Current, former City Council members to square off for Wayne's mayoral seat

Sixty-six seniors from Wayne High School visited the Wayne County Courthouse last week to cast ballots for the May 2010 Primary election. Wayne High School government instructor Josh Johnson routinely visits the courthouse with his students to see the democratic process in action. Earlier this school year the students visited the courthouse to register to vote. They also took part in County Government Day activities in early April. Prior to casting ballots, County Clerk Debra Finn spoke to the students and explained the different ballots and gave voting instructions to the students.

A current and former member of the Wayne City Council will square off in November to decide who will be the city's next mayor, while all three incumbents for county races that faced primary challenges survived and will be running unopposed in the general election.

With a surprisingly-active voter turnout of 33 percent, voters in Wayne County made their feelings known on the various local, county, state and federal races. Winners in Tuesday's primaries advance to the November 2 general election.

Locally, Current City Councilman Kenneth Chamberlain was the clear leader in the primary balloting for Wayne's mayoral seat, which will be vacated this November when Lois Shelton's term runs out. Chamberlain received 430 votes (54.78 percent) to earn one of the two spots in the November election. Former City Councilwoman Jane O'Leary picked up 281 (35.8 percent) votes. Randall Pick finished a distant third with 67 (8.54 percent) votes, with seven write-in ballots cast.

Chamberlain was the leading vote-getter in all four wards in the City of Wayne, picking up more votes than the combined total of the other two candidates in each

"I'm really excited about it, and I want to thank everybody for getting out and voting," he said as the results were announced. "I'm looking forward to campaigning this fall

and meeting more people.' O'Leary, who said she didn't campaign aggressively during the primary race, is looking forward to the challenge of running against Chamberlain.

"I'm very excited about it," she said. "I think it's going to be a challenge, but I'm looking forward to it. I'm looking forward to getting to work on campaigning."

County SheriffLeRoy W. Janssen appears headed for what he said will be his eighth and final term as the county's top law enforcement officer. He received 765 (56.54 percent) votes to 588 (43.46 percent) for challenger Cory Moeller. Janssen currently is running unopposed, as no Democrat candidate chose to run for the seat.

"It's an opportunity to fulfill a career," he said. "I've been a part of law enforcement for a number of years and tried to impact the community and bring the best law enforcement we could to the county, and I appreciated the competition."

Current Wayne County Commissioner representatives Kelvin Wurdeman and James Rabe also survived their primary elections and are currently running

# School board sells old District 51 building

The Wayne Board of Education received just one bid for the old District 51 property and decided to go ahead and accept that bid during Monday's school board meeting.

Dunklau Family Limited Partnership of Pilger made the bid of \$3,011 for the property, which the board unanimously

accepted during Monday's meeting. "I was hoping we could get \$10,000 (for

the property), but the offer is better than a poke in the eye," board member Rod Garwood said. "It's not like we have a lot of options or a lot of use for it, and this will get the property off our tax rolls.'

The board authorized superintendent Mark Lenihan to execute a purchase agreement for the sale of the property.

The board discussed negotiations on a new contract with the district's teachers. but no decision was reached. Lenihan said talks between the two sides are ongoing.

One thing that she and her husband, Doug, have done through their 24 years of







Instructors for the class will be Ron Carnes and Matt Schaub.

The Driver Education Program will place emphasis on skill development in driving, alcohol and its relationships to the driver, road rage, traffic laws and insurance.

Guest speakers include local law enforcement, state troopers, insurance agents, Operation Life Saver and a parent speaker whose daughter was a victim of a Driving While Under the Influence.


Students must complete a minimum of five hours behind the wheel driving and a minimum of 20 hours of classroom work.

"People think nothing of the money that they would spend on a new car. If they only realized how many lives they could touch with that same amount," she said.

Many children go through the foster care system in Nebraska. Currently, there are 463,000 children in the U.S. foster care system and 123,000 of these children are waiting for families to adopt them, according to a national public service announcement campaign with the AD Council.

"I do public speaking about adoption because that is where my heart lies," Markworth said. "I see the potential in these kids. How would any of us react or get through life if we were reminded of a list of what we have done wrong in life?'

Markworth sees what children can do right. She tries to find their passion, what they are good at and, what they like to be involved with.

