## City approves \$75,000 revolving loan request

Approval was given on a request for \$75,000 Wayne Revolving Loan fund application to move a business.

Jeff and Jill Ellis plan to move Ellis Plumbing Heating and Air Conditioning from their home northwest of Wayne into the former Heartland Stainless building in Wayne.

Jeff spoke to the council about the growth of his business in recent years and the need for a larger space for equipment and inventory. He said the building he is planning to purchase is four times as large as the current one he is using.

Wes Blecke, representing the Business and Industry Committee, said the group had approved the request for funding as it will be used for job creation/retention and move a business into the city.

The council approved an annual request from the Sharp Shooters 4-H Club to have a shooting gallery style 4-H Shooting Sports Trailer during Henoween and Chicken Show activities.

The city was presented with a plaque from the Heritage Nebraska Main Street 2010 Award of Excellence for being an "Outstanding Public Partner.'

Sandra Bartling, representing the Main Street

group, told the council that the city has always been involved with Main Street activities and supportive of the group.

In other action, the council gave second reading approval to two ordinances, including one dealing with the definitions of non-farm buildings and vehicle towing service and the other with required building permits.

Four resolutions involving the creation of sidewalk improvement districts in downtown Wayne were passed unanimously.

City Clerk Betty McGuire told the council that two objections had been received in each of three of the districts and one objection was received in the fourth district. However, the objections did not constitute 50 percent of any of the districts and the projects can move forward and be bid out for construction.

The council then approved amending the sales tax capital project's plan to add \$250,000 for the Downtown Sidewalk Plan. Traditionally, the city pays one-half of the cost of a sidewalk project and approval of the plan will allow for sales tax funds collected in the capital improvement portion of the tax to be used for the project.

Approval was given for city staff to seek bids regarding heating/air conditioning system for the

## School, teachers agree on 2010-11 salary package

Teachers in the Wayne Public Schools will get about a 3 percent increase in their base salary after an agreement was reached between the Board of Education and the local teachers' union.

At a special meeting Tuesday evening, the Wayne school board approved a negotiated proposal between negotiator for the board, said talks between the the district and its teachers for the 2010-11 school district and the teachers union went smoothly. year. The proposal was approved on a 5-0 vote, with board member Rod Garwood absent from the special everybody thought it was a good agreement," Nelson meeting.

The negotiated agreement calls for a raise in the base salary from \$29,150 to \$30,000, an increase of \$850, or just under 3 percent. The current health benefits and personal leave will be maintained, and the district will offer a \$30,000 life insurance package paid for by the district, with another \$30,000 policy available for purchase by the employee.

## Wayne teen is killed in accident

A Wayne teenager who had just completed his first year of high school was killed in a one-vehicle accident over the Memorial Day holiday weekend.

James Ping, 16, of Wayne was killed Sunday in a one-vehicle roll-over accident southeast of Wayne.

Ping, who just finished his freshman year at Wayne High School, was driving a 1993 Ford Pickup on 847th Road near 579th Avenue when the eastbound pickup entered the ditch and rolled. He was ejected from the vehicle. Seat belts were not in use at the time of the accident.

Ping was the lone occupant in the vehi-

The accident occurred between 11:45 a.m. and 1 p.m. and was investigated by the Nebraska State Patrol.

To date, the state has had 59 traffic fatalities, down from the 79 fatalities recorded on the same date last year. Ping's death was the ninth in the month of May.

## **County goes in with** neighbor on bridge deal

Stanton and Wayne County will share in the cost of a concrete box culvert along the county line and forego federal aid for the project.

At Tuesday's meeting, the Wayne County Commissioners approved the cancellation of a federal aid interlocal agreement with Stanton County and entered into an interlocal agreement with their neighbors to the south that will allow the two entities to use soft match funds for the construction of a 12 foot-by-12 foot box culvert on 846th Road, located 1.5 miles south and 1.3 miles west of Hoskins on the county line.

Officials with both Wayne and Stanton counties said the bridge has been in need of repair for some time, and Stanton County - the entity responsible for this particular bridge - had been waiting for the better part of a decade to get federal aid for the project before deciding recently to forego the federal route and use soft match funds for the project.

