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School gets public input on building options

Renovation, consolidation and new building considered

Doing nothing is not an option.

Superintendent Mark Lenihan presented a series of options for the elementary school to a crowd of about 80 local residents, including several elementary school teachers, during a special meeting with the Wayne Board of Education Monday night.

Of primary concern is the 51-year-old elementary building, which is in dire need of roof replacement and a host of other issues. Four options were presented for the community to consider, but Lenihan stressed that something needed to be done to take care of issues at the elementary building.

"Not doing anything isn't an option," Lenihan told those in attendance. "(The kids) deserve the best facility they can have so they can learn in a 21st century environment," he said. "It's important to make kids the top priority in any decision we can make. We want to make sure they are in a safe facility that meets their needs.

A tour of the elementary building was conducted at the start of Monday's meeting, as principal Daryl Schrunk gave board members, administration and those in attendance a closer look at some of the problems the building has, including leaks that have rotted out ceiling tile and exposed wiring in different parts of the building, including the hallway.

After a tour of the facility, Lenihan discussed the findings of a recent building audit and offered four options for the board to

Lenihan told those in attendance that the school district is trying to take a proactive approach in informing residents about the issues the district is facing with its elementary building.

"The board has been very open and wanting to meet with the public on this, because they want your feedback," he said.

The first option, which seemed to be the least popular, was a patch-up renovation of the elementary building, which would include a new roof, at a cost of somewhere between \$1.31 million and \$1.48 million.

The second option would be to renovate the existing structure and add on between 3,500 and 12,000 square feet, at a cost between \$1.8 million and \$3.16 million.

The third option, which received the most discussion both for and against, was to consolidate the district into two buildings, with students in grades K-6 going to the current middle school and kids in grades 7-8 moving to the high school. An addition to the high school would be constructed. The total cost for renovations to the high school and middle school would be between \$3.9 million and \$4.3 million.

Lenihan said that the district would see some cost savings in a consolidation of staff, particularly in the amount of time and energy spent with some staff members traveling back and forth between two buildings, at a cost equal to that of a full-time teacher's salary.

Enrollment up slightly for 2010-11

As tuition increases and state aid wanes, Wayne State College saw marginal gains in enrollment, specifically from the transfer student sector.

Wayne State recorded an approximately 3 percent increase in freshman enrollment. This figure is up 14 students from 664 in fall 2009 to 678 this fall.

Fewer new transfer students this year enrolled at Wayne State. Robert McCue, vice president of academic affairs, attributes this to "the rising costs of higher education in the Nebraska State college system compared to community

colleges in the region."

The fall 2010 enrollment for community colleges in Nebraska recorded a 16 percent increase overall. "This increase in community college students is certainly a factor in our taking less transfer students this semester," relates McCue.

Total enrollment to date for Wayne State's fall semester is 3,705.

As Curt Frey steps up to accept the position of interim president at Wayne State College, the search begins for a permanent replacement.

The college's various senates – faculty, staff and student - have been soliciting for volunteers to be on the search committee.

"An advertisement for the open president position is currently being drafted," explains Jay Collier, director of public relations

Once the search committee is fully formed and the position is officially open, the process of narrowing the pool of applicants will begin. Following these steps, the committee will commence either telephone or in-person interviews to further narrow the pool. The finalists are then brought to campus for a tour and in-depth analysis by the committee

Theater fundraising gets closer to \$530,000 goal

The new doors are in at The Majestic Theater, but it will still be some time before they can be opened for a movie.

Fundraising for the project has gone well, with grants totaling \$220,000 and an additional \$200,000 in private funds being raised so far. The committee overseeing the theater renovation is about \$110,000 short of the \$530,000 needed to complete construction work and have the theater ready to open for business.

Renovation is ongoing at the theater, and plans have been to have the theater open by Christmas of this year, but for that to happen, the fundraising needs to be completed.

The Project Majestic committee is seeking contributions, both financial and volunteer labor, from people in the community to help bring a movie theater back to Wayne and have a live stage for the Community Theater Group to perform. Volunteers will be needed soon to help with cleaning and painting.

Committee representatives said that unexpected expenses, like the lack of insulation in the building and Nebraska Department of Roads requirements for adjusting the facade and marquee, have added to the budget, but the committee has been able to keep within its original budget

The committee hopes to have fundraising completed by the end of September to keep with their hopes of a late 2010 opening date. Announcements regarding the theater will be made on KTCH and posted in the Wayne Morning Shopper, but now is the time for those who have "been meaning to give" to send in their checks.

Wayne Police are investigating a burglary at the White Horse gas station that took place sometime late Tuesday evening.






Staff recognition





Revenues to the General Fund

We receive about \$2.4 million each year of unobligated revenues for operating the police, recreation, activity center street, parks, library, Senior Center departments.

Most of our operating revenue comes from the following sources: 1) \$611,000 from city property

2) \$335,000 Equalization Fund revenues allocated to Wayne from state taxes on insurance premi-

3) \$311,000 allocated to Wayne by Nebraska Department of Roads from gasoline taxes;

4) \$472,000 in franchise fees from the city electric department;

5) \$78,000 in franchise fees from the city water and sewer depart-

6) \$200,000 in franchise fees from natural gas, cable TV, telephone and cell phone;

7) The rest comes from miscella-



Highway 116 bridge work set to begin

Weather permitting, concrete deck repair will begin August 30 on the Highway 116 Bridge near Concord, according to the Nebraska Department of Roads.

