great to see him getting back into form."

Teammate John Kern also placed in the 3,000-meter steeplechase, taking fourth at 9:43.40.

Senior hurdler Garrett Flamig placed in two events, taking seventh in the 400-meter intermediate hurdles (55.00) and eighth in the 110-meter high hurdles (15.11).

Other WSC finishers included Kern who finished sixth in the 5,000-meter run (15:47.01) with Matt Seiler in 10th place at 16:08.48.

Jacob Mathieson was eighth in the hammer throw (168' 2") while the 4 x 100-meter relay team of Drew Molacek, Cody Diehl, Travis Toepfer and Flamig earned seventh in a time of 42.90 seconds.

"I thought for the most part we hit the marks we were shooting for at the meet," Brink said.

"We have some opportunities coming up to improve, so we have to make the most of every meet we have left." This weekend, WSC will compete

in the Sioux City Relays on Friday and Saturday.

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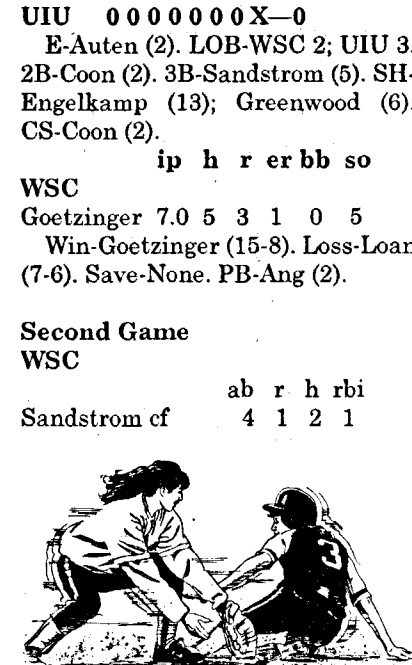
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### Blue Devil softball to host three-day training clinic

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## Lippman and Pollard break school records at DII Multi-Event Challenge

Jade Lippman and Paige Pollard of Wayne State College both broke the school record for the women's heptathlon to finish fourth and fifth respectively at the Division II Multi-Event Challenge in Emporia, Kan., on April 9-10. Lippman finished with 4,416 points which was also an NCAA provisional qualifying mark while Pollard was right behind in fifth place at 4,376 points out of 17 competitors in the event. Lippman eclipsed her previous school record of 4,250 points that was achieved last season and set personal best marks in the long

jump (16' 10 3/4") and the javelin (115' 5"). Pollard's best finish in an event game in the 800-meter run as she crossed the finish line first in a time of 2:19.52.

Cody Diehl of Wayne State College finished fourth out of 13 competitors at the Division II Challenge Decathlon held last Thursday and Friday in Emporia, Kan. Diehl, a freshman from Grand Island Northwest High School, scored 5,572 points and won four events by taking first in the 100-meter dash (11.48), 400-meter dash (53.14), discus (106' 11") and the pole vault (14' 7 1/4").

## Goetzinger earns third NSIC Pitcher of the Week honor

Katie Goetzinger of Wayne State College was selected as the Northern Sun Conference Softball Pitcher of the Week on Monday by the league office in St. Paul, Minn. This is the third time that Goetzinger has earned Player of the Week honors. She also received the award on Feb. 24th and March 30th. Goetzinger helped WSC post six straight shutouts last week by going 4-0 in five appearances with one save and a 0.00 ERA. She pitched four complete games, working 25 1/3 innings with 36 strikeouts and just three walks while allowing only 11 hits. On Saturday, Goetzinger was one strike away from her third no-hitter of the season before settling for a one-hit shutout with 10 strikeouts in WSC 11-0 win over Northern State in the first game of the doubleheader.

She then followed with a three-hit shutout, her 10th of the season, with 11 strikeouts in WSC's 2-0 win over Northern State in the second game of the doubleheader. Goetzinger is 18-8 on the year for the Wildcats with an impressive 1.58 ERA. She has allowed 43 runs on 130 hits with just 26 walks and 207 strikeouts in 168 2/3 innings of work. Goetzinger already has 18 complete games on the season, and opponents hit just .212 against her. WSC is 25-12 on the season with a 10-1 record in the NSIC. The Wildcats can next be seen in action on Saturday, April 18 when they travel to Minnesota Duluth for an NSIC doubleheader starting at 12 p.m.

