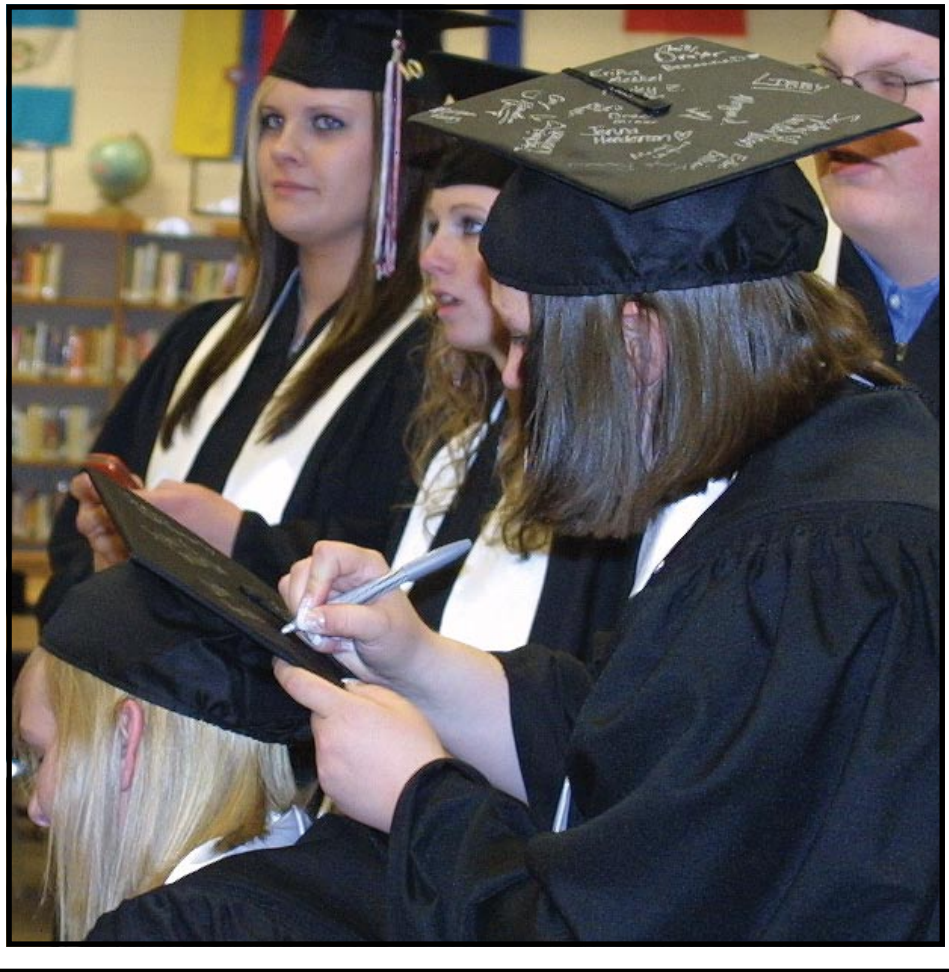

## City will be part of groundwater protection program

*Park playground equipment upgraded; Liquor permit for chicken show is OK'd*

Groundwater protection was among the items on the agenda when the Wayne City Council met in regular session on Tuesday.

Brian Reetz, Program Coordinator for the Nebraska Groundwater Foundation program, spoke to the council and gave a Power Point presentation on the goals and services provided by the Groundwater Foundation. He noted that the organization is celebrating 25 years of existence. With a desire to educate people to ensure sustainable groundwater for future use, he talked about what other cities throughout the state have done and explained what ground water is. He encouraged the city of Wayne and other agencies, such as the golf course, to become a part of the program. There is no charge to the city to participate in the program.

Following the presentation, the council voted unanimously to submit an application for Bressler Park for participation as a Groundwater Guardian Green Site.

The council voted to approve a request from the Leadership Wayne Committee for \$20,000 to purchase and upgrade playground equipment for East Park in Wayne.

Three members of the group told the council that they had surveyed school-age children for suggestions for new equipment in the park and said the group would be willing to provide volunteer assistance for the project. Money for the equipment is currently in the city budget.

Several agenda items dealt with the city's responsibility for building permits for buildings outside city limits, but within the city's two mile jurisdiction.

Ordinance 2010-10 received unanimous approval and will add a definition for "non-farm buildings" to comply with state statutes and allow farm buildings to be treated differently in regard to needing building permits.

Ordinance 2010 will amend the city code to state that new residential and commercial structures and buildings on acreages of 20 acres or less that are producing less than \$1,000 per year in farm income would still require building permits, but all other buildings would be considered farm build-

ings and require only a "Use Permit" for zoning enforcement.

Street closings for the 2010 Wayne Chicken Show were approved, including the downtown area on Friday, July 9; Main Street and 10th Street for the Chicken Show Parade on Saturday morning, July 10 and the area around Bressler Park for the Chicken Show activities on Saturday, July 10.

Also, in preparation for this year's Chicken Show activities, the council approved an application for a special liquor permit for The White Dog Pub to have a beer garden in the parking lot on South Main Street for the annual Street Dance.

Roger Protzman with JEO Consulting spoke to the council on the "Invitation to Bid" process for the Wastewater treatment facility. He stated that bids would be open on June 15 and preliminary work on the project could begin early in the fall. He also explained the time frame for completion of the project and noted that there is a 360-day construction period.

Council members also approved an item to request proposals for contract operation of the Wayne Transfer Station and approved a change order for the 2009 Water Distribution Improvement Project in the area of the Wayne Fire Hall and Tomar Drive. Public Works Superintendent Garry Poutre told the council that the work is part of the water main looping project for which the city received stimulus funds to complete.

As a Community Development Agency, the council approved a request for a three-month extension from Lou Benschoter, president of Benschoter Plumbing & Heating to obtain an occupancy permit for a house in the Western Ridge II Subdivision

The council also approved the appointment of Tom Sievers as Fire Chief of the Wayne Volunteer Fire Department.

Nancy Braden, City Finance Director, presented reports on conferences she had recently attended. She shared ideas she brought back from the conferences, including the need to include immigrants in the workforce development plan and several ideas in regard to website development.

