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Shelton looks back on 16 years

Outgoing mayor: This community is very special

When she was asked to run for the position of City Council member for the Third Ward of the city of Wayne in 1994, Lois Shelton had no political aspiration.

"Cheryl Lindau, who had decided to run for mayor, asked me to consider running for the council position she was giving up," Sixteen years later, Shelton is giving up her political life

after having served as a council member for 10 years and mayor for the past six years. Shelton was born in New York and came to Nebraska with

her husband, Dave, after he was offered a position with the University of Nebraska-Lincoln in 1976.

"We came to Wayne in 1978. At that time I had an alteration business," Shelton said.

Her business career continued at Kuhn's Department Store and later the drapery business.

She later went back to college and earned a teaching degree in home economics and sociology. She worked for a brief time with Wayne Sporting Goods, and later the Rusty Nail in downtown Wayne.

"For 17 years I ran Lois' Silver Needle downtown before moving the business to my home in 2002," Shelton said.

In addition to city government, Shelton has been active with For the Love of Animals, a predecessor of the Northeast Nebraska Humane Society, and has been an active member of the Wayne Historical Society and Wayne Friends of the

As she looks back on her years involved with the governing of the city, Shelton recalls a number of projects that she has been involved with that have benefited the citizens of the com-

"I was part of the process when the new fire station was built, the Library/Senior Center and all the projects with the downtown revitalization," Shelton said.

She said one of the projects she is most proud of is the building of the new, state-of-the-art wastewater treatment facility.

City Council following swearing in ceremonies at Tuesday's meeting of the council. Judge Robert Ensz conducted the cer-

emony, swearing in Ken Chamberlain as the new mayor of Wayne. Also taking the oath of office for their respective council seats were Kaki Ley, Dale Alexander and Jim Van Delden.

Prior to giving up her position, Mayor Lois Shelton presented her state of the city address to the council and those in attendance at the meeting. She noted a number of highlights of her time in public office, including the city moving forward with a state-of-the-art wastewater treatment facility and attempts to make the electric distribution facility more efficient.

Mayor Ken Chamberlain presented the former mayor with a plaque in honor of her years of dedicated service to the city. He noted that he "has big shoes to fill" in his new position as mayor.

The council declared a vacancy in Ward Four and authorized the city clerk to publish a vacancy notice for the position. Stephanie Hansen was the winner in the November election for the seat but has moved to Louisville, Kv., and sent notice to the city that she will not be able to serve as a council member. Mayor Chamberlain will review names of those interested in the position and bring his recommendation to the council for a vote at a future meeting.

Bloomfield preparing for new role as senator

One day last week, Dave Bloomfield said he was sorting cattle on his farm near Hoskins.

The next day, he became a state senator.

Bloomfield was sworn in Thursday afternoon as the new District 17 representative in the Nebraska Legislature. He was selected by Gov. Dave Heineman to serve out the final two years of Bob Giese's term. Giese resigned his position Tuesday to take over as Dakota

County Treasurer, a seat he was elected to in the general election one month ago.

Bloomfield was one of eight candidates who expressed interest in the position, and Heineman said Bloomfield's no-nonsense approach was what encouraged him to ask Bloomfield to take over the seat.

"We had eight very good people who applied for the position, and each had their strengths and qualities that I liked," Heineman said. "He's a very humble man,

and he understands the challenge ahead of

Bloomfield, 64, has been a resident of the 17th district for most of his life. He is a graduate of South Sioux City High School and grew up as the youngest of five children on a farm north of Jackson. He lost his father when he was eight years old and was raised by his mother, who was named Ak-Sar-Ben Mother of the Year in 1967.

Bloomfield, who served as the chairman of the Wayne County Republican Party, gave up that position and his seat on the State Central Committee for the Republican Party to accept the position to the nonpartisan Legislature.

"I got the call the evening before it was announced," he said in a phone interview a few days after being sworn in. "I had some cattle sorting to do Thursday morning before I went down to Lincoln, then after I got sworn in I went up to meet with some of the new senators that were there for a presession meeting.