One of her children was 8 when she adopted him. He will graduate fourth in his class. She talks of her pride in him rather than her own accomplishments. A public speaker, photographer, philosopher and many other hats are worn by a woman with time for putting oth-

# Two local businesses sell alcohol to minors

Although the majority of the 18 Wayne businesses were closed, two out of six of the on- and off-sale establishments sold alcohol to underage purchasers last week during alcohol compliance

A shoulder tap operation was also conducted resulting in the following citations: one procuring alcohol for a minor and five minor in possession of alcohol.

"Adults, particularly those adults who are close in age to their minor friends, tend to be a regular source of alcohol for kids," said Chief Lance Webster of the Wayne Police Department. "During prom and graduation season it's important to let the community know we're serious

about enforcing the underage drinking laws, including citing adults and businesses that make it easy for youth to access alcohol."

Of the two businesses that failed the compliance checks, only one outlet, White Dog Pub, located at 102 N. Main St., had a prior sale to a minor violation on record with the Nebraska Liquor Control Commission from November of 2008. The other business that failed the compliance check was Melodee Lanes, 1221 North

Historically, the non-compliant rate has fluctuated from a high 33 percent in 2008, with six of 23 businesses failing the compliance checks; to 14 percent in May 2009, where one out of 14

sold alcohol to minors; to a low zero percent noncompliant rate in September 2009, when five businesses were checked.

"These numbers reflect a strong need that enforcements to reduce youth access to alcohol continue," Diane Riibe, executive director for Project Extra Mile, said. "The research reflects that the deterrent effect of these operations dissipates after three months, which only reinforces the strong need for these efforts."

The Wayne Police Department worked collaboratively with Project Extra Mile to conduct the

# Big 10 bad for Husker grid future

Monday evening, a good friend of mine called with some shocking "Hey, it looks like Nebraska is

moving to the Big 10 Conference," he told me.

Can't be, I said.

"A radio station in Kansas City reported that Nebraska and Missouri are joining Rutgers and possibly Notre Dame in moving to the Big 10," he insisted.

As it turns out, officials at UNL are insisting that they have not been offered a chance to make the move, which can mean one of two things:

- They haven't been contacted about moving, or,

- They are still trying to finish the paperwork to apply for membership and don't want anybody to know they are preparing to jump ship.

Whether or not Nebraska moves to the Big 10 (plus Io-WHAT?) remains to be seen, but if you're a football fan, you have got to hate the possibility of Nebraska moving out of the Texas-dominated Big 12 to the hoity-toity Big 10.

Let's be serious, folks - this is not a football-related move Nebraska may (or may not) be making. This move is all about money and exposure, something they get enough of in the Big 12, but will get even more of in the Big 10.

However, since it's football that drives the economic engine of most of the major college athletic programs on this planet, let's talk about how great a move, from a football perspective, this would be for Nebraska.

But let's be honest – it will make a BCS bowl bid, and a potential (mythical) national championship game, a lot tougher than you think

In previous years, Nebraska has had to contend with the resurgence of programs like Missouri, Kansas, Texas Tech and Oklahoma State, all programs who have been in the top 10 nationally at some point during the past five years. We all know about how dominant Texas and Oklahoma have been, with both programs winning, or playing for, national titles in the past decade.

A move to the Big 10 would take most of those big-ticket, nationallyprominent, BCS difference-making opportunities off the table.

Illinois? Northwestern? Minnesota? Michigan? Indiana? Purdue? Wisconsin? Michigan State? What have these programs done lately, outside of trading spots in the bottom half of the Big 10 standings and getting an occational low-tier

Oh, sure, there's Ohio State and Penn State, the perpetuallyoverrated kings of the conference. And then there's Iowa, another program that is a perennial underachiever. I suppose they would give Nebraska a run for their money if the Cornhuskers were to move.

But let's be serious – Nebraska's program has turned around under Bo Pelini, and it's a pretty good bet the Cornhuskers would spoil the welcoming party in year one.

The Big 10 is the most overrated football conference on the planet. In the last 40 years, the Big 10 Conference has won ONE mythical national football title. Were it not for the Rose Bowl, the conference couldn't spell "major bowl bid" if you spotted them the first 10 letters.

Nebraska's national championship hopes will be hurt by a move to the Big 10 Conference. Butting heads with Texas and Oklahoma gives Nebraska a puncher's chance of a BCS bowl bid and a potential national title game. Knocking helmets with Purdue or Michigan is going to hurt the Huskers' chances of finishing in the top two and earning a shot at the (mythical) title.