The council will next meet in regular session on Tuesday, June 1 at 5:30 p.m. in council chambers.

## Randolph man injured in accident

A one-vehicle crash in the northwest corner of Wayne County has sent a rural Randolph man to the hospital.

At about 1 a.m. on May 15, a south-bound car driven by Nicole Bowers of rural Randolph hit some loose gravel and lost control and rolled two times before coming to rest in the east ditch near the intersection of County Road 558 and 862.

Kody Kuchta was one of the passengers in the Bowers vehicle and was the only

one who sustained injuries. Two other passengers and Bowers escaped uninjured. Bowers reported that she was wearing restraints at the time of the crash but was unsure if anyone else was restrained.

The Life-Net helicopter was called at that time to land at the scene, but was diverted because it was reported that a bird had crashed into its windshield, causing it to return to Norfolk. The Randolph Fire Department Rescue Squad then

transferred Kuchta to Faith Regional Health Services in Norfolk. Kuchta was later transferred to the University Medical Center in Omaha. The extent of his injuries is unknown at this time.

The Wayne County Sheriff's Office is investigating the accident.

## Izaak Walton League opens rec area Saturday

The Wayne Area Izaak Walton League has completed a major portion of the restoration project at the local recreation area and is looking forward to showing everyone the improvements that have been made.

For those who are not familiar with the Izaak Walton recreational area, or past members wanting to see the improvements, an open gate day will be held Saturday, beginning at 1 p.m. This date coincides with the annual Nebraska Game and Parks free fishing day. All are welcome to visit the area free of charge, fish, and see what it has to offer.

The Izaak Walton recreational area is located 2 miles west and 4 1/2 miles north of Wayne on the east side of the road. For those wanting to join, memberships will be available there that day.

"We encourage our members to use the area for fishing, camping, family outings, picnicking, and walking, Erin Eilers, Wayne Izaak Walton president, said. "Dogs are welcome. Hunting is not permitted. The campground area has grills, covered eating areas, a playground area for children, large fire pit, and a restroom facility. The grounds are mowed regularly and the area is close to Wayne which presents an alternate option for those not wanting to travel far to be in the outdoors."

Work that has been completed on the restoration project, with dredging and

deepening of the North and East sides of the lake, which will improve fishing and reduce moss. In addition, an aeration system is in the process of being set up to help sustain fish during times of low oxygen and minimize moss buildup. Fish have been restocked.

Two years ago, bluegill were stocked, and last year, bass were added. Monitoring fish numbers will continue, with other species being added in the future. In an effort to increase fish numbers a total catch and release of all fish is in effect. Much of the grounds area has been leveled, with some dirt work yet to be completed. A boat ramp has been added to the lake. The entry road has been graveled and concrete around the buildings has been added.

"We would like to thank all who have donated money and their time to help see that this restoration project comes closer to completion," Scott Brummond, a member of the Izaak Walton group, said. "Future projects we are looking to work on, as funds permit, include additional dredging on the south and west sides of the lake, improving the restroom facility, painting of the club house, and tree planting."

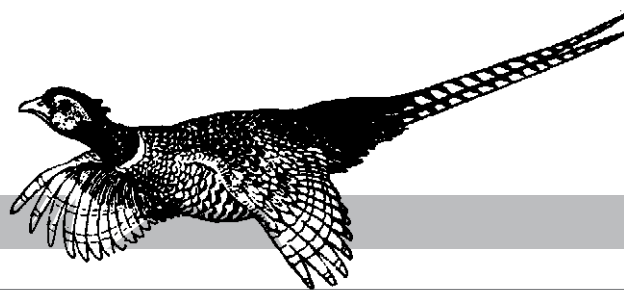
## Special runner

There she taught seventh and eighth grade remedial Math and Language Arts in the Wayne School System as well as at St. Mary's Catholic School. She became involved in Project Success and was the co-author of a teacher's manual designed for use in helping to teach teens and adults with learning disabilities. While teaching in Wayne, she attained her Master's Degree. Lavah was very active at First Baptist Church of Fremont, where she taught Sunday school for 12 years. She also served on the Board of the Omahaland Association of Baptist Churches. When she moved to Wayne, she became active in the Wayne Baptist Church. She was a member of the American Baptist Women for over 25 years and was also a member of the American Legion Auxiliary in Wayne. Lavah helped plan programs and helped lead the support group for the visually impaired of Norfolk. She always enjoyed playing cards, board games, traveling, and visiting with her friends and family.

## Area doctors are recognized for providing care for diabetes

The National Committee for Quality Assurance (NCQA) and the American Diabetes Association (ADA) have announced that Dr. James Lindau and Dr. Mark McCorkindale have received recognition from the Diabetes Physician Recognition Program for providing quality care to their patients with diabetes.

Both Dr. Lindau and Dr. McCorkindale practice at the Wayne Mercy Medical Clinic in Wayne, Nebraska. The recognition of Drs. Lindau and McCorkindale means that all providers at the Wayne Mercy Medical Clinics are now certified in diabetes care.

Drs. Lindau and McCorkindale were formally honored as NCQA/ADA diabetes physicians at a special ceremony Thursday at the Wayne Mercy Medical Clinic.

Designed to improve the quality of care that patients with diabetes receive by recognizing physicians who deliver quality diabetes care, the NCQA/ADA recognition program also seeks to motivate other physicians to document and improve their delivery of diabetes care.

To receive such recognition, which is valid for three years, Drs. Lindau and McCorkindale submitted data that demonstrates performance that meets the program's key diabetes care measures. These measures include eye exams, foot exams, nephropathy assessment, lipid profiles, tobacco status and counseling referral, and blood pressure tests, among others. When people with diabetes receive quality care as outlined by these measures, they are less likely to suffer

complications such as heart attacks, stroke, blindness, kidney disease and amputations.

"For a person with diabetes, the right physician can make the difference between living with diabetes as opposed to suffering from diabetes," says Dr. Robert A. Rizza, president of the American Diabetes Association. "Physicians who earn recognition through the Diabetes Physician Recognition Program have an established track record of providing excellent diabetes care. These physicians are on a list of recognized doctors that is the first place to look if you or a loved one has been diagnosed with diabetes."

