



WSC to host graduation on May 9

Wayne State College will hold commencement for graduate students at 9:30 a.m. in Rice Auditorium and undergraduates at 2 p.m. May 9 in the Willow Bowl. A total of 531 degrees - 198 graduate degrees and 333 undergraduate degrees - will be conferred by Wayne State President Richard J. Collings.

Graduate invocation speaker - Stephen Hakes will give the invocation for the master's ceremony. Hakes was born in Baltimore, Md., but was raised in Auburn, Mich., a town of about 2,000. He earned his bàchelor's degree in 1992 from Concordia College, in Ann Arbor, Mich.: his master's of divinity in 1996 from Concordia Seminary, in St. Louis; and will be awarded his MBA on May 9 from Wayne State College.

Hakes lives in Norfolk and serves as the director of music at Christ Lutheran Church, His hobbies include running, sailing, swimming, water-skiing, researchwriting, woodworking, computer graphic design and working on cars. He is married to Lori Hakes, with whom he has three children, Daniel, Megan and Lauren.

Graduate commencement speaker - John Gathje, who is receiving his master of science in education, curriculum and instruction, will be the featured speaker at the master's ceremony. 


Optimist Club gathers

Nebraska Historical Society representative will tour courthouse and give remodeling advice

The Wavne County Board of Commissioners met in regular session Tuesday. Discussion was held on re-lettering for the courtroom and doors in the courthouse. Deb Allemann-Dannelly, clerk of the district court, gave quotes that were received for the project and showed some samples of what the finished doors could look like. The cost of the project for 11 doors and the courtroom would be around

Anne Volk, a state employee in the

county court office, asked the commissioners to seek advice from the Nebraska Historical Society before proceeding with dusting, glazing or moving the courthouse doors. A call was made to the Historical Society and Grant Landreth will be stopping at the courthouse to give his opinion on how to proceed with this and other possible projects.

Elizabeth Carlson, highway superintendent, discussed fuel tank replacement. She noted she spoke to Bob Shelborne of the State Fire Marshall office about selfcontained tanks and he said they

would meet state requirements. Fuel tank replacement for each of the three districts will cost around \$66,000 (per district) plus installation costs. Commissioner Kelvin Wurdeman made a motion to solicit for bids for fuel tank replacement, Commissioner Dean Burbach seconded the motion which passed unanimously.

Installation of horizontal curve signs was discussed. Carlson noted this is an 18 month project that needs to be completed within the next six months. The commissioners will go ahead with the project.

Carlson, Wurdeman and Burbach were appointed to a committee to review proposals received for enginéering services for 2009-11 and to select firms for said engineering

Carlson noted two applications for permission to place utility line in county road right of way were received. They were: Dan Hansen for electrical line for pivot changes from diesel to gas. Keith Fiscus of Coleridge will be doing the work. Burbach made a motion to allow burying the lines, Wurdeman seconded the motion which passed unanimously. The second application was from Doug Nelson for the same reason (pivot changes from diesel to gas) with Fiscus doing the work. Burbach made a motion to allow burying the electrical line, Wurdeman seconded the motion which passed unanimously.

A motion was made by Burbach to approve renewal of the maintenance agreement (heating and cooling units in each room in the courthouse) with Control Services, Inc. Wurdeman seconded the motion which passed unanimously. The amount of the renewal is \$1927.00 effective May 1, 2009.

The towel/rug service agreement with Appeara was discussed. It was noted the company is increasing the price from \$4 to \$4.75 service charge per trip.

Burbach made a motion to renew, the towel/rug service agreement with Appeara, Wurdeman seconded the motion which passed unanimously.

Burbach made a motion to approve employee technology grant application 09-03, Wurdeman seconded the motion which passed unanimously.

Wurdeman made a motion to reappoint Keith Gamble to a fiveyear term on the Vets Service Committee, Burbach second the motion which passed unanimously.