Unfortunately, it won't be football that is the ultimate factor in whether or not the rumors of Nebraska's move to the Big 10 are true. Money rules the day, which is great for the athletic department, but bad for the future fortunes of the Husker football program.

# From The Wildcats ride pitching to NSIC title

you've got good pitching and solid defense, you're a hard softball team

The Wayne State softball team used those two ingredients to capture the school's first-ever Northern Sun Conference Softball Tournament title Saturday afternoon with a pair of 2-0 wins over 12th-ranked and NSIC regular-season champion Augustana. The Wildcats earn the NSIC's automatic berth to the NCAA Tournament with a 40-12 record following the win, marking their second straight trip to the NCAA Div. II Tournament.

Goetzinger was brilliant on the mound for the Wildcats, going a perfect 4-0 and not allowing a single run with three shutouts.

"She had a great weekend," coach Krista Unger said. "She gave up zero runs, and I think we may have given up just one error on defense, and you can pitch really well when the defense has your back like that. The girls really took care of business."

Goetzinger was jointed by Amy Sandstrom and Kassie Nurton on the all-tournament team, and Unger said both Sandstrom and Nurton were outstanding for the Wildcats in their run to their first conference tournament title.

"Kassie came up with some huge hits, and it was good to see that because she's usually a slapper and she showed she's got some power behind her," Unger said. "Amy made some great catches for us and did a good job at the plate as well."

The Wildcats opened the scoring in the first inning of the championship game with three hits off Augustana starter Ashley Meyer to take the early lead. Nurton singled and later scored on Jennifer Radley's single to give WSC the early 1-0 lead.

Augustana's lone scoring threat on Wildcat starter Katie Goetzinger came in the second inning when the Vikings recorded back-to-back

on first and second, but Goetzinger then struck out the next two Augustana batters to get out of the inning, and the Vikings were never a threat offensively after that.

Wayne State added another run in the top of the sixth when Radley opened the frame with a walk. Pinch-runner Alesha Finkey advanced to second on Hannah Engelkamp's sacrifice Goetzinger's groundout to second sent Finkey to third, and she later scored on a wild pitch to make the score 2-0.

That would be more than enough for Goetzinger, who pitched her second straight shutout in the same day against the 12th-ranked Vikings. She allowed just three hits and struck out five without issuing a walk.

Wayne State had seven hits in the game. Nurton capped a stellar tournament by going 2-for-4 with a double and a run scored. Sandstrom, Blaire Kuhl, Radley, Goetzinger and Brittany Greenwood each singled to round out Wayne State's seven

Wayne State College junior pitcher Katie Goetzinger tossed a two-hit shutout with 10 strikeouts to lead the Wildcats in a 2-0 win over the top-seeded Vikings in the winner's bracket final, helping her own cause by igniting the Wayne State offense to break a scoreless

The only runs of the game were scored by the Wildcats in the fifth inning. Goetzinger laced a oneout double to right center field. Greenwood singled with two outs to send Goetzinger to third, Sandstrom delivered an RBI single to right to score Goetzinger, then stole second base and on the play, allowing Greenwood to come home on a throwing error.

That's all the support Goetzinger needed, as she out-battled Meyer

Leading the way was junior pitcher Katie Goetzinger, who was selected first-team All-NSIC for the third straight season and was named 2010 NSIC Softball Pitcher of the Year.

Senior outfielder Amy Sandstrom and junior first baseman Jennifer Radley each received firstteam All-NSIC honors, while junior catcher Sam Earleywine and junior second baseman Blaire Kuhl were named second-team All-NSIC.

Goetzinger, a Harlan, Iowa native, posted a 16-3 mark in NSIC play this season with a 1.09 ERA for the Wildcats. She struck out 172 batters in 109 innings pitched against NSIC opponents. Overall, she is 25-8 with a 1.04 ERA and ranks seventh in NCAA Division II with 280 strikeouts in just 201.2 innings pitched. Goetzinger ranks sixth nationally in hits allowed per seven innings (3.92), eighth in wins (25) and ninth in ERA (1.04). She was named the NFCA National Pitcher of the Week on April 21, the NSIC Pitcher of the Week on April 19th.

Sandstrom, a senior centerfielder from Omaha, earned First Team All-Northern Sun Conference honors for the third straight season after hitting .366 in NSIC play with six homers and 22 RBI's. Sandstrom became the all-time leader in several categories at WSC this season, including hits (251),

Overall, Earleywine has a .402 average for Wayne State while leading the team in home runs (8) and runs batted in (34). She led the NSIC in on-base percentage (.571) and was second in walks (35) while ranking fourth in slugging percentage (.697), fifth in average (.402) and fifth in runs scored (39).

