

The possibility of combining the Wayne Elementary School students with several grades of Wayne Middle School students in the Middle School building has raised some concerns for Wayne Elementary School teachers.

Several of these teachers were on hand during Monday's regular meeting of the Wayne Board of Education.

Mike Jaixen and Jodi Lutt, teachers at Wayne Elementary,

at wayne Elementary, spoke of concerns with putting young students in the building, including crowded classrooms, the use of stairs and lunch room facilities.

Following the presentations, Wayne Schools Superintendent Mark Lenihan thanked the teachers for their input and encouraged additional dialogue between staff and administration

The issue came about

following a recent facility study that noted a number of deficiencies and issues at the Wayne Elementary School. A special Board of Education meeting on Aug. 23 included a tour of the elementary school and the presentation of four options for future building projects.

The availability of Build America Bonds to assist with the funding of projects was also discussed and a decision on whether or for the team, eliminating one expense for the district.

Prior to the board meeting, a budget hearing and final tax request was held in regard to the 2010-2011 budget.

Superintendent Lenihan told the board that "we have put together a good budget. Our mill levy will be \$1.18, which is nearly the same as last year's asking."

In reports from faculty and administration, Cheryl Suehl spoke on the Jump Start Summer School. She noted that this year's session was several hours longer

> each day and included extra days. In addition to this being a benefit for the students attending, the district should be reimbursed for some of the expenses associ-

ated with the school. Mark Hanson, Wayne High School Principal, presented information on ACT test scores for Wayne High School students and talked about a community/school effort to provide treats to students

at all three schools. He noted that overall, "there has been a nice start to the school year."

Daryl Schrunk, Wayne Elementary Principal, explained the process for Parent/ Teacher Conferences to be held Sept. 23-24. He also told the board, "people have been very generous to the schools in providing gifts to the schools. There are so many organizations and individuals too numer-

Police warn of door-to-door vendors

The Wayne Police Department has received calls and emails reporting suspicious activity or suspicious persons who may be posing as door-to-door vendors.

Wayne Police Chief Lance Webster said he isn't aware of any law enforcement reports in the area pertaining to this suspicious activity, but does urge people to use caution when strangers approach their

homes or businesses.

"If a door-to-door vendor comes to your home or business, don't be afraid to ask questions. All out-of-town vendors are required to obtain a City Vendor Permit if they are vending in Wayne. Ask to see the permit. Ask for company identification. Responsible vendors won't be offended by these questions," Webster said. "If you are home alone don't invite anyone you don't know into your home and report anything you feel is suspicious to law enforcement. Take some simple precautions and you can reduce your risks of becoming a victim," he added.

Anyone with information about this type of suspicious activity should call the Wayne Police Department at (402) 375-2626. not to proceed with the issuance of bonds will take place at a future board meeting. 




Several of the presenters spoke of the passage from Europe to America and the sighting of Ellis Island. They also talked about what brought them to northeast Nebraska.

Hunters should be aware of deer diseases

LINCOLN – Nebraska hunters should be aware of the possibility of encountering the following deer diseases when afield this fall: chronic wasting disease (CWD), brain worm and deer lice.

None of these diseases is known to be harmful to humans, according to the Nebraska Game and Parks Commission.

CWD - This disease, discovered in western Nebraska in 2000, is always fatal to deer when contracted. Deer with CWD can range in appearance from healthy looking to thin and rough looking.

Biologists last year sampled 2,983 deer from check stations during the November firearm season, with 43 new CWD positives confirmed. One positive was of unknown species and sex. Counties with positive deer included: Banner, two; Box Butte, five; Cherry, six; Dawes, five; Deuel, one; Keith, two; Kimball, one; Garden, five; Morrill, one; Scotts Bluff, seven; Sheridan, six;

and Sioux, two. An elk taken in Sioux County during the firearm season also tested positive for CWD. Biologists will be taking samples again this year to track the prevalence and distribution of the disease.

Brain worm - This disease is caused by a parasitic worm that lives in the brain of white-tailed deer without harming them. When this worm is eaten by mule deer, it may make them sick and may lead to death. Mule deer with brain worm may be found walking in tight circles, unafraid of humans when approached, throwing their heads or displaying other neurological symptoms.