The board accepted the bid of 1,365 per month, which includes cleaning supplies, submitted by Sparkling Klean Service, Inc. to clean the public areas of the courthouse. Additional services accepted was cleaning/disinfecting of all offices once a week for \$85 per time. A motion was made by Burbach to accept the bid by Sparkling Klean Service, seconded by Wurdeman and passed unanimously.

In the Board of Equalization, Joyce Reeg, assessor, showed the commissioners two tax list corrections: Barrows, Inc., which was a duplicate. Commissioner Jim Rabe made a motion to omit the duplicate order, Burbach seconded the motion which passed unanimously. And, Krusemark Ag, which had an item that needed to be deleted; Rabe made a motion to take the item off the tax list, Burbach seconded the motion which passed unanimously.

The next meeting of the Wayne County Board of Commissioners will be held on Tuesday, May 19 at 9 a.m. at the courthouse in Wayne.







Council denies request for church

A use-by-exception request to construct a church on Main Street in Wayne was denied following debate at Tuesday's meeting of the Wayne City Council.

A public hearing was held on the request of Juan Rojas to construct the church at 117 Main Street, an area that is in the B-2 Central Business Zoning District.

Several people spoke against the request and stated that they had no objections to the church, but rather to the location.

Wes Blecke, representing Wayne Area Economic Development and Revitalize Wayne, told the council his groups voted to deny the request because they would prefer to see a retail/service business in the location. He said his office is willing to work with Rojas and his group to find a location for them to worship.

Marie Mohr said she felt parking was an issue on Main Street, especially during business hours and would also prefer to see a business that generates sales tax in the loca-

Council member Verdel Lutt told his fellow council members, "the Hispanics are part of the community. If they were allowed to build a church on Main Street, they would spend money in the downtown

Council member Kaki Ley said she felt the Main Street area was not an ideal location but that "we need to actively work with the

worship."

Following discussion, the council voted 5-2 to deny the application. Council members Lutt and Kathy Berry voted against denying the request.

A report on the Community Garden was presented.

City Administrator Lowell Johnson told the council that the city would prefer to work with individual gardeners due to insurance and liability issues.

Tracy Bruckner, one of those promoting the concept of a city garden, spoke to the council and asked about the make-up of the soil near the Community Activity Center. She said the area is mainly clay and needs top soil to be better suited to gardening. She said that due to the lateness of the gardening season, that area may not be able to be used this year. Council members approved

Resolution 2009-33 which approves a wage and salary scheduled for the position of City Planner/Inspector. Garry Poutre, Superintendent of Public Works, talked about the work required with the position and the current work load of city

employees who have been handling the duties since the position became open several months ago. At the present time, all certified inspections are being done by someone from outside the city and other work is being distributed among several current employees.

City Administrator Johnson said the current plan is working well but does see the position being







The winner of Central Region Bracket No. 1 will advance to the NCAA Central Super-Regional on May 15-16 where they will face the winner of Central Region bracket No. 2 that includes Metro State of Colorado, Mesa State, Colorado School of Mines and Colorado State University-Pueblo.

Wayne State College athletic director Eric Schoh announced last Thursday that Paul Combs has been named the new head men's basketball coach at WSC

Combs becomes the 25th men's basketball coach in the program's 96-year history and brings 10 years of head coaching experience and 15 years of overall coaching experience to the Wildcat men's basketball program. Combs will begin his duties at WSC on June 1.

"We are extremely pleased have Paul Combs and his family being a part of the Wildcat athletic family," Schoh said. "He's a proven coach and winner and we are fortunate to get a coach of his caliber. It's an exciting day for Wildcat bas-

Combs comes to WSC after serving six seasons as head coach at the University of Wisconsin-Plat-

He guided the Pioneers to a 104-55 record, including a 23-6 mark this past season that saw UW-Platteville reach the NCAA Division III National Tournament.

It was the first NCAA Division III Tournament appearance for the school since Bo Ryan, the current head coach at Wisconsin, coached the Pioneers to an NCAA National Championship in 1998-99.

