City will be part of groundwater protection program

Park playground equipment upgraded; Liquor permit for chicken show is OK'd

Groundwater protection was among the items on the agenda when the Wayne City Council met in regular session on Tuesday.

Brian Reetz, Program Coordinator for the Nebraska Groundwater Foundation program, spoke to the council and gave a Power Point presentation on the goals and services provided by the Groundwater Foundation. He noted that the organization is celebrating 25 years of existence. With a desire to educate people to ensure sustainable groundwater for future use, he talked about what other cities throughout the state have done and explained what ground water is. He encouraged the city of Wayne and other agencies, such as the golf course, to become a part of the program. There is no charge to the city to participate in the program.

Following the presentation, the council voted unanimously to submit an application for Bressler Park for participation as a Groundwater Guardian Green Site.

The council voted to approve a request from the Leadership Wayne Committee for \$20,000 to purchase and upgrade playground equipment for East Park in Wayne.

Three members of the group told the council that they had surveyed school-age children for suggestions for new equipment in the park and said the group would be willing to provide volunteer assistance for the project. Money for the equipment is currently in the city budget.

Street closings for the 2010 Wayne Chicken Show were approved, including the downtown area on Friday, July 9; Main Street and 10th Street for the Chicken Show Parade on Saturday morning, July 10 and the area around Bressler Park for the Chicken Show activities on Saturday, July 10.

Also, in preparation for this year's Chicken Show activities, the council approved an application for a special liquor permit for The White Dog Pub to have a beer garden in the parking lot on South Main Street for the annual Street Dance.

Roger Protzman with JEO Consulting spoke to the council on the "Invitation to Bid" process for the Wastewater treatment facility. He stated that bids would be open on June 15 and preliminary work on the project could begin early in the fall. He also explained the time frame for completion of the project and noted that there is a 360 day construction period.

Council members also approved an item to request proposals for contract operation of the Wayne Transfer Station and approved a change order for the 2009 Water Distribution Improvement Project in the area of the Wayne Fire Hall and Tomar Drive. Public Works Superintendent Garry Poutre told the council that the work is part of the water main looping project for which the city received stimulus funds to

Randolph man injured in accident

A one-vehicle crash in the northwest corner of Wayne County has sent a rural Randolph man to the hospital.

At about 1 a.m. on May 15, a southbound car driven by Nicole Bowers of rural Randolph hit some loose gravel and lost control and rolled two times before coming to rest in the east ditch near the intersection of County Road 558 and 862.

Kody Kuchta was one of the passengers in the Bowers vehicle and was the only

one who sustained injuries. Two other passengers and Bowers escaped uninjured. Bowers reported that she was wearing restraints at the time of the crash but was unsure if anyone else was restrained.

The Life-Net helicopter was called at that time to land at the scene, but was diverted because it was reported that a bird had crashed into its windshield, causing it to return to Norfolk. The Randolph Fire Department Rescue Squad then

transferred Kuchta to Faith Regional Health Services in Norfolk. Kuchta was later transferred to the University Medical Center in Omaha. The extent of his injuries is unknown at this time.

The Wayne County Sheriff's Office is investigating the accident.

Several agenda items dealt with the city's responsibility for building permits for buildings outside city limits, but within the city's two mile jurisdiction.

Ordinance 2010-10 received unanimous approval and will add a definition for "nonfarm buildings" to comply with state statutes and allow farm buildings to be treated differently in regard to needing building permits.

Ordinance 2010 will amend the city code to state that new residential and commercial structures and buildings on acreages of 20 acres or less that are producing less than \$1,000 per year in farm income would still require building permits, but all other buildings would be considered farm build-

complete.

As a Community Development Agency, the council approved a request for a threemonth extension from Lou Benscoter, president of Benscoter Plumbing & Heating to obtain an occupancy permit for a house in the Western Ridge II Subdivision

The council also approved the appointment of Tom Sievers as Fire Chief of the Wayne Volunteer Fire Department.

