## City approves \$75,000 revolving loan request

Approval was given on a request for \$75,000 Wayne Revolving Loan fund application to move a business. Jeff and Jill Ellis plan to move Ellis Plumbing Heating and Air Conditioning from their home northwest of Wayne into the former Heartland Stainless building in Wayne. Jeff spoke to the council about the growth of his business in recent years and the need for a larger space for equipment and inventory. He said the building he is planning to purchase is four times as large as the current one he is using. Wes Blecke, representing the Business and Industry Committee, said the group had approved the request for funding as it will be used for job creation/retention and move a business into the city. The council approved an annual request from the Sharp Shooters 4-H Club to have a shooting gallery style 4-H Shooting Sports Trailer during Henoween and Chicken Show activities. The city was presented with a plaque from the Heritage Nebraska Main Street 2010 Award of Excellence for being an "Outstanding Public Partner." Sandra Bartling, representing the Main Street

group, told the council that the city has always been involved with Main Street activities and supportive of the group. In other action, the council gave second reading approval to two ordinances, including one dealing with the definitions of non-farm buildings and vehicle towing service and the other with required building permits. Four resolutions involving the creation of sidewalk improvement districts in downtown Wayne were passed unanimously. City Clerk Betty McGuire told the council that two objections had been received in each of three of the districts and one objection was received in the fourth district. However, the objections did not constitute 50 percent of any of the districts and the projects can move forward and be bid out for construction. The council then approved amending the sales tax capital project's plan to add \$250,000 for the Downtown Sidewalk Plan. Traditionally, the city pays one-half of the cost of a sidewalk project and approval of the plan will allow for sales tax funds collected in the capital improvement portion of the tax to be used for the project. Approval was given for city staff to seek bids regarding heating/air conditioning system for the

## School, teachers agree on 2010-11 salary package

Teachers in the Wayne Public Schools will get about a 3 percent increase in their base salary after an agreement was reached between the Board of Education and the local teachers' union. At a special meeting Tuesday evening, the Wayne school board approved a negotiated proposal between the district and its teachers for the 2010-11 school year. The proposal was approved on a 5-0 vote, with board member Rod Garwood absent from the special meeting.

The negotiated agreement calls for a raise in the base salary from \$29,150 to \$30,000, an increase of \$850, or just under 3 percent. The current health benefits and personal leave will be maintained, and the district will offer a \$30,000 life insurance package paid for by the district, with another \$30,000 policy available for purchase by the employee. School board member Dr. Jeryl Nelson, the lead negotiator for the board, said talks between the district and the teachers' union went smoothly. "I do think we had productive negotiations and everybody thought it was a good agreement," Nelson

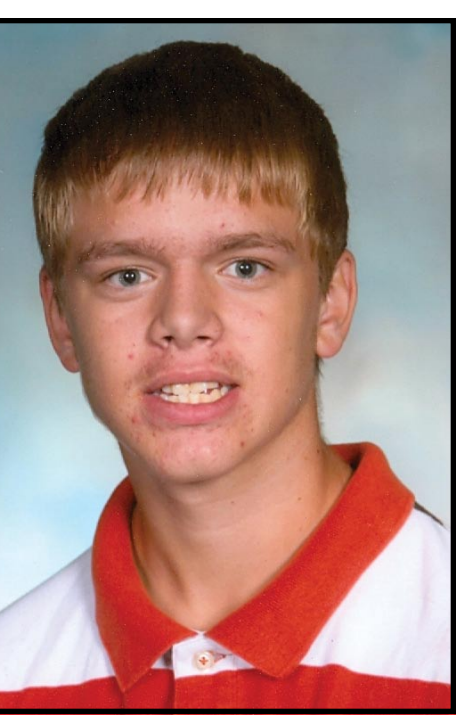

## Wayne teen is killed in accident

A Wayne teenager who had just completed his first year of high school was killed in a one-vehicle accident over the Memorial Day holiday weekend. James Ping, 16, of Wayne was killed Sunday in a one-vehicle roll-over accident southeast of Wayne. Ping, who just finished his freshman year at Wayne High School, was driving a 1993 Ford Pickup on 847th Road near 579th Avenue when the eastbound pickup entered the ditch and rolled. He was ejected from the vehicle. Seat belts were not in use at the time of the accident. Ping was the lone occupant in the vehicle. The accident occurred between 11:45 a.m. and 1 p.m. and was investigated by the Nebraska State Patrol. To date, the state has had 59 traffic fatalities, down from the 79 fatalities recorded on the same date last year. Ping's death was the ninth in the month of May.