This disease was suspected in the deaths of 133 mule deer in central Nebraska in 2009, where the mule deer and white-tailed deer populations overlap.

Deer lice - These exotic lice have begun to infest mule deer in western Nebraska. There have been 10 confirmed cases from Box Butte, Dawson, Frontier, Garden, Grant, Knox, Lincoln, and Morrill counties since their discovery in 2008. These lice first were found in Oregon and Washington, presumably coming from exotic fallow deer.

These chewing lice infest mule deer, creating an allergic reaction that leads to the deer scratching and rubbing to relieve itching. Deer with lice may rub hair off, creating a rough look to entire patches of hair missing. Deer eventually may become sick and die from hypothermia related to the loss of their hair coat. Deer sick with lice may appear lethargic, unafraid of humans when approached and in poor condition. Deer lice may be found in large numbers under the legs of infested animals.

Hunters discovering deer with symptoms for brain worm or deer lice should report them to their local district Game and Parks office.

Bill Schwartz (Athlete) '83: Wayne native Bill Schwartz was a standout baseball player at Wayne State from 1979 to 1982. Schwartz holds the career home run record at Wayne State with 37 and ranks Library, state commission to partner on \$3.6 million grant

The Nebraska Library Commission announced that Wayne Public Library will participate in Library Broadband Builds Nebraska Communities, Nebraska's public computer center project funded by the U.S. Department of Commerce.

The three-year project is designed to expand broadband capacity; upgrade public computing resources in libraries; and advance access to employment, learning, health information, and E-Government services. The Department of Commerce National Telecommunications and Information Administration (NTIA) Broadband Technology Opportunities Program (BTOP), funded by the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA), provides funding to expand broadband access and adoption in communities across the U.S. and intends to increase jobs, spur investments in technology and infrastructure, and provide long-term economic benefits.

In addition to the \$2,416,403 federal grant, the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation will provide \$1,251,786 in matching funds, including a grant and technical assistance to support the project. The total project budget is \$3,668,189.

"As Mayor I am very pleased to hear that this grant from the Department of Commerce has been funded." said Wayne Mayor Lois Shelton. "Our public libraries are an important resource in any community and improving access to the world through these broadband and computer upgrades will aid all residents in their information search efforts. Library computer center locations will serve as the delivery platform for educational programs, providing Nebraskans with access to audio and video webinar content and interactive computer-based training. Key project partners – such as Central Community College, Nebraska Department of Labor, Nebraska Court Administrator's Office, Nebraska Community Foundation, Center for Rural Affairs, Center for Rural Entrepreneurship, University of Nebraska-Lincoln Extension, University of Nebraska Medical Center McGoogan Library of Medicine, and the National Network of Libraries of Medicine – will facilitate these programs.

An outreach and public awareness campaign will feature special promotional programs, such as "Public Computer Center Learning Nights," to encourage residents to explore the enhanced computer and broadband services available at the centers. This grant will enable Wayne Public Library to continue to provide critically important services and to expand the opportunities, education, and services that high-speed Internet can provide to the un-served and underserved in our community.

This grant project will increase connectivity in 45 of Nebraska's public library buildings, as well as deploy more than 600 new computer workstations and upgrade another 475 at 147 public library locations. With this increased capacity to deliver rich Internet content and provide computer literacy training at libraries across the state, the project will partner with other state agencies and organizations to provide services in education, workforce development, and E-Government to 13,300 weekly users at libraries. As many as 42,700 Nebraskans will benefit.

She still ranks as the winningest coach in WSC softball history, going 142-78 in her five years as head coach from 1984 to 1988. Strate never had a losing season in softball and coached the Wildcats to back-to-back 30 win seasons, going 30-20 in 1985 and 32-14 in 1986. In volleyball, Strate posted a 123-103-1 record in five seasons as head coach from 1983 to 1987.

2001 Wayne State Baseball Team (Team): The 2001 Wayne State baseball team went 35-10 with a 12-2 record in the Northern Sun Conference. The 'Cats were NSIC Tournament Champions and advanced to the NCAA Division II Tournament for the first time in school history. Coach John Manganaro was named NSIC Coach of the Year and Brady Borner was named NSIC Pitcher of the Year after going 9-2 with a 2.74 ERA and 103 strikeouts on the season.