Mercy Medical Center—Sioux City and its affiliated clinics across northwest Iowa and northeast Nebraska have taken a leadership role in diabetes care. The Wayne Mercy Medical Clinic, part of the Mercy Diabetes Education Program, gives people with diabetes the knowledge, skills and tools they need to successfully manage their diabetes and avoid many of the complications associated with the disease.

Diabetes is a serious disease that affects the body's ability to produce or respond properly to insulin, a hormone that allows blood sugar to enter the cells of the body and be used for energy. An estimated 16 million Americans have diabetes; it is the sixth-leading cause of death by disease in the U.S. and it has no cure.

## Energy-efficient appliances will carry Energy Star logo

The U.S. government has a program that can help you make an energy-wise decision when purchasing electric appliances for the home. Always look for the Energy Star logo.

When buying an appliance, remember that it has two price tags: one that you pay at the store and another that you pay for the energy and water the appliance uses once you get it home. Energy Star-qualified appliances incorporate advanced technologies that use 10-50 percent less energy and water than standard models. The money you save on your utility bills can more than make up for the cost of a more expensive but more efficient Energy Star model.

Simple actions can make a big difference. If just one in 10 homes used Energy Star qualified appliances, the change would be like planting 1.7 million new acres of trees.

**FOCUS: Refrigerators**

In most households, the refrigerator is the single biggest energy consuming kitchen appliance. Looking for the Energy Star could make a huge difference when considering the purchase of a new refrigerator. For example, replacing a refrigerator bought in 1990 with a new Energy Star qualified model would save enough energy to light the average household for nearly four months.

Other refrigerator tips: You may also be interested to know that you can reduce the amount of energy your refrigerator or freezer uses, whether with a standard or an Energy Star qualified model:

- Position your refrigerator away from a heat source such as an oven, a dishwasher, or direct sunlight from a window.

- Cleaning the coils (on the back or underneath) will help transfer the heat and make the unit run less.

- Make sure the door seals are airtight.

- Keep your refrigerator between 35 and 38 degrees Fahrenheit and your freezer at 0 degrees Fahrenheit.

- Minimize the amount of time the refrigerator door is open.

- Recycle older or second refrigerators - or if you have a second older inefficient refrigerator for refreshments, consider unplugging it! Ask your local public power utility for more info on a refrigerator recycling program that is currently available.

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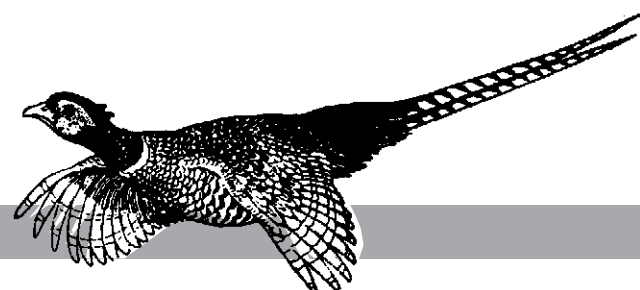

It's State Track week, which means yours truly is about to start this summer vacation (and, yes, a weekend kicking back with a hot dog, soda and a summer's worth of watching baseball or softball is a vacation, compared to dealing with half of the state's population in one place for 48 hours).

Before we fall into full relaxation mode, though, a few thoughts and observations crossed my mind:

— First off, congrats to the Wayne State softball team for making it to super regionals, and best of luck against the fourth-ranked Metro State Roadrunners this weekend in Colorado.

The Wildcats are on fire heading into this best-of-three matchup, and if the Roadrunners bats (more than 100 homers in 53 games) can't figure out the fireballing Katie Goetzing (school-record 32 wins), Wayne State will be heading to the Div. II Women's College World Series next week in Missouri.

I've got the laptop and golf clubs packed, ladies.

— An interesting side note to last week's regional tournament.

It seems the good folks at Augustana University were already making plans to host the regional tournament, figuring their better record and regular season conference title were good enough items on their resume.

The NCAA softball committee saw different, though, giving the tournament to Wayne State, who beat Augie twice in the conference tournament. And the folks from up north were, shall we say, unhappy (I have to use that word, because the proper adjective can not be used in a family newspaper) with the NCAA snubbing.

They were so distraught, in fact, that they sat out a mandatory pre-tournament meeting in protest. Even their sports information department got in on the act, with this little side note in their media packet:

"Augie will be out for revenge after losing to Wayne State in the NSIC Softball Tournament on their home field. The Vikings were unable to score against the Wildcats last Sunday and hope to meet up with them again to win when it really counts."

Augustana's frustration with the NCAA softball committee carried over onto the field. They stubbed their toes in the opening round against Concordia-St. Paul, needed a three-run homer to beat the Golden Bears in the final elimination game, then couldn't overcome a two-run deficit in the game that "really counts."

I guess sour grapes don't go down easy when you're choking on them.

— It's been an outstanding year for Wayne State's women's sports teams, most notably the softball (NSIC tourney title, super regionals, possible College World Series), basketball (NSIC tourney title, NCAA regional, perfect record at home) and volleyball (highest ranking ever, second-team All-American, fifth straight NCAA tourney appearance) squads.

But if you missed any of these teams' efforts this year, you'll get to see most of those athletes back in action next year. And that could be a major concern for those teams that faced Wayne State this past season.

Softball should have 15 of its current 16 players on the roster next year, basketball will have 11 of 12 and volleyball has at least 10 back next year. Each team loses just one senior off the 2009-10 roster, which means all three teams will be loaded for next season.

With the recruits coming in, if these teams avoid injuries and stay hungry (and if I've learned anything this past year, it's that none of these teams' coaches handle complacency very well), we could see each of those teams making deep postseason runs in 2010-11.

— This is the last weekend of the high school sports year, which

# Wildcats heading to super regionals

WSC goes 3-0 to win regional

After beating Augustana twice in the Northern Sun Conference softball tournament, the thought of the regular-season conference champs returning the favor in regionals was in the back of Wayne State coach Krista Unger's mind Sunday morning.