## County goes in with neighbor on bridge deal

Stanton and Wayne County will share in the cost of a concrete box culvert along the county line and forego federal aid for the project. At Tuesday's meeting, the Wayne County Commissioners approved the cancellation of a federal aid interlocal agreement with Stanton County and entered into an interlocal agreement with their neighbors to the south that will allow the two entities to use soft match funds for the construction of a 12 foot-by-12 foot box culvert on 846th Road, located 1.5 miles south and 1.3 miles west of Hoskins on the county line. Officials with both Wayne and Stanton counties said the bridge has been in need of repair for some time, and Stanton County - the entity responsible for this particular bridge - had been waiting for the better part of a decade to get federal aid for the project before deciding recently to forego the federal route and use soft match funds for the project. In order to do that, the Wayne County board had to agree to cancel the original interlocal agreement and enter into a second interlocal agreement that will require the use of soft match funds for their share of the \$167,500 project. While the county's share of the project will be more than it would under a federal aid project - where the federal government pays 80 percent, the local entity pays 15 percent and the state pays 5 percent - the

county will be credited for 80 percent of its share of the project with the state, and that credit can go toward future federal aid jobs the county encounters. County officials and board members said that work needed to be done on the bridge. "This has been in the plan a long time," said Elizabeth Carlson, Wayne County highway superintendent. "The bridge needs to be replaced more quickly than the federal aid will come." Board chairman James Rabe agreed. "We need to get this done, because it's been in the works for a long time and they (Stanton County) want to get it done, so we should go through with this." The board also gave county sheriff LeRoy Janssen the go-ahead to purchase a new computer system to update the department's record management system. The \$4,937 purchase from Elite Computers and Consulting of West Point will update the system of the county sheriff's department with equipment that is also in use in other area law enforcement departments, including Cuming County. Janssen said he would try to get the computer equipment purchased and installed before the end of the county's fiscal year on Wednesday, June 30. Janssen also mentioned a ceremony for the Special Olympics torch run that will be held in Wayne on Monday, July 12. The torch run will be coming through town that day, and will end at the new memorial at the courthouse. A ceremony will be held

## Wayne State recognized for graduation success rate

Wayne State is known regionally for the culture of student success that drives the college's outstanding student graduation rate. Now that recognition has moved onto the national stage. A recent report published by the Southern Regional Education Board (SREB) profiled Wayne State among 15 public colleges and universities from across the nation, noting that Wayne State's "success in raising graduation rates may provide other institutions with practices and strategies that work to help more students succeed." These 15 public colleges and universities - including institutions in Kentucky, Mississippi, North Carolina and

Texas - are outperforming most similar institutions in helping students stay on track and graduate, a major new report from SREB shows. The report, "Promoting a Culture of Student Success: How Colleges and Universities Are Improving Degree Completion," profiles six public institutions in SREB states: Murray State and Western Kentucky Universities in Kentucky, Delta State University in Mississippi, North Carolina Central and Elizabeth City State Universities in North Carolina, and Sam Houston State University in Texas. All of the institutions in Promoting a Culture of Student

Success outperform similar colleges and universities by having relatively high graduation rates, compared with similar institutions, based on criteria developed by SREB. The report also outlines common approaches and strategies that these institutions are using to boost student success for other institutions, university systems and states to use. Wayne State was approached by SREB to participate in the study on the basis of the college's success in graduating students despite many of WSC's students