The bridge is located 6/10 of a mile east of the junction of Highways 15

The bridge will be closed to through traffic for approximately three weeks. Traffic will follow a marked detour on Highway N-15 and US Highway 20.

Upon completion of this project, the contractor will move to the N-116 Bridge at the south edge of Dixon. Work at this second location will include piling repair, remodeling the bridge rail and guardrail

Traffic on the N-116 bridge, south of Dixon, will be maintained with lane closures and a 12' width limit. This work is anticipated to take two to three weeks.

Christenson Brothers, Inc., of Cherokee, Iowa, is the contractor performing the work. The Roads Department manager for this project is Bob Wiebelhaus, of Hartington. Motorists should drive safely through highway work

The final option was the building of a new facility. While the other options presented could be done within the board's budget, a new building would require a bond issue that would be put before voters some time in the spring of 2011. If approved, construction of a new building would cost somewhere between \$7 million and \$9 million, Lenihan said, and the district could use Build America Bonds, which carry a 35 percent rebate on the interest that could be applied to the principal.

Board member Rod Garwood said the first option was nothing more than a "band-aid" that

doesn't address the needs at the elementary school. And while he appeared to favor building a new building, he expressed concern that voters might not want to pay for a new building at this time.

"What are the odds we could pass a bond issue right now? I don't think it could get done," he said. "With today's economy and the public mood, I don't think it would pass. So then we're back to spending (money) on this old gal to get through. I don't hate this building, but it's just not adequate

Board member Dr. Jeryl Nelson added, "If we went for the bond issue and it didn't pass, then you're down to doing it through the building fund and doing things in a piecemeal fashion."

Lenihan said that Monday's meeting was strictly an informational meeting, and that no plans have been made at this time for any construction, whether it's to renovate the elementary or build a new building.

"Right now, all we want is feedback. There are no plans drawn. These are just options and it's open for discussion," he said. "Funding is a big issue because of the current (economic) situation, but there are no plans or designs right now."

Dr. Felber ready to retire after 23 years serving area


On Sept. 1, Dr. Dave Felber will retire from family practice.







DHHS decision hurts area's disabled people

It is with a heavy heart that I announce a devastating loss to the residents of Northeast Nebraska.

After two months of meetings, hearings and discussion the Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) has decided to stand by their decision to cancel their contracts with Goodwill Industries and Ability Building Services (ABS). Unfortunately this decision severely limits options available to families, especially those served by ABS, as DHHS did little to ensure similar services were established in the affected area prior to terminating the con-

Last Thursday, the Legislature's Developmental Disability Special Investigative Committee held a hearing on the DHHS shift in policy, bringing together service providers, affected family members and the DHHS Developmental Disability Director, Jodi Fenner. Senators on the committee listened to four hours of testimony from parents or guardians of the developmentally disabled defending the services provided by ABS and Goodwill Industries. Some shared cautionary tales of abruptly changing services and the negative repercussions it had on their children. Some shared success stories of improved quality of living after receiving services. And all begged for an alternative, but they were sorely disappointed as none were offered by Fenner.

After two months of evasive answers and changing arguments, it was refreshing to hear some rea-



soning for the DHHS policy shift and answers to the questions Sen. Lathrop and myself have been asking for weeks. I had hoped providing DHHS with the opportunity to hear the families affected, to understand third and do what was best for the people they serve.

Regrettably, that was not the case and both contracts will be terminated in October. In her testimony Director Fenner suggested an inconsistency in statute as a possible rationale for terminating the contracts, it is my hope that the Legislature will review this issue next session and, with the full cooperation of DHHS Developmental Disabilities, rectify the problem for the good of all Nebraska residents.

Heineman, Nelson both wrong

LINCOLN - It's remindful of Old Mrs. Shanahan and Dorothy

Old Mrs. Shanahan was something a neighborhood parent-atlarge, self-appointed and much appreciated. She broke up fights, arbitrated heated disputes over everything from a game of marbles to who stung Gilooley's billy goat with a rock, to who convinced a first-grader to wade through a flooded gutter wearing new shoes.

Dorothy Parker was a national treasure, a marvelous writer of short stories, screenplays, reviews and razor-tongued quips about people and things.

Old Mrs. Shanahan traipsed down the steps of her front porch slowly, but with the aura of the Almighty's own deputy sheriff, whether on a peacekeeper's mission or to pass among some deserving grade school rowdies with a ping-pong paddle and the longstanding blessing of neighborhood

"Boys! Boys! If you can't get along, then get along home!"

Dorothy Parker dispensed much of her wisdom at a typewriter or a cocktail party, and expressed her world-weary view with a subtlety that nonetheless had the sting of Old Mrs. Shanahan's paddle. When the phone rang and she dreaded the thought of dealing with some boorish nuisance, she reached for the receiver with the enthusiasm of the guest of honor at a hanging, climbing toward the rope. Her regular comment, to both officemates and callers:

'What fresh hell is this?"