Nancy Braden, City Finance Director, presented reports on conferences she had recently attended. She shared ideas she brought back from the conferences, including the need to include immigrants in the workforce development plan and several ideas in regard to website development.

The council will next meet in regular session on Tuesday, June 1 at 5:30 p.m. in council chambers.

Izaak Walton League opens rec area Saturday

The Wayne Area Izaak Walton League has completed a major portion of the restoration project at the local recreation area and is looking forward to showing everyone the improvements that have been made.

For those who are not familiar with the Izaak Walton recreational area, or past members wanting to see the improvements, an open gate day will be held Saturday, beginning at 1 p.m. This date coincides with the annual Nebraska Game and Parks free fishing day. All are welcome to visit the area free of charge, fish, and see what it has to offer.

The Izaak Walton recreational area is located 2 miles west and 4 1/2 miles north of Wayne on the east side of the road. For those wanting to join, memberships will be available there that day.

"We encourage our members to use the area for fishing, camping, family outings, picnicking, and walking, Erin Eilers, Wayne Izaak Walton president, said. "Dogs are welcome. Hunting is not permitted. The campground area has grills, covered eating areas, a playground area for children, large fire pit, and a restroom facility. The grounds are mowed regularly and the area is close to Wayne which presents an alternate option for those not wanting to travel far to be in the outdoors.'

Work that has been completed on the

deepening of the North and East sides of the lake, which will improve fishing and reduce moss. In addition, an aeration system is in the process of being set up to help sustain fish during times of low oxygen and minimize moss buildup. Fish have been restocked.

Two years ago, bluegill were stocked, and last year, bass were added. Monitoring fish numbers will continue, with other species being added in the future. In an effort to increase fish numbers a total catch and release of all fish is in effect. Much of the grounds area has been leveled, with some dirt work yet to be completed. A boat ramp has been added to the lake. The entry road has been graveled and concrete around the buildings has been added.

"We would like to thank all who have donated money and their time to help see that this restoration project comes closer to completion," Scott Brummond, a member of the Izaak Walton group, said. "Future projects we are looking to work on, as funds permit, include additional dredging on the south and west sides of the lake, improving the restroom facility, painting of the club house, and tree planting."



Area doctors are recognized for providing care for diabetes

The National Committee for Quality Assurance (NCQA) and the American Diabetes Association (ADA) have announced that Dr. James Lindau and Dr. Mark McCorkindale have received recognition from the Diabetes Physician Recognition Program for providing quality care to their patients with diabetes.

Both Dr. Lindau and Dr. McCorkindale practice at the Wayne Mercy Medical Clinic in Wayne, Nebraska. The recognition of Drs. Lindau and McCorkindale means that all providers at the Wayne Mercy Medical Clinics are now certified in diabetes care.

Drs. Lindau and McCorkindale were formally honored as NCQA/ADA diabetes physicians at a special ceremony Thursday at the Wayne Mercy Medical Clinic.

Designed to improve the quality of care that patients with diabetes receive by recognizing physicians who deliver quality diabetes care, the NCQA/ADA recognition program also seeks to motivate other physicians to document and improve their delivery of diabetes care.

To receive such recognition, which is valid for three years, Drs. Lindau and McCorkindale submitted data that demonstrates performance that meets the program's key diabetes care measures. These measures include eye exams, foot exams, nephropathy assessment, lipid profiles, tobacco status and counseling referral, and blood pressure tests, among others. When people with diabetes receive quality care as outlined by these measures, they are less likely to suffer complications such as heart attacks, stroke, blindness, kidney disease and amputations.

"For a person with diabetes, the right physician can make the difference between living with diabetes as opposed to suffering from diabetes," says Dr. Robert A. Rizza, president of the American Diabetes Association. "Physicians who earn recognition through the Diabetes Physician Recognition Program have an established track record of providing excellent diabetes care. These physicians are on a list of recognized doctors that is the first place to look if you or a loved one has been diagnosed with diabetes."