Kuhl, a junior from Logan, Iowa, received secondteam All-NSIC honors for the second straight season after recording a .305 average in league play with two homers and 13 RBI's. Overall, Kuhl hit over .300 for the third straight season with a .301 average accounting for four homers and 27 RBI's. She ranked third on the team in hits (44) and runs scored (32).

'We were coming out of our funk then, but Duluth is going to bring some good hitters with them and it will be a good matchup," Unger said. "I think we'll give them a run for their money, and hopefully we can come out on top.'

A win might give the Wildcats a matchup with Concordia St. Paul, a team Wayne State swept in St. Paul, Minn., or Augustana, who swept Wayne State earlier in the year before losing two to the Wildcats in the conference tournament.

Either way, Unger expects a

tough matchup.

"Augie is a good, well-rounded ball team, and they're going to want revenge and they'll be very disciplined; and Concordia is a good team as well, so there won't be an easy game from here on out," Unger

Where Wayne State goes, should they win this regional, will depend on the fortunes of Metro (Colo.) State, who is the top seed in the Central Region and is hosting the other four-team tournament in the region. If Metro State should be upset and Wayne State wins their tournament, they would play host to the super regional on May 21-22, with a College World Series appearance hanging in the

# Pollard wins 400 hurdles to highlight NSIC meet

Both Wayne State men's and women's outdoor track and field teams finished ninth at the Northern Sun Conference Outdoor Track and Field Championships, held over the weekend in Moorhead, Minn.

The Wildcats had one conference champion as junior Paige Pollard won the 400-meter hurdles Saturday in a time of 1:02.18. The Newcastle native also earned All-Conference honors with a secondplace finish in the heptathlon, with a school record point total of 4.558 points. She also finished eighth in the 100-meter hurdles in 19.25

Senior sprinter Christina King placed in two events, taking third in the 400-meter dash (55.67) while finishing seventh in the 200-meter dash in 25.23 seconds.

Other Wayne State women placed include Megan Zavorka taking fifth in the 3,000 meter steeplechase (11.14.15), Savannah Wakeley was fifth in the high jump (5' 2 1/4"), Lachel Milander took sixth in the shot put (43' 1") and Ky'Lee Engelken was eighth in the 1,500-meter run at 4:53.59. The 1,600-meter relay team of King, Melissa McIntosh, Pollard

and Engelken came in seventh at 4:03.45.

The top finisher for the Wayne meter relay team of Molacek, King, State men was sophomore Alex Timperley, who earned All-NSIC honors with a second-place finish in the triple jump at 46 feet, 4 1/4 inches. Teammate Lucas Sirek was right behind in third place at 46 feet, 3 1/4 inches to also earn All-Conference honors.

Senior Nate Preston captured All-NSIC honors with a thirdplace finish in the 3,000 meter steeplechase. His time of 9:14.78 was a provisional national qualifying mark. Rounding out the All-NSIC performers for Wayne State was John Kern, who placed third in the 10,000-meter run in a time of 32:02.97.

Other medal winners included Cody Diehl finishing fourth in the decathlon with a new schoolrecord point total of 6,057 points, Nate Preston was fifth in the 5,000-meter run at 15:15.33, John Kern took sixth in the 3,000-meter steeplechase (9:39.49), Andrew Jansen was seventh in the 400meter dash (50.42) and York Thomas finished eighth in the 5,000-meter run in 15:18.94.

The 400-meter relay team of Michael King, Drew Molacek, Cody Diehl and Alex Timperley was fifth in 42.74 seconds, and the 1,600Aaron Garza and Andrew Jansen took fifth in a time of 3:21.26.

Senior outfielder Joe Wendte, iunior second baseman Nick Bidroski and sophomore pitcher Austen Wisroth each received first-team All-NSIC honors, while Bidroski and senior catcher John Plasha were also named to the 2010 NSIC Gold Glove Team.

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
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
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# Wayne boys win Battle Creek quad





State gaming the federal system

WEAR IT UNTIL WE GET

THOSE FEDERAL FUNDS ...!

LINCOLN-Business is business, especially when it comes to the Nebraska Department of Education trying to get its dipper into a bucket of public money.

The superintendent of Omaha Public Schools was annoyed, and then some, when the state managed to have five high schools in the Omaha area listed as among the "persistently lowest achieving" by federal standards. They include Omaha Central, Omaha North, Omaha South and Omaha Benson.