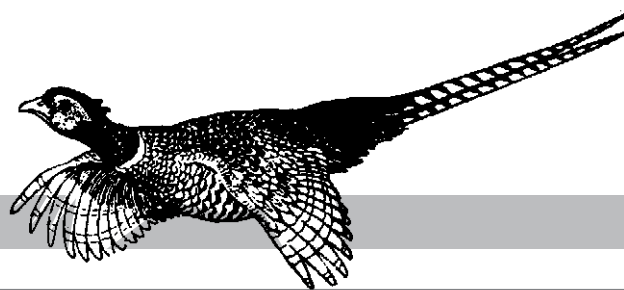

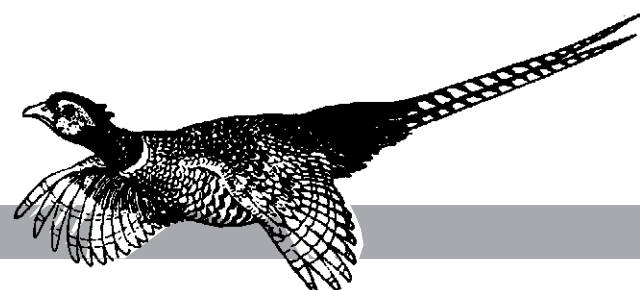

## Give me NHL over dull NBA

I used to be a HUGE fan of the NBA.

When I was growing up, I'd obsess over the boxscores of the NBA games, even though the only time I could watch an NBA game was on the occasional Sunday afternoon when CBS had the game of the week.

My favorite player during that time was "Pistol" Pete Maravich. He was a ball-handling wizard who still holds the single-season and career scoring averages in NCAA Div. I college basketball (look them up . . . I can guarantee you those records will never be broken, not even if they create a 10-point shot between the 3-point line and the free throw line).

The guy could do things with a basketball that few people can do today (unless they play for the Harlem Globetrotters). I idolized this guy and tried to imitate some of his crazy moves, from bouncing the ball between my legs to the basket from the free throw line to his no-look passes that made today's wannabe wizards look like amateur night at the projects.

Today, the NBA holds little interest for me. If I'm having a hard time sleeping at night, all I need to do is DVR an Orlando Magic game, and I'm asleep within five minutes.

The NBA finals start this week, and for the 12th time in the league's history, the two teams playing in the finals are the Los Angeles Lakers and the Boston Celtics.

Wah-freakin'-hootie. It's like watching another bad rerun on one of the three major networks (actually, the finals are being broadcast on ABC, so this isn't one of my usual funny, offbeat comparisons). Same song, new verse, different key.

Combined, these two teams own the majority of the NBA championship trophies. It sort of reminds you of watching the Nebraska-Oklahoma matchup for the Big Eight title . . . but you're a Missouri fan (and, yes, it could be worse than being a Missouri fan, but let's leave Colorado out of the discussion for now).

A few days ahead of the NBA finals, the NHL's Stanley Cup Finals are underway, with the Chicago Blackhawks and Philadelphia Flyers both trying to end long-standing championship droughts.

The Flyers haven't won since the Broad Street Bullies of the mid-1970's took the cup. Chicago has gone even longer . . . you have to go all the way back to 1961 to find the last Blackhawks team to win a title (which isn't all that long when you compare it to a certain long-suffering Chicago sports franchise that hasn't won a title in more than a century . . . sorry, Cubs fans).

This series is much more compelling and interesting to watch than the NBA. The Blackhawks are one of the league's best teams, going up against a Cinderella story in the Flyers, who needed an overtime shootout win on the last game of the season just to get into the playoffs as a No. 7 seed, then had to beat the No. 8 seed to reach the finals.

I couldn't name three players on either of the teams playing for the NHL championship. In fact, I'm pretty sure half of the sports writers on this side of the planet couldn't spell the name of the Blackhawks' goalie if you spotted them all the vowels (Antti Niemi, for those who don't already know).

Frankly, I'm tired of hearing the comparisons between Kobe Bryant and Michael Jordan. The same old song and dance about an aging Celtics team looking for one last chance at glory is old news (see the 1986 Celtics with Bird, Parrish, McHale and Co.).