Mercy Medical Center-Sioux City and its affiliated clinics across northwest Iowa and northeast Nebraska have taken a leadership role in diabetes care. The Wayne Mercy Medical Clinic, part of the Mercy Diabetes Education Program, gives people with diabetes the knowledge, skills and tools they need to successfully manage their diabetes and avoid many of the complications associated with the disease.

Diabetes is a serious disease that affects the body's ability to produce or respond properly to insulin, a hormone that allows blood sugar to enter the cells of the body and be used for energy. An estimated 16 million Americans have diabetes; it is the sixth-leading cause of death by disease in the U.S. and it has no cure.

The money you save on your utility bills can more than make up for the cost of a more expensive but more efficient Energy Star model.

WSC goes 3-0 to win regional by Michael Carnes

After beating Augustana twice in the Northern Sun Conference softball tournament, the thought of the regular-season conference champs returning the favor in regionals was in the back of Wayne State coach Krista Unger's mind Sunday morning.

Knowing that her team was riding a 15-game winning streak and had played well in their first two games took some of the edge off her worry, and the Wildcats erased any underlying fears she might have had by beating the Vikings when it counted most – with a trip to super regionals on the line.

Katie Goetzinger was once again brilliant on the mound, notching her school-record 32nd win of the year to lead Wayne State to a 2-1 win over Augustana in the finals of the Central Regional's east bracket Sunday afternoon at the Pete Chapman Softball Complex. The win secured the school's first-ever trip to super regionals, where they will travel to Denver this weekend to face fourth-ranked Metro State in a best-of-three series.

The Wildcats had a game in hand Sunday as the only undefeated team left in the four-team, doubleelimination tournament. Still, the thought of having to play their conference rivals twice in one day was of some concern to the Wildcats' coach.

"It was kind of in the back of my mind, but we've been playing good ball right now and the girls had a lot of confidence, and I just didn't think anybody could beat us twice in one day," she said. "Augustana has some very good hitters and are scary with every swing of the bat."

Wayne State scored first in the third when Brittany Greenwood launched a solo homer over the fence in right center to give the Wildcats a 1-0 lead. The lead increased to 2-0 later in the third when Amy Sandstrom scored on a

Blaire Kuhl groundout to the right side of the infield.

slam homer to help Wayne State beat Concordia St. Paul 7-3.

Goetzinger shut down Augustana for six innings, but the Vikings did put a little scare in the Wayne State faithful in the seventh.

Brittany Coufal led off the seventh with a single, but was erased on a line drive double play by Kuhl. That defensive gem proved to be important, as the next batter, Chelsea Durland, launched a towering homer to left to cut Wayne State's lead in half.

"They were starting to get on Katie toward the end of the game, and if that (home run) had happened earlier it would have put more pressure on us, but we were still confident we were going to get out of it," Unger said.

That's exactly what the Wildcats

did, as Goetzinger struck out Britt Stewart to end the game, sending the Wildcats to the super regional round. Goetzinger struck out five and allowed four hits to pick up her 32nd win, and Wayne State had nine hits, led by Greenwood's 2-for-3 performance. They were so distraught, in fact, that they sat out a mandatory pretournament meeting in protest. Even their sports information department got in on the act, with this little side note in their media packet:

"Augie will be out for revenge after losing to Wayne State in the NSIC Softball Tournament on their home field. The Vikings were unable to score against the Wildcats last Sunday and hope to meet up with them again to win when it really counts.

Augustana's frustration with the NCAA softball committee carried over onto the field. They stubbed their toes in the opening round against Concordia-St. Paul, needed a three-run homer to beat the Golden Bears in the final elimination game, then couldn't overcome a two-run deficit in the game that "really counts.'

I guess sour grapes don't go down easy when you're choking on them. – It's been an outstanding year for Wayne State's women's sports teams, most notably the softball (NSIC tourney title, super regionals, possible College World Series), basketball (NSIC tourney title, NCAA regional, perfect record at home) and volleyball (highest ranking ever, second-team All-American, fifth straight NCAA tourney appearance) squads.