In order to do that, the Wayne County board had to agree to cancel the original interlocal agreement and enter into a second interlocal agreement that will require the use of soft match funds for their share of the \$167,500 project.

While the county's share of the project will be more than it would under a federal aid project – where the federal government pays 80 percent, the local entity pays 15 percent and the state pays 5 percent - the

county will be credited for 80 percent of its share of the project with the state, and that credit can go toward future federal aid jobs the county encounters.

County officials and board members said that work needed to be done on the bridge.

"This has been in the plan a long time," said Elizabeth Carlson, Wayne County highway superintendent. "The bridge needs to be replaced more quickly than the federal aid will come."

Board chairman James Rabe agreed.

"We need to get this done, because it's been in the works for a long time and they (Stanton County) want to get it done, so we should go through with this.'

The board also gave county sheriff LeRoy Janssen the go-ahead to purchase a new computer system to update the department's record management system. The \$4,937 purchase from Elite Computers and Consulting of West Point will update the system of the county sheriff's department with equipment that is also in use in other area law enforcement departments, including Cuming County.

Janssen said he would try to get the computer equipment purchased and installed before the end of the county's fiscal year on Wednesday, June 30.

Janssen also mentioned a ceremony for the Special Olympics torch run that will be held in Wayne on Monday, July 12. The torch run will be coming through town that day, and will end at the new memorial at the courthouse. A ceremony will be held

## Wayne State recognized for graduation success rate

dent success that drives the college's outstanding student graduation rate.

Now that recognition has moved onto the national stage. A recent report published by the Southern Regional Education Board (SREB) profiled Wayne State among 15 public colleges and universities from across the nation, noting that Wayne State's "success in raising graduation rates may provide other institutions with practices and strategies that work to help more students succeed.'

These 15 public colleges and universities - including institutions in Kentucky, Mississippi, North Carolina and

Wayne State is known regionally for the culture of stu- Texas – are outperforming most similar institutions in helping students stay on track and graduate, a major new report from SREB shows.

The report, "Promoting a Culture of Student Success: How Colleges and Universities Are Improving Degree Completion," profiles six public institutions in SREB states: Murray State and Western Kentucky Universities in Kentucky, Delta State University in Mississippi, North Carolina Central and Elizabeth City State Universities in North Carolina, and Sam Houston State University in Texas

All of the institutions in Promoting a Culture of Student

Success outperform similar colleges and universities by having relatively high graduation rates, compared with similar institutions, based on criteria developed by SREB. The report also outlines common approaches and strategies that these institutions are using to boost student success for other institutions, university systems and states to use.

Wayne State was approached by SREB to participate in the study on the basis of the college's success in graduating students despite many of WSC's students





Combined, these two teams own the majority of the NBA championship trophies. It sort of reminds you of watching the Nebraska-Oklahoma matchup for the Big Eight title . . . but you're a Missouri fan (and, yes, it could be worse than being a Missouri fan, but let's leave Colorado out of the discussion for now).

A few days ahead of the NBA finals, the NHL's Stanley Cup Finals are underway, with the Chicago Blackhawks and Philadelphia Flyers both trying to end longstanding championship droughts.

The Flyers haven't won since the Broad Street Bullies of the mid-1970's took the cup. Chicago has gone even longer . . . you have to go all the way back to 1961 to find the last Blackhawks team to win a title (which isn't all that long when you compare it to a certain longsuffering Chicago sports franchise that hasn't won a title in more than a century . . . sorry, Cubs fans).

This series is much more compelling and interesting to watch than the NBA. And NBA basketball is so predictable. Each game can be summed up by one of two scenarios:

1. Home team gets big lead early, visitors make it close by halftime, momentum swings back and forth until one team pulls it out at the end.


While the Juniors struggled in their tournament, they opened the season with hot bats, pounding Ponca early for a 10-0 win on Wednesday and exploding

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

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

## **Capitol View** Heineman says wage freezes could help state avoid job cuts

LINCOLN-Gov. Dave Heineman wants unionized state employees to give up \$12.7 million in pay increases called for in their current contracts.

His latest request of NAPE/ AFSCME, the union representing state workers, got an understandably chilly reception. It previously rejected a similar request from the governor.