And NBA basketball is so predictable. Each game can be summed up by one of two scenarios:

1. Home team gets big lead early, visitors make it close by halftime, momentum swings back and forth until one team pulls it out at the end.

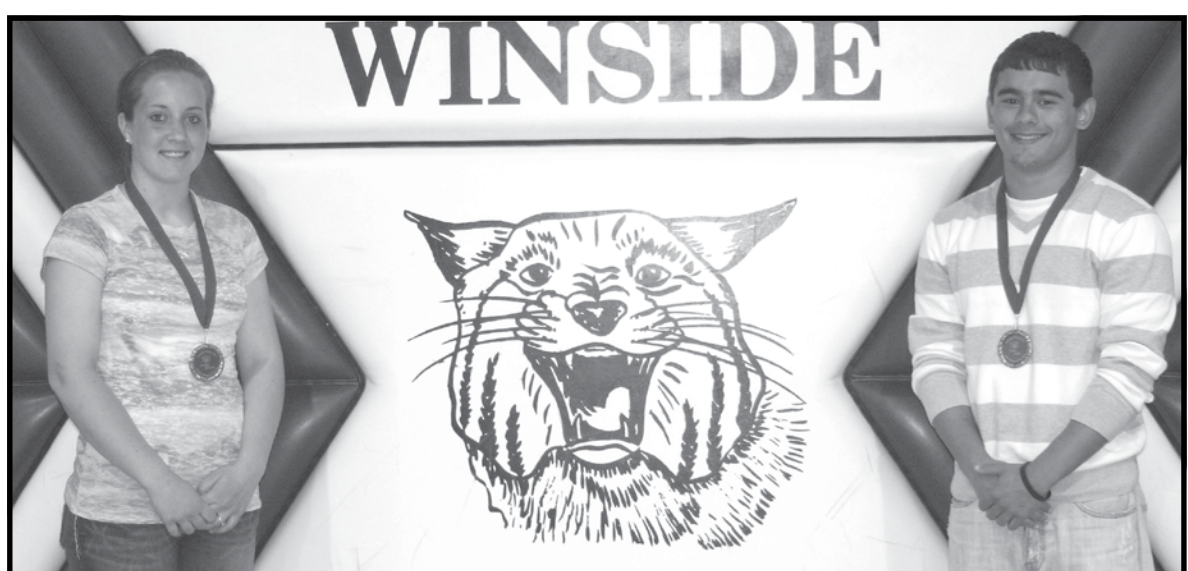

## Local RC&D council gets update

Jan Jorgensen, Coordinator of the Northeast Nebraska RC&D, gave a presentation on this year's current Projects. The Council was

surprised to see 28 projects being worked by the group. This helps with economic development, promoting good stewardship in the northeast Nebraska area, promotes tourism and to receive grants which bring additional dollars into the area.

The stream monitoring project on the Bazile Creek near Center was well attended on May 17. Dr. Barbara Hayford, Wayne State College, AJS Museum of Natural History and Department of Life Sciences was the leader. Much information was gathered in the group's findings, 106 benthic specimens were collected, counted and identified. It is recommended that the group continue to monitor this stream twice a year.

Over 10,000 pounds of waste was collected at the household hazardous waste collection. Some of the items collected were paint, pesticides, acid, batteries, antifreeze and light bulbs.

Alyssa is the daughter of Ken and Diane Lundahl of Laurel.

