Mother Nature unleashed her first blizzard of 2011 earlier this week, dumping as much as a foot of snow on many parts of Northeast Nebraska. While the snow was a light and fluffy precipitation, it began falling over the weekend and continued almost non-stop well into Tuesday, forcing area schools to call off classes Monday and Tuesday and make for a late start on Wednesday. The storm made travel next to impossible on area highways, although the bus carrying the Wayne State basketball teams home from a weekend road trip in Minnesota was able to make it through on unplowed roads and return to Wayne early Monday morning. Below-zero temperatures were felt Tuesday and Wednesday, and cold temperatures are expected to continue into next week.



Summer date is on target

Snow won't slow work on facility

Five months after breaking ground, work on Wayne's new wastewater treatment facility continues and remains on schedule for a late summer completion date.

Despite recent cold and snow, crews from Eriksen Construction Company of Blair have been able to work toward completion of the \$5.1 million facility.

During the construction of the facility, representatives of Eriksen Construction, engineers with JEO Consulting Group, and city officials and employees meet once a month for an update on the project and to express any concerns or determine if any changes are necessary.

Depending on the weather, more than 20 employees may be in Wayne working on various phases of the construction.

At a recent meeting of the Wayne City Council, council members approved a change order for the project which will monitor the discharge water from the new treatment plant to Logan Creek. The monitoring system uses a small aquarium with native fish, insect and plant species from Logan Creek that has constant discharge water flowing through it.

The total cost approved by the contractor to add this monitoring feature is \$4,226.63. Both Aquarius and JEO will donate \$1,000 each towards the cost to add this monitoring feature.

When completed the facility will be home to the first-of-its-kind Aquarius system for waste treatment.

Early in the project, city officials and water/wastewater staff members traveled to Israel to view the site where the Aquarius system is produced. Later, a smaller version of the system was brought into Wayne and monitored for use in a Nebraska winter.

Following several months of debate, the council voted last summer to move forward with the Aquarius system for the city of Wayne

Sales tax sees a drop

Sales tax figures for the City of Wayne saw its first decline in eight months, although the reduction in numbers was very small.

December's sales tax revenue, which is based on October sales receipts, was at \$40,489.37, down a little more than \$150 from the same period last year. It is the first time since April of last year that the city received less in sales tax revenue.

Even with the slight dip in revenue, the city is well on its way to surpassing last fiscal year's total of \$521,105.15. During the first three months of the 2010-11 fiscal year, the city has collected \$137,710.97 in revenue, averaging a little more than \$45,900 per month. At that pace, the city should generate a little more than \$550,000 for the fiscal year.

Wayne's local radio station is going to take a new approach, though, and show off the academic side of area schools with its first Quiz Bowl competition that starts next week.

Bill Seifert, news and sports director at KTCH-AM/KTCY-FM, will host the 43-school competition when it airs on KTCH-AM weekdays at 9:30 and 10:30 a.m. Two 37,710.97es will be broadcast during the week, leading up to 48,640,080 hampionship and third-place finals on Saturday, Feb. 19.

Seifert, who joined the radio station staff last summer, said he was host of the show on a Norfolk radio station for a number of years ago and wanted to showcase the academic capabilities of area high school students.

promote the brightest and smartest students in the area," he said. "I thought it would be good to recognize these kids for their academics."

The competition is a question-and-answer format, where a three-person team confers before the team captain gives the answer. Teams have 15 seconds to come up with an answer on subjects including literature, science, geography, history and sports, with 30 seconds provided to answer mathematics questions.

After three rounds, the team with the most points is declared the winner and moves on to the next round. Sudden death competition will break any ties that develop,

The first Quiz Bowl for the station will feature 43 teams from across the northeast part of the state. Teams from Wayne, Winside and Wakefield will be among the competing schools, and Seifert said he was thrilled with the initial response the station got.

"We've got 43 area schools involved, so I'm very pleased we got this positive a response," he said.