This past season, Combs coached the Pioneers to an 84-79 win at Bradley and earned the school's first number one national ranking since 1999.

His overall head coaching record is 163-101 in 10 years as a head coach.

Prior to serving at UW-Platteville, the 38-year old Combs resurrected a once-struggling program at Lakeland College in Sheboygan,

Wis., where he went 60-45 in four years after he inherited a program that won just 20 games in the three years before Combs arrived.

Before Lakeland, Combs served as an assistant coach at Ripon College in Wisconsin, helping his alma mater to a 102-21 record with four NCAA Division III tournament appearances in five years.

Combs earned his bachelor's degree in business management from Ripon in 1993 where he was also a point guard and captain of the nationally-ranked Red Hawks in 1992-93.

"My family and I feel fortunate to be a part of the Wayne State College campus and community of Wayne," Combs said. "I'm humbled to be part of a great tradition of both athletics and academics at Wayne State. The most impressive part of the interview process was the people I met and now get to work with. And the community support is tremendous."

Combs added, "I'm eager to get started, understanding we have a lot of work to do. I look forward to building on the great tradition of Wildcat basketball."

Combs replaces Rico Burkett, who served as head coach for nine seasons at WSC and posted a 111-138 overall record and 75-79 mark in the Northern Sun Intercollegiate Conference.



Fred Pierce

Former WSC baseball coach Fred Pierce passes away unexpectedly

Wayne State College received word last week on the unexpected passing of Fred Pierce.

Pierce, the Wayne State College baseball coach from 1969-73, died unexpectedly at his home in Mesquite, Nev., on April 25th at the age Pierce coached the Wildcats to a

head coach, including a 26-3 mark in 1973 that still stands as the most successful team in school history with a .987 winning percentage.

Pierce was a native of Lake City, Iowa and after high school attended WSC where he earned his bachelors and masters degrees.

He later taught and coached baseball at WSC. His 1973 team ranks as one of the most successful in school history, winning the NAIA District 11 Championship and advancing to the NAIA Area Three Playoffs in Enid, Okla.

The 1973 Wildcat baseball team was inducted into the WSC Athletic Hall of Fame in the fall of 2005. Pierce was named the NAIA District 11 Coach of the Year in 1973, one of three seasons he earned the award.

Following his stint at WSC, Pierce earned his doctorate in education administration from the University of Wyoming and served as an assistant superintendant in Casper, Wyo., from 1973-1990 which later resulted in becoming superintendant of schools.

Weekly Legislative Update

This week marks not just the start of the Legislature's budget debate, but the start of late night sessions as well. For the last few weeks of the session, the Legislature will still convene at its normal time in the morning and afternoon, but will work until at least 8:30 p.m. during the middle of the week. Speaker Flood has made it known that if necessary some sessions could go as late as 11:59 p.m., so there will be no shortage of time to finish work on the large number of priority bills that remain on General File.

Last week brought two major compromises on the floor of the Legislature. First, a tentative agreement was reached on the K-12 state aid formula. Under a new amendment to LB 545 offered by Education Committee Chair Greg Adams of York, school districts would receive less aid earmarked specifically for contributions to the school retirement system, but would also be required to contribute less than originally expected to the plans. The fact that compromise is within reach after more than 14 hours of bitter floor debate on LB 545 is a good sign, and I will continue to maintain an open dialogue with local school districts as the bill moves forward.


Finally, a package of bills designed to address last year's safe haven crisis was advanced to Final Reading on Thursday. Five different bills were amended into LB. 603, which would create a state-



wide crisis hotline, secure Medicaid coverage for community-based residential and extended behavioral health care, expand Nebraska's program under the State Children's Health Insurance Program (SCHIP), and increase funding for children's behavioral health services. Additionally, LB 603 would create a special legislative commit-

Is life without parole too harsh?