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

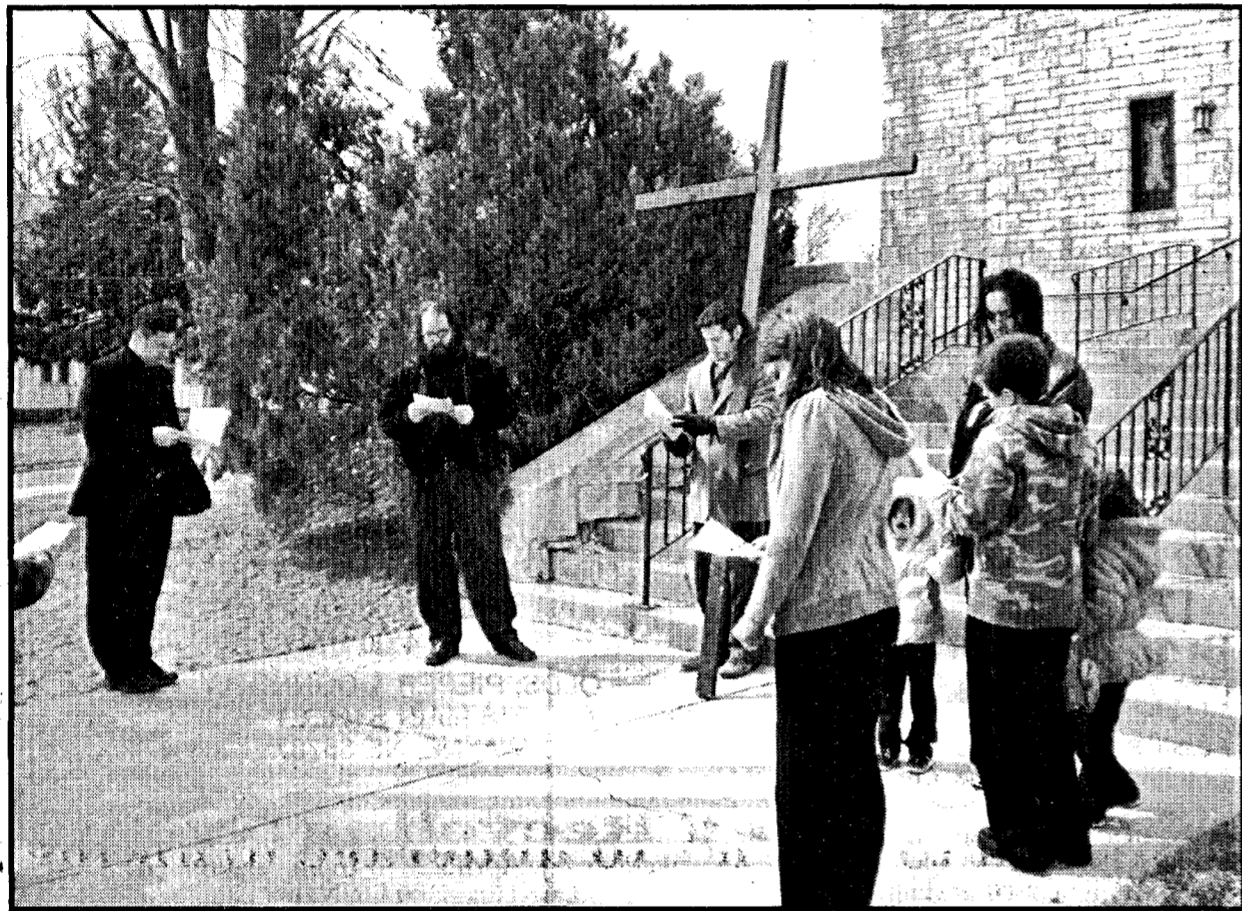

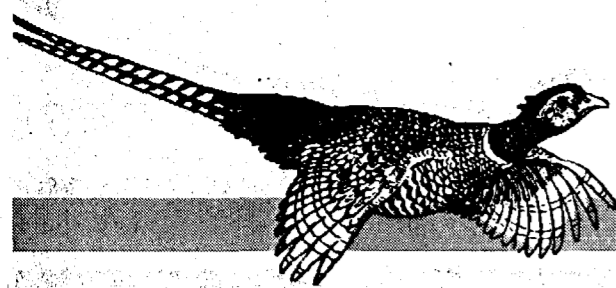

City Council meeting

The next regular City Council meeting will be held Tuesday, April 21 at 5:30 p.m. in the council room.