Teams participate via telephone conference calls that are patched into the studio. The first match of the Quiz Bowl will feature Orchard and Humphrey High at 9:30 a.m., followed by Verdigre and Osceola at 10:30 a.m. Wayne High's first match will be against Hartington Cedar Catholic on Wednesday, Jan. 26, at 9:30 a.m.

The finals will be broadcast live from a yet-to-bedetermined location on Saturday, Feb. 19. The consolation and championship matches will be broadcast in front of a live audience.

Adult polio and second dose of Chicken Pox vaccine available

Polio is an infectious disease the throat and intestinal tract. It is spread through person-to-person contact with the stool of an infected person (for instance, by changing diapers). Polio used to be very common in the U.S. and caused severe year before polio vaccine was introduced in 1955. Most people infected with the poliovirus have no symptoms but some infections cause paralysis and even death.

Up to about 95 percent of people infected with polio have no symptoms. However, infected persons without symptoms can still spread the virus and cause others to develop polio. About four to eight percent of infected persons have throat, upset stomach, or flu-like inability to make a donation. symptoms and have no paralysis or other serious symptoms.

About one to two percent of infected persons develop aseptic meningitis with stiffness of the back, back or legs, and in some persons increased or abnormal sensations. Symptoms typically last from two to 10 days, followed by complete recovery. Less than one percent of polio cases result in paralysis. The

risk of paralysis increases with age. Adult vaccinations will be offered at all our public immunization clinics by appointment only. Appointments can be made by calling (402) 529-3513. Immunization's fee can be discussed at the time your appointment is made.

Students from Kindergarten through 12th grade, including all transfer students from outside the State of Nebraska and any foreign

students two doses of varicella (chickenpox) given on or after 12 months of age. Written documentation (including year) of varicella disease from parent, guardian, or health care provider will be accepted. If the child has had varicella disease, they do not need any varicella shots.

Past immunization records are required. Proxy forms are needed when a parent or legal guardian is unable to accompany the child to clinic. Proxy forms may be obtained by contacting the Wisner office at (402) 529-3513. A suggested donation of \$20 per child would be appreciated to help defray administrative costs. If a child only receives one immunization, then the suggested donation is \$13.50. No one minor symptoms such as fever, sore will be denied immunizations for

Wayne Power Plant?

Wise people have maintained a modern, reliable power plant in Wayne since the 1920's. Because NPPD wholesale power is much cheaper than diesel power we only run the plant during outages and when NPPD calls us to add power to their lines on hot days with high irrigation, air conditioner demand. The Wayne power plant has eight diesel powered generators with a combined 20,000 Kilowatts (KW) generating capacity which is more than adequate to carry our highest city electric load of about 15,000 KW in the event our regular power supply from NPPD is interrupted.

Cost: The plant and engines are valued at \$28 million. Our annual insurance premium for the plant is \$46,000. Our annual repair and maintenance has varied from minimal to \$350,000. A new muffler for one engine costs about \$40,000. NPPD pays for all of our diesel fuel until 2022 through our lease agreement with them to run whenever they call for help. NPPD also pays Wayne \$650,000 per year for us to run the plant whenever they need us. We have to heat the engines and cooling water to 110 degrees F at all times so they can be started instantly.

Fuel: When we have to run the power plant to carry our full city electric load we use 7-8,000 gallons of diesel fuel per day. Six of the engines will run on a combination of 10 percent diesel fuel and 90 percent natural gas when they are warmed up. The projected future costs of natural gas are much lower than the projected costs of diesel fuel so we will look at adding a natural gas system back to the plant.

New Air Quality Standards: EPA has released new requirements beginning in 2013 for all power plants like Wayne with reciprocating piston engines. Because we supply occasional power to NPPD we are required to install catalytic converters in the silencers (mufflers) on all our engines. Estimated cost is \$700,000 with no grant funds or federal assistance available.

Trained Staff: Wayne has five full time highly qualified city employees trained to operate the power plant on a moment's notice and maintain it when it is idle. It takes a lot of training and experience to start and operate the generators safely and maintain the plant. We'll need to look ahead to training new staff in the future as people retire.