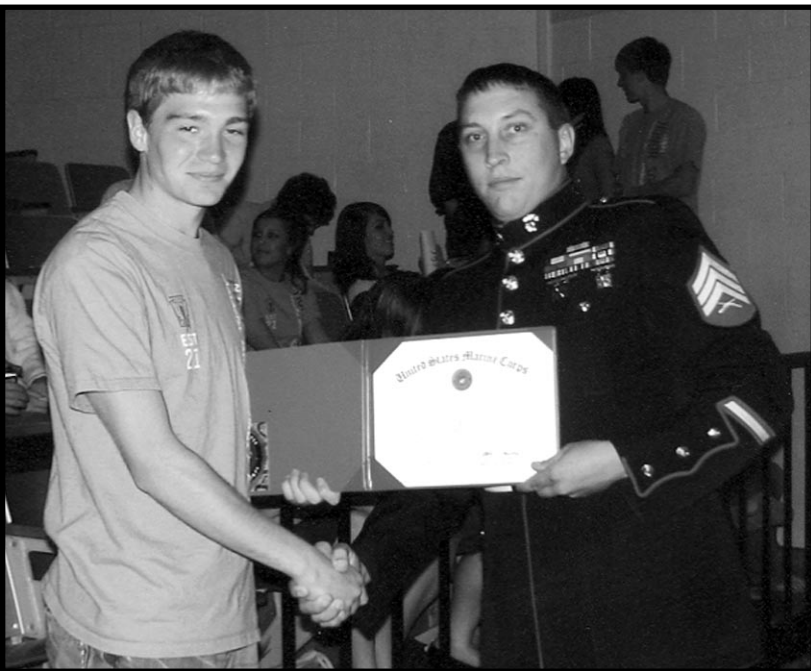

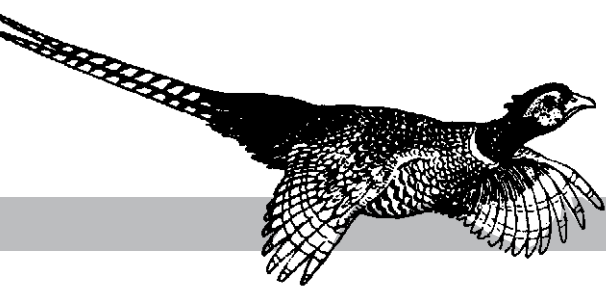

## Cheers for the national anthem?

Some random thoughts and observations now that summer has unofficially made its presence felt:

— When it comes to the Star Spangled Banner, I'm a by-the-book kind of guy.

I like a band, or an artist, to perform the song the way Francis Scott Key wrote it all those years ago. I don't need to hear a singer's dazzling multi-octave range or ability to make one word a 30-note, up-and-down the staff exhaling of their massive lung capacity.

And when it comes to showing respect for the country, I'm most comfortable with seeing people in the stands to stand quietly and face the flag. I'm not sure which bothers me more — the disrespect shown by those who refuse to remove their hats (especially those dingbats who think wearing them sideways somehow makes them look cool, hip or anything other than what they really look, which could politely be described as dopey), or the kids who like to gab amongst themselves while failing in their attempt to show their pride in the country they live in.

This past weekend, though, I saw a display during a singing of our National Anthem that shocked me at first, then brought a new spin on the idea of showing respect for the flag and those who fought for it.

The scene was prior to the start of the National Hockey League's Stanley Cup Finals, a matchup between the Chicago Blackhawks and Philadelphia Flyers. The first two games of the series were played over Memorial Day weekend in Chicago, and I saw something that I've never seen before — fans cheering, and cheering loudly, during the singing of the anthem.

# Heineman says wage freezes could help state avoid job cuts

LINCOLN — Gov. Dave Heineman wants unionized state employees to give up \$12.7 million in pay increases called for in their current contracts.

His latest request of NAPE/AFSCME, the union representing state workers, got an understandably chilly reception. It previously rejected a similar request from the governor.

Heineman is freezing wages for 3,200 nonunion state workers who will not get a scheduled 2.5 percent pay increase July 1. He is asking two agencies he doesn't directly control — the Department of Education and the state court system — to do the same with another 1,200 workers.

Heineman said wage freezes could help avoid the need to eliminate jobs.

"Essentially the governor's notice is pretty much the same as before," union executive director Julie Dake Abel said last week. "Once again the governor is trying to make us look like the bad guys, for political gain."

She said most of the workers whose pay Heineman froze last week are in management, and already earn more than the union workers. "Our folks are mostly lower to middle class people . . . It's easier for people who are paid more to afford a pay freeze." She also noted Heineman had not been specific about which jobs, or how many, would be saved.

