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Former City Council rep joins mayoral race

Wayne School Board president decides she will run for a third four-year term

Voters in Wayne will have a mayoral race to consider this November, and the last of the three incumbent members of the Wayne Board of Education has thrown her hat into the ring for another term.

Former Ward 4 City Council representative Jane O'Leary filed Monday for the mayoral seat that will be open when Lois Shelton leaves office at the end of the year. She is the second resident of Ward 4 to run for the city's top office. Kenneth Chamberlain, the current Ward 4 City Councilman, has already filed to run for

The last of the three incumbent members of the

Wayne Board of Education has also decided to run for another four-year term. Board president Dr. Carolyn Linster announced earlier this week that she will seek a third term.

O'Leary, a 30-year resident of Wayne and a parttime instructor at Wayne State College, was a member of the City Council from 1988-2000, and decided now was a good time to get back into city government.

"Ever since I was on the City Council, I thought (being the mayor) would be an interesting thing to do," she said. "There hasn't been an incumbent that I wanted to run against, so this is the first opportunity

O'Leary said her past experience in city government would be an asset to the city as the new mayor.

would enjoy it and be able to contribute more to the city," she said.

O'Leary, who was a member of the council when the city began work on the library/senior center and the community activity center, said the city needs to look to the future and do some strategic planning to meet the community's needs well into the future.

"We need to take a big look at the future, do some strategic planning and see how the city needs to position itself for the next 20-30 years," she said. "We have a lot of young people that are going to be staying here, and they need to be assured of a promising quality of life. We need to look at planning for the future."

Linster, who has served two terms on the Wayne

> "It took a while for me to reflect on what would be best, but I think we have a board in place and a new superintendent, and there are a number of initiatives that we're discussing and I'd like to be a part of the continued planning."

Linster cited the board's reaching out to the community and being involved as a liaison to other community organizations as one of the keys to the board's success in recent years.

"I think we're getting more communication out to the public, and I think the board we have is a very

School day to last 10 minutes longer

Students in Wayne Public Schools will start the day earlier and end it later next

The Wayne Board of Education approved the 2010-11 school calendar at its meeting Monday night, which will add 10 minutes to the school day and give the district more than enough hours to meet the state requirement for instructional time.

Next year, the school day will start at 8:05 a.m. and run until 3:35 p.m. each day. Assuming there are not days off for weather-related cancellations or other events, students will get about 1,175 hours of instructional time.

"We wanted to be at or above the state average (1,150) as far as instructional minutes go, and doing this will allow for that, even if we have another bad winter and have to change things," superintendent Mark Lenihan said. "This allows us, as we need, to take time off for snow or other situations, like state tournaments, and not have to add days like we're doing this

The board approved the receipt of a number of gifts made by the community, including a \$45,000 gift from Wayne Community Schools Foundation for a number of school projects.

Lenihan said the board appreciates the gifts that were received, which will go to help improve the school.

"The district appreciates the work that the parent organizations and others in the

community have done to help us out with all the projects that we've done this year," he said. "We wouldn't have been able to do them without the donations from the community."

The donation from the foundation will go toward funding for the new message center outside the high school, the sound system in the gym and theater, upgraded wireless technology in the district buildings, a new practice mat for the wrestling room and a new kiln for the art room.

The Wayne Booster Club donated \$10,000 to help with the purchase of the new sound system in the gym. Other donations included \$1,500 from Pamida Foundation for classroom LCD projectors, and a donation from Tim Schaefer in memory of his mother for the purchase of a new bass

The board adopted a resolution in support of the Nebraska School Activities Association, which is coming under fire with the introduction of LB1021, a plan to restructure the school organization, in the Nebraska Legislature. The bill looks to change the governance

structure of the school organization, but Lenihan said smaller school districts don't want to lose their voice in the

"If we start adding regional representatives based on student numbers, the larger schools would have more representation than we would, and they already have that when they get to the

Mark Lenihan, Superintendent of Wayne Community Schools, sent an email to staff concerning an accident that happened Thursday, Feb. 4 approximately 1 1/2 miles west


The van was on the way home from the basketball games in Norfolk. The email states that "The van Mr. Wall was driving hit a patch of ice near the radio station and slid into a ditch. The hill leading to the ditch was rather steep and the van slid onto it's side as it came to the bottom. Everyone in the van was buckled in and nobody was hurt. Mr. Wall was driving no faster than 30-35 miles per hour when this happened.