Were Mrs. Shanahan and Mrs. Parker yet with us they could contribute mightily to the public discourse by combining talents as political consultants. Things are

getting out of hand in regard to Republican Gov. Dave Heineman and Democratic U.S. Sen. Ben Nelson. In addressing a matter of the greatest importance to their statewide constituencies the two are behaving in such a way that those constituents might look and listen, then offer the dismayed and dismal assessment: "Whenever those guys disagree, it's easy to suspect that both of them are wrong!" Heineman did his best portrayal

of the outraged state official in offering his view of what the pending changes in Medicaid would mean to the state's finances. It was a vision of calamity, fiscal decimation and the possible ruination of Nebraska as we know it. To his credit, nothing was alleged about Nelson's view of motherhood, apple pie or puppies. Nothing but evil, Heinemann seemed to say, could result from the plan supported by Nelson. Heinemann cited a recent study by a consulting outfit to back his views.

Nelson scoffed at Heineman's rhetoric. "This report doesn't make the case against health care reform," Nelson said. "It makes the case for it!"

If Heineman truly lacked sufficient concern for the healthcare of Nebraskans, Nelson suggested, the governor could try to pull Nebraska out of the popular Medicaid pro-

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

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Back-to-Back UNL water events planned in October

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Back-to-back water events are coming to Lincoln's downtown Holiday Inn in early October. The University of Nebraska-Lincoln Water Center and University of Nebraska College of Law co-host a daylong Water Law Conference Oct. 6. The Water Center then joins with the U.S. Geological Survey's Nebraska Water Science Center to present a daylong Greater Platte River Basins Symposium at the same location the following day, Oct. 7. "The Wednesday water law conference focuses on Nebraska water law and will feature a variety

of speakers and topics tailored to the practicing bar, but which will also be of benefit to anyone interested in water law," said conference organizer Lorrie Benson, assistant director of the UNL Water Center. Tentative topics include an overview of property rights to water by UNL law professor Sandi Zellmer; conservation easements by Jesse Richardson of Virginia Tech University; and Clean

Other conference sessions include issues and impacts of transactions that involve water, boundary disputes, updates on recent Nebraska water law cases, Endangered Species Act law and application, practicing before state agencies, and designing integrated management plans to simplify

Water Act enforcement by Patricia Miller of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, Region

Continuing legal education (CLE) credits for attending the conference have been applied for. The Oct. 7 Greater Platte River Basins Symposium will focus on water-related research and innovative programming in the Niobrara, Platte and Republican River basins. Robert Hirsch, a national expert in water science and policy and USGS hydrogeologist, opens the symposium with 'Perspectives on Hydrology and Water Management in a Changing World."

Other presentations that morning will examine management of water resources beyond the state's current integrated management planning requirements. A diverse panel of experts will discuss future water management, including sustainability and resilience, legal frameworks, human dimensions, whether we have the science needed, possible scenarios for the future, and reality

Attendees can choose from 20 presentations by researchers on topics ranging from basic hydrology to economics to wetlands to fish and wildlife issues. A formal poster session offers several dozen posters on a wide range of water-related topics.

Though the two events are separate, Benson said many in the water profession will find both useful and informative and a discounted registration fee is being offered to those electing to attend

The budget proposes merit increases of 2.755% with no cost of living adjustment Councilmember Alexander and Sturm disagreed with not giving all employees a cost of living adjustment. The General Fund reserve, at this time and without any changes that have taken place this evening would increase by approximately \$33,000. This is assuming there will be no change in the current valuation. If a 2% cost of living adjustment would be added to the budget, the General Fund reserve increase of \$33,000 would decrease to \$12,000. Wes Blecke, Executive Director of Wayne

Area Economic Development, presented their request for funding. Along with the monetary request, WAED was also requesting that the City provide internet services to the office

at no cost along with the technical support it currently provides; to allow WAED employee access to the health care insurance (WAED pays premiums); and to fund the gap between the City's self-insured deductible and the plan's deductible for health care insurance.

The **Transition** Specialist works with special needs students in grades 9-12 with a focus on transition planning from high school into the adult world. One Transition Specialist worked with 144 students in 23 school districts. Interest inventories, aptitude testing, and job shadows are part of this process. Encouragement is offered to students and parents to become involved with agencies that provide services to students beyond high school graduation. The Vision Program continues to provide individualized learning environments, focusing on the unique needs of

children with visual impairments. One teacher of the visually impaired served or evaluated 34 students in 11 different school districts in the six county ESU #1 service area, as well as 3 students from the ESU #8 service area. Services provided included direct instruction in the areas of braille instruction and instruction in areas of the expanded core curriculum for the visually impaired, consultation, material preparation/adaptations, and functional vision evaluations

follow-up testing included over 1,290 students. The ESU #1 Deaf Education program provides support for the unique educational and communication needs of students who have a verified hearing loss. The program provides direct and consultative services to students, as well

direct services. The department also assists with early childhood screenings, kindergarten round-ups, teacher

trainings, and pre-service presentations at local colleges