Surprises You Don't Need (What We Can't See Underground)

For the last two weeks, some local property owners, a contractor and our city water department and utility locate guys have wrestled with a complicated water service line problem. A water leak was reported, a contractor was hired and the digging started. Our utility department has asked that I remind our customers about services lines and costs.

What We Found:

- 1) Three houses that no one knew were hooked onto the same 150' water service line (common in the older parts of town). This can be very frustrating for contractors to find and for property owners to sort out the cost to repair.
- 2) Many water service lines in the early areas of Wayne were installed without any records of the location and can be hard to find. (Frustrating for contractors and city employees)
- 3) Very small leaks (small leaks are hard to find)
- 4) More than one leak was found (often the case with the older steel pipe lines and curb stops).

Lessons Learned Again:

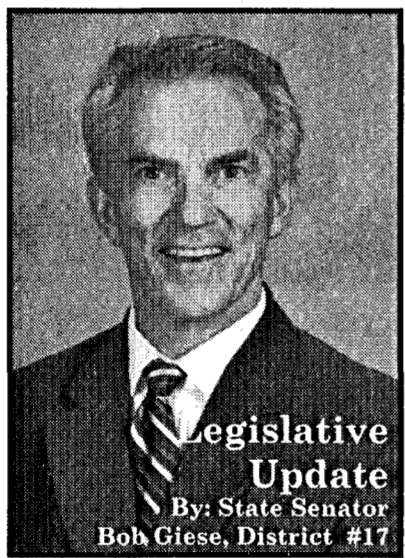
- 1) The property owners last week already knew, but some Wayne property owners aren't aware, that the cost of maintaining water and sewer service lines from the house all the way to the connection on water main is the cost of the homeowner and not the city utility.
- 2) When water service lines are dug up and we find two or more houses on the same service line, we require all the houses involved to install separate service lines back to the city water main (this will be a surprise for the other home owners that didn't even know they had a problem).
- 3) If your contractor starts digging up a water leak and the leak is found on the city water main, the city takes over the cost of the work. (The contractors often don't know whose leak it is until it is dug up).
- 4) If any driveway paving has to be removed by the contractor to fix a water service line, that is also a cost to the home owner, replacing the service line - even if it is the neighbor's driveway. (nobody likes this surprise).

It's a good thing that water and sewer lines last a long time, but like musical chairs or leaky roofs, whoever owns the property when it happens has the cost.

Weekly Legislative Update

Greetings from the Unicameral! Last week, Governor Heineman signed LB 403, a bill passed by the Legislature to address the issue of illegal immigration. Under the provisions of the bill, illegal immigrants would be ineligible to receive federal, state, or local public benefits administered by state or local governments.



Additionally, LB 403 includes the provisions of two other bills: LB 34, which would require public employers and businesses that have contracts with the state to use the federal E-Verify system for all employees; and LB 335, which would deny business tax incentives to employers who do not use E-Verify to confirm the legal presence of their employees working in Nebraska.  
 Illegal immigration is just one of many difficult subjects tackled by the Legislature this session, and LB 403 represents a good first step towards addressing the delicate issues surrounding illegal immigration. I believe that LB 403 will help provide protection for the many immigrants who are in the United States legally, while at the same time preserving public benefits for those who qualify for them. Ultimately, there are limits to what

Teaching your children to say 'no' to underage drinking

Did you know most kids try alcohol for their first time at 12 years old? Experts say communi-



cation between parents and children is key in the fight against underage drinking. We've seen so many instances of one bad decision changing lives forever. That's why it's important to talk directly with your children sooner rather than later about the dangers of alcohol use.

April is National Alcohol Awareness Month and I've partnered with beach volleyball sensation Misty May-Treanor, and The Century Council, a non-profit organization dedicated to fighting drunk driving and underage drinking, to help kids say "no" to alcohol.

The misuse of alcohol by underage students and by students over 21 remains a problem. According

to the National Survey on Drug Use and Health, the rate of binge drinking in 2007 was about 42 percent for young adults 18 to 25, and almost 26 percent of 21 to 25 year olds reported driving under the influence of alcohol.