"The girls were incredibly calm and maintained composure during the entire time. The girls were helped out of the van and driven back to school by other coaches and parents. Obviously we are fortunate no one was hurt, and, after talking to Mr. Wall, the coaches did everything they could have done according to protocol.

"Mr. Wall, Mr. Hoskins, and Mr. Johnson handled this situation very well and did a great job keeping the kids safe. It does serve as a great reminder when driving vans to make sure all passengers are buckled in, and drive slowly when conditions warrant as the coaches were doing.'

Food Check Out Week to be observed in Wayne

Food Check Out Week is devoted to helping to teach Americans how to stretch their grocery dollars with healthy, nutritious food. Food Check Out Week will be observed in Wayne on Thursday, Feb. 25.

The Ag Taskforce of Wayne Area Economic Development/Chamber/ Main Street will set up information tables all day at both Pac 'N' Save and Quality Food Center where customers may register to win Grocery Certificates.

Also on that day, from 5-7 pm, members of the Ag Taskforce will be staffing the tables and offering information about using the food pyramid to plan nutritious and affordable meals. Eight winners of \$10 Grocery Certificates will be announced at Chamber Coffee on Feb. 26.

With many Americans feeling an economic squeeze, they may be eating out less and preparing more meals at home. Public health experts fear that lean economic times may mean an already overweight public may resort to cheaper high calorie foods, which can lack important vitamins, minerals,

fiber and other nutrients.

The price of readily available fresh fruits and vegetables, such as Iceberg lettuce, bananas, whole carrots, Red Delicious apples, broccoli and tomatoes, has remained stable compared to dessert and snack foods. This suggests that the price of a healthy diet has not changed relative to an unhealthy

Americans enjoy a food supply that is among the safest, most abundant and most affordable in the world.

Based on Agriculture Department statistics, it takes just five weeks for the average American to earn enough disposable income to pay for the family's food supply for the entire year.

Recent retail price increases at the grocery store are due primarily to higher energy costs for processing, hauling and refrigerating food products.







Wayne State lands 27 recruits for football

Wayne State College head football coach Dan McLaughlin has 27 new recruits coming into the football program for 2010.

National Signing Day was last Wednesday, Feb. 3, and a number of student athletes have signed national letters of intent to play football for Wayne State College.

The 2010 recruiting class includes 25 high school recruits and two junior college transfers. Of the 25 high school signees, 20 come from Nebraska, with the other five hailing from Iowa. The Wildcats signed nine offensive linemen, six defensive linemen, five wide receivers, four linebackers, one tight end, one quarterback and one running back with this year's class.

"This is the largest signing class in the five years that I have been here,", McLaughlin said. "Our focus this year was to sign offensive line prospects, because we only signed two last year, and I feel our hard work was rewarded with the signing of nine new offensive linemen."

This year's class includes some local flavor, as lineman Nathan Janke of Winside and Laurel-Concord wide receiver Johnny Saunders. Several area standouts are on the list, including Ponca linebacker Jared Curry, Hartington Cedar Catholic running back Chad Koch, and Battle Creek standouts Zac Bierman at wide receiver and offensive lineman Brent Scholte.

Here is a brief synopsis of the Wayne State recruiting class (position, height, weight and hometown in parenthesis):

Zac Bierman (Wide Receiver, 6-3, 190, Battle Creek, Neb.)

Bierman was an All Mid States Conference selection in football as a junior and senior at Battle Creek High School, helping the Braves reach the Class C1 State football playoffs.

Michael Bohn (Offensive Line, 6-3, 250, Ravenna, Neb.)

Bohn was a Class C2 All State selection at offensive line by the Omaha World-Herald and Lincoln Journal Star as a senior, helping Bluejays to an 8-2 record and the second round of the Class C2 football playoffs. He earned Academic All-State honors three seasons and was a three-time All-District pick.