A proposal to do away with sentences of life without parole for juveniles has been set aside for this

The chairman of the Legislature's Judiciary Committee, Sen. Brad Ashford of Omaha, says he wants a panel of lawmakers to study the

The bill was sponsored by Sen. Brenda Council of Omaha. When its consideration was delayed until 2010, she made an interesting reference to the 1958 spree killings involving Charles Starkweather and his 14-year-old girlfriend, Caril Fugate. Council compared Fugate's sentencing to a recent murder case.

Starkweather was executed in the wake of the rampage, whose victims included Fugate's mother, stepfather and 2-year-old sister. Nine people were murdered in Nebraska, and one in Wyoming.

Fugate was convicted of firstdegree murder and sentenced to life in prison. She was paroled after 18 years, in 1976.

"Jessica Reid is not going to see the light of day," Council told a reporter. "Caril (sic) Fugate did."

Reid was 17 when arrested in connection with the 2006 murders of a Murdock couple. She was convicted of second-degree murder and sentenced to life without parole.

It's important to understand that enactment of Council's proposal would only mean that juveniles sentenced to life in prison could eventually be considered for parole. It does not propose any mandatory

The interesting comparison of the Fugate and Reid cases:

Fugate denied she participated

in any killings, saying she was Starkweather's prisoner - the latter being a tale that strained credulity. Starkweather first told the same story, but when Fugate turned on him, he swore that she helped in some murders.

Not only did Reid acknowledge her part in the Murdock murders, she also wrote in her diary: "I loved it. I wish I could do it all the time."

For some, the differences in the two cases aren't sufficient to conclude that Reid, who was older than Fugate and apparently relished the

murder experience, should be forever denied consideration for parole. Again: The argument isn't that she should be entitled to parole, only that she eventually be allowed to ask the Pardons Board to consider

While murder is murder, we're talking 10 dead versus two dead, but we're also faced with at least a dispute over Fugate's involvement. In Reid's case, there is no question about her involvement, given her seemingly joyous recollection of the

So: Do the distinctions add up to its enactment.

to significant differences? Further, regardless of any previous case, is Council correct in asserting that juveniles simply should not go to jail without ever having even the possibility of being able to ask for parole consideration?

Under Council's plan: The sentence would be 50 years to life for those 16 or 17 when they commit a first-degree murder. Juveniles under 16 could get 40 years to life.

The bill would not be retroactive, and thus would not apply to Reid or any other juvenile sentenced prior

Use credit categories to improve credit [Briefly Speaking

Credit files include four general and information about inquiries. categories of information: identifying information, credit use information, public record information protects information by assuring

The credit file includes information identifying the person. This

that only people who have legitimate reasons may access a credit file. Identifying information includes name, present and past addresses, date of birth, phone number and current and past employers. Maiden names or nicknames also may appear in a credit file. A credit file includes a Social Security number, but that number

should not be included in requested copies. The information identifying the credit file is not used to calculate a credit score.


An important component of a credit file is the credit use history compiled by each of the three national credit reporting agencies. Where and how credit has been used is included in this history. Besides listing all past and present credit accounts, information on each account tells when the account was opened, the current balance, how much credit is available, monthly payment amount

and the status of the account. A historical timeline shows the record of payment on each account for at least two years. Credit information is collected from a variety of sources including financial institutions, mortgage and other lenders, retail store credit accounts, credit card accounts and collections accounts. Because creditors may not report to all three national credit reporting agencies, information in the three files may vary.

Information can remain in a credit file for seven years from date of last activity on a credit account, except for bankruptcy. Bankruptcy remains in a credit file for 10 years. Unpaid tax liens are part of a credit file until they are paid. Once paid, tax liens are deleted from a credit file in seven years.

Repossessions and collections are accounts that are so delinquent that they have been turned over to a collection agency or the collection branch of a major creditor. Creditors also will report chargeoffs for accounts that are in default of the original terms of the contract. Technically, a charge-off is a bookkeeping term used to indicate the date the creditor reports it as a loss on their business taxes; if it gets paid after that date, a recovery is reported in the business's records. Some consumers mistakenly think at a later date.