Darold '46 and Maxine Bartels Bobier '45 (Contributors): Darold is a 1946 graduate of Wayne State where he lettered in three sports. He served 34 years as a teacher and administrator in the Denver Public School system, retiring in 1987. He also taught and coached at Cleghorn, Iowa, (1946-48) and Hartington, (1948-53). Upsetting weekend in Colorado Wayne State dominates three ranked teams to win Premier Challenge

At the start of the year, coaches in the Northern Sun Conference inexplicably picked the Wayne State volleyball team to finish fourth in the conference this season.

After the first week of the season, Wayne State dropped two spots in the polls in spite of a perfect 4-0 weekend to start the 2010 campaign.

After $_{\mathrm{this}}$ past weekend's efforts, those who pontificate on rankings might want to start taking the Wildcats seriously.

Wayne State College capped an incredible weekend of play Saturday night at the Colorado Premier Volleyball Challenge in Denver,

beating 10th-ranked Southwest Minnesota State in the championship match by scores of 20-25, 25-21, 25-23 and 25-20.

That win came only hours after the Wildcats disposed of three-time defending national champion and defending NSIC champion Concordia-St. Paul in four sets,

winning 25-22, 15-25, 25-17, 25-23. It was an impressive weekend for the Wildcats, who also defeated No. 6 St. Leo of Florida Friday afternoon to raise their record to 8-0 on the season.

"It was a pretty exciting weekend for us," coach Scott Kneifl said. "This was the first time we were invited to this, and we felt going out there that our goal was to come back 4-0 and we just took it one game at a time and played pretty well."

The Wildcats got off to a slow start in the championship match against the Mustangs, hitting just .060 in the first set with seven hitting errors. They started turning things around in the second set, taking a 9-3 lead on the Mustangs. Southwest Minnesota got as close as two at 18-16, but the Wildcats hung on to tie the match at one set apiece.

Wayne State scored six straight points to take a 16-9 lead in the third set. Southwest Minnesota State rallied to within 23-22 before Wayne State hung on for the win. The Wildcats came back from a 9-6 deficit in the fourth set, forcing the Mustangs into 11 hitting errors in the decisive fourth set to win the match.

Tali Fredrickson had a big match for the Wildcats, finishing with 15 kills and 15 digs. Jennifer Hefner had her own double-double with 13 kills and 12 blocks, and Cori Hobbs added 11 kills and six blocks. Setter Diedra Artz had 45 set assists while libero Leigh Connot recorded 21 digs.

"We had to sit for five hours after beating Concordia, but so did Southwest after they beat No. 2 Tampa," Kneifl said. "We came out a little slow that first set, but we still scored 20 points playing our worst set of the year, so that gave us some confidence and allowed us to know that we could control the game."

Wayne State handed Concordia-St. Paul its second loss of the season Saturday afternoon, beating the Golden Bears in four sets (25-22, 15-25, 25-17, 25-23), marking Wayne State's first-ever win over Concordia and marking the first time since 2007 that the Golden Bears lost a conference or non-conference match against an NSIC opponent.

Wayne State hit a modest .222 in the first game, but held the Concordia to a .170 See UPSETTING, Page 2B

'Cats leap 12 spots to highest-ever rank

Wayne State College jumped 12 spots from No. 19 to No. 7 in the latest American Volleyball Coaches Association Div. II Top 25 coaches poll.

The No. 7 national ranking is the highest ever in program history, and comes on the heels of a first-place finish at the Colorado Premier Challenge last weekend in Denver where Wayne State beat former No. 1 Concordia-St. Paul, former No. 6 Saint Leo of Florida and former No. 10 Southwest Minnesota State.

Wayne State received six first-place votes, the second most of any team in the poll. Despite owning wins over Southwest Minnesota State and Concordia-St. Paul, the Wildcats are ranked behind the two NSIC rivals. Southwest Minnesota State is ranked fifth and Concordia-St. Paul is sixth. Other Northern Sun teams in the top 25 include Minnesota Duluth at No. 4 and Minnesota State at No. 14.