Here are some of the numbers: Heineman last week froze the wages of 3,200 people.

He wants some agencies, notably the State Court Administrator's Office, to freeze wages for 1,100 employees statewide; and seeks wage freezes for 115 people in the

Department of Education.

If the wages of all 5,000 workers are frozen, the administration estimates the state will save some \$7.5 million.

Bigger bucks, the \$12.7 million previously mentioned, are sought from union workers who negotiated their pay and benefits with the state. The union said it would discuss Heineman's request with its members.

The salary maneuvering is an ongoing issue. The governor froze the pay of 230 agency chiefs in January. The Legislature froze the pay of 200 of its employees. And the state's five constitutional officers — the governor, secretary of state,

treasurer, auditor and attorney general — are forgoing scheduled pay increases.

**More About Money**

The last report from the state Department of Revenue showed that April's net tax receipts were 14.6 percent below projections.

That means the state's coffers received \$51.9 million less than expected.

The take from corporate income taxes was 28 percent lower than projected. Individual income tax revenue was off by 25 percent.

Many local governments and local government agencies have

learned to be careful about what they ask for when it comes to federal dollars.

When the federal money runs out, the programs it financed can wind up being added to the tax burden on local residents, or abandoned. And there are other issues. The feds require lots and lots of paperwork, detailing how such money is spent; and local governments usually have to match at least 25 percent of the money provided by the feds.

In a recent interview, Kearney Police Chief Daniel Lynch summed things up nicely.

"There's no such thing as free money," he said.

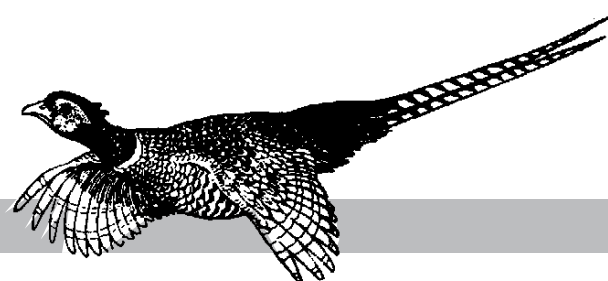

## Tips can save money on meals

By having a healthy pantry, fridge and freezer, time and money can be saved while eating healthy, according to a nutrition newsletter from Tufts University on the "22 Essentials for Quick, Healthy, and Cheaper Meals." Here are few ideas for you to try and use:

**For the pantry:**  
Cooking and salad oils low in saturated fat and high in monounsaturated or polyunsaturated fat. Soybean and canola oil are the most cost effective.

Cooking oil spray can help reduce the need to pour cooking oil in many recipes. There are only two

calories per spray.

Whole grain pasta is a great way to add whole grains to your diet.

Canned beans are more convenient than dried beans. By rinsing and draining them, you can reduce the sodium. They also are a great source of fiber. The beans can be added to salads, casseroles, soups or can be a main dish on their own.

Low-sodium reduced fat chicken broth or vegetable broth can add flavor to cream-free sauces without a lot of calories and sodium.

Instant and quick cooking brown rice and other whole grains such as barley are great pantry staples.



Brown rice will work in any dish that calls for white rice. Barley is great in soups. This is a great way to get whole grains and increase the nutritional value of your meal.

Whole wheat flour can be substituted for wheat flour in most recipes up to 50 percent of the amount of white flour. If the recipe calls for a cup of flour make it a half-cup white flour and a half-cup whole wheat.

Vinegars such as balsamic, red wine, white wine, cider and sherry can help make tasty vinaigrettes for salads and add flavors to sauces.

Oatmeal and other whole grain dry cereals are great for breakfast and can be added to meatloaf and other dishes to replace some of the meat.

With canned tuna, salmon or mackerel, make sure you buy canned fish in water instead of oil with no added salt. This is a great way to get some omega-3 fatty acids by adding canned fish to salads or casseroles.