Knowing that her team was riding a 15-game winning streak and had played well in their first two games took some of the edge off her worry, and the Wildcats erased any underlying fears she might have had by beating the Vikings when it counted most — with a trip to super regionals on the line.

Katie Goetzing was once again brilliant on the mound, notching her school-record 32nd win of the year to lead Wayne State to a 2-1 win over Augustana in the finals of the Central Regional's east bracket Sunday afternoon at the Pete Chapman Softball Complex. The win secured the school's first-ever trip to super regionals, where they will travel to Denver this weekend to face fourth-ranked Metro State in a best-of-three series.

The Wildcats had a game in hand Sunday as the only undefeated team left in the four-team, double-elimination tournament. Still, the thought of having to play their conference rivals twice in one day was of some concern to the Wildcats' coach.

"It was kind of in the back of my mind, but we've been playing good ball right now and the girls had a lot of confidence, and I just didn't

think anybody could beat us twice in one day," she said. "Augustana has some very good hitters and are scary with every swing of the bat."

Wayne State scored first in the third when Brittany Greenwood launched a solo homer over the fence in right center to give the Wildcats a 1-0 lead. The lead increased to 2-0 later in the third when Amy Sandstrom scored on a

Blaire Kuhl groundout to the right side of the infield.

Goetzing shut down Augustana for six innings, but the Vikings did put a little scare in the Wayne State faithful in the seventh.

Brittany Coufal led off the seventh with a single, but was erased on a line drive double play by Kuhl. That defensive gem proved to be important, as the next

batter, Chelsea Durland, launched a towering homer to left to cut Wayne State's lead in half.

"They were starting to get on Katie toward the end of the game, and if that (home run) had happened earlier it would have put more pressure on us, but we were still confident we were going to get out of it," Unger said.

That's exactly what the Wildcats

did, as Goetzing struck out Britt Stewart to end the game, sending the Wildcats to the super regional round. Goetzing struck out five and allowed four hits to pick up her 32nd win, and Wayne State had nine hits, led by Greenwood's 2-for-3 performance. Sandstrom, Kuhl and Kassie Nurton also had two.

hits apiece.

The Wildcats opened the regional tournament Friday with a dandy extra-inning battle, as Goetzinger won a pitcher's duel with a 1-0, eight-inning win over Minnesota Duluth.

Goetzinger and the Bulldogs' Kristin Danielson kept the opposing bats silent for most of the game. Wayne State had just one hit through the first seven innings, and needed an infield single by Jennifer Radley with the bases loaded and

coach said to just get it out of the infield and I was thankful I got it through," Radley said.

Wayne State's bats woke up in Saturday's winner's bracket final, as the Wildcats hit four home runs, including a grand slam by Radley, to defeat Concordia-St. Paul 7-3.

Goetzinger led off the second with a solo home run, and Wayne State got back-to-back homers from Kuhl and Earleywine in the third to make it 3-0. The Golden Bears cut the Wildcat lead to 3-1, but Radley took a 3-1 pitch the opposite way, hitting a two-out grand slam in the fourth to give the Wildcats a 7-1 lead.

Radley said she wasn't trying to hit the ball out of the park when she went the other way for the grand slam.

"What was going through my head was to just get it out of the infield," she said. "Base hits are what we need, and I wasn't expecting it to get out of the park. Thank God, it did."

Goetzinger's five-game streak of shutouts ended in Saturday's game,

as she allowed three runs in five innings before Amber Baird came on to throw two innings of scoreless relief.

The Wildcats, 43-12, will face 49-4 Metro State of Colorado in the super regionals, with the winner advancing to next week's Women's College World Series.

It will be an interesting matchup, with Goetzinger's pitching going up against a Roadrunner team that has hit an NCAA Div. II-record 103 home runs so far this season.

"They do swing the bat hard and have 103 homers, so we've got to be mentally prepared to go out there and produce at the plate," Unger said. "We can't expect Katie to pitch a shutout every single game, so we need to try and keep the ball in the park as much as we can, and if one gets out we have to answer back."

"They have some very strong hitters, and I think all or most of their starters are batting over .300," she added. "Their offense is probably a little better than ours, and our defense is a little better, so hopefully it will be a good game."

Rose had a huge day for the Trojans, adding a qualifying effort in the 300-meter hurdles for a second-place finish, and joining Clay, Dusty Sherer and Hugo Ortiz on the winning 1,600-meter relay team.

"Things went really well for us," coach Mike Hassler said of the Trojans' day. "Tyler's got an excellent shot in the mile and two mile, and T.J. making it in three events was huge. Going into the season, I didn't think he'd qualify for one event, let alone three, so he was a tremendous surprise for us."

The Lady Bears, winners of the last two Class C state titles, didn't have enough depth for a Crofton team that is looking to get back on top of the Class C mountain. The Lady Warriors won four straight Class C titles before Laurel-Concord ended its run with back-to-back crowns, and the two teams could be headed for another battle this week in Omaha.

Laurel-Concord will be led by senior Bethany DeLong, who cruised to wins in the 100 and 200, easily won the long jump and ran a leg on the winning 400-meter relay; and junior Katie Jacobsen, who dominated the 800 and 1,600 and ran the anchor legs of the winning 400- and 1,600-meter relays.

"I thought we performed really well," coach Nate Sims said. "We got 10 events down to state, so it was a good day for us, and we had some great times in our two relays."

In addition to DeLong's and Jacobsen's individual wins, Jade Cunningham took the gold in the shot put and Kayla Wiese won the pole vault. DeLong, Jacobsen, Ashley Lunz and Erika Hochstein took top honors in the 400-meter relay, while Lunz, Hochstein, Jacobsen and Mandy Nelson were winners in the 1,600-meter relay.

The Trojan girls finished fourth and got state qualifying efforts from Keri Lunz (400), Shelby Lierman (3,200) and the 3,200-meter relay of Lunz, Lierman, Katie Weinrich and Abby Schultz; while the Laurel-Concord boys rode the throwing of Ezra Schantz and the legs of Johnny Saunders to a fifth-place finish.