Ask, Listen, Learn: Kids and Alcohol Don't Mix is a program that can help reduce underage drinking by providing both kids and parents with information and strategies to help jumpstart a conversation about the dangers of alcohol. Parental involvement does make a difference. Research shows parents are the leading influence

when it comes to their children deciding not to drink. If you haven't already, sit down and talk with your children about

### Services available for financially strapped families

Where do you turn if you lose your job or your family becomes pressed for money? There are many family services available in Northeast Nebraska. If you call your local University of Nebraska-Lincoln Extension Office, they can assist you with finding the services in your area.

A 2-1-1 phone call can also provide easy access to human services information from communities across Nebraska. 2-1-1 includes information on human services such as: child care, respite care, adult day care, drug rehabilitation, mental health services, job training, rent assistance, utility assistance, shelters, food pantries, legal aid, and volunteer opportunities.

Depending on your situation you may want to ask about different programs. Here are some suggestions: Health and Human Services has many different programs such as: WIC, the Food Distribution Program, the Nebraska Low Income Energy Assistance Program, the Food Stamp Program, and Aid to Dependent Children, Employment First, and Kids Connection.

Community Action Agencies offer programs regarding: Weatherization, Commodity Supplemental Food Program, Food Pantry, Immunizations, Rent/Utility/Emergency

Financial Assistance, Income Tax Preparation, Nebraska Homeless Assistance, Operation Great Start, and Operation Building Blocks.

Northeast Nebraska Area Agency on Aging offers services in the following: Senior Care Options, Care Management, In-Home Services, Emergency Response System or Lifeline, Nutrition Counseling, Congregate Meals, Home-Delivered Meals, OMBUDSMAN, Legal Assistance, Aged and Disabled Medicaid Waiver, Health Clinic/Supportive Services, Outreach Information, and Assistance, Transportation and Assisted Transportation, Senior Health Insurance Information Program (SHIIP), and Family Caregiver Support.

There are also public and private organizations that assist with abuse, assault and rape and, drug and alcohol addiction. There are hospitals and education facilities that also have services available. If you have any questions on any of these programs please contact the agency or call your local University of Nebraska-Lincoln Extension Office and they will provide you with the contact information.

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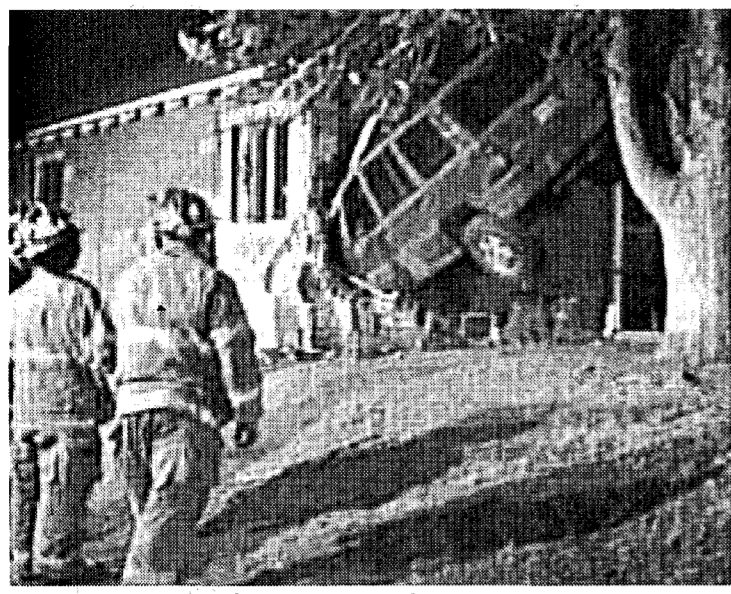

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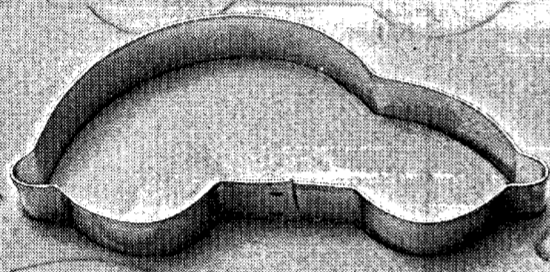
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## NDA notified of pseudorabies infected wild pig in Genoa area

Nebraska Department of Agriculture (NDA) State Veterinarian Dr. Dennis Hughes has been notified by the Nebraska Game and Parks Commission of an investigation into a wild pig infected with pseudorabies in the Genoa area.