But if you missed any of these teams' efforts this year, you'll get to see most of those athletes back in action next year. And that could be a major concern for those teams that faced Wayne State this past season.

Softball should have 15 of its current 16 players on the roster next year, basketball will have 11 of 12 and volleyball has at least 10 back next year. Each team loses just one senior off the 2009-10 roster, which means all three teams will be loaded for next season.

With the recruits coming in, if these teams avoid injuries and stay hungry (and if I've learned anything this past year, it's that none of these teams' coaches handle complacency very well), we could see each of those teams making deep postseason runs in 2010-11.

Dennis Ekberg was presented with a Department of Commerce service certificate commemorating 35 years of volunteer service to the National Weather Service (NWS) as the Cooperative Weather Observer at his farm four miles north of Wavne.

Terry Landsvork, Observation Program Leader from the NWS office in Valley, Nebraska made the presentation. Dennis maintains a NWS solar powered precipitation gage that measures precipitation automatically ever 15 minutes. The gage produces a monthly log of precipitation occurrences which Dennis mails to the NWS office in Valley. The log is quality controlled at the Valley office before being forwarded to the National Climatic Data Center in Asheville, North Carolina where it is then archived.

The National Weather Service (NWS) Cooperative Observer Program (COOP) is the Nation's weather and climate observing network of, by and for the people. More than 11,000 volunteers take observations on farms, in urban and suburban areas, National Parks, seashores, and mountaintops. The data are truly representative of where people live, work and play.

The COOP was formally created in 1890 under the Organic Act. Its mission is two-fold:

To provide observational meteorological data, usually consisting of daily maximum and minimum temperatures, snowfall, and 24hour precipitation totals, required to define the climate of the United States and to help measure longterm climate changes

To provide observational meteorological data in near real-time to support forecast, warning and other public service programs of the NWS.

Observers frequently record temperature and precipitation daily and send those reports monthly to the National Climatic Data Center (NCDC) or an NWS office. Many cooperative observers provide additional hydrological or meteorological data, such as evaporation. Data is transmitted via telephone, computer or mail. Equipment used at NWS cooperative stations is owned by the NWS.

The first network of cooperative stations was set up as a result of



LINCOLN-John Robert Murphy was one of the ones.

He served two terms in the Legislature, from 1972-1980 but declined to seek a third because he was an early supporter of term limits.

Murphy, known as "Bob" all his life, was a businessman and a banker who fought constantly during his legislative career for business and financial institutions. He was good at it, too.

He worked hard and fought hard but brought a celebrated sense of humor to his work.

To say he was conservative would be akin to saying Bo Pelini believes

Murphy also believed that state law should serve to enhance the government's doings.



Legislative Update: Census is important

As most Americans already know from advertising and media coverage, April 1 marked the date of the 2010 Census, required by the United States Constitution to be taken every 10 years.

Results from the census, including age, population, and demographic information generated from census questionnaires, help determine the allocation of federal and state funding for critical community services, including funds for healthcare, education, and transportation. Each year, the federal government allocates more than \$300 billion to states and communities based in part on census data.

Last year, the Legislature unanimously passed LR125, a resolution supporting the efforts of the U.S. Census Bureau in achieving a complete and accurate count, and encouraging all Nebraskans to fill out the ten-question census questionnaire when it arrived in March.

While preliminary figures show est census return rates in the naires being mailed back, many



Nebraskans who chose not to fill out their census forms will be paid visit by census employees in the coming months. Those who have yet to complete their census questionnaire can feel confident in knowing that census employees are legally prohibited from sharing an individual's responses with anyone, including other federal agencies and law enforcement.

Aside from funding for our local communities, the results of the

census determine how many seats boundaries is one of many difficult each state will have in Congress for the next 10 years. While Nebraska is not expected to lose one of our three congressional districts, the boundaries for these districts and all 49 legislative districts will need to be redrawn to reflect statewide changes in population.