Lunz earned a trip to state with a runner-up finish in the 400-meter dash, but just missed out on qualifying in the other two sprint events.

The 3,200-meter relay team for Wakefield took second in the meet, but their time was one of the fastest wild card times in the state, giving the Trojan foursome a chance to show their talents at state.

Schantz has the second-longest

throw in the shot in Class C and is the clear leader in the discus going into this weekend's state competition, and coach Terry Bear said he was happy with the senior's progress this spring.

"Ezra's done an outstanding job this year," he said. "We pulled him out of the high jump to narrow it down to what he's going to do in college, and he's done an outstanding job and should go down and have a great state meet."

Saunders won the long jump on his second jump in the preliminaries. He didn't jump in the finals, as his preliminary jump was easily the best effort of the day. He qualified in the 100-meter dash as a wild card, but missed out on a qualifying effort in the 200-meter dash.

Winside picked up two qualifiers for this week's state meet, as senior Nathan Janke put together a great throw in the discus to take runner-up honors while Zach Brokaw won the triple jump.

Janke had been struggling some in the discus this spring, but coach Mark Tonniges said he had a great showing at districts to earn a trip to state.

"That's the neat thing about competition, in that he went out and performed well and relaxed, and that put pressure on some of the other throwers," Tonniges said. "He really went out and tried to do his best and got a lot of good throws out there."

"Seeing Carly setting new records in the shot and discus was great," coach Dale Hochstein said of the senior's efforts. "She really did a great job of competing with herself and against herself, and she had a great day."

Marissa Fallesen and Megan Stalling both qualified in two events for the Blue Devils. Fallesen will go in two individual events after taking third in the long jump and fourth in the 100-meter dash, while Stalling qualified with a fourth-place finish in the 1,600-meter run and will join Jordan Alexander, Sydney Burke and Emily Leeper on the 3,200-meter relay team, which took runner-up honors Thursday.

Wayne will be represented in all the distance events on the track. The 3,200-meter relay team of Marcus Baier, Luke Trenhaile, Cory Foote and Zach Thomsen qualified with a solid second-place effort. Thomsen, Baier and Foote will also

run in individual events. Thomsen was runner-up in the 400-meter dash, Baier took third in the 800-meter run and Foote was fourth in the 1,600-meter run, all qualifying for state.

"We got a lot of kids in different events, and I hope we can go down there and relax and get some personal bests," Hochstein said.

Hochstein said his team will have some good senior leadership at state, with Baier, Fehringer, Alexander, Collins and Foote all having made previous appearances at state.

"They've led us all year, and some of those kids have been there before, so it's going to be a good mix and I hope we can perform well and get some great weather," he said. "I think our 3,200 relay has the potential to score for us, and Carly is sitting right up there in both of her events. Hopefully, those kids can come through for us."

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## May is Stroke Awareness Month - Are you at risk?

Stroke is the fourth leading cause of death in Nebraska. In 2008, stroke resulted in 825 Nebraska deaths and 3,451 hospitalizations.

Risk factors for stroke include high blood pressure, high cholesterol, diabetes, tobacco and excessive alcohol use, physical inactivity and being overweight. The good news is that lifestyle changes can reduce the risk of stroke.

The most important risk factor for stroke is high blood pressure. One in four Nebraskans have been diagnosed with high blood pressure, and they are over six times as likely to report having a stroke. African Americans and Native Americans are significantly more likely to have high blood pressure. If lifestyle changes are not enough, your health care provider may prescribe medica-

tion to help reduce your blood pressure to a safe level.

Learn the warning signs of stroke, and call 9-1-1 immediately if you notice any of them. Immediate treatment can save someone's life and prevent or reduce disability. Warning signs include:

- sudden numbness or weakness of face, arm or leg, especially on one side of the body
- confusion, trouble speaking or understanding
- sudden trouble seeing in one or both eyes
- trouble walking, dizziness and loss of coordination
- sudden severe headache

There are time-sensitive treatments that can help undo the effects of stroke, but you have to seek immediate treatment at a hospital at the first signs of one.

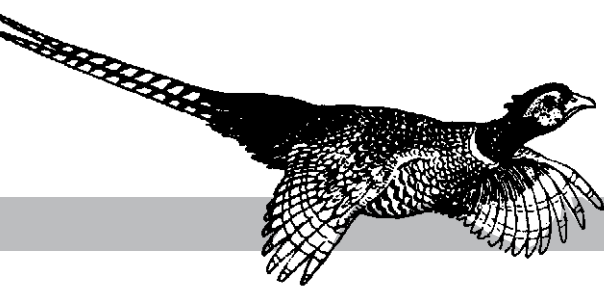

# Remembering John Robert Murphy

LINCOLN — John Robert Murphy was one of the ones.

He served two terms in the Legislature, from 1972-1980 but declined to seek a third because he was an early supporter of term limits.

Murphy, known as "Bob" all his life, was a businessman and a banker who fought constantly during his legislative career for business and financial institutions. He was good at it, too.

He worked hard and fought hard but brought a celebrated sense of humor to his work.

To say he was conservative would be akin to saying Bo Pelini believes in defense.

Murphy also believed that state law should serve to enhance the people's right to know about the government's doings.

He pushed for the state's first open meetings law and believed access to public records was more a right than a privilege. Among his accomplishments was the law which opened police blotters to reporters.

A bit more about his storied sense of humor.

Once upon a time he was opposing a proposal that had to do with spending money and, as I recall, also had to do with workers' compensation. The measure was being pushed by then Sen. Frank Lewis, himself a debater of the first order.

Murphy referenced the famous statue that tops the Capitol.

Some people thought it was a likeness of a sower, hand outstretched from a sack slung over his shoulder, tossing seeds by hand, he noted.

Not the case, said Murphy. It was, instead, a statue of Lewis, exhibiting his view of how state money should be thrown to the winds, in all directions.

Lewis, in turn, said a banker/businessman like Murphy seemed unlikely to know anything about "real work" that could lead to injury. Not the case, said Lewis. He had it on good authority that Murphy had in fact suffered a painful injury on the job. "He dropped a sack of

money on his foot!"