Accounts in good standing may be reported using terms such as "curent," "paying or paid as agreed" or never late". The timeline record hows "on time" payments.

Public records include information such as bankruptcies, court and default judgments, liens, foreclosures and overdue child support payments. Dates of such legal ction are noted in a credit file. f negative legal information is nown as part of a credit file, be ponest with a potential creditor hen applying for future credit. Tell the creditor the reason for the negative information.

If not granted credit the first time, wait a few months before applying for credit again. Waiting gives time to establish a better credit record. When credit is attained, always pay all debts on time.

The final category of credit file information is credit inquiries. Anyone who has accessed a credit file for the past two years is included. Some inquiries are for promotional purposes, such as for pre-approved credit cards. Other inquiries represent an account review when creditors scan their computers to see if there has been any deterioration of payment performance. These two types of inquiries will not affect a credit score.

What will affect a score is the number of inquiries for new credit. When applying for a mortgage they don't need to pay charged-off or car loan, people sign a form debts. 




Consumer Challenge


Ridiculous fees cause frustration



worked for the University of Nebraska for many years as an Integrated Pest Management specialist working mostly with insect problems in field crops. I am now an Extension Educator for three counties, and my first few months have been very busy trying to get the hang of things as an educator. My main focus will be on crop production and natural resources. Here's a little bit about myself first before we get to business.

I grew up in northern Minnesota where there is plenty of water and trees. I received by B.A. in Biology from a small college, Gustavus Adolphus in St. Peter, Minn. My Master's degree was in Entomology from North Dakota State University in Fargo. Ever since, I've been here in northeast Nebraska. My wife Mary and I reside in Wayne and we have four children, Erin, a teacher and coach at Ravenna, Wade and Michelle who attend UNK, and Shannon, a junior at Wayne High.

My column will mostly consist of information gleaned from what I'm seeing out in the field and the many sources available from the University of Nebraska. It will cover primarily crops and natural resources. So without further ado, here we go.


This is the time of the year when we get a lot of calls on evergreen tree problems. Several diseases can cause needles to brown and fall off. Kelly Feehan, Extension Educator in Horticulture from Platte Co. shares this information.

. Pine tip blight has caused significant browning of Austrian and ponderosa pine over the last few years. This fungal disease, called Sphareopsis and Diplodia tip blight, is one of the pine diseases that can be controlled with fungicide sprays and now is the time to begin application.

Our moist weather during the last two summers, along with high winds and hail wounding shoots and branches, has allowed this disease to severely infect some pine trees. The first year a tree is infected the most obvious symptom is stunted (one to one and a half inch long) brown needles on branch tips.

Infection of healthy shoots on branch tips occurs when the Sphareopsis fungus and moisture is present on new shoots, whether shoots are wounded or not. New shoot infections often result in only the death of new growth during the years of infection. This is not as damaging to a tree as infections of older shoots which can cause entire branches to die.

Older shoots and branches become infected when tissues are



injured by insects, hail, or pruning. When infected, full sized needles turn tan to brown in color and often droop and wilt. Because of this wilted appearance, tree owners might assume their tree has pine wilt; the disease that is killing Scotch pine across Nebraska.

Pine wilt affects mainly Scotch pine and does not cause needles or branches to visibly wilt. Pine wilt results in tree branches or entire trees rapidly turning pale

dles, look for stunted, brown needles on branch tips and check for black fungal spores or specks on the bottoms of pine cones. These two symptoms distinguish this disease from pine wilt and from Dothistroma needle blight which causes reddish purple lesions (spots) to form on green needles followed by browning of the needle from the tip down to the lesion.

Once tip blight is confirmed by these symptoms, new infections can be reduced significantly with two fungicide applications made at the correct time. In Nebraska, the application is best made now, during the first week in May. Fungicides applied after mid-May usually are ineffective.

Use fungicides labeled for use on evergreens and which contain the chemical Thiophanate-methyl. Some trade names include 3336 F. Topsin and AllBan. Homeowners can apply Bordeux mixture, Ferti-lome Sytemic Fungicide or Spectator. Be sure to read and follow label directions for effective application.