Powdered egg whites can add the low-fat, low cholesterol part of the egg when recipes call for egg whites.

Nuts can be added to salads,

bake goods, entrees. Nuts are a good source of protein and healthy oils.

Canned fruits in light syrup or juice can be a dessert by itself or add it to yogurt or cottage cheese. Canned peaches and mandarin oranges are great in salads.

With canned vegetables, look for the reduced salt or no added salt varieties. They can be added to soups, salads, casseroles, or pasta.

Herbs and spices can add flavor to foods and can replace salt.

**In the fridge:**  
Purchase fat free or low-fat milk, yogurt or cottage cheese. Yogurt can be added to sauces to thicken them instead of sour cream. You can use cottage cheese in lasagna or add it to tuna or salmon salads.

Use real and egg substitutes in recipes or as omelets and scrambled eggs. They can help reduce saturated fat and costs.

Whole grain bagels, pita bread and English muffins are other ways to add whole grain to your day.

Low-fat, whole wheat flour tortillas can help increase your fiber and whole grains. Serve these with chopped up vegetables with low fat cheese to make a great snack.

**In the freezer:**

With frozen vegetables and vegetable blends be sure to read the label to make sure that sodium has not been added, especially on Asian blends for stir fry or microwave dishes. These make it easier to add vegetables to casseroles and soups.

Frozen blueberries, blackberries, raspberries and strawberries all deliver hearty antioxidant punch. Put them on your cereal, salads or use them as a dessert with non-fat yogurt.

Pre-portioned seafood, lean meats, ground turkey and boneless chicken breasts can help make quick and easy meals because they are already portioned into four ounce portions, taking the guess work out on the amount you are eating.

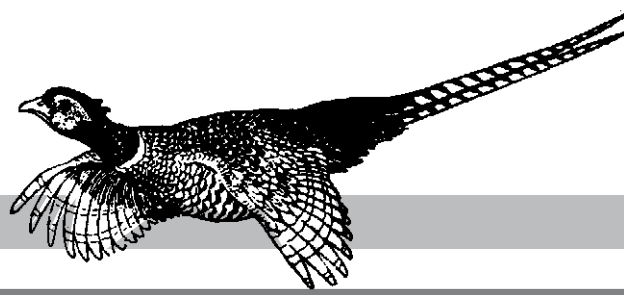

coming from disadvantaged economic backgrounds and having low median SAT or ACT scores. SREB researchers found that Wayne State achieves its graduation rate through a culture of "friendliness," "care," "attentiveness" and "excellent cooperation between academic, student services and other administrative units."

"These institutions are helping many students complete college degrees who otherwise often do not graduate," said Cheryl Blanco, an SREB vice president who co-wrote and researched the report with consultant Paul Bradley. "The strategies they're using can be adopted by other colleges and universities, and will guide state policy decisions to improve degree completion across the nation," she said.

Despite rising college enrollment, improvement in students' timely completion of bachelor's degrees in the United States has stalled, according to the report. Less than one-third of degree-seeking, full-time freshmen in public four-year institutions graduate in four years. Most students who enter college

as first-time, full-time freshmen take at least six years to earn a bachelor's degree — and only 55 percent graduate in that time span. And research shows that students from disadvantaged economic backgrounds or with low SAT/ACT scores are even less likely to complete bachelor's degrees than their classmates.

The institutions profiled in the SREB report are helping more students complete degrees while also providing a quality education. These institutions often serve a comparatively high percentage of students from low-income families and students with average-or-below scores on standardized achievement tests. Yet their six-year graduation rates are near the national average for all students.

The study team used The Education Trust's College Results Online database to select colleges and universities that met these criteria in 2006: a six-year graduation rate of at least 45 percent; a median SAT score no higher than 1050 (ACT average of approximately 25); a proportion of students receiving Pell Grants of at least 25 percent;

and Carnegie Classification as a public baccalaureate or master's institution. At the time of the 2006 report, Wayne State's graduation rate was 52 percent; median SAT score was 990; and 38.9 percent of the college's students received Pell grants.