Cody Calhoun (Wide Receiver, 6-2, 185, Maxwell, Neb.)

Calhoun set a new Class D1 single-game playoff record this season with 214 yards receiving and helped his team to a 7-3 record and the second round of the Class D1 playoffs. He was named Class D1 All-State as a linebacker by Omaha World-Herald and as a punter by the Lincoln Journal Star as a senior. He had 79 catches for 1,122 yards and 18 TD's as a junior, helping his team reach the semifinals for first time in school





Arlen happy with move to Wayne State

It's not often that a high-level talent finds a fresh start in Wayne,

When women's basketball coach Chris Kielsmeier heard that an outstanding basketball talent was looking for a new start in college basketball, he wasted no time in encouraging Ashley Arlen to come to Wayne State College, and the move has paid huge dividends for

Arlen and the Wildcats. The 6-foot-2 sophomore standout from Cascade, Iowa has been scorching hot during Wayne State's 17-4 season so far, averaging almost 20 points and eight rebounds per game. In NSIC play, she has scored more than 30 points on two occasions this year, is averaging more than 21 points per game and recently earned her second straight NSIC Player of the Week nod.

Her contributions at Wayne State are a far cry from her time in Ames, where she averaged 3.5 points and 3.1 rebounds as a freshman for an Iowa State team that reached the Elite Eight in Div. I last year.

She said she enjoyed her time at

Iowa State, but she didn't feel she

was a good fit for the program. "I liked it (at ISU) at first, but after that first year I just felt it wasn't a good fit for me," she said.

Not long after she told Iowa State coach Bill Fennelly of her decision, she was in touch with Kielsmeier, whose connections with Fennelly helped him get the early jump on the talented player.

"When you hear there's a Division I transfer out there, you make a call," Kielsmeier said. "I did an intern when I was a student at Iowa State and know the coaches there really well, and (Fennelly) got me the release for her that day. I had the release in my hand before any other coach in the country."

Arlen was joined by her father and boyfriend on the recruiting visit, and she ran into Clare Duwelius, a teammate of hers on an AAU summer team in Iowa who was playing for the Wildcats.

"I knew Clare from playing AAU and after we took a visit, I really liked what I saw here," she said.

Kielsmeier said he saw Arlen's play during the NCAA tournament

"I knew coach was expecting points out of me, and I think I've come pretty far with learning how coach wants the defense to run.' she said of her effort. "We can't have one person slacking off on defense, and I definitely don't want to be that one person."

One could hardly accuse Arlen of slacking off. She plays an average of 30 minutes per game, is averaging 23.7 points and 10 rebounds during Wayne State's current winning streak and has cracked the 30-point barrier three times this season.

Arlen said the team's chemistry is part of the reason for the success the Wildcats are enjoying this year, something that was an immediate attraction to her when she came to

"The girls are really close, and we hang out together off the court as well as at practice, so there's a great chemistry with this team and the coaching staff is great," she


And, for all the success that Arlen is having, Kielsmeier said she still has room to grow as a player.

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
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Brett Spiker shoots over an Augustana defender during the Wildcats' loss to the Vikings Saturday at Rice Auditorium.



Bills are up for debate in Education Committee


Greetings from the Unicameral! The Education Committee has a full plate this session, with work on major topics like the kindergarten entrance age and the community college funding formula awaiting the committee in the coming

While these major policy debates will likely take up a significant year, sometimes the smaller changes to state law have the greatest impact on our local communities. LB711, introduced by Senator Cap Dierks and advanced on a unanimous vote by the Education Committee, is one of those small changes that will help local school districts in Northeast Nebraska.

In 1998, the Legislature created a process called school unification, allowing smaller school districts to share resources without going through the consolidation process. Unified school districts are essentially treated as a single school district, but each district is allowed to retain their own identity and sports teams.

Unfortunately, the original unification law made the process of "un-unifying" difficult, by forcing districts to either unify or consolidate with another district. Under LB711, school districts that seek to unify would be able to use interlocal agreements to terminate the unification. While there are only three unified school districts in existence at the current time, the bill opens up the possibility of unification for school districts facing an increasing shortage of resources.