A wild pig that was killed by a producer has tested positive for pseudorabies. NDA is currently contacting producers in the area to alert them to the situation and to advise them of symptoms and preventative measures.

A similar outbreak of pseudorabies was discovered in this area in early 2007.

Swine producers should be vigilant and watch for any of the symptoms of pseudorabies in their animals. Symptoms include: respiratory distress, nervous system signs (trembling, difficulty with coordination, and paralysis), sudden death of your piglets, and females aborting. Producers are asked to contact their local veterinarian or NDA at (800) 572-2437, if they notice these symptoms.

Producers can consider several options to avoid the disease, including vaccinating stock, following strict biosecurity measures on their farms, and minimizing contact with wildlife and rodents.

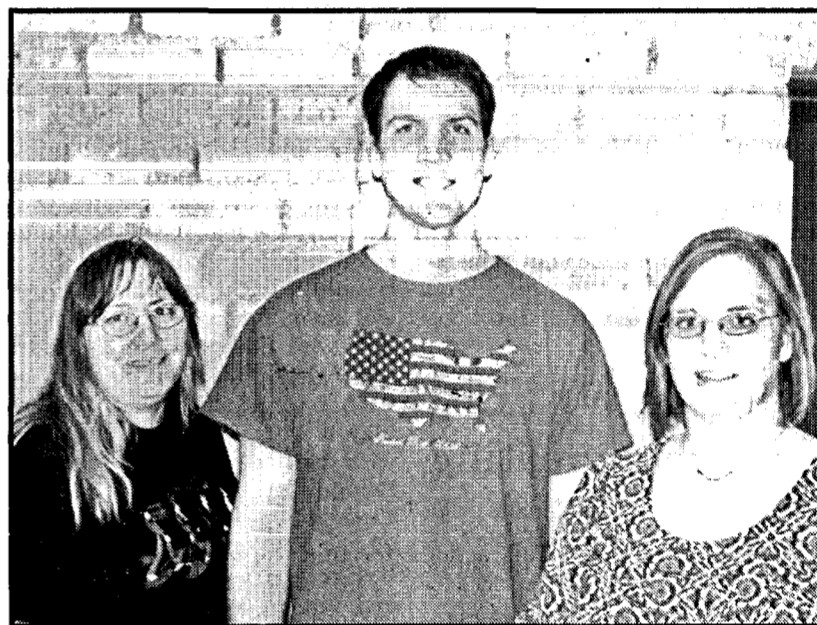

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## Satellite training sessions for producers participating in SFMNP to begin

Fresh fruit, vegetable, and honey producers who were not enrolled in a previous Nebraska Senior Farmers' Market Nutrition Program (SFMNP) will have a chance to join this year's program by completing training offered by the Nebraska Department of Agriculture (NDA). SFMNP, reauthorized in the 2008 Farm Bill, provides low-income senior citizens with coupons that can be exchanged for fresh produce and honey at farmers' markets, roadside stands, and u-pick operations.

In accordance with USDA requirements, producers who are not certified, but wish to accept SFMNP coupons this year, must attend a NDA training session. Newly-trained producers will receive their vendor certification number from NDA,

which is necessary for producers to cash 2009 SFMNP coupons.

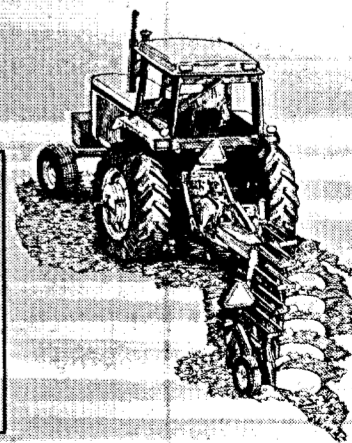
Through the use of satellite video conferencing, NDA hopes for broad participation in the training sessions. The training sessions will last approximately one hour. Producers need to contact NDA by April 17 to reserve their seat. Reservations and questions should be directed to NDA at 800-422-6692. 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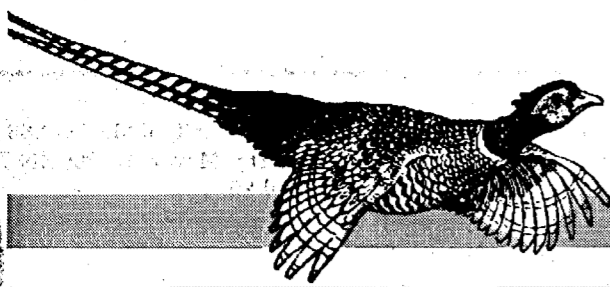