Heineman is freezing wages for 3,200 nonunion state workers who will not get a scheduled 2.5 percent pay increase July 1. He is asking two agencies he doesn't directly control - the Department of Education and the state court system – to do the same with another 1,200 workers.


Heineman said wage freezes could help avoid the need to eliminate jobs.

"Essentially the governor's notice is pretty much the same as before," union executive director Julie Dake Abel said last week. "Once again the governor is trying to make us look like the bad guys, for political



Frozen blueberries, blackberries, raspberries and strawberries all deliver hearty antioxidant punch. Put them on your cereal, salads or use them as a dessert with non-fat yogurt.



coming from disadvantaged economic backgrounds and having low median SAT or ACT scores. SREB researchers found that Wayne State achieves its graduation rate through a culture of "friendliness," "care," "attentiveness" and "excellent cooperation between academic, student services and other administrative units."

"These institutions are helping many students complete college degrees who otherwise often do not graduate," said Cheryl Blanco, an SREB vice president who co-wrote and researched the report with consultant Paul Bradley. "The strategies they're using can be adopted by other colleges and universities, and will guide state policy decisions to improve degree completion across the nation," she said.

Despite rising college enrollment, improvement in students' timely completion of bachelor's degrees in the United States has stalled, according to the report. Less than one-third of degree-seeking, fulltime freshmen in public four-year institutions graduate in four years. Most students who enter college

as first-time, full-time freshmen take at least six years to earn a bachelor's degree - and only 55 percent graduate in that time span. And research shows that students from disadvantaged economic backgrounds or with low SAT/ACT scores are even less likely to complete bachelor's degrees than their classmates.

The institutions profiled in the SREB report are helping more students complete degrees while also providing a quality education. These institutions often serve a comparatively high percentage of students from low-income families and students with averageor-below scores on standardized achievement tests. Yet their sixyear graduation rates are near the national average for all students.

The study team used The Education Trust's College Results Online database to select colleges and universities that met these criteria in 2006: a six-year graduation rate of at least 45 percent; a median SAT score no higher than 1050 (ACT average of approximately 25); a proportion of students receiving

and Carnegie Classification as a public baccalaureate or master's institution. At the time of the 2006 report, Wayne State's graduation rate was 52 percent; median SAT score was 990; and 38.9 percent of the college's students received Pell grants.

Using the study criteria, SREB selected 15 institutions for this report: California State University, Long Beach and California State University, Stanislaus; Western Illinois University; Murray State University and Western Kentucky University; Delta State University; Northwest Missouri State University; Wayne State College; Montclair State University in New Jersey; Queens College, The City University of New York and The College of Staten Island, The City University of New York; Elizabeth City State University and North Carolina Central University; Clarion University of Pennsylvania; and Sam Houston State University in Texas.

The report's key recommendations call for institutions to:

- Make graduation of all stu-Pell Grants of at least 25 percent; dents the first priority of the cam-

pus, the faculty and staff, and central to the campus culture and to all institutional practices at every public four-year institution.

- Emphasize students' degree completion in the selection and evaluation of all campus administrators, especially the president and top academic administrators. Charge a team of campus leaders with overseeing efforts to improve student success.

- Help ensure that students are academically ready to succeed in college - in reading, writing and math - and provide them with additional instruction when need-

-Require that all students choose a major and develop an individual graduation plan by the end of the freshman year.

- Provide appropriate and targeted programs and services that foster degree completion.

- Closely monitor all students progress on their individual graduation plans.

- Develop an institutional master course schedule that covers at least three years.

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
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




## Now is the time for irrigation check-up

Bill Kranz, Extension Irrigation Specialist at the Haskell Ag Lab, provides us with some good tips on getting your irrigation system ready for the summer.

A pre-season irrigation checkup should be part of the regular maintenance schedule. Components wear, resulting in less uniform water application, increased energy use and untimely breakdowns during the already busy irrigation season. Act now to identify and replace worn components so the system is ready when it's needed.

One of the best ways to identify worn components such as the sprinklers or pump is to keep good records. Recording the outlet pressure, flow rate, hours of operation and energy use each month provides an excellent means of evaluating pump and motor performance

The pumping plant evaluation should identify the overall operating efficiency and provide the pump speed, outlet pressure, flow rate and energy use rate. This information will provide a base point to compare with future operating characteristics.