Two bills that I introduced this session have passed the first round of debate. The first bill, LB746, would extend and enhance



the provisions of Nebraska's existing ban on racial profiling. As many Nebraska communities have learned through experience, bringing law enforcement and the affected communities together is essential to finding broad-based solutions that can best address the difficult issues facing our state. LB746 will likely be debated on Select File in the coming weeks.

My other bill awaiting secondround debate on Select File is LB873, a "clean-up" measure designed to eliminate taxpayer confusion by repealing an additional notice that is currently sent to owners of mobile homes, cabin trailers, manufactured homes and other types of property that are subject to personal property taxes.

The Legislature learned something (one hopes) with the original, misbegotten safe-haven statute that opened the door for people who wanted to drop their kids off at hospitals when they felt unable to care for them. using it to unload teenagers. The episode made Nebraska look like a place where legislators make policy the way Toyota makes accelerators.

That particular mess could have been avoided if the appropriate attorneys who work for state senators had rightly advised their bosses. Maybe: "Whoa, chief! This makes less sense than a tuna fish and jelly sandwich!'

So, let's give credit where it is eventually due.

The Legislature recently stepped in a bucket of stuff when it rewrote a pending bill so that it would require some people - those who would ride motorcycles without helmets – to buy insurance to cover any long-term care they might need as a result of choosing to ride motorcycles without helmets. Another well-intended idea.



The good news - this is where due credit is given - is that shortly after the requirement was written into law someone figured out it would cost motorcyclists somewhere between \$4,000 and \$5,000 annually. The requirement was eventually erased from the

Voters deserve a choice in this election

By this time next week, we will know which of our elected leaders plan to run for re-election this November.

Now the question is – who among you will give us a choice when we go to the polls this year?

The best thing about being an American citizen is that we have the opportunity to choose who will represent us in the halls of government at every level (at least locally – when it comes to the federal elections it's pretty much the lesser of two horribly incompetent evils, known as the Democrat and Republican parties, but that's another column for another day).

We have the right to determine who will serve the public as representatives of our city councils, school boards and other public offices. the local school board or President of the United States. The scheduled meetings that most of the public sees (if they bother to attend the meetings) are just the tip of the iceberg for a public official. Whether it's the school board or

the city council, a public official's schedule is a busy one. There are meetings with subordinates, attending certain functions, going to state and regional meetings relating to their position, the hours spent poring over financial information and budgets, and the daily conversations - many of them negative - with constituents who want to give them their two cents worth of criticism regarding an issue related to the office they

Most of the decisions an elected official will make, generally, go unnoticed by the public unless it directly affects them. Nobody pays much attention to the county sheriff's office until they get pulled

over for speeding (or worse). The school board won't draw much attention from the public unless they make a drastic change in curriculum or the price of school lunches (although they recently added 10 minutes to the school day, which might put them in dutch with the kids in the district . . . then again, the kids aren't old enough to vote, so what the heck).

It's those tough decisions, the ones that could have a profound effect on the school, community or county, that will draw the attention of the public, and more often than not, that attention won't be the kind that makes them want to go out in public. Ask a board member how much fun it is to hear from people who just had their property taxes raised, and they'll tell you that those conversations are not the ones they relish taking part in.

These people put a lot of time and effort into representing the will of the people, and they should be applauded for their efforts. At the same time, they should not get comfortable in their positions as a member of school, city or county government, and that's why we elect and re-elect people every two and four years.

To do that, incumbents need challengers to run for public office. We need a choice when we go to the polls, if for no other reason than to keep those now in office from becoming complacent in their positions as a representative of the public. Every governing body, from the school board to Congress, needs new ideas and new energy, and the only way that will happen is if we the people, are given a choice at the ballot box.