Murphy didn't suffer fools or foolishness, gladly or otherwise. Once he showed up in the legislative chamber dressed as a clown. In full regalia he offered the view that, if lawmaking was a circus, by golly, he'd dress for the occasion.

And there was the time he countered the argument that horseracing should be allowed on Sunday, the former being a day of prayer. His response, paraphrasing here:

"All you need to do is be there when those horses make that final turn and hit that final stretch. There will be more people praying at that moment at that racetrack than in any church in Nebraska."

The judge said that if ever Murphy appeared before him on

any charge, he could count on getting the book thrown at him. Murphy was fond of saying that, if such an occasion arose, the judge would have his chance. "I'd be in contempt from the moment I walked in the door!"

In my first year reporting the Legislature I asked Murphy if he had any advice for me.

"From the looks of you I'd say you need to start eating breakfast. You're awfully skinny, kid."

Any thoughts about news stories? Yes, he said. "Most of them have too many words and not enough facts."

And among my personal favorites was the time Murphy became unbearably frustrated with the way then-Sen. John DeCamp, who was not a detail man, was chairing a meeting of the banking committee.

"John, you're a brilliant guy, but I swear you could screw up an iron ball!"

About colleagues he regarded as

liberal: "I don't think they're empty headed. Their heads are just full of the wrong stuff."

He could take it as well as dish it out.

A colleague pointed out, when Murphy ran for re-election, that his irascible disposition could cost him votes. If he wanted to win another term, the other senator said, he should use billboards and campaign buttons that said: "Vote for Bess Murphy's husband!"

"By golly, I hadn't thought of that, but you're right. I'll get moving on it."

Murphy suffered with diabetes and was all but blind during his Unicameral service. Wife Bess was allowed to sit at his side during floor sessions and helped him to keep abreast of amendments and other paperwork.

Bob Murphy died a few weeks ago. He was 91. He is survived by Bess, two sons, four grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

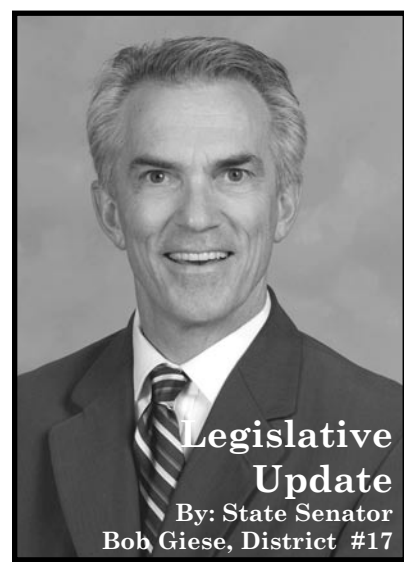
## Legislative Update: Census is important

As most Americans already know from advertising and media coverage, April 1 marked the date of the 2010 Census, required by the United States Constitution to be taken every 10 years.

Results from the census, including age, population, and demographic information generated from census questionnaires, help determine the allocation of federal and state funding for critical community services, including funds for healthcare, education, and transportation. Each year, the federal government allocates more than \$300 billion to states and communities based in part on census data.

Last year, the Legislature unanimously passed LR125, a resolution supporting the efforts of the U.S. Census Bureau in achieving a complete and accurate count, and encouraging all Nebraskans to fill out the ten-question census questionnaire when it arrived in March.

While preliminary figures show that our state had one of the highest census return rates in the nation with 76 percent of questionnaires being mailed back, many

Nebraskans who chose not to fill out their census forms will be paid a visit by census employees in the coming months. Those who have yet to complete their census questionnaire can feel confident in knowing that census employees are legally prohibited from sharing an individual's responses with anyone, including other federal agencies and law enforcement.

Aside from funding for our local communities, the results of the

census determine how many seats each state will have in Congress for the next 10 years. While Nebraska is not expected to lose one of our three congressional districts, the boundaries for these districts and all 49 legislative districts will need to be redrawn to reflect statewide changes in population.

Drawing these new district

boundaries is one of many difficult tasks awaiting the Legislature in 2011, and ensuring that Northeast Nebraska is well-represented in Lincoln depends in part on full census participation. I would encourage all District 17 residents who have not yet done so to complete their census questionnaire when census-takers come to your door.

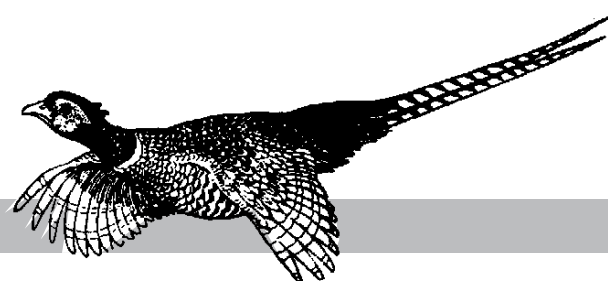

## The truth about anger — Good advice for resolving conflict

### Focus on the positive aspects of your partner.

Let your partner know how much you appreciate them every day. Don't get wound up in that handful of negative things. Being habitually negative and dwelling on your partner's faults doesn't work and is not healthy for you. It leads to an endless cycle of hurt and anger.

### Call a time-out.

Parents often use time-outs for children when they are too wound up but adults need time-outs too. To call a time-out with your partner, simply agree that the situation

is getting out of hand and that you will get back together in awhile, whether it be a half hour or the next day. Everyone has to get the adrenalin to stop flowing and become reasonable.

### Listen very carefully to your partner.

Check out what is being said: "Let me see if I understand your point here: are you saying that....?" And then repeat back to your partner what you think is being said. Many arguments go on needlessly because the partners have no idea what the other is talking about.

### Get to the point.

Say what you mean - what you REALLY mean. Besides listening carefully to your partner, make sure that when you speak you are speaking clearly and to the point. Often times, we are afraid to say what we really are feeling. People often attack as a way of masking their true feelings.

Don't expect your partner to be able to read your mind. You may think that they should just know, but that is not realistic.