Students compete in Regional Science Fair

The Northeast Nebraska Junior Academy of Sciences held their Regional Science Fair on April 3 at Wayne State College. Junior and senior high science researchers from Allen, Columbus-Lakeview, Madison, Newman Grove and Wayne Community Schools presented their projects to judges.

Sixty-one students participated in the junior division (grades 6-9) and 16 students participated in the senior division (grades 9-12). Based on the quality of their research, judges awarded first place (blue), second place (red), and third place (white) ribbons.

In the junior division; seven blue, 31 red, and 23 white ribbons were awarded. Three blue ribbons were awarded to students from Wayne Middle School, two to students from Allen, and one each to students from Columbus-Lakeview and Newman Grove. 

Living Resourcefully

Avert family money problems through open communication

Often, a major cause of conflict in families is how to use money. Sometimes, family members have different attitudes about spending and saying money or have unrealistic financial goals. Communication is the key to helping a family make satisfying and better quality financial decisions.

To facilitate effective communication, arrange a regular meeting time for family members to talk about money. Family members can determine how often to meet. Don't wait for problems to occur before getting the family involved. Limit this meeting to 30 or 40 minutes and try to focus on one clearly identified issue at a time, such as spending money on brand name or designer clothing, or eating out multiple times per week.

The entire family, including children old enough to understand, should decide as a team how to spend money. Spending isn't just the decision of those who earn the money. Family members are more willing to adhere to decisions they helped make.

Begin communicating about money by identifying personal values. These values guide decisions, including financial ones, and reflect what a person considers important.

Financial issues can be difficult to address, so it is important to allow open and honest communication without judgment or criticism. Each family member should be able to express wants, needs, and personal feelings. Avoid phrases such as "you always" or "you never" instead try to begin statements with the words "I think" or "I feel". Listen carefully and responsively to others, expressing willingness to compromise and negotiate to realistically settle disagreements. Sometimes, a written contract or agreement helps avoid misunderstandings.

The following steps can help families come up with acceptable solutions to their financial decisions:

· Specifically define the problem, listing only one problem at a time. Brainstorm and write down all possible solutions to the problem,

regardless of their value. Evaluate the list of solutions. Discuss which ones are workable, practical and agreeable to all involved.

· Pick one solution, and outline the steps it would take to reach

• Identify possible obstacles to the solution, how to avoid them, what could be sacrificed to reach the solution and whose support is necessary for the solution to work.

· Celebrate accomplishments or progress that you make towards your goals. If still facing challenges, regroup and re-define to work towards success.

Personal Finance class discusses insurance

The Wayne Community School's Personal Finance classes have been studying insurance and as part of the unit have been discussing risks young people encounter.

It was decided to create a campaign to help other students become more aware of the risks associated with eating and/or cell phone use while driving, as well as the use of seatbelts, and the dangers of driving when tired. They spent several days researching statistics, brainstorming ideas, making posters and flyers, and designing their group's campaign to be distributed to the rest of the school.

The Personal Finance classes watched a video concerning distractions while driving. Then posters and flyers were put up throughout the school and special announcements were made concerning car safety. They also were outside the school to give a treat to the students who were not texting or talking on their cell phones on their way out of the parking lot after school and a warning ticket to those students who were already using their cell phones while driving.

It was discovered that most of the Wayne High School students do not use their cell phones on their way out of the parking lot.

However, students should keep in mind that one of the many important statistics students researched included: The No.1 source of driver inattention is use of a wireless device. (Virginia Tech /NHTSA).

Most problems regarding money are caused by lack of planning and communication. Usually they fall under four categories: conflicting values, unrealistic goals, emotional uses of money, and lack of planning. Through negotiation and honesty, family members can help and better manage finances.

Communication becomes especially important as change occurs and families evolve. Change is a the task of rethinking and reanalyzing values, realizing potential causes of money problems, and increasing financial communica-.