This is not to say that those currently serving in office who have filed for re-election (or are about to) are not worthy of continued representation in their respective positions. I think the vast majority of those now serving in office at the city, county and state levels have done as good a job as they are capable of, and if people are comfortable with having those people serve another four-year term in their respective office, then we should go ahead and vote them

But in order to have the right representation, voters need to have a choice during the May 11 primary and the November 2 general elections. Which of you will step up and give us a choice when we step into the ballot box?

3. Balance "flexible" spending. Flexible spending usually includes expenses that vary from month to month, such as groceries, maintenance on an automobile, clothing,

4. Learn to identify the difference between needs (essentials) and wants (extras) in your spending plan.

5. Keep track of miscellaneous expenses. Spending a dollar a day in a vending machine at work may not seem like much, but if you multiply a dollar times five (for each day of the week) times 52 weeks, it adds up to \$260 a year.

6. Comparison shop. Check prices, product guarantees, and service at two or more places when purchasing costly items, like a major appliance or a car.

7. Use credit with care. Be sure to limit credit card purchases to an amount that can be comfortably paid within a given time frame. Using a credit card for small purchases is, however, fine if you always pay the total balance and

don't accrue interest charges. Keep track of credit card expenditures to minimize surprises when the bill arrives. Try carrying an index card or small notebook to keep a running total of credit card expenditures if you have difficulty managing credit.

Can parents help children learn the value of a dollar? Here's an easy exercise that can help parents teach children about purchasing power. Choose a time when a supermarket is not likely to be crowded. Ask a child to choose two grocery items from the same shelf and help the child compare the size of the boxes; the number of servings; price and/or price per serving, which usually is posted. Or, help them check how many of two or three different items, such as grapes, potatoes, and/or bananas they might purchase for the same amount of money.

Children also benefit from learning that price is influenced by the place of purchase. For example, a candy bar is likely to be least expensive at a supermarket or discount department store; more costly at a convenience store; and still more costly at a movie theater or sporting event concession stand.

Lauren Lofgren, the director of the library, was the guest speaker for the afternoon. She took the group on a tour of the library. Members of the group learned there are many more items besides books that are available to be checked out at the library.

The Acme Club is observing the 125th anniversary of the organization of the club. It was organized in February 1985 as a literary society. One of the main purposes of the Acme Club was working for the Library Fund.

Following are some excerpts from a letter written by Mrs. John T. Bressler in 1945. "In the early life of the club there were several other clubs and they formed a city federation. The Acme Club also belonged to the state federation of clubs. Acme joined with other clubs to start a library and members of the various clubs gave books to the

The library was opened in a basement at the court house, which was furnished rent-free by the county. Turns were taken to open it twice a week, but in time, other clubs withdrew from the project, leaving the Acme Club with the project.

Later on, The Monday CLub had a rental library downtown.

In April of 1910, according to an item printed in the Nebraska Democrat, a library board was appointed by the Mayor, Mr. Henry Ley. Their first meeting was held in the Baptist Church. After organizing, they asked the city council to levy a two mill tax for maintaining a library which they received. The board decided to buy a lot north of the church for the sum of \$850 which was paid for by money being raised by subscriptions taken in

After the lot was obtained the matter of getting a Carnegie library

was written to Andrew Carnegie. He responded to Mrs. John T. Bressler and told her what would be required of the city, so that he would make a gift for a library building. It was approved and Mr. Carnegie gave \$10,000 for the construction of a building.

The Acme Club earned money in various ways in order to buy books, pay for a librarian, etc.

The letter that Andrew Carnegie responded to Mrs. Bressler is framed and hangs in the Conference Room at the library.

The next meeting for the Acme Club will be Monday, Feb. 15.

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
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
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

Private pesticide applicator training classes scheduled

Private pesticide applicators whose licenses expire in 2010 and those seeking first-time certification can find information on pesticide safety education programs at their local University of Nebraska Extension offices.

Licensing as a private applicator allows farmers to purchase and use pesticide classified for restricted use by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency in their own farming operations.

Extension provides the educational program, while the agriculture department is responsible for licensing. The training fee is \$30.00. An applicator may also certify by self-study for a \$60.00 training fee.

In 2001, the Nebraska Legislature created a state pesticide license fee of \$25.00 for private applicators. The fee covers a three-year license
