However, after careful consideration (and by "careful," I mean a quick scanning of the list between bites of pizza at the Great Northeast Nebraska Shootout), here is the 2010 Wayne Herald Area Sports Top 10 List:

10. Wayne State women's basketball makes top 10: For the first time in team history, the Wildcat women are among the top 10 teams in the nation and make one of two appearances in this year's Top 10. 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





# The word is out on earmarks

LINCOLN - Great political humorists have an advantage in that their subjects are constantly saying and doing dumb things, so that all a person need do is present reality as a punch line.

And a gullible electorate is every bit as much a source of laughable doings as people sent to occupy public office, high or low.

H.L. Mencken put it beautifully: "Democracy is the theory that the common people know what they

vant, and deserve to get it good and

Taketheuproarovercongressional 'earmarks" in spending bills.

And take Attorney General Jon Bruning's throwing away \$500,000 in federal money his office received for use in the fight against the scourge of methamphetamine.

Bruning says he will return the money to the feds because, by golly, it was acquired through the nowtransparent, wide-open earmark process. This was \$500,000 Bruning requested, arguing legitimately and correctly that it was needed in the fight against meth.

By the way, Bruning is a U.S. Senate in 2012. The anti-drug money came to Nebraska via an earmark provided by U.S. Sen. Ben Nelson. Nelson is a Democrat.

You've figured out the storyline, right?

Bruning's first campaign gambit was based on the message that Nebraska should lose \$500,000 to fight methamphetamine because it began its journey from the federal treasury by way of the earmark.

Now, here is where the people of Nebraska or elsewhere in America seem to forget exactly what it is they actually asked for when the years-old fuss about earmarks

At one time earmarks were more than less secret. The public wasn't necessarily aware of which which projects.

A new public-information campaign by Nebraska Operation Lifesaver highlights the many ways drivers become distracted near train tracks - from switching the radio station, to reading a text message, to talking with a passenger The campaign will encourage drivers with the tag line, "Stay focused. Stay Alive.

"The drivers of vehicles who are distracted when approaching a railroad crossings do not realize it takes a train at the speed of 50 MPH. 5280 feet to stop their train, which is equivalent to 18 football fields,' according to Carol Daley, Executive Director for Nebraska Operation Lifesaver. "There are communities in Nebraska that have greater speed to the train passing through. in which the distracted driver will not have the split second to make the decision after approaching the railroad crossing."

More than 40 collisions were reported at Nebraska railroad crossings in 2009. Nine people died, and 18 others were injured. Distracted driving is considered a leading cause of car-train collisions.

"The job of a driver is to drive and any distraction puts themselves, their passengers, and others on the road at increase risk for a crash." said Fred Zwonechek, director of the Nebraska Office of Highway Safety. "Safe driving demands making split-second decisions, so you can't afford to be distracted at any time."

Nebraska Operation Lifesaver encourages drivers to always expect a train at any crossing, and to avoid all distractions to stay focused. That means putting away cell phones or other electronic devices near railroad tracks.

Operation Lifesaver's mission is to end collisions, deaths and injuries at highway-rail grade crossings and on rail property through a nationwide network of volunteers who work to educate people about rail safety.

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