Farmers and ranchers wanting to get in the Conservation Stewardship Program (CSP) this year have until June 11, 2010 to file their basic application.

The Conservation Stewardship Program is a voluntary stewardship incentives program, administered by USDA's Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS), designed to reward farmers, ranchers, and forestry producers to maintain existing conservation, as well as for the adoption of additional conservation measures that provide multiple environmental benefits that run beyond the farm or ranch. This program pays producers for clean water, better soil management, improved habitat, energy efficiency, and other natural resource benefits.

Traci Bruckner, with the Center for Rural Affairs, encouraged farmers, ranchers and others to call the Center for Rural Affairs' Farm Bill Helpline to learn more about the program and application process. "There are some initial steps farmers and ranchers interested in applying for the program need to do, and there have been some positive changes made to the program since the 2009 ranking. Through our Helpline we can assist farmers and ranchers with understanding how the program works and what they need to do to qualify and rank well." According to Bruckner, after filing the simple application form, farmers and ranchers will also need to schedule an appointment to complete the CSP Conservation Management Tool (CMT), a set of questions related to their conservation baseline and scheduled improvements. After all applicants who file the short application form by June 11 have completed the CMT, USDA's Natural Resource Conservation Service (NRCS) will rank the proposals to determine the best offers for enrollment dur-




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




Ash tree defoliation common this spring

Area State Forester Steve Rasmussen and I have received a flood of calls this week regarding leaves falling off ash trees. While we haven't had the time to look at some of these trees at the time of writing this article, it is a strong possibility that the leaf drop is being cause by a disease called anthracnose.

Many of the callers are wondering if the problems are being caused by emerald ash borer, which has become a serious problem in

eastern Minnesota and Iowa and is steadily moving west. A lot of publicity has gone into ash borer awareness, since it may be spread by firewood from infested areas. However, we do not know of any ash borer problems yet in Nebraska.

Getting back to anthracnose; this is a common disease that can affect many trees but in our area ash and walnut trees tend to be affected more severely. This is a fungal disease spread by spores in cool, moist weather. Young developing leaves and shoots are most susceptible. New infections and lesion growth slows down when the weather turns warmer and drier.

The disease starts as brownish water-soaked spots on young tissue and these spots may rapidly coalesce. The leaves will curl and it may look similar to frost injury. The end result is brown to tan blotches on distorted leaves. Then the diseased leaves will drop to the ground. Green ash is actually relatively resistant, but other ash varieties may lose many if not all

of their leaves.

I have seen this disease severe in one instance about 20 years ago. This particular tree literally was stripped bare. The tree did set on a new set of leaves, however.


There is nothing that can be done at this time. The disease has already occurred and the damage is likely done. The coming warmer weather should halt the spread of the disease, although some varieties will suffer extreme leaf loss. The good news is that mature trees should have enough reserves left to re-leaf in a few weeks. It is early enough in the year that the trees should survive this attack. In the meantime it will be hard to look at, but when the new buds arrive you can begin to relax.

UNL Extension Tractor/Farm Safety Courses offered

University of Nebraska-Lincoln Extension Tractor/Farm Safety Courses will be offered at seven locations across the state in May and June.

Federal law prohibits youth under 16 years of age from working on a farm other than their parents'. Course completion grants an exemption to the law allowing 14- and 15-year-olds to drive a tractor and to do field work with mechanized equipment. The course also is available for just the safety training if room permits.

To standardize the training, courses were moved to seven locations across the state this year instead of many local classes.

The most common cause of death in agriculture accidents in Nebraska is overturn from tractors and all-terrain-vehicles (ATV), said Bill Booker, UNL Extension educator in Box Butte County. Tractor and ATV overturn prevention are featured in the class work.

"There is an obligation to teach safety, and these courses allow us to do that," Booker said. "These classes will teach respect for the job and the tools involved."

Classes consist of two, eight-hour days plus two, four-hour homework assignments. Classes are from 8 a.m.-5 p.m. each day. An optional third day of training is available for ATV safety. Dates and locations include:


