Hotel project is closer to breaking ground

Work could start in 45-60 days

Cobblestone Inns and Suites cleared a significant hurdle in making Wayne the home of one of its newest facilities recently, as the Nebraska Department of Banking and Finance approved Wayne Hospitality Group L.L.C.'s Securities Offering Disclosure Document (SODD).

The result is a culmination of an immense amount of work by the Northeast Nebraska Investors L.L.C. — a for-profit group of local individuals looking to invest in Wayne-area projects — in an attempt to help spur economic growth in the Wayne area.

A hotel feasibility study showed Wayne could use another hotel, and the results of that study were shared with a number of hotel designers. A group out of Wisconsin, ironically called WHG took interest and the Northeast Nebraska Investment Club took flight from there.

The investment club (Northeast Nebraska Investors L.L.C.) purchased nearly four acres of land from Louis Benschoter, behind McDonald's and adjacent to the Fire Hall and coupled with the results of the hotel study, the impetus was in place.

"The investment club bought the land in late 2009," president Kent Franzen said. "The investment club always had an idea for a motel and things just went into motion."

Franzen and the other members of the executive board consisting of Kelvin Wurdeman, Ken Kwapnioski and Kevin Hoffart held numerous meetings with WHG in hopes of making the project a reality.



"WHG likes smaller communities," Kwapnioski said. "That is their niche and Wayne fit nicely." The project pricetag from beginning to end rests at about 2.8 million dollars.

Franzen said it took about 120 days to get all the legal work completed and approved. "The legal owner of the hotel is Wayne Hospitality Group L.L.C.," Franzen said.

There is a myriad of loans that have been applied for and approved to help make this a reality including a USDA rural development loan which is guaranteed along with Tax

Increment Financing (Tif bonds) as well as a LB840 loan. LB840 consists of sales tax receipts of which a portion can be used for economic growth.

Franzen said he believes ground will be broken within 45-60 days. "We have had significant local support from the Wayne community for this project," Franzen said. "It has been fabulous."

Kwapnioski said one thing that attracted his attention to WHG was they use local contractors to do the work. "They (WHG) believe in hiring local folks to build their hotels," Kwapnioski said. "That also lends to stimulating economic growth."

Cobblestone Inns and Suites will house a 44-room facility with a pool and a conference room that can seat nearly 60 people. It will also contain a small bar area, which will serve wine and beer, as well as a convenience store.

A public information meeting for those interested in finding out more about the new hotel will be held Tuesday, Aug. 31 at 7:30 p.m. at the Fire Hall. The meeting is hosted by the Wayne Hospitality Group.

Johanns hears familiar concerns

Nebraska Sen. Mike Johanns visited Wayne Tuesday afternoon and got what is becoming a very familiar message from his constituents: concerns about the budget and health care reform.

The Republican senator said he has taken part in 28 town hall meetings across the state, and he's hearing these concerns at every stop along the way, including Wayne, where a gathering of about 25 local residents chatted with the senator for a little more than an hour.

"We've done about 28 town hall meetings over the last month, and the concerns you heard here are the ones I'm hearing all over, whether it's Omaha, Scottsbluff or Wayne," he said after the meeting. "People are worried about the spending and the federal debt, and people are about 2-to-1 against the health care bill and see it as a massive intrusion of their personal rights and liberties."

"There's a lot of frustration with the Obama administration," he added. "It was billed as a moderate administration, and it's been anything but that. And we have heard that from people all over the state."

Johanns presented charts that illustrated the current budget — projected at more than \$3.5 trillion for fiscal year 2010-11 — compared to projected receipts that fall about \$1.4 trillion short of the budget. He

also showed a chart of the recent history of the federal deficit, which has grown from about \$360 billion in 1970 to more than \$13 trillion today, with projections of close to \$20 trillion by 2015.

"I think we can make the sacrifices

necessary and slow this train down without any outright devastation," Johanns said. "We don't have to go from (\$20 trillion) to (zero) by next year, but you do have to level

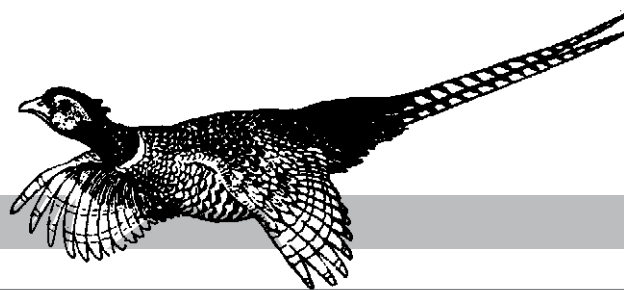

Budget Hearing

The Wayne City Council will hold a budget hearing on Tuesday, Sept. 7 at 5:30 p.m. in the city council room at 306 Pearl Street.

A copy of the Fiscal Year 2010-2011 budget proposal will be available on the city website for public review beginning Friday, Aug. 20. Call our office with comments or questions.

Assumptions in the Proposed City Budget

1) City Property Tax request will remain at about 45 cents per \$100 of property value or lower depending on the final total valuation of property in Wayne.

2) No water rate increase.

3) Residential sewer rates for 2011 will be adjusted every year for each individual house by averaging your monthly water use in

November and December 2010 and January 2011.

This will provide a monthly average that will be used for your sewer bill for the next 12 months.

4) Commercial sewer rates will be based on each month water usage through 2011.

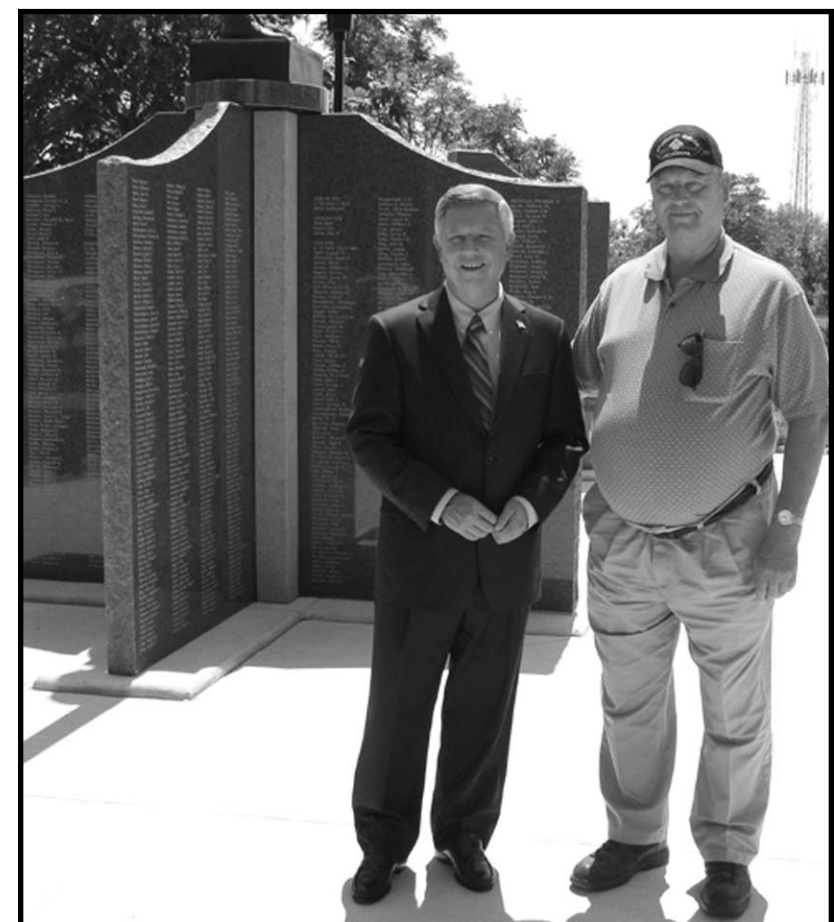
5) Electric rates will be adjusted to pass through any increase in wholesale power costs from NPPD.

Transfer Station Operation

The council approved a two-year operating contract with Gill Hauling to privately operate our transfer station. Gill will take over on Sept. 1. The recycling program will remain the same, and the hours of operation and costs to dump garbage will be about the same. Gill plans to add a glass recycling operation in September.

Magnuson Hopkins Eye professionals give time during Special Olympics

Larry M. Magnuson, OD, Sonja Hansen, CPOA, Lisa Niemann, CPOA and Melia Hefti, CPOA, volunteered for the Opening Eyes vision screening portion of the Healthy athletes program at the Special Olympics National Games in Lincoln the week of July 19-23. Almost 1,000 athletes had their vision screened during Opening Eyes. A total of 564 pairs of prescription eyewear and 353 pairs of sunglasses were distributed to athletes.

Opening Eyes provides diagnosis for vision related problems, as well as corrective and protective eyewear, all free of charge. At the end of the screening, athletes receive a certificate detailing their vision needs and follow-up referrals for health care providers in their home areas, if needed. Athletes are also taught how to take better care of their eyes.

Nebraska Optometric Association (NOA) member optometrists and staff work together with Lions Club volunteers to check to the eyes of Special Olympic Athletes. Research has shown that among Special Olympics athletes, 68 percent have not had an eye examination in three years and 37 percent are in need of

"Being a part of this program was so rewarding," says Dr. Steve Alcorn, Nebraska Opening Eyes Clinical Director. "Whether it was watching an athlete's eyes light up after he put on his glasses and realized how much better he could see or getting a hug from another athlete for her new glasses that replaced her broken ones — it was truly evident that we were affecting lives in a positive way."

City Council is introduced to Wayne firefighter cadets

Several items relating to the Wayne Volunteer Fire Department were among those on the agenda at Tuesday's meeting of the Wayne City Council.

Council members approved the application of Dillon Phillips to the department as a new member.

In addition, Fire Chief Tom Sievers introduced the first two members of the department's recently created Wayne Firefighter Cadet Program. The two, Jacob Stenka and Riley McManus, are students at Wayne High School.

Those in the cadet program will learn of the workings of the department, but will not be allowed to be within a specified distance from an actual fire. The program is designed for youth ages 16-19.

The council also approved a monetary contribution for the fire chief for the year ending in May.

Fire Chief Sievers said the money, which will come as an IRA contribution will be split between the chiefs of the department, fire and rescue, as well as assistant chiefs.

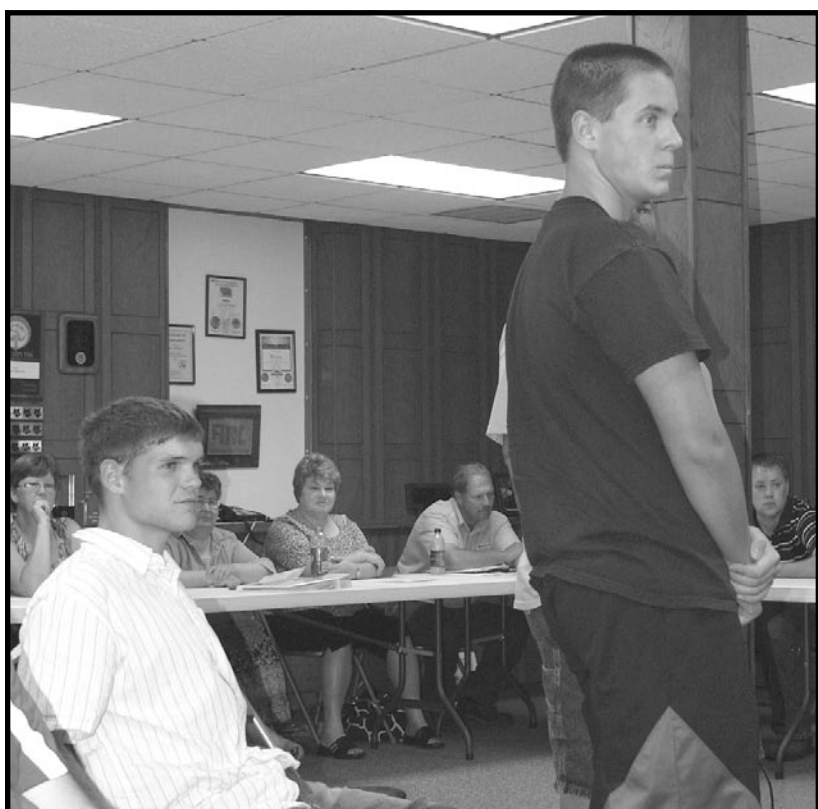
A new ladder truck for the fire department was also discussed during a budget work session at the end of Tuesday's meeting.

Council also approved a use-by-exception request for David and Connie Stuthman to construct a two-family dwelling at 721 Windom Street. Discussion was held on the drainage on the property, as the owners of the property adjacent to the Stuthmanns was concerned with the natural flow of water off the Stuthmann's property to theirs.

Three ordinances were passed and the three readings of each waived for the creation of street improvement, water extension and sewer extension districts for the Benschoter Addition in the eastern area of Wayne.

The street improvement district will extend Tomar Drive to the south past the Cobblestone Inns and Suites property and extend Fourth Street to the east to an intersection with the newly created Jaxon Street.

An agreement was approved between the city and Gill Hauling for the operation of the Wayne Transfer Station and Recycling Center.

The agreement will mean that the Transfer Station will continue to operate as it has in the past, with the possibility of adding additional hours. In addition, effective Sept. 1, Gill Hauling will be accepting glass at the recycling center.

Council members heard an update from Roger Protzman with JEO Consultants on the future of the sludge lagoon near the wastewater treatment facility.

Protzman told the council that the city received a letter from the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), questioning what the city had been doing with the sludge since 1995 when the city had the lagoon classified as a "sludge holding lagoon" that would need to have sludge removed every two years.

However, the city has not removed any sludge during that time frame and the EPA has now implemented a time frame for the city to become compliant with regulations or be fined.

Council members voted unanimously to take measures to comply with the EPA regulations by the 2013 deadline.

Considerable debate was also held on the request for a second

three month extension to obtain an occupancy permit on two lots in Western Ridge II Subdivision.

Lou Benschoter, President of Benschoter Plumbing and Heating told the council that the two homes are "basically done" and at least one should be occupied by Labor Day.

Council member Brian Frevert was not in favor of granting the extension without a penalty.

"We had a similar situation in 2005 and we levied a fine to the property owner. If we aren't going to do the same thing now, should we just throw out the requirements that the house be completed in one year," Frevert said.

Council member Doug Sturm said his recollection of the 2005 case involved the city and county losing tax money because the home was not completed. In the current situation, the homes will be completed before the next time property is assessed (Dec. 31, 2010).

Following debate, the council, acting as the Community Development Agency, voted 6-2 to grant the extension. Council member Dale Alexander and Brian Frevert voted against the extension.

Area departments train on natural gas fire safety

Nebraska natural gas service provider Black Hills Energy conducted natural gas fire safety training Tuesday for the Wayne Volunteer Fire Department and four other fire departments from the surrounding area. The Wayne department hosted the event at its station.

Approximately 45 area firefighters from the Wayne Volunteer Fire Department and fire departments in Winside, Wakefield, Winnebago and Jackson/Dakota City participated in the natural gas education and safety training session led by Black Hills Energy's natural gas operations trainers.

The training provided firefighters the opportunity to practice techniques to effectively contain and extinguish actual natural gas fires under controlled circumstances using portable fire extinguishers and hose streams.

"Although natural gas is a safe fuel, and fires are rare, experience is the best way to learn how to fight this type of fire, and it's much better to gain that experience during a training exercise instead of during an actual emergency," said Scott Zaruba, operations manager, North Region, Black Hills Energy. "This training is a partnership between Black Hills Energy and the local fire departments in a joint effort

to protect the public. These sessions provide firefighters with the experience they need to effectively extinguish these types of fires if one should ever occur."

The Wayne training session was one of a series of fire safety seminars that Black Hills Energy has offered to firefighters throughout Nebraska for a number of years.

Training sessions about natural gas releases and fires provide hands-on experience and instruction for firefighters.

These sessions also educate firefighters about the various characteristics of natural gas so they can safely and effectively manage potential natural gas incidents in the future.

In one exercise, firefighters used hose streams and chemical extinguishers to put out ignited natural gas fueled by an open gas pipe underneath an old automobile.

In another, they practiced additional techniques to safely contain and extinguish different types of natural gas fires, including simulated pipeline punctures.

School board to hold special meeting at Wayne Elementary

Buildings will be the topic of discussion at a special Wayne Board of Education meeting that will take place Monday.

The special meeting, set for 7 p.m. at the Wayne Elementary School gymnasium, will focus on options the district need to look at regarding the current elementary school building.

A recent facility audit noted a number of ADA updates and improvements that are needed at the elementary school, which was built in 1959. Preliminary estimates put the cost of those needed improvements at around \$1.8 million.

Superintendent Mark Lenihan told the Herald that Monday's meeting will focus on possible ideas

for expansion and future building needs. He said the board and public will have an opportunity to talk about remodeling and/or expanding the current elementary school, or

the possibility of new construction. No action will be taken at Monday's meeting, but the public is encouraged to attend and provide feedback to board members.

company approves the claim, it will set a bad precedent.

"If insurance pays on it, it's going to be bad," he said. "We have to open the roads, and unfortunately when there's that much snow there's not much you can do about it. If we settle this one case, then look out."

Wurdemann said that most of the land owners in the county are local residents who understand the issue of snow removal, but those who live outside the region don't share the idea of being neighborly.

"More of these absentee owners are coming in and they don't care about the neighbor down the road that is snowed in and has to get out," he said. "The snow has to be moved off the road, and where are you going to put it where there is as much as what we had last winter?"

Wurdemann had a simple alternative to paying the claim in question.

"Take us to court," he said.

The board also approved a proposal to continue working with the Gary Pavel CPA firm out of Lincoln for the county's audit, but not without first hearing concerns from a county official on what was viewed as unprofessional treatment.

Deb Allemann-Dannelly, Clerk of the District Court, said a representative of the firm that she worked with last year told her she was asked for a report that she was unaware of.

"He asked about an end of year report, and I had no clue what he was talking about," Allemann-Dannelly told the board. "He said I was letting the people of Wayne County down, and to this day I don't know what (report) he wanted. I don't know if I caught him on an off day or what."

County Clerk Deb Finn told the board that the county has been very comfortable with the work the CPA firm has done, although the county does more work for the firm than other counties they contract with.

it off and bring it down and sustain that over time."

"By the time I took the Ag Secretary job, we were putting money in cash reserve and weren't paying back any debt. (Gov.) Heineman didn't have to say that

Johanns borrowed a billion dollars, because we didn't have any debt."

Johanns was also critical of the health care reform package passed by Congress and signed by Obama late last year.

"A 2,700-page bill is a train with too many cars on it," he said. "I'm not arguing there aren't some things in the health care agreement that would benefit from a thoughtful, careful, step-by-step approach, but the idea that we're going to reform the entire health care system is getting us in trouble."

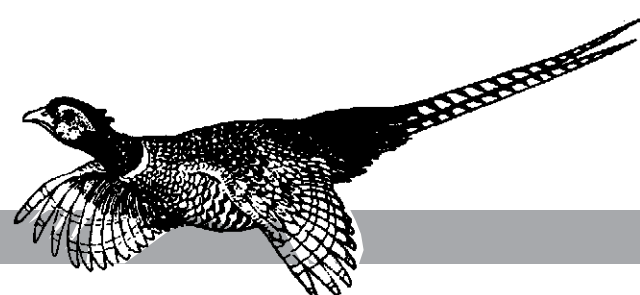

If it all adds up, bring baseball back to WHS

When it comes to covering local sports, The Bleacher Bum never gets enough.

I've been a sports fan for as long as I can remember, so when I'm at a local sporting event, I'm there more because I enjoy watching athletes perform than I am in a working capacity (although I do actually work during these events, if that's what you call taking photos, keeping stats and talking to players and coaches).

I'm also a big fan of baseball, so when word came down that the Wayne Baseball Association was going to ask the Wayne Board of Education to reinstate baseball as a varsity high school sport, the sports fan in me was thrilled.

The grouchy, realistic, taxpaying part of me, though, has some concerns that the board might want to consider before green-lighting an additional activity on the Wayne High athletic agenda.

My biggest concern, which I'm sure is shared by those involved with track and golf, is the effect adding baseball would have on those sports.

Jacki Zeiss, who led the presentation at the Aug. 9 school board meeting, said that 23 kids have expressed interest in playing high school baseball. Of those 23, only seven were not planning on going out for track or golf.

The question, then, is what kind of effect will the departure of those 16 kids who are either on the track or golf team have on those sports? Some of the athletes who would play baseball were contributors in varsity meets for both sports last year. And while they weren't the top scoring athletes (or lowest scoring in golf), their

absence will have something of a negative impact on next year's track and golf teams.

Of particular interest is the boys golf team, which has had a long history of success. While they failed to make it to state this past spring, they have been a regular in the state tournament for well over 30 years, and there will be a noticeable drop-off if enough of the current varsity golfers switch from Big Berthas to Louisville Sluggers.

That being said, their departure wouldn't kill either program. Granted, each team has some athletes that would contribute to the effort this coming spring, and there will be a noticeable, but temporary, drop-off for each sport, but both sports, I believe, should continue to be competitive in the future.

The second concern I have is financing for the new program. I'm impressed that the Wayne Baseball Association is offering to provide a good chunk of the start-up costs, including uniforms, and that will offset some of the expenses the school will face in getting the program up and running for the first time since 1984.

The question is – how long can the Wayne Baseball Association help fund the program? You can't expect the WBA to put up the money to help run the high school program, especially when it has its own programs to grow and develop. Ultimately, the taxpayers will have to pay for the coaches, umpires, travel costs and

equipment. With the budget concerns the district will be facing in future years (if the Legislature follows through with promised cuts in state aid to education), does the district need any additional expenses at this time?

The third question I have concerns the future. At the present time, there are 23 kids who want to play high school baseball. If you've seen these kids play during the Pony and Legion seasons, you know these young men are very good and have represented Wayne well on the diamond this summer.

Once these kids go through the program and graduate from Wayne High, though, will there be enough to keep the program viable? A head count from our recent photo section of local summer sports teams found 117 kids (minus those who were absent when team photos were taken) in ages from 5-14. That's an average of about 12 kids per age, or 48 in an average four-year group of kids.

In order to have a solid program, you're going to need at least 20 kids signed up every year. That means Wayne Public Schools will need to see its enrollment stay at its current numbers or improve slightly, year to year, to keep enough kids in each of the athletic programs the school offers. If half of those 48 play baseball, that leaves only 24 to go out for track or golf.

Starting a program is the easy part – having enough numbers to keep the program going years into the future is probably the biggest challenge the district would have. Wayne's future numbers of male students, looking at last year's enrollment numbers, appear to be pretty stable in the short term, with the smallest numbers of boys coming in this year's seventh (29) and eighth (27) grade classes, compared to this year's seniors (39), juniors (31) and sophomores (36). After that, the numbers go back up.

Wayne has a proud tradition when it comes to baseball. When the sport was in the school, Wayne won three state titles and finished as runner-up twice. Their Legion program has been quite successful and won numerous state championships over the years, and the Juniors finished third in Class B this summer.

However, tradition and history are not the anchors you can use to make this decision. If Wayne High is to bring baseball back, there should be enough interest, the finances should be in place for the school to fund the program (although the WBA's offer is a very generous one that should be applauded), and there should be enough enrollment at the younger levels that will be there to feed the program well into the future.

I'd love to see baseball make a comeback at Wayne High School, and I hope we can see the first pitch this coming spring. For the sake of the sport, and the school, I hope that the Board of Education gets the answers to the questions that are needed to make it the kind of program the entire community can be proud of.

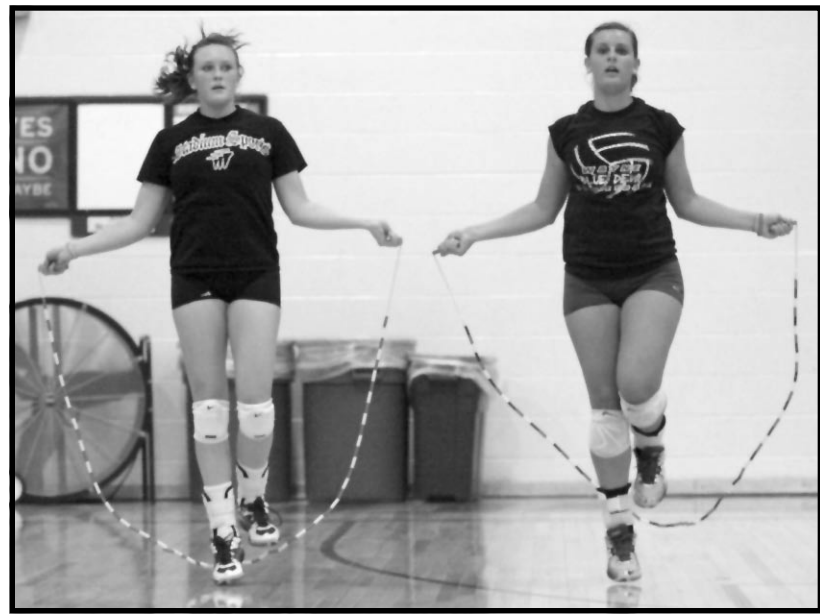

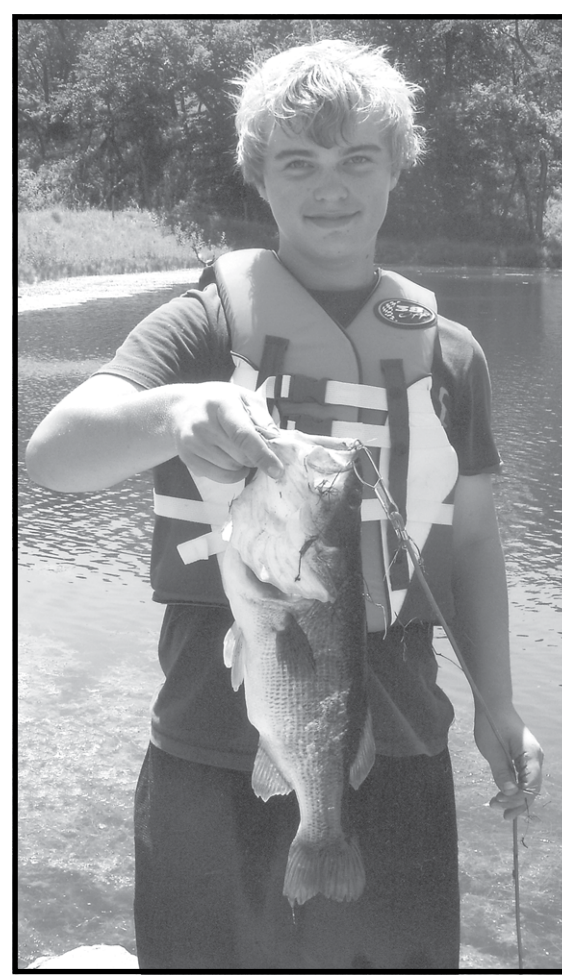
Softball camp set for Sept. 19

WSC volleyball picked fourth in NSIC

Wayne State has been selected to finish fourth in the 2010 NSIC Preseason Volleyball coaches poll released Thursday.

The Wildcats received a total of 136 points in voting conducted by the league's coaches. Three time defending national champion Concordia-St. Paul was selected as the pre-season choice with 11 of a possible 14 first place votes and 166 points.

Minnesota Duluth had two first place votes and 147 points, followed by Minnesota State with the remaining first place vote and 142 points in third.

Wayne State's player to watch in the NSIC this season is Jennifer Hefner, a Central City graduate. Last year, Hefner earned second-team AVCA All-American status and was a first-team selection to the ESPN The Magazine Academic All-American team. She averaged 3.72 kills and 1.22 blocks per set

while hitting .326 for the season. She led the NSIC in blocks, ranked second in points per set (4.66), was third in kills and seventh in hitting percentage. Hefner ranked 12th in NCAA Div. II in blocks per set.

The Wildcats were 29-8 last year, advancing to the NCAA Div. II National Tournament for the fifth straight season. WSC ended the year ranked No. 18 in NCAA Div. II, the highest ever ranking for a Wildcat volleyball program to end the season.

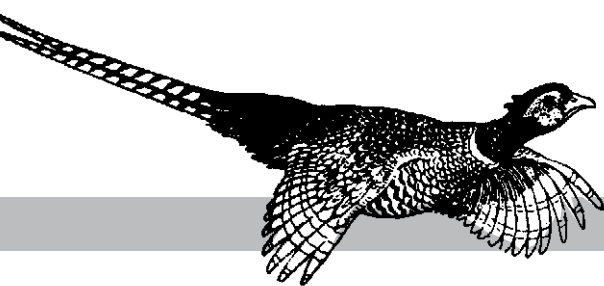

Instead of cuts, can exemptions

The state of Nebraska will start its next fiscal year more than three-quarters of a billion dollars in the hole.

Since the state constitution requires a balanced budget be set by the Legislature, the big question that is being asked is: how will this issue be addressed in the coming year?

Since our esteemed leader, Gov. Dave Heineman, is up for re-election, he is going to take the easy way out and tell us all that he intends to impose further cuts on the state's budget and veto any tax increase that the Legislature might come up with.

Hey, Dave – you're a Republican governor in a state where the Democrat party is, to put it in kind terms, a joke. You don't need to play the "budget cut" card in this coming election.

The Legislature is already looking at making significant cuts in important areas, such as state aid to education, an area that should be looked at, in my opinion, only as an absolute last resort.

School districts across the state have been helped out by stimulus funds made possible through the generosity of the Obama regime, which seems bent on spending us into oblivion. Heineman wasn't a fan of the funds, yet accepted the funding and used it to minimize cuts in state aid to education.

Those funds, however, won't be available after this fiscal year, and the Legislature is looking at having to make significant cuts in funding local school districts. Wayne Public Schools, for example, is looking at a \$141,000 cut in state aid this year, which means the district will have to get very creative in adjusting its budget, including the possibility of reducing its work force, including eliminating teachers who educate our students.

Of course, Heineman isn't interested in raising property or income taxes to help meet the shortfall, and if it were a few million dollars we were talking about, I'd see no problem with making up the difference solely through budget cuts. Even with the prohibitive advantage he holds against his Democrat opponent (what was his name again??), raising property or income taxes in an election year is never a good platform to run on.

The problem is, we're talking more than \$750 million here. This isn't chump change – it's a significant part of the state's budget, which was \$3.3 billion last fiscal year, or about 25 percent of the gap we face for next fiscal year.

That's where the tax exemptions come in. There are more than 27 pages worth of exemptions in the state statute books, exempting everything from lottery tickets to prepaid telephone services from the state's sales tax.

In Nebraska, you don't have to pay sales tax on purchase of fine art by a museum; semen used in ranching, farming or commercial

use; or aircraft fuel. The Nebraska State Fair Board is exempt from paying sales taxes, as are state and local governments.

Earlier this month, Omaha mayor Jim Suttle raised the idea of removing the exemption for grocery items, setting off a firestorm of criticism for taxing budgets of low-income residents who are already having a heck of a time making ends meet in this economy.

And while I'm not a fan of removing the sales tax exemption on my groceries, there are a slew of exemptions on here that, by themselves or in combination, could get rid of the budget shortfall and put the state's budget easily in the black, which would make it possible for the state to actually – dare I say it? – lower property and/or income taxes.

Exemptions on the sale of property that is intended for resale, rental or lease, alone, are worth more than \$1.6 billion, more than double the \$750 million shortfall. Exemptions on property that becomes part of property manufactured for resale costs the state more than \$800 million a year.

Of course, those who benefit from such exemptions are going to raise holy you-know-what with the Legislature, and their lobbyists will be tripping over each other trying to be the first to tell our "representatives" why they shouldn't have their exemptions lifted.

The time has come, though, for the state to take a good, long look at some of these exemptions. Some, like purchases made by state or local governments (to the tune of more than \$232 million annually), would eventually be passed on to consumers or taxpayers. Some exemptions, like those for the State Fair Board and purchases of fine art by a museum (both of which are an absolute laugh riot), could be eliminated with little or no effect on the average consumer.

It doesn't take a rocket scientist to play the budget-cutting card to win votes in an election year. My nephew's dog could easily win in November running on that platform (especially when the opponent is a no-name attorney from Scottsbluff who is a last-minute replacement for another no-name candidate).

If Heineman – who told the Omaha World-Herald removing exemptions is a "non-starter" – wants to establish himself as a true leader who is willing to make the tough decisions, though, he'll go after some of the billions of dollars in sales tax exemptions, rather than slash into the meat of the state's budget, in an effort to get Nebraska's budget in the black for the next fiscal year.

Granted, it's not an idea that would be politically correct. It would require actual leadership and determination – which would be refreshing to see in a politician looking for my vote this November.

Nelson election two years off

LINCOLN – Week after week it still seems fantastic.

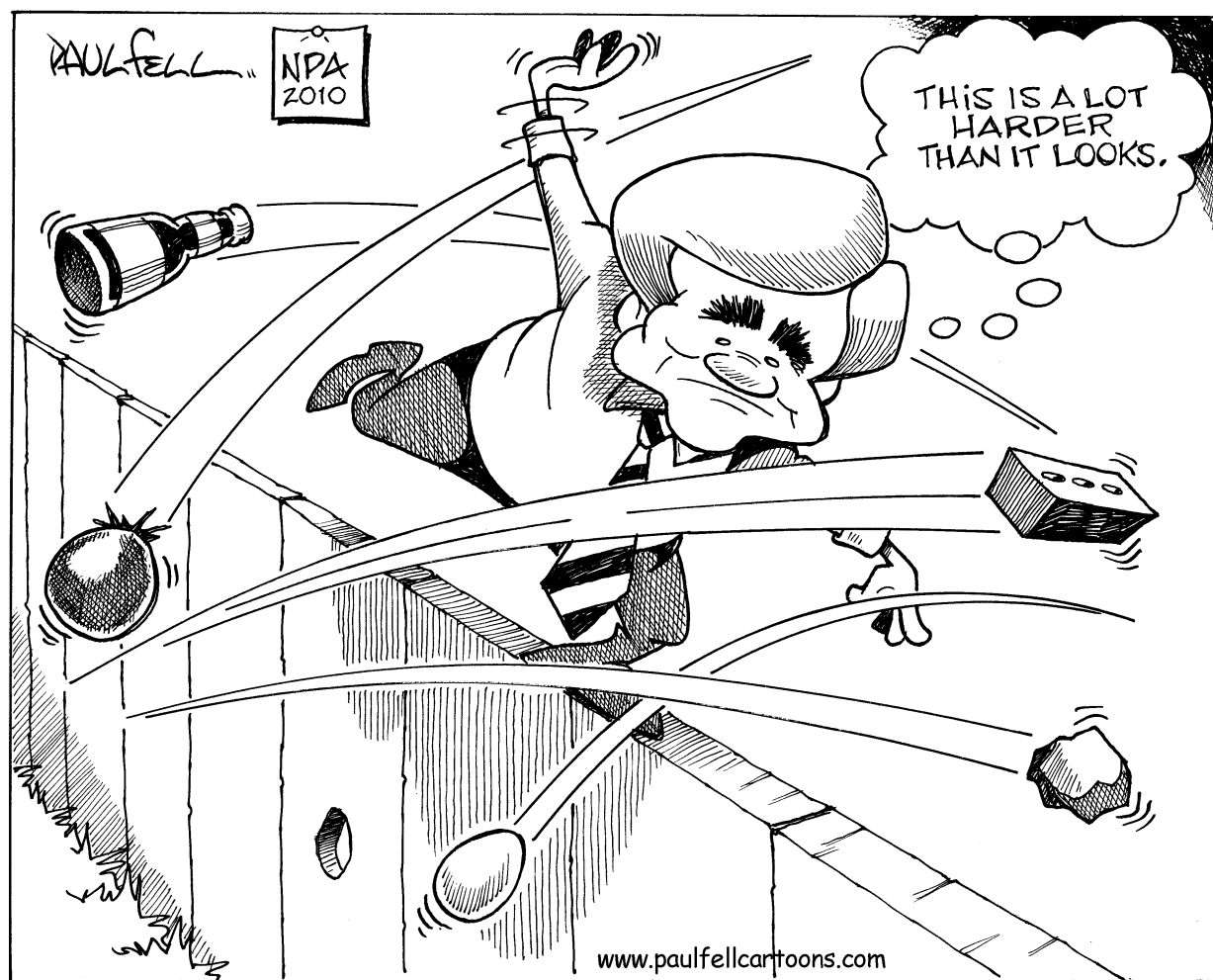
You could easily get the impression that the 2012 election is coming up in November.

U.S. Ben Nelson, the lone Democrat in Nebraska's congressional delegation, is pushing daily, through news releases, interviews and speeches, to extol his policy decisions. Think of him as an undeclared candidate for re-election who figures he needs a running start at selling voters on his record – more than two full years before election day.

As noted previously in this space, at no time in recent memory has a campaign for national office centered so much on traditionally local issues. And never has such been the case with voting day more than 24 months off. Think about that – 24 months away!

Nelson voted for a recently enacted measure to throw another \$123 million in federal stimulus dollars to cash-strapped Nebraska. It would/could help cover the ever-increasing costs of state aid to education and the state's share of Medicaid costs. State senators and legislative departments continue to spend uncounted hours looking for ways to reduce spending. (Aside: Will lawmakers eventually consider cutting their own office staffs?) That's quite a sum for a state facing a \$751 million revenue shortfall for the coming two-year budget cycle. This, at a time when local governments are up against it financially.

Nelson has repeatedly reminded Nebraskans that federal money that provides state aid to schools is



money that can hold down increases in local property taxes. No political button has consistently been hotter than local property taxes, but it has been an issue in the state Capitol, rather than the nation's Capital.

However, questions remain about whether federal mandates concerning their use would be excessively odious. Nelson's problem: He wants to pre-empt the opposition from taking bows for the good things the money might do, while condemning him as an irresponsible spender for

making those dollars available.

All of this reflects a political chess game involving Nelson and his GOP critics, including incumbent Republican Gov. Dave Heineman, a potential challenger for Nelson's seat in that distant 2012 election. Nelson has regularly noted Heineman and the Legislature used stimulus money to balance the state's budget this year; and he has criticized Heineman for not seeing that more of those dollars went to local governments, particularly to help hold down local

property taxes.

Obviously, Nelson can hardly cast any vote critics won't condemn. Again, such has always been the nature of politics, Republican or Democrat. His votes against the confirmation of Elena Kagan's appointment to the U.S. Supreme Court, and for extension of the Bush tax cuts, will be ballyhooed in his re-election effort as proof of his conservative views, reflective of the state's conservative bent.

And the band plays on – a full two years before the election.

Trade mission looks at opportunities

Dear Fellow Nebraskans,

This week, a delegation of Nebraska agriculture and commodity group representatives led by Nebraska Agriculture Director Greg Ibach took part in a trade mission to Taiwan and Hong Kong. The purpose of the visit was to explore opportunities to secure agricultural exports in two international markets important to Nebraska.

We negotiated a deal that is expected to result in \$436 to \$516 million in purchases of Nebraska commodities in the next two years. This is the largest export agreement ever negotiated on behalf of the state.

Nebraska corn, soybean and wheat representatives signed a letter of intent to provide up to one million metric tons of corn, and at least 300,000 tons of soybeans and 500,000 tons of wheat to Taiwan importers which will be processed for soybean oil, tofu and other soy-based products, feed for livestock and the flour needed for noodles and bread products.



Maintaining relationships with our international trading partners is a priority. This trade mission was an opportunity to revisit business contacts made three years ago during our last trade mission to several Asian markets. Taiwan and Hong Kong are two markets that rely on imported commodities to fulfill food needs.

The visit to Hong Kong focused on promoting Nebraska beef. During a trade mission three years ago, the Chinese Cuisine Training Institute agreed to use Nebraska beef in its classes for Hong Kong and mainland China chefs. The delegation returned to the culinary school during this visit where student chefs have the opportunity to work with quality meats in their training. We want Nebraska beef to be the first choice for these graduates as they move on in their professional careers.

Another promotion featuring

Nebraska beef has been taking place this year at the Disneyland resort in Hong Kong, which since Christmas has been featuring Nebraska and U.S. beef in its restaurants. We are working hard to expand market share in Asian countries. These promotions help remind customers of the consistent quality of U.S. and Nebraska beef as we attempt to regain our position as the provider of choice in these important markets.

Nebraska farmers are experienced in producing for a global market. Taiwan and Hong Kong are important trading partners for Nebraska agriculture. In 2009, Hong Kong was Nebraska's fifth largest agricultural trade partner. Taiwan was our eighth largest international market.

I applaud the work of the Nebraska Department of Agriculture in securing this new commitment for exports. The sales agreement negotiated represents a significant opportunity that is good news for farmers and our state economy.

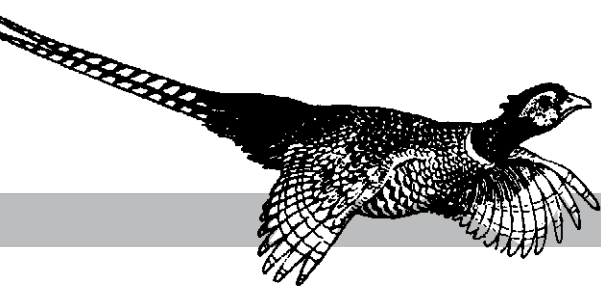

Don't make the list too long so that it is impossible to accomplish everything. At the end of the day when everyone has reached their goals, the family will have a sense of accomplishment that helps relieve stress.

Parents should be realistic about what really needs to be done before school. Instead of cramming everything into the last few weeks of summer, maybe some clothes shopping and the dentist appointments can wait until a few weeks into school. If children are stressed about going back to school, parents should sit down with them and discuss how they can solve the problems. Instead of trying to find three

new outfits for school, maybe they can get one outfit now and find the rest later.

Children already worry out about fitting in and doing well in school, so parents need to be careful not to stress out children even more. It is good to encourage children to succeed academically, but avoid putting too many expectations on children. Stressed children are more likely to perform poorly, which will then just lead to even more stress.

Parents should be supportive of children and help them work towards attainable goals. When they reach these goals or overcome a stressful situation, parents should let their children know they are proud of them. Celebrate students' successes and let them know they have done well.

Parents can also sit down with their children and map out their weekly schedule. Sometimes stu-

dents do not realize that playing football and soccer while working a small job and being in 4-H is going to stress them out. Instead of telling children they cannot do something and making them angry, sit down and show them how busy they will be. Do they want to have time to relax, watch TV and hang out with friends? And don't forget all those chores they have to do. It is much easier and productive to guide children through the decision-making process instead of immediately telling them no.

Finally, just don't schedule as much to do at the end of the summer. Get the important tasks done early and leave the others until after school starts. Stress creates a feeling of loneliness, but families

members can work together to help each other through hectic times. Spend the last weeks of summer relaxing and having fun together and going back to school will be much less stressful for everyone.

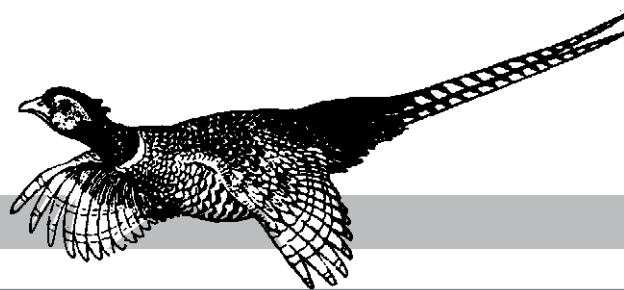

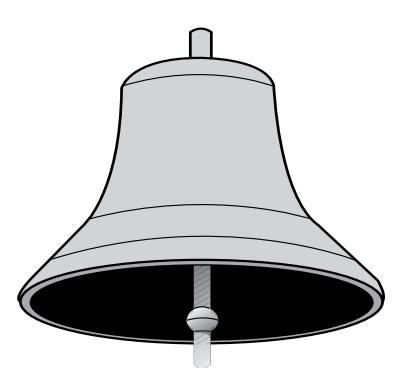

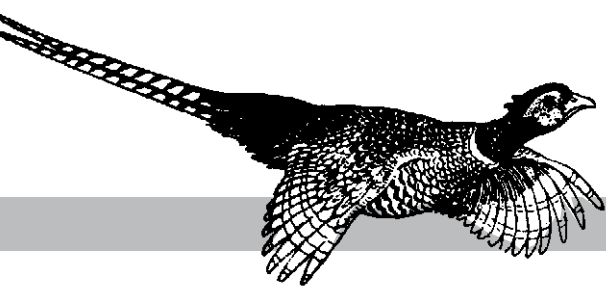

Story of 'singing revolution' needs to be told

Some of you may recall that I wrote about a YouTube video showing Hungarians dancing in the public square in Budapest on Resurrection Sunday. I've had subsequent communication regarding the events that led up to that public display of Christianity in a formerly Communist country. A lot of it had to do with people praying for their country.

Some of you may even remember my writing about the fall of the Berlin Wall, which was preceded by Christians in East Germany meeting to pray, light candles, and process out of St. Timothy church.

The latest edition of Archways, the Nebraska Wesleyan magazine, has an amazing story called the Singing Revolution. It reviews for us the story of the Soviet tanks and troops that pushed into Estonia in 1991. Estonia is a tiny Baltic state of 1.3 million and there was an independence movement going on there.

The freedom movement took hold in the late 1980s at a music festival in Tallinn, Estonia's capital. This is no Woodstock. Tens of thousands audition to perform in Estonia's 30,000 member chorus, which sings together on a single stage at the national festivals.

The festival is called laulupidu, and dates back to 1869, but it changed dramatically under Soviet rule. The nationalistic folk songs were replaced by some which praised the Soviet state. If they sang the old songs, they could be arrested and sent to Siberia.

The nationalistic folk songs went underground. As the Soviet Union weakened, they came trickling back to the surface. When they

resurfaced at concerts and festivals, the police had a hard time stopping them. So, they brought in the tanks.

But what are tanks to a million voices singing? The nationalists sought assistance from an attorney and he comments that it was a time in Washington that no one wanted to ruffle Gorbachev's feathers. But when he told the senators about the brave stand the young Estonians were taking, they helped the "good guys".

The article also shows a photo of something called The Baltic

Way, which took place in 1989, the year that the wall came down. One million people held hands to form a human chain stretching across Estonia, Latvia, and Lithuania. It was a simple demonstration of a united independence movement, and it caught the world's attention.

The article also retells a story of a group of Estonians who fled the country in 1944, when Germany and Russia both invaded. Their boat was torpedoed, but the last thing they did was to sing their national anthem. The music teachers of our country have introduced the national anthem project, designed to teach it to every student. When we attend concerts at Norris High, they begin with the anthem. Music is powerful! And a "singing revolution" is such a powerful story, one that needs to be told and retold.

Small wind turbines can help reduce energy bills

Are you thinking about adding a wind turbine to your acreage, farm or business? Here are some thoughts from John Hay, Extension Educator-Energy and Shirley Niemeyer, Extension Housing and Environment Specialist. Wind turbines generate "green" energy and can help reduce electricity bills. However, homeowners, farmers and businesses should ask themselves several questions before deciding if a wind turbine is right for them.

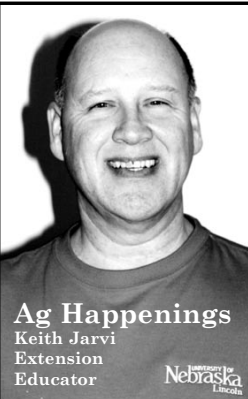
First, people should look at their electricity load and see if there are any other areas where they can reduce their energy use. In the long term, taking simple steps to reduce the energy load can result in more savings than installing a small wind turbine. It is also important to make sure that the site is big enough for a turbine and there are no zoning laws that could restrict wind generators or tall buildings.

After deciding that a turbine is an appropriate investment, people should determine which design and size of turbine will best suit their load. A new certification process for small wind turbines has been written by the Small Winds Certification Council based on the standards of the American Wind Energy Association.

This new rating system has standardized measurements of output, making it easier for buyers to determine which turbines best fit their needs.

It is important to question manufacturers about the installation, capabilities and testing results of turbines. Wind turbine installers should also be questioned about their experience, turbine maintenance and total costs of installation.

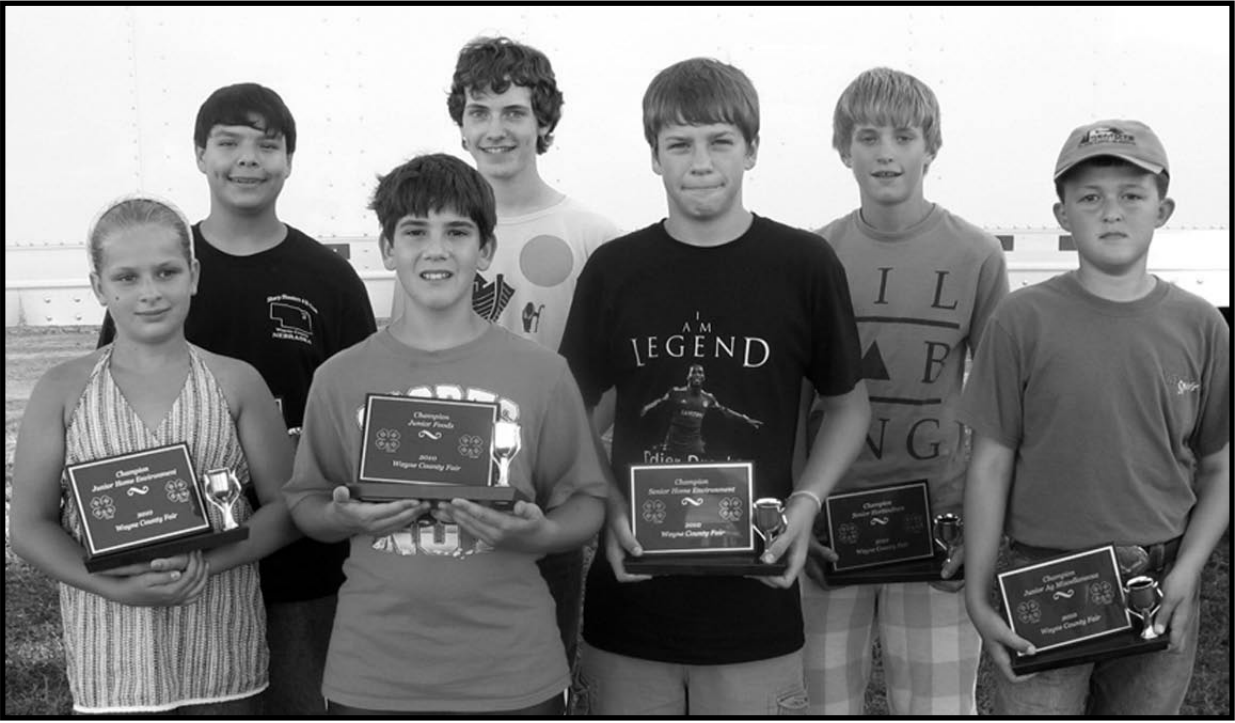