Using the study criteria, SREB selected 15 institutions for this report: California State University, Long Beach and California State University, Stanislaus; Western Illinois University; Murray State University and Western Kentucky University; Delta State University; Northwest Missouri State University; Wayne State College; Montclair State University in New Jersey; Queens College, The City University of New York and The College of Staten Island, The City University of New York; Elizabeth City State University and North Carolina Central University; Clarion University of Pennsylvania; and Sam Houston State University in Texas.

The report's key recommendations call for institutions to:

— Make graduation of all students the first priority of the cam-

pus, the faculty and staff, and central to the campus culture and to all institutional practices at every public four-year institution.

— Emphasize students' degree completion in the selection and evaluation of all campus administrators, especially the president and top academic administrators. Charge a team of campus leaders with overseeing efforts to improve student success.

— Help ensure that students are academically ready to succeed in college — in reading, writing and math — and provide them with additional instruction when needed.



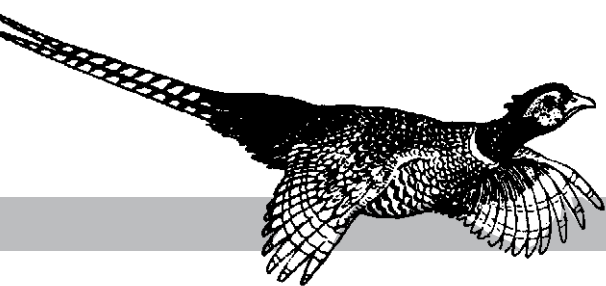

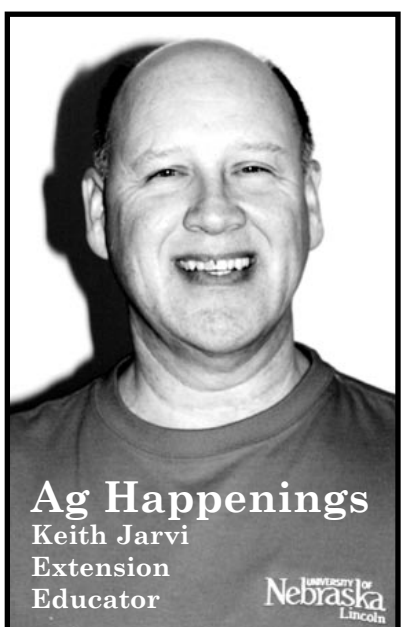
## Now is the time for irrigation check-up

Bill Kranz, Extension Irrigation Specialist at the Haskell Ag Lab, provides us with some good tips on getting your irrigation system ready for the summer.

A pre-season irrigation checkup should be part of the regular maintenance schedule. Components wear, resulting in less uniform water application, increased energy use and untimely breakdowns during the already busy irrigation season. Act now to identify and replace worn components so the system is ready when it's needed.

One of the best ways to identify worn components such as the sprinklers or pump is to keep good records. Recording the outlet pressure, flow rate, hours of operation and energy use each month provides an excellent means of evaluating pump and motor performance and identifying changes.

To evaluate system performance, the pivot should be in the same position each time the operating pressure is recorded since the pump will produce different outlet pressures depending on whether the center pivot is facing uphill or downhill. Also, systems that do not

have pressure regulators to maintain sprinkler pressure will have different flow rates. Compare the current flow rate and pressure to last year's and the year's before.

Now also is the best time to test safety switches. Each irrigation system is equipped with a number of safety switches to shut the system down in the case of failure. Run

the system through a set of conditions that should cause each safety control to function.

It's also important to check how efficiently the system is functioning. Periodic pumping plant evaluations will help identify whether the pumping plant is operating at an optimum level. Contact your local well driller to make these arrangements.

The pumping plant evaluation should identify the overall operating efficiency and provide the pump speed, outlet pressure, flow rate and energy use rate. This information will provide a base point to compare with future operating characteristics.

If you have recent pumping plant evaluation results, simply compare the information you collect with the test results to determine if the system is becoming less efficient over time.