Participants have seven days from a specific date during the Challenge to enter their points (e.g., by Oct. 10 for health and financial activities performed on Oct. 3).

The SSHW Challenge is based on the performance of 10 recommended practices on a daily basis: five that involve health and nutrition and five that involve financial management.

Ten points are given for performing each one for a maximum of 700 points per week and 3,500 points for the five-week challenge. "The Challenge is a great way to convert personal health and financial goals, like losing weight and saving money, into daily action steps," noted Barbara O'Neill, Extension Specialist in Financial Resource Management for Rutgers Cooperative Extension.

The five daily health and nutrition practices are: eat at least 4 cups of fruits and vegetables; get at least 30 minutes of exercise; drink water or unsweetened beverages instead of sugar-sweetened beverages; walk 10,000 or more steps with a pedometer; and learn something new about health and nutrition.

Koski said the total for all budgets for 2010-2011 is \$76,943,900, compared to \$84,242,327 last year. She noted that funding for these budgets comes from property taxes, student tuition and fees, state aid, and other sources.

"As anticipated, the large decrease in our total budget came in the Other Funds budget. That budget has a \$6,835,081 decrease from last year," she said.

Funds from the Other Funds budget are restricted, non-tax-supported dollars that come from the capital campaigns for new building projects and proceeds from revenue bonds issued by the Facilities Corporation. In the past year, Northeast Community College has opened the College Welcome Center built with revenue bonds issued by the Facilities Corporation, to be repaid with student fees, the J. Paul and Eleanor McIntosh College of Nursing, financed with an \$11.9 million capital campaign, and the Industrial Training Building in South Sioux City. Approximately 50 percent of the funds for the Industrial Training Building project were federal funds from the U.S. Department of Commerce, Economic Development Administration.

The College Center of South Sioux City will open this winter. A portion of the cost of that project was also raised in a capital campaign.

"With the completion of these construction projects," Koski said, "our Other Funds budget shows a sizeable decrease for 2010-2011."

Koski said that the minimal levy increase of \$.00496, coupled with the increase in valuations, equates to the approximate \$2 million increase in tax asking over last year's budget. "This year, we will be asking our taxpayers for an additional \$290,461 for our General Operating Budget with the remainder of that budget increase coming from tuition and fees and other sources," she said.

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

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

All of the participants received a certificate and those winning in each age category will go on to districts in Omaha on Sunday, Oct. 10.



Suggestions offered for safely freezing tomatoes

Extra summer tomatoes can be quickly frozen without blanching whether their skins are on or off, whether they are whole, sliced, chopped or pureed.

Hair

First, be sure to select firm, ripe tomatoes to freeze. Discard any tomatoes that are spoiled. Like all produce, tomatoes need to be properly washed before freez-

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ing. Wet tomatoes with water, rub the surfaces, rinse them with running water and dry them with a paper towel. Do not wash tomatoes in a sink filled with water because contaminated water can be absorbed through tomatoes' stem scars. Using soap or detergent is not recommended with fruits and vegetables because they can absorb detergent residues. Peel the washed tomatoes by

dipping them into boiling water for about one minute, or until the skin



splits. The skin can then be easily removed. To freeze tomatoes with their skins, wash the tomatoes and then cut away their stem scars and the surrounding areas.

Wait to season tomatoes until after they have been defrosted and are about to be served. Freezing could possibly weaken or strengthen herbs and seasonings.

For freezing tomatoes, with or without skins, place them on a cookie sheet and freeze them. Once the tomatoes are frozen, transfer them to bags or containers.

For best results, use containers meant for freezing and make sure they are tightly sealed. Use a freezer with a temperature at or below zero degrees Fahrenheit. It is recommended that all frozen vegetables be eaten within eight months.

the irozen tomatoes remove them and run them under warm water in a sink. This will help defrost them and any tomato skins will slip off easily. Thawed tomatoes can be used in recipes calling for cooked tomatoes. However, freezing gives tomatoes a mushy texture, so do not substitute them for raw tomatoes. 
Re-Tree Nebraska being celebrated

With ReTree Nebraska Week set for the week of Sept. 19, we are going to cover a few topics of interest for planting trees.