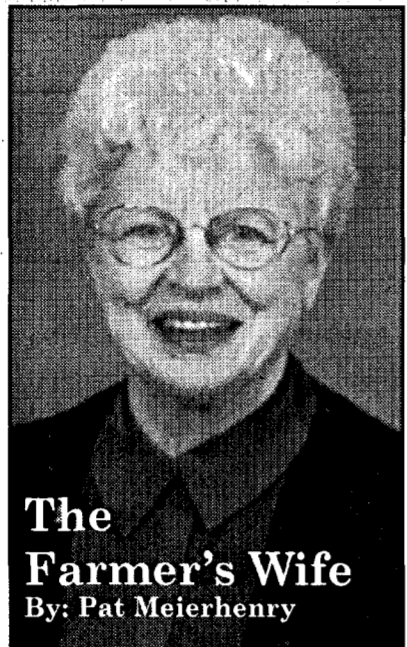

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## Pieper notes producers participating in USDA's Milk Income Loss Contract (MILC) to receive payments

Debra J. Pieper, executive director of USDA's Farm Service in Wayne, announced recently that because of low dairy prices across the country, producers participating in USDA's Milk Income Loss Contract (MILC) program will soon begin to receive payments.

"As a result of low dairy prices, we will soon begin distributing MILC payments to ensure that dairy producers have the financial assistance they need. This action will also stimulate local economies," said Pieper.

USDA makes MILC payments on a monthly basis when the Boston Class I milk price falls below \$16.94 per hundredweight as adjusted for feed costs. USDA determines the per hundredweight payment rate for the applicable month by subtracting the Boston Class I price for that month from the \$16.94 MILC payment trigger price, established in the 2008 Farm Bill, as adjusted for feed costs and multiplying the difference by 45 percent. The monthly Boston price along with final MILC payment rates are posted online at: <http://www.fsa.usda.gov/FSA>.

usda.gov/FSA.

The MILC payment trigger price of \$16.94 is adjusted upward when the National Average Dairy Feed Ration Cost for a month is greater than \$7.35 per cwt. USDA's National Agricultural Statistics Service released the data for determining the Average Dairy Feed Ration Cost for the month of February on March 30, 2009. Using this information and the formula contained in the 2008 Act, the MILC payment trigger for the month of February has been adjusted to \$17.33 for a final MILC payment rate of \$1,5132. USDA

expects to issue approximately \$150 million to dairy producers for milk produced in February.

USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service announced the Boston Class I price for the month of March on Feb. 20, 2009 and for the month of April on March 20, 2009. In both instances, the Boston Class I price was below the MILC payment trigger price of \$16.94 per cwt. USDA expects to issue MILC payments on milk produced in March in early May and MILC payments on milk produced in April in early June, after USDA has adjusted the MILC payment trigger price for feed costs

and determined the final payment rate for those months. MILC payments may also be triggered in future months if the MILC payment trigger price is below \$16.94 per cwt.

FSA makes payments up to the maximum eligible pounds of milk produced and marketed by each operation per fiscal year. The annual maximum eligible pound limit per dairy operation is 2,985,000 pounds per fiscal year.