John Mackiel said the state was gaming the federal system to get the money.

It seems the federal standard classifies the persistently lowest achieving schools as those with graduation rates of 60 percent or less. It further seems that Nebraska's Department of Education pursued and received a waiver from the feds, so that Nebraska could qualify with any schools that have a graduation rate of 75 percent or less.

"I don't believe there's anything more reprehensible than gaming the system to access \$77 million of federal money by accepting it and then labeling schools that two months ago you just celebrated in terms of the educational opportunities going on in those schools," Mackiel said.

He said it with feeling, too.

The view from here: Mackiel is wrong, only insofar as this gambit by the state is certainly not the most reprehensible thing imaginable when it comes to states gaming the federal system for money. However, it isn't hard to see his point. Is it?

It might be especially easy to imagine Mackiel's ire being understood, and maybe endorsed, by Nebraskans. After all, U.S. Sen. Ben Nelson drew enough flak to

down a B-52 when he finagled what most states (if they'd admit it) would regard as a great deal that would have saved Nebraska several tons of money when it came to the state's costs for a change in federal healthcare policy. Other states were so jealous they screamed and caterwauled until they got the same deal; but until then, Nelson's critics said it was wrong of him to negotiate that tremendous savings for Nebraska taxpayers. Such a deal went against

As state Education Commissioner Roger Breed explained it, his department had to do what it did to get the aforementioned dipper into the previously referenced bucket of

their moral grain, they said.

education bucks. Breed said virtually no Nebraska high schools are so bad as to be able to lay claim to any of those federal dollars, based on the 60 percent standard.

Question: Is that bad news or good news? Think on it.

Note: The exceptions among Nebraska schools are those categorized as "Native American" institutions. They would have qualified for the federal money.


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
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












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
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# Mission project

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

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

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

alfalfa fields is spring black stem and leaf spot. This is a very common disease in northeast Nebraska and we usually see a little of it every year, especially when it is cool and moist. This is a fungal disease and the spores overwinter on residue, so chances are if you have it last year you will have at least some of it again.

In most years, black stem is not serious as warmer, drier weather in May will slow or stop the growth of the fungus. And, as usual, there is a difference in how each alfalfa variety will react to infection. Symptoms of spring black stem and leaf spot include numerous

**ORDINANCE NO. 2010-9** 

ORDINANCE AMENDING THE WAYNE MUNICIPAL CODE. CHAPTER ARTICLE VIII. SECTION 74-293 FEES; TO PROVIDE FOR THE REPEAL OF CONFLICTING SECTIONS; AND TO PROVIDE FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Council of the City of Wayne, Nebraska: Section 1. The Planning Commission,

subsequent to a public hearing held April 5, 2010, 2009, recommended amending Section 74-293 Fees subject to the following "Findings of Fact": Staff and Planning Commission recommendation.

Section 2. That Chapter 78, Article VIII, Section 74-293 of the Wayne Municipal Code is hereby amended to read as follows: Section 74-293 Fees.

The amount of land dedicated by a subdivider pursuant to this article shall be five percent of the land area comprising the total land area in the proposed subdivision as reflected in the final subdivision plat. If a subdivider so desires, the subdivider may elect to pay a fee in lieu of land dedication provided, however, the city may reject the subdivider's election and require land donation. Where a subdivider is required to pay a fee in lieu of land dedication, the amount of such fee shall be based upon the fair market value of the amount of land comprising the total land area as indicated in the final subdivision plat. The amount of such fee shall be eight percent of the fair market value of the total land area comprising the proposed subdivision as indicated in the final subdivision plat, except that the park fee for new non-annexed, noncontiguous subdivisions, which are outside of the city limits, in the extraterritorial jurisdiction, and not fully served by city services, shall be one percent. Fair market value shall be determined as of the time of filing the final plat in accordance with the following:

(1) The fair market value, as determined by the council based upon fair market value appraisals considering all of the uses and purposes for which it might reasonably be used; or

(2) If the subdivider objects to the amount of valuation, the subdivider may, at its expense, obtain an appraisal of the land based on the highest and best use of the land by a qualified real estate appraiser approved by the city, which appraisal may be accepted by the council if found reasonable; or

(3) The city and the subdivider may agree as to the fair market value.

Section 3. All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith are repealed.

Section 4. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect after the passage, approval, and publication as provided by law