Most of us think of planting trees in the spring but fall planning has its advantages. A lot of the information in this article is provided by Kelly Feehan, Extension Educator from Columbus. If you like websites, go to retreenebraska. unl.edu.

In the fall warm soil, cooler air temperatures and adequate moisture promotes root growth well into November. This gives plants time to establish new roots before having to support new spring growth. Fall planting also avoids the stress of summer heat.

The greatest concern with fall planting is if an extremely cold winter follows. Many trees sold are tagged with the hardiness zones on them; often a range of zones are given. Hardiness zones are based on low temperature averages. The zones are 2.9 in the continental



peratures become too cold for root growth. Since we are in northern Nebraska, I would feel better if we could get trees planted before mid-October. If large trees are to be transplanted, moved from one location to another with a tree spade, it is best to wait until just after the first freeze when leaves are no longer transpiring and losing moisture. When large trees are transplanted, 80 percent or more of the roots are lost. By waiting until after the first

Evergreen conifers, such as pine Magnolia. and spruce, also prefer warmer soil temperatures of around 60 to 70 degrees Fahrenheit for root growth. These are best planted in September to allow for adequate root growth and water uptake to cover the loss of water from needles during winter.

Some trees do not adapt well to fall planting. Over the years, the list Kelly has compiled includes Magnolia, dogwood, tuliptree, red maple, birch, hawthorn, poplars, cherries, plum, ginkgo, willow, many oaks, bald cypress, fir and yews. While these trees are best saved for spring planting, if an exceptional bargain is found, go ahead and try to fall plant these trees.

What are the best trees are to plant? A better question may be what not to plant. We have a good idea from experience that some trees have chronic problems and European white birch, green ash and Scotch (Scots is the proper name of this tree and may be on the tag). Avoid planting Austrees, 'Autumn Blaze' maple, Siberian elm, poplars, sawtooth oak, aspen, black locust and royal pawlonia. Kelly's personal list of "good to great" trees for this area (this is freeze, the demand for water from not a complete list) includes ginkgo, white oak, hybrid elms, silver linden, bur oak, Kentucky coffeetree, Norway maple, Ohio buckeye, Japanese tree lilac and star

Okay to good trees (mainly because they tend to be over-planted, untried, or have issues such as disease) include river birch, northern catalpa, hackberry, thornless honeylocust, American and littleleaf linden, northern pin oak, American sycamore, black walnut, black cherry, hedge maple, black alder, and European mountain-ash.

Good evergreens include ponderosa pine and jack pine on sandy soils; Norway spruce, Serbian spruce, Black Hills spruce, concolor fir, balsam fir, and white pine in protected locations. It's okay to plant Colorado blue spruce and Austrian pine, but these do have many disease problems. It showed this year as many of my calls in the Dixon/ Dakota/Thurston Co. area involved problems with these two trees. Lots of these problems occur when trees are planted too close; as they grow they crowd each other and become don't function well in this area. more prone to disease. Remember Do not plant pin oak, silver maple, your spacing when planting rows of trees; you may have to thin them out later if you are planting seedlings.

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United States with the cooler zones having lower numbers.

In this area we are right in the middle of Zone 5. For very hardy trees, those hardy to USDA cold hardiness Zones 4 or lower; fall planting is usually not a problem. Spring planting is recommended for trees hardy to Zone 5. Trees hardy only to Zones 6 or higher are not recommended for planting in our area.

Trees need to be planted early enough to allow adequate root growth to support trees over winter. Roots stop growing when soil temperatures drop to 40 degrees Fahrenheit. Ideally, shade trees are planted at least four weeks before this happens, which is usually sometime in November. For Nebraska in general, September into about the third week of October is a good time to plant most container grown and balled and burlapped shade trees that already have developed roots. These trees will establish new roots into surrounding soil up until soil temroots is reduced. Fall planting of evergreens is more of a risk because evergreens continue to lose moisture from green needles throughout winter.

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Do not plant Scotch (Scots) pine because pine wilt is near and they will soon be attacked. Green ash is under threat from the emerald ash borer so be aware of this potential problem. Planting this tree should be avoided.

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