### Don't humiliate your partner in front of others.

Shame and embarrassment don't work. The hostilities will simply continue when you are alone and the level of anger can increase.

### The dance of nagging - and avoidance doesn't work.

Couples often get into the trap of nagging and avoiding, nagging endlessly or ignoring, avoiding, and running away. This type of game can escalate to temper tantrums, throwing things, hitting or running away. To get out of this trap, sit down and identify it honestly for the game each person is playing

and find an adult solution calmly and rationally.

### Avoid giving ultimatums.

Don't get into the game of saying things like, "If you do that again, I will never ever...." Or "You had better do this or else." This is one of the most heavily confrontational ways people have for arguing. When someone gives an ultimatum they are trying to put themselves in an adult position, looking down on the other person.

### Grow up. Calm down. Act like an adult.

Listen to what is being said, have we regressed to a child behavior? This is precisely how it looks to outsiders. This childish behavior may work as little kids but as adults we look foolish.

### Don't fight dirty.

Avoid attacking your partner. Conflicts in a relationship are not resolved by attacking each other. Avoid the temptation to fight dirty or to win by damaging your partner. What good can possibly come from making our loved one feel bad?

### Take time to be kind to each other, laugh, have fun and goof off together.

Anger holds everyone back and blaming doesn't do any good. Use "I" statements rather than "you" statements. This aims towards minimizing the blame and working on joint problem solving. Always try for a win-win situation. Loving relationships are not athletic contests nor are we at war. Loving relationships can work through the conflict and join together as a team to find the solution that is good for all involved.

## Grandchildren are a blessing

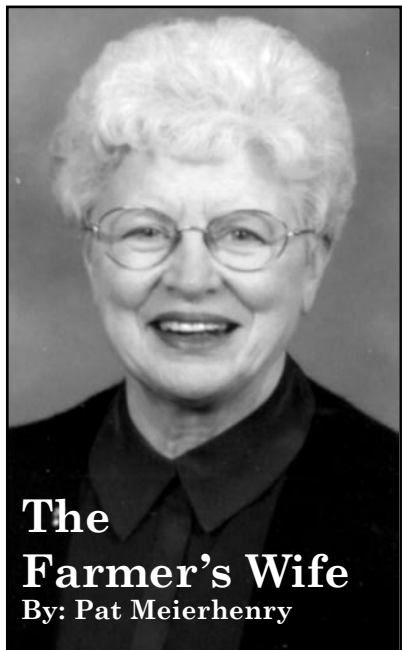

## Conservation stewardship program sign up begins

Farmers and ranchers wanting to get in the Conservation Stewardship Program (CSP) this year have until June 11, 2010 to file their basic application.

The Conservation Stewardship Program is a voluntary stewardship incentives program, administered by USDA's Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS), designed to reward farmers, ranchers, and forestry producers to maintain existing conservation, as well as for the adoption of additional conservation measures that provide multiple environmental benefits that run beyond the farm or ranch. This program pays producers for clean water, better soil management, improved habitat, energy efficiency, and other natural resource benefits.

Traci Bruckner, with the Center for Rural Affairs, encouraged farmers, ranchers and others to call the Center for Rural Affairs' Farm Bill Helpline to learn more about the program and application process. "There are some initial steps farmers and ranchers interested in applying for the program need to do, and there have been some positive changes made to the program since the 2009 ranking. Through our Helpline we can assist farmers and ranchers with understanding how the program works and what they need to do to qualify and rank well."

According to Bruckner, after filing the simple application form, farmers and ranchers will also need to schedule an appointment to complete the CSP Conservation Management Tool (CMT), a set of questions related to their conservation baseline and scheduled improvements. After all applicants who file the short application form by June 11 have completed the CMT, USDA's Natural Resource Conservation Service (NRCS) will rank the proposals to determine the best offers for enrollment dur-

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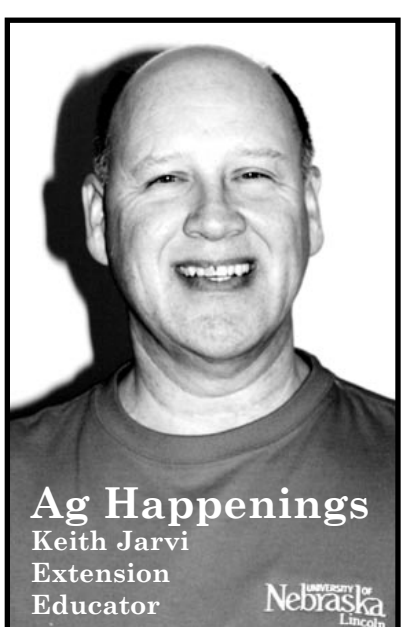
## Ash tree defoliation common this spring

Area State Forester Steve Rasmussen and I have received a flood of calls this week regarding leaves falling off ash trees. While we haven't had the time to look at some of these trees at the time of writing this article, it is a strong possibility that the leaf drop is being caused by a disease called anthracnose.

Many of the callers are wondering if the problems are being caused by emerald ash borer, which has become a serious problem in eastern Minnesota and Iowa and is steadily moving west. A lot of publicity has gone into ash borer awareness, since it may be spread by firewood from infested areas. However, we do not know of any ash borer problems yet in Nebraska.

Getting back to anthracnose; this is a common disease that can affect many trees but in our area ash and walnut trees tend to be affected more severely. This is a fungal disease spread by spores in cool, moist weather. Young developing leaves and shoots are most susceptible. New infections and lesion growth slows down when the weather turns warmer and drier.

The disease starts as brownish water-soaked spots on young tissue and these spots may rapidly coalesce. The leaves will curl and it may look similar to frost injury. The end result is brown to tan blotches on distorted leaves. Then the diseased leaves will drop to the ground. Green ash is actually relatively resistant, but other ash varieties may lose many if not all

of their leaves. I have seen this disease severe in one instance about 20 years ago. This particular tree literally was stripped bare. The tree did set on a new set of leaves, however.