Future Need for Power Plants: Our lease contract with NPPD that pays us \$650,000 ends in 2022. NPPD is giving notice they have no plans to renew so all the fuel costs will be ours. We keep 150,000 gallons on hand. Without the NPPD lease agreement we will need another source of outside revenue to support the plant.

NPPD plans to develop wind farms over the next 30 years. NPPD will need fast acting power plants like Wayne to start up and generate when the winds die down. This is called "load following". NPPD will likely bid out their "load following" purchase of power at the lowest price by the hour from local plants like ours. We'll have a tough time competing using diesel fuel only so natural gas will become an important option.



Wayne State overcame a slow start to defeat Minnesota Duluth 66-58 in a key Northern Sun Conference matchup Saturday afternoon, led by Ashley Arlen's season-high 26 points and careerbest 17 rebounds.

The win was an important spark for a team that suffered their only weekend losing string last year on this same road trip, coach Chris Kielsmeier said.

"We talked about how, if you want to build a program that's one of the best in the nation, you have to win in places you've played before," he said. "I was just so proud of how the players focused and came ready to play great basketball both nights."

The Wildcats struggled early against Duluth and found themselves down by 10 points, 17-7, midway through the first half. Wayne State battled back, taking the lead at 29-27 with 3:03 to go in the first half on a layup by Arlen. Wayne State closed with a 6-3 surge to take a five-point lead into the

Duluth came out hot in the second half and regained the lead, and Wayne State was down by eight points with 13 minutes to go before their defense got busy.

"The last three games have been our three best defensive performances, and after we got down eight with 13 to go, the defense only gave up 11 points after that," Kielsmeier said. "We talked about how we needed to get better defensively, and the girls responded."

Arlen had a big night in the win, while Mara Hielle added 12 points and Renee Wood put in 11.

"Ashley hit some big shots when we were out of sync offensively, but



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

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

Wildcats win own invitational

Winside won its own wrestling tournament Saturday, as the Wildcats walked of the mats with all 10 varsity wrestlers earning third place medals or higher.

The Wildcats held a 53-point margin over runner-up Newman Grove/Lindsay Holy Family, and were almost 70 points ahead of its traditional nemesis, the Howells Bobcats. The Wildcats and Bobcats have shared the tournament title for the last 10 meets, with each team winning the meet five times.

The tournament, which started in 1970, is one of the longest running in the state outside of the Class A ranks and was the 40th annual meet, with Winside earning it's 17th tournament title.

Head coach Paul Sok said, "I thought we had an exceptional day with all 12 wrestlers placing in the top four at the meet. Having five champions and four runners-up was a definite plus for us. should try to find as much quality and quantity time with their children as possible.

The world has become like the Energizer bunny, just going and going all the time. Everyone is trying to multi-task in order to get things done: trying to help the children do homework while talking on the phone; checking e-mail while the kids are watching TV. The list goes on and on.

The first step in prioritizing family includes finding time just to be together. Go to the park or take a walk. Find time to be unplugged from the world and plugged into the family. Set aside a specific time each day and stick to it. This could be making sure family dinnertime and after-dinnertime is from 6 p.m. to 7 p.m., just strict family-only time. No phone, no TV, just dinner and conversation.

It can be one special day a week, if that works better. If designating a certain time during the day doesn't work, parents should just try to find as much time in the day when their focus is completely on their kids. The key is to make it a constant in the family.

Another way to find time is to involve the children in things the parents are doing, and vice-versa. While driving home from soccer practice, talk to children and ask them about their day and schoolwork. Have the kids help out with dinner preparation. Do chores together. Let children into some daily activities parents normally do to get that quality time.

Divorce is hard and sometimes the only option, but parents should keep in mind that children should come first despite emotions, anger and frustration that the end of a relationship brings. During divorce, many children lose the constants in their lives. Some move, lose one parent, lose their social support and so on. 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
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
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Wayne County Jaycees kick off new year

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