Heineman said Bloomfield's position within the Republican Party did not play any effect in his decision to choose Bloomfield to serve out Giese's last two

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

On Thursday, Dec. 2, the of Nebraska (ABDN), Nebraska First Lady Sally Ganem, and Executive Director of the Nebraska Liquor Control Commission, Hobert Rupe, kicked off ABDN's Prevent Don't Provide statewide campaign to remind parents and other adults that it is illegal to buy alcohol for minors or provide it to them, no matter what the occa-

Not allowing minors to drink

alcohol or refusing to buy it for them and their friends should be non-negotiable.

Nebraska's Beer Distributors are committed to spreading this message statewide and in doing so, will offer point of sale display reminders to liquor, convenience and grocery stores in all of the distributor territories across Nebraska. Window signs, case cards, table talkers, corner clings and cooler stickers will be made available to Nebraska retailers for prominent display in an effort to remind adults that it is illegal to provide alcohol to minors.

The Nebraska Beer Distributors recognize the important role parents and other adults play in the fight against underage drinking. Providing alcohol to minors is illogal uncafo and irrognoughlo ABDN President, Tony Gillick stated, "We wanted to do our part and remind adults that it is illegal to purchase or provide alcohol to minors.

First Lady Sally Ganem said, "Buying alcohol for young people sends a message that underage drinking is acceptable, and it reinforces the perception that drinking is a rite of passage, rather than a dangerous choice. Nationally, teens who drink say they are getting alcohol from adults. We need more people to set an example at home and to help young people make better, safer choices. 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

Shelton noted that no one takes the job of mayor in Wayne for financial gains, as the position pays \$4,500 per year. She estimates she spent 15 hours per week on mayoral

"I have also been able to do a lot of traveling, both to attend meetings and to represent the city. For example, I traveled to Seattle, Wash. to visit the Pacific Coast Feather facility and promote Wayne," Shelton

Shelton said that government is a lot more complicated than people realize, and that the mayor and council deal with a large budget.

"It is amazing where all the money comes from and the fact that property taxes are only a small part of the total budget," she said.

Shelton began her political career with Joe Salitros as city administrator, and was part of the council that had a part in hiring current administrator Lowell Johnson.

"Mayor Shelton's leadership has always focused on long-term results. She and the council have targeted strategies for long term school enrollment, job creation and

"When you look at appointing someone for higher office, it doesn't matter if they are the local county chair," he said. "We need citizens who are active in both political parties. This is an individual who understands his district and is refreshingly honest, and you know where he stands when it comes to taxes and spending."

Bloomfield actually ran for the seat six years ago, losing to Pat Engle in the general election. He said he was interested in the seat because he wanted to do his part to help the state hold the line on taxes and spending.

"I think I can have some input on property taxes and holding spending in line," he said. "I think the big thing right now is to keep taxes and spending from going up, and hopefully someday we'll be able to cut taxes.'

The next session of the Legislature begins Jan. 5, 2011, and Bloomfield said he is ready to hit the ground running.

"I'm on a learning curve, and I hope to get up to speed before the session starts," he said. "I'm looking forward to getting to know people and get out and talk with people in the district."

The council also heard an update on the city's response to Nebraska Equal Opportunity Commission discrimination claim brought by Lieutenant Phil Shear and Police Chief Lance Webster.

According to Hansen, the current CAD system "is very cumbersome and not user-friendly.'

Council members talked about the benefits of the new system and what needs to be done in terms of entering data into the system.



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

Allen gym is almost ready to go

Things are about to get a little less cozy in the Allen High School gymnasium.

With the final touches being put on an expansion project for the high school's athletic facilities, Allen High's basketball teams are scheduled to christen the new floor Saturday when Wakefield comes to town for a boys-girls basketball doubleheader.

The new gym floor was an unexpected addition after summer storms created a water leakage issue that ruined the school's old gym floor.

The gymnasium expansion was expected to be finished in time for the fall sports season, allowing the Allen High volleyball team to use the gym for practices and games. While they were able to use the facility for practice, the construction delays caused by the water damage forced the Lady Eagles to play all their home matches away from home.

The problems arose in mid-July, according to Steph Sullivan, an administrative assistant at the school. The roof to the new gym was not completed when a wind storm blew through, bringing water into the old part of the gymnasium. That water found its way to the creative adjustments in the school's gymnasium use.