There is nothing that can be done at this time. The disease has already occurred and the damage is likely done. The coming warmer weather should halt the spread of the disease, although some varieties will suffer extreme leaf loss. The good news is that mature trees should have enough reserves left to re-leaf in a few weeks. It is early enough in the year that the trees should survive this attack. In the meantime it will be hard to look at, but when the new buds arrive you can begin to relax.

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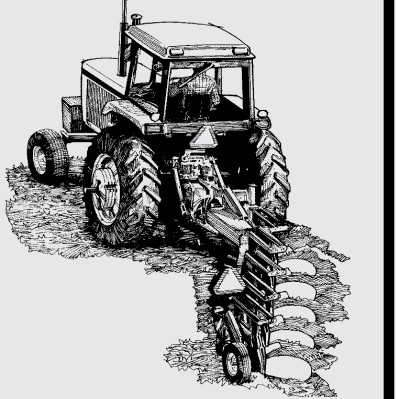
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# UNL Extension Tractor/Farm Safety Courses offered

University of Nebraska-Lincoln Extension Tractor/Farm Safety Courses will be offered at seven locations across the state in May and June.

Federal law prohibits youth under 16 years of age from working on a farm other than their parents'. Course completion grants an exemption to the law allowing 14- and 15-year-olds to drive a tractor and to do field work with mechanized equipment. The course also is available for just the safety training if room permits.

To standardize the training, courses were moved to seven locations across the state this year instead of many local classes.

The most common cause of death in agriculture accidents in Nebraska is overturn from tractors and all-terrain-vehicles (ATV), said Bill Booker, UNL Extension educator in Box Butte County. Tractor and ATV overturn prevention are featured in the class work.

"There is an obligation to teach safety, and these courses allow us to do that," Booker said. "These classes will teach respect for the job and the tools involved."

Classes consist of two, eight-hour days plus two, four-hour homework assignments. Classes are from 8 a.m.-5 p.m. each day. An optional third day of training is available for ATV safety. Dates and locations include:

- May 26-27, Panhandle Research and Extension Center, Scottsbluff;
- June 1-2, West Central Research and Extension Center, North Platte;
- June 4-5, Fairgrounds, Kearney;
- June 8-9, Tractor Test Lab, UNL East Campus, Lincoln;
- June 11-12, Northeast Research and Extension Center, Norfolk;
- June 15-16, Niobrara Valley Equipment, Ainsworth
- June 22-23, Southeast Research and Extension Center at the Agriculture Research and Development Center, near Mead

Pre-registration is strongly encouraged two weeks before a location's start date. Cost is \$60 to cover expenses. For more information, contact Bill Booker at (308) 762-5616, wbooker2@unl.edu, Sharry Nielsen at (308) 832-0645, snielsen1@unl.edu or the local UNL Extension office in the county in which the training is offered. To register, call (308) 762-5616.

The first day of class will consist of intensive classroom instruction with hands-on demonstrations, concluding with a written test that must be completed satisfactorily before the student may continue the driving tests the next day. The classroom instruction will cover the required elements of the National Safe Tractor and Machinery Operation Program.

The program was developed to offer this exemption training. Homework will be assigned to turn in the next day.

The second day will consist of testing, driving and operating machinery. Students will have to demonstrate competence in hooking

up and then driving the tractor and trailer through a standardized course. They also will have to hook up PTO and hydraulic systems.

UNL Extension is in the Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources.

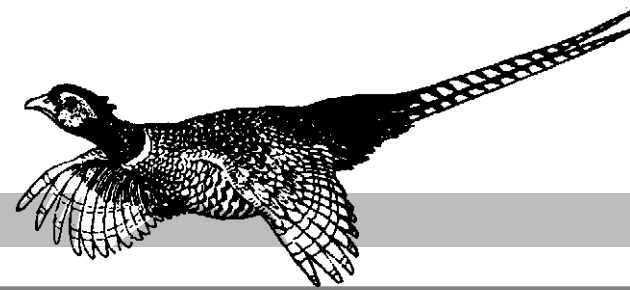

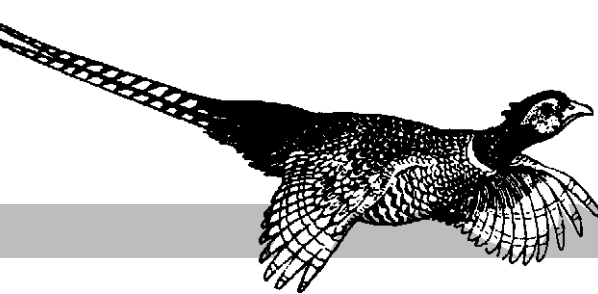

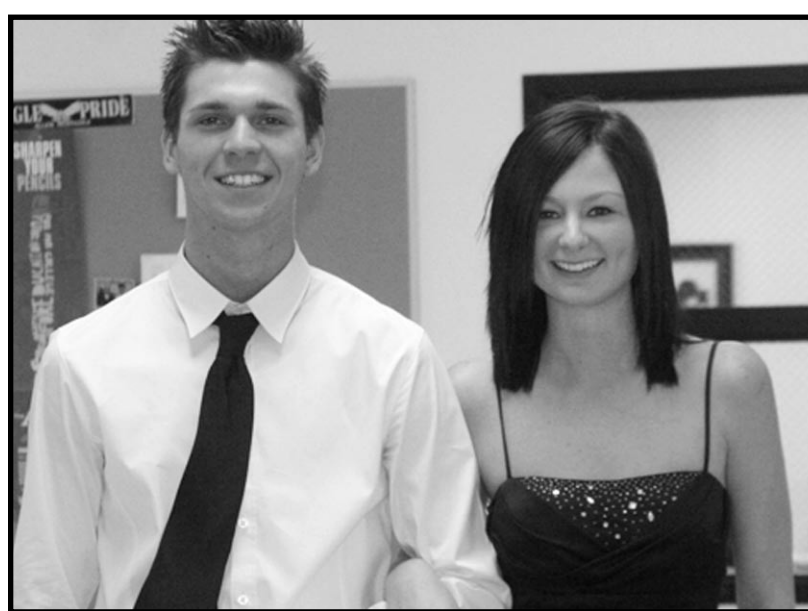