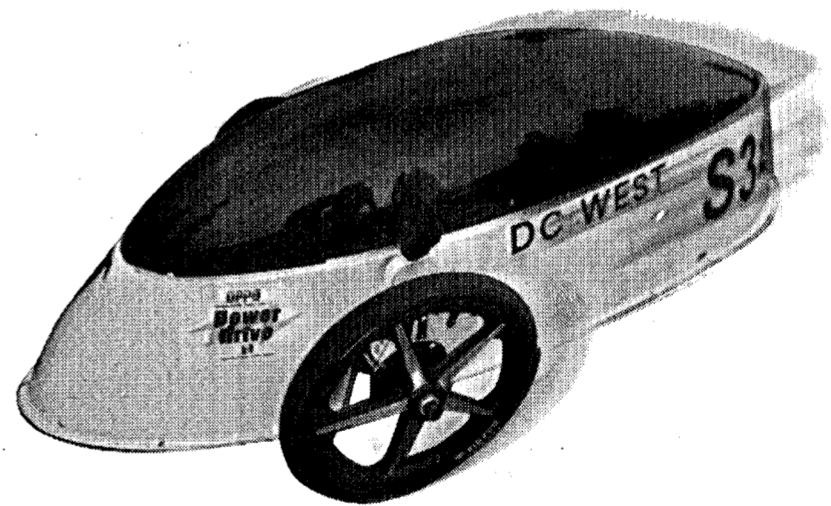

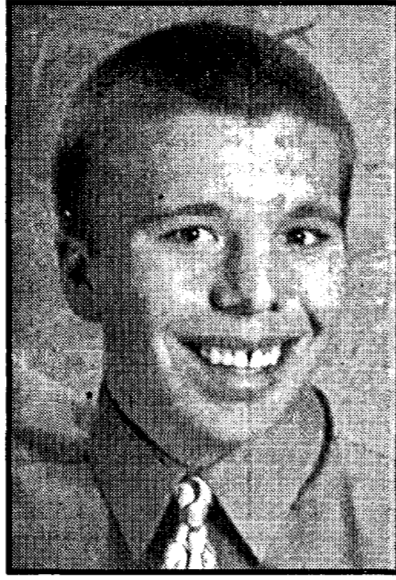
## BOYS' STATE

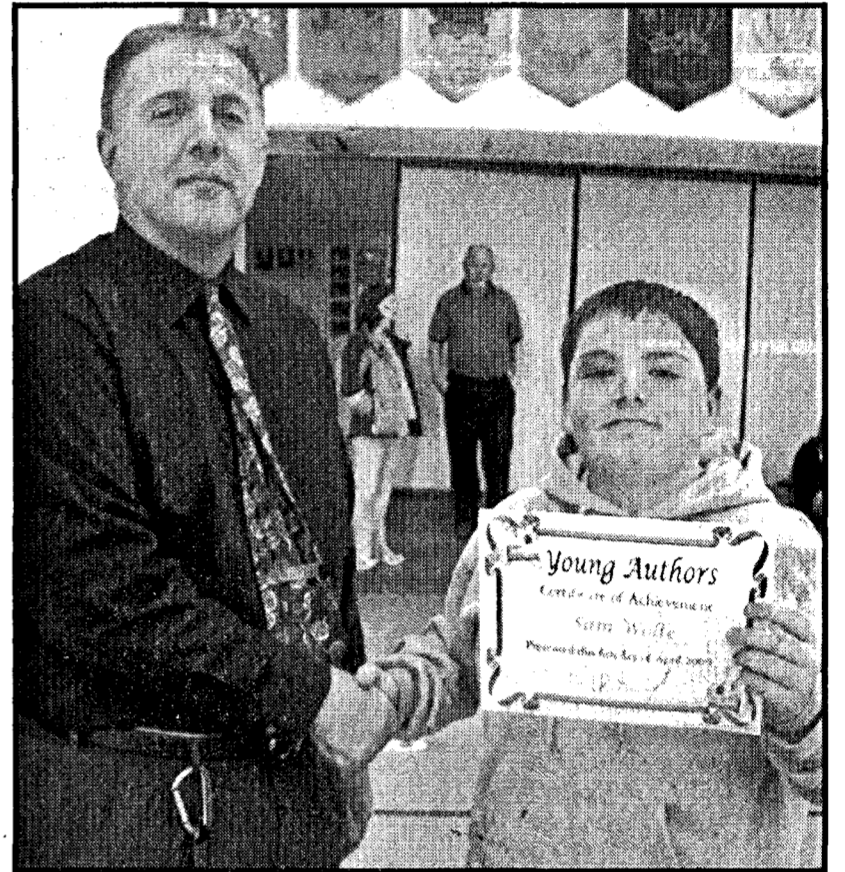