"The volleyball girls practiced the majority of the time when the stabilization wall was up, but they weren't able to play any home games," she said.

Once the walls were finished, the new floor was put into place. Now the bleachers are the final touch to the facility, which is expected to undergo a final state inspection Friday.

"It's long overdue," athletic director Dave Uldrich said. "There's been a definite need over the last several years, and they've been talking about it for a long time."

The old gym was a space crunch, with fans literally sitting on top of the teams and the scorer's table. Now, teams and the scorer's table are on the south side of the gym near the expanded locker rooms, which were built where the old weight room once stood. The new weight room has been moved near the trophy case.

"It's great, because we can be a subdistrict host site now and put each team in a locker room, and we'll be able to host some of our conference tournaments," Uldrich said. "It's kind of the topping on the cake."

The gymnasium expansion was not part of the school's new building that was built eight years ago, but the new renovations are the crown jewel, according to Uldrich, for the facility.







Nebraska's November firearm deer harvest set a record this fall. rising 18 percent over last year, according to the Nebraska Game and Parks Commission.

The 2010 November firearm deer harvest was 63,300, compared to 53,767 in 2009. Most of the increase is from antlerless white-tailed deer harvest, as 21,000 bonus antlerless white-tailed deer tags were added this year.

Good weather benefited hunters and farmers as the corn harvest was nearly complete at the start of the November firearm season, compared to 2009 when more than half of the crop was still in the field at the start of the season.

The following are harvest figures for each region of the state, with the percentage increase from 2009:

Panhandle (District I) - 6,580, 9 percent north-central (District II) - 11,885, 13 percent; northeast (District III) - 13,791, 32 percent southwest (District IV) - 7,042, 20 percent southeast (District V) - 13,709, 11 percent; and south-central (District VI) – 10,325, 13 percent.

"This is a good step toward our goal of a 25-percent reduction in the deer herd in eastern Nebraska over the next 3 years," said Kit Hams, big game program manager for Game and Parks. "The use of Earn-a-Buck rules on Elkhorn and Wahoo permits and the October firearm antlerless season (3,000 deer harvested) in 2010 have both been successful in increasing doe harvest."

Earn-a-Buck rules required hunters to check in an antlerless deer before or at the same time they checked a buck.

Assuming normal harvest rates during archery, muzzleloader and January antlerless seasons, hunters should harvest about 90,000 deer in Nebraska for the 2010 seasons, compared to the previous record of 80,400 in 2008 and 78,000 last year.

Nebraska has enjoyed excellent deer hunting the past three years, with record harvest numbers and record deer. A state record nontypical white-tailed deer was taken last year in Richardson

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



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

LINCOLN - Millions upon millions of people listen carefully when Warren Buffett talks, writes, muses, tells a joke or says he likes a particular kind of ice cream.

They read the Nebraskan's books. They try to see or read interviews

The Oracle of Omaha is a multimulti-multi billionaire, and

It only makes sense that a great many of those millions and millions of people who cast admiring eyes at Buffett are millionaires and billionaires. They admire him and often heed his advice and adhere to

Recently, however, Buffett's popularity has fallen off just a bit among some in the very highincome crowd.

It's because The Oracle has observed the economy and concluded, as he put it in one recent interview:


"I think that people at the high end, people like myself, should be paying a lot more in taxes. We have it better than we've ever had it . . . "The rich are always gonna say,

'Just give us more money, we'll spend more and it will all trickle down to the rest of you,' but that has not worked in the last 10 years."

Buffett has for some time been pointing out some other things having to do with taxes and the

The gist: If lower-income and middle class Americans get to keep more money they will energize the economy because, out of necessity, they will spend that money. When the very rich get to keep more money they are less likely to put it back into the economy in anything approaching the same vigor. Hardly a trickle in comparison.

And then there is Buffett's noting

There is also the reality that America is criticized because some of its corporate tax rates are high but the other side of the coin is that corporations with accountants who aren't morons appropriately take advantage of provisions, which ensure that virtually no one pays taxes at those rates.

It seems two irreconcilable points of view are at the center of things.
